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## Council talks budget amid income woes

Village revenues for the first six months of this fiscal year are down in all but two categories, according to a report prepared by village manager Jim Hine.

Income from gross receipts, franchise, cigarette, gasoline and lodgers' taxes, as well as building permit fees, court fines, water and airport receipts, are lagging behind the same six-month period last fiscal year from 2.65 percent to 51 percent.

Receipts are up in sewer and solid waste, but the overall decline totals \$179,217.

Hine said municipal accounting

has some built-in problems that include a dependence upon the state accounting system for payment of some tax revenues. He said the state runs behind on remitting gross receipts, cigarette and gasoline taxes.

"Gross receipts tax is the best barometer," noted Hine. He said while overall receipts received through the end of December are just down by 2.65 percent, that includes the months when Ruidoso business is expected to be the best.

In the village's seasonal economy, Hine said revenues received in the first half should be near 64 percent in order to meet the fiscal year budget.

"Your big money still comes in

the summertime," said Hine. He said he figured the 2.65 percent shortfall on a month by month basis.

During a Ruidoso Village Council workshop Tuesday, Hine got word that November's gross receipts payment to the village will be for \$243,000.

"That's good news," said Hine, adding that he had projected just \$221,000 for November. In spite of that news, Hine said he still fears as much as a \$78,000 shortfall in gross receipts revenues for the fiscal year.

"All I'm worried about is coming out in the black this year," said Village Councillor Victor Alonso. Tuesday's budget review session

was called at Alonso's suggestion. Councillors reviewed departmental budgets and heard Hine's projections for the rest of the year.

"Your figures are very conservative," said Alonso, noting that the area is having a better ski season than last year.

"January should be a very good sales tax month," remarked Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. He said Wal-Mart should have an impact. Davis said he has heard that Wal-Mart is depositing a great number of checks from Otero County.

"They've been here since last

March," said Hine. Davis wondered if the village is being credited correctly in Santa Fe, recalling past incidents when

another village received some Ruidoso taxes.

"We need somebody in Santa Fe," said Davis.

Hine presented two recommendations to free-up funds to cover a possible deficit in the general fund. He suggested repealing an ordinance that increased the lodgers' tax rate to three from two percent with a requirement for the village to match those collections.

He said the village could still deposit \$40,000 or so into the economic development fund, but would release as much as \$81,000 for the general fund.

Village Councillor Jerry Shaw said she would support repealing the ordinance since a bonding coun-

cil told her the money couldn't be used to guarantee bonds.

But Alonso disagreed, calling the village matching funds an investment in the future.

He reminded the group of the debate that preceded passing the ordinance.

"It was a compromise," said Village Councillor Ray Dean Carpenter, adding that he was against it from the beginning.

"I would not feel comfortable renegeing on the way it was done," said Mayor Davis.

Shaw said the New Mexico Municipal League will support a bill this session to raise the limit on

## Planning & Zoning allows neon sign

What kind of signs best portray the desired image for the Village of Ruidoso?

Members of the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z), during a regular meeting Monday, approved a neon sign for the Cattle Baron Restaurant, but not before debating the merits of neons and other types of signage.

Enforcement officer Sandy Hall told the commission that she couldn't approve the restaurant's request for a neon sign because the sign ordinance doesn't allow neons. Owner Jeffrey Wilson and agent Earl Dawdy were at Monday's meeting asking for a variance to that ordinance.

"If we allow this ... we'll have many that will come to us wanting neons," said Commissioner Marie Rooney. She said several area people make beautiful signs, but neons would have to be purchased and serviced by out-of-town companies.

"It's going to set a precedent," warned Commissioner Ellen Long. Commission Chairman David Smith, Rooney and Long finally opposed the variance, which passed in a six-to-three vote.

Smith said the question of whether to allow neon signs should

be addressed in a change to the ordinance, noting that to grant a variance would be to invalidate the ordinance.

"We're between a rock and a hard place," said Smith.

Dawdy, speaking on behalf of the requestor, said he didn't think the regulation's purpose was to eliminate neon.

"It's very ambiguous to say no neon," said Dawdy.

"It's not ambiguous at all," retorted Smith. "The long-term purpose was to work toward a neon-free Ruidoso," he added.

Wilson said the sign proposed is not "obtrusive or offensive," and commissioners agreed after looking at pictures of the sign which will be just like the one on the Cattle Baron in Roswell.

"There's nothing wrong with it (neon) if it's in good taste," said Commissioner Eddie Nichols.

Commissioner Pete Thompson wondered if the commission could dictate "taste," and suggested drafting guidelines for neon signs. He said other signs already in place could be used as examples.

"We open the door and we're going to get some real Las Vegas specials," warned Thompson. He said the commission should be Please see Planning, page 2A

## Fire damages Enchanted Forest home

A garage and bedroom were destroyed by a structure fire Monday at the Ken Strom residence in Enchanted Forest.

Deputy Chief Carl Palmer of the Bonito Volunteer Fire Department said all his available firefighters responded to the scene when the call was issued in midafternoon Monday.

Palmer said both Mr. and Mrs. Strom suffered from smoke inhalation and were transported to Lincoln County Medical Center by Alto Ambulance.

Although much of the house and its contents were saved, Palmer said the entire structure underwent extensive smoke damage. A car parked in the attached garage was

destroyed, said Palmer.

Fort Stanton firefighters backed up the Bonito volunteers in extinguishing the blaze, said Palmer. He said the firefighters remained at the scene for about seven hours.

Palmer confirmed that a problem occurred in dispatching the fire units to the scene.

"It was kind of a mixup at the Sheriff's Office," said Palmer. But he said most members of the Bonito group knew where the house is located because the Stroms are members of the volunteers.

Palmer said neither a damage estimate nor a cause for the fire have been determined.

Building permits in 1986 end at half of 1985's valuation

A decline in village building continued in December when permits issued were at the lowest level in five years. The office of the building inspector issued just 13 permits with a valuation of \$324,844, during the month of December, down slightly from November's 14 permits at \$373,044, and way down from the same time in 1985 when 25 permits were issued with a valuation of

\$980,431. December's sluggish building brought the year-end figure on permits issued to just over half the 1985 total. In 1986 337 permits were issued in all categories with a total value of \$11,733,991, while in 1985 the village saw 578 permits worth \$22,822,239. Just two new single family residence permits with a valuation of \$197,540 were issued in December, holding steady to November's three at \$167,856, but a sharp decline from December 1985

when the village saw six new homes started with a valuation of \$576,578. Residential addition starts numbered five in December, and their value was listed at \$17,795. In November permits were given for eight residential alterations worth \$126,060, and in December 1985 the village issued permits on eight redo projects valued at \$102,090. Commercial building, at a standstill for September, October and November, saw one permit valued at \$55,680 issued in December. Last December the village issued four

the lodgers' tax rate to five percent. "Ruidoso must be the only town that hates it," she said. In discussions on how the ordinance was passed and who supported it, Mayor Davis said the larger lodging establishments don't usually attend meetings of the lodgers' association. "As far as we can determine we're the only municipality in the state that spends 133 percent on advertising and promotion," said Hine. Hine also recommended paying the engineering department from the water and sewer fund for half the year. He said the engineer supervises those departments, and having engineering services paid

for from those funds would release about \$37,000 from the general fund. In a telephone conversation Wednesday Hine said municipalities are not permitted to go into deficit spending. "Elected officials can be held personally liable for approving expenditures that don't have the funds to cover," added Hine. Also during Tuesday's workshop, Mayor Davis recommended exploring the possibility of self-insurance. Assistant manager Frank Potter said the village is practically self-insured now. "We're taking all the exposure and paying them (insurance companies) all the money," said Potter. He said the village spends about \$550,000 a year on insurance. Hine warned councillors against opting for self-insurance on workmen's compensation.

"One claim could wipe you out," said Hine. In other business, councillors briefly discussed proposed ordinance changes and heard from Paul Crown of Lincoln Cablevision. Crown said cable rates, deregulated by the federal government on January 1, will be increased on February 1 by \$4 a month. He said his increase will net the village an increased franchise and gross receipts tax revenues. "A lot of people are going to accuse you of giving me a 15-year franchise so I could raise my rates," said Crown. "I was going to raise my rates anyway," he added. "He needs to keep raising this every year until it gets to \$40 or \$50 a month and we'll all go out and buy satellites," said Alonso. "Everything will be scrambled," replied Crown.

consistent. "Nobody wants flashing signs," remarked Commissioner Jess Stinson. "Ruidoso is going down the tubes architecturally and other ways," said audience-member Sue Taylor. She worried that allowing the neon sign will "let a little Las Vegas happen here." When the commission finally gave the go-ahead for the neon sign, Commissioner J.D. James stipulated that it be a "channel-type" neon affixed to the building. In other discussions on the sign ordinance, Commissioner Ken Carr asked Hall what the sign ordinance has to say about Christmas lights. Hall said the ordinance allows temporary holiday decorations to remain in place from 60 days before the holiday until 15 days after. "What about portable signs... like Big John's?" asked James. Hall said the ordinance doesn't allow portable signs, adding that she has notified the owner of the Big John's sign that his sign does not

comply with village regulations. In further discussions the commission talked about bright floodlights on signs, sodium vapor lights at the "Y" that an audience member said look like a forest fire, and the new traffic light on Sudderth Drive. "I don't think they could have done it any uglier," said Smith. "While we're talking, what do we do about sidewalks downtown?" asked James, adding that someone is going to be injured walking in the Midtown area. And Charles Gray, a visitor at the meeting, entered into the discussion wondering why the village plans to hire a professional planner to develop plans for the airport land. "Why not ask the people?" asked Gray, suggesting that at least part of the land be set aside as a park. Gray said Ruidoso has no place to go sledding, and recommended the north end of the runway as a good place to sled. James suggested the airport land would be a good place for a cemetery.

Gray was critical of plans to develop Moon Mountain, and heard that discussions on that subject were postponed until the next meeting. Gray, calling himself "the Christmas freak in Paradise Canyon," was also critical of The Ruidoso News. In regular business Monday, the commission: —Agreed to recommend a portion of the airport land as a proposed site for a new post office. Hall said a letter from the U.S. Postal Service asked for a recommendation of a 2.5-acre site for a new 17,000 square-foot postal facility. —Approved an amended replat on lots 1B, 2A and 2B of lots 1 and 2, Block 1, White Mountain Heights. —Set Tuesday, February 17, as the date to have final discussions on a proposed zoning ordinance and comprehensive plan. Hall said a public hearing will be scheduled for that evening. Commissioners agreed to bring suggested revisions in writing to the P&Z meeting on Monday, February 2.

During a regular meeting of the Heart Association board Monday,

blood drive chairman Cal Cowden said the United Blood Services will conduct a blood drive from 9 a.m. until 6 p.m. February 4 in the public meeting room at Lincoln County Medical Center. "We're running a 25 percent deficit," noted Cowden, explaining that area patients need 25 percent more blood than is being donated at local blood drives. Cowden said 100

donors are needed on February 4. On Valentine's Day, February 14, the Heart Association will check blood pressures in the foyer of Wal-Mart. Members want to stress the relationship between blood pressure and a healthy heart, and will distribute Heart Association literature at the screening.

Paving district in county passes final hearing

The Special Assessment Paving District 1, final protest hearing, was heard Tuesday by County Commissioners John A. Hightower, Ralph Dunlap and William Karn. In a two-hour hearing, a small portion of the paving district was deleted. The protest, filed by Lester and Yvonne Lanelli, resulted in the deletion from the paving assessment of Sun Valley lots 1 through 9, 11 and 12, Block 9; and lots 4, 5 and 6, Block 7. According to county attorney Steven Sanders, 2,100 notices to property owners were sent out on the assessment district. His office

received seven protest letters in return. "It means the county did their homework in putting this together," Sanders commented. "The district requested this through petitions. Apparently the residents felt good about the way this was put together for there to be so little protest." The assessment district involves approximately 20 miles of paving, involving 2,000 property owners in District 1. Property owners in Alto, Eagle Creek, Sun Valley, High Mesa and Deer Valley Meadows petitioned the county commissioners over a year ago to consider this paving project. In a regular commissioners'

meeting December 23, the bid for the paving contract was granted to Bill McCarty Construction Company of Ruidoso. McCarty had the low bid of \$2,836,563. Work on the project could begin as early as March. The original cost estimates were \$2,260, \$1,130 and \$745 for paving that would have consisted of double and triple penetration. "The bid was low enough," Sanders said. "We've been able to lower the cost to property owners and upgrade the road to all-aspalt." The assessment price to property owners will now be \$1,640 per lot on the road, \$820 per lot for those off the pavement and \$541 per lot for owners primarily in Deer Park.

There will not be any interest charged if property owners pay their full assessment before February 23. Otherwise, payments will be spread over a 10-year period, with the first payment due October 1. Equal payments will then be made at six-month intervals. Interest will be set when the bonds are sold, sometime in March, but the interest cannot exceed 12 percent. In a telephone interview, county manager Suzanne Cox, was "pleased everything went so smoothly." "This is a historic day for Lincoln County," Cox continued. "This is the first paving assessment Lincoln County has ever passed."

Man killed in crash

A 46-year-old Ruidoso man was killed and two Texas men injured in an early morning crash on Highway 70 about eight miles east of Ruidoso. Deputy Medical Examiner Jim Stover said he pronounced the man dead at the scene at 3:35 a.m. The victim's name is being withheld until next of kin can be located and notified, said New Mexico State Police Officer Jim Long. Injured in the accident were the driver and co-driver of a 1985 Freightliner 18-wheeler, according to Stover. He said the driver, Louis Sonis, 51, of Texas was admitted to

Lincoln County Medical Center in serious condition after apparently suffering chest and hip injuries. Stover said the co-driver, Robert Cox, 50, of Leadville, Texas, had some potentially critical injuries and was transported by Emergency Medical Services to St. Mary's Hospital in Roswell. Officer Long, who was still at the scene at 8 a.m. today (Thursday), said the Ruidoso man was driving a GMC pickup. He said the driver apparently went left of center colliding head-on with the 18-wheeler. Long said he was continuing his investigation.

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### Mushroom Delight

This is an old recipe that my Mother has always utilized when we were expecting a bunch of company or when she wanted to freeze some meals to have on hand. When my children were just babies and we would make the long trek to Mom and Dad's, I always knew there would be a big pot of Mushroom Delight simmering on the stove when we arrived. Mom would serve this with hot bread and a big tossed salad. It always rejuvenated us.

It must be good because Mom is remembered for it. Last month when my brother married in El Paso, his best man came up to Mom and said "Mrs. Jones I'll always remember your great Mushroom Delight!" We couldn't believe that he would remember something he had eaten at Mother's so long ago, much less that he would remember the name of the dish!

Think you'll like this old standby.

### Mushroom Delight (serves 8-10)

- 2 lbs. ground meat
- 1 large onion, diced
- 2 small cans mushrooms
- 1 large package of flat egg noodles
- 1 large can of tomatoes (approx. 4 cups)
- 1 large can of tomato juice (the big one)
- 1 lb. package of Velveeta
- 1 green pepper, finely chopped (optional)

Brown meat in a large soup pot. Drain off excess fat. Add onion, mushrooms, egg noodles, tomatoes and green pepper (if you desire). Cook over low heat for about 30 minutes adding the tomato juice as needed. Add cheese and simmer for an additional 30 minutes.

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

"I'm trying something that is not usually done in shows," reported Hosmer. "In order to maintain a reasonable price range, I will display some pieces in matts, with no frames." He added that the price range for his work will be \$75-\$800. The reception for the event will be a wine/hors d'oeuvre party from 6-9 p.m. Saturday, January 24.

Hosmer, a noted art workshop instructor, received his B.A. in Art Education at the University of Texas in El Paso. Additional education includes studies in oil painting with Carl Colgar and William Henry Earle, and watercolor with Edgar Whitney, Charles Reid and

Frank Webb. He holds memberships in the New Mexico Watercolor Society, Artists Equity Association and Southwest Watercolor Society, and an associate membership in the American Watercolor Society.

Let us be grateful to our community for a spirit of true friendship and need and let us help Ken and Beth Strom all we can.

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

Ruidoso closed the gap to six or four points several times in the final quarter, but the visitors hung on for the victory.


Senior guard Veralyn Platta led the Warrior scoring with 10 points on five field goals, scoring six of her points in the first quarter.

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

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



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## Committee hears requests for promotional funds

An additional \$875 was granted at the request of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce (also presented by Radzewicz), for John Jeffers and Dan Kelley to attend the 28th Annual New Mexico Sport Show in Albuquerque, Friday through Sunday, February 20-22.

Chamber executive director John Jeffers presented committee members with copies of various communications from Crume Advertising and Epstein Communications, detailing where and with whom various advertising dollars were spent. Jeffers noted that there is still an additional \$25,000 from the original budget available.

Gary Miller, of the Lincoln County Heritage Trust, and David Kirkpatrick of Human Systems Research, made a lengthy but vague request for an undetermined amount of money to promote "The McSween Site: Wild West Dig at Lincoln State Monument." It was finally suggested that they meet with John Jeffers and Bill Hirschfeld to come up with a budget for the request—to be presented at the next regular meeting.



Lincoln County Commissioners approved county applications to New Mexico for state disaster assistance in their meeting Tuesday.

—Received a \$25,000 grant through the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District for the purpose of conducting a historic survey of Fort Stanton. A request for proposals will be published.

—Appointed Barbara Duff to the Lincoln County Personnel Board for District III.

—Appointed Mike Lafayette to the Carrizozo Health Center Advisory Board.

Before closing the meeting for executive session, commissioners discussed remaining in open meeting and were told by county attorney Gary Mitchell that District Attorney James Weldon had specifically requested an executive session and would not appear at an open meeting."


## Greeters host Artesia, Cruces chamber members

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




## Inside the Capitol

**SANTA FE**—What makes our American form of democracy unique is what also makes it work. We call it the system of checks and balances.

Why is it then that many who come before us and ask to be elected to high posts in a government operating according to this form resist above all else the application of the very checks and balances that make the system work?

That's what all Ronald Reagan's present troubles are about. Here is a man who was frustrated that Congress could, as he apparently saw it, "interfere" with what he wanted done in regard to supporting the Nicaraguan contras. He put out the word, either directly or by indirection, that the right of Congress to so check his actions was to be ignored.

When pressure from the families of those held hostage and his own need to demonstrate that he is no Jimmy Carter, who let Americans languish in the captivity of Muslims for 444 days, built up in him, he gave other signals that the orders of those who were checking his use of negotiating power should be ignored.

What he wanted got done, and the nation may be a long time in recovering from those facts.

Or take the man who recently left office as New Mexico's governor. In one of those dozens of self-exculpating interviews he gave before going on his way, he told a reporter that one of the things he learned in his four years in office was to make "a little bit" of effort "to try to work with the system." After that rather remarkable revelation, he went on to add that the very idea of doing that "still bothers me." What he objected to, he says, and what contributed to making his term in office the debacle it was, is "all of the compromises that some people would insist upon."

Compromise, you might have expected even Toney Anaya to have comprehended by now, is the heart of the system. We have structured our government in such fashion that one part of government can propose, but can seldom act without the cooperating authorization of another part. To get that, it is almost always necessary to compromise. Those who do not understand that, or are unwilling to accomplish it, should not

accept positions of authority in the American system.

It is perfectly clear from all the things he told us while in office that Toney Anaya wanted to be a dictator—a benevolent one, undoubtedly, but a dictator all the same.

Others who have recently been in power in the state give evidence of suffering from the same syndrome. In our state Senate in recent sessions, for instance, we had men in charge who wanted to control every vote before it was taken, in preference to the riskier way of letting members vote their own consciences. The one thing they fought like sin was the notion of compromise.

In all these instances, those who wanted to by-pass the system as it has been established have one compelling reason, they tell us, for doing so. The way our various constitutions set down for us to work, they insist, is not efficient.

Translated, that means the system does not allow them to have their way as often as they would like to.

This space has been used before to lament the lack of historical knowledge manifested by many of those chosen to rule over us at this point in our developing history. If such men understood the way this nation was begun and organized, they would know why the system is designed the way it is.

Paradoxically, each of those who tries to shortcircuit the arrangement we have built for the protection of the citizens will almost always tell us he is the most convinced of practicing patriots. It's just that such people want to practice their own form of patriotism, not the sort of government we have previously agreed upon.

If you want more examples of this single failing, just mouth the names Nixon and Haldemann and Erlichman. They made the mistake of believing they could run things their way, when what the people, the law and the constitution demand is those who will run it our way.

A further interesting point is that doing what they want to do leads to nothing but trouble, while "working within the system," as Anaya would put it, gives us a peaceful and productive nation and state.

The municipal, county and state road crews were out all weekend, working to exhaustion, trying to keep up with the storm. An impossible task. The ice and snow covering the roads had too big a headstart before the men and equipment began their battle to clear them ... at the very beginning of the storm, early Thursday afternoon, Angus Hill was solid ice. The first salt truck didn't get there until after 8 p.m. I know, because I was off the road waiting for a tow truck.

The first person to come to my rescue, after setting in a ditch, off the road on Angus Hill for almost two hours, was Deputy Sheriff Larry Brinkley. His kindness and consideration for my safety were beyond the "call of duty."

Larry and Mike Thompson from

Sierra Blanca Wrecker Service arrived promptly. Expertly and with great care, they carried my car and I safely to Capitan.

The storm had settled in, other people were sliding off the roads, equally courageous people were pulling them out or helping in some way to keep them safe. And road crews kept up their battle. A semi-trailer rig slid, jackknifed and "took out" 32 feet of guard rail outside of Capitan Friday evening.

As the storm moved out the winds began. Drifts appeared. Reports from the north side of the Capitan Mountains estimated drifts from five to six feet in some places and 20 to 35 feet in others. County road crews worked through the night Sunday "out north" trying to dig out the ranchers, the crews and equipment getting stuck in their attempt to open those roads which are a vital link for the people stranded out there.

By Monday morning the storm was gone, the winds were quiet, everyone was beginning to dig out. Roads were still snowpacked and icy. It surprised me to learn that school would resume as usual. I had expected the school to be closed, with the roads still so treacherous, or, at least, delayed two or three hours.

Now, the reports were of school buses stuck. One bus was stuck three different times, with children on board.

To receive state funds the law dictates our schools must be in session a certain number of days each school year, or the funding is withdrawn. To remain within those dictated days our school was "in session."

It made me wonder how we have arrived at this point. Is there something wrong with a society that allows monetary gains to endanger our most precious resource, the fragile lives of our children?

## Four bettors collect \$37,000 each on Trifecta

Oklahoma businessman E.J. Branch and his wife, Amber, were both in the money during Sunday's program at Sunland Park Race track. Branch's horse Senator Billy B. earned \$276 with a third-place finish, while his wife collected \$37,794 on a winning Twin Trifecta ticket.

Amber Branch was one of four lucky fans who walked off with more than thirty-seven grand by busting the largest Twin Trifecta pool in the history of Sunland Park. After opening with a carryover of \$105,000 on Sunday, the jackpot ballooned to \$151,000 when fans went after the hefty pool.

Sunday's crowd of 4,464 was the highest attendance in nearly two years at Sunland Park. The total amount wagered on the program - \$507,749 - was the 5th largest handle since the track opened in 1959.

Joining Amber Branch for the big payday were El Pasoan Jim Singleton and Anchorage, Alaska, resident Larry Walstrand. The final winner requested that his name not be published.

Singleton, a 44-year-old fuel buyer for Petro Inc. in El Paso, said he used a consensus of the handicappers selections in the Daily Racing Form to pick his winning tickets. He spent \$36 on the com-

binations.

"I thought the payoff was \$3,700 not \$37,000," Singleton remarked while collecting his winnings. "The most I've ever won at the track was \$156."

Larry Walstrand, a 48-year-old heavy duty equipment welder, said he and his wife, Trina, almost missed Sunday's racing program.

"We talked about leaving on Thursday," said Walstrand, who was visiting friends in El Paso. "Then we decided to stay for the weekend. I'm glad we did."

Walstrand said it cost him \$210 to peg Sunday's winning Twin Trifecta combination.

"It was a very heavy gamble for me," he said, adding that his wife was unaware of the wager. "I've never bet \$200 in my life."

The Branch's are accustomed to earning large payoffs at Sunland. Senator Billy B., the horse they came out to watch on Sunday's program, pocketed \$165,000 by winning the Riley Allison Futurity in 1985. The horse is named after E.J.'s brother - Billy - who is an Oklahoma state senator. Amber Branch spent \$8 to win a fourth of Sunday's Twin Trifecta pool.

A winning Twin Trifecta ticket correctly picks the top three finishers in two consecutive races.

Sunland Park's Twin Trifecta climbed to an all-time high of \$152,000 last Sunday before four lucky fans managed to peg the consecutive trifecta event. In the first half, Washington Lobby (3-1) crossed the wire in front of Aldura and Ama Hit to create more than 400 \$1 exchanges. In the second-half it was favored Chili J.E., Schoolerville and Pappys Brother leading the way. Four tickets out of the 400-plus exchanges managed to come away winners of more than \$37,700 each.

Racing fans wagered more than \$150,000 on Sunday's third race creating one of the highest single race wagering totals in the history of Sunland Park.

Sunday's handle of \$507,749 was the fifth-highest total in the history of the track. The attendance of 4,464 was also one of the track's highest totals.

Last Saturday's racing action was called off due to a freak winter snowstorm. The storm dumped about four inches of snow in the El Paso area, which severely hampered travel in the city for most of the morning.

There were two claims over the weekend. On Friday, Willard and Shirley Turner tagged Pukula for \$2,500 and Saturday, William and Bill Laursen got Rochelle for \$8,000.

It didn't take jockey Mike Lidberg long to return the winner's circle after being sidelined with an injury. The young reinsman won his very first attempt in a very tight photo after going down three weeks ago.

Up Front Runner displayed his usual quick start while winning last Sunday's Juarez Handicap. The 5-year-old speedster also won the 350-yard division of the Savannah Swinger Series earlier in the year.

winner Lubbock County was named Top 2-year-old Thoroughbred Filly of 1986 by the Texas Thoroughbred Breeders Association last week. The Jerimi Johnson filly also accounted for a second-place finish in the Pocket Coin Handicap at Ruidoso. Owners James and Ellen Hambrick, of Canutillo, Texas, bred the filly.

## Up Front Runner stays in front for victory Sunday

Up Front Runner lived up to his name while posting a narrow victory in Sunday's \$8,000 Juarez Handicap at Sunland Park Race track.

Racing as the slight second choice to win the 350-yard dash, the Texas-bred quarter horse broke alertly and was never headed as he stepped off the fastest clocking for the distance this season.

Jockey Rick Thedford went along for the ride aboard the win-

ner, never unocking his whip for the neck verdict that was posted in 17.60 seconds. Thedford was taking his second mount on Up Front Runner after piloting the James Gerhards trainee to a distant fourth-place finish in the final leg of the Savannah Swinger Series on Dec. 28.

Owners Eddie and Karen Jacobs of Mission, Texas, earned \$4,800 for the victory. From his last seven

starts, Up Front Runner has made five trips to the winner's circle. He won the opening race in the Savannah Swinger Series by a neck last October, before finishing fourth in the final two divisions.

## Sunland to participate in bettors' World Series

Officials of Sunland Park announced Friday the race track will participate in the \$187,500 World Series Of Handicapping at Penn National in Pennsylvania by sending a Sunland Park representative to the famed handicapping event. The winner of Sunland Park's 1987 Best Of The West Handicappers Showdown scheduled Jan. 31 and Feb. 1 will gain an automatic seed to the national contest this fall, which hands its winner \$100,000. Sunland's Handicappers Showdown will offer a \$2,500

guaranteed purse with 60 percent of the jackpot going to the winner. The entry fee is \$25 with an entry deadline set for Jan. 28. Contestants will start with a mythical \$1,000 bankroll, wagering on 22 races over two programs at Sunland Park. The handicapper with the largest amount of money at the end of the two days wins the contest. Sunland Park will provide air fare and lodging to the World Series Of Handicapping conducted at Penn National Race Course in Grantville, Pa.

## Fans wager big bucks in chase after record Trifecta Friday

Horse racing fans bet a seasonal high \$390,000 on Friday at Sunland Park chasing the largest Twin Trifecta carryover in the history of the track. The wager eluded more than 3,100 fans for the eighth consecutive program and track officials projected the pool would reach \$160,000 when racing resumed on Saturday. Sunland's management was overwhelmed on Friday when 3,127 fans wagered \$390,527. The betting total was the highest Friday handle in more than two years. Nearly a fourth of the large handle was bet on the Twin Trifecta events as fans wagered more than \$94,000 chasing a \$68,000 carryover. The carryover

soared to \$105,000 when no winning tickets were cashed on Friday. The record Twin Trifecta carryover has helped Sunland experience its three best handles of the season. Last Saturday, total betting broke the \$300,000 mark for the first time this season when 2,853 fans wagered \$322,621. The following day, the handle totaled \$308,614 with 3,049 fans in attendance. After a six-year absence, the Big Q wager was re-introduced for Friday's program and appeared to be well received. Fans wagered nearly \$22,000 on the Big Q, which requires handicappers to pick the first two finishers in the 10th and 11th races on the program.

**HOT TO CHOOSE AND STORE:** Skin should always be glossy and smooth. The fruit (it really is, you know, although it's served as a vegetable) should be firm and heavy with a bright green, fresh cap. Avoid wrinkled or bruised eggplant or those with yellow, wilted caps. Store in refrigerator. Keeps well for several days.

**Basic Preparation**  
It's an old wives' tale that eggplant has to be peeled, sliced, salted and weighted for a couple of hours to squeeze out the juice. Just slice and use—not even necessary to peel unless the skin is quite tough. Eggplant is best prepared with a crisp crust to contrast with its soft, tender pulp.

**BAKED:** Just cut in 3/4 inch slices, arrange in a large flat baking dish, brush with a seasoned melted butter and bake at 375° until tender and golden brown.

**SAUTEED:** Slice into 3/4 inch circles. Saute in butter or olive oil until golden brown. Salt, pepper, and serve piping hot.

**FRENCH FRIED:** Cut eggplant into 3 inch "French Fries," roll in seasoned bread crumbs or flour and cook in deep fat at 375° until golden brown.

**SKEWERED:** Eggplant cubes alternated with tomato wedges and cubes of meat make a superb shish kabob. For extra flavor, brush all with a mixture of equal parts of lemon juice and olive oil with a touch of garlic.
