School elections Mil levy squeaks by; Fuchs, Cox elected by voters in Capitan

The Ruidoso two mil levy passed by a mere 10 votes in Tuesday's election.

Unopposed on the ticket, Don Swalander and Mike Morris will remain on the Ruidoso Board of Education. Winning seats on the Capitan Board of Education were Hollis Fuchs in Position 1 and Kenneth Cox for Position 2. Fuchs had two opponents, Cox had two after a third dropped out of the running.

The final, official tally of votes cast was 143 for and 133 against the Ruidoso School two mil levy. Ruidoso has supported the mil levy since it first appeared on the ballot in 1981. Funds derived from the mil levy have been used and will be used for maintenance repairs, furnishings, equipment and upgrading building conditions in the Ruidoso School District.

Associate Schools Superintendent Mike Gladden is "extremely happy that the mil levy got by, we're pleased that the public passed it."

Low voter turn-out resulted in just 276 total votes cast in the Ruidoso District.

Incumbents Swalander and Morris were unopposed for their positions on the Ruidoso Board of Education.

Swalander was "glad it passed (the mil levy). We needed it bad. I

don't feel like people quite understood what it means to the schools." He was sorry that voter turn-out seemed to show a lack of interest.

The Capitan ballot had a large slate of candidates for the two vacant positions on the board.

Fuchs with 222 votes has won the Position 1 seat and Cox with 214 votes has taken Position 2.

"Now it's time to put the politics behind us," Fuchs said in a telephone interview Wednesday, "it's time, now, to get busy with educating our kids and doing the best we can for them. I was impressed with the campaign, everyone on the ballot kept the politics real clean."

With 423 total votes cast in the Capitan election the final ballot count for Position 1 includes Hollis Fuchs 222; Jimmie Luna 165; and Jerri Jo Wilson 42. In Position 2 it was Kenneth Cox, 214; Curtis Payne 135; Kenneth Huey 71; and Jim Leslie 7.

At the Capitan Teachers Candidate Forum, January 27, Jim Leslie stated although it was too late to officially withdraw he was withdrawing from the election and asked those present not to vote for him.

Council's neon sign decision may have far-reaching effects

When the Ruidoso Village Council overruled a sign ordinance variance granted by the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z), that action raised questions about the appeal process and the ordinance itself.

It all started when P&Z granted a variance to allow The Cattle Baron Restaurant to erect a neon sign, a type prohibited in the sign ordinance. Several private citizens,

including a local signmaker, appealed the sign and the council overturned the variance.

That decision was apparently based on the village attorney's opinion that the sign ordinance has no provision for variances. Some P&Z members wonder how that effects variances the commission has granted in the past.

In a letter to village attorney John Underwood, P&Z enforcement officer Sandy Hall agreed the ordinance doesn't clearly have a provision for variances, but added it

seems to be implied in section 8-7-6 (Appeal). Underwood was out of town and unavailable for comment this week.

"It's always been my understanding that we have the right to give a variance," said P&Z Chairman David Smith Wednesday. He said he opposed the variance since the ordinance clearly prohibits neon signs.

P&Z commissioners wondered Monday why the ordinance has an appeal process if relief can't be granted through a variance.

The ordinance describes types and sizes of signs allowed and lists prohibited signs, including neon. A business applying to erect a sign that complies with the ordinance is issued a sign permit by the P&Z enforcement officer.

If the application is for a sign that doesn't conform with the sign ordinance, then the enforcement officer denies the application. In the past an applicant whose sign permit application was denied, could appeal to P&Z, according to the ordinance:

8-7-6 APPEAL

A. Any sign permit application which is rejected, for any reason, by the Officer may be appealed to the Planning and Zoning Commission. The applicant shall submit, in writing, a request to be placed on the Planning and Zoning

Commission agenda within five (5) working days of the rejection. The appeal will be scheduled for the next Planning and Zoning Commission meeting, provided the Planning and Zoning Commission agenda deadline has not passed, in which event the matter will be scheduled for the next regularly scheduled Planning and Zoning Commission meeting.

P&Z has heard "many" requests for variances to the sign ordinance, but has turned down the majority, said Hall. But P&Z has granted variances in size and has allowed at least one business to temporarily use a portable sign, another type specifically prohibited in the ordinance.

Hall said when the village Architectural Plans Review Committee was functioning, P&Z authorized that group to grant sign ordinance variances.

During Monday's P&Z meeting commissioners Jess Stinson and John White disagreed with the council action.

Stinson said councillors apparently felt they had to go along with the legal opinion. He said the attorney has indicated P&Z can give variances and then "comes back and says we can't."

"I just think that somebody got to the lawyer," said Stinson.

White said that, according to the legal opinion, every section of the ordinance would have to indicate if a variance could be granted.

"I think he's dead wrong," said White.

The ordinance further states that "any denial" by P&Z may be appealed to the Ruidoso Village Council.

"We're kind of used to having our denials reversed; we're not used to having our approvals reversed," said Smith. He wondered if the Village Council can reverse an approval.

In her letter Hall asked for "clarification on how the council could move on the appeal," and called the action "precedent setting."

Gail McIntosh, one of several private citizens who appealed the variance, told the council she didn't object to neon signs, but urged the village to be consistent.

Smith, too, said he has no objections to neon signs, but is concerned about what they can become.

"I'm against them because I don't know where to draw the line," said Smith, adding that Las Vegas type neon signs can contribute to "visual pollution."

But Martin Rose, a former P&Z commissioner who helped draft the sign ordinance, said the group did intend to eliminate neon signs, not only because they found them to be

gawdy, but also because as neon signs age or fall into disuse they become an eyesore.

"We collectively—as a village about 10 years ago—determined that we wanted to portray the image of a quiet serene peaceful mountain village," said Rose. He said the signs in town are beginning to make that statement.

"We want to preserve that charm," said Rose.

He said the committee that drafted the sign ordinance never wanted to deprive any business of a means of identification. The ordinance designers had an eye to the future, he added.

"Fifty years from now we can have a hodge podge, or an awesome village," said Rose. He raised some concern over each group that serves opting to rewrite village regulations, or "governing by whim."

Former P&Z chairman Greg Masters said the kinds of neon signs coming in now aren't the same kind the commission was trying to prevent when the ordinance was adopted.

"If I had to change it I'd be in favor of changing it to allow neons," said Masters. "Municipalities age like everything else," he added.

Masters said the overall sign or-

Bridge the Gap program spans lack of communication with AA, SCC learns

"There isn't a one of us who doesn't know somebody who needs help," remarked Service Club Council (SCC) president Barbara Duff Monday, enthusiastically endorsing Bridge the Gap, a program sponsored by Alcoholics Anonymous (AA).

"Jacque," an AA member who didn't want her last name published, stressed the importance of anonymity in her presentation at a regular SCC meeting. She said Bridge the Gap was designed as a network to acquaint other organizations with AA services and AA

members with other groups. Jacque said alcoholism is an incurable disease. She said the AA 12-step program has worked, not only for alcoholics, but also for programs to aid gamblers and overeaters. She said anonymity protects both members and the program, adding that if she or another member has recurring problems with drinking it wouldn't mean that the program isn't effective.

"My ability to stay sober rests on my ability to use the tools available to me," noted Jacque. She distributed information on

the AA program, meeting times and a form for other organizations to fill out and return. Information from that form will be a part of the Bridge the Gap network.

Also Monday, Kathy Barnett described Altrusa's "Warm Fuzzies" project. She said Altrusans have gathered information from school principals on specific clothing needs of some children.

"We wanted to know the needs of children who don't come to school properly dressed, for whatever reason," said Barnett. She said Altrusa will provide some of those

needs in the Warm Fuzzies project. Barnett said she also discovered another need when talking with school principals, and asked SCC members to explore with their various organizations the possibility of setting up a discretionary fund. She said funds could be used by teachers to meet emergency needs of some students.

"Teachers are in a position to know special needs," said Barnett, adding that the fund could be very small.

dinance is reasonable, in that it relates sign-size to building-size. He added any changes should be carefully considered and reviewed by a study group.

Although the sign ordinance and possible changes are discussed at most P&Z meetings, Smith said

Wednesday he'd prefer to leave it unchanged.

"Basically we're there to try to apply some human judgments to specific problems," said Smith.

"Personally I don't think we're quite as bad as the council about crisis management—seems like they go from crisis to crisis," he

added.

And what about sign variances P&Z already has granted ... will they hear future appeals?

"That's a good question, and needs to be settled," said Smith.

P&Z members are waiting to hear more from the village attorney.

Planning and Zoning says go on Moon Mountain annexation

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) voted Monday to recommend to the Village Council that Moon Mountain be annexed after a new zoning ordinance and comprehensive plan are adopted.

The P&Z action followed a series of presentations by Architectural Research Consultants, Inc., a professional planning firm hired by the State Land Office to draft a master plan for the 630-acre tract of state-owned land, and a workshop by village staff on annexation policies.

Moon Mountain is located just west of Gavilan Canyon Road, southeast of Country Club Estates, north of Palmer Gateway and east of Highwood and Paradise Canyon subdivisions.

John Petronis, president of Architectural Research Consultants and project planner, has stressed the long-term nature of his plans, projecting a development date of 10 years in the future. But commissioners have voiced concern of possible effects on village services and traffic patterns.

Assistant village manager Frank Potter and village engineer Mike Davalos, in a workshop preceding Monday's meeting, apparently laid those worries to rest.

Davalos assured commissioners that Ruidoso has the capability of meeting the needs of development plans for Moon Mountain. He said a future developer will be required to build streets and utility distribution

systems to tie into village services. "I think if we'd be lacking anywhere it would probably be in traffic," noted Potter. But he and Davalos said a developer could be required to upgrade access roads in the area. Plans call for a combination low-density residential and resort area on Moon Mountain with at least two-thirds of the tree-covered mountainous acreage left in its natural state.

David Smith, P&Z chairman, said there still is confusion on whether annexation will give the village control over state lands, since some court cases have indicated the state isn't bound by local zoning ordinances.

"We don't have any assurance as to how it will be developed," noted Commissioner Marie Rooney.

But Rick Lopez, new planning and commercial leasing officer for the State Land Office, assured P&Z that State Land Commissioner Bill Humphries wants to cooperate with the people of the Village of Ruidoso. Petronis said the whole intent of the planning process was that whoever develops the land will follow the master plan.

Charles Gray, the lone observer at Monday's meeting, objected vehemently to any plans to develop Moon Mountain, and criticized P&Z for not making sure the public knows of plans for changing Moon Mountain. He said P&Z has "failed miserably" in letting the public know of the Moon Mountain development as well as other actions.

"This is our last chance to have an open area in town that's not developed," warned Gray. "Who gave you permission to sell my land?" he asked Lopez.

Gray questioned Lopez on why a state park is not located in this area, and asked him why cables are placed across roads on Moon Mountain.

"Why is it people can't even get up there to see what they're losing?" asked Gray in a loud voice.

Gray said he is worried that developing Moon Mountain will cause drainage problems on his Paradise Canyon Drive property.

"I'm going to fight it tooth and nail," said Gray.

Commissioners voted unanimously to recommend the annexation to the Village Council.

In regular business Monday, P&Z:

—Granted a one-year extension for temporary development by Crown Point Corporation on a tract of land in Section 36, Tract L, Pinecliff Subdivision. Enforcement officer Sandy Hall said the development meets requirements for commercial development.

—Discussed at length a proposed zoning ordinance that will be reviewed in a public hearing on Tuesday, February 17.

—Heard Hall announce her resignation effective toward the end of February. Hall said her husband has accepted a job in Florida and the family will be moving.





Service clubs learn of food bank's needs

"Poverty is not a discriminator—it effects every group," Phyllis Boverie, Lincoln County Food Bank president, said Tuesday.

Food bank representatives spoke Tuesday, in separate meetings, to Kiwanis and Altrusa club members.

Boverie, in a noon program for Kiwanis, said the area food bank serves people of all ages and all races. She said the hungry in Lincoln County include the newly poor, unemployed and underemployed, as well as single parents, the elderly and infirm.

"The stereotypes are just not true," said Boverie. "I have yet to meet anybody who doesn't want to

work," she added.

Rigo Chavez told Altrusa members Tuesday that at least 500 Lincoln County families are in need. He said the food bank served 13 families in July 1986, and 29 families in December. He said food from the bank was also used to fill out Happy Holidays foodbaskets.

But the need has outstripped the supplies of food, and both Boverie and Chavez said the food pantry was often bare during January.

"For the first time, the food bank purchased food in January," said Chavez.

Boverie and Chavez called on the service organizations to help meet the needs of the poor in Lincoln County.

"We need food; we need money; we need volunteers," said Boverie. Kiwanians responded with a \$100 donation, and the offer of future help. Altrusa members revealed

plans to conduct a food drive next month.

"Our aim is to not let anyone in Lincoln County go to bed hungry," said Boverie.

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

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School expands to meet student needs

Construction of the new classroom wing at Nob Hill Elementary School is nearing completion.

Five new classrooms, boys and girls restrooms and a storage area will be housed in the \$345,000 building project. The completion of this building will be just the beginning of the facelift for Nob Hill, according to Principal Roger Sowder.

Renovation of the existing building, one of the oldest schools in Ruidoso, will begin when the new wing is finished, sometime in March.

All kindergarten classes, and one first-grade class, will be moved into the new wing and the north end of the school will be boarded off for the renovation.

Sowder said a District Building and Planning League was formed more than a year ago to determine the condition and needs of each

school in the district.

Their report highlighted Nob Hill and Ruidoso Middle School as the schools with the most immediate need. They determined the Nob Hill structure was excellent, but outdated.

"The league planned for growth and what would serve the greatest number of children," Sowder said. "A lot of things in this (existing) building have to be brought up to code."

Sowder cited the most important need, after the new wing is completed, will be the roofing, energy efficient windows, restrooms and storage.

"If the bids come in low enough, and the plans go like we hope, everything could be completed by August 1," Sowder said. "When the kids come back to school all the disruption would be over."

The added space with the renovation will move all the Nob Hill students, including Special Education, into the building. The portable

classrooms, Sowder hopes, will no longer be needed.

"We planned for growth," he said. "We hope we won't have to use the portable classrooms again. There has been total faculty input, also, on this remodeling. They have been working on every part. It's been a very valuable asset to have faculty working on this."

In addition to the inside renovations, plans have been made for asphalt paving and additional parking areas. The paving will cut down on mud and dirt, now a big problem, and will give students a place to play when the playground is too muddy.

The school bond monies were used for the construction project, the mill levy monies will be used in part for the renovation and for furnishings. The next school project will be work on Ruidoso Middle School.




Nob Hill Elementary School Principal Roger Sowder inspects a newly constructed room at the school. The new classrooms all will


This newly constructed classroom only needs carpet, cabinets and furniture to be completed. Nob Hill Elementary School



Will a much-needed program, which may actually have saved lives in our village, be discontinued after just a month due to lack of a few dollars?

The Sober Ride Program provides safe rides home, via the "Topsy Taxi," to those who feel they have indulged to the point where driving would be unwise.

The Friday and Saturday night program began December 31. So far, 43 drivers have requested a ride. Program organizer Laura Ashley reports that about 91 percent of the riders were tourists or part-time residents. Six percent were juveniles and three percent full-time residents.

Who can say what lives may have been saved when those people made the decision to take a "sober" ride home. The risk to lives was bypassed by the Topsy Taxi.

The program costs just \$510 a month. That means we can have safer streets for just \$64 a weekend night. Sounds pretty cheap.

But Ashley says the program already is running short of donations. Indeed, this Friday night may see the last of the Topsy Taxi. Unless people who believe keeping drunk drivers off the streets pitch in a few dollars, all the effort to get the program started, and the benefits it provides for other motorists, will be lost.

The Sober Ride Program must continue. A complete cure to the disease we call "drunk driving" may still be years away. But programs like the Sober Ride Program take an important step in the healing process.

A little bit of help can make a big difference. Let's not let this successful program be lost.—DJP

Dear Governor Carruthers,

As a result of the downturn in New Mexico's economy in the past two years (for the many reasons with which I am sure you are quite familiar) two major things have resulted in my business:
1. Two of ten sales positions have been eliminated.
2. Those of the staff remaining had no raises for a period of 18 months. In addition, the New Mexico Legislature's tax reform of 1986 resulted in a net paycheck decrease.

Our net sales decreased by 27% in 1986 from our peak year of 1984. Adjustments in our operation (established in Ruidoso in 1946) were necessary to ensure our remaining in business, fiscally sound.

The budget proposal presented to the 1987 New Mexico Legislators asks a significant increase in expenditures rather than a "belt tightening". These increased funds must come out on an economy that is not growing but struggling to keep afloat.

These tax increases, user fees, discontinuance of other allowances, if granted, will result in another effective loss of income to my employees and others like them.

It is not fair, when we in the private sector must review our operations, curtail activities, etc., for the State to continue to expand and plan to spend so much more, to ask us to contribute so much more.

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Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—"I'm glad they got their fighting out of their system at the start of the session," one lobbyist said about the members of our not-very-much esteemed state Senate. "Now they won't be battling one another during the closing days of the session this year."

Unfortunately, that conclusion doesn't follow from that premise. These folks, given the contentious natures with which some of them appear to have been born, can fight at the beginning, in the middle and at the end of any session, anywhere, any time.

Since those who were defeated in the initial battles seem to have delegated some of their members to act as guerilla warriors, lying in wait to find every chance to bushwhack the opposition, the warring here is no more over than it is, sad to say, in the Philippines.

The big question around Santa Fe after the members of the Senate acted as though they had settled everything was this: How come, with the same number of Senators this year as last, there was such trouble about getting the minority members into suitable office space?

It took an unconscionably long time after the capitulation by the forces of Senator Les Houston before anyone anywhere in the capital knew in what offices and at what phone numbers members of the Senate were to be found. One side claimed that was because the others were too insistent on being treated with kid gloves, while the other said their opposite numbers were trying to downgrade them and their importance in the scheme of things.

Needless to say, it's a little difficult for constituents to find their representatives when they come to the capitol if nobody, not even the Legislative Council Service, which has charge of housing them, can say where the Senators are to be found.

It's too bad, but the governor's office has no institutional memory.

What that means in practice is that each time an administration changes, nobody familiar with the kind of office routines a governor needs is carried over. That leaves plenty of room for mistakes of all

kinds. From what we hear, the Carruthers people, green hands almost all, have made most of them, including failing to get their man to appointments they have accepted from such organizations as Chambers of Commerce that planned to have him as the main speaker at their banquet.

That's too bad. The measure of a good governor, however, is how quickly he can see to that his staff gets such glitches out of the system and gets down to smooth working order.

In connection with that last thought, the utterance of Governor Carruthers has somehow turned into a very cold, unwelcoming place.

The media representatives who used to gather there daily in the time of his predecessor, to begin their day in contact with one another, now have gone elsewhere for the morning coffee, in the belief that they are no longer looked upon as being wanted. Too bad. That cuts potential contacts between the governor and the news media—and thus between the governor and the citizens—with no proportionate gain of any kind to counterbalance the loss.

If you're wondering how much you put out in the way of tax money for this meeting of the Legislature, the National Conference of State Legislatures in Denver says the last time they checked, each New Mexico citizen paid \$4.56 per year to maintain the state's lawmakers.

Costliest Legislature in the nation is in Alaska, where the price runs \$46.75 per citizen; and cheapest is in North Carolina, where citizens pay only \$1.71 apiece.

As someone here remarked, the price to New Mexicans is about what it takes to buy a movie ticket. To some extent, a legislative session here may provide a lot more entertainment than the average movie does—and you don't have to get a babysitter in while you are laughing at it.

Note: Arizona, Oklahoma, Colorado and Texas manage to hold legislative sessions at a cost per capita that is substantially under New Mexico's.

Dance Trainer takes Downs' stakes

Dance Trainer, under jockey Jim Powell, rallied through the stretch to score a two length win in the second running of the \$21,900 Premier Stakes Sunday at The Downs at Albuquerque.

Poly's Director opened a three length lead at top of the stretch in the five and one-half furlong stake for older runners but could not hold

off the fierce drive of Dance Trainer. Poly's Director finished second with the longest Restless Charger third and Mr. Greek finishing fourth in the field of 12.

Trained by Billy Hitt, Dance Trainer was named top New Mexico bred 3-year-old last year by the New Mexico Breeders Association. The son of Choreographer won six

of nine and earned more than \$55,000.

In his first start of 1987, Dance Trainer made his first try at older horses, an impressive one, in the Premier covering the five and one-half furlongs in 1:05.4. Dance Trainer earned \$13,140 for owner Billy Moore of Denver City, Texas.

Prince Ego takes Gambit Stakes at Downs

Prince Ego, under jockey David Lidberg, drew clear in the stretch to post an easy nine length win over Browning in the featured \$21,500 Gambit Stakes Friday afternoon at The Downs at Albuquerque.

Prince Ego opened an early lead in the 5 1/2 furlong Gambit and never was seriously challenged on his way to the easy victory in the

opening day feature. The Cliff Lambert-trained son of Bold Ego covered the 5 1/2 furlongs in a good 1:05.1 in the stake for 3-year olds.

The victory by Prince Ego was his third in only six lifetime starts. His win in the Gambit was worth \$12,900 to owners George Stayley and George Huckabay of Midland, Texas. Browning was distant se-

cond with Grey Rabbit third in the field of nine.

Prince Ego returned \$4 as the even money favorite. The \$3 quinella with Prince Ego and Browning was worth \$9.

Friday's opening day crowd of 4,224 wagered \$474,344, down from 1986 figures of 4,262 and \$475,344.

Hoofbeats

Sunland Park concluded its first handicapping contest last Sunday when the "1987 Best Of The West Handicappers Showdown" ended in a "driving finish." Clayton rancher Malcolm Shields bet \$5,100 (all but \$94) of his "mythical" bankroll on Sunday's last race on 9-5 favorite Bruin County and his gutsy gamble paid off as the gelding recorded a slim nose win. Bruin County's heroics earned Shields more than \$9,000 for a two-day total of \$14,790. In addition to \$1,500 for first place (in real money), Shields will represent Sunland Park at the World Series Of Handicapping this fall at Penn National.

Sunland Park's Twin Trifecta is continuing its upward climb. The consecutive Trifecta event will bring a \$35,000-plus carryover into the Feb. 6 card, where the total pool is expected to reach \$50,000.

Last Sunday's action at Sunland Park included the season's first simulcast. The grade II San Pas-

qual Handicap from Santa Anita was wagered on by Sunland's 3,023 fans as a "special wagering event," which meant that it carried no official race number allowing fans to wager on the 16-mile event throughout the program. Sunland's fans made the winner (Epidauros) the 1-2 favorite, while he went off at 4-5 at Santa Anita.

In the claiming department last weekend, Shortstop Special was tagged for \$2,500 by Lewis Germany Sr. and Easy Coins went to Otis Fenton's barn for \$4,000.

Veteran jockey Arthur Anderson continues to have tremendous success in Twin Trifecta races. Three weeks ago, Anderson brought in two longshots in successive days to contribute to the \$100,000-plus carryover during that weekend. In last week's action, Anderson again found himself in the winner's circle in the third race with 10-1 shot Anlegogetter on Friday and 15-1 shot Iwannahefirst on Saturday's program.

Three jockeys enjoyed riding triples last weekend. Pedro Benitez won three races on Friday while Glenn Lowry turned the trick on Saturday. It was Kevin Cogburn's turn Sunday.

Next Sunday at Sunland Park, fans will get the opportunity to wager on one of thoroughbred racing's greatest tests, the \$500,000 Strub (pronounced stroob) Stakes from Santa Anita. The Grade I event annually draws some of the country's top thoroughbreds.

Sunland's fans got their first look at the 2-year-old class of 1987 last weekend as a pair of maiden quarter horse dashes were carded. On Friday, More Of A Wrangler won his opening test in 17.39 for 330 yards, while Surprising Dot stopped the clock in 17.67 for the same distance on Sunday.

Sunland officials announced last Sunday that the track's mile-long oval would be closed to workouts for two days as crews renovate the racing surface. The track is expected to reopen for morning workouts late Tuesday.

Big gamble pays off in Handicappers Showdown

Malcolm Shields bet \$5,100 on the nose of Bruin County to win Sunday's "Best of the West Handicappers Showdown" at Sunland Park Race Track.

Shields, a cattle rancher from Clayton, out-picked 107 handicappers in the two-day contest parlaying a \$1,000 mythical bankroll into \$14,824. The contestants were required to wager on each of the 22 races during Saturday and Sunday's programs at Sunland.

Ruidosoan Charles Pereyra's conservative strategy led to his downfall after holding a comfortable lead throughout most of Sunday's action. Pereyra went into the final race in the contest holding a \$2,500 advantage over El Pasaon Hugo Baez, while Shields trailed the leader by nearly \$4,000.

Pereyra posted a \$100 win bet, while Shields dumped his entire \$5,100 bankroll on Bruin County to win. Baez also went with Bruin County, betting \$2,000 to win and another \$1,000 to place.

Racing as the 9-5 favorite, Bruin County stormed through the final

furlong to nip Baffle You at the wire for a nose verdict. The close decision earned Shields \$14,790 and the right to represent Sunland Park in the \$185,000 Penn Series Of Handicapping at Penn National Race Course this fall. The winner of that event earns \$100,000.

"I was waiting for this horse all day, hoping I'd have enough to bet it all and win," Shields said after the contest. The first-place check was \$1,500.

Baez checked in second at \$11,041. Pereyra was third with \$3,977. El Pasaos Nick Padilla and Daniel McElwee rounded out the top five with \$3,104 and \$2,701 in earnings.

Racing resumes on Friday at Sunland Park when the track's Twin Trifecta pool is expected to reach \$50,000.

Sunland officials announced Sunday that the track's mile-long oval will be closed for two days as crews work on renovating the racing surface. It is expected to reopen late Tuesday.
