## Football stars sign for college play

The superior quality of football seniors at Ruidoso High School this past season was shown Wednesday morning when three Warriors signed letters-of-intent for four-year colleges.

Quarterback-safety Jeff Willingham and defensive end Matt Evans signed with Eastern New Mexico University (ENMU) at 8 a.m.

Split end Brian Davis signed with New Mexico State University (NMSU) three hours later.

The three players will receive athletic scholarships. All three players will play for the South All-Star team against the North this summer.

Willingham was signed as a free safety.

"I played strong safety in high school," the 5-11, 165-pounder said. He made the all-state first team

in his junior and seniors years as a defensive back. He also made the all-state team as a quarterback his senior season.

Willingham threw 25 touchdown passes and had 2,132 yards passing in his senior year. He also scored eight touchdowns and intercepted 10 passes.

Davis made the all-state first team as a split end his junior and senior seasons. The 6-2, 180-pounder scored 28 touchdowns in his senior season, 19 on pass receptions.

The 6-2, 205-pound Evans was outstanding against the run and pass for the Warriors. He has excellent speed as he is a sprinter on the track team.

"We're glad to have them," Eastern New Mexico University assistant coach Phil Lopez said of Willingham and Evans. "We need to get more good New Mexico athletes."

ENMU is a member of the Lone Star Conference and was 8-3 last

season. NMSU is a member of the Pacific Coast Athletic Conference and had a 1-10 overall record last season.

The athletes' parents witnessed the signings.

Willingham's parents are Pat and Judy Willingham, Evans' mother is Pat Evans, and Davis' grandfather is Eugene Davis.

Warrior head football coach and athletic director Cooper Henderson was naturally pleased with the players' signings.

"It's a real exciting thing to happen," he said. "It's a big step for them. Younger kids always think about something like this happening to them."

Some other Warrior players are expected to walk on at college campuses next fall.

That is just more proof of the outstanding quality of this year's Warrior senior class.

## Hine resigns

### Village manager, council agree on split

Village manager Jim Hine, the first and only manager the Village of Ruidoso has ever had, resigned Tuesday.

"I think that 26 years and seven months will be enough years of public service," said Hine Wednesday. He said his resignation will be effective March 31.

The Ruidoso Village Council, after a lengthy executive session during Tuesday's regular meeting, agreed unanimously to accept Hine's resignation and authorized the village attorney to negotiate a consulting contract between Hine and the village.

When questioned Monday, Hine refuted rumors that he had been asked to resign. But those rumors apparently prompted former village attorney John Thompson to attend the council meeting Tuesday.

"I did not ask him to come," said

Hine, adding that Thompson probably attended the meeting out of friendship. Hine said he and Thompson were first hired by the village the same year.

Hine said Wednesday that Thompson is his attorney.

When Village Councillor Ray Dean Carpenter called for an executive session to discuss pending litigation and personnel, Thompson stood, introduced himself and asked if the session would involve Hine.

"The matter will not be brought up," answered Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr.

But within moments, Davis asked Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor to locate Thompson, who had left the building. When Thompson returned to Village Hall, he and Hine were invited into the executive session.

"I offered my plans for retirement and they accepted," said Hine, who was unwilling to confirm rumors that he was forced out of his position.

"The less I can say about it the better," said Hine. He said he doesn't know what village officials plan to do about the management position, but said he will be available, through a consulting contract, to help out during a transition period.

Even if asked, Hine said he won't make a recommendation as to a replacement.

"Ethically, I'm not supposed to," he added.

Assistant manager Frank Potter said he has not been approached by the mayor regarding the village manager slot.

"We're just going on like we normally do," said Potter Wednesday. Mayor Davis could not be reached for comment.

"The village has been good to me and I feel that I've made contributions," noted Hine. He said he'll be reviewing a number of ongoing village matters with the mayor between now and March 31.

## Council looks to Moon Mountain

In a meeting spent mainly behind closed doors in an executive session, the Ruidoso Village Council Tuesday accepted the resignation of longtime village manager Jim Hine (see related story), heard reports on a variety of subjects and accepted a recommendation that could lead to the annexation of Moon Mountain.

Councillors voted unanimously in favor of accepting a Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) recommendation to approve the Moon Mountain annexation petition with the following stipulations:

- the development must conform with village design standards and subdivision regulations;
- the petition will not be acted upon until the new master plan is adopted;
- a legal opinion be obtained on annexation agreements between other entities and the State Land Office.

Rick Lopez of the State Land Office stressed that office's willingness to abide by village regulations. He said annexation will give the Village of Ruidoso control over any future development.

Councillors heard from P&Z enforcement officer Sandy Hall that the master plan is expected to be adopted by the end of March. The council, according to Tuesday's discussions, will then act on the annexation petition.

After the executive session Tues-

day, the council authorized the payment of a bill from Atkins Engineering. The \$216,670.71 bill is for additional Eagle Creek water rights offered by the State Engineer after the village paid the original billing of close to \$1 million. (See related story.)

Village attorney John Underwood told councillors gross receipts taxes shouldn't have been paid on the first payment, nor should tax be paid on the second bill.

"It's my position that gross receipts taxes are paid by the person that contracts at \$200 per acre-foot," said Underwood.

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. noted that even if the original contract had a "flaw" in it, the village validated that document when the first payment was made.

"We're almost obligated to pay it because we paid the first one," said Village Councillor Elmer Pirelli. He cast the lone dissenting vote on the motion to pay the bill.

Councillor Victor Alonso recalled the council instructing Atkins Engineering to do further pump tests in an attempt to find more water.

"We understood we were going to have an additional liability," remarked Alonso.

In other regular business Tuesday, the council:

- Authorized Mayor Davis to execute an agreement with the federal government on a \$275,000 grant for improvements to the wastewater treatment plant.
- Heard from Hine of a \$50,000

State Disaster Assistance grant to reimburse the village for repairs following the June 1986 flood.

- Heard "good news" from Hine on refinancing Ponderosa Heights sewer bonds. Hine said the original interest rate of 11.265 percent may be reduced to as low as seven percent, saving the village \$1,150,000 in interest over the 20-year life of the bonds.
- Learned of changes in the Topsy Taxi Sober Ride Program. Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor announced the Topsy Taxi is now available 24 hours a day seven days a week and is utilizing the services of Ruidoso Taxi. Rides are still free to Topsy Taxi callers, but the taxi service will be paid \$500 a month from Sober Ride business participants. Swenor said not all businesses who use the service are making contributions, and the program operated with a deficit last month.
- Received copies of correspondence between village engineer Mike Davalos and the State Highway Department arranging for the purchase of 559' of guardrails and posts to be placed on Warrior Drive near Ruidoso High School and on Crown Drive in Camelot. Davalos said new materials would cost 10 times the Highway Department price of \$379.50.
- Went into executive session to discuss pending litigation involving the Hollywood well and personnel matters.

# Council pays big water bill

The Ruidoso Village Council, after paying Atkins Engineering \$912,929.29 for Eagle Creek water, voted Tuesday to pay an additional \$216,670.71 on the "spectacular" water find of two years ago.

Village manager Jim Hine said earlier Tuesday that the village had received an Atkins Engineering bill for \$257,027.20. He said he questioned paying the gross receipts tax and gave the bill to the village attorney, recommending it be the subject of an executive session.

And apparently it was, as the motion to pay the bill, less gross receipts tax, came after a closed session during a regular council meeting Tuesday.

The bill was adjusted after village attorney John Underwood told the council that, in his opinion, gross receipts tax should be paid by

the other party. He said after the meeting that adjustments were made to recoup the tax paid on the original, near one million dollar payment.

Hine said former village attorney Lee Huckstep, who apparently thought the village was liable for gross receipts tax on the contract, calculated the tax when the big water bill was paid.

Hine said the formula in the Atkins Engineering contract approved by former Mayor George White did call for paying \$200 per acre-foot of water rights adjudicated on the Eagle Creek field. He calculated that would be \$1,129,600.


The State Engineer has ruled in an amended offer of judgment that Ruidoso has the right to 5,648 acre-feet of water from the four wells,

and has left the question of inter-connection to the Hondo Basin and that of priority dates to be settled in court at some future date.

The Atkins Engineering contract has come under fire from citizens more than once, but in discussions during Tuesday's meeting, Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. said the first payment validated the document, even if it "had a flaw in it."

Councillor Elmer Pirelli, although he voted against paying the statement, said the village was "almost obligated" to pay the second bill, having paid the first one.

Village Councillor Victor Alonso reminded the council that by authorizing Atkins Engineering to attempt to gain more water rights, the council understood the additional liability.

## County considers Picacho bridge replacement

Lincoln County Commissioners heard a bridge request and attended to various business at their regular meeting Tuesday.

Appearing on behalf of San Patricio and Picacho land owners, Mary Skeen asked commissioners to reconsider bridge replacement priorities.

Five county bridges are scheduled for replacement in the next few years. The Glencoe bridge was the first on the list. Replacement was scheduled to begin in November.

"We would like for you to look at the Picacho bridge," Skeen requested. "It is in terrible condition. In 1906 a 10 ton limit was placed on the bridge and there have been loads up to 80 tons on it."

"We are concerned," she continued. "There is no other way to get across the river from there."

County attorney Gary Mitchell explained to commissioners the bridge serves 50 people and is a school bus route.

"It's the most dangerous bridge in the county," Mitchell said. "School buses will not go across it and there's a lot of kids who live back there. The only other way in and out is 150 miles over very rough roads."

District Highway Engineer Lou Medrano estimated that if work

began immediately on the bridge, construction would take at least one year.

According to Medrano, on any bridge federal criteria stipulates bridge designs and weight limits regardless of use. He said, according to his list, the Glencoe bridge had top priority.

Mitchell suggested the commissioners have Pajo Engineers inspect the bridge and report their findings at the next commission meeting.

Commissioners learned emergency funds could be available to help with the replacement of the Picacho bridge.

In other business, commissioners John Hightower, Ralph Dunlap and William Karn:

- Considered a lease agreement with Valley Transit Mlx.
- Approved formation of a local committee to formulate plans for celebrating the Constitution Bicentennial. The committee will be the Lincoln County Lodger's Tax Committee, Chairman Walter Henn.
- Considered a request from Judge Richard Parsons for additional courtroom space.
- Appointed three members to the Board of Registration. They are Dorothy Talley, Pat Hume and Bill Elliott.
- Heard an update from Historian Donald LaVash on the

preservation of Lincoln County historic records and documents.

- Denied a request from Barbara Ward for financial aid to attend a Grantsmanship Seminar.
- Sent letters of appreciation for emergency assistance during the recent snowstorm to Edward DeBaca, Ben Hall, Louis Medrano, Dewey Lonsberry, Thomas Closson, Village of Capitan, County Road Department and Governor Garrey Carruthers.
- Approved a letter to the Board of Regents, New Mexico State University, inviting them to consider the purchase of land in the same area to continue the experimental farm.
- Adopted the Bond Ordinance for the Lincoln County Special Assessment District Number 1.
- Appointed a board of five members to review the findings on the Fort Stanton reports of building conditions, in a historic sense. The board members are Gary Miller, Ervin Aldaz, Steve Massey, Ralph Dunlap and Johnson Stearns.
- Proclaimed March as Mental Retardation Month.
- Approved the Official Holiday Calendar.
- Approved joint powers agreements between county municipalities and the sheriff's department, concerning the care and housing of prisoners.

# Building permits take another nosedive, lowest level since '81

Village building activity continued to plummet in January, with just 11 permits valued at \$180,943 issued in all categories. That figure indicates building is at its lowest recorded level since 1981.

In January 1986, the village issued 23 permits totaling \$2,893,599; in January 1985, 42 permits with a valuation of \$1,751,161 were issued and in January 1984, 23 permits with a value of \$1,729,994 were issued.

Last month's sluggish building total reflects the same number of permits issued in December (11), but for just over half the December valuation of \$324,844.

In January the building inspector issued just one new single family home permit with a valuation of \$65,735, down from December's two residential permits valued at \$197,540 and down sharply from

January 1986 when six single family home permits were issued worth a hefty \$469,023.

Nine residential addition/alteration permits valued at \$91,827 were issued last month, a big increase over December's five permits totaling \$17,795 and worth more than the dozen issued in January 1986 with a valuation of only \$64,770.

No new commercial building permits were issued in January or a year ago in January. In December one new commercial building permit was issued with a valuation of \$55,680.

One commercial remodeling permit with a dollar value of \$31,581 was issued in January, down slightly from December's five at \$53,829, but comparable with January 1986 when one permit worth \$36,000 was issued in that category.

Accounting for most of the healthy January 1986 building figure was one new apartment permit for a \$2,243,516 project in

Camelot Estates. No new apartments or condos were started last month.

January 1986 saw one apartment remodeling permit issued for \$80,000 and one grading permit issued totaling \$290. No permits were issued last month in either of those categories.

Village building inspector Jimmy Neeley furnished 1984-86 building valuations and permit fees that indicate fees collected have not dropped as drastically as overall building values.

Neeley said building valuations for all of 1984 totaled \$40,412,970, and the building inspection department collected \$67,856 in fees. In 1985 the total valuation dropped by more than half to \$20,869,130, but fees collected were at 90 percent of those collected in 1984 at \$61,159. In 1986 building took another nosedive to \$11,733,991, but fees collected, \$37,424, remained at 55 percent of the 1984 fees.

Increased enforcement initiated in 1985 of existing building code statutes and rules helped maintain the fee level, said Neeley in a memorandum to village manager Jim Hine. He said enforcing a regulation that calls for doubling the building permit fees when construction begins before a permit is issued has upped the fees collected.

Neeley said increased awareness among citizens and builders of the need for permits has resulted in greater cooperation and a greater number of permits issued.

Grading fees and re-inspection fees were also initiated in 1985, according to Neeley.

Since the building inspection department is a service department, one that should support itself through fees, Neeley said he is working on a plan to increase the volume of inspections and permits by enlarging the area he covers to include parts of the county around the new airport.

A spokesman for Construction Industries Division in Santa Fe said his office issues permits for areas not included in cities, towns or political subdivisions with a planning and zoning department. He said in some cases the nearest certified building inspector is called upon to perform inspections for the state.

Neeley said the village building inspection department currently has jurisdiction over the three-mile extra-territorial zone surrounding Ruidoso. If his plan to enlarge that area is successful then his inspection area will increase.

The advantage to area builders will be in having permits issued within a day or two instead of the week or more required when paperwork is handled in Santa Fe, said Neeley. The advantage to the village will be in increased revenues, he added.

## Sex charge is levelled

The Lincoln County Sheriff's Office has announced the arrest of former Ruidoso Downs resident David Horst.

The 37-year-old Horst was arrested Saturday in Las Cruces and charged with second degree criminal sexual penetration, according to a release from the Sheriff's Office.

Horst was returned to Lincoln County Monday and arraigned before Magistrate Judge Gerald Dean, continued the release.

The suspect remains in custody with bond set at \$50,000, according to Sheriff Don Samuels.

## Downs 'recall' set for May 5

After nearly a year of conflicting attitudes, relentless petitions and heightened tempers, the question of whether the Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees should swell by three members will be placed before voters.

Trustees voted Monday night to adopt a resolution calling for a special election in which voters will be asked whether the governing body should be increased to seven from four members.

Village clerk Jo Ann Jenkins said an election will be scheduled for May 5.

Downs residents have attempted several times to petition for a larger board of trustees, and initially, immediately following March's municipal election, petitioned both to increase the size of the council and recall Mayor J.C. "Jake" Harris.

But those efforts failed, the petition including Harris being ruled invalid by a district judge and the trustees themselves blockading in state court last fall's petition attempts. Another petition last month did not meet state guidelines and so was termed invalid by Jenkins.

But petitioners persisted, collecting 58 signatures by the time the most recent petition was turned in late last month.

"I don't think we have any choice in the matter," commented Harris just after the trustees approved the election resolution.

In other business Monday, the trustees:

- Agreed to allow the Ruidoso Downs Ladies Auxiliary the use of the ballpark for their annual arts and crafts fair.
- Approved the hiring of Steven Young as animal control officer on the resignation of Robert Layher. Layher continues in village employ as a

police officer.

- Approved Ordinance 87-2, following Federal Emergency Management Administration guidelines for flood damage prevention.
- Approved Resolution 87-3, budget increase.
- Voted to offer for sale through bids a village 1981 St. Regis automobile that is "setting on blocks."
- Heard Trustee J.L. Wilson note his appreciation upon seeing that Municipal Judge Martin Valenzuela had included an update on the community service program in his report.
- Adjourned into executive session to discuss litigation.





## A Ruidoso oldtimer moves on

"GOING OUT OF BUSINESS 50% OFF"—read the bold red letters in the windows of Ruidoso's Ben Franklin Store on Sudderth Drive. Sunday, February 15, the doors will officially close to the public for the last time.

In 1981 it was among the top 10 of the then existing 1,800 Ben Franklins. This week, it closes because there is no longer a "return on investments," according to owner Tommy Graham, who purchased the store in June 1977—15 years after it had opened in its original location.

"It's a matter of economics," continued Graham, a Ruidoso resi-

dent who is converting the store to a Ben Franklin Arts & Crafts store and relocating it to Santa Fe.

Bob Gregory, the local store's manager of the last three years, will manage the new facility. Gregory says he is looking forward to the move, as the "economic conditions have changed greatly in the past 18 months," though he feels "sure eventually the economy will come back."

The main concern of both Graham and Gregory seems to be that of the future of their loyal employees, Felicia Hales and Rickie Adams.

"Felicia has been a real asset to the store—both on the floor and in the office. She would make anybody a good employee, regardless," said

Gregory. Hales, a 10 and one-half year employee of the store, had little to say other than, "It's very sad—this is where I've been a large part of my life—I grew up in here."

Hales, Gladys Neils (who worked fabrics), and Adams (an eight and one-half year employee) agreed to "stick it out to the end" due to their loyalty to their employers.

"Rickie has been a good, dependable employee," states Gregory. Adams, who has been in charge of the Men's, Boy's and Children's department at the store, feels the closing is "sad, a great loss to the people of Ruidoso." When asked what she would do now, she replied, "We agreed to stay 'til the end, so we haven't had much chance to look."

NOTICE OF ADOPTION OF ORDINANCE  
The County Commission of the County of Lincoln, New Mexico, hereby gives notice of the adoption of an ordinance on the 10th day of February, 1987.

The title of the Ordinance is:  
**RELATING TO LINCOLN COUNTY, NEW MEXICO, SPECIAL ASSESSMENT DISTRICT NO. 1, PROVIDING FOR AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF IMPROVEMENT BONDS PAYABLE FROM AND SECURED BY A PLEDGE OF DISTRICT SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS; PROVIDING THE FORM, TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF SUCH IMPROVEMENT BONDS; PRESCRIBING OTHER DETAILS IN CONNECTION THEREWITH AND OTHERWISE RELATING TO THE FOREGOING; RATIFYING, APPROVING AND CONFIRMING ACTION PREVIOUSLY TAKEN IN CONNECTION WITH THE DISTRICT; AND REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREOF.**

A general summary of the Ordinance is as follows:  
The Commission has previously provided for and ordered certain street and road improvements (the "Improvements") in the County under the designation of "Lincoln County, New Mexico Special Assessment District No. 1" (the "District") and by ordinance has levied valid special assessments against the lots, tracts and parcels of property in the District specially benefited by the Improvements; that the Commission has determined the total cost of constructing the Improvements, which cost is to be paid by the specially benefited property; that a portion of the special assessments will remain payable in 20 substantially equal semiannual principal installments with interest at the rate not to exceed twelve percent per annum for the special assessments, both principal and interest payable at the office of the County Treasurer; the desire of the County to issue its fully registered Lincoln County, New Mexico Special Assessment District No. 1 Improvement Bonds (the "Bonds") in an amount not to exceed \$1,421,300, to pay in part the cost of making the Improvements; that a claim of lien for special assessments due, assessed and unpaid will be filed with the Lincoln County Clerk prior to issuance of the Bonds.

Initial sections define terms used in the Ordinance; ratify all prior action taken in connection with the District, the Improvements therein, the

levy of special assessments therefor, and the sale and issuance of the Bonds therefor; authorize, empower and direct the County to receive, collect and enforce all special assessments and other sums due in connection therewith, and to disburse such special assessments and other sums to proper persons, pursuant to ordinance; authorize, empower and direct the County Treasurer to receive and collect all sums due in connection with the special assessments and to disburse said sums to the proper persons, according to law, require all improvement special assessments unpaid after the 32nd day of February, 1987 to be paid into a Bond Retirement Fund (the "Bond Fund") which is pledged exclusively to the payment of the Bonds; and provide for conditions under which assessments may be reduced.

Other sections provide that if the owner of any assessed lot or parcel of property is delinquent in the payment of any sum due in connection with District special assessments, the Commission shall foreclose the special assessment lien against the delinquent property at its own expense, as provided for the foreclosures of mortgages on real estate or otherwise, and if there is no purchaser therefor at public sale, the Commission shall purchase the lot or parcel at a certain minimum price; provided that any registered owner of the Bonds may file and prosecute the foreclosure action if the Commission does not do so promptly; provide for the deposit of said sale proceeds into the Bond Fund with certain specified exceptions; and authorize the Commission to lease or sell said property and to deposit proceeds therefrom into the Bond Fund.

Another section authorizes the fully registered (i.e., as to payment of both principal and interest) Bonds and sets forth the details of the Bonds including, but not limited to providing that said Bonds shall be issuable in denominations of \$5,000 or integral multiples thereof; shall be numbered from 1 upwards; shall be subject to prior redemption in regular numerical order of Redemption Numbers (as further defined in the Ordinance); shall mature as set forth in the Ordinance (unless called for prior redemption and payment); and sets forth interest payment dates.

Other sections provide for the dating of the Bonds; for payment of principal thereof; the principal office of the paying agent; for continuation of interest at a specified rate per annum if any Bond is unpaid at or after maturity, for payment of interest to the registered owner; provide that after any special assessment installment date, if money in the Bond Fund exceeds the interest due on the next Bond interest payment date, the Commission shall call for redemption on the next Bond interest payment date, as many Bonds as permitted by said excess; provide for written notice of prior redemption by mailing and details relating to

Redemption Numbers and the registrar; set out other details concerning prior redemption; and require that the Bonds be refunded under certain conditions.

Other sections provide that the Bonds are negotiable instruments and are to be governed by the Uniform Commercial Code-Investment Securities; authorize the Chairman, County Clerk and Treasurer to file their signatures with the Secretary of State; provide for the execution of the Bonds; and a facsimile of the County seal; require authentication by the registrar; provide for the registration and transfer of Bonds, including but not limited to (i) appointment of a registrar; (ii) procedures relating to registration and transfer of Bonds; (iii) circumstances under which the registrar is not required to transfer or exchange Bonds; (iv) the registered owner is regarded as an absolute owner and payment of principal of or interest on any Bonds to be made to or upon written order of the registered owner, subject to change of registration, and such payments to the registered owner are valid and effectual to discharge the liability upon the Bonds; (v) procedures relative to lost, stolen, destroyed or mutilated Bonds; (vi) delivery of executed but unauthenticated Bonds to the registrar; and (vii) cancellation of Bonds upon surrender to the paying agent; provide details with respect to successor registrar or paying agent; provide that the Bonds and interest thereon are payable solely from the Bond Fund; provide that the Bonds are not general obligations or a debt of the County; provide that the owners of the Bonds have no claim to any general or other fund except as therein provided; provide that the payment of the Bonds is not secured by any encumbrance, mortgage or other pledge of property except for special assessments; and provide that subject to said exceptions, no prop-

erty shall be forfeited or taken in payment of the Bonds.

Other sections provide for the form of the Bonds; for delivery of the Bonds, and for the disposition of the proceeds of the Bonds and accrued interest; require the County to maintain accurate books and accounts concerning payment of the Bonds and interest and concerning collection and disbursement of special assessments, to permit an inspection of said books and accounts at reasonable times and to cause a statement concerning said books and accounts to be prepared each year; contain covenants related to exclusion of interest on the Bond from gross income for federal income tax purposes; and authorize the County officers to take all necessary action to effectuate the Ordinance, including printing the Bonds and executing necessary certificates specified therein.

Another section permits any registered owner of the Bonds to commence any court action which may be necessary to protect the liens created by the Ordinance on said special assessments, which may be necessary to compel performance of any duty imposed by the Ordinance or any other ordinance concerning the District; and provides that failure of any registered owner of Bonds so to proceed does not relieve said County Officers of the obligation of performing said duty.

The final sections contain a repealer clause and also provide that the Ordinance is irrevocable until the Bonds and interest are fully paid; permit amendment or supplementation of the Ordinance upon consent of the registered owners of seventy-five percent (75%) of the principal amount of the outstanding Bonds, but also makes several exceptions to that rule; contain a severability clause; provide for the publication of the Ordinance by title and general summary and for the effective date hereof and specify a form for publication.





## Editorial

We who believe the beauty of New Mexico is worth protecting, both for our own enjoyment and the enjoyment of visitors, should support passage in Santa Fe of the "Bottle Bill."

A measure currently being considered by members of the New Mexico House of Representatives would require that most beverage containers sold in the state have a refund value of at least five cents. The law is intended to discourage littering by offering a "reward" for the return of beverage containers. Bottle bills have been considered by Santa Fe lawmakers before, but never were successful.

The House Energy and Natural Resources Committee approved a compromise measure Monday made up of two similar bottle bills. The compromise next will be considered by the House Business and Industry Committee.

We in Lincoln County should be especially supportive of such a bill. Tourism is our bread and butter, and trashy roadsides, picnic areas and recreation sites are a sure way to ensure tourists travel elsewhere next vacation.

Knowing there's a nickle for that bottle you might find while outdoors makes it a whole lot easier to bend down and pick it up.

Opponents claim the bill would cause a hardship on businesses and consumers alike.

Consumers who return their containers won't be penalized. Beverage-dealing businesses, who make good money from tourism across the state, can only stand to gain from an increase in that trade.

Express support of the bottle bill with a call to your legislator. We'll all benefit from a cleaner New Mexico.—DJP

## Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—A Legislature is like a small world. It creates its own myths and stories, including these, which grew out of this year's fight among Senators over who would occupy what offices:

—Because certain diehard conservatives insist on dramatizing their plight by occupying space in the PERA building, a block or more from the capitol, Senator Mike Alarid sent the chairman of the Senate Finance Committee a brief note when it proved difficult to get a quorum one day recently. The note said simply, "Maybe they missed their bus."

—Among all those in the upper house who snipe at each other and attempt to maximize any possible embarrassment to the opposition, friends are a pleasant sight to see. Through all the infighting and bad feelings, Roswell's Democratic Senator Tim Jennings and Portales' Republican Senator Stuart Ingle have shared office space in a totally amicable fashion. They have been an example to their warring brethren, though the example has been heeded all too little.

—And then there is the dilemma all this has created for Clay Buchanan, who heads the Legislative Council Service.

The short-tempered members of the Senate who have wrangled over this question of office space almost since the first hour at which they arrived here claim Buchanan should have foreseen their problem and had extra offices erected before the Senate convened.

Those are the very same querulous members who, had Buchanan done that, would have been rising to a point of personal privilege on the Senate floor now to inquire by what authority he had acted.

—What's worst of all about all this to-do over space is that it may set the stage for a rebirth of that idea Toney Anaya had that a whole new building should be erected just to house executive offices. I asked Governor Carruthers how he stood on that particular notion, and he allowed as how he's against it.

Carruthers pointed out that the problem of the executive-legislative building, which is the official title of the capitol, is that it has a "peak-

loading problem." During most of the year, most of it stands empty. Only when legislators come to town does its occupancy swell to full capacity—or beyond. The Gov feels it would be a waste of money to construct another edifice just to take care of a temporary problem.

He didn't say it in so many words, but I got the impression he thinks the problem can easily be solved if some elected officials will only stop trying to be such obstructionists.

Sometimes what's said here gets results.

Comments in this space about a perceived lack of friendliness in the Governor's outer office drew the personal attention of Carruthers. He quickly took steps to make it clear to those of us who hang around the big building on a daily basis that we are indeed part of the family.

An observation about the oversupply of uniformed and ununiformed State Police officers in the Roundhouse led to an order that their numbers be rigorously curtailed. It turns out last year's Senate leadership, who seem to have something of an over-dramatic notion of their own importance, had asked for all that protection.

And our words about the habit our Governor had of referring to himself in the third person ("Garrey Carruthers believes..." and "Garrey Carruthers will act..." and so on) brought an explanation from the man himself. He began doing that on advice of his political consultants, who said their surveys showed he wasn't well known when he started the Republican primary. Repeating his name as often as possible, they told him, would fix it in the minds of the voters. It seems to have worked.

And if you care to know, one of the columns in this location that drew the most favorable response so far this year was the one in which I called some of the folks covering for the television stations so many Twinkies. That seemed to hit a response in readers from all parts of the state, apparently themselves also distraught by listening to comments from certain electronic reporters who appear to understand so little of what they observe.



## Five fans get \$1,967 each on exacta at Sunland

Sunland Park recorded its highest exacta payoff of the season on Friday when five fans collected \$1,962 each for pegging 150-1 dark horse Pleasure Lad with second-place finisher Vic in the feature race.

The track's Twin Trifecta events eluded more than 2,000 fans for the sixth straight program resulting in a \$46,110 carryover. Sunland officials are pointing to a \$75,000 jackpot for Saturday's 11-race program that gets underway at 1 p.m.

After being let loose at more than 150-1 odds, Pleasure Lad and rider John Cushing never looked back while posting a decisive win in Friday's 5 1/4-furlong headliner.

Cushing had the William Thompson trainee two lengths ahead of 11 challengers through the backstretch and continued to draw away for a 3-length winning margin in 1:07.1. It was Pleasure Lad's first trip to the winner's circle since going wire-to-wire in a \$4,000 claiming event at Ruidoso Downs last July.

Those fans holding a two-dollar win ticket on Pleasure Lad collected \$304.40 - the second highest win payoff of the season. Owner Randy Herrin banked \$1,100 for the victory.

Vic, a 6-1 outsider ridden by Danny Sorenson, checked in second. The resulting combination paid \$1,962 for a two-dollar exacta ticket. A winning exacta ticket picks the top two horses in the exact order of finish.

## Jockey/Trainer Standings

Two winning mounts over the weekend boosted Pedro Burgos to a network lead over Salustio Benitez in Sunland Park's jockey standings. On the trainer's list, Doyal Roberts moved to within one win of leading conditioner Fred Danley.

Young El Paso rider Glen Murphy took the weekly riding honors booting home five winners over the three days of racing. The strong performance pushed him to the No. 7 spot in the season's standings.

Benitez maintains his leading rider position with 43 trips to the winner's circle. Burgos is next with 42 tallies, while Danny Sorenson holds the No. 3 spot at 41. Mike Lidberg is fourth (37) with Joe Martinez fifth (35).

Rounding out the top eight riders are: Glenn Lowry (26), Glen Murphy (25) and David Lidberg (23). Darrell Belvins, Leroy Coombs and Kevin Cogburn each share 17 wins.

Danley continues to hold the leading trainer position although he was only one-for-eight over the weekend. He holds 29 win pictures compared to Roberts, who saddled three winners over the weekend to tally 28 for the season.

Cliff Lambert Sr. took Trainer of the Week after sending out four winners. But the effort still puts him a distant third to Danley in the overall standings with 24.
