Drug charges brought against three men

A joint undercover operation by the New Mexico State Police and the Alamogordo Department of Public Safety (ADPS) resulted in drug charges naming three local men.

Lieutenant Detective Ray Bailey

of the ADPS confirmed magistrate court reports that William Billingsley and Steve R. Land were arrested January 30, and charged with distribution of a controlled substance. He said an arrest warrant has been issued naming Brett

Sofolo who is still at large.

Bailey said the Ruidoso arrests were part of a six-month operation that netted a number of suspected drug dealers in Otero County. He said the investigation is continuing.

Magistrate records indicate that cases against Billingsley and Land will be heard by a grand jury. Both Billingsley and Land are free on Please see Drug charges, page 2A

Legislators introduce airport road funding bill

Proposed legislation to fund an access road to Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA) was heard in the Transportation Committee in Santa Fe Thursday.

State Representative Ben Hall, a Republican who represents parts of Lincoln, Chaves and Eddy counties, said he and representatives Maurice Hobson and Richard Knowles introduced two bills to pay for a road to the new regional air facility on Fort Stanton Mesa. State Senator James Martin is expected to introduce the airport road proposals in the Senate.

"We got a lot of support in the committee," said Hall in a telephone interview Friday. He added that legislators from throughout the state seem to agree the \$7 million project will benefit the economy of the entire state and needs to be funded.

House Bill (HB) 309 asks for \$1,098,000 from the general fund and HB 310 proposes using \$5 million in severance tax funds to design and construct a road to the new airport. SBRA is expected to become operational by the end of 1987.

Hall said Ruidoso Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) Chairman Tim Morris, former Lieutenant Governor Mike Runnels, county commissioners Ralph Dunlap and Bill Karn, Ruidoso Downs Trustee Conrad Buchanan, Ruidoso Valley

Chamber of Commerce board member Barbara DiPaolo, Ruidoso assistant manager Frank Potter and county manager Suzanne Cox were on hand for the hearing.

"We feel pretty good about it," remarked Hall.

A bill to provide \$250,000 to the Water Defense Association was introduced last week by Hall and Representative Casey of Roswell. Hall said the funds are proposed to help the group fight claims to its members' water rights by the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe. If the bill passes both houses, the association will use the money to help pay for expert witnesses in the upcoming trial.

"So far none of the major bills have come down," said Hall. Close to 800 bills have been read into the record, but Hall said legislators are waiting to see the governor's proposals on some major issues.

Education reform, an issue that dominated the last special session, is expected to resurface with lawmakers proposing a host of amendments and changes to the controversial measures passed last year. Hall said education bills were on the calendar for Friday and Saturday.

Hall said a bottle deposit bill expected to come out of committee this week has been so watered down that it bears little resemblance to the proposal designed to clean up streets around the state.

"I don't know how I'll vote on it," admitted Hall, adding the bill being discussed on Friday included less

than 10 percent of bottles and no cans at all.

"All the grocers are against it," noted Hall. He said he suggested that the state let contracts for redemption centers in various cities so grocers wouldn't have to buy back and store bottles.

All the tax proposals are still at the "wish list" stage, said Hall. Other issues still to come for this session include workmen's compensation and insurance.

Hall predicted a "right to work" proposal, even if it passes the Senate, won't come to a vote in the House. He said he favors "right to work" and will vote for the bill if he gets the chance.

Hall said members of the Senate seem to have settled their differences and are "getting some work done." He said senators have determined that they should each have a private office and are building offices in every available space of the Roundhouse.

"I don't know where they're getting the money," said Hall. Overall this session is characterized "by a better feeling so far as everybody getting along," said Hall. "There have been no major knockdown-dragouts yet."

But with so many big issues still to come, and with Thursday the last day of this 60-day session to introduce new bills, Hall said that congenial atmosphere could change at any time.

"We'll just have to wait and see."

Potter in line for village manager post

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. said Friday he will appoint assistant village manager Frank Potter to the position of village manager when present manager Jim Hine retires next month.

"We're not going to advertise for a manager," said Davis, adding that he plans to name Potter. The mayor said his choice must then be approved by the Ruidoso Village Council.

Village Councillor Larry Simon said Friday he will vote to approve Potter, noting that Potter has spent more than 20 years working for the village.

Councillor Victor Alonso, contacted by telephone, said he, too, will vote to confirm Potter.

"I think what we need to do is reward from within," said Alonso. Potter said Friday he has worked

for the village for 23 years and two months, as assistant manager since 1974, and as manager of the Ruidoso Municipal Airport before moving to Village Hall.

Potter was hesitant to talk of his appointment Friday, but Mayor Davis said the two had discussed his plans.

Mayor Davis said moving Potter into the management slot goes along with a new organizational chart the council adopted.

"We are not doing any hiring," added the mayor. He said the village, as often happens during good times, overhired. He said the village staff is being reduced by natural attrition.

Davis said village clerk Leon Eggleston will continue with his current responsibilities.

After Hine's retirement, he will enter into a consulting contract with the village, due to a motion passed during Tuesday's council

meeting.

"We have to have consulting," said Davis. He said Hine will be available to help during the transition period after his retirement. Hine, who has managed the Village of Ruidoso for 26 years, is the only manager the community has had.

Davis refuted rumors that Hine has been asked to resign. He said Hine has been planning to retire for some time.

"This whole thing has been handled very badly," said Davis. "Rumors that got out were wretched," he added.

"I feel that we live surrounded by such unbelievable natural splendor we have a responsibility to try to repay nature by trying to go on a crash course of self-improvement," said Davis. He was critical of those responsible for spreading rumors surrounding Hine's retirement.

Wrecking ball nears Sierra Swim club

Salvage operations leading to the demolition of the Sierra Swim and Racquet Club are continuing. The Ruidoso Village Council indicated in a special meeting last week that it might consider purchasing the facility if the price was right, but Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. said Friday nothing further has happened. Jim Wooldridge of D&J Services said he has a salvage contract on the building and grounds. He said reports in The News that the club might be sold were responsible for a slowdown in his operations last week.

Wooldridge said he is authorized by a Houston company to continue selling items in and around the building. He said another contractor will demolish the structure. Paul Wallace of State Savings and Loan in Dallas, Texas, titleholders for the 13-acre property, confirmed that his company has contracted with a Texas company to demolish the building. He said the contract calls for completing the job within 30 days. Wallace said he has talked with

several brokers but has had no offers on the facility. Although Mayor Davis said Friday that he had talked with Wallace and another State Savings and Loan employee, Wallace said he has not talked with anyone representing the Village of Ruidoso. He said he has not been contacted by the mayor. Wallace refuted rumors discussed in a Village Council workshop that the property could sell for as low as \$200,000. He said State Savings can sell the property for no less than a half-million dollars.

bond, according to court and jail records. In the affidavit for Billingsley's arrest, the undercover officer stated he "entered a motorcycle accessory store known as Papa John's and struck up a conversation with a sales clerk identifying himself as William." The officer alleged that Billingsley was that man and that he then negotiated for the purchase of an amount of "crank." Detective Bailey said crank is a form of speed or methamphetamine. "William went upstairs at Papa John's and after about five minutes returned with a packet of white powder," continues the affidavit. Bailey said field tests identified the white powder purchased by the undercover agent as methamphetamine. He said the substance was sent to the state crime

laboratory in Santa Fe for further testing. Court documents also reveal that the accused showed the undercover agent a large box kept on a counter behind a door in Papa John's display area. The box reportedly contained bong, pipes, syringes and water pipes. The undercover officer negotiated to purchase marijuana from Land and Sofolo, in separate incidents, at the Cochera Restaurant lounge, according to affidavits filed in Magistrate Court. In the affidavit for arrest, the undercover agent said he met Land, "a biker," at Cochera lounge and negotiated for the purchase of a bag of marijuana for \$25. The report claimed that Land indicated he could get "some good smoke" before leaving the premises and returned to negotiate a deal at his car. Field tests indicated the

substance purchased was marijuana, according to court records. Sofolo also is accused with two counts of selling marijuana to the undercover officer. Bailey said efforts are being made to apprehend Sofolo on the outstanding arrest warrant. Bailey said no large amounts of controlled substances were recovered in the operation. He said the contraband is easily obtained in El Paso, Texas, so area distributors don't normally keep large quantities. The operation did draw several "repeat offenders" into its net, said Bailey. Drugs confiscated included marijuana and methamphetamine. "I guess we're lucky in this area; we haven't found any crack," said Bailey. "But that doesn't mean it's not here," he added.

Lawmen seek assault suspect

The Ruidoso Police and the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office are investigating an assault that was reported at 2:45 a.m. February 6. Sheriff Don Samuels said a white male, described as being in his middle 40s with dark graying hair, is being sought in the incident that began when a 23-year-old woman had car trouble on Highway 37 north of Alto. After the woman walked to a telephone to call for help, the suspect, driving a dull red or brown

pickup, reportedly offered her a ride. Police said when the two got back to the woman's car the victim said the man took her into the woods where he held her against her will and partially disrobed her. The accused later left and the victim locked herself in her car until her husband arrived, said Samuels. He said the incident occurred in the county, but was reported initially to the Ruidoso Police Department. Ruidoso detective Lanny Maddox took the first report, and Sheriff

Samuels said he has asked him to continue his investigation. Samuels said he wanted to avoid causing any additional stress for the victim, who has been under medication since the attack. Samuels said he didn't want to ask the victim to undergo further interviews. Lieutenant Ray Garner of the Sheriff's Office has also been assigned to the case, said Samuels. Sheriff Samuels said the suspect will be charged with criminal sexual contact.



Katherine Sanchez scored 26 points to lead the Tigers. The rest of the team had good scoring balance.


"We're progressing at the level we need to be right now," said Tiger girls head coach Jim Blizell.





Lodgers' Tax Committee hears trade show report

Lincoln County Lodgers' Tax Committee heard a report Wednesday on the San Antonio Boat and Travel Show from Nancy Radziewicz.

An estimated 200,000 people attended the show, according to Radziewicz. She said the Lincoln Heritage brochures were very popular and the booth was well received.

Smokey Bear and Woodsy Owl cut the ribbon, opening the show, and made appearances during the show.

In a poll she and Barbara Downs conducted, they determined that 50 percent of the people stopping at their booth had been to Ruidoso, 25 percent had heard, but not visited and 25 percent had never heard of Ruidoso.

will be 10 similar shows this year. She said she'd like to participate in all of them, on behalf of Ruidoso and Lincoln County.

"The Dallas Show, March 3 to 8, has already been funded by the Ruidoso Lodgers' Tax," Radziewicz said, "I want to take county information also and whatever you want to send, advertising Lincoln County."

—Granted a livestock tap, as per original agreement, on the Jim Pearson property. The backflow will be tested.

—Instructed Terry Cox to make spot inspections on the water line being placed from the new well. He will check it at critical placements, making sure it is properly trussed and placed.





SANTA FE—It's too bad the officially established subject for high school debates this year isn't that dependable old one about unicameral legislatures being superior to the two-house kind.

If that were the topic, proponents of unicameralism could use the example of the early days of the 1987 session in New Mexico to prove that having a Senate adds little or nothing to the legislative process.

Right now, though, there is a feeling in the air that things may actually have changed for the better. Both houses seem to have finally settled down to get their work done; and the more obstreperous members, who often seem intent on acting only as spoilers, appear to have been cut off from power to such an extent that a relatively smooth session could still be the end-product.

It has even been observed that the number of bills introduced may not be as wildly out of line as some of us originally expected.

Both of those are highly positive notes, and if that sort of spirit continues, this could turn out to be a successful session instead of the kind it looked for too long as though we were in for.

Every Legislature has its own spirit, and so does every administration.

In either case, that spirit is a kind of mosaic made up of the personality, attitudes and values of those who set the tone in this specific and concrete government.

On the administrative side, that is almost entirely the governor, his closest counselors and maybe the members of his Cabinet. In the Legislature at this moment, however, where the leadership is not always as clearly defined as it has been during some years in the past, each of the 112 members develops more than ordinary importance.

It would appear that one of the results of that fact is that running commentaries on government like this one may have a more than ordinary obligation to direct attention to those personalities, attitudes and values, which more "objective" parts of your newspaper touch on-

ly peripherally.

That observation is not meant to be an apology for the fact that this column sometimes grows more personal than some believe fitting. The point is that it is both right and necessary for citizens to become acquainted with their elected representatives as people. Without that, it's difficult to know what is likely to happen when these sometime volatile personalities begin to mix with one another.

Besides, as with any other sport, politics-watching is more fun when you know something of the players as people.

Personal service contracts. Those are the things that need to be watched in government, and the fact of the matter is that they are not nearly sufficiently supervised—or at least they haven't been in our state in recent years.

What kind of money are we talking about? Well, during the last year of the Anaya administration, the state issued \$123.4 million in such arrangements to have those outside of government perform part of the work of government.

At that time, the contracts portion of the Department of Finance and Administration was composed of a mere handful of people, who had trouble just keeping track of how many contracts were issued and by whom, much less seeing whether or not the contracts were complied with.

If the Republican administration that has now taken over even begins to approach that level of contracting out of the people's business, we are in bad shape. That will suggest that no matter which party is in power, we are likely to get taken to the cleaners in this fashion.

You can be sure those of us who are accredited to cover government in Santa Fe will keep a weather eye on this very sensitive issue. You will hear our reports frequently, because this is an area of government in which there has been too much freedom practiced and not nearly enough good management. I call this the soft underbelly of government, and I say it needs and deserves to be protected.

SANTA FE—It's too bad the officially established subject for high school debates this year isn't that dependable old one about unicameral legislatures being superior to the two-house kind.

If that were the topic, proponents of unicameralism could use the example of the early days of the 1987 session in New Mexico to prove that having a Senate adds little or nothing to the legislative process.

Right now, though, there is a feeling in the air that things may actually have changed for the better. Both houses seem to have finally settled down to get their work done; and the more obstreperous members, who often seem intent on acting only as spoilers, appear to have been cut off from power to such an extent that a relatively smooth session could still be the end-product.

It has even been observed that the number of bills introduced may not be as wildly out of line as some of us originally expected.

Both of those are highly positive notes, and if that sort of spirit continues, this could turn out to be a successful session instead of the kind it looked for too long as though we were in for.

Every Legislature has its own spirit, and so does every administration.

In either case, that spirit is a kind of mosaic made up of the personality, attitudes and values of those who set the tone in this specific and concrete government.

On the administrative side, that is almost entirely the governor, his closest counselors and maybe the members of his Cabinet. In the Legislature at this moment, however, where the leadership is not always as clearly defined as it has been during some years in the past, each of the 112 members develops more than ordinary importance.

It would appear that one of the results of that fact is that running commentaries on government like this one may have a more than ordinary obligation to direct attention to those personalities, attitudes and values, which more "objective" parts of your newspaper touch on-

ly peripherally.

That observation is not meant to be an apology for the fact that this column sometimes grows more personal than some believe fitting. The point is that it is both right and necessary for citizens to become acquainted with their elected representatives as people. Without that, it's difficult to know what is likely to happen when these sometime volatile personalities begin to mix with one another.

Besides, as with any other sport, politics-watching is more fun when you know something of the players as people.

Personal service contracts. Those are the things that need to be watched in government, and the fact of the matter is that they are not nearly sufficiently supervised—or at least they haven't been in our state in recent years.

What kind of money are we talking about? Well, during the last year of the Anaya administration, the state issued \$123.4 million in such arrangements to have those outside of government perform part of the work of government.

At that time, the contracts portion of the Department of Finance and Administration was composed of a mere handful of people, who had trouble just keeping track of how many contracts were issued and by whom, much less seeing whether or not the contracts were complied with.

If the Republican administration that has now taken over even begins to approach that level of contracting out of the people's business, we are in bad shape. That will suggest that no matter which party is in power, we are likely to get taken to the cleaners in this fashion.

You can be sure those of us who are accredited to cover government in Santa Fe will keep a weather eye on this very sensitive issue. You will hear our reports frequently, because this is an area of government in which there has been too much freedom practiced and not nearly enough good management. I call this the soft underbelly of government, and I say it needs and deserves to be protected.


