## Big snow hits

A flurry of winter weather that arrived Saturday in the Ruidoso area hit the village with three successive snowstorms of increasing intensity, finally winding up with a day-long blast Wednesday that left a nine-inch-thick blanket of white on cars, streets and rooftops.

By today, Ski Apache Resort was basking in the powder, 37 inches of new snow since Saturday. That brought the resort's undisturbed, settled snow depth to a whopping 80 inches.

The snow delayed school Tuesday in Ruidoso for an hour and two hours in Capitan. Some buses ran abbreviated routes. Today, school was cancelled in Capitan and put on a two-hour delay in Ruidoso.

Heavy snow Wednesday cancelled the School Ski Program at Ski Apache, and several meetings around the village were called off.

Electricity in the Ruidoso area flickered in some areas and was knocked out for as long as six hours in others. A Texas-New Mexico Power Company spokesperson said electricity to all areas had been restored by early this morning.

The slick streets contributed to a rash of accidents Tuesday and Wednesday with Ruidoso Police reporting 12 accidents without injuries for those days.

Fender benders began about 3:22 a.m. Tuesday when an El Paso driver crashed into a guardrail at the "Y," according to police reports. Luis Martinez, 41, told police he was westbound on U.S. Highway 70 and his car slid into the guardrail, said police.

That report listed snowpacked roads as a contributing factor, as did most of the other accident reports.

Minor accidents were reported Tuesday at 8 a.m. at Meander and Paradise Canyon drives, 8:06 a.m. on Gavilan Canyon Road north of Meander, at 8:20 a.m., at 8:51 a.m. on Juniper and 8:52 a.m. on Hull Road north of White Mountain Road.

On Wednesday police recorded accidents at 1:16 a.m. on Yellow Pine Road, 9:02 a.m. on Gavilan Canyon

## Groenendyk is selected to lead convention bureau

Liz Groenendyk will head the Ruidoso Convention and Visitors Bureau, announced Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce executive director John Jeffers Wednesday.

The University of New Mexico graduate was chosen from a field of seven candidates after all seven participated in an intensive two-day assessment center. Jeffers said they were evaluated on a variety of skills by a qualified and objective resource team.

Groenendyk, a lifelong Albuquerque resident, recently completed a dual degree in marketing and tourism and travel. She said UNM's tourism and travel program is just one year old.

Although this is her first "career" job, Groenendyk said she worked for three years at Kirtland Air Force Base and spent last semester assisting in the History

Department on the UNM campus.

Groenendyk was pleased, but not totally surprised, when offered the job of director of the Convention and Visitors Bureau.

"I thought I was a good contender for the job," she said. The assessment center process puts job applicants under close scrutiny as they role-play various contrived but realistic situations, but Groenendyk never lost her composure.

"I found the whole situation stressful, but nothing I couldn't handle," she said.

The new director of the brand new bureau will report for work March 2.

Jeffers and Groenendyk said the first priority will be to establish the visitors bureau—an organization that presently exists only on paper.

## P&Z OKs zoning plan

After more than three years, at least a dozen public meetings and countless hours of review, the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) Tuesday took action on a new comprehensive plan and zoning ordinance.

"I admire your persistence," said Rich Unger, a professional planner for BRW, the company hired in 1984 to draft the plan and ordinance. In spite of a "zoning snafu" that stalled the process for many months, Unger announced during Tuesday's public hearing the project is "almost done."

Village manager Jim Hine said Wednesday that BRW was hired in 1984, and began work in earnest in 1985. He said the original contract was for \$69,720 with a travel budget of \$3,920. Hine said the village paid BRW a total of \$67,242.11 as work progressed. He said travel expenses will total about \$2,000.

After Unger's presentation and a series of questions from the audience the commission voted to recommend to the Ruidoso Village Council that the two documents be adopted. P&Z will forward a list of recommended changes to the council for consideration.

Unger said the comprehensive plan is a guide or format for village growth, and the zoning ordinance is an implementation tool to reach goals set forth in the plan. He said his firm began three years ago with an inventory analysis and business and residential surveys.

Information gained in the analysis and surveys was coupled with public input from hearings to identify major issues. They were:

- preservation of forest hillside environment;
- enhancing the downtown area,
- traffic concerns.

Unger said the plan set out to establish goals and policies to ensure future development will consider the natural environment, thought to be the area's greatest asset. A land use plan was developed showing what planners envision 20 years from now.

A transportation study also was completed, and Unger said traffic patterns that will be effected by future development were considered. A downtown redevelopment concept, of major concern during previous hearings, again was presented.

It includes improved sidewalks, benches, landscaping, a unified storefront theme, enhanced pedestrian crossings and offstreet parking. The recommended solution to traffic problems in Midtown was a one-way pairing of Sudderth, westbound, and Wingfield, eastbound.

Audience members were concerned about additional requirements for developers in the new forest hillside protection zone, but Unger said the items required should be completed by a developer anyway.

He said the intent was to protect hillsides and trees from unsightly development that cuts into mountainsides and blocks views.

Several audience members questioned established setbacks that make it hard to build or alter existing structures in older subdivisions.

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. noted that 20' front and rear and 10' side lot line setbacks can't be met on 80 percent of village lots.

"It was interpreted wrongly by a Gestapo-type P&Z commission," said Davis, adding that he was not referring to the present commission.

Unger said the time was right to address problems with setbacks

before adopting the ordinance. He said at least one 10' side yard should be required, and the other side would have to be 5' to meet fire standards. Unger said 20' front lot line setbacks allow room to park a car in front of a structure.

"We're not on the same wavelength—there's no need to go any further," said Davis. He then asked Unger if he is from a mountainous community, and heard that he is not.

"You ought to move to one before you start making recommendations," advised Mayor Davis.

A discussion followed on parking recreational vehicles and trailers in residential areas, with the mayor saying "it's just absolutely white trash" who do that.

The new ordinance calls for increasing a variance application fee from \$15 to \$50, and Village Councillor Victor Alonso told the audience that requestors also are required to pay a \$100 attorney's fee if a variance is granted.

"I don't think we ought to require citizens to pay \$100," said Alonso.

But village clerk Leon Eggleston disagreed and heatedly explained why the village wants its own attorney to prepare the paperwork for all variances.

"John charges us and we pay him," said Eggleston. "The Village of Ruidoso is giving that variance so I think they have a right to dictate what attorney does it," he added.

Underwood later explained that variances take from an hour to two hours, and the \$100 was set as an equitable rate.

Audience member Anne Ellis complained of imposing newer and stricter standards on property she purchased in 1960. She said she plans to enclose a deck that is built

## P&Z reviews comprehensive, zoning plans

Members of the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) discussed a proposed zoning ordinance Tuesday after acting quickly on a short agenda.

Rich Unger of BRW, the professional planning firm hired more than three years ago to draft a comprehensive plan and zoning ordinance for the Village of Ruidoso, was on hand to discuss the plan.

"This has been a long process and we now have a document before us ... is it a good one?" asked P&Z Chairman David Smith. Unger replied that he was satisfied "for the most part," but would have preferred a couple of changes.

The proposal allows for many variances to be granted administratively, and Unger said he would prefer to see variances come before the commission.

"That's an awful lot of authority (for the enforcement officer)," said Unger. He said he would have preferred

separating the subdivision and zoning ordinances, which are combined in the proposal.

Unger made a brief presentation and answered questions during a public hearing Tuesday night. (See related story.)

In regular business, the review of plans for a convenience store at Power Plus Car Wash, uncovered an existing encroachment into village right of way.

The commission finally approved the site development presented by Tim Collins for owners William and Phyllis McCarty, but stipulated a vacation of right of way must be sought for a concrete pad and a canopy that project off the property.

Smith asked village attorney John Underwood if allowing an encroachment to continue, once brought to the attention of the village, would imply tacit approval. Underwood answered no, but suggested that would be a proper time to address the problem.

He said the commission has the option of withholding approval until

the owner negotiates with the village to purchase the right of way.

Collins asked for assurance that a replat and vacation of right of way will be approved, and commissioners indicated it will, but noted the final decision is up to the Village Council.

Also Tuesday, the commission approved Tim Hoyt's request for a 7'10" rear property line variance in spite of an objection from the adjacent property owner. Hoyt, a licensed contractor, showed plans for a house he intends to build on Lot 44, Block 20, Forest Heights Subdivision.

Hoyt said dimensions and terrain of the lot and state environmental regulations for septic tanks caused him to extend the house into the 20' rear lot setbacks.

During the workshop, building inspector Jimmy Neeley said Hoyt staked out the proposed house and had his property surveyed, but the surveyor didn't tell him of the setback violation.

"I think it's unfortunate they didn't get the information from the

surveyor," said Neeley. "It was a total surprise to the Hoyts," he added.

Hoyt was encouraged by the commission to move the house as far up on the lot as possible without violating state rules on septic tanks.

In other regular business, the commission:

—Approved a site development plan requested by owner Ralph Gary for a hobby shop on Lot 2-B, Block 11, Cree Meadows Country Club Subdivision.

—Heard Neeley explain that a replacement will not be hired for enforcement officer Sandy Hall, who is leaving Friday. He said his department, Building Inspection, will be combined with Planning and Zoning, and he will serve both areas.

—Agreed with an administration suggestion to meet just once a month, and set the third Monday as the regular meeting day.

into setbacks, according to today's rules.

"Now you tell me it's going to cost me \$150," said Ellis. She said village philosophies and policies change with each change of administration.

"We change administrations like

we change underwear," remarked Davis.

After a series of questions on trees, parking, commercial lot sizes and the like, Mayor Davis complimented Unger on the proposed plan.

While he admitted the setback requirements drive him "bonkers," he said the overall plan is good.

Before adjourning, Commissioner J.D. James noted the meeting would be enforcement officer Sandy Hall's last, since she will be moving to Florida. Members thanked Hall and commended her for her work with the commission.

P&Z will have a workshop at 2 p.m. Monday, March 2, to draft recommendations to be sent to the

council before the zoning ordinance is finally approved.

Just a handful of citizens attended the final P&Z public hearing before the ordinance and plan are considered by the Village Council. Elected officials at the meeting included the mayor and councillors Alonso, Jerry Shaw and Rick Davis.

## Lodgers' Tax Committee OKs ski promotion funds

Ruidoso will take its promotional message to Texas next spring for Ski Group '87.

The Ruidoso Lodgers' Tax Committee, during a regular meeting Wednesday, authorized a total of \$1,700 for two one-day Ski Group '87 events—one in Austin and the other in Dallas.

Nancy Radzewicz presented a budget asking for \$1,500, but the committee tacked on the additional amount after hearing that pre- and post-show mailings are vital. Radzewicz said the shows are by invitation only and are designed to reach people in the travel industry.

By registering early for the May 26 and May 28 shows, the Chamber of Commerce will receive a set of mailing labels with the names of travel industry people in the two cities. Radzewicz said those labels were purchased last year for \$70. Radzewicz also presented a

\$2,225 budget for a Dallas trade show, approved last month contingent on receiving the budget. Included are airfare for three, per diem for two for six days and one for two days, as well as booth rental and show expenses.

Also during the meeting, discussion of the committee's membership took place.

"We're still a four-member board, until the mayor appoints a fifth member" noted Chairman Rod Adamson. He said the committee needs a secretary, and Don Parsons volunteered.

"I'll take the job if Tammie (Maddox) continues to take the minutes," said Parsons. Maddox, deputy village clerk and an ex officio member of the committee, agreed.

Treasurer Bill Rawlins reported a continued decline in lodgers' tax collections, down 17.5 percent at the

end of December. He said the total was down 20 percent at the end of November.

"So we're gaining a little bit," said Rawlins. He said the year-to-date collection total is \$77,811.45, down from last year's \$94,320 total at the end of December.

Maddox said collections are picking up, but at least two lodging establishments have gone out of business.

After a lengthy discussion, the committee turned down a request for \$9,370 to promote the McSween dig in Lincoln. Members agreed to authorize funds for brochures if the requestors will redraft a proposal and discuss trying to get more brochures for the money.

"We'd be agreeable to brochures but not to T-shirts, caps and billboards," said Parsons.

Adamson suggested beginning a draft budget for next year during

next month's meeting. He said he wants to complete the budget in April.

He suggested that Radzewicz discuss next year's trade shows with John Jeffers, executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, so that one budget proposal can be presented from the chamber.

Dan Kelley said the U.S. Forest Service won't allow him to use the Smokey Bear suit at a trade show in Albuquerque Saturday. He said the costume is not supposed to be used for commercial purposes, but to promote fire prevention.

He said with so many Forest Service districts in New Mexico it could appear that one was being favored over the others. Kelley said the suit still may be used at shows in other states.

Road, 10:36 a.m. on Ski Run Road, 5:06 p.m. on Baldy Drive and 6:50 p.m. in front of Three Bees on Mechem. Ruidoso Police Deputy

Chief Jim Alston said police are having no problems handling the snow-related traffic problems. He said traffic slowed to a standstill after about 6 p.m. Wednesday.

"People seem to be driving OK," noted Alston.

He said dispatch equipment went on battery power when the Police Department ex-

perienced a power outage from 2:15 a.m. until 8 a.m. today.

Village engineer Mike Davalos said village crews began salting streets at 3 a.m. and plowing at 4 a.m.

"Everything's moving along OK with no breakdowns," said Davalos. He said Street Department

crews will remain on the job throughout the day keeping village streets passable.

Assistant village manager Frank Potter said he, too, was out on the streets early.

"They (street crews) did a heck of a job," said Potter. Weather reports call for an additional two to six inches of snow.

## Village treats employees to hypertension checks

"Hypertension leads quietly but directly to a number of diseases," said state adult health nurse Jina Vick Friday.

Although high blood pressure can go undetected because it has few symptoms of its own, it can cause "end organ destruction" of the heart, kidney and brain.

Vick and adult health nurse Winona Stoltzfuz, of the state Health Services Division District IV, were in Ruidoso last week to present blood pressure programs and do screenings for village employees as the village's Valentine's gift to its staff.

"What better Valentine gift than promoting healthy hearts?" asked village manager Jim Hine. About 90 village employees took advantage of the program.

Vick said one of six adults is afflicted with hypertension, often called high blood pressure, a chronic disease. She said as an adult health nurse her main concern is early detection and prevention. Educational programs, such as the one given in Ruidoso, are designed to promote healthier lifestyles, a major factor in prevention.

In a program illustrated by charts and large pictures, Vick said the heart is a pump and blood pressure is the amount of force required to circulate blood through the body.

She said when blood pressure is measured, the top number, or "systolic," is the heart at work, or how much pressure is exerted on arteries while the heart pumps. The bottom number, or "diastolic," measures the pressure on a heart at rest.

If the bottom number is continually high, then the heart is not getting to rest, explained Vick. She said that can cause a great deal of damage to the heart and other organs.

What's a normal blood pressure? Vick said below 140/90 for people under 50 and below 160/90 for people over 50 is considered normal. She said a normal pulse ranges from 60 to 100 per minute. But simply measuring higher than those numbers doesn't necessarily call for a diagnosis of high blood pressure.

"Persistent readings over the norm indicate high blood pressure," explained Vick.

Three factors contributing to blood pressure include how hard the heart is pumping, the elasticity (contraction) on arterial walls and the resistance present in small arteries.

Vick displayed a jigsaw puzzle to illustrate the causes of high blood pressure. She said uncontrollable factors include race, sex and genes, since men are more at risk than women, blacks more than other races and the risk apparently runs in families.

But personal risk factors are very important, too, and they can be alleviated or avoided. Risks that can be controlled include obesity, stress, medications, salt, cholesterol, caffeine and smoking/nicotine.

Vick said one extra pound of weight adds a mile of blood vessels to the number the heart must pump blood through.

Both caffeine and nicotine are drugs, and Vick explained that they narrow and tighten blood vessels. She warned that coffee, tea, chocolate and some soft drinks contain caffeine. She cautioned against

smokeless tobacco as well as smoking.

A diet too high in sodium or salt causes the body to retain moisture and increases volume, said Vick.

While the disease can't be cured, she said it can be treated and controlled. Vick said a new trend is toward trying non-drug therapy first, and if that doesn't bring the problem under control to add medication.

Since high blood pressure drugs are notorious for causing side effects, Vick cautioned hypertensive patients to communicate frankly with doctors if a medication causes problems. With at least 100 different medications available, there are many options, she said.

Lifestyle changes recommended to reduce cardiovascular risk factors include: control blood pressure, control weight, manage stress, more exercise, less sodium/salt, no nicotine, less caffeine and less cholesterol.

"Weight loss seems to decrease blood pressure more than anything," said Vick. She also emphasized cutting down on salt consumption since the average adult consumes more than 10 times the 1/2 teaspoon a day the human body requires. Vick warned of hidden sodium in fast, canned or highly processed foods.

Vick said exercise is important because it relaxes blood vessels and increases circulation. An aerobic-type exercise, such as biking, jogging, brisk walking, jumping rope or hiking, is recommended for 20-30 minutes three to four times a week. "Blood pressure can be treated when you follow the rules," said Vick. But since the disease is so quiet, regular checks are highly encouraged.

The rest of the Warrior lineup for the tournament will be Henry Kaytah at 100 pounds, John Tipton at 114 pounds, Heath Wood at 121 pounds and Pete Baca at 140 pounds.

He has a 12-11 record on the season. Hill also is a standout football player.

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

## Ruidoso water lead-free; EID moves to new office

Hari Mukhoty of the local state Environmental Improvement Division (EID) office said Thursday that Ruidoso water has no lead in it.

The state EID office announced Monday plans to sample homes in four New Mexico cities to determine if high levels of lead occur in drinking water. Water will be sampled in Raton, Las Vegas, Santa Fe and Albuquerque, according to a news release.

"We have sampled Ruidoso water," said Mukhoty. He said Ruidoso water is not perfectly balanced, but is acidic and corrosive.

Mukhoty said lead is caused by the corrosive action of water in the pipes. Although lead has been banned for use in plumbing materials, some soldered joints may have small particles of lead that can dissolve into the water, said Mukhoty.

He recommends running some water through the pipes leading to home faucets after a night or longer of disuse.

"Signs that indicate the presence

of lead in tap water include frequent leaks in plumbing, rust-colored water, staining of laundry or dishes and a greenish discoloration which could indicate copper pipe has corroded," said EID environmental scientist Robert Gallegos.

Exposure to elevated levels of lead can increase blood pressure and cause other health problems, according to Gallegos.

But Mukhoty said Ruidoso water is free of the dangerous substance.

Results of the sampling in other areas will be made public in April. For further information contact Mukhoty at the new EID location: 1096 Mechem Drive in the Ruidoso Financial Center, Suite A4 (airport level).

Mukhoty said the secretary and two environmentalists working the Ruidoso area were moved to the new quarters to meet state requirements on office space. He said the new roomier office even has space for a sampling laboratory.

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
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

**SANTA FE**—Some of us were taught early and often not to kick a man when he's down.

Two "men" who are currently down in New Mexico are the ranching-farming business and the oil and gas business. None of our lawmakers appear tempted to stomp on the farmers and ranchers at the moment. So how come a few of them can't get it through their heads that it isn't wise to twist the arms of the petroleum folks?

Doesn't it indicate a certain paucity of imagination on the part of those we send to the capitol to take care of our affairs for us that they inevitably and always start off by saying, "Let's take it out of the hide of those oil and gas people"? Did we depend on this industry to support the extravagances of state government for so long it never enters our minds to up the taxes on anybody else?

That pipeline tax bill (SB 228) Senator Eddie Lopez has put in is a good example of the kind of thing we ought not to be doing. In an effort to punish out-of-state producers of petroleum products, it would end up drawing blood (more blood) from those who produce these products here at home.

The heart of the scheme is to tax the natural gas that flows through pipelines in the state, using a formula based on the amount of gas moved and the number of miles of New Mexico territory it traverses.

As the measure was originally proposed to me, it appeared the proposed tax would not in any way be produced anywhere in the state or on gas produced elsewhere but delivered anywhere in the state. That made it sound like it would only apply, for instance, to Oklahoma-produced gas moving through an El Paso Natural Gas pipeline straight across the state for ultimate delivery to El Paso's California customers.

I could dig that. But as the bill came out, it doesn't make those exceptions. Maybe they will be added later by amendment, but as it stands it looks to me as though it would punish New Mexico producers right along with out-of-staters. It wouldn't punish the pipelines, if that's what it's intended to do. They are just common carriers, and they are going to pass the extra tax on to producers, even though the proposal says they are responsible for collecting the money to be paid into the state treasury.

That collecting job would be something. Putting a pencil to the bill as it now stands, industry people say the gas moved by one pipeline alone would generate between \$100 million and \$200 million in new taxes every year. That might be great for solving the problems of New Mexico, but it would only add to the near-total economic disarray in the industry.

And there's another point our short-thinking legislators ought to get through their noggin. It's mighty tough to punish California, no matter how hard you want to. Add on to the price of gas presently being delivered there, and about the only effect you have is to push those who buy gas for use in that state deeper into the arms of Canadian producers. It's a simple economic fact that these folks on the West Coast are going to buy where they get the best price; they couldn't care less about New Mexico, or Oklahoma or Texas, for that matter. Playing any games that will add to the cost of locally produced natural gas will only mean New Mexicans will sell less and less of it, and we certainly don't need that.

What our lawmakers should be doing is taking their brains out of gear on this worn-out notion that they have to keep going back to this one industry to carry more than its share of the burden of supporting their appropriations. If anything, those in the oil and gas business in the state have been too forthcoming in the past. They have been a little too agreeable when new taxes were being loaded on them.

At the moment, though, it's likely they have been beaten down so far that anything that threatens them further is liable to bring them out of their corner ready to kick and butt a little.

I'd expect to see lots of them trooping the halls of the state capitol before the next month is over if only to deliver a simple message: "It's time for you guys to get off our backs!"

As a part-time resident of Ruidoso, I have been concerned for some time about the way that our village is being administered.

One thing that I object to is the fact that the fate of all of us is resting apparently on the decision of a few.

Although, I am a part-time resident, I pay full-time taxes. This by itself, should give us, the part-time residents, a voice and a vote on whatever decisions have to be taken which affect us.

As a property owner, I have seen the area where my home is located, as well as a neighbor's re-zoned, against our wishes, from residential to commercial. This was probably done only to comply with those few that I mentioned before.

Now, I find that water from the river is being diverted to supply Grindstone Canyon Dam, a development. This same water is also being diverted to an area behind the Skateland Building for use of a recreational paddle boat business. The paddle boat area surrounding it looks and smells like a junk dump. There is complete lack of sanitation around this "recreational" spot.

I feel that both of these problems are a direct violation of my water rights, besides being a public nuisance.

Every day news items are printed in the local paper and magazines promoting tourism. How can Ruidoso expect to attract tourism when its own residents are resentful of the way the town is being governed?

I therefore make the following observations:

1. It is a well-known fact that over 80% of the taxes are paid by the part-time resident. This by itself should give us a voice and a vote on deci-

sions which affect our community.  
2. Since I consider the diversion of the water from the river a violation of my water rights, I feel that a committee should be formed by the residents and part-time residents with water frontage.

Eliminate any commercial use of river water!

3. I would like some information on how to re-zone my property back to residential. Why should I be made to pay a commercial tax rate for my residence? Let's regulate the Palmer Gateway Subdivision. It is after all the gateway to Old Ruidoso!

4. Freeze developments in Ruidoso. The quality of life is beginning to suffer. We should not trade quality for quantity.

5. No more national franchises. Let's back our local merchants.

The village needs more commercial property, high rise buildings and more high density condominiums like it needs a dry August forest fire.

With all due respect to the City Council, I believe that more attention should be given to the needs of the permanent residents (who sometimes are afraid of speaking out), and to the part-time residents who pay taxes as well, and less to the developers and real estate agents!

## Editorial

Do we allow a problem to continue just because that's the way it has always been?

A line of hundreds of cars backed up along snow-slick Ski Run Road; nervous drivers—some who had never before driven in snow; weather conditions worsening; nightfall's darkness flooding in; nothing to do but follow the glow of taillights ahead; moving at the pace of a big city traffic jam; tempers rise with the fear of being caught on the mountain; and still the line of cars creeps so slowly.

This happens just about every weekend in the winter. Saturday's trip from Ski Apache took nearly two hours. If inclement weather hadn't halved the number of automobiles in the parking lot during the day, the trip down may have taken four hours.

The root of the problem? Each car having to come to a stop at the intersection of Ski Run Road and Highway 37.

The solution? Traffic control—either an officer or a traffic light regulating the heavy flow of traffic coming down the mountain into the light traffic on the highway.

We encourage the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office to coordinate with the New Mexico State Police some type of human traffic control to provide a solution for now. In addition, we urge Lincoln County Commissioners to work with state Highway Department officials on the possibility of installing a traffic light to provide temporary traffic control whenever needed at the intersection.

The ski resort has been there 25 years. The problem of downhill traffic continues. Let's do something about it.—DJP

A 54-year-old automotive mechanic at Fort Bliss, Torres said he spent \$30 on the wager that returned \$40,260.

"This is by far the largest amount that I've won at the track," the handicapper said, adding that he has been going to Sunland Park for the past 10 years.

## Sunland Park Hoofbeats

Sunland Park's latest mega-Twin Trifecta carryover pool was won by three lucky bettors last Saturday. Each ticket returned \$40,259.20. One handicapper bet \$30, another invested \$400 while the final winner bet more than \$7,000.

The local 1987 two-year-old thoroughbred crop is starting to make its presence known. Several of the youngsters have appeared in early morning workouts in preparation for the rich Riley Allison Futurity - which will be run in early May. The first local freshman race should come up next week.

Apprentice rider Lewie Germany turned in a veteran performance last Saturday when the young reinsman guided Stanel to victory in the fourth division of the Rio Grande Marathon Series for claiming horses. Germany held Stanel off the lead for much of the contest before letting the 8-year-old California-bred roll down the stretch. It was Stanel's third division win in the Marathon Series.

As a result of increased handle and attendance figures, (up an

average of 10 and 13 percent respectively for the last two weeks) Sunland Park will raise its purses for the third time in a two-month period. The increase goes into effect Feb. 27. The purse hike will effect lower-end claiming, maiden and conditioned allowance races.

Sunland Park's former leading rider Danny Sorenson will be one of many new faces trying their luck at the new Birmingham Turf Club in Alabama. The talented 28-year-old came to Sunland Park last spring from the Northwest and quickly established himself as a top-notch rider. Sorenson also was one of Ruidoso Downs' top stakes riders last summer.

The American Quarter Horse Association announced its yearly champions on Monday. Gold Coast Express, the winner of the 1986 Champion of Champions, was named World Champion. Current Sunland Park resident Dashing Phoebe (Kansas Derby winner) was named Champion 3-year-old filly. All American Futurity winner Ronas Kyon took the 2-year-old colt or gelding title. Heavenly was named champion aged mare and Sir Allbi was given the aged stallion

award. Budweiser Derby winner Six Fortunes won the 3-year-old colt honors, while Cash Rate was named best older horse.

Sunland Park presented a special President's Day program last Monday. More than 2,500 fans wagered \$228,000. The attendance figure was one of the highest totals for a Monday in the track's history. Country swing artists Asleep At The Wheel entertained the local patrons prior to the day's racing action and El Paso's Moon Pie Daince Band performed throughout the afternoon.

Last weekend's action at Sunland Park featured three simulcasts of top thoroughbred events. Saturday's action saw 1985 Belmont Stakes winner Creme Fraiche upset in the \$200,000 Widener Handicap from Hialeah. On Sunday, Santa Anita's La Canada for older fillies was the feature and Monday's action saw a cagey Bill Shoemaker win the San Luis Obispo also from Santa Anita.

There was only one claim in last weekend's action. Betty L. Lichty tagged Baran for \$2,500. The 5-year-old won the race in impressive fashion.
