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Area residents want out of Cedar Creek road mess

Lincoln County Commissioners were confronted by frustrated property owners from Cedar Creek at their meeting Tuesday. Representatives from Cedar Creek turned out en masse to get some answers from the commissioners about work that was done and what they could expect to be done on the Cedar Creek Road. According to "Buddy" Bundick, a letter was received by residents of Cedar Creek from the county com-

missioners last year. The letter stated that Cedar Creek would be paved. Work begun on the road was halted in December. "The road in its present condition is worse than I've ever seen it," Bundick said. "Work started last year began too late to do any good. I plead with the county to get something done on this road. "The county has passed us over time and time again and we've been patient. Now it's our turn!" Bundick declared. A 16-year resident of Cedar Creek, Charlotte Jarratt explained

to commissioners there was only one road in and out of Cedar Creek. "In some places the road is only wide enough for one vehicle, if you meet someone on the road, somebody has to back up," Jarratt said. "Cedar Creek is a disaster area!" Commissioner Bill Karn explained to the nearly full room that the funds for the Cedar Creek road were gained from a co-op agreement with the state Highway Department and work had to be done according to their guidelines. "The scope of the work was set by

the Highway Department," Commissioner John Hightower interjected. "We can't deviate from that." "Nothing less than a proper asphalt road is acceptable," Bundick answered. "We've been given incorrect information all along. We were told that we were getting a 32-foot-wide asphalt road." County manager Suzanne Cox explained there was never any mention of paving the road. "The last commission did discuss changing the scope of work on Cedar Creek, but the state Highway

Department refused to approve widening and paving," Cox said. "We are faced with a large problem on that road." "We understand \$22,000 was received from the timber cut and sold along the road by the people working on the road this fall," Jarratt said. "Can we have that to use on the road?" "All I can say about that," stated county attorney Gary Mitchell, "is that it's under investigation." In other business, commissioners Hightower, Karn and Ralph Dunlap:

—Heard a request to blade roads from ranchers in the Corona area. —Heard Sheriff Don Samuels express an opinion that vouchers from his department were not being treated fairly. He felt he wasn't getting "any cooperation" from the manager's office. "It seems like the rules have changed since I took office," Samuels stated. "We need to fill out more paperwork now than in the beginning." Cox explained all vouchers are

Village Manager hopes regrouping yields results

Newly appointed village manager Frank Potter is overseeing a massive shake-up at Village Hall.

"The mayor and council told us to get things organized where we're more result-oriented and responsive to the public," said Potter. And he contends that the present whirlwind of moving offices and changing titles and job responsibilities will lead to just such a result-oriented organization.

Appointed last week by Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., Potter isn't wasting any time.

"Lloyd's a guy that wants things done," remarked Potter.

Among changes Potter has implemented is naming two division heads to oversee all village departments except the Police Department. He said, by law, the appointed Police Chief reports to the manager.

Potter said the village spends money for personnel, operations and capital improvements, and his goal will be to save enough money in personnel and operating expenses to continue supporting capital improvement projects. He expects to attain a goal of fewer employees through attrition.

Although he served as assistant manager from 1974 until longtime manager Jim Hine retired last month, Potter said he won't appoint an assistant to serve with him.

"We don't need an assistant city manager," said Potter. He said he'll utilize the two division heads to oversee village operations. He has appointed village clerk Leon Eggleston as head of the support services division and village engineer Mike Davalos as head of the infrastructure division.

"I told them what I wanted and where I want to be in the future," said Potter. "No one ever told me," he added.

Eggleston, who also serves as finance director, will supervise finance, personnel, payroll, purchasing, the Ruidoso Public Library and the airport.

Davalos will oversee the Street, Sewer, Water, Fire, Parks and Recreation and Protective Inspection departments.

Potter said he'll be expecting a lot from Eggleston and Davalos, so he's given them some help. Tammie Maddox will be named deputy village clerk and Becky Durham will serve as assistant division head for infrastructure.

Maddox has served as executive secretary and Durham will move from the Water Department where she was assistant water superintendent.

Mary Maxwell, who has been cross-trained to fill in as needed at Village Hall, will now be trained as executive secretary.

Potter said the Water and Wastewater departments will be combined, and the position of Wastewater Department head will be deleted when Blair Halladay retires. His assistant, Rudy Lugo, will assist Water Department chief Richard Sanchez, who will head the new combined department.

Debbie Rogge, assistant personnel director and payroll clerk, will also be assigned to help out in the Protective Inspection Department. Potter said no one will be hired to replace Planning and Zoning enforcement officer Sandy Hall, who resigned last month, and Rogge will assist that department's only employee, Building Inspector Jimmy Neeley.

The change that has Potter the most enthusiastic is a central purchasing warehouse that he predicts will save the village a great deal of money. Three employees will staff the warehouse, in the old vehicle maintenance shop behind the Police Department, said Potter. He said Fonda McClain, formerly of the Street Department, will act as

one of three purchasing employees. No new employees will be hired to staff the warehouse, said Potter. He said a feature of the central warehousing will be a computer card system for vehicle fuel.

Potter said he already has talked to village employees about his commitment to being responsive to the public on a timely basis.

"I think some employees were shocked to find out that we are public servants and we work for the public," noted Potter. But he stressed that he is serious in expecting all village employees to be polite and helpful at all times.

Potter praised the Fire Department and the gymnastics program, two village areas he said are "result-oriented" and responsive to the public.

Since municipal governments all operate in much the same way, Potter said he doesn't plan to "reinvent the wheel." He said he's working on a five-year capital improvements plan that will be tied to a time schedule.

"That's something that every city does," he noted.

Potter also has implemented a management information system (MIS) featuring weekly updates by departments and projects. He said that will help eliminate some past problems caused by lack of communication.

Information from MIS memoranda will make it easier for Potter to keep the mayor and Village Council informed, a function that Potter says is an important part of his job.

Already he sees some improvement in communication among the public, the administration and elected officials. Potter said he has been visiting Midtown merchants to discuss problems unique to that area.

"Ninety days ago they hated us; and now we're communicating," said Potter. "We're going to go out there and try to work with everybody."

Nearly \$500,000 spent so far on airport

While a regional airport on Fort Stanton Mesa is still at ground level, the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) has spent nearly a half-million dollars over the past six months.

According to SBAC financial reports, that five-member commission spent \$489,331 from the Sierra Blanca Improvement fund between August 1986 and January 1987.

Cattle continue to graze on the flat land that once was a New Mexico State University range studies project as construction crews begin moving onto the land to begin earthwork included in Phase I, PAC 1.

Funding for the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRRA) has been provided thus far by the State of New Mexico and the federal government.

The biggest part of preliminary expenses have gone to Leeshill-Herkenhoff, the Albuquerque design engineers on the many-

phased airfield project. SBAC has paid design engineers \$312,341 through January.

Fred Heckman, former SBAC chairman who was hired as a contract administrator, was paid \$64,822, during those six months, according to financial reports.

Legal advisor, Steve Sanders, reportedly has been paid \$31,896 during that same period.

The SBAC also remitted \$1 million to New Mexico State University with a federal grant allocated to pay for the airport land.

A November report indicated a total of \$67,500 has been obligated to Betty Schrecengost, apparently in payment for water rights.

The SBAC also oversees a fund that receives regular contributions from its five member governing bodies. Total contributions of \$2,000 each are listed for Ruidoso, Capitan and Lincoln County, but Ruidoso Downs has apparently made an early payment for a total of \$2,300.

The fifth member of the commission formed by a local powers agreement, the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe, has contributed just \$1,000.

During a recent SBAC meeting Commissioner Conrad Buchanan questioned why one member is not up-to-date on payments, and fiscal agent Suzanne Cox said she is sending bills.

Ruidoso's Topsy Taxi topples

The Topsy Taxi is out of gas. Laura Ashley, coordinator for the Sober Ride Program, announced Wednesday that the service has been discontinued due to a lack of funds.

Although the Sober Ride Program collected \$1,110 in donations from bar owners and operators, those contributions just didn't keep pace with the overhead involved in operating the program.

The service began on New Year's

Eve with a donated telephone line, volunteers staffing the phone, a car furnished by the Village of Ruidoso and paid drivers. When a commercial taxi began operations, the Topsy Taxi retired the village vehicle and utilized that service.

Between New Year's Eve and Wednesday, 56 rides were provided through the Sober Ride Program. The service operated a total of 38 days.

Ashley said the majority of the

rides originated at liquor establishments.

Tourists comprised 91 percent of those using the Topsy Taxi, said Ashley.

Even though the Topsy Taxi is out of service, Ashley urges anyone who is drinking to be sure of a sober ride home.

"Call a taxi," said Ashley. She said the cost of a taxi ride is minimal.

Orogrande picked as Star Wars site

A site just 75 miles from Ruidoso has been chosen for a \$3 billion laser project that is part of the Strategic Defensive Initiative (SDI), or "Star Wars."

Lieutenant General James A. Abrahamson, director of the SDI organization, announced Tuesday the Army's ground-based free electron laser technology integration experiment will be located on a 2,471-acre portion of White Sands Missile Range near Orogrande, according to published reports.

The project is reportedly planned

to determine whether a ground laser can be beamed to orbiting mirrors, which would then aim the beams at enemy missiles soon after launch.

Members of New Mexico's Washington delegation were quoted as citing the economic boost the laser project is expected to bring in to the state. Both Senator Pete Domenici and Congressman Joe Skenen said local businesses stand to benefit from jobs and construction contracts.

A spokesman for Senator Jeff

Bingaman said Wednesday that he is very pleased that the project will be located in New Mexico. He said the laser experiment meets the terms of the Anti-ballistics missile (ABM) treaty.

Senator Bingaman said he hopes many New Mexico firms will be involved.

Business people will have the opportunity to learn more about the project at briefings scheduled on March 21 in Alamogordo, Las Cruces and El Paso, Texas, times and locations to be announced.

"When used for lengthy periods of time, home computers can put as much stress on the eyes as the office types," Dr. T.T. Marquardt said.

Computer related eyestrain symptoms include headaches, blurred vision, itching/burning eyes, eye fatigue and flickering

sensations.

"Studies have traced the causes to vision problems computer users already have and to improper working environments," Marquardt continued. "Sometimes you can have a minor vision problem that doesn't interfere with normal seeing tasks. But it will show up under the stress of staring at a computer screen for hours at a time."

Annual eye examinations are recommended for people who use computers at home or at work.

Sometimes, glasses with a mild prescription are needed to reduce stress when using a computer. For those who already wear glasses, it may be necessary to have a specially designed pair for computer use.

Marquardt advised talking to your optometrist about how much you use your home computer and any eyestrain symptoms you are having. Also, measure the working distance between your eyes and the screen. All of this is important in determining your computer-related

eye care needs.

In addition to seeking regular eye care, home computer users can help their eyes by taking a 10 to 15 minute rest breaks every hour or two; eliminating glare from windows and lights; reducing room lighting; using adjustable furniture and placing reference material next to the screen to avoid frequent eye and head movements and focusing changes.

Girls floor competition will begin about 2:30 p.m. at the RAC, and then the two girls teams will move to the Activities Center for vault, bars and beam.


Qualified judges will travel to

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



Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—It is reported, perhaps facetiously, that the chief lobbyist for the railroads in our state has requested us to cease referring to what is going to occur in our legislature as a "train wreck." It appears to think the activities of New Mexico's lawmakers give train wrecks a bad name.

Should we still be looking for the crash those words foretell? At the moment, there would appear to be no reason not to. I am assured very solemnly that all sorts of heavy meetings are taking place somewhere offstage at just this time, some of them lasting till the small hours of the morning. Those gatherings of the men perceived as having ultimate power in the current Legislature (no women lawmakers are thought to be in that category) are apparently in an effort to reconcile the wish lists of the Governor and the legislators with the reality of New Mexico's economic situation. Those taking part in these juntas would have us pay little or no attention to those daily public carryings-on in House and Senate, which are apparently being staged more for our amusement than for any other purpose.

It is clear that, even before the session started, certain members had been selected by the powers to serve on the inevitable conference committees that meet to arrive at final conclusions on important matters during the closing hours of each of our legislative gatherings. Those of our people who work entirely behind closed doors, shape the real distribution of money during the coming fiscal year. Watch to see who they are, and you will be able to distinguish the Legislature's big-leaguers from those who merely think they are such.

When Rep. Max Coll of Santa Fe rose to put on final passage what was officially designated "House Appropriations and Finance Committee substitute for House Bills 2 and 6, House Education Committee substitute for House Bill 3 and House Transportation Committee substitute for House Bill 4," he used lots of phrases to suggest that this massive funding bill was somehow "shrunk from those of the same kind which

have been enacted in previous years.

He proudly stated that the total bill appropriated as \$15 million less than had been requested by the Governor. He made much of the fact that spending for all branches of state government except education was actually being reduced by \$9 million from last year's level. He spoke of a budget that is "very lean" and of keeping appropriation levels "as low as is reasonable."

Unfortunately, he could not explain away with his words the fact that the \$1.495 billion he was asking the members to vote to spend was, put simply, more than we have ever spent before.

It remains the strong belief of the man who writes these lines that the ordinary citizens of New Mexico expected their lawmakers, during 1987, to plan to spend less than the state has consumed in the past.

Since less and more are in direct opposition to one another, no amount of pretty language can change more into less. Representative Coll and the men and women who serve with him should therefore not be surprised if voters express their disappointment at the performance of this year's legislators in a forceful manner in November of next year.

The two segments of this column above refer, respectively, to the behind-the-scenes activity and the before-the-scenes activity of the present legislative gathering here.

Those who would have us reassured tell me I should tell you not to worry because what is going on in private is considerably different from what takes place on the floor of the House and Senate, where the battle over House Bill 2 goes on.

The problem with that theory is that you and I can see the public side of the legislators' activities, while the private side we are expected to take entirely on faith.

What bothers me is the fact that the public activity seems to be so far off the mark reality would appear to require. If in public these folks can't understand the harsh facts of contemporary life in New Mexico, why should we put credence in the fact that they can act sensibly behind closed doors?

DEAR EDITOR:

In the last forty years, real estate prices in Ruidoso have been on a continuing climb, making it one of the surest investments a person could have. A cabin in the pines not only proved to be a place where someone could escape for a weekend alone or with family and friends, but also provided a "blue chip" investment.

6. Expanded track facilities now bring in horsemen, trainers and fans of thoroughbred racing;
7. Additional lifts, snow-making machines and other facilities make our Ski Apache area the most popular in the state and one of the largest ski areas in the Rockies; and
8. The possibility of a large military build-up and expansion in the El Paso, Las Cruces and Alamogordo areas, due to the Star Wars program, could bring as many as 2,500 people into the area for the next several years.

Due to these factors, it is our opinion that Ruidoso real estate has become an exceptional buy and Ruidoso's future is brighter than it has been.

Charles Smith's Mr. Nicholas, who battled for the lead throughout the race with Rolling K. Farm's Will Cut, finished second in race to earn \$2,677. Early in the stretch drive, it appeared that it would be Mr. Nicholas that would hand Curribot the defeat, but the gelding could not keep up with Thats Incredible in the final stages and had to settle for the runner-up spot. Carlos Rivas had the riding call.

Will Cut finished third earning \$1,460 with jockey Joe Martinez aboard.
