

Ollinger's wallet

'Star Wars' briefings set, 1,100 new jobs predicted

The New Mexico congressional delegation today announced that Roswell has been added to the list of cities scheduled for briefings on participation by New Mexico companies in the Free Electron Laser ("Star Wars") project at White Sands Missile Range near Orogrande. Briefings to discuss opportunities for businesses to be involved in the \$1 billion project are scheduled for March 21 in Roswell, Alamogordo, Las Cruces and El Paso, Texas. The Alamogordo meeting is set for 10 a.m. at Alamogordo High School, the Las Cruces meeting for 2 p.m. at the Holiday Inn at 201 East University and the El Paso meeting for 10 a.m. at the Holiday Inn at I-10 and Airway Boulevard. A location has not yet been announced for the 2

p.m. meeting in Roswell. Briefings will be conducted by the U.S. Army and the primary contractor, Fluor Constructors, Inc. of Irvine, California. Members of the congressional delegation urge New Mexico companies interested in participating in this major "Star Wars" project to attend one of the four meetings. The project reportedly will research whether a laser can be fired through the atmosphere and reflected off orbiting mirrors to hit enemy missiles immediately after they are launched. A spokesman for Fluor Constructors has been quoted as saying at least 1,100, and perhaps as many as 2,000, people will be hired to work on the \$197.6 million contract.

Cedar Creek residents get answers

Residents of Cedar Creek received some detailed answers about their road at a meeting Tuesday. County manager Suzanne Cox explained the problems encountered on the Cedar Creek Road work since the project started last October. She told a standing room only crowd how former commissioners Bill Elliott, Kenneth Nosker and A.W. Gnatkowski accepted an estimate from Jack LaMay to do tree removal, culverts and a base course for \$110,000. The work was scheduled to be completed in six weeks. The final bill, \$224,972.09, included an overrun of \$115,499.09, said Cox. "Bad weather slowed them (LaMay's crew) down," Cox said.

"When a job is estimated for six weeks and overruns to three months, there are budget overruns." Cox distributed detailed account sheets of what it will cost to finish Cedar Creek according to state highway specifications. State Highway Department cooperative (co-op) funds for Cedar Creek will remain effective until December. It was also learned that many trees were removed, not to allow room for widening the road, but to allow the sun to shine on the surface to aid in the drying process. "There were places on that road that never saw the sun," said county road supervisor Earl Krieg. "The road needs to dry out," he added. Krieg was asked by several people in the crowd if he could begin putting the culverts back in now to assist in drying out the roads and

draining them. They were told it is still too wet to put culverts in; however, as soon as weather permits work will resume on the road. Krieg said he plans to move his road crew to Cedar Creek by the end of March. "Weather permitting," Cox promised, "the double penetration should begin in May." County Commissioner William Karn noted that with the trees removed and better drainage from the new culverts the road will stay in better shape longer than it has in the past. He said a double penetration road should last from two to five years. Karn said he talked Tuesday with Lou Medrano, State Highway Department district engineer. "The State Highway Department will not change the scope of the work on Cedar Creek—it has to stay

the same," said Karn. "We (present county commissioners) are taking \$100,000 out of the general fund, so that Cedar Creek will be done right," he added. Among the group of residents at both Tuesday's and last Friday's meetings, was former Lincoln County Commission Chairman Bill Elliott. "All I have to say is that the present county commissioners believed the road could be done," said Elliott. "It didn't work out the way we planned, but we tried." Cedar Creek residents heard last Friday from attorney Steve Sanders on how to set up a paving assessment district, by the end of Tuesday's meeting they were apparently satisfied with the county's promise of work to be done and indicated they would like to begin discussion of the paving assessment district.

Village Council discusses changes

Village Councillor Victor Alonso, during a short Ruidoso Village Council meeting Tuesday, urged newly-appointed village manager Frank Potter to keep the council informed of reorganization plans. Recalling the time and effort that went into the village personnel policy adopted a few months ago, Alonso said the council should be involved in any further changes. "I believe they need to do this with the consent of this body," said Alonso, observing that the new administration is working diligently to reorganize so that new employees won't be needed to fill vacant positions. "It's within the scope of the reorganization we adopted some time ago," said Village Councillor Ray Dean Carpenter. Councillor Elmer Pirelli added that Potter is keeping the council informed. While stressing a belief that councillors shouldn't "meddle" in the day-to-day running of Village Hall, Alonso was adamant that they be informed of restructuring plans.

"I don't see how they can turn a blind eye," said Alonso. And Potter agreed. He said his newly-designed "Management Information Service" will help keep councillors informed. Potter recommended a workshop, or a series of workshops, to discuss a number of items. Councillors set a workshop to discuss the airport land and contracts for 2 p.m. Monday, March 30, in council chambers of Village Hall. Potter said councillors and planners for the airport land need to set the scope of the planning project and finalize a contract agreement. He said he'll have "10 or 12" other contracts ready for council review. Also Tuesday Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. issued a proclamation honoring Ruidoso High School senior Hamilton Carter, who won first place at the regional science fair and is the first Ruidoso student ever to qualify for the International Science Fair to be conducted in San Juan, Puerto Rico. Mayor Davis proclaimed May 10 through May 16 as "Hamilton Carter Week" and urged all citizens to support Carter's endeavors and congratulate him on his success.

In other regular business Tuesday the council: —Listened to a presentation by Al Junge on transition. —Heard the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission report presented by commission Chairman Tim Morris. —Adopted a resolution pertaining to authorized signatures on banking matters. —Adopted a resolution making minor changes to personnel rules

and regulations. —Heard from Mayor Davis of a joint workshop on wildfires to be conducted by the U.S. Forest Service. —Authorized advertising for proposals for an insurance specialist to aid the village in finding the best price on insurance policies. —Went into executive session, requested by Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor, to discuss personnel. —Request by owner Billy Wade for property line setback variance, Ponderosa Heights, Unit 2, lots 70 and 71, Block 10. The meeting will be preceded by a 2 p.m. workshop session. Both the workshop and regular meeting are open to the public.

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission will meet at 3 p.m. Monday, March 16, in council chambers of Village Hall. Items on the agenda include: —Consideration of site development and vacation of right of way request for Power Plus Car Wash in Skyland Subdivision.

Ruidoso Downs sets cleanup campaign

During a regular meeting Monday, the Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees handled a short agenda, heard a citizen's complaint and listened to a report by the Ruidoso Downs Ladies Auxiliary on plans for a spring cleanup campaign.

Village clerk Jo Anne Jenkins said Robert Hageman, owner of Cimarron Condos on U.S. Highway 70, complained of large utility bills on the vacant structure. She said he asked for a special rate, but trustees were unwilling to make

special allowances for one vacant building when the village has many more citizens with the same problem.

The Ruidoso Downs Ladies Auxiliary announced the upcoming spring cleanup, and told the board that this year's spruce-up will be in conjunction with the Village of Ruidoso's beautification and cleanup campaign.

Jenkins reported that in other regular business the trustees: —Adopted the open meetings act.

—Tabled a resolution on the Joint Use Board.

—Adopted a joint resolution with the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office setting a \$10 per day charge for Ruidoso Downs' prisoners housed in the Lincoln County Jail. Jenkins said the Sheriff's Office asked for \$37.50 a day, but agreed to the reduction after she and Ruidoso Downs administrator Charles Robinson testified at a meeting of the Lincoln County Commission.

Wally's Dome

Regular eye exams recommended for children

Children go through many changes during their school years and so do their eyes, according to the New Mexico Optometric Association.

"Unfortunately, school eye chart tests are not likely to pick up changes in a child's vision that might be interfering with his or her learning," said Dr. T.T. Marquardt in a Save Your Vision Week message.

"The eye chart test checks only how well a child can see at a distance," he explained. "Yet there are many other vision problems that could affect a child's learning and enjoyment of recreational activities."

Marquardt said that once a year every school-age child should have a thorough eye examination cover-

ing vision perception as well as eye focusing abilities. Between eye examinations parents and teachers should be alert for behavioral symptoms that may indicate a child is developing a vision problem. The stress of schoolwork can cause this to happen.

These symptoms include consistently sitting close to the television screen, poor sports performance even with practice, a drop in school performance, failure to work up to potential, rubbing of eyes, difficulty remembering what is read and difficulty following verbal instructions.

Symptoms that may occur while the child is reading include turning the head to use one eye only or closing or covering one eye; placing head close to book or desk; frown-

ing or scowling; losing place or using finger or marker to guide eyes; saying words aloud or lip reading; omitting, repeating and miscalling words or confusing similar words and persistent word reversals after the second grade.

Most children may exhibit some of these symptoms at one time or another but those who do so frequently or consistently may have a vision problem in need of immediate professional attention.

New growth protein has been discovered at the University of California at San Francisco. It makes bone cells multiply faster to help cut healing time; could be used in the future to help replace periodontal loss, speed fracture healing or repair osteoporosis.

High-energy shock waves used to disintegrate kidney stones are now being used against gallstones, too, in European tests.

At the University of Florida in Gainesville, scientists are testing a technique to remove bone marrow from children suffering from neuroblastoma, take out the cancer cells, and return the clean marrow to the patients. Early results are very hopeful.

Ultrasound is being utilized to spot prostate tumors that are too small to find by palpation. Early treatment improves cure rate.

New electric toothbrush is designed to remove tartar. Brushes get in deep and reverse direction 45 times a second. Found effective in studies at Loyola University in Chicago.





"Senator Smalley and Jeff's grandfather used to ride to Santa Fe together," reflected Cox.

"And I was named for my grandfather," Jeff adds proudly.

Jeff ended his day by meeting former Governor Bruce King, who told him, "I hope you come again." "I will if you will vote for me," replied the budding politician.

ENMU alumni raise scholarship funds





Ruidoso boys drop finale to Deming

The second time around in Deming's Wildcat Gymnasium proved not as successful as the first time for the Ruidoso High School's boys varsity basketball team Tuesday night.

Ruidoso lost a 69-52 game to the host Wildcats in the first round of the District 3-AAA Tournament.

Ruidoso thus ended the season with an overall 11-13 record and was fourth in regular-season district action with a 3-5 record.

Hall led the Deming attack with

But Segura is optimistic.

"We've played a lot tougher schedule than we did a year or two ago," he said. "We're getting better."





The Young Calf Learns The River

Little January, the bull calf born in the snowy blizzard of January 28, is a great favorite with the older calves and grown cows. And he knows this. He will visit around during the noon rest, lying beside this calf for awhile and that one awhile more; and following one cow and calf awhile and another after a bit, getting the lay of the land. He and the grown bull are great

pals, they play at fighting and kicking, and running and dodging. The big bull is very easy on the little guy, as if careful not to hurt him.

Little January Kid is very devoted to his mother, and is always watching over his shoulder to see where she is. And when he drifts out of sight he will raise his little bull bugle voice

in a call, and then listen for his mother's answer. If he receives none he will go skipping and kicking back to the last place they were together. Sometimes he goes in a different direction. Or that is, to me it seems he does. No doubt his mother's answering call has been too low for my hearing, although his keen little ears have caught the answering voice of his mother.

The other day I saw him across the creek nibbling the young grass with his mother and some other cows. How did this tiny fellow cross this high water, surely almost as deep as he is tall in most places?

The cows had crossed on a kind of ford they had selected about a-foot-and-a-half and two-feet deep.

The mother cow saw me and thought I had showed up to bring her some extra feed, or wanted to re-

mind me that soon she would be ready for a little extra grub. Anyhow she began wading across the creek. After she was across, January raised his head from his grazing and started over. He reached the creek above the ford at a steep bank where the creek was narrow and swift and about three feet deep. Here he studied the situation, going down to the water, then went on and stopped opposite where his mother stood. Then, just above the ford where the water must have been about three-feet deep—over his head, he came to the edge of the two-foot high bank. Then gathering himself together he got ready to leap. I was ready to run down the creek and pull him out; but with a great jump, he landed, ker splash, out on the water and half-swimming and half-wading and leaping he made it across.

You stood there, hardly able to believe your eyes. Who taught the little guy how to do this? He acted as though this were something he had learned long ago. Just like the tiny fawns following their mothers leaping over the fences.

I have always had a dread of young calves following their mothers across the creek in high water, but the cows know what they are doing, and the calves also.

The river is much deeper and swifter now than when January made his flying leap out into the stream. And the cows are not crossing much. When they do, the calves always stay on this side.

Between mother and calf there is an unmistakable language; and the ways of Our Lord in protecting his creatures become more wonderful day by day.

Why not toss that hot potato right back into the governor's court and get down to the hard job of drafting a budget in line with state revenues. When times are tough, it's time to bite the bullet and live within your means.

So when it comes to more and higher taxes, let's send this message to our state legislators:

Just say no!—fj

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Just keep smiling, New Mexico, and everything will work out all right.

That seems to be the way things look from the office of our Governor these days. If we act as though we have no problems, the chief executive seems to be telling us, presto! there will be no problems.

But there are those of us, including many in our legislature, whose experience of living doesn't lead us to that same lighthearted conclusion. We think when things get grim, you roll up your sleeves and start coping with them. In the case of a governor, in our view, that doesn't mean going about the state giving happy-talk speeches and making nice-nice while your legislative program is being treated with massive indifference.

Unfortunately, indifference about such matters is the impression the Governor himself creates, so it isn't much of a surprise that lawmakers don't seem to care much either.

Maybe it's Carruthers' timing that is wrong. He told us clearly during his campaign that he was going to run things the way Ronald Reagan, his hero, was running them in Washington. So we can't say he didn't warn us.

During the period of time since Carruthers chose to model himself on that particular gentleman, the world has come to know in unmistakable ways that just being the front man for a system that you trust to manage itself is a disastrous manner of proceeding where government is concerned. Merely being the Great Mouthpiece doesn't earn the princely salary and perks that go with high office.

Yet Carruthers seems still to be intent on operating that way. He presents us with a set of proposals to enact, and then he more or less walks away, saying, "Wake me up when it's over."

Unfortunately that won't cut it. What New Mexico needs is somebody who has a tough mind that commits him to looking our problems in the eye and then moving effectively to solve them. Just skimming around on the surface in a kind of "Skater's Waltz," while giving us a flash of the old molars, isn't going

to accomplish that.

Can our people honestly believe that when Arizona, Colorado, Oklahoma and Texas are all in the process of cutting back their state governments, New Mexico should honestly be expanding ours further? Are those who are unemployed because of conditions in the mining and petroleum industries really interested in seeing cabinet secretaries given raises on top of their already-sufficient salaries? Does the thought of tax increases being taken for granted as a kind of "given" warm the hearts of our consistently hard-pressed citizens?

Tough times require stern measures. We aren't getting those from the legislative assembly now sitting, which may be seen as more interested in protecting the owners of the state's racetracks by allowing them to slip in a measure to legalize off-track betting than in taking the hard steps needed to return the state to solvency. A major factor in their failure to act that way is the signal sent out by the Governor's office that he had no intention of handling any of the hot potatoes either.

He wants to make things "pleasant," he tells us. That's okay. We just came off a period of four-years' duration in which there was little pleasantness in the Roundhouse, God knows. But being pleasant should come a long way after being productive of sound and healthy government.

What we are failing to deal with here in our state capitol at the moment is the very foundations of our government. We are allowing those to erode, while concentrating instead on what kind of curtains we have in the windows.

I said repeatedly during the campaigns of last year that Garrey Carruthers was deliberately refusing to reveal to us his plans for what he would try to do after being elected. I thought that was a campaign ploy, suggested to him by shrewd advisors. I am coming to believe, however, that his reticence came from the fact that he didn't know then and doesn't know now what must be done to solve the problems of the state he governs.

Their concern was the condition of their roads and the apparent lack of proper response from the County Road Department. I understand their frustration and appreciate their attempt to remedy the problem by bringing it before the commissioners. We tried to make them aware of the problem the Road Department and the commissioners have in trying to cope with over 1,400 miles of road and two extraordinary snow storms, one on the heels of the other.

As commissioners, our problem is money and the lack of the same. We are constantly exploring every avenue we become aware of, trying to come up with grant money, cooperation money, or whatever. At present we are locked into a Cop with the State Highway Department for the Cedar Creek road. Their mandates and the amount of money available will not fix the road to the satisfaction of the residents. This fact is frustrating to us, the commissioners. We'd like to be able to build a 32 foot asphalt road. The aforementioned restrictions prevent this. We can only do the best we can with what we have to do it with.

The purpose of this letter is to appeal to everyone who has a genuine concern about roads to contact our legislators and ask for help. Counties need a recurring source of funding for road repair. I personally think a gas tax increase earmarked for county road repair is the answer. Many people run backwards when you mention a tax increase. If anyone has a less painful plan to raise the money I'd like to hear it.

In the meantime I welcome all complaints, comments or whatever from anyone in the county. We need to know your concerns and your problems. If you don't tell us we'll likely not know. I promise that within our limitations for money we will do our best to help.

Hoofbeats

A group of four Ruidosoans pegged Sunland Park's Twin Trifecta last Sunday for \$36,159. There were 239 live exchanges going into the second half of the Twin Tri and only one successful second half ticket.

Last Friday's action included nine trials for the West Texas Futurity. The 330-yard dash is scheduled for Sunday, March 22. The grade II dash boasts a purse of more than \$150,000 including the consolation with the winner taking home more than \$55,000.

As usual, trainer Jack Brooks and jockey Jacky Martin dominated the trials. The talented twosome combined for two qualifiers with rider Thane Zufelt adding another charge for Brooks' West Texas finalist.

The qualifiers with trainers, riders and times include: Shoot Yeah (Jack Brooks, Jacky Martin) 16.925; Native Orchid (Jerry Lazenby, Terry Layton) 16.980; Sound Rocket (Jack Dube, Jerry Nicodemus) 17.100; Lady Zevi (Bobby Willis, Larry Layton) 17.145; Double Leader (Cliff Lambert, Casey Lambert) 17.190; Holymolytsastreaker (T.E. Davidson, Mike Lidberg) 17.215; Im Steppin Easy (Jack Brooks, Thane Zufelt) 17.215; Johnny's Empress (Alfred Fontenot, Robert Thompson) 17.235; Elaines Beduino (Jack Brooks, Jacky Martin) 17.255; Bobabon (Richard Fry, Darrell Blevins) 17.270.

Fastest qualifier Shoot Yeah and Bobabon were graduates of last year's All American Select Quarter Horse Sale. Shoot Yeah, an Easy Jet colt, went for \$15,000, while the gavel fell at a bargain basement \$2,100 for Bobabon - a son of Sun Country Futurity winner Greybon.

Quarter horse legend Jerry Nicodemus turned another flashy performance in last Saturday's John Phillips Handicap. The three-time All American Futurity winner piloted Up Front Runner to a one-length win in 19.65 for 400 yards - the fastest time of the season at that distance. It was Nicodemus' first trip on Up Front Runner who is a three-time stakes winner at the meet.

In last week's simulcast action, jockey Angel Cordero Jr. continued his red-hot streak by recording victories in both stakes events. On Saturday, Cordero guided Why Not Try to victory in the \$75,000 Swift Stakes at Aqueduct and the veteran reinsman made a trans-continental

trip to win the \$1 million Santa Anita Handicap with Broad Brush in a thrilling stretch drive with Bill Shoemaker and 1986 Kentucky Derby winner Ferdinand.

There were two claims over last weekend's programs. On Saturday, trainer Billy Hitt claimed Aggariva for \$3,200 and Sunday's action saw trainer Waldo Morgan tag Senor Ralph for \$5,000.

Defending champ Mike Lidberg took the lead in the local jockey standings last weekend with a 3-tally performance. The 26-year-old rider led earlier in the season but was sidelined with an injury for almost three weeks.

Four bettors split \$36,000

Leading rider Pedro Benitez set a new seasonal track record while steering Moolah Smoke to an upset victory in Sunday's feature race at Sunland Park.

Earlier on the afternoon racing program, Sunland's Twin Trifecta carryover went to the wayside when four Ruidoso handicappers shared the only winning ticket that returned \$36,000.

Racing resumes next weekend with 12-race programs scheduled Friday through Sunday beginning at 1 p.m. each day. The \$10,000-added Sunland Park Derby highlights Sunday's action featuring 3-year-old thoroughbreds over Sunland's mile course.

Ribbon cutting ceremonies will be conducted Friday for the new Sunland Park Turf Club to celebrate completion of the first phase in a half-million renovation project. The track will host open-house festivities over the weekend.

Moolah Smoke was never seriously threatened while racing to a three-length winning margin in Sunday's 5 1/4-furlong allowance headliner. Even-money favorite What A Discovery stalked the leader throughout the sprint, but could never get closer than two lengths.

Sunland fans bet \$21,654 on Sunday's live simulcast of the \$1 million Santa Anita Handicap, which found Broad Brush posting a close decision over Kentucky Derby winner Ferdinand.

The winner returned \$10.80 on a two-dollar win ticket at Sunland. Attendance topped 3,300 on Sunday, nearly 12 percent higher than the same day last year. Total wagering - \$352,510 - represented an 18 percent increase over the same date.
