Drugs go sky high

A diesel pickup truck bounced along a dusty dirt road Thursday afternoon, fast approaching a line of onlookers all peering at a barren hillside the truck had just left.

The two in the truck joined the motionless watchers. Some peeked at the distant hillside through camera lenses, most ticked off a mental countdown, all waited for the explosion they were sure would happen any second.

The crowd had arrived at the Ruidoso Gun Club shooting range about an hour earlier. Ruidoso Police Department detectives Mike Lovelace and Lanny Maddox led the contingent of a dozen or so newspeople, firefighters, explosives expert Carl Kelley and fellow police officer Joe Tiano to the far end of the shooting range.

There Maddox helped Tiano unload a pickup truck load of narcotics, illegal pharmaceuticals, some 93 pounds of marijuana, and assorted other drugs and paraphernalia that had been confiscated by the Ruidoso Police Department since December 1983. Altogether, the collection was worth about \$500,000.

From the diesel pickup, Kelley unloaded more than 100 sticks of dynamite and a roll of detonator cord.

As Maddox and Lovelace conducted spot tests on the druggies, Kelley began stacking the hodgepodge of contraband material—druggies, baggies of marijuana atop yard-long "bongs," and shopping bags filled with boxes containing white powder packets and a dog-eared copy of the "Marijuana Grower's Guide."

Kelley wove the detonator cord over and under the head-high stacks of carefully as a grandmother knitting mittens, using the tape a few sticks of dynamite to the cord at regular intervals.

Lovelace said similar collections of contraband had always been disposed of by incineration, but this time the decision was made to use explosives since the amount of illegal substances was so great. He noted that burning a large amount of contraband is time consuming and physically demanding, and all residue must be accounted for.

The two detectives agreed the explosion would be much more efficient. Kelley finished wrapping the pile with loop after loop of detonator cord, as if preparing to send a Christmas package to a distant relative. Instead, this bundle was destined for a very short trip.

A group of three Ruidoso firefighters—Captain Jesse Reynolds, Chief Virgil Reynolds and Jesse M. Reynolds—made the last-minute preparations from a distance. Soon others joined their cautious vantage point as the time before detonation shortened.

Kelley pointed to an embankment several hundred yards downrange when questioned where vehicles would be safe. The half dozen automobiles carried all but Maddox and Kelley to that place of safety.

Unseen by the onlookers now gathered on the crest of that distant embankment, Kelley stooped to put the match to a three-foot length of 45-second-per-foot fuse.

He and Maddox wasted no time bumping down the two-track road, joined the others on the embankment, and waited as ignition swept along the faraway fuse.

Through a 200-millimeter camera lens the explosion appeared first as a flash of orange and a fast-spreading black cloud. A second later, the "boom" of the blast and a powerful shock wave rocked the line of watchers.

The surprise of the intensity and force of the explosion left some speechless, others cheered with relief and Kelley just cracked a smile.

"It did just almost exactly like we expected," he said, as the cloud finished its expansion and began to drift away in the gusty winds. He noted that the blast was the first of its kind for his company, Drew Engineering, which routinely uses explosives for more common, construction purposes.

The line of vehicles again negotiated the dirt track to the blast site. Inspection of the site, now a four-foot "crater," turned up a single hinge and some twisted fragments from a metal box. Nearby, scattering nearly as quickly as had the windblown black blast cloud, were the shredded pages of the "Marijuana Grower's Guide."

Nothing else remained.

Wreck kills Mesclero trio

Four people were killed and five injured in a one-vehicle accident early Saturday in Tularosa.

All of the victims except one were from Mesclero.

Police said the victims' car went out of control eastbound on Central Street in Tularosa about 12:38 a.m., veered to the right and hit a cement block. Police said alcohol was involved, but that further details were under investigation, according to a published report.


The driver, Norman F. Blake, 34, was killed, as were Janel Lang, 25, Bobbie Morgan, 9, and Robert Morgan, 39. Listed in serious but stable condition at Gerald Champion Memorial Hospital in Alamogordo were Sherman Blake, 29, Edith W. Morgan, 33, and Avery Belen, age unknown. In critical condition was Adrian Dolan, 22.

Ruidoso High School senior Hamilton Carter will realize one of his life ambitions in May when he attends the International Science and Engineering Fair.

Carter's interest in science, and specifically in electronics, began in the third or fourth grade. He entered his first science fair in the sixth grade, winning first place. Every year since then he has qualified, through the local science and engineering fair, for competition in the state science and engineering fairs.

At his first science fair, Carter set a goal for himself to one day qualify for the International Fair.

Students from all over the world will be competing for awards and scholarships, from May 10 to 18 in San Juan, Puerto Rico. Carter has won the right to be there.

His long range plans now include attending New Mexico State

University, with a double major in physics and electrical engineering. Then he plans to attend either Berkeley or MIT for his Ph.D.

"New Mexico State has one of the best electrical engineering departments in the states," Carter stated. "What I want to do is become a physicist and work on particle accelerators."

His father and mother, Garry and Diane Carter, have been very supportive of their son's interests, always encouraging him in his scientific pursuits, as well as his interests in swimming, running, hunting, fishing and "sports in general."

Carter's additional credits include recognition at the Academic Awards Banquet, three years; member of the winning Science Bowl Team, two years; Academic All-District, two years; National Honor Society; track, three years; cross country, two years; and becoming certified as a lifeguard.

Village, schools can be important local consumers

Village spent \$448,000 in local buys

The village itself may be one of the biggest consumers in Ruidoso. Lee Ann Boswell of the Finance Department said that department has paid vendors more than a half-million dollars since the current fiscal year began on July 1. She said \$448,000, or 68 percent, has been spent with local vendors, and \$215,000 with out-of-town businesses.

Leon Eggleston, director of support services, said the village buys from local vendors whenever possible, but is required by state law to get the best price possible. He said in some cases the village can purchase items for less than local businesses.

Eggleston said the village normally checks the state contract book before making a purchase. He said if an item is in the book, then the village is likely to take advantage of the state's quantity purchasing power and buy from the contractor.

"If we feel we can get it cheaper someplace else, we can go ahead and get bids," said Eggleston, explaining that three bids must be solicited and documented on purchases over \$10.

"I find myself trying to buy locally," said Eggleston. He said freight and time may be taken into account on prices from other towns.

The village is currently establishing centralized purchasing, and Eggleston foresees heavily utilizing the state contracts to stock that central supply area.

"Once we're in true centralized purchasing we'll be trying even harder to buy locally," said Eggleston.

Business people differ on village, schools as purchasers

Do business people feel they are being treated fairly by the purchasing policies of the Village of Ruidoso and the Ruidoso Public Schools?

It all depends on who you ask. "As far as I'm concerned, it's been good," said C & L Lumber owner C.L. "Bones" Wright.

"They do a lot of business with us, the schools and village both." Wright reported that his company has been treated fairly for many years by both agencies. When projects are put out for bid, C & L Lumber often gets the contract. On big projects, the company often gets business from the bigger companies that get those contracts.

"We're pretty well satisfied," Wright added. Dan Shaver, of Shaver Tire & Auto, also said he is being treated fairly by both schools and village.

"They buy a considerable amount with me over a year's time," he said. Shaver said since Goodyear has a contract with the state, and gets bids through the state contract book, he processes many state contract orders.

"They buy tires cheaper than I do," he said. But he's happy to service the contract, even though he makes little or nothing from the low-level prices, since he feels when agencies buy cheaply, tax money is saved.

"I pay taxes, too," he said. "I don't know how they'd be more fair," he added.

But Village Hardware & Paint Company owner Larry Langford has a different opinion.

"The city has kind of neglected the townspeople," he said, listing instances when the village has completed projects without soliciting bids from his and others' local businesses.

Specific examples he noted included when the airport buildings were painted, and, more recently, when the village's warehouse was being painted. Langford said neither he, nor any local business he knew of, were approached for a bid on either project.

"I think it's all the businesses that I'm talking about," Langford said, explaining that he thinks many businesses have had similar treatment.

Langford was particularly concerned about the village and schools purchasing items out of town on the assumption that out-of-town

goods are cheaper. He related an incident in which a village employee indicated "it just stands to reason" that materials would be cheaper to buy in Alamogordo.

"How do you know I don't have the best price if you didn't ask me?" Langford asked. "It's money that should be spent here. They don't have to go out of town to bid the stuff. Give us the opportunity to give them the best price."

NAPA Auto Parts Warehouse owner and manager Earl Randall reported mixed feelings on the purchasing practices of the village and schools.

He is particularly concerned with the schools. "I almost sell them nothing," he said. "I don't feel like they're interested. They could do more for us here in town."

However, he is optimistic that the village's new plan for a central purchasing warehouse will result in a better situation for businesses and the village alike.

"It will work to the advantage of everybody," he said. Randall praised the efforts of village manager Frank Potter, who has played a key role in the organization of the warehouse plan.

"I have tremendous faith in Frank Potter," he added.

But Randall cautioned against overstocking the warehouse and tying up a lot of village money in parts on the shelf, when local businesses can promise to have parts readily available on short notice.

Randall is especially concerned with the village and schools purchasing through the state contract book. He noted that an item purchased in that manner usually is not returnable, many times isn't the highest quality, and often has no promise attached of service after the sale.

He maintains "overall savings" can be achieved by agencies who purchase locally and get higher quality items that can be exchanged and serviced after the sale.

Most of those contacted agreed that the village and schools would be best served by purchasing locally as much as possible. The business people listed everything from keeping money in the village, so it can "turn over" many times and enrich the economy, to boosting local gross receipts tax collections as reasons to buy locally.

To buy locally is to support the community the schools and village exist to serve, one businessman said. And a spirit of working in the future with the village and schools on local purchasing prevailed.

"I'm optimistic," said Randall.

Schools buy local when it's possible

The Ruidoso Schools purchase school supplies from local merchants when it is possible for them to do so, according to superintendent Sid Miller.

"We try to buy all our maintenance supplies and building supplies locally," Miller said. "Teachers' supplies and some other supplies have to be put out for bid, according to state purchasing procedures."

There are two large manuals of procedures, detailing how school districts will purchase all school items.

"We're restricted in purchasing," Miller continued. "We do have to take the lowest bid, but sometimes we can use a local bid because we have better delivery locally. Anytime we use a local bid that is not the lowest bid, we have to give the state a real good reason."

There are some large bid items that the school can take a five percent difference on, if the low bid comes from an out-of-state supplier. If a local merchant can bid that larger item at less than five percent higher than the out-of-state low bid, the local merchant will obtain the sale. The five percent allowance is allowed on a statewide basis.

All purchase bids are advertised in The Ruidoso News, he said. Miller welcomes local bids on all advertised items.

"All school money, \$10 million plus, is distributed among the local banks," Miller said. "We keep that money here in town, with the exception of the bond money, which has to be handled by a Trust Department. None of the local banks can handle that. Everything else is here."

State has controls on purchasing

The state has very lengthy and specific regulations on using public monies to purchase goods and services.

Jim Montoya, state purchasing deputy director, explained that a major point in those statutes is the requirement that everything be purchased on a competitive basis.

Montoya said state agencies are required to use the state contract book, but municipalities and schools have options that include

using the state contractors or seeking competitive bids. A third option is also available to local governments and schools.

"They have the authority to go to local distributors and show them the state contract and ask them if they'll meet that price," said Montoya. "Statutes don't prohibit them from using our quotes and going down the street and meeting that price," he added.

But the State Purchasing Department discourages that practice.

"It's defeating the purpose of our contract," said Montoya, adding

that if eligible agencies don't take advantage of the quantity prices available through the state contracts, their bidders will begin upping their prices and contract prices will rise significantly.

Local businesses have the same opportunity as others to bid on state contract items and be included in the hefty volume.

"We encourage all businesses to register and get on the bid list," said Montoya.

"Public purchasers need to make every dollar count," said Montoya.

Airport commission readies for the reality of operation

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) talked at length Thursday of the transition from development to operations.

During a regular meeting at Ruidoso Village Hall, commissioners heard a joint powers agreement proposal from John Underwood, attorney for the Village of Ruidoso.

Underwood said it's time to decide how powers and monies will be arranged, and proposed reorganizing the commission according to populations of the five members' areas. Under the pro-

posal, Ruidoso and Lincoln County, the area population centers, would have two representatives and Ruidoso Downs, Capitan and Mescalero would continue to have one member.

Discussions centered on how members would participate in the budget process and who will pay how much if the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport experiences a period of operating at a deficit.

Underwood, stating a belief that the Village of Ruidoso will be the airport operator, also asked that the village be designated as fiscal agent.

The four members present agreed to discuss the proposal with

their governing bodies, and Underwood offered to attend the various meetings to answer questions or provide further information.

But Ruidoso Downs Commissioner Conrad Buchanan told Underwood he'd prefer to discuss the proposal with the board without him.

Commissioners agreed to schedule a workshop meeting to "hammer out" an agreement after all members have reviewed the document.

Also Thursday commissioners complained of not receiving information from contract administrator Fred Heckman before the meeting began. Commissioner

Benny Coker said he would be unwilling to approve paying bills listed in the packet since he hadn't had time to review them.

Commissioners Bill Karn and Buchanan agreed, with Karn recalling that Heckman was asked several meetings ago to provide information several days before the meetings.

In other regular business, the commission:

—Heard the engineer's report from on-site inspector Jim Cogdell of Leeds Hill-Herkenhoff. He said snow and moisture have slowed the earthwork, but the project is still on schedule for the 240-day contract period.

—Unanimously voted to drop requests for right of way on state and Bureau of Land Management lands outside the airport land boundaries after hearing that the applications should be made by the county.

—Heard the administrator's report, and agreed to Heckman's suggestion of a workshop to discuss minimum standards, a hangar program and a formal request from New Mexico State University.

—Heard a water rights report from SBAC attorney Steve Sanders, who reported that the State Engineer has ruled the commission can use water rights purchased from Betty Schreengost. Members voted to pay for the water rights

after the 30-day appeal period is over.

—Heard financial reports from Heckman and county manager Suzanne Cox. Buchanan wondered why the two are both preparing financial reports, and suggested that one report is enough.

—Questioned Cox on the payment of a bill. After the meeting, Cox reported that a bill commissioners couldn't recall approving was, indeed, approved, and she said she had documentation signed by Heckman and former commissioner Kenneth Nosker as verification.

Commissioner Wendell Chino was absent from the meeting.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—It hasn't been a good year for the dinosaurs.

Those most conservative of the legislators who come here for the annual session have faced problem after problem this year, and their performance in the face of those difficulties has been a far from stellar one.

When it came to organizing Senate and House, for instance, they found themselves on the outside looking in. On the House side, that coalition of cowboy Democrats with Republicans from all over the state didn't have enough members to keep itself in charge of things any longer. In a senate split 21-21 between the two major parties, the only effort conservatives could mount to keep power from moving to the Democrats was a kind of dog-in-the-manger effort that would have split the leadership between the man who gives every appearance of loving power for its own sake, Les Houston, and a certain liberal Hispanic Democrat from the South Valley of Albuquerque, Manny Aragon. That attempt was just weird enough to have been pronounced brilliant if they had been able to pull it off, but it could only be seen as a disaster when it lay in ruins around their feet.

I still shake my head over the unlikelihood of that initiative—and of some of those who actually backed it.

But far and away the biggest shock the nervous systems of these old penny-pinchers faced was to watch their the newly elected Republican governor, first of that breed to make it into the governor's mansion in a decade and a half, calling for tax increases almost within hours after being inaugurated. They weren't prepared for that, and they haven't adjusted to it almost three months later.

What Garrey Carruthers, the new man in the governor's chair, was up to seemed to some of us pretty clear. He and his brain-trusters had obviously decided it was the better part of valor to go for those tax increases they saw as inevitable from the first shot out of the box. That way, they undoubtedly hoped, they could coast through the remaining three years of the Carruthers term with no further such unpleasantness called for, especially if, with any luck, economic conditions in the state improved during that

period. By the end of four years, they may well have hoped, we common folks out there would no longer remember the pair of the bite the Republican Carruthersites had put on us.

That's pretty shrewd, but as an impulse, it too ran counter to the inclinations of the conservatives. All of them in both Senate and House, after all, if they want to keep their legislative jobs, have to face the voters next year—and nobody is likely to have forgotten a major tax raise that quickly. Thus any support the Governor got for this effort from such people came very reluctantly and with little or no grace or enthusiasm.

What caused this group of anti-big spenders the most trouble in this year's legislative session, however, was another factor altogether. That was the total absence of any kind of integrated program from them for solving the state's problems. The cast of mind of such people seems to be almost entirely limited to sitting on the sidelines and telling the rest of us what's wrong with their opponent's proposals. They flourish when they need only be "agin" things, but they aren't worth much of anything when it comes time to proposing something positive. There is in fact a kind of sourness of spirit about many of those of the ultra-conservative persuasion that militates against their supporting much of anything.

Now, this particular year, it became clear during the last two months that the opponents of conservatism didn't have any program either. As a result, we got a Legislature that was more like an assemblage of total individualists, with everybody going his or her own way.

If the Governor had a program he really cared about, and if he knew how to lead lawmakers in the direction in which he wanted them to go, he could have stepped into this void and played the legislators like a pipe organ. He didn't have those qualities. Neither did the liberals. Neither did the conservatives, and so those latter people were to be seen trailing along behind everyone else, complaining every step of the way, and, like almost all of New Mexico government in 1987, going nowhere in particular.

DEAR EDITOR:

It seems to me Mr. Kenyon very accurately depicts the right wing emotional stance that for the second time in fifteen years has corrupted the democratic process to the extent the top levels of government have been severely disrupted. His short attention span is notable when he suggests he is "tired of not yet in." He apparently has already decided that top-level government officials, probably including the president, may with arrogance tell the public one thing and then behave quite differently, perhaps even illegally. Apparently not being concerned with history (isn't this somewhat similar to the way Mr. Nixon and his imperial presidency functioned?) Mr. Kenyon merely recites the litany of emotional shouters and stompers like the Falwells, Robertsons, et al.

There does seem to be some question as to whether the contras are indeed "freedom fighters." The verdict isn't in partly due to the activities of other "freedom fighters" such as Colonel North and Admiral Poindexter. So it is the Iran-contra problem not Iran-scam. I have the impression Mr. Kenyon may feel Watergate should have been passed over as it continued for a lengthy period of time.

In that the vast majority of Americans profess to be religious, it seems reasonable to assume the victims of Aids probably contain the same majority and are involved in the non-biblical sexual activity he would prefer to stop. I didn't see a solution as to how to deal with the "Christians with Aids" problem. Most churches are having a devil of a time dealing with this in spite of biblical standards whatever they might be.

The color word "murder" in respect to abortion is another example of irrational emotional response to a problem that historically has always been with us. Again, I don't see his solution to the problem of unwanted children. Factually, children are the result of sexual activity even within biblical standards. And, frankly, there are millions of unwanted children if one includes children in orphanages, foster homes, living with relatives—and, abused children.

And, it would help some if Mr. Kenyon would define which communists he is referring to. We are somewhat friendly with China, Bulgaria, Rumania, Poland, Czechoslovakia—and we trade with most communist countries, including Russia.

This long-running, right-wing, anti-communist tirade is what is getting tiresome. I sense a bit of conflict in bemoaning intervention in South Africa and supporting intervention in Nicaragua. Russia is a country that perceives reality quite differently than we do. It doesn't seem rational that this is something to get a few hundred million people continually in a conflict situation except for those like Mr. Kenyon and his group of "Americans and Christians".

I was under the impression there might even be some good Americans who are not Christians. And so on.


