County officials squabble over historical wallet

"Not one person has ever discussed this matter with me," County Clerk Fran Siddens stated, "the first I heard of it was from the Lincoln County Heritage Trust at a commissioners meeting and in the press. Mr. Mitchell and Mr. Dunlap have never tried to talk to me. I could have shown them the statutes regarding this."

Siddens' statements centered around the infamous sheriff's deputy Bob Olinger's wallet. The property has been held by Lincoln County

clerks since Olinger's murder by Billy the Kid, in 1881 on the street in Lincoln.

County Commissioner Ralph Dunlap introduced a resolution regarding the wallet at the regular commissioners meeting Tuesday.

The resolution stated in part, "one of the personal effects of Robert Olinger found upon his body was that of a wallet, it is rumored that Sheriff Pat Garrett did deliver said wallet to the Probate Clerk, who was also the County Clerk, for safekeeping."

"The wallet has never been claimed by heirs of Olinger, it has

remained in the custody, control and safekeeping of the Lincoln County Clerk since April, 1881. Said wallet has been abandoned to the County of Lincoln and now belongs to the people of the County of Lincoln.

"Now, therefore, be it resolved that a public hearing be held to determine how said wallet should be preserved and where said wallet should be placed so that the public can view same." The resolution continues, asking for a public hearing in the old Lincoln County Courthouse in the community of Lincoln, at which the Lincoln County Com-

missioners would receive evidence, public comment and other information regarding the wallet, its preservation and display.

Siddens' prior refusal to "hand over the wallet" to the Heritage Trust is based on her belief and reports from the New Mexico State Archives that any "mismanagement" of historical documents or properties in the safekeeping of the clerk's office could result in confiscation by the state and removal to Santa Fe.

"They would be lost to us forever," Siddens claimed. "As long as we are following the process

of preservation as required and requested the state will cooperate and work with us. We will be allowed to achieve housing these old records in our own county."

County attorney Gary Mitchell stated that in 1881 there was no law governing personal property and that the wallet was dropped off with the clerk only because Garrett didn't know what else to do with it.

"The county commissioners have control over all county property," Mitchell said, "and this is county property."

"A resolution has been presented," Siddens responded,

"with tongue in cheek. I'm an elected official of this county and should be able to expect legal representation from county counsel. Are the commissioners going to hire a third attorney to represent me in this? Obviously Gary Mitchell will be representing Lincoln County and the commissioners!"

Commissioners agreed to table the resolution until their next meeting.

Wednesday, Siddens released a statement regarding her stand on the Olinger wallet (see text of statement below).

Law says wallet stays with clerk, says Siddens

(Editor's note: The following statement was released Wednesday by County Clerk Fran Siddens regarding the Olinger wallet.)

"Much ado has been made regarding the Olinger Wallet, part of a probate file in the Office of the Lincoln County Clerk. People, such as Representative Ben Hall, who have an evident lack of knowledge in this matter have been quoted and/or misquoted as to what 'they' are going to do about this matter. I hope my statement will clarify the position of the County Clerk."

"Upon receiving a request from the Lincoln County Heritage Trust to preserve the Olinger Wallet at the Historical Center, my reply was the County Clerk does not have the authority to grant this request. (I offered to provide certified copies of the probate and photos of the wallet for display). Should I have granted such a request I would have been in violation of the State Statutes, Article 3, Public Records. I further confirmed my legal position in this matter by going to the State Records Center and have since received confirmation correspondence from B. Michael Miller, administrator, State Records and Archives."

"To date I have had no response from the Heritage Trust and assume they are aware of the security requirements as imposed by the laws regarding the safekeeping of files such as Olinger's."

"For the last two years, my office has worked diligently, under the guidance and recommendations of the State Records Center, to preserve and maintain these records for the citizens of Lincoln County. Therefore, I was surprised to read such words as 'dispute,' 'conflict,' and 'controversy' in the articles in the newspapers. There has been none of the above from the County Clerk as I have simply been following the duties of my office."

"This is a matter involving State Statutes and I find it very unfortunate that Attorney Gary Mitchell and Commissioner Ralph Dunlap did not pursue the proper steps to determine the legality involving this probate file before embarking on sensationalized publicity. Had Mr. Mitchell researched the Public Records Statutes, I feel certain, he would not now be leading the Commissioners in the direction of possible legal action against the State and the Office of the County Clerk. Any further action of this nature will be costly to the county and will serve no legitimate purpose as the Wallet has been and will continue to be preserved and protected by this office. A facsimile of this file can be viewed by the public at any time."

"A public hearing, as suggested at the meeting of March 24, for social purposes, only furthers the personal opinions and wishes of a very few and from my standpoint, mocks the integrity of my office. Dunlap, I feel I never questioned the persistence of Mr. Mitchell or Mr. Dunlap, I have I should question their persistence in this issue."

"It appears to me the Lincoln County Commissioners should get on to more pressing matters than dwelling on an issue which has little, if any, bearing on conducting county business."

Sheriff presents 'proof' in pay voucher dispute

Sheriff Don Samuels told Lincoln County Commissioners, at their meeting Tuesday, he had brought proof that the county manager's office was treating his administration differently than the former sheriff's administration.

At the March 3 commissioners meeting Samuels informed the commissioners that it seemed "like the rules have changed" since he took office and that more documentation was needed on his employees' pay vouchers than was requested for former Sheriff Tom Sullivan's employees.

At that meeting, Chairman John A. Hightower asked for Samuels to

produce proof of any changes in the procedures for voucher validation.

"We would like to give you that proof now," Samuels stated, introducing Betty Dean.

"We have three statements from deputies in our department and copies of pay vouchers from 1986," Dean said. "There are discrepancies and we want you to be aware of them."

Vouchers were handed, one by one, to Commissioners Hightower, Ralph Dunlap and William Karn. As they were handed the documents, Dean pointed out that some of the vouchers had taken up to five weeks for payment, after being returned "time after time" for additional documentation.

Dean then showed commis-

sioners vouchers dated 1986. On some she pointed out, there was little or no documentation.

"There is proof the county manager is changing what is required on payment vouchers," Dean stated.

County manager Suzanne Cox, after viewing the vouchers, maintained that proper documentation had been attached to the 1986 pay vouchers.

"We had a training session scheduled with Rachel (Van Cleave, Samuels' administrative secretary) to explain procedures and documentation on pay vouchers," Cox said. "It was for a Friday at 5 p.m. My office waited until well after that and nobody from the Sheriff's Office showed

up."

"We haven't been selective on these vouchers," stated computer programmer Mignon Simms. "We can't pay them without proper documentation."

"Barbara Langley has made a copy of a proper voucher for us to follow," Dean said, "so that now we know what we're doing. Now that we have a model to follow we trust our vouchers will be paid more promptly."

"The problem is lack of communication," Hightower stated. "We need communication between the Sheriff's Office and the county manager's office."

"I'll be more than glad to come to your office any time and help with any problem," said Cox.



Downs Trustees have own ideas on airport commission changes

Proposed changes to the organization of the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission brought out strong views during the Monday meeting of the Ruidoso Downs Trustees.

The changes were included in a proposed joint powers agreement first presented to the airport commission last week by Ruidoso village attorney John Underwood.

Commissioners, including Downs representative to the commission Conrad Buchanan, agreed to present the proposal to their respective governments.

Representatives from Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Capitan, Lincoln County and Mescalero make up the membership of the commission. "I think it should be redone," said Downs Trustee LeVerne Cole after Buchanan explained the highlights of the proposal.

Other trustees agreed the proposal is unsatisfactory for the Downs as written.

Key changes the proposal would make include tying the level of representation on the board to members' populations. As proposed, the agreement would allow one representative for areas with as many as 4,000 residents (Ruidoso Downs, Capitan and Mescalero qualify), two representatives for populations of 4,000 to 6,000 (Ruidoso and Lincoln County qualify) and three representatives for populations over 6,000.

Buchanan pointed out that although the Downs would be less represented than some others in the agreement, the village also would be less liable if the new airport faces a deficit.

Other proposed changes would appoint Ruidoso as the fiscal agent for the commission and Ruidoso as operator of the airport.

Downs Mayor J.C. "Jake" Harris voiced his opinion on those changes. "Maybe it would be good for one

to operate and the other to hold the checkbook," he suggested. Harris proposed that Ruidoso be named operator of the airport and the county be the fiscal agent. Also, the mayor wondered why Carrizozo and Corona aren't represented on the commission.

Trustees agreed to study the document and form opinions on the changes to be discussed at a future meeting.

In other business, the trustees:

—Heard comments from Steve Massey, of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District, on two Downs residents' applications to the Community Development Block Grant Set-Aside Program. Massey critiqued the loan requests of Jack Black and trustee Conrad Buchanan and concluded that he could not recommend continuing with the application process for either request as written. But Massey, Black and Buchanan concurred that if minor changes in the applications are made, they'll stand a better chance of being funded. They agreed to make revisions and present the reworked applications at a future meeting.

Under the program, a municipality sponsors a loan application for a business based on the potential economic impact the new money would have. Massey said one requirement of the federal program is that at least one job is created for every \$10,000 loaned. Buchanan and Black each applied for more than \$200,000.

—Accepted a bid of \$6,500 from the Donald R. Wingfield Company for the 1987-1988 audit. Trustees opted to bypass a lower bid, of \$6,250, from Terry L. Jones, apparently due to their dissatisfaction with an earlier audit he performed.

"I want someone to come in there and do a good job and call it like it is," Buchanan said. "I just have a real problem with taking a bid from that man (Jones)."

—Approved sending Paul Bonnell

and Mike Forbess to attend Dispatch School in Santa Fe May 28-June 5, and Robert Layher to Criminal Investigations Class in Santa Fe May 18-22.

—Appointed Trustee Jackie Branum as the representative for the New Mexico Self Insurers Fund.

—Approved Resolution 87-5, enabling participation in the New Mexico Self Insurers Fund.

—Heard a report on Phase II of the paving project from engineer Kim Kemper, of Molzen-Corbin and Associates of Albuquerque. He said start-up of the project is nearing, but "we've got more project than we have money to build." He noted that plans call for about \$60,000 to \$70,000 more roadbuilding than project funds can cover. Buchanan challenged Kemper to locate additional funding for the project himself. "His firm said they could go and find money and I'd like to see them do it," Buchanan commented.

"Things are looking worse than anybody expected," Kemper said of prospective funding sources. "We'll keep you posted."

—Approved a request from Mayor Harris for permission to put up a sign for his mobile home park.

—Proclaimed Friday, April 3, through Saturday, April 18, as "Ruidoso Downs Beautification Day" in cooperation with a regional cleanup effort set for that period.

—Approved a request by village clerk Jo Ann Jenkins for lease purchase of a phone system for village offices.

—Voted to support a fund-raising project of the Ruidoso Downs Ladies Auxiliary in which cachet postal envelopes will be issued, commemorating opening day this year at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

Trustee Jackie Branum was absent from the meeting.

Citizens remind commissioners of Cedar Creek Road concerns

Lincoln County Commissioners listened to Cedar Creek residents and attended to a varied agenda at their meeting Tuesday.

Paul McClendon, representing the Cedar Creek Cabin Owners Association, Incorporated (CCCOA), gave commissioners copies of a letter from CCCOA concerning the condition of Cedar Creek Road.

Reading from the letter, McClendon reminded the commissioners that his association would continue to monitor the progress on Cedar Creek Road very closely.

"Those who travel on this road do so with serious apprehension and great risk," McClendon read, "due to the hazardous condition in which the project has been left standing for several months. Property owners in the Cedar Creek area are concerned that the present cooperative agreement (with the state Highway Department) be complied with as agreed upon."

The letter reported on meetings the CCCOA has had with the New Mexico State Highway Department's chief executives. It contained statements concerning the scope of work on co-op agreements and inspections of Cedar Creek Road.

The road will have to pass inspection by state Highway Department engineers. According to Chief Highway Administrator Dewey Lonsberry, the road must comply with all regulations regarding safety factors, including the removal of tree stumps on the right of way within six to eight feet of the roadbed and testing for compaction on the roadbed as well as em-

bankments where trees were removed and erosion is occurring.

County manager Suzanne Cox and road department supervisor Earl Kreig assured the Cedar Creek residents that work on the road should begin by the end of March and that all guidelines would be followed.

The finished road will have a 32-foot roadbed and a 24-foot base course with double penetration chip seal for 2.5 miles.

In other business, Commissioners John A. Hightower, Ralph Dunlap and William L. Karn:

—Heard a rebuttal from the Sheriff's Department in a dispute over the handling of pay vouchers (see related story).

—Tabled a resolution introduced by Dunlap concerning the historical Olinger wallet (see related story).

—Accepted a letter from Audean Franklin on behalf of the County Central Committee representing the Republican Party of Lincoln County requesting the commissioners treat all persons appearing before them with the same respect and courtesy as they would wish to be treated. The letter specifically questioned action by the commission in regard to Sheriff Samuels at their March 3 meeting. Hightower responded with his belief that executive sessions were "overused" and that "a lot of things can take place in a closed meeting that shouldn't. The Open Meetings Act dictates what can be used in open and closed meetings. I will tell all the elected officials we expect to treat all of them fairly and courteously."

—Approved transfer of a liquor license, due to name change, not a

location change, for the Riverside Rancho. No protests were presented in the public hearing.

—Awarded the bid for the Senior Citizens Center mini-van to Sierra Blanca Motors, Ruidoso, for \$12,360.

—Accepted a bid proposal for audit from Don Wingfield of Roswell.

—Approved the Joinder Resolution with the New Mexico Self-Insurer's Fund. The county will realize a savings of approximately \$38,000.

—Approved a budget increase for the Senior Citizens Center.

—Approved Paving Assessment District insurance requirements.

—Approved the corrected Personnel Ordinance.

—Approved the use of space available in the New Horizons, old hospital building and the Ruidoso Sub-office for use as Human Services Offices. Betsy Seiler told commissioners there are 243 families on food stamps in Lincoln County and it is an "unnecessary hardship" for those people to travel to Roswell, Alamogordo or Santa Rosa for financial assistance. She and Commissioner Karn had word from state Human Services Director Lou Gallegos that offices could be opened in Lincoln County if the county would provide office space.

—Signed a letter of appreciation to Bob Batte, for his services to the county as an Emergency Medical Technician. Batte is leaving the area.

—Approved a request to begin hiring procedures for a county building inspector.



John Phillips

John M. Phillips, one of New Mexico's pioneer horse racing officials, died Monday in El Paso, Texas, at the age of 77.

Phillips was a summer resident of Ruidoso for 20 years.

Phillips' career spanned more than three decades during which time he served as executive secretary of the New Mexico State Racing Commission under two separate governors. His first job at a racetrack came in 1949 as patrol judge at Ruidoso Downs. He went on to serve in numerous capacities at the New Mexico State Fair Meet in Albuquerque, the Downs at Santa Fe, La Mesa Park, Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park.

A native of Las Cruces, Phillips represented the New Mexico State Racing Commission for Sunland Park's opening in 1959. His final years in racing were spent as state steward in the judges stand at Sunland Park. He retired in 1981. For the past seven years, Sunland

has saluted his contribution to the sport of horse racing with the annual renewal of the John Phillips Handicap.

Phillips was a former president of the Las Cruces Sheriff's Posse, where he resided for a number of years. He spent most of his years living in El Paso and is survived by his wife, Betty; grandchildren Mrs. Bruce Ramey of South Bend, Indiana, and John Russell Ellis of College Station, Texas; and two great-grandchildren.

John Augustine, a longtime friend of Phillips now serving his third term on the New Mexico State Racing Commission, said Phillips was "one of the finest and squarest racing officials we've ever had in the state of New Mexico."

"John was extremely well versed in the sport of racing. Many of our top officials during the past years were John's proteges. He was one of the pioneers of New Mexico racing."

Funeral services will be at 2 p.m. today (Thursday), March 26, in the Graham Mortuary Chapel in Las Cruces with the Reverend John Parrott of the First Baptist Church officiating. Burial will follow in the Masonic Cemetery.



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



Emergency? Call 257-9111

Emergency number 257-9111 should be used strictly for emergencies.

Communications/detention officer Lorena LaMay and the Ruidoso Police Department dispatch staff would like to remind the public that non-emergency calls should be directed to 257-7365.

LaMay said dispatchers have been receiving many information calls on the emergency line, and she is concerned that the line will be busy when an emergency call is placed.

"We appreciate the public being patient," said LaMay, explaining that when a weather or road conditions inquiry comes in on the emergency line, dispatchers ask the caller to redial 257-7365.

"We're the lifeline of the community," said LaMay, noting that dispatch personnel are available seven days a week, 24 hours a day. And while her busy day is happy to answer questions and assist the public, she must keep that lifeline open.

LaMay said dispatchers have recently logged a number of calls by youngsters to 257-9111. She asks parents to educate children about the emergency line and caution them not to call it except in an emergency.


Sometimes children have called and failed to hang up, causing the emergency line to remain busy.

"At the expense of somebody's life, that could be scary," said LaMay.

Calls to the municipal and magistrate judges are sometimes received on the emergency line. LaMay said the judges are located in the same facility but each has his own telephone number.

Police retrain to stay current

Ruidoso Police Chief Richard S. Swenor said last week that members of his department are undergoing intense proficiency and recertification training to keep pace with state rules and regulations.

Many of the training courses are needed because of the many changes in police work over the last few years, said Swenor.

Detectives Lanny Maddox, Danny Stewart and Oscar Villado recently completed a forensic photography course. Maddox and Stewart also completed an advanced narcotics course, said Swenor.

Training officer Roxanne Pfeffer and officers B.J. Barnes, Pete Es-

quibel and Kent Birkedahl received grief intervention training in a workshop last week. Pfeffer said the course will be particularly helpful in following up with victims of various situations.

A recertification session on the intoxication or breath machine was presented in Ruidoso last week. Swenor said an annual recertification is required on that equipment.

Detectives Maddox and Villado attended a one-day seminar in Albuquerque Wednesday on criminal investigation case management.

Pfeffer, Villado, Esquibel and patrol officer Joe Tiano will attend a two-day crime scene preservation update in Las Cruces Friday and Saturday, March 27 and 28.

Swenor said five instructors will attend a 40-hour instructors' school in April. He said officers T.J. McBride, Robert Achterberg and Pfeffer, along with detectives Stewart and Villado will take the class, which is part of a new requirement for instructors.

Patrol officer Paul Butler is scheduled for the 10-week basic academy course in June. After he graduates the entire force will have completed the academy, said Swenor.

The chief, along with all state police chiefs, will attend a training session at the academy in May. He said the school has changed its philosophy, and chiefs will be introduced to the "positive" training techniques.

Swenor said under the new train-

ing techniques officers will be taught just the correct way to do something, and will have that right way re-enforced over and over. They will not be told what not to do in the training philosophy that "accentuates the positive," said Swenor.

Swenor is enthusiastic about the new approach, which he predicts will produce more secure and prepared police officers.

"That fear factor is not there," said Swenor.

While he's pleased to be getting all his officers trained, Swenor said scheduling around the schools and classes has been a "nightmare."

"It's stuff we've got to get done," noted Swenor.

County WIC program expands; Service aids women, infants and children

Nutrition during pregnancy is vitally important for the development of the child, medical experts say. To help women achieve a proper diet, the New Mexico Health Services Division of the Health and Environment Department administers the WIC program.

WIC stands for the special supplemental food program for Women, Infants and Children. The WIC program is a federally funded nutrition education and food supplement program serving infants, children and pregnant and breastfeeding women.

The WIC program in Lincoln County recently expanded to a full-time program to serve more women in the area. Barbara Bishop is the Lincoln County WIC nutritionist. Her office is in the Lincoln County Sub-office in Ruidoso.

Bishop reviewed the qualifications of eligibility. A potential recipient must be a low-income, pregnant, breastfeeding or post-partum woman (to six months for women under 17 years of age) or an infant or child through the age of 18 months. Potential participants must meet at least one condition on a list of nutritional-medical health factors. The list was compiled by nutritionists and physicians in New Mexico and approved by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Potential participants are weighed, measured, given a hematocrit (a test to determine the iron level in the blood) and diet recalls are recorded, Bishop said. If the applicant is pregnant, other data is collected, Bishop added.

The data is reviewed, and if the applicant qualifies, vouchers in the form of monthly checks are issued. The checks are for specific food items including milk, eggs, cheese, cereals, juice, dry beans or infant formula.

"If they do qualify, they do receive their vouchers for the supplemental food at the same appointment," Bishop said.

Bishop encourages all WIC participants to attend her nutrition classes, which include slide shows and visual displays every other month. The classes cover pre- and post-natal, infant, children and breastfeeding nutrition.

"Specific classes for specific stages," Bishop said.

Any woman who feels she qualifies for the WIC program can contact Bishop at 258-3252 for an appointment. Her office is located in the Lincoln County Health Office in the county sub-office in Ruidoso.

Bishop also serves participants in Mescalero from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on the third Thursday of each month and 9 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. on the third Friday of each month at the Mescalero Health Clinic.

Bishop travels to Carrizozo for a

clinic from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the Lincoln County Health Clinic in the courthouse.


The Lincoln County WIC program now serves about 220 women, infants and children. Bishop's goal is to increase the number of participants.

Participants usually learn about the program by word of mouth, Bishop said. Participants also are told of other county health services; food stamps, well-child clinics, car seats, immunizations, children's medical services, family planning, pre-natal clinics and LaMaze classes. Pregnancy tests also are available at the county health office.

The WIC nutrition program services and other county health services and free and available to eligible persons without regard to race, religion, handicap, age, national origin or sex.

Bishop's performance is evaluated by Anne Warner, district nutritionist. The Lincoln County program is one of seven offices Warner serves.

Those who feel they may qualify for WIC can contact Bishop and enroll in a health program designed to prevent poor growth and development in the fetus, infant and child and to establish good nutritional habits, which may prevent other health problems associated with nutrition.







Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Governor Carruthers returned to his desk yesterday, after a two-day rest. During that time, it is to be hoped, he seared into his memory the two major lessons the 1987 legislative session should have taught him.

Translated into simple terms, those two topics come out like this: Never underestimate the butt-headedness of your true conservative; and not all those who believe government was created to provide for their welfare are living below the poverty level.

As the first of those maxims, the scene which best dramatizes it would concentrate on the hardcore conservatives in the Senate in a sort of diptych. One side of the representation would show these hearty souls voting for a spending level for government during the coming year that tops anything the state has ever previously achieved. The other picture would show them as, some time later, they vote against the tax-increase bill that became necessary when they previously voted for this high level of spending.

That shows, as well as anything ever could, that much of what these people do is based on a kind of superstition.

It clearly is the concept behind the words "tax increase" that triggers their glands and causes them, despite the most fundamental logic, to vote their resounding "no's." Reason has almost nothing to do with their acts once this topic has been touched on. Since taxes take from them something of this world's goods, and since most of those who label themselves conservatives have amassed larger-than-average quantities of this world's goods, their kneejerk reaction is clear. Vote "no," and to hell with the consequences.

As for the second of those lessons Governor Carruthers has to learn, it too became obvious as a lasting piece of wisdom only during the closing days of the legislative session that began the new governor's career. It also almost managed to bring the whole structure down, in much the same fashion as the intransigence of the conservatives did.

This axiom, of course, addresses

a totally different group in the mixed-up bunch we refer to as our legislators. In this case, the hand-wringing and foot-dragging alike came from those whose title is "liberals." They are the ones who would pull the house down on their own heads unless they were handed over certain juicy morsels of governmental spending assigned to their specific legislative districts.

In the conservatives' favor, there is at least the realistic point of view that says New Mexicans didn't want their taxes raised. There is almost nothing logical to be said in support of the "gimme" position the liberals espoused.

We should not fail to note that these two attitudes are contradictions of one another, and that a governor who is learning from this session so as to be able to do a better job in the future has to find some manner of reconciling them. No government can give the liberals what they want, more money to spend, without doing what the conservatives demand we refrain from, taking more from the pocket-books of our citizens.

Needless to say, this year's Legislature didn't manage to find any real reconciliation of those contradictory positions. Instead, it simply did a little something in the way of making gestures to both parties. As a consequence, its work turns out to be of a purely temporary nature; that is to say, it didn't solve any genuine problem facing the state, and in fact it probably left a larger legacy of problems that will have to be solved at a later date.

Our governor probably got during this session that on-the-job training he so clearly needed. Because he came into office so little prepared for the reality he found there and because neither side in the equation that represents our corporate legislative bodies was willing to act in a rational manner, we ended up with three months of chaos and very little positive accomplishment. As is usually the case, the citizens get to pay the tuition for the governor's training and the room and board for the rest of them.

If there is a happy thought, it has to be this: At least they went home on time.

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Do our schools and village government make purchases from local businesses as often as is possible?

The answer to that question seems to vary, depending on the respondent.

The village and schools say yes, and some business people agree wholeheartedly. Others in business here build a strong case to the contrary.

But at least three observations on the subject of purchasing locally can be made.

- We are alarmed to learn of a report of a village purchaser who assumes that things are cheaper in Alamogordo. When spending public money, generated by local taxpayers, a purchaser should be a firm disciple of the benefits of purchasing locally. It may be cheaper here.
- On the other hand, we are reassured by the positive beliefs of village and school leaders on the benefits of purchasing locally. We hope their strong words will be taken to heart by those down the ranks who do the actual purchasing.
- At the state level, we are concerned about state purchasing guidelines that demand purchasers get the absolute lowest bid. Can purchasers make no exception for quality? Are public funds often sacrificed when inferior products are bought. "You get what you pay for."

The benefits of purchasing locally are tremendous. The "turnover" of money spent locally makes a dollar spent here quite far-reaching. Tax benefits from local spending, too, give local governments a boost.

Do the schools and village government make purchases locally as often as possible? For business people, working people and their own well-being, they must.—DJP

You can imagine the trauma of a recent weekend when I walked in the P.O. to find my corner pay phone had been removed. Can we have it back? You'd do it for a Texan.



Holymolytsastreaker wins West Texas Futurity

Jockey Mike Lidberg could do no wrong during Sunday's program at Sunland Park as the 28-year-old El Paso rider won five races on the afternoon card including the \$158,000 West Texas Futurity.

"I've won four races before, but this is the first time I've ever won five in one day," Lidberg remarked on his seven years as a professional rider.

The 16th running of the West Texas Futurity featured the 10 quarter horses who survived time trials for the Grade II race held on March 6 at Sunland.

Although Holymolytsastreaker won his trial division impressively that day, the Texas-bred colt was sixth on the qualifying list, taking a back seat to No. 1 contender Shoot Yeah.

Sunday's crowd of 4,105 fans made Shoot Yeah the even-money favorite for the 330-yard stakes race, while Holymolytsastreaker went postward as the second choice at 3-10-1 odds.

When the gates flew open, Lidberg came out strongly with his mount veering slightly to the outside. After setting him on a straight course, the reinsman uncocked his whip and outdueled Native Orchid and Shoot Yeah to win by a head.

His final time of 16.62 seconds equalled the second fastest clocking in the history of the West Texas Futurity, in addition to establishing a new season record.

"He was all business today," Lidberg said after the victory. "He stood perfect in the gates and was never more than a half-length out of it in the early stages of the race."


West Texas Consolation upset
