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Council targets operation of new airport

The Ruidoso Village Council, in adopting an amended joint powers agreement on the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC), reaffirmed its commitment to serving as lead agency and operator for the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA), expected to open late this year.

During a regular meeting Tuesday, councillors unanimously approved the agreement that calls for reorganizing the five-member commission with membership based on population. Currently Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Capitan, Lincoln County and the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe are parties to a joint powers agreement with each governing body having one member and one vote.

Village attorney John Underwood explained a plan that would give Ruidoso and Lincoln County two members each, with the other three members retaining one member each.

Underwood said the present agreement was designed to get the proposed airport through the development phase, but didn't address operations. He said the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) requires assurance that the finished airport will be operated and fiscally managed during the next 20 years—what the FAA considers the useful life of the improvements.

Underwood stressed the FAA requirement that one entity take responsibility, and said he believes Ruidoso is the logical choice with the expertise, experience and a \$500,000 airport budget in place.

"If somebody else wants to run the airport, let somebody else come up with the budget," said Underwood. "If we're providing the budget for the airport... then we should control the checkbook," he added.

Besides the plan to transfer the

current Ruidoso Municipal Airport budget to the new regional facility, Underwood said the village will also move about \$750,000 in material and equipment to the new airport.

If another operator is selected for SBRA, Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. noted that the village would expect some reimbursement for those materials and equipment. He said the commission would then be faced with coming up with an operations budget.

The agreement calls for reinvesting any operational profits into airport development and improvement, but councillors voiced concern of how any shortfalls will be divided among commission members.

Underwood, comparing the division of responsibility to a marriage, said any shortfall could be divided on a percentage basis. He also noted that perhaps Ruidoso, as lead operator and fiscal manager, should be responsible for possible shortfalls.

Councillor Elmer Pirelli said when he visited an SBAC meeting, commissioners were concerned about that shared liability.

"It wouldn't be fair for them to have a vote and not share the responsibility," said Councillor Jerry Shaw.

Ruidoso Municipal Airport manager Tim Morris, who also serves as SBAC chairman, said the extensive research and planning that went into the 1976 Airport Master Plan leads him to believe the new facility will operate in the black. He said traffic will increase because the new location is much safer than the current airfield.

Morris said the agreement was drafted "to allow for a very easy transition."

"It's very simple," he added. The other four members of the SBAC also must approve the joint powers agreement, and councillors hinted of problems ahead.

Pirelli said the intent of the

agreement—easy transition—needs to be explained to SBAC members.

"They think we're trying to take over," said Pirelli.

But Mayor Davis predicted "it won't be long till we'll all be singing out of the same hymnal."

In other regular business Tuesday, the council:

—Approved Mayor Davis' appointments of Councillor Larry Simon to the Eagle Creek Inter-Community Water Supply Association and Shirley Neuhaus to the Cemetery Advisory Board.

—Adopted a cooperative agree-

ment with the State Highway Department to pave Cliff Drive and Mockingbird Lane at an estimated total cost of \$73,775.04. The agreement calls for the state to provide 60 percent and the village 40 percent of the project funds.

—Instructed the Street Department superintendent to review and re-evaluate a street improvements priority list after Councillor Victor Alonso questioned why some streets are paved at the expense of residents while others are completed with state and local funds.

—Adopted an ordinance restating

the purpose of a .50 cent gross receipts tax to be implemented on July 1. Underwood said the bonding attorney asked for the action.

—Authorized village engineer Mike Davalos to seek bids on an asphalt paver with specifications to be written that allow for purchasing new or used equipment outright or through lease-purchase or other terms.


—Awarded the bid on an outlet facility at Grindstone Canyon Dam to low bidder Industrial Electric, Inc. for \$116,000. The engineer's estimate was \$120,000 and the seven

bids received varied from the low bidder's to \$189,800.

—Awarded the bid on 40,000 Village of Ruidoso brochures to low bidder Guynes of El Paso, Texas, for \$8,955. Other bidders were Homes and Land of Ruidoso bidding \$11,270 and Ruidoso Printing with a bid of \$9,809. Councillor Shaw noted that the cost for brochures is less this year than last, and Mayor Davis said the new publication is smaller.

—Approved a contract with Neil

What to do with old airport land? Councillors think it over

The Ruidoso Village Council discussed "constraints and possibilities" for the Ruidoso Municipal Airport land Monday.

During a workshop session called to review special services contracts, the council heard from John Petronis of Architectural Research Consultants (ARC), the firm

selected to master plan the airport tract; Neil Stillinger, water attorney; and Jackie Atkins, water engineer.

Petronis presented some suggested goals for the planning document his firm will supply, and asked for direction from the council.

"One of the planning issues is the decision-making flow," said Petronis. He proposed an advisory committee to work with ARC staff,

provide input and "keep political tabs" on the planning process.

Petronis, stressing that the final decision should rest with the council, suggested that the appointed advisory committee include councillors, a Planning and Zoning Commission representative and representatives from other sectors of the community.

He also asked that a village administration representative be

designated to work with ARC on a day-to-day basis.

Before hammering out details of the contract with village attorney John Underwood, Petronis presented details of the planning process. He recommended at least three public hearings: one to review present conditions, the next to discuss alternatives and a third for final recommendations.

Goals Petronis listed for the final

plan include diversifying the local economy, preserving and protecting the long-term economic value of the property, protecting the natural environment, developing a tool for rational development of the site and involving the community in the process.

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. suggested respect for adjacent land uses and neighboring land values as an additional goal. He said many

citizens have directed elected officials to keep as much as possible of the 150-acre tract for public use, and said that factor should also be considered.

Davis, comparing the village with a woman whose slip is showing, recommended that Ruidoso's slumping image be considered in the plan.


Ski Apache: The undisturbed settled snow depth midway on the mountain is 85 inches.

George Perry, builder and sports backer, is dead at 51

Lifelong area resident George Powell Perry Jr. died at his Ruidoso home Monday following a lengthy illness.

Born September 27, 1935, in Roswell, Perry was a descendant of Lincoln County pioneer George Coe. He graduated from Ruidoso High School in 1953, and attended New Mexico Military Institute and New Mexico State University.

Perry was a member of the Lincoln County Homebuilders Association, an active member of First Christian Church of Ruidoso and an avid supporter of the Ruidoso High School Warrior football team. He was honored by the team as "Warrior Fan of the Year" for the past two years.

Perry is survived by his wife, Sharon E. Perry of the home; parents, George P. Perry and Hazel N. Perry of Tularosa; son, Ty Powell Perry of Ruidoso; and daughters Laine O'Neal of Dallas, Texas, and Tara Willingham of Ruidoso.

Survivors include a granddaughter, Jordan Brinn Willingham of Ruidoso, and a brother, Lewin D. Perry of Timberon.

Water claims due April 23

"All parties claiming water rights within the Rio Hondo stream system have until April 23, 1987 to file and serve objections 'inter sese' and set forth the grounds of those objections to any other water right claimant within the stream system," according to a pre-trial order released by District Judge Pro Tempore LaFel E. Orman.

Neil Stillinger, water rights attorney for the Village of Ruidoso, explained during a council workshop Monday that the April 23 deadline is the "last chance" for any water user in the stream to challenge the rights of any other claimant in the system.

He said the pre-trial order is separate from an order pertaining

to all Rio Hondo users versus the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe.

Village attorney John Underwood told the council that the Latin term, "inter sese," actually means "among ourselves."

The State Engineer Office has announced a public meeting at 7 p.m. Tuesday, April 7, in the Hondo High School gymnasium. The upcoming "inter sese" proceedings will be explained and discussed during the open meeting.

The Rio Hondo stream system includes the Rio Hondo, Rio Ruidoso and Rio Bonito.

"We hope to form these ideas into


beneficial goals which will support the Village of Ruidoso's progress for future planning," continues the announcement.

Stillinger to provide legal services on water issues. The terms were reviewed in a workshop session Monday.

—Approved, on Underwood's

recommendation, plumbing and electrical contracts. —Went into executive session to discuss personnel and pending litigation.

—Reconvened and moved to

resolve a bill with Sergeant, Hoskins and Beckwith. That bill, for services on the Grindstone Canyon Dam, has apparently been a source of disagreement between the village and Boyle Engineering since a council meeting when coun-

cillors questioned representatives of Boyle Engineering about authorizing services apparently not in the project contract. Village administrators met last week with Boyle Engineering staff members in efforts to settle on the bill.

"We have permitted our image to take a nosedive," noted Davis. He said the master plan is an opportunity to "make a highly definitive statement."

Petronis said his final product will serve as a long-term plan vision, an implementation tool, a sales tool or a combination of all three.

In discussion of optional planning tools, such as economic feasibility, market analysis, selection of alternatives and a plan development, Petronis warned of additional costs.

"The more detail you get the more expensive it gets," he said.

Councillors instructed Petronis to include the market overview, but leave some other alternatives optional for the time being.

The \$35,000 contract was set to begin on April 1, and continue for six months.

"I think this is a challenge for the council and should be an even greater challenge for you," Mayor Davis told Petronis.

Also during Monday's workshop the council reviewed a two-year contract with Neil Stillinger for legal services on water matters.

Underwood said the contract is not limited to the water case involving the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe and downstream water users. He said Stillinger will represent the village on any legal questions surrounding water rights.

Stillinger explained that two pretrial orders have been issued in the upcoming case involving Rio Hondo system water right owners. He said one order addresses all users in the system versus the tribe while the

other is everyone against each other.

The deadline for water users in the stream system to object to each other's water rights is April 23, said Stillinger.

"When it's all over there will be a final decree on the Mescalero Apache Tribe and a partial decree on the others," said Stillinger.

Underwood said the contract allows for Stillinger to share costs whenever possible.

Stillinger said the attorney for the Water Defense Association has indicated that group would like the village to share in the cost of some expert witnesses. He said some things the association is doing might not benefit Ruidoso, but added he'll discuss specific situations as they occur.

Mayor Davis recalled that some members of the Water Defense Association felt the village was hostile to its cause when it opted not to join.

"We certainly did want to cooperate with them," said Davis. "We're neighbors on all sides with all these people," he added.

Stillinger said he is already working with engineer Jackie Atkins.

Councillors then reviewed the engineering contract with Atkins, and found that his firm already has billed the village for \$18,000.

"We've done quite a bit of work," said Atkins.

Councillor Carpenter recommended a \$25,000 cap as a good way to keep up with the contract but changing its scope.

Underwood questioned Atkins on several contract items and instructed him to call when the contract billing hits \$25,000.

Conference focuses on exceptional children

Dr. James Tucker was the keynote speaker at the New Mexico Council for Exceptional Children Spring Conference.

More than 250 educators, representing over 70 percent of the school districts in the state, attended the conference last week at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

According to conference chairman Karen Tillman, this is the first time a conference covering so many disciplines within education has been offered.

"Curriculum-based assessment is the key to understanding classroom problems," Tillman said. "90 percent of the kids experiencing problems in the classroom can be helped in the classroom."

"Special Education is a valid, needed source, but only for the really disturbed," she continued. "Most problems with children are easily addressed, if someone will take the time to sit down and watch them."

According to Tucker, behavior problems with a student is the usual reason for a referral to Special Ed.

"But, behavior is not the problem, it's the indicator of a problem usually stemming from frustration over curriculum," Tucker said. "There is a need to work with com-


bined disciplines."

Trust fund embezzlement trial set for May 11

A February trial date for Raymond Reeves, indicted by a Lincoln County grand jury on embezzlement charges, has been continued until May 11, according to District Court records.

Reeves, accused of embezzling \$13,700 from a fund established at Ruidoso State Bank to benefit injured jockey Steve Harris, is set for trial at 9:30 a.m. May 11 in Judge Sandra Grisham's court in Carrizozo.

District Court Clerk Margo Lindsey said her records don't indicate why the trial date was vacated, and defense attorney Gary Mitchell,

despite several attempts, couldn't be reached for comment.

Reeves, a 51-year-old Ruidoso resident, has remained free on \$25,000 bond since his September 22 arrest. He appeared before Magistrate Judge J.R. "Jim" Wheeler on September 23.

Wheeler said Reeves faces two third-degree felony charges with penalties up to three years in jail and a \$5,000 fine, and one fourth-degree felony charge, which carries possible penalties of 18 months in jail and a \$5,000 fine.

The charges came out of a

Ruidoso Police investigation instigated after a complaint was filed by Harris' attorney Charles Hawthorne. He said bank records showed his client's trust fund totaled \$24,181.50 at one time, but dwindled to about \$10,000 when Harris contacted the bank in September.

The Steve Harris Trust Fund was established last June after Reeves, then manager of The Barn, and others organized a benefit to help Harris with expenses he's incurred since he was paralyzed in a racehorse riding accident.

Mescalero man suspected in Fawn Ridge burglary

A Mescalero man has been charged with burglary and larceny in connection with the theft of at least \$4,500 worth of jewelry from a Fawn Ridge area home, after an investigation by the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office.

Arraigned before Magistrate Judge Gerald Dean Jr. March 20 on burglary and larceny charges was Dan Wienbrenner, of Mescalero. The Sheriff's Office reported Wienbrenner already was jailed in Ruidoso, then was transferred to

the Lincoln County Jail on the Fawn Ridge burglary charges.

A Sheriff's Office spokesperson said \$4,500 worth of jewelry already has been confiscated and more is expected.


On campus

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The Center for Disease Control is recommending supplementary flu shots for high-risk persons to protect against a strain of Russian flu.

Large-scale study found that the birth-control pill does NOT increase breast cancer risk, even for those with a family history of the disease.

A Canadian doctor found that patients with dry mouth could not get relief from angina using nitroglycerin tablets. However, it was determined that a squirt of saline solution under the tongue helped dissolve the drug. (Spray form of nitroglycerin has been approved by the FDA.)

Loosing weight will not only normalize blood pressure in many hypertensives, it will also reduce an enlarged heart, an Australian study found.

Married people have similar blood pressure, the American Journal of Epidemiology reports. Researchers think the reason may be psychological.

Winter's Last Visit

The coldest freeze of all the winter here in the vale arrived in the wee small hours of March twenty-nine, after spring had been with us for nine days. The coldest had been about eight above back in January. On the morning, about four o'clock of the twenty-ninth, Corina the cat came in to the bedroom and woke me up by touching me lightly with her little paw, letting me know it was time to put another log on the fire. Most of the night in cold weather she sleeps on the stone hearth in front of the fireplace on a woolen sweater which serves as a pallet. As the fire burns low she will move closer to the embers, right next to the screen.

I got up and put another log on the embers, and the fire felt especially good. Turning on the front door light I looked out to see a driving blizzard of snow and sleet, and freezing rain. The thermometer outside the window read two above. The strange feeling came over me that there was some mistake in the seasons. Were we really in the season of spring?

In years past I have seen snow in March, April and even May. However I cannot remember a blizzard with cold this close to zero in all the years I have lived here—sixty-two.

All to the north, through the Midwest, Canada and on up to the North Pole, a great wave of cold got completely out of the hands of Jack Frost and his helpers, and brought us down here a surprise blow with the southern tip of the vast cold front.

The advance of spring was slowed down a walk, but not stopped. Under the two inches of snow, the

grass and herbs and weeds kept growing, nourished by the unusual moisture in the ground, and the warmth that was stored away in the soil and the sod and the fallen leaves during the sunny days of the first week of spring.

All day yesterday, the thirtieth, while the last of the snow was melting away, the sunny air under the blue sky was made melodious with the chirping and singing of a great host of Robin Red Breasts. Their cheerful songs echabing through the glens and over the meadows and down along the river—brought you a musical message that spring had quickly rebounded from the slow down caused by the wintery blast which had made these favorite birds of spring stop in their flight north and take cover for a day or so.

Now at noon today on the thirty-first, the last day of March, the robins are all gone. They have journeyed on to complete their mission of cheering up the folks up to the north with their spring time serenades. They will be especially welcome this season, after the record cold, with their orange red breasts shining as they hop about gathering material for their nests, singing their songs of joyful celebration of the return of spring.

This colony of robins was the first to pass through the land on their way north. Others will follow through the early spring, settling in areas to the south of the first bands. Then our own Lincoln County robins will arrive to spend the summer with us.

The crimson and gray house finches arrived today and are feeding with the last of the snow birds. Their

songs of winter and spring blend together joyfully through the warm air, which is now up to an even sixty.

Most Fruit Blossoms Holding Back

The apricot blossoms, after holding back way past their usual time of blooming, will now have to wait another year to try for a full fruit crop. There are still a few buds that did not open, so there will be a few apricots.

Just the same, the blossoms of the apricot tree were a life saver for the bees. Today they are humming around the trees looking for a few late blossoms. Yet they are not downhearted.

Their oak tree down near the river is swarming with workers making up for lost time, so you know that there are leaf buds, evergreen pollen, bark nectar, and early flowers—many things to keep the bees busy before their real work begins: the pollination of the infinite number of blossoms so that there will be a bountiful harvest of food in the world—in fields, orchards, gardens and in the native children of Mother Earth.

These latter include wild strawberries, algerita berries, wild cherries, wild raspberries, elderberries and many more.

The three-point shot will go into effect in New Mexico high school basketball next season, and it could have a big effect on the outcomes of games.

Three-point shots must be taken from at least 19 feet, nine inches from the basket. That would seem to give teams with outside shooting ability an advantage.

In past seasons, teams with one or more dominant big men could

control a game as long as they had a guard who could bring the ball up the court without committing a turnover.

The guards didn't really have to shoot well (although that would certainly have helped) because the team's strong inside game would take care of the scoring.

Now, with the three-point shot, smaller teams can make up for a larger team's advantages with some hot-shooting guards.

But it may also make for more exciting inside play.

"The original reason for the ruling was to help eliminate injuries inside," said Ruidoso High School boys head coach Gene Segura. "The guards were inside the post a lot. The rule should help open up the inside play."

If the three-point rule had been in effect this season, Ruidoso's boys team probably would have been aided by it.



Pro-growth or no-growth?

The question of whether Ruidoso needs a larger natural gas pipeline that has been proposed seems to boil down to just that, to grow or not to grow.

During his presentation at an informational meeting last week with Public Service Commission staff members (PSC) and area businesspeople, Ruidoso Natural Gas President Bob Maddox was very plain in his assertion that without a new pipeline, we'll have no new hookups.

No more gas, no more growth. Of course, LP gas is an alternative, but it's not really a practical answer for longterm growth or major gas users. Particularly in jeopardy would be any plans to develop the current airport site when the new airport is completed in November. And for Ruidoso, growth means economic prosperity.

Others make a strong case against the pipeline. Indeed, some prefer no growth, maintaining they'd rather Ruidoso "as it was"—the mountain village of days gone by.

Others protest the pipeline because we, the ratepayers, will be footing the bill. Maddox said the increase will be reflected in the cost of gas due to increased transmission costs. April bills, which will charge us \$2.75 per metered cubic foot (mcf), would have charged us \$3.25 per mcf if the pipeline were in operation now.

The Public Service Commission will determine the future of the pipeline when Maddox files the proposal as a rate case. Gilbert Quintana, public utility engineer for PSC in this area, can be reached at 224 East Palace Ave. Room 319, Santa Fe, 87501, or (505) 827-6950.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Nobody looks to this column for advice, as they do to Ann Landers or Dear Abby, but we do get queries in the mail.

A gentleman from Silver City, for instance, wants to know what really happened to Right-to-Work legislation in this year's legislative session.

To oversimplify somewhat for purposes of getting to the heart of the matter, that highly controversial and extremely emotional measure simply didn't have enough supporters in our House of Representatives. Proponents of this kind of legislation, who find it more than ordinarily difficult to understand how anyone could be opposed to it, may find that tough to believe, but it is so.

Even the professional agitators in favor of passage of this particular measure admit that. Their childish temper tantrums after it went down to defeat again this year were aimed at the man who was carrying it in the House, Dick Cheney of Farmington, because he allowed it to die without coming to a rollcall vote on the floor.

What they were interested in, in short, was getting a list of names of those who favored their legislation and those who opposed it, for use at election time next year.

If they don't have that laundry list by this time—if they can't identify their enemies by name—they haven't been reading their own campaign material.

If you would like to know where your local representatives stand on this matter, brace them directly. If by any chance you do not know who they are or where they are to be found, the editorial staff of the paper in which you read these words will be glad to tell you how they may be reached.

These folks, after all, are expected to be held accountable to their constituents, though that particular factor in their jobs happens to be one they dread the most.

Another reader, this time in Artesia, asks how legislators could support bills that proposed to stiffen criminal punishments up to the very last moments of a legislative session and then watch them go down the line.

By now, that reader has read the story by Lynn Koenig in her hometown paper that quotes some legislative leaders on this topic. Others who are bothered by the

same question, however, may not have seen that explanation.

House Speaker Raymond Sanchez of Albuquerque was giving the straight skinny when he said two major problems led to the demise of this kind of legislation. By far the more important of these was the lack of money lawmakers had to distribute. As Sanchez says, the fiscal impact of one such bill was \$80 million, and there was not sufficient money in the kitty this year to cover that.

We might want to add, however, that the money was not there after lawmakers chose to assign it to other uses.

To put that in another way, legislators chose to spend what money was available on other things, and that forced them to neglect this item of so much importance to so many of our people.

Again, if you want to know how your local representatives voted on the issue when given a chance, ask them. They came to Santa Fe this year to speak for you, and you have a right to know how they stand on such matters.

In answering the questions of the Artesia Press, the House Speaker also referred to "lack of study before legislation was written" as contributing to the downfall of the two bills the paper was specifically asking about. It's true that measures proposed for the first time often have glitches in them that need to be ironed out. Part of our legislative process is the give-and-take that refines concepts before they go into the law books permanently.

It's hard to believe, however, that this was in the mind of Max Coll, chairman of House Appropriations and Finance, in the emotionally overwrought closing hours of the session. What he did then was to recommend that a bill that had passed the Senate 38-0 and had already been favorably reported out by his own committee be referred back to it for further consideration. That, as almost everyone can understand, is a device for killing a bill without forcing members to go on record for or against it.

If any of the 26,000 people who signed petitions on this topic before the session opened would like to ask Max Coll what he was up to, the Santa Fe phone directory shows his listing as 982-2286.

In a recent letter Mr. John White stated that calling abortion murder was just emotional response. He calls it an "adult decision" that helps with the problems of "millions of unwanted children" and child abuse. I feel very strongly about this subject and since Mr. White is against emotionalism one must look at the facts with maturity, since this is an "adult decision". First, Mr. White claims abortion helps with the problem of unwanted children. He says that "factually there are millions of unwanted children". However, studies show that between 2-4 million people are trying to adopt. Should we kill aged parents unwanted by their children, or wives unwanted by their husbands? The argument given by Mr. White and other pro-abortionists seems to be more of an excuse than a reasonable reason. Child abuse is another reason stated by Mr. White for abortion. He would see the truth if he would look at the statistics. They show that since the Roe-v-Wade decision in 1973 which legalized abortion-on-demand, child abuse has increased 700%. A study done at U.S.C. showed that 91% of the children that were abused were planned. This argument also seems more an excuse than a reason.

A woman's right to privacy to do with her own body what she wants is another excuse. If it was truly part of her body it would have exactly the same chromosome make-up, be the same blood type, and even be the same sex. Reasonable adults know that this does not happen. If it did we would be a world full of women. The right to privacy in the bill of rights is freedom only from unreasonable search and

seizure, not freedom to kill babies in private.

Making abortion illegal would force women back to having back-alley abortions is still another excuse that can also be disputed with facts. A study in 1958 showed that 84%-87% of abortions were done by reputable physicians. A past president of Planned Parenthood said that in 1960 90% were done by a physician. With abortion-on-demand legal they don't have to go through the back-alley they can walk right through the front door. With abortion-on-demand now being "legal and safe" women still die. Abortion is the 6th most common cause of maternal death.

Mr. White, and others like him, may want to look at the true facts before defending the right to end a life. Increasingly more physicians, biologists, and other scientists are agreeing that conception marks the beginning of life.

Having taken a deeper look at the "adult decision" to have an abortion one sees that pro-abortionists hold on to meaningless excuses. With all the excuses out of the way we have to look at the reason. I believe the reasons are that some people, like selfish self-centered children, do not want to take responsibility for their own actions, and because people with fervent emotionalism blindly hold onto empty excuses and non-existent Constitutional "rights". Mr. White may be right when he states that people who are tired of this senseless slaughter of innocent life emotionally call it murder. But, as we have seen, abortion as being murder is more than emotionalism, it is a fact.



Warrior boy tracksters should again be strong

It should be another good season for the Ruidoso High School boys track team.

Ruidoso finished second in the District 3-AAA meet and seventh in the state meet last spring. In 1985, the Warriors took second in district and finished fourth at the state meet.

This time around, with a little bit of luck, the Warriors could do even better.

For starters, returning are Gabe Tam, district champion in the 1,600 meters and 3,200 meters (third in the state at the shorter distance and fifth at the longer one); Jeff Willingham, district champion and state runner-up in the javelin; Verlon Edwards, tied for third in the state pole vault and district champion; and Brian Davis, fifth in the state meet 200 meters and a relay standout.

Add to these four athletes some more quality athletes and some promising underclassmen and the Warriors should be tough again.

"I think we're going to have a good track team," said Warrior head coach Ronny Maskew. "I think we'll be strong in all areas."

Junior Rusty Shelton in the hurdles, senior Mark Airington in the high jump, senior Bubba Miller

in the long jump and junior Todd Morris in the shot put and javelin are potential state meet competitors.

Shelton has been impressive in early meets. In last season's District 3-AAA meet, he finished third in the 110-meter high hurdles and ran on the second-place 1,600-meter relay team.

Senior Garret Henson, a football-basketball star, could be a bright spot in the long jump and relays. He is coming out for track after competing in golf last spring.

Maskew and assistant coach Clendon Kirkpatrick have 33 athletes currently out for the team.

Depth is important when going up against a team like defending district champion Silver City, which has more than twice Ruidoso's enrollment and usually has a lot of athletes.

"I'm sure Silver City will be tough again," Maskew said. "They've got a lot of athletes back, including a good hurdler, a good half miler and a good miler."

"It is important for us to have some of our younger kids come through. If they do, combined with the guys who have already done well, we should be tough."

Warlick and Roller will make up the top doubles team. They played together last season.


Henderson and Morrow and Makowski and Griffin will make up the other doubles teams.

Altoan's Lightfoot Lil captures \$9,500 City of Las Cruces Handicap

After undergoing surgery this winter to replace a hip joint, jockey Larry Byers steered firmly onto the comeback trail piloting Lightfoot Lil to victory in Sunday's City of Las Cruces Handicap at Sunland Park.

It was the second major win this spring for Byers, who teamed with trainer Terrell Davidson and owner Jacqueline Spencer, of Alto, to capture the \$20,000 consolation of the West Texas Futurity last week at Sunland. Davidson also took home the winner's share of the \$158,000 West Texas final.

The Oklahoma trainer said Sunday's City of Las Cruces Handicap was a proving ground to test Lightfoot Lil's abilities for the upcoming Kiley Allison Derby.

"This was a prep race," Davidson commented after the Cruces 'Cap, adding that Lightfoot Lil appeared to have pulled up well from the race. "I can't say that we'll start her in the Derby at this time. I'll have a better idea after talking to Jacqueline Spencer."

Lightfoot Lil's convincing victory in the Cruces Handicap came as no surprise to the 2,730 fans who backed her down to the odds-on favorite for the 6-furlong sprint. It was the California-bred's form, however, that raised a few eyebrows.

After earning \$43,000 last year in front-running fashion, Davidson reversed his strategy for Lightfoot Lil's sophomore debut in the Las Cruces Handicap. Byers held the Muscovite filly fourth through the early stages of the race, before moving within striking distance on the final turn.

Lightfoot Lil proved she could rate well against a sizzling pace. The filly ran down the leaders near the eighth pole and went on to post a one-length winning margin. The final time was a very sharp 1:11.3 - only a fifth off the fastest clocking of the season.

I'm Sweet Bombay, a 10-1 longshot under Joe Martinez' guidance, finished second. Richard Nolen trains the Florida-bred miss for Burt Masters of Lubbock. Smokin Elaine was only beaten a neck for third with Duane Iveling in the irons. Ruidoso's Steve Ivey trains and owns the Texas-bred runner.

Racing resumes next weekend at Sunland Park with programs scheduled Friday through Sunday.

Friday's Twin Trifecta carryover is \$11,384. Saturday's card opens with a one-hour concert by Country-western artist John Conlee. The afternoon racing program is highlighted by Sunland's simulcast of both the Florida and Santa Anita derbies, two of the top races leading up to the Kentucky Derby. On Sunday, some of the nation's best 3-year-old quarter horses meet in the \$85,000 West Texas Derby.

Sunland Park fans saw a truly impressive effort in the 2-year-old thoroughbred department last Friday when Jim Wilburn's Bold Ego son, Fearless Ego, easily daylighted the field in his initial start. The colt was a nine-length winner in :53 3/4 for 4 1/2 furlongs for trainer Cliff Lambert and jockey Carlos Rivas. Wilburn is the president of the Tulsa-based company Winner Communications, which televises numerous horse races

across the country - including Ruidoso Downs' Triple Crown events.
Ruidoso Downs' residents Susan Anderson and J.B. Rogers visited Sunland Park's winner's circle twice last Saturday as two horses that they own were winners. Anniegogetter (2-1) won the fourth race at 6 furlongs while Sparkling Jedi (20-1) shocked the field in the 400-yard seventh race. Anderson trains both winners and Harla Webb was the pilot for both winning trips.

Two jockeys recorded riding triples last weekend. Jockey Carlos Rivas won three on Friday, while Pedro Benitez turned the trick on Sunday.

Win Friday by Frosty Straw hints of successful future
