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Councillors, LTC meet to 'iron out' understanding

Members of the Ruidoso Village Council sat in on a Lodgers' Tax Committee (LTC) budget workshop Wednesday in an apparent attempt to open lines of communication between the two groups.

Councillor Jerry Shaw told LTC members the council wanted to "iron out" some things the advisory board was "left in the dark about."

LTC Chairman Rod Adamson said he had questions over a contract between the Village of Ruidoso and the newly formed Convention and Visitors Bureau (CVB) that allocates 75 percent of lodgers' tax funds collected to the CVB.

"What control does the LTC have over these? Zero?" asked Adamson.

Village attorney John Underwood said the contract, which allocates economic development funds as well as 75 percent of occupancy tax funds to the CVB, calls for the CVB to "cooperate" with the LTC and

submit its budget through the Village Council. He said he wrote the contract to comply with state statutes, but didn't intend to change normal procedures for spending occupancy tax funds.

But Adamson noted a change already had occurred with the allocation of 75 percent of those funds before the normal budget process. Village clerk/finance director Leon Eggleston said requestors normally ask LTC for funds, LTC formulates a budget and the Village Council acts on the budget.

Wednesday's meeting followed a presentation to LTC last week by Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce executive director John Jeffers and CVB director Liz Groenendyk. They presented a proposed budget for \$132,500 of lodgers' tax funds, about 88 percent of an anticipated \$150,000 budget. The CVB also will receive \$41,500 in economic development funds.

Jeffers told LTC last week that the budget presentation was "a courtesy," apparently believing those funds were provided by the Village Council through the CVB contract.

But some councillors wanted LTC to continue to oversee the lodgers' tax funds, and Shaw called on Jeffers to separate the CVB budget into lodgers' tax and economic development. Jeffers pointed out that that was already accomplished in the CVB budget.

LTC members questioned paying CVB operational expenses with lodgers' tax funds, and councillors Shaw and Victor Alonso both said economic development funds were meant for operations and lodgers' tax funds for advertising.

"You made a contract with the city to handle this and now you're coming back and asking for lodgers' tax funds for supplies and equipment and travel," complained

LTC member Bill Rawlins. "Where are we going to stop on this?" he asked.

"The sky's the limit," answered Jeffers. He said equipment and travel funds requested are for trade shows—an advertising expense.

Shaw reiterated her belief that economic development funds would pay for the CVB, freeing more occupancy tax monies for "pure" advertising.

"It was not our intention to throw another \$40,000 at the chamber to do business as usual," noted Alonso. He called on Jeffers to separate the two sources of revenue in his budget.

"Whether it comes out of A or B ... it's all going to the same result," inserted LTC member Dan Kelley.

He said start-up funds have to come from somewhere, and compared starting the CVB with opening a new business.

Shaw said she doesn't favor spend-

ing funds on trade shows, and discussions on the pros and cons of those events followed.

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., apologizing for arriving late, entered the discussion by saying the council is trying to "mesh together all efforts through the chamber." He added Ruidoso has, in the past, done a poor job of establishing an image.

Davis said the chamber Advertising Committee has decided that trade shows are the least of priorities.

"I thought we were trying to get a unified shot at advertising Ruidoso and creating an image for Ruidoso," noted Davis.

Jeffers cited political reasons for including trade shows in the CVB budget, adding he is willing to delete them.

Finally, after more discussions including a heated exchange between Jeffers and Shaw, LTC

members opted to submit a budget to the council that funds every request received. They are:


- CVB.....\$132,500
- Bicycle Race.....1,000
- Volksmarch.....1,300
- Texas Appreciation.....2,500
- Ruidoso to You (trade shows).....6,750

It was learned at the meeting that Ruidoso to You is an organization formed by Nancy Radzewicz and Barbara Downs to fund trade shows. Downs said other funds will be gathered from businesses.

"After hearing the council talk, I don't want you to get too excited," warned Adamson.

LTC, unable to act officially during a workshop, will have a special meeting at 1 p.m. Tuesday, April 28, to act on the proposed budget.

Adamson noted the council can then change the budget or "throw it out the window."

Planning and Zoning Commission says yes on nine, no on two

Meeting Monday for the first time in two months, the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) approved nine requests, but turned thumbs down on two others.

A request by Catherine Waldrop to replace a 1959 mobile home, allowed conditionally in her single-family residential neighborhood (R-1) through a "grandfather clause" in the zoning law, led to lengthy discussions on the philosophy of conditional use versus rezoning.

Waldrop's property, Lot 21 and the north half of Lot 20, Block 3, Hamilton Terrace Subdivision, was apparently rezoned from light com-

mercial (C-1) to R-1 in the village master plan adopted in 1976. Any conditional use in place at the time the ordinance was passed may remain, but may not be changed or replaced, according to the grandfather clause.

Waldrop and her husband, Barney Waldrop, said the change would upgrade the neighborhood, and claimed they weren't notified when the zoning was changed.

Village attorney John Underwood said legal notices and public hearings for the 1976 changes are all in order. He warned the commission that precedent for other property owners in the neighborhood to place mobile homes in their back yards.

"A number of people have

requested a rezoning, then public hearings are required so their neighbors will have the chance to speak.

"I think you'd be wasting your time to try to rezone," said Commissioner Jess Stinson, adding he sees no difference between a variance for a garage and allowing a conditional use to continue.

"For what it's worth, our mayor has been out and looked at it and said he sees no reason we can't put a new mobile," said Barney

Waldrop. Village clerk/finance director Leon Eggleston said a similar request by the Waldrops was turned down by the Ruidoso Village Council about two years ago.

Discussions continued until Commissioner Pete Thompson finally called a halt.

"We vote for it or against it ... we might as well go ahead and do it," said Thompson, before commissioners denied the request with Stinson casting the lone "aye" vote.

Commissioners also nixed Ray Eidson's plans to develop a go-cart track on Mechem Drive across the street from the municipal cemetery.

Smith said the area is C-1, but Eidson's plan could be considered

only in a general commercial (C-2) district.

Eidson claimed a go-cart track could be allowed in C-1 as a recreational use, but the village attorney disagreed.

"It's quite clear ... it's not permitted in C-1," said Underwood.

Several people were on hand to protest Eidson's plans citing noise and proximity to residential neighborhoods. When the commission denied the request, Stinson was the only member to vote in favor of the proposal.

In other regular business Monday, P&Z:

—Unanimously approved site development plans for the addition of a small building at Power Plus Car Wash contingent on Village

Council approval of a vacation of right of way request on the property on lots 326 through 337 in Skyland Subdivision.

—Approved a setback variance for the construction of a two-car garage in Ponderosa Heights, Unit 2, lots 70 and 71, Block 10, but stipulated that the structure be an open carport and remain three feet from the property line. Smith cast the single "no" vote.

—Approved unanimously a setback variance request for new construction in Golf Course Estates, Lot 8, Block 2. The commissioners stipulated that the deck and structure be no closer than 8.5 feet to the property line, and asked for a letter

from the subdivision's Architectural Control Committee.

—Unanimously approved a setback variance request in the 2nd Addition of Wingfield, Lot 3, Block 2. Mike Seelbach told commissioners a new buyer wants assurance the village won't make him tear down a portion of the structure built in the setback area.

—Approved unanimously a request for setback variances for a residence built in a commercial district. Underwood said the variance could be granted by applying residential setbacks (20 feet front and back, and 10 feet sides) when an R-1 use exists in a C-1 area. Zero setbacks are allowed in commercial zones.

—Unanimously approved a replat for three lots into two in Ponderosa Heights Unit 2, lots 24, 25 and 26, Block 9.

—Approved unanimously a replat request in Palmer Gateway, Island Tract, lots 1 through 5, and Kennedy Subdivision of Tract F.

—Approved unanimously a setback variance request in

Ponderosa Heights, Unit 5, Lot 11, Block 33, but made approval contingent on approval by Village Council of a vacation of right of way.

—Approved a setback variance but denied a vacation of right of way on Lot 5, Block 14, Unit 3, Pinecliff Subdivision. Building inspector Jimmy Neeley said the village engineer recommended notifying the owner that the use can continue, but the village may someday require the removal of a concrete drive built on village right of way.

—Authorized Neeley to act administratively on a site development plan submitted by John Ellis too late to be included on the agenda. Ellis plans to move a saw shop from its present location near Lincoln Cablevision to a building behind Mountain Automotive.

—Agreed to a workshop meeting with the Ruidoso Village Council with the date and time to be established later.

Commissioners J.D. James and Ken Carr were absent from Monday's meeting.

Tentative budget

School board meets to work out next year's funding

In a special meeting Wednesday, the Ruidoso Board of Education approved a preliminary 1987-88 school budget of more than \$5 million.

Superintendent Sid Miller explained modifications the state Legislature has made in Senate Bill 106 to ease salary and student-teacher ratio demands that would

have gone into effect in the next school year.

The modifications will allow the use of teacher aides in classrooms and only lunch will be "duty free."

"Even with the modifications, in keeping with the rest of SB106, we will still be \$41,000 short," Miller noted.

He said this is just the first, preliminary, budget and additional meetings would be called to finalize it.

In other business, the board: —Approved White Mountain Elementary School Principal Karen Tillman's request to become solely the Special Education direc-

tor during the next school year, releasing her from the duties of principal. Currently she is filling both roles.

—Approved hiring of non-certified personnel.

—Approved federal projects. —Approved acquisition of a food director.

Changes in state contract could overshadow mental health agency's future

Mental health care in Lincoln County may undergo drastic changes in the very near future.

Board members for Otero County Mental Health Corporation (OCMHC), parent organization for Professional Counseling Associates (PCA) of Ruidoso, after finally solving a host of problems, learned in early April that a state contract which provides 75 percent of the agency's funds may be in jeopardy.

OCMHC operated for months without a director, before appointing J.L. Wilson to fill that slot. He implemented a program to cut costs and bring the overall program into compliance with all state regulations.

"We have always delivered quality clinical services," said Wilson, adding that problems have been financial and administrative. "There has been some mismanagement in Alamogordo, but it's been taken care of," he added.

Wilson and members of the board thought all their troubles were over when the counseling center brought operations into the black, and even repaid more than \$36,000 owed the state for incorrect billings last year.

And so they were surprised to learn that two other Alamogordo-based agencies, Zia Therapy and Otero County Council on Alcoholism, were recently invited to bid on the OCMHC contract.

PCA board members, who serve as a liaison between the community

and the official OCMHC board of directors in Alamogordo, fear that Lincoln County is the most vulnerable to any change in contractor for mental health care.

"As a satellite center, if push comes to shove, we'll be the ones cut," noted Geri Collins, one of three locals who serve on both the PCA and OCMHC boards. "I see that they're going to concentrate on Otero County," she added.

PCA board member Lanny Maddox said the organizations vying for the state contract may not have expertise in the areas most vital to Lincoln County. And Municipal Judge John Cupp, who makes referrals to PCA services regularly, echoed that belief.

Cupp said the state would be regressing to take the small

amount of funds available and "reinvent the wheel" by changing administrations.

A new problem surfaced after the contract was put up for grabs. Wilson said the state felt his budget was too low, and said the services might be under-utilized at the \$300,000 the agency requested. Last year's request was for \$400,000.

Wilson and the board felt there were good reasons to pare the budget, including a cash flow problem that has plagued OCMHC. Wilson explained that services are delivered, a request is submitted to the state under one of several categories in the budget and then a payment is sent back to the local agency.

"What has happened is not so much lack of funds, but the

mechanism," said Wilson. The state pays only a portion of the cost of any service rendered, but delays in payments can cause cash shortages.

Private mental health care providers practicing in the area can be expected to compete for some patients, and were another factor in reducing the budget, said Wilson.

"My budget is very realistic," said Wilson, adding he thought he was being fiscally responsible.

PCA receives funds from Lincoln County and the Village of Ruidoso, as well as from the state. Patients are billed on a sliding scale of from \$1 to \$50.

Wilson said some clients are referred through the judicial system, medical community, social services and schools, but most are

self-referrals.

The board has persuaded state officials to delay awarding the contract until a site visit and evaluation of the Alamogordo and Ruidoso offices is completed. State officials have scheduled a site visit in Ruidoso today (Thursday).

Local board members said, during a special meeting last week, they want the community to know of the "threat" to the local organization.

While Wilson shares the board's concern, he stressed that the state is responsive to the mental health needs of its citizens and will continue to provide services.

But who will deliver those services will remain in question until the state re-evaluates OCMHC and awards the contract.

Through Winter's Farewell




Tam has consistently won both distance events at most of the invitational meets this season. Willingham won the javelin at last week's Warrior home meet and finished second in last season's state meet.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—If I catch his drift, Governor Carruthers is saying New Mexico's citizens took on a new and backbreaking load of taxes largely because he wasn't prepared to be our governor.

To be fair, let me point for you the conversation that points in the direction of that conclusion.

At one of those bill-signing ceremonies that were sprinkled through the early weeks of April, Carruthers was musing to those of us present about some of the things he has learned since he took his present job at the top in state government. Among other things, he said he now has some clear ideas about places where the cost of government may be reduced. He even hinted that some of that reduction must be made in the 70 percent of the annual budget that goes to education.

At that point, I asked this question: "If you know, sir, where cuts can be made, why did you choose in this your first year in office to recommend that government be expanded?"

There appeared to be a slight flare of what in a person of less positive cast of mind might be described as anger as he responded.

It was the shortness of time between the election and the commencement of the Legislature that made that necessary, he said. There just isn't a chance in that period to get a whole program together.

As one example of that fact, he said he is a man much inclined to Cabinet-style government, yet he didn't even have half his Cabinet named when he was inaugurated. At this point he seemed to me to imply—though this is completely subjective—that he had more or less been forced to adopt a program for this first year that had been put together by others and speak of it as though it were his own. He was quite clear in implying that this will never happen again.

That should be some relief to us who are affected so directly by what a governor and legislators do. But it still seems to me to be very close to saying directly that the \$150 million and more in new taxes we are going to shoulder would probably not have been needed if Carruthers had more time to learn his job.

Repeatedly the last campaign, I said repeatedly that this candidate was refusing to tell us what he planned to do if we elected him. I thought holding out on us on such an important topic—it's more or less the heart of what a campaign is designed to reveal—was unfair to all our citizens. Carruthers appeared to me then to be more or less saying we should accept him on faith, largely because he is cheerful by temperament, and leave the revelation of his concrete plans till later.

Now he seems to be saying he didn't have any plans.

There's never been any secret about the shortage of time between the first Tuesday in November and third Tuesday in January; the calendar is there for anyone running for office to see. Because of that, most people who aspire to the top job in state government backtime their efforts a little, and start their planning long before it is clear they have been designated by the electorate to hold the post.

Have we made campaigning so complicated that those engaged in it have no time for any other form of thinking? Are they so taken up with running that they have no chances to consider what they will do when the run is over? If so, we are condemning ourselves to some pretty steep prices for their on-the-job training during the first months of their terms, if we are to judge by what happened to us this year.

We would save a lot of money and a lot of grief if we changed this system for the future, or at least made sure before we chose our leaders that they were prepared for the job we want them to assume. A tax raise of \$150 million is a stiff price for us to pay for inexperience.

It should be noted that legislators, who joined with the governor to deliver this blow to our solar plexuses, have no excuse of that same kind to hide behind. Of the 112 of them, 98 were returning veterans, for whose on-the-job training we had already presumably previously paid. They knew better; they just didn't have the courage to do the cutting this year that Governor Carruthers now promises they will be asked to do next.

Isn't the Ruidoso Village Council getting 15 rickety carts in front of the horse in considering purchasing the Rocky Mountain Builder Supply property?

Architect and planner David Smith (whoever he is) proposed such a move at last week's Council meeting and used as one of the advantageous points of so doing that the property is contiguous to the Ruidoso Municipal Airport land. So what! The people of Ruidoso have not voiced an official opinion on what that land is to be used for and if and when it is proposed as a Village Center-Convention site, then it is going to receive all kinds of opposition.

Frankly, I almost fell out of my chair when I read that the Rocky Mountain Builder Supply property was listed at \$585,000. After all, it is only a metal building with very limited parking. Plus, it would take extensive remodeling to make it a workable building. Who is trying to pull what wool over whose eyes?

In my opinion, Ruidoso has been master planned and feasibility studied almost out of home and hope. If we had all the monies which have been spent on California or Illinois-based firms studying our situation here, then we could have enough to build almost anything we wanted.

We do not need a Community Center-Convention Center out in the boonies. The object of such a facility is to bring business to a business district. Look at where your major cities of the Southwest (in particular) placed such buildings. Check Amarillo, Lubbock, El Paso, Tucson, Albuquerque. Those cities placed the centers in the downtown area where conventioners could walk the streets and shop in their

spare time. Even Dallas placed Reunion Arena right smack down town.

If, at this time, the Village Council thinks it imperative that Ruidoso latch on to a suitable facility, why not give an eye to the King building on Sudderth. This is a two-floor solid building of somewhat over 10,000 square feet with parking all around, plus street parking. It is adjacent to the Walking traffic area of Ruidoso. It is near shopping and eating facilities...and it would take little in the way of renovation to turn it into an attractive and atmospheric place. (By the way, I have absolutely no financial interest in the King building.)

Personally, I am still not happy at where Village Hall was placed. It is next to impossible to tell people how to get to it...and I hate thinking about the Post Office relocating to the area of the old airport. How inconvenient that is going to be for the bulk of business people...course, it would be just down the road from Village Hall!

Ruidoso has had its share of high-rolling financial geniuses who have walked into town with grandiose ideas, grabbed their little bits of loot and glory, then vanished into the setting sun leaving the diehards and bootstrappers more (bond paid) than they likely can ever get paid off.

I suppose Pastor Rodgers could argue that it takes a lot to support 617 missionaries in 45 countries, and it does. (I did have a problem with only aiding refugees in 35 countries.
