

Honor student Carl Lueras is killed in accident

Carl Lueras, honor student at Ruidoso High School, was killed in a motorcycle accident early Saturday morning between Ruidoso and his home in San Patricio. Lincoln County Sheriff's Office reports indicate Lueras was driving his 1987 600 cc Honda Hurricane "at a high rate of speed" when he lost control, rolling the vehicle at least one time. According to Sheriff's Office reports, the accident occurred at 1:20 a.m., and the victim was pronounced dead at the scene by medical investigator James Stover. Reports indicate an autopsy has been ordered.

Lueras was reportedly wearing a full helmet and face shield. Sheriff's Office spokesman Rachel Van Cleave said no alcohol was involved. Lueras was a straight-A senior student, National Honor Society member, had been accepted to the Air Force Academy, attended Fellowship of Christian Athletics meetings and was a fine all-around athlete. He had a very good chance of becoming the school valedictorian. The Warrior student played basketball and track, had been a youth soccer player and was a standout bicycle racer.

"He was a kid who never complained," said Warrior boys junior varsity basketball coach Ridge Bowden. "He always had positive things to say about his teammates. I was disappointed he didn't come out for basketball his senior year. He could have helped us." "The thing I remember about Carl was that he was a genuinely good person," said Ruidoso High School principal Tom Hansen. "He was a truly outstanding student and earned everything he got. I never heard anyone say anything bad about him." Lueras was born December 12, 1968, in Tularosa. Survivors include

his parents, Robert and Joan Lueras of San Patricio; brothers Bill Bohning, Bobby Bohning and Bradley Bohning, all of Minnesota; H.R. Lueras of Washington; Levi and Amanda Lueras of San Patricio; and grandmother Ruth Aldous of Wisconsin. Memorial services will be at 7 p.m. Tuesday, May 12, in the Ruidoso High School gymnasium. The family suggests memorial contributions be made to the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, c/o Ruidoso High School, attention Gerald Tully. Arrangements were by LaGrone Funeral Chapel of Ruidoso.

Airport paving, lighting on go

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC), during a special meeting Friday, awarded bids on paving and lighting to keep construction of the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA) on its fast-track schedule.

But the brakes could be applied if the FAA disagrees with SBAC's plan to reserve the \$2.7 million in proceeds from the Ruidoso Municipal Airport land for constructing the passenger side of the multi-million dollar regional air facility.

SBAC attorney Steve Sanders reminded commissioners of two budget alternatives presented last week by airport administrator Fred Heckman—in one the airport land proceeds are used in the upcoming paving and lighting construction (PAC 2), but in the other those funds are used for things other than PAC 2. Sanders said with the second option the airport is almost totally funded with a smaller local contribution.

The meeting, called for 1:30 p.m., convened at 2:30 p.m. after Chairman Tim Morris apologized for "extenuating circumstances beyond our control." Morris, Sanders, Heckman and Ruidoso village manager Frank Potter spent that hour closeted in Potter's office for a telephone conference with Village of Ruidoso bonding agents.

Upon the recommendation of Leedshill-Herkenhoff, Inc. design engineer Earl Cook, Nielson's Inc. of Cortez, Colorado, bidding \$6,550,187.20 for the paving; and Bixby Electric of Albuquerque, bidding \$136,550.60 for lighting, were awarded the two contracts. The two companies were the low bidders. Sanders announced in the meeting that bids had been

tabulated and all bidding documents appeared to be in order. He told the commission that bids for paving are unit rather than fixed cost, and Commissioner Conrad Buchanan wondered if a cap could be set on the project cost.

Cook said the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) wouldn't accept a lump price bid, and explained that a three percent contingency is included on the project. He said if unit amounts push a contract way over the bid amount, the FAA normally entertains a supplemental grant request.

Cook and Heckman explained how Leedshill-Herkenhoff engineers keep track of unit amounts as they administer the construction contract.

Commissioners also agreed with Cook's recommendation to include the additional two-inch paving included in the paving bid as an additive alternative. That accounts for \$862,910 of Nielson's bid.

Both Cook's recommendations and the commission's action are contingent on concurrence by the FAA.

The actual motion to award the bids was stated for the commission by its attorney. It calls for awarding contracts to lowest bidders according to the recommendation of the engineers and "subject to FAA funding of all eligible items without resort to the use of proceeds from the sale of the old airport."

Sanders said he'll work toward gaining FAA approval to use the Ruidoso airport land funds later in the project. He said the plan meets with FAA rules and regulations. "It should be our responsibility and duty to see if we can get FAA to agree," said Morris.

Commissioners Benny Coker of Capitan and Wendell Chino of the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe were absent Friday.

Accident knocks out Sudderth traffic signal

A one-vehicle accident Thursday at Sudderth Drive and Mescalero Trail put the traffic signal at that intersection out of service. Ruidoso Police Deputy Chief Jim Alston said the Street Department installed stop signs at the intersection to control traffic until the signal box can be repaired. He said

the State Highway Department will be in Ruidoso today to repair the box. Gayla Curry, 44, of El Paso, Texas, suffered minor injuries in that accident at about 5 p.m. Thursday, when the 1986 Ford pickup she was driving hit the power box that operates the traffic light, according

to Ruidoso Police reports. Police said witnesses reported that Curry's vehicle was westbound on Sudderth when it crossed oncoming traffic onto the sidewalk in front of the 7-11 at Sudderth and Mescalero. Police said the driver, who was disoriented and didn't remember

what happened, was transported to Lincoln County Medical Center. A hospital spokesman said she was treated and released. Officers Evelyn McKinney and Roxanne Pfeffer investigated the accident. No citations were issued.

Signs block stocking of fish; group protests

New Mexico Department of Game and Fish employees have not been stocking trout in the Rio Ruidoso in the Upper Canyon above the first bridge for about two months.

State law rules that fish cannot be stocked less than one quarter mile upstream or less than 200 yards downstream from an area that is closed to public fishing.

Most of the area in the Upper Canyon is privately owned and there are a number of posted signs in the area. Previously, the Game and Fish employees had been stocking fish in three areas around the second bridge and beyond.

Concern about the Department of Fish and Game employees not stocking part of the Upper Canyon prompted a meeting at the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce April 28.

Game and Fish fisheries biologist Miles McInnis of the Roswell office and Roy Hays, a New Mexico Department of Game and Fish officer assigned to the Ruidoso area, were present at the meeting.

They explained the situation to concerned citizens, some of them lodge owners who are afraid the restrictive stocking would drive away fishermen and potential customers.

"The first bridge is the last place we stock fish now," Hays said. "We used to stock fish more, but a lot of

posted signs have been put up in the past year or since last fall."

McInnis said that fishermen had been asking why fish were being stocked in areas that were posted. "That was when the Department of Game and Fish employees stopped stocking beyond the first bridge."

"We've got the fish," McInnis emphasized. "We want to stock them, but we can't stock them in any area that is posted."

Still, McInnis is optimistic that a solution could be worked out.

"Some of the lodge owners are planning to talk to the land owners in an effort to get them to modify the signs," said McInnis. "Maybe they could change the signs to say something like no vehicles allowed."

"That way fishermen might be able to walk on the land and we could stock it."

Business people and lodge owners in Ruidoso are still concerned about the problem.

"We've got to do something," said T.L. Wilson, owner of T.L. Wilson's Sporting Goods. "Fishing on the river is a part of Ruidoso tradition."

"Very definitely, it could affect local tourist business," said Bill Rawlins, owner of Ruidoso Lodge on the edge of the Upper Canyon. "The problem with talking to some of the people who own property in that area is that one day they're here, the next day they're gone. Most of them are from out of state and are not here all the time."

Barbarys Pokey is no slowpoke in Mr. Jet Moore victory

For the second straight year, trainer Arnold Simmons captured the season's first stakes race at Ruidoso Downs as Barbarys Pokey took a close decision in Saturday's \$11,000 Mr. Jet Moore Allowance Stake.

Renowned quarter horse rider Jerry Nicodemus piloted the 6-year-old horse to a half-length winning margin in the 400-yard test. The victory earned \$6,600 for owner John Kitzman from Cypress, Texas, who also bred Barbarys Pokey.

Ruidoso Downs' opening program was pronounced a resounding success by president Ferd Slocum as a crowd of 3,714 fans wagered \$366,406. The tally represented a 4 percent increase over last year's opening card.

A single winning ticket returned \$12,248 in Saturday's Big Q wagering as the back-to-back quintela bet made its debut after a six-year absence.

Racing resumes next weekend at the mountain track when the stage is set for the \$300,000 Kansas Derby. The 12-race program next Sunday spotlights eight trial divisions for the Derby with the 10 fastest horses advancing to the final on May 24. First post is 1 p.m. with Ruidoso's admission gates opening at 11 a.m.

Nicodemus never uncocked his whip as he hand-rode Barbarys Pokey to a decisive win in the Mr. Jet Moore. Racing as the overwhelming 4-5 favorite, the burly quarter horse took control of the race midway down the course after Up Front Runner and Runnin Roro

got the jump out of the gates.

The two early leaders were run down in the final yards when rider Luke Myles got Big John Mito rolling to nose out Runnin Roro for second-place money. Up Front Runner and Whata Lucky Jet finished another nose back in a dead-heat for fourth.

Nicodemus said he had "no problems at all" during the trip. "He left there good and he always runs real good on this end (near the finish). So I wasn't worried." The final time for the 400-yard race was 19.84 seconds.

It was the second-consecutive stakes victory for Barbarys Pokey, who drew off to a half-length win in the Alameda Handicap at Albuquerque Downs last month. In only two appearances this year he has earned \$22,000.

Barbarys Pokey ran out nearly \$38,000 last year winning the Mr. Jet Moore and the Mr. Kid Charge Handicap before finishing third in the prestigious World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic.

Big John Mito's second earned \$2,400 for Jerry Rheudasil of Lewisville, Texas. Dwayne "Sleepy" Gilbreath conditions the grey son of Mito Paint. Runnin Roro's show earned \$1,100 for Sue May of Fort Stockton, Texas. Nicky Wilson had the riding assignment for trainer Bill Leach.

Up Front Runner and Whata Lucky Jet were followed across the wire by Zircon, Leading Jet, Easy Good Buddy, Cash Pledge and A Lively Lov.


The New Mexico Horsemen's Association has a great new publication out called



After seven months of snowy winter these little friends or ours that brighten our summer days, are more welcome than ever.

The little pair of swallows who came here earlier on their annual pilgrimage from Mexico, send word to the main band, which arrived just at the last of April.

The little pair who arrive here at the house every year have been flying around the house for a week or so trying to make up their mind where to build their nest. Usually the nest of the summer before is waiting for them up under the apex of the west eave of the roof. This year they returned to find that something had knocked it down.

This morning, May nine, I was out to the front of the house, and there under the apex of the little extra gable on the north side, the little swallows already have a nest under construction.

They were circling out over the cedars and then returning with tiny

fragments of twig in their beaks which they quickly and skillfully put in place. They put dabs of mud in amongst the twigs, making a home something like a Mexican Jacal (a house made of upright piles with adobe mud in between). The swallow's nest is built snugly against the house in shape and size of half a breakfast bowl. Here they raise their young—both flying in feed for their infants—until time for them to fly.

Building their nest on the shady side of the house—does this mean that they are looking for a warm summer? We are happy for the blessing the swallows, and all the other birds of summer bring into our lives.

She came down with her bag full without a calf and went back up the hill, leaving me worried about her and her young calf. Right while I was most worried, one cold morning in early spring, here the young mother was on the knoll; and right in a rut in the road, was a tiny calf, curled up out of the wind. She raised her white head and looked calmly at me with her velvet brown eyes. I named this calf Tiny Susie, and she has since brought many calves into the world.

On April twenty-four, Tiny Susie's first calf, now several years old, showed up with a tiny heifer, much like the original Susie. The little calf came walking straight up to me, gen-

tle and tame, with the look of purest happiness in her light brown eyes full of trust, and friendliness.

This little calf was born under the star of happiness. She goes jumping and running at top speed across the meadows, her tiny red and white body the very picture of a little new life filled with the sheer joy of living.

She is the pride and joy of the grown cows and older calves, and she is well aware of being the favorite of the herd. She is an obedient child, obeying her mother to the letter. Ruidoso boys win district title, girls finish second

Warrior boys get eight firsts

Combine some outstanding performances by some talented seniors, excellent clutch efforts by some underclassmen, and good coaching and you have the ingredients of the Ruidoso High School boys' track team's championship performance at the District 3-AAA meet Saturday in Las Cruces.

Performing in hot weather on the Mayfield High School track, the Warrior boys scored 116 points to win the meet by seven points over runner-up Silver City, which had 109.

Cobre had 50 points, Deming had 36 points and Hot Springs scored 24.

Ruidoso will now send 15 athletes in 10 events to the state meet Friday and Saturday, May 15-16, at the University of New Mexico track in Albuquerque.

The district title was Ruidoso's first in the AAA division, and it came after two second place finishes the past two seasons.

The first-place performance earned head coach Ronny Maskew Coach of the Year honors by his fellow district coaches.

It did not come easy, however, despite the fact Ruidoso took eight first places, broke three school records and set six district records.

Going into the final event of the day, the 1,600-meter relay, Ruidoso had a four-point lead.

Based on the scoring for relays, if the Warriors had finished two places below Silver City in the relay, the Colts would have won the title.

But the Warrior quartet of Rusty Shelton, Chuck Daniels, James Hall and Brian Davis responded with a meet-record 3:27.58 to win the event and the team title.

Davis ran a sizzling 49.0 on his anchor leg to secure the victory for Ruidoso.

Just before the 1,600-meter relay, senior Gabe Tam completed his second straight distance double in district competition. He won both the 3,200 meters and 1,600 meters, just as he did in 1986.

Tam led a first-fourth-fifth finish for Ruidoso in the 3,200 meters, winning in 10:07.65.

Freshman Ira Sago took fourth in 10:43.55 and Sergio Hernandez was fifth in 11:20.81, giving Ruidoso a four-point lead in the team standings.

Earlier, Tam had outraced a Silver City runner for a 4:33.25 1,600-meter win. Tam pulled ahead of the Colt runner in the last 50 yards for the win.

Other Warrior first-place efforts were Jeff Willingham's school and district record javelin throw of 191-4; Verlon Edwards's 13-7 pole vault (another school and district record), Davis' 22.67 200-meter district record victory; the 400-meter relay's 43.56 district

record; and the 800-meter relay's 1:30.39 district record.

Shelton, Daniels, Garret Henson and Davis made up both relay quartets.

Willingham also had another 190-foot plus throw as he broke his own school record by over 12 feet.

Junior Todd Morris took fourth in the javelin with a 165-1/2 effort on his last throw. That last throw qualified him for the state meet.

Sophomore Michael Swanner took fifth with a 141-9-3/4 effort.

Edwards had two narrow misses at 14-2, leading a first-second-fifth place Warrior effort in the pole vault.

Junior Jef Sherwood took second with a state-qualifying 12-2 leap and junior Heath Wood was fifth at 10-6.

Another excellent performance was turned in by high jumper Mark Airington.

Airington took second with a 6-3 leap, breaking the school record and qualifying for state.

The Warrior medley relay team of Billy Harrison, Bubba Miller, Hall and Hernandez qualified for state with a second-place finish of 3:48.28.

Daniels added a second place in the 200 meters, running a 22.95 behind Davis. That Warrior one-two finish was critical in the team race.

"That gave us a one-point lead in the standings," said Maskew.

Other Warrior scoring efforts were by Dusty Beavers, third in the shot put at 40-3 and third in the discus at 122-9; Morris, fourth in the shot put at 40-3; Bubba Lane, fifth in the discus at 116-11-1/2; Shelton, third in the 110-meter high hurdles at 15.74; Airington, fourth in the high hurdles at 16.50; Jason Willins, fifth in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles at 43.53; Hall, third in the 400 meters at 53.23; Miller, fifth in the 400 meters at 54.61; Henson, third in the 100 meters at 11.46; and Sago, third in the 1,600 meters at 4:47.92.

Maskew was naturally pleased with the results of the meet.

"I'd say we did a little bit better than we thought we would," he said. "We had a lot of key events."

"We got 35 points in the field events. The pole vault was a key event, as was the 200 meters, high jump, javelin, shot put and discus."

Ruidoso took fourth in the junior varsity meet.

John Tipton won the pole vault with a 9-6 effort and Peter Gable won the shot put with a 34-10-1/2 toss.

Logan Stirman also had a fine performance, taking second in the 200 meters (24.95) and fourth in the 100 meters (12.56).

Now the Warriors ready to challenge for the state title, where they finished fourth in 1985 and sixth last season.

"I tell you this," Maskew remarked. "If I had to take 15 guys to the state meet, there's no group of guys anywhere I'd rather take than our group."

"I think we'll do exceptionally well."

And no one who saw the Warriors come through at Mayfield would argue with the Warrior coach.





Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—The glory-dreams of Ronald Reagan and Friends started coming apart when those folks failed to distinguish the dividing line between "public" and "private." They apparently could not appreciate the fact that "government" means one thing, and "business" means something very different.

That is a mistake that conservatives, who often appear to be people with their eyes firmly fixed on profit, seem to make more frequently than their opposite numbers do. Those Senate-House hearings now examining matters of arms to the Iranians and bucks to the Contras (or to somebody else) make clear that a major contributor to the sad state of affairs that was allowed to develop was the belief that it is possible to "privatize" the foreign policy of the United States.

If the hearings did nothing but take some of the sheen off that buzzword, "privatize," they would already have accomplished something for the good of the country. That idea has too much charm for too many at the right end of the political spectrum, and it ought to be laid to rest.

It is clearly misguided to believe that the burdens of government, which are the burdens of all the people, can be transferred to private concerns that exist for a reason quite different from the one that underlies all government. "Profit" makes the mere go in private business, but it has nothing at all to do with the workings of government. It is hard to conceive any valid circumstances under which the functions of government should be performed for the purpose of making a profit.

When that is done, as in much of the transaction that sent arms to Iran, the true aims of government are subverted, and what results is neither good government nor good business, but some bastard form with the bad features of both.

If you don't think that thought applies to state government as well, you haven't been paying close attention to what goes on here in Santa Fe. There is a clear spirit of belief here at the moment, since a new Republican administration took control, that business, and especially businessmen, can do everything bet-

ter than those who are professionals in government. If they are not watched, these guys will give away the store in their efforts to contract out as much as possible of the daily running of the state.

There's another way in which the concepts of "private" and "public" have gotten confused that has no connection with the thoughts above except for the adjectives it involves.

This one affects local governments as well. Our state's open meetings law says there are two items that may be discussed by units of government in New Mexico in executive, or private, session. One is matters of pending litigation, and the other is, as the act puts it, "personnel matters."

Over the years since that law was adopted, we have seen a misinterpretation of it grow at all levels of government. That misinterpretation was illustrated earlier this week after Governor Carruthers sacked David Sierra, who had been acting director of the state's Alcoholic Beverage Control Division. When the Governor was asked why he fired Dave, he sidestepped the question, saying he couldn't tell us that because it was a "personnel matter."

In short, the "personnel was taking refuge, as do many others in government who do not like to account to the electorate for their actions, behind a shield that does not exist. The open-meetings law doesn't say it is forbidden to discuss personnel matters in public; it merely says that, to spare embarrassment to those being discussed, it is permitted to lock the media and public out while decisions in such matters are being arrived at.

We would certainly be safe in concluding that a chief executive, or anybody else holding elective office for that matter, should not discharge a major official in the administration for anything except due and good cause. It would also seem to follow that, where such due and good cause exists, the citizens have a right to know what it is when we are given word of the firing.

Since Dave Sierra worked for us, we have a right to know where he failed us.

I'm amazed Mr. White found my first paragraph "unintelligible." Those who responded favorably to my letter varied in age from their early twenties to their late seventies, from college educated to high school diploma. They outnumbered the unfavorable response by no less than twelve to one, two if Mr. White's wife agrees with him. Perhaps his lack of understanding is due to an opposing mind-set since those who responded had no difficulty understanding, regardless of age or education.

Mr. White labels himself a "Human Liberal" and writes that the biblical moral standards have "fortunately changed through time." Fortunate for whom? Ignoring biblical standards of behaviour, sexual and otherwise has serious consequences as is seen in the lives of those involved in the PTL scandal. Mr. White is seemingly pleased at the change in moral standards. Seeing such tragic results brought about by the change I wonder if his pleasure is shared by the other human liberals.

As to the "control" America has over Western Europe it is only that which they have permitted and is hardly as totalitarian as that control exercised within the Soviet systems nor is it as callously applied. Western Europe is close enough to Communism to see it

without the lustre that those living at a distance give it and is understandably alarmed over the talk about removing medium and short range missiles. They know that if such talk becomes a signed agreement there's little doubt that America will go about fulfilling the obligations of the agreement, considering Her past record; and that the Soviet Union will continue to ignore her obligations, considering her past record. Has anyone asked where the Soviets are going to put their missiles if they keep their word for once and actually do remove them? Cuba? Afghanistan? Nicaragua?

"The Tower Commission Report" states that one reason for dealing with Iran was to obtain their aid in securing the release of the hostages held in Lebanon. Two were released to their families. It's not enough, all should be released. I've heard of no better plan offered, least of all from those belly-aching about the "arms for hostage" deal. To those who recommend talk I offer the disappearance of Terry Waite.

I'm not worried about 40,000 Sandinistas marching up through Mexico to attack us. I'm concerned about the widespread naive belief that the Communist ideology controlling the Nicaraguan government will have no influence in the surrounding countries and replace those governments friendly to America, as Nicaragua once was, with ones hostile to America, as Nicaragua now is. Anyone who says that that won't happen is ignorant of both history and geography. For proof I suggest they compare a map of the territory controlled by Russia before 1917 with one of the Soviet Union's territory in 1986.

Years after the Bolshevik

Revolution, seeing its terrible results, Winston Churchill stated that the West should have stepped in and "strangled Communism in its cradle." It's much to late for that now and the terrible titan stalks the earth bringing human misery where its ideology holds sway. Mr. White and other "human liberals" would condone its spread, would try to talk the Red Bear into releasing its prey or to persuade it to return to its lairs. Their "live and let live" policy will not affect in the slightest this threat to liberty. The only things the Communists understand are military superiority and the guts to use it. If I may quote an ancient Roman axiom "If you want peace, be ready for war."
