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Water group heats up defense plan

"I think Governor (Garrey) Carruthers is solidly behind our defense effort," said Michael Hurd Monday during a meeting of the Water Defense Association (WDA). Close to 200 area residents gathered in the Hondo High School gymnasium to hear the latest in the continuing legal dispute over water rights on the Pecos stream system, including the rivers Bonito, Hondo and Ruidoso.

Before hearing details of the case from WDA attorney Richard A. Simms, the crowd heard of efforts to gain state funds to be used to hire expert witnesses in the complicated water case involving the United States government, the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe and hundreds of water right owners in the stream system.

Hubert Quintano of Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District said WDA was granted \$25,000 in emergency aid from the state, and came very close to obtaining more funds through the state Legislature. Legislation passed by the House died on adjourn-

ment in the Senate.

Quintano said he has asked the Department of Finance and Administration for \$150,000, and that request may be considered in a special meeting in June. WDA members asked how they can support the request and were advised to write to Governor Carruthers, who also serves as chairman of the board of finance.

While the United States has spent as much as \$3 million to aid the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe in efforts to gain about 18,000 acre-feet of additional water rights, the WDA has spent between \$40,000 and \$50,000, according to Simms.

Quintano said WDA has been allocated, in addition to the \$25,000 state grant, \$25,000 from Lincoln County, \$10,000 from Chaves County, \$20,000 from the City of Roswell, \$5,000 from the Village of Ruidoso Downs and \$1,000 from Capitan. WDA executive board member Kenneth Nosker said the Mayor of Ruidoso has also assured him of some support. Individuals have contributed about \$50,000 so far.

Nosker warned that property values in the Hondo Valley may drop as much as 75 percent if the

Mescalero Indians are successful in claiming 18,000 acre-feet of water rights.

"Be aware of a claim to close to two times the historic flow of the river," noted Simms. He said rights that have been sold and moved will also be dead if the tribe is successful.

Simms said the water case is comprised of two parallel procedures—the first is water right owners' opportunity to challenge Mescalero Apache claims and the second is the chance for the tribe and others to object to any water right owners in the system.

On April 24 attorneys for the Mescalero tribe filed suits challenging water rights in 63 ditches involving 252 water right claimants and about 400 tracts, said Simms. He said in most cases the tribe is contesting priority dates.

Since some water rights and tracts have changed ownership since the state adjudicated those rights in 1976, the case was filed by sub-file numbers. In some cases the actual water right owners may not know they have been brought into the case, said Simms.

He called on WDA members to

help locate all water right owners whose rights have been challenged. He said if the challenges are not answered by May 23, the water right holders will lose by default.


Simms said his assistants researched the sub-files published in the case, colored them in on hydrographic survey maps and left them in the hands of WDA executive board member Gayle Hopkins. To make an appointment to review the maps, contact Hopkins at 653-4201.

"The important thing is, more than 250 individuals have been sued and less than half of them even know they have been sued," stressed Simms.

Simms answered a variety of questions, taking time out to get a drink of water from the fountain in the gym.

"There's still water in the fountain," quipped Simms. "You're lucky," said one audience member.

WDA owners continue to voice concern over the future availability of water in the Hondo Valley and throughout the Pecos stream system.

Economic Development Corp. gets council endorsement

The Ruidoso Village Council, in a short meeting Tuesday, endorsed the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County, rejected bids to drill a well at Eagle Creek Sports Complex, accepted a proposal to auction surplus property, and heard from Al Junge on "progress."

Details on the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County (EDC) were discussed in a joint meeting last week, and councillors Tuesday unanimously approved a resolution endorsing the concept.

EDC member Buddy Bundick said the purpose of the non-profit corporation is to diversify and enhance the economy of Ruidoso.

Councillors voiced concern over the \$200 fee asked of corporation members, with Councillor Ray Dean Carpenter recalling a plan mentioned in last week's meeting to waive that fee. Village attorney John Underwood said EDC's attorney is researching the legality of a municipality paying such a fee.

"We value your participation so much ... I'm sure we can work it out," said Bundick.

Also Tuesday, some councillors were critical of bidding procedures that led to rejecting bids on drilling a water well at Eagle Creek Sports Complex and debating proposals for an auctioneer before finally accepting a different proposal than that recommended by purchasing agent Fonda McClain.

On the drilling proposal, village engineer Mike Davalos said advertisements were published and bids received before the Environmental Improvement Division (EID) was consulted. Davalos said EID requires some changes before the proposed well will be approved for drinking water.

Village Councillor Elmer Pirelli recalled a similar problem on the Hollywood well.

"You should have learned a

lesson," said Pirelli.

Davalos said the two options available are to reject all bids and have final designs approved by EID before repeating the bidding process or accepting one of the two bids received and negotiating with the bidder to change the terms of the published invitation to bid.

"Let's get all our ducks in a line and then decide," said Councillor Victor Alonso.

The council then rejected the

bids: one from Ray Parnell Drilling Co. at \$7,799.20 and the other from Wesley Weehunt at \$5,602.05.

In further discussions on bids, councillors heard of plans to conduct a surplus village property auction at 10 a.m. May 30.

Purchasing agent McClain said three auctioneer proposals were received and carefully reviewed. She recommended accepting "the second lowest proposal" submitted by Blaine Partridge of Truth or

Consequences.

"He shows a lot of enthusiasm," noted McClain; and clerk/finance director Leon Eggleston added he "seems to really know what he's doing."

"He seems to know more than we do what he's doing," inserted Councillor Alonso. "Seems like we should have done a little more homework," he added.

Proposals were from Partridge for \$550 or nine percent of the sale, Edward C. Kruse for 14.75 percent of the sale and Jim Woodriddle for \$50 plus tax of seven percent of the sale.

Councillors questioned how it could be determined which price was lower, not knowing the amount and value of property to be auctioned. McClain said she didn't have an estimate on the value of surplus items.

McClain said she went by the proposal letters more than the price in making her recommendation.

Alonso moved to reject all bids, form an idea of the value of items to sell and then resubmit, but fellow councillors failed to second his motion, finally passing Councillor Larry Simon's motion to award the bid to Kruse at 14.75 percent.

Councillor Alonso cast the lone "nay" vote.

Early in the meeting Al Junge spoke on "progress" in two areas and "lack of progress" in another.

Junge recalled asking the council last December to consider placing guardrails on Warrior Drive. He said those rails are nearly com-

plete, and thanked the council.

He then congratulated the village administration on having enough "get up and go" to rescind a decision that he said was wrong in the first place. Junge said the administration reversed itself, after appointing village engineer Mike Davalos to head the infrastructure division, and appointed Becky Durham as division head, freeing Davalos for his engineering responsibilities.

Junge then raised questions on a number of issues relating to the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport. He said the joint powers agreement forming the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission is nothing more than an agreement to meet and should never have been signed. Junge was critical of the lack of participation by the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe, suggesting the tribe should have been told to "get up or get out."

He questioned various reports as to how much the local contribution or "shortfall" will be, and lambasted The News for its reporting on airport issues. Junge said headlines often indicate one thing while the story indicates something else entirely.

Junge suggested that voters, supporting a .50 percent gross receipts tax increase to go toward the new airport, were misled, believing that would be the total contribution they'd be asked to pay.

Village reorganizes; Durham is named dept. head

Village manager Frank Potter revealed last week he is reorganizing several village departments.

Becky Bell Durham, recently promoted to assistant division head for the Infrastructure Division, was named to head that division.

Potter said engineer Mike Davalos, formerly head of infrastructure, will remain village engineer, but will be freed from the day-to-day routine of overseeing infrastructure departments: street, water and wastewater.

Davalos will oversee the Building Inspection and Planning and Zoning (P&Z) departments, but will now have more time to spend in "engineering" functions, such as supervising capital projects, explained Potter.

Although the departments of building inspection and planning and zoning were recently combin-

ed, Potter said he'll separate those departments. The Management Information Service bulletin for May 8 said the change was made "in order to utilize village personnel more effectively and divide an increased work load."

Building Inspector Jimmy Neeley will continue in that position, and Margaret McDonald Lahey, hired recently for a temporary part-time slot, will head P&Z. The two will continue to work together to serve the public in building inspection and P&Z, said Potter.

"It's going to work pretty good," said Potter, explaining that his plan is to use every employee's training and experience to the best advantage.

Plans also call for combining the water and sewer departments on July 1. Potter said Water Depart-

ment head Richard Sanchez is slated to head the expanded department.

Potter said he also is working on a plan to pool all small equipment in a shop to be checked out by various departments. He said one mechanic will be assigned to the small equipment maintenance warehouse to be housed in the old wastewater plant below the Street Department building.

Fonda McClain was recently named purchasing agent and oversees a central purchasing warehouse near the Municipal Courts and Police Complex.

Resignations have left vacancies in both the police and fire departments, and Potter said consideration is being given to whether or not those slots will be filled.

Governor to conduct government here

Governor Garrey Carruthers will bring state government to Lincoln County Wednesday, May 21.

The governor's office announced last week that Carruthers and a number of his cabinet members will conduct Government Day beginning with a public no-host breakfast at 7 a.m. Wednesday, at the Ruidoso Inn. The governor is scheduled to speak during the breakfast, and citizens will have the opportunity to meet members of his cabinet.

A news conference is scheduled at 8:30 a.m. and Carruthers will be interviewed on local radio stations at about 9:30 a.m.

At 11 a.m. Governor Carruthers and his entourage will tour the Grindstone Canyon Dam and the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport

construction project. He will have a private lunch with village and county elected officials at the Wortley Hotel in Lincoln.

The governor will conduct a town meeting from 2-4 p.m. at the Lincoln County Heritage Trust Historic Center in Lincoln, and will then be honored at a reception at St. Jude's Community Center in San Patricio.

According to a release from the governor's office, selected cabinet members will be available to meet with local residents about issues relating to particular department or state government after the breakfast. To schedule a meeting, contact Margaret Gray, deputy for cabinet affairs, 827-3000.

Cabinet members expected to accompany the governor to Lincoln County are Nick Jenkins, Economic

Development and Tourism Department; Deway Lonsberry, Department of Highways and Transportation; Lou Gallegos, Human Services Department; Larry Gordon, Health and Environment Department; Paul Garcia, Department of Labor; Bill Stephens, Agriculture Department; and Tom Bahr, Department of Energy and Minerals and Natural Resources.

Also scheduled for Lincoln County Government Day are Anita Lockwood, deputy secretary of the Department of Energy and Minerals and Natural Resources; and Ron Loyd, acting secretary of the Transportation Department, who is slated to become secretary of the Department of Taxation and Revenue when the reorganization takes effect July 1.

Hine has served Ruidoso for 26 years

"I wonder how much a 1944 autograph of Bob Hope is worth these days?" asked former village manager Jim Hine, thumbing through a huge scrapbook packed with years and years of memories.

The newly retired Hine, relaxing at home with his wife, Margie, took the time recently for a trip down memory lane using the carefully prepared book of mementos as a road map.

Tucked away, along with the Hope autograph, are the signatures of Jack Benny and other celebrities who visited troops during World War II.

No, Hine isn't your average autograph seeker, but as a military police officer in Australia, part of his job was checking travel orders for everyone coming and going from that outpost. Travel logs from that military station contain signatures of Hope and Benny alongside all the not so famous who passed through Australia's American military base.

And neatly attached to page after page are documents and memorabilia of Hine's education, family and full career as a school administrator that led up to his arrival in Ruidoso in 1960 as the village's first manager.

The scrapbook, lovingly made by Hine's wife, covers his life through 1978. Mrs. Hine, who has continued to gather material for the next volume, said putting it together will be Hine's job, now that he has more time.

Hine smiles as he reminisces of the 26 years he spent managing the Village of Ruidoso. He's been in the midst of big changes, and yet some things remain the same.

Many faces smiling from the pages of Hine's book of memories are just younger versions of people

still involved in the village today.

Issues reflected in the news stories that Hine has saved keep recurring. For instance, in 1977 he wrote village councillors a letter naming some things to be thinking about affecting Ruidoso's future—one of those things was what to do with the Ruidoso Municipal Airport land when the facility moves.

And just this month the present council awarded a planning firm a contract to master plan that land.

Hine served during the terms of six different mayors—Pearson, Tucker, Stoneman, Davis, White and Farrar—some more than once. And his management was along with many different village councils.

"I used to have a saying," noted Hine. "I never worked for a particular village council, I always worked with them for the Village of Ruidoso." Pet projects remained low on Hine's priority list. He always gave top billing to budget concerns and projects promoting growth—"something for the betterment of the village."

Ruidoso had never before had a village manager when Hine was recruited to lead the quiet little town into the future. The village payroll was at 40 in 1960, and had swelled to 135 by the time Hine retired.

"The town was growing—we had to establish priorities and find financing to accomplish them," said Hine. "I used to be told I had a mind for creative financing," he added.

And, creative or routine, all kinds of financing was gathered under Hine's leadership to finance millions of dollars of capital improvements.

Of all his accomplishments as village manager, Hine is proudest of the Ruidoso/Ruidoso Downs joint use wastewater plant that opened

five years ago.

"I was told I'd never see it finished," said Hine. He said the \$8-million project cost Ruidoso only about \$450,000 with \$250,000 paid by Ruidoso Downs and the rest paid for with state and federal funds.

Hine said the facility has been so well maintained that it looks as good now as the day it opened. Credit for that goes to the department manager at the wastewater plant, said Hine.

"I think the key to my management style is that I had great confidence in my department heads," said Hine, adding his employees knew he was available to assist them at any time. "They're all still there," he noted.

Hine looks back proudly on great strides in firefighting and in police protection.

The budget remained a very important part of Hine's responsibilities as village manager.

"I went by what the law says—the manager shall prepare and submit a budget," explained Hine.

But above all, Hine is proud to have served the people of this village. "You have to honor and respect the public," he said, confident that he was able to do just that.

And now, Hine looks to the next chapter in his life.

"We're enjoying this phase of our life," said Mrs. Hine, and Hine agreed. The two enjoy the new freedom to come and go without the daily demands of Hine's responsibilities in running a village.

"It's rewarding to go to the grocery store... and see people who are interested in your retirement," said Hine. "It's good to get out and know they still recognize you," he added.

"Ruidoso, I must say, has been good to me and my family; and I feel that we made a contribution to Ruidoso," said Hine.

Harrison is a junior and was second in the district 800 meters. She competed at state last year.


Comanche won the district 3,200 meters title and Patton took the district hurdles crown.



Employers, aliens learn of immigration law provisions

Catholic Diocese of Las Cruces staff in the area Wednesday to provide information on the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986, met with at least 60 people at St. Eleanor's Catholic Church in Ruidoso and St. Jude's Community Center in San Patricio.

Antonio Lujan, director of the Office of Catholic Social Ministry in Las Cruces; Sandra Figueroa; and Sister Carmel Garcia answered questions for employers concerned about the new act, as well as people who may be entitled to achieve legal status through provisions of the law.

Bishop Ricardo Ramirez of the Diocese of Las Cruces, while not present for the information sessions, issued a statement concerning the law and the Catholic Church position that has prompted the Diocese to open Proyecto Amnistia in Las Cruces to act as a "qualified designated entity" to serve people wishing to legalize their status.

Father Dave Bergs of St. Eleanor's said his parish will sponsor more information nights on the act. He said offices may be established in Roswell and Alamogordo.

Anyone needing further informa-

tion is encouraged to call the Office of Catholic Social Ministry at 524-0965 or 523-3938.

In his statement, Ramirez said "the Conference of Bishops is called upon to respond to a law that will affect millions of lives within the next year." He said the law will affect individuals living in this country illegally and individuals that employ undocumented workers.

Ramirez said he understands the law to have two purposes. "First of all, it is an attempt by the United States government to close the U.S. borders to the flow of illegal entries. Second of all, the law allows for qualifying undocumented persons to normalize their status."

Ramirez described the three areas in the new law: employer sanctions making it illegal to hire a worker who is in this country illegally; legalization for those who can prove they have resided continuously in this country since January 1, 1982; and special agricultural provisions.

The Bishop made some observations on the law, making note of the "confusion and ambiguity" during the public education period that ended May 5, the "excessive" fee for legalization and the restrictive

definition of agricultural worker. "The arbitrary cut-off date of January 1, 1982 in Title II of the Legalization provisions stands in the way of family unity in many cases," said Bishop Ramirez.

Recognizing that the law "represents the opportunity of a lifetime" for many, Ramirez said it also represents further frustration and disappointment for others.

"While we have strong reservations about this law, we are prepared to cooperate as best we can with the law," continued Ramirez.

Ramirez further explained the Catholic Church involvement in the education and application of the new immigration rules:

"Over the centuries the Catholic Church has developed a strong tradition of service to the poor and to displaced peoples around the world. The Catholic Church in this country identifies strongly with its immigrant roots particularly in the 19th Century.

Insufficient checks caseload changes handlers

Insufficient check charges that swelled the caseload in Judge J.R. "Jim" Wheeler's magistrate court late last year are now being filed in Judge Gerald "Junior" Dean's magistrate court in Carrizozo.

"I don't mind handling check cases," said Judge Wheeler, reviewing a history of changes in how such cases are handled in Lincoln County.

The influx of bad check filings in magistrate court occurred right after general elections last November, said Wheeler.

Several years ago, when Steve Sanders was district attorney, that office had a staff member, John Carver, who worked returned check cases, said Wheeler.

"For some reason the Sheriff's Office started doing it," said Wheeler, not sure exactly when that change came about. But after the November election, the Sheriff's Office turned the check cases over to the District Attorney's (DA) office, said Wheeler. Complaints started coming

through the courts, "as they should," said Wheeler. He said the DA began entering check cases by the hundreds.

"It's a hard job," said Wheeler, noting the huge amounts of paperwork involved in each check case.

When Judge Dean became a fulltime magistrate judge on January 1, the DA began filing those cases in Carrizozo, said Wheeler. He said the Carrizozo court is able to handle the check

cases since the overall caseload is lighter there.

While the cases are not showing up in large numbers in the Ruidoso courtroom, the heavy volume is continuing. Wheeler, who still has a number of check cases on file, said he usually resolves them by collecting the check amount, plus a \$15 service charge to the merchant, a DA's fee of from \$5 to \$50 and court costs of about \$20.

"The merchant ought to be more careful," warned Wheeler.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—I get to be governor for a day.

Governor Garrey Carruthers put the request to me about like this: "McCaffrey, you've been telling me how to run things around here with such intensity, I'd like to invite you to join me. Spend one 24-hour day with me, doing everything I do during that time, just to see what the job is like."

I have agreed to accept his challenge, and between us, we will choose a day on which this is to happen.

The exchange that set this up was accomplished with many smiles, lots of laughs and a final handshake to close the deal. Underneath the surface, though, certain things not said were being communicated.

Clearly the Governor meant me to understand at least these things, expressed here in my words, not his: —You, columnist, do not really appreciate the extent and depth of this job, so your comments on it are of dubious validity.

—You think you're so smart, but you need a little humbling.

—There's something to both of those notions—but not much.

The Governor has clearly been stung by those columns by me that criticize him, which he sees so frequently in his daily roundup of what the press is saying about him. (Previous governors, I have reason to believe, have been sheltered from reading what it is I have to say, as an aid to their digestion. Carruthers wants to read everything the papers say about him, so he gets my words as part of the package.)

Underneath the joking, there are some very valid questions that deserve our consideration.

One is whether or not those of us in the news business do acquire any knowledge of what it takes to succeed in the jobs we write so much about.

The answer to that is that we do not get a chance to experience the actual day-to-day, hour-to-hour grind, which is part of the message Governor Carruthers is addressing to me. That doesn't mean, however, that we don't become pretty expert on what it takes to do the job.

It's true that drama critics don't always make the best persons to play

Hamlet on Broadway, and sports writers may not be able to function at third base in the big leagues. Still, observing those who do play Hamlet and those who do cover third base over many years teaches us something about what is required to do those jobs properly, and allows us to distinguish between those who do them well and those who do them poorly.

During an election campaign, for example, "the boys and girls on the bus," as political reporters are called, really do get a better-than-average feel for which of the candidates should be elected.

If you don't think the national press corps had a pretty accurate feeling about what kind of man Richard Nixon was long before Watergate, you underestimate their competence. The trouble is that most of those in the news business are expected to communicate to you only what are referred to as "facts." If they have any judgments (and every one of them does), they are expected to suppress them and be totally "fair" in what they say.

I don't operate under that disadvantage. This paper publishes my columns with no pretense that the words they contain are anything but my opinion. They are not objective and factual, nor are they meant to be. They are my judgments from what I observe of state government from a relatively privileged position in Santa Fe. The purpose for printing them is not to force them on you or to ask you to submit your thoughts to mine; it is simply to stir your own thinking on what happens here, in the general belief that a more thoughtful electorate makes for a better government.

Thus, if following Governor Carruthers around for 24 hours gives me a better understanding of the job he has to do, I'm glad he offered me that opportunity. I'll tell you what I think after I have had that experience.

When I do, however, what I say will be strictly my views, just as this column and all other columns I write will be. Despite the fact that my words hurt him a little bit, I'm sure that Governor Carruthers at his best wouldn't really want it any other way.

Time trials will determine Kansas Futurity field

More than 240 young quarter horses face the electronic timer this weekend at Ruidoso Downs in 26 elimination trials for the \$600,000 Kansas Futurity - the opening leg of the mountain track's famed Triple Crown.

Friday's program spotlights 124 hopefuls in the first 13 divisions. Only the five horses posting the fastest times down Ruidoso's 350-yard straightaway will advance to the final of the Kansas Futurity on May 31. The remaining five berths will be filled from Saturday's 13 elimination heats. First post each day is 1 p.m. Friday's program opens with a \$14,705 Twin Trifecta carryover.

Friday's 10th race should attract considerable attention as jockey Mike Lidberg pilots Holymolyitsastreaker from the No. 6 post position. The Streakin Six son takes his bow at Ruidoso Downs off a close win in the \$138,000 West Texas Futurity on March 22 at Sunland Park.

The Texas-bred gelding upset top qualifier Shoot Yeah in the West Texas to earn \$55,000 for owner Tommy Joe Hoyt of Powderly, Texas. Trainer Terrell Davidson will be seeking his first Kansas trophy with Holymolyitsastreaker.

Shoot Yeah went on to capture the \$200,000 Sun Country Futurity last month at Sunland. The Easy

Jet colt will make his bid for the Kansas in Saturday's fourth trial heat.

Quarter horse specialist Jacky Martin takes the assignment aboard Elaines Beduino in Friday's sixth race. Martin qualified the Beduino filly for the West Texas Futurity, but opted to ride Shoot Yeah in the final.

The Texas-bred miss is owned by Clarence Scharbauer of Midland, Texas, who recently went to the winner's circle of the 1987 Kentucky Derby with Alvsheba.

Elaines Beduino faces a royally bred field in her Kansas division that includes Eye For Cash, What An Effort and Meddlin Dash.

Another horse to watch in Friday's Kansas trials could be Sun Country Futurity finalist Border Express. Sired by Special Effort, Border Express will break from the No. 4 post position in the seventh Kansas trial with Casey Lambert in the irons.

Special Effort is the only horse in 23 years to have won all three legs of Ruidoso's Triple Crown. The feat was accomplished in 1961 when trainer Johnie Goodman and rider W.R. Hunt teamed to win the Kansas, Rainbow and All American Futurities. No other horse has ever monopolized the series.

Veteran reinsman Luke Myles nabbed the early lead in the rider standings during the opening weekend at Ruidoso Downs, while Dwayne Gilbreath and Arnold Simmons shared the No. 1 spot on the trainer's list.

Myles booted home three winners from 10 mounts over two racing programs for a respectable 30 percent win percentage. He finished no worse than third for eight of those trips to tally an eye-catching 80 percent in-the-money figure. His efforts qualified two horses to the final of the \$227,000 Kansas Derby on May 24.

Myles is followed in the standings by Henry Uriegas, Jerry Nicodemus, Jacky Martin, Glen Murphy, Joe Martinez, Terry Layton, John Cushing, David Lidberg and Steve Fuller.

On the backside, Gilbreath and Simmons both saddled two winners over the weekend and will compete against one another in the Kansas Derby.

Gilbreath sent out two qualifiers in Sunday's trials - Strictly Wicked and Cash Wagon - who were both ridden by Myles. Simmons checked in second on the qualifying list with 1986 All American Futurity winner Ronas Ryon.

Bill Leach follows the top two conditioners. He'll send out Hennesy Hope in the Derby. Jerry Lazenby, who is fourth in the standings, qualified Gilda Ryon and Just Dashing By.

Rounding out the top 10 trainers are William Thompson, Jimmie Claridge, Jack Dube, Wayne Buehrer, Bobby Crenshaw and Matt Mattox.
