

Airport is designed to handle DC9s, 737s

Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, only a dream for the past 10 years, is fast approaching reality with an expected opening date of November 30.

Airport administrator Fred Heckman, former chairman of the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC), said Friday he believes that November 30 opening date is realistic.

And even as progress escalates with earthmoving, paving and lighting contracts under way, questions continue to surface over what kind of facilities will be available on November 30, and what the capabilities and limitations of the multi-million dollar Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA) will be.

Heckman took time Friday to describe what will be completed on the aircraft side before the operational target date of November 30.

Heckman said the runway will be 8,100 feet long and 140 feet wide with a full four inches of paving. He said the full length of the runway will have two inches of paving with a two-inch overlay over a 100-foot-wide surface. He said a runway shoulder will consist of 11 feet of paving on each side with nine feet of compacted earth on each outside edge.

The next phase in SBRA develop-

ment plans calls for widening the runway to 150 feet wide.

"This configuration of runway brings us into full compliance with the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) design group three classification of airport," said Heckman after talking with FAA official Ray Hampton.

A class three designation, according to FAA, indicates an air facility is designed to handle fully loaded DC9s and 737s. Heckman said weights on those aircraft vary from 80,000-140,000 pounds, but the average gross loading is 115,000 pounds.

"Therefore, we can handle a DC9 or 737, fully loaded, on a regularly scheduled basis," said Heckman. The FAA determines a regularly scheduled basis as a minimum of 1,200 operations a year.

At an official airport altitude of 6,810.4 feet, weather still will be a factor for fully loaded large aircraft. Heckman said during the hottest seasons when temperatures climb to 100 degrees or higher, pilots and airport personnel will have to carefully compute the effects of gross weight and temperatures given the length of runway.

"What these figures tell us is that the airport is designed to handle day-in, day-out operations of aircraft up to 150,000 pounds," noted Heckman.

Although 727s haven't been manufactured for the past eight years, they still are important to the SBRA since they are used by many charter operations, said Heckman. He said the 727 is a "critical design aircraft," since it is harder on an airport runway than any other model.

Heckman said the 727 200 or stretch series planes have a maximum gross weight of 180,000 pounds distributed over four high-pressure tires, causing them to be hard on runway surfaces.

"This airport we are building can handle the 727 stretch on a charter basis—less than 1,200 operations a year," said Heckman, adding the facility will be certified to handle 727 operations on that basis.

"We've simply got to be more observant about what we're doing," said Heckman. He said if a fully-loaded 727 200 series plans to land at noon on June 25, someone has to check and see if there's a hole in the runway.

Most 727s expected to use the SBRA will be of the 100 series, with a gross weight of 150,000 pounds, said Heckman.

"Physically there's no reason the airport can't handle any charter or commercial airline that wants to come in here," said Heckman.

He predicted that most operations will be in 737s and DC9s since those are the most commonly used

from major airports to feeder airports, such as the SBRA.

In discussions on funding, Heckman said no additional funds are expected to be needed to attain an operational airport by November 30.

"We have taken a big chunk out of the FAA budget," said Heckman.

"We have signed federal grants and contracts to get us through this budget and get us an airport," said Heckman. "There will not be a shortfall," he added.

SBAC recently approved a capital budget of \$9,489,631. That document must now be approved by each of the five members of the SBAC joint powers agreement. So far it got the OK from the Ruidoso Village Council, but hasn't been presented to the Lincoln County Commission, Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe or the villages of Capitán and Ruidoso Downs.

Funds for that budget are expected to come from:

—FAA.....\$5,483,723
—State.....200,000
—Ruidoso airport land...2,701,000
—Private investment.....725,179
—Other state and federal funds.....379,729

Heckman said private investors are expected to participate in the development of a T-hangar area, with several different options to be considered.

He said the SBAC could borrow

the money, build T-hangars and amortize the investment over a period of years through rental fees, or free enterprise could build, maintain and lease T-hangar facilities and pay a land-lease and percentage of profits to the commission.

"The commission needs to be very profit-minded about this airport," said Heckman, adding airports of all sizes must be operated so that they pay their own way. He noted that the T-hangar project is SBAC's first income venture.

"We're taking it slow," he added. Heckman then explained that figures from other area airports were considered, along with Ruidoso Municipal Airport statistics, to draft a proposed eight-month operations budget of \$361,130.

"The commission's instructions to the airport manager, whoever that is, will be that you will break even," said Heckman. He said the master plan predicted an operations deficit for the first two years, but the commission is instructing the manager to make a profit the first year.

"We'll tell the manager he can spend only what he makes," said Heckman. The budget estimates revenues of \$107,138 from rents, \$231,963 from fuel sales and \$22,029 from miscellaneous sales.

The operations budget estimates

the following expenses:

—Personnel.....\$100,000
—Administration.....28,000
—Maintenance.....17,300
—Fuel Cost.....118,600
—Legal & Professional.....44,400
—Start-up & moving.....20,000
—Contingencies.....32,830

Heckman stressed that the operations budget is subject to change since it involves so many unknown variables.

With funding secured and construction contracts on schedule, Heckman said the airport will be operational "for all practical purposes" on November 30.

He said construction schedules remain right on target with the earthmoving contract to be complete in July and the paving contract to begin in June.

"I feel my benefit to the commission is drawing rapidly to a close," said Heckman Friday. He said he's anxious to pass his administrative duties on to the airport manager and get back to his real estate business.

"I'm prepared to move on to something else," said Heckman, who has been involved in this project from the very beginning, serving as the first chairman of the SBAC.

"The fun is getting the thing built," said Heckman.

Racing wrapup

Shoot Yeah captures Kansas Futurity

Shoot Yeah became the richest 2-year-old quarter horse in the country with an impressive victory in Sunday's Kansas Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

The one-length winning margin earned \$163,000 for 21-year-old Liese Gulliksen of Lawton, Oklahoma. The chestnut colt was a birthday present last year from her father, who purchased the horse for \$15,000 in the All American Select Sale at Ruidoso Downs.

The 37th running of the Kansas Futurity found Shoot Yeah sharing 5-2 odds with Holymolytastreaker - the horse who defeated him in the West Texas Futurity this spring at Sunland Park Race Course. The slight favorite of 3,966 fans on hand for the opening leg of the quarter horse Triple Crown was Dash For Speed, a filly who had made her first career appearance in trials for the Kansas Futurity.

When the gates flew open for the Kansas, rider Jacky Martin took Shoot Yeah to a heads-up battle with Dash For Speed as they broke side-by-side from the No. 6 and No. 7 post positions.

"My horse was head-and-head with Dash For Speed for a few strides," Martin commented after

the race. "He was right with them the first couple of jumps and after that it was all over with. I looked over to see where Holymolytastreaker was and knew I had the race won."

Martin took a commanding lead midway through the race and continued to draw away from Dash For Speed. The official winning margin was one length with a final time of 17.66 seconds. Lady Pass Oak raced an even third, while Holymolytastreaker made a strong late charge to finish fourth.

Trainer Jack Brooks said Shoot Yeah is "one of the better colts that I've had through the years."

"I feel real good. His performance today gives us a lot of hope for the Triple Crown. It's hard to come by horses that run as well as this one," the Oklahoma horseman said.

Martin, who was notching his third Kansas Futurity win, agreed that Shoot Yeah is a leading candidate to be the second horse in 24 years to win all three legs of Ruidoso's Triple Crown.

"He came back sound today and if he stays sound he'll be hard to outrun in the Rainbow and All American futurities."

A relative newcomer to the sport of horse racing, Gulliksen was making her second trip the winner's circle of a major racing event. Shoot Yeah won the \$200,000 Sun Country Futurity at Sunland Park in April.

"I came to Ruidoso Downs last year with my parents and fell in love with the sport. Then my dad put this horse in my name," Gulliksen said. "I'm hooked. They're not going to get me away from it now."

The Kansas Futurity winner's purse pushed Shoot Yeah's earnings this year to more than \$240,000. He's won four of six races and finished no worse than third in the remaining two starts.

Bob Blakeman of Fort Worth's Blakeman Farms earned \$68,000 for Dash For Speed's second-place finish. Larry Keiter conditions the filly. The Oakhill Trio partnership pocketed \$32,000 for Lady Pass Oak's third under veteran rider Jerry Nicodemus. Holymolytastreaker's fourth was worth \$22,500 to Tommy Joe Hoyt of Powderly, Texas.

Easy A Win finished fifth followed by Eye For Cash, Chickazita, Elans Special, Special Volley and By By Yawl.

Two fans bust \$166,000 Twin Trifecta

Two fans split a \$166,000 Twin Trifecta pool on Friday at Ruidoso Downs while Go Paz Go raced to an upset victory in the \$37,000 Kansas Futurity 2nd Consolation.

Friday's wagering total was up 40 percent over the same day last year when 2,660 fans bet \$360,000.

After eluding fans for nine consecutive programs, two winning tickets were cashed in the track's Twin Trifecta events. Friday's pool grew to \$166,000 when railbirds bet another \$85,000 chasing the large carryover.

One of the winners was a Ruidoso businessman who shared his ticket with a couple visiting from Las

Cruces. They spent \$300 to collect the \$83,000 Twin Trifecta payoff. The remaining winner was a professional horse player from El Paso who wagered \$1,600 for the large return.


Friday's Kansas Futurity 2nd Consolation resulted in a minor upset when 5-1 shot Go Paz Go posted a nose verdict over 20-1 longshot Lantys Gal. Both horses are trained by Oklahoman Jack Brooks, who saddled three of the contenders.

Veteran rider Luke Myles had Go Paz Go away from the gates quickly and was never headed for the 350-yard journey that stopped the

timer in 18.07 seconds. The effort earned \$6,000 for Delores Hill of Moore, Ok.

Don Moore of Dell City, Ok., campaigns Lantys Gal. Brooks gave the leg-up to Thane Zufelt for the filly's second-place finish that earned \$5,600.

Rocket Shawnee finished third under jockey Jeff Williams, followed by Go Vik, Mr Special Bug and Blue Moon Dude. Cash Project, Dashing Encounter and Yukon Tuesday were early scratches, while Make Jos Day was withdrawn Friday morning after suffering an insect bite.

Jockey Salustio Burgos overcame traffic problems aboard the powerful filly Lacrosse to post a narrow victory in Saturday's Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

Saturday's Kindergarten Futurity featured 10 New Mexico-bred thoroughbreds chasing a \$45,000 purse over Ruidoso's 5-furlong course.

Spend, a 45-1 longshot ridden by David Lidberg, took the early lead as the field raced through fairly slow fractions. Burgos settled Lacrosse on the rail racing eighth through the backstretch. He ran out of running room as the field rounded the turn and was forced to steady

his mount.

"I was a little worried," Burgos said after the race. "I thought we might never get through there, but it came out all right. I give all the credit to the filly. She ran a game race."

Burgos maneuvered between horses at the head of the stretch and took Lacrosse back to the rail for a heads-up battle with Spend through the final furlong. Lacrosse ran down the leader in the final strides to win by a nose with a final time of 1:00.4.

Howard Beddo of Anthony, N.M., owns the daughter of Scout Leader that he also bred. Fred Danley gave the leg-up to Burgos for the victory

that earned \$22,600.

Jack L. Fry checked in two lengths behind Spend for third, followed by Strokomo, V.J. Pullaway, Shutup And Deal, Our Little Scout, Majolica, Drakon and Happy Draconic.

Spend flies the colors of El Paso A.D. Bowen and Robert Kellerman of Fort Worth. Cecil Crabtree conditions the Draconic colt who banked \$10,000 second-place money.





Governor's man supports New Mexico artists

New Mexico is one of a handful of states that has an art gallery in the capitol building, said James Rutherford who directs that gallery for Governor Garrey Carruthers.

Rutherford, in Ruidoso Friday and Saturday for the Lincoln County Show of Art, said the governor's gallery was started in 1975, by Georgia Apodaca, and has continued as a means to promote art in New Mexico. A Georgia O'Keefe exhibit was the first offered in the Roundhouse gallery, said Rutherford.

Appointed by Governor Toney Anaya over a year ago, Rutherford was asked by Carruthers to remain on his staff. "I had a good

schedule," noted Rutherford.

The objective set forth under the current administration is to display work of living New Mexico artists in group settings of one or two people, explained Rutherford. He said the governor and first lady host a reception during each exhibit.

The governor's office is the focal point in a plan to promote New Mexico artists as an important natural resource, said Rutherford. Besides hanging work in the gallery, he said art is taken on loan for the governor's office and residence.

Rutherford said the current administration is taking a "much more positive tone" and he is

receiving a great deal of support from the governor's office.

"I try to travel around the state as much as I can," said Rutherford, adding he likes to meet and encourage New Mexico artists.

"We're building files on New Mexico artists," said Rutherford. He said artists can submit slides, photographs and a resume to him through the governor's office in Santa Fe.

Rutherford, commenting on the beauty of the area, said Lincoln County is particularly lucky to have many fine artists.

Lincoln County art was displayed recently in the foyer outside the

governor's office. An exhibition of paintings by Dr. Ken Barrick and sculptures by Frank McGuire is in the Governor's Gallery through Friday, June 12. "Art from other Places," a group of work by inmates of the Department of Corrections, will then be displayed for two weeks, to be followed on July 20 by an exhibit of native American sculpture.

A native New Mexican, Rutherford was born and raised in Albuquerque, received his education at the University of New Mexico and went into the art business in California.

And so, Ruidoso, our city in the pines, travels along joyfully, one of the finest places in the world to live and be happy. And our country is in good hands with the graduation of fine young Americans like the Ruidoso High School graduates.

"I think all the kids did real well," said Ruidoso High School


head boys track coach Ronny Maskew. "Especially considering they had just graduated from high school the night before and they probably didn't have as much rest as they usually have had."

Fish stocking may increase

Fish may soon be stocked in several areas above the first bridge in the Rio Ruidoso in the Upper Canyon.

At present, the only place in the Upper Canyon trout are stocked is around the first bridge. Above the first bridge, there are a number of private property signs posted, which have deterred fishermen from fishing in the area.

State law rules that fish cannot be stocked less than one quarter mile upstream or less than 200 yards downstream from an area that is closed to public fishing.

But things should change soon, according to Ruidoso village manager Frank Potter.

"We plan on having village employees putting up 'fishing allowed' signs above the first bridge in the near future," Potter said. "I've talked to some owners up there (the Upper Canyon) and they don't care if people fish there or not."

In the past, Department of Fish and Game employees have stocked fish in areas at the second bridge and above.

But for almost three months, the Fish and Game employees have just been stocking fish in the Rio Ruidoso up to the first bridge in the Upper Canyon and not beyond.

But the stocking of trout above the first bridge was stopped when fishermen became concerned that trout were being stocked in areas that were posted.



"We know that restaurant workers' problems are our problems ... they are hard workers ... we work with them," said Bonnie Richardson. "To remain competitive we go with the market and don't always buy from the same source."

While food products have been their main business, Ruidoso Wholesale Foods has recently hired salesman Bill Meyers to handle their new line of janitorial supplies.

Ten-year veteran salesman Darold Moorhead says that while things may be a bit slow now, he expects to be putting in some 12-hour days with summer right around the corner.


Convention Adopts Rules

The Rules Committee of the Convention, appointed at the end of last week, and consisting of Mr. Hamilton, Mr. Wythe and Mr. Charles Pinckney, reported to the Deputies on Monday.

All questions are to be decided by a majority of the states present. The members agreed to this Proposition which indicates they wish to ensure each state has an Equal Voice in Convention. The Pennsylvania delegation had put it about that the Small States would be refused an equal voice as their interests made them untrusty.

No Vote of the Convention is to be considered binding; all questions may be reopened if a delegation wishes. Mr. Spaight of North-Carolina introduced this rule, which met with general approval because members expect their opinions to change and develop as they listen to arguments and do not wish to be restrained by Earlier Votes.

The affairs of the Convention are to be conducted in the Greatest Secrecy. Only members are permitted to consult the Journal of the Convention, and no one may make copies from it without the Leave of the House. Nothing spoken in the House may be communicated without Leave of the Members in any way whatsoever.

GORHAM AND STRONG OF MASSACHUSETTS ARRIVE

Last week Rufus King of Massachusetts complained that he was the only New England representative at Philadelphia. His complaint must have echoed all the way back to Boston because today two of his fellow Massachusetts Delegates took their seats in the Pennsylvania State House to discuss the problems of our National Charter.

The tardy arrivals were Nathaniel Gorham and Caleb Strong. Gorham is a forty-nine year old Boston merchant and Land Owner. He has been the Speaker of the Massachusetts House of Representatives and has served on the Massachusetts Board of War and the State's Constitutional Convention. He is currently in the Continental Congress, serving as President of that body. He served a previous term from 1782-1783.

Gorham has been described as an "old Patriot," "indifferently educated but likeable," and possessing "nothing fashionable or elegant in his style." Nevertheless, Gorham submitted his name for nomination as Chairman of the Committee of the Whole, a body that will be convening shortly. Most political pundits give him a good chance at being elected to the position.

Caleb Strong is the son of a tanner and has trained himself in the law. He helped draft the Massachusetts Constitution but has done little else to distinguish himself prior to his service at this Philadelphia meeting. His manners are "plain and easy" according to most observers at today's meeting.

Both Gorham and Strong will have their work cut out for them if they expect to hold their own in deliberations with fellow Massachusetts delegate Rufus King, King has made it very clear that he intends to speak for Their State.

DELAWARE'S ATTORNEY GENERAL TAKES HIS SEAT(S) IN STATE HOUSE

Gunning Bedford, Jr. Esq., waddled into the Pennsylvania State House this morning and took his seat. Bedford, the forty-year old Attorney General from Delaware, has already distinguished himself by his Suspicious and Defiant attitude of the meeting in general and the Pennsylvania delegates in particular. He has made it clear that he intends to Champion the cause of equal representation for Small States.

Bedford's previous service to his State includes a period in the Delaware Legislature and Council and two years in the Continental Congress, from 1783 to 1785. He was selected to attend last year's Convention in Annapolis, but refused to go. He now becomes the fourth Delaware deputy to arrive.

Considered sociable and an excellent conversationalist by his friends, the tall and very fat Bedford can be impetuous and a real Trouble Maker. William Pierce notes that he is "precipitate in his judgment and very corpulent." The approaching summer could bring both natural and man-made heat at the State House!

McHENRY FIRST MARYLAND DELEGATE TO ARRIVE

Dr. James McHenry, thirty-four year old Irish-born Baltimore physician, was the first Maryland deputy to arrive at the meeting currently going on at the Pennsylvania Statehouse.

McHenry's background includes a period of service in the Continental Army where he served as Military Secretary to General Washington and as an aide to the Marquis de Lafayette. He has been a member of the Maryland Legislature and of the Continental Congress from 1783 to 1785.

The meticulous surgeon has a well-deserved reputation as a precise note-taker and will undoubtedly continue this during the meeting, although General Washington has made it very clear to all delegates that absolutely No Information from the deliberations be given to the press or general public.

McHenry's stay in Philadelphia is very uncertain at this date due to the serious illness of his brother in Baltimore which might call him home at any moment.

The Convention Begins Its Work

With the rules of the Convention being settled by Tuesday morning, His Excellency, Governor Edmund Randolph of Virginia, rose and addressed the delegates. With his speech the real work of the meeting began. Many members, knowing how influential Virginia has been in arranging the Convention, expected that Virginia would take the lead in determining its direction. They were not disappointed. Mr. Randolph presented Fifteen Resolves which are no more or less than the plan for a New Government for the United States. He spoke lengthily on the defects and weaknesses of the Confederation, in many directions. For none of these problems did he hold the founders of the Confederation responsible because, at the time the Articles were drawn up, the Founders were fighting the British. Nevertheless, all Americans now know from experience the defects of the existing government. A new government must remedy those Defects and secure the Objects of the Confederation which were, he said, "the common defense, the preservation of liberty, and the general welfare."

To the surprise of some, Mr. Charles Pinckney of South-Carolina then presented a plan of his own devising, which he indicated he wished members to consider. Mr. Pinckney is but twenty-nine years old, one of the youngest delegates, and it cannot be expected that His Plan will be accorded the same attention as the mature reflections of Mr. Randolph and the members of his Distinguished Delegation. Some members indicated privately they thought the young gentleman presumptuous in bring his Frame of Government to the Convention at all! The same gentleman predicted that it would receive no further consideration. The hour then being late, it was decided to adjourn and to meet the next day as a Committee of the Whole to consider the State of the American Union.

THE NEXT DAY

The next day, with Mr. Nathaniel Gorham of Massachusetts in the chair, the delegates considered the fifteen Virginia Resolves. It is expected that the extent of what is known as the Virginia Plan and its radical character will cause long and possible contentious discussions, perhaps lasting several weeks.

It was objected at once that the First Resolve, calling as it does for the correction and enlargement of the Articles of Confederation, was not in accord with the remaining Resolves which represent what is, in fact, a New Frame of government. As a substitution, the members agreed to a resolution calling for a National

Government consisting of a Supreme Legislative, Executive and Judiciary. The word "National" was a hindrance to some members, one of whom asked Mr. Randolph whether the states would continue to exist at all under the Virginia Plan. To allay the doubts of Members, Mr. Gouverneur Morris of Pennsylvania and Mr. James Madison of Virginia explained that the words "National" and "Supreme" indicated that the government would have the compulsive character which Congress now lacked, resting as it did only on the good faith of the States. Connecticut alone voted against this Resolve, although the vote of New York was divided and, therefore, not counted.

The Committee of the Whole then moved at once to a consideration of the Second Resolve which specifies that representation in the National Legislature shall be according to the amount of taxes paid, or according to the numbers of Free Inhabitants. This resolve was certain to be contentious because the states with small populations are bound, under it, to lose the equality of influence they now have in Congress where each state receives one vote regardless of size. Mr. Reed of Delaware became excited during the discussion that followed and asked that consideration of the Resolve be postponed, pointing out that his delegation might be forced to withdraw from the Convention should discussion continue on an issue which the Delaware members were forbidden by their Instructions from voting for any change whatsoever. Mr. Morris and Mr. Madison intervened to prevent the secession of a delegation at so early a stage of the proceedings. But observers report that Mr. Madison was much more conciliatory than Mr. Morris, the latter insisting that a change in the proportion of representation of the states was Fundamental and could not be dispensed with. Mr. Madison suggested that the question be postponed and the Members agreed to this.

In comparison, the issue of whether or not the Legislature should consist of two houses or not was agreed to without difficulty. Most states already have Legislatures consisting of two houses, an arrangement which most Delegates apparently find satisfactory.

By Saturday instant, delegations from Eleven States are represented in Convention. There is no news from New Hampshire, and of course none is expected from Rhode-Island. However, a letter has been received from certain Respectable Citizens of that State deploring their lack of representation at the Convention, and begging that their commercial interests be taken into consideration by the other Delegates.

Full Complement Reached

Pennsylvania's eight-man contingent of deputies reached its Full Complement today with the arrival of George Clymer, Jared Ingersoll and Thomas Mifflin. They joined Dr. Franklin who is back at the State House after a bout with his infirmities.

Clymer, a forty-eight year old Philadelphia merchant, was a member of the Continental Congress from 1776 to 1777 and from 1780 to 1782. He signed the Declaration of Independence during his first period of service. He has also been on the Pennsylvania Council of Safety and has been a member of the Pennsylvania legislature.

Mr. Clymer has a reputation for being very effective in caucus work, but generally defers to others in large groups. He has already expressed strong reservations about the rumored creation of Western states, calling it "suicide" for the Thirteen States.

Jared Ingersoll, Esq., born in Connecticut thirty-eight years ago, has been called the "ablest lawyer in Philadelphia." His well-known reputation for hospitality in the Quaker City will undoubtedly be enjoyed by Convention delegates. Ingersoll served in the Continental Congress in 1780 and later was Attorney General. He has spoken out and written often of the need for revising and supplementing the Articles of Confederation. This modest, quiet man will have his work cut out for him if he hopes to get his ideas heard at the meeting now going on at the State House.

Major General Thomas Mifflin, forty-three years of age, rounds out the Pennsylvania delegation. Mifflin served as an aide to General Washington, and as Quartermaster General in the Continental Army. He has been an active Quaker Merchant in Philadelphia and was the Speaker of the Pennsylvania Legislature. His service in the Continental Congress (1774-75 and 1782-84) included a term as President from 1783 to 1784. He and his Charming Quaker wife, Sarah, are expected to host out-of-state Delegates during the Summer.



Southern Capitals Relocate


The setting of the seats of government of Georgia and the Carolinas in Coastal Centers has long been a vexation to the many planters moving westward. Long journeys to the coast, on matters of law and business, were an inconvenience to many. Thus it is these states have relocated their capitals to the midst of the population.

Georgia led the way in 1785, by establishing the Seat of Government at Augusta, some one hundred miles upriver from its former place at Savannah. South-Carolina, never slow to display her love for liberty, and trust in the wisdom and virtue of her people, has set the springs in motion for a similar westward move from Charleston. This past session of the legislature authorized establishment of a new capital, called Columbia, at the confluence of the Saluda and Broad Rivers. Even now, public buildings are rising, and work on a fine new State House is commenced on Mr. Taylor's plantation. It is anticipated that the legislature shall remove thence during the next year.

Perhaps inspired by these exertions by her neighbors, North-Carolina, is at work on the same task of seeking a site whence the government might relocate. New Berne, the capital since 1774, pleases none but the most Local Interests. The legislature has, it is reported, approved the plan of seeking a new seat, but awaits finding a site that recommends itself agreeably to all parties. Discussion centers upon Wake Court House, some hundred miles westward from New Berne, a site near the Neuse River.

LENDING A HELPING HAND IN THE MIDDLE EAST

Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—Almost nowhere but in government can you start your career at the top.

It's not just a governor who gets himself elected with almost no prior applicable experience who does that. So do lots of those he taps for top jobs in his administration. If you don't credit that, ask the veteran state employees who are busy at just this time breaking in the greenhorns who have been placed over them.

Right now, for instance, here in New Mexico we have cabinet secretaries who may be fine folks with lots of skills but who have never run anything like the agency they now are running. Such people can be found at Economic Development and Tourism, Regulation and Licensing, Natural Resources, General Services and Public Safety. In addition, Lou Gallegos at Human Services, while he has cogitate experience, must find lots that he has to make decisions on new to him as well.

That's a big portion of state government to be headed up by those who are in practice to one extent or another especially when you note that the governor who named them to these jobs is in more or less the same category.

This positioning of inexperienced newcomers in top posts is most dramatic, of course, when the party affiliation of the man making the appointments changes, as it has here this year.

Democrats, who are in charge most of the time in New Mexico whether we like it or not, tend to develop a cadre of utility administrators who can, theoretically at least, be dropped down to run almost any department. Leo Griego would be one recent example of that; he headed personnel under Bruce King, and then moved to Natural Resources for Imney Anaya when the first choice for that job turned sour. Griego is so capable of functioning almost anywhere that he even made the transition to a Republican administration; he's now on the payroll of the Land Commissioner, where other Democrats have also foregathered.

And then there's Ron Lloyd, another man-of-all-work under the Democrats, who appears to be on his way to a top job under the Republicans. He has experience at Taxation and Revenue, as well as at the Transportation Department, when

Democrats were in office; and he seems to be slated to become Cabinet Secretary for Tax and Rev when Vickie Fisher, the boss there now, leaves government.

Reportedly, the GOP guys at the top also plan to back Lloyd up with Franklin Jones as legal counsel at T and R. Jones, of course, is another switchhitter, who reappears under Democratic and Republican governors alike.

As of now, nobody knows who will be named to head the Department of Agriculture or Cultural Affairs, both of which posts become vacant shortly.

Governor Carruthers did find professionals in the field whose political affiliation did not interfere with their being named to head Finance and Administration, Corrections, Health and Environment, the Highway Department and the new Department of Labor.

In the business world from which so many Republicans seem to come there is a theory that a manager is a manager is a manager. Somebody who has his or her MBA from the proper school, the theory goes, can run a manufacturing plant or a service industry equally easily. Some of us are not so convinced that is so. We further hold that government is sufficiently different from business in so many essential fashions—no profit motive and no merchandising, just to name two—that some very different talents are required in those who succeed in civil service.

Governor Carruthers must agree with that theory. Only two of his choices for cabinet posts come directly from the business world; all the others, himself included, have spent the major part of their careers cashing paychecks that come from some branch of government or another.

Still, what is implied in the first paragraph of this piece is valid. In government service, it is possible to wake up one morning and find yourself named a general without having previously been an officer at anything. Because that's true, it's those career colonels, majors, captains and lieutenants—and, yea verily, even down unto the privates—who keep government humming along, though they aren't the ones who get their names embossed on the letterheads.

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Reporter's Round

What a place to spend the summer.

No wonder everyone wants to come here. The mountains are great, there's a beautiful view everywhere you turn, the air is clean and the people are so friendly.

This is the kind of place where you can kick back and watch the tourists go by, take it easy and forget about the world's problems. But I just can't help wondering...

Is the Supreme Court slowly dismantling our personal rights? People accused of crimes can now be jailed without bail while awaiting trial if a judge decides they are a threat to public safety.

Some people think this is a great idea, especially if they are familiar with the Terry Clark case. He was out on bail when he murdered a little girl here in New Mexico. Others may find this recent ruling a little hard to swallow. Those who stand wrongfully accused will pay a bitter price if they are denied bail under this ruling, and if your imagination is active you can probably think up a few "worst case" scenarios yourself.

An Associated Press story that ran in the May 27 issue of the Albuquerque Journal said that the court ruled that jailing someone who is deemed dangerous does not violate that person's rights or the presumption that they are innocent until proven guilty. This ruling was based on a 6-3 vote.

Justice Thurgood Marshall called the ruling "an ominous exercise in demolition" of constitutional rights. He also said that in the interests of expediency the court had sacrificed the principle that all citizens are innocent until proven guilty.

As we can see in this case, the most respected men in law, the Supreme Court Justices, differed on this issue. Some said the ruling would violate a person's rights and others said it did not.

With this ruling, a judge, not a jury or a court, but a judge, can deny a person their freedom based on that particular judge's feelings about the accused.

Are the guidelines that serve to protect our individual rights slowly eroding away in the search for more control of our growing social problems, or will this particular ruling serve the best interests of our society?

Editorial

A favorite way for those we elect to get out of a tight budget situation is to raise taxes.

Just ask any member of the state Legislature. They can raise taxes with the best of them, rivaling even the federal government in this regard.

But the Ruidoso Village Council chose to cut their 1987-88 budget, avoiding any tax increase.

Yes, it's true.

Perhaps more remarkable is that they had a tax increase readily available, in the form of an untapped five-mil increase in property tax available at their option. It was there for the taking, and they resisted the temptation.

Instead, they sharpened their pencils and made what no doubt were difficult cuts in the village budget.

That shows a lot of integrity, and may reflect a feeling that "taxpayers" exist for something other than paying higher and higher taxes.
