Village may rework animal control contract

Village clerk/finance director Leon Eggleston told the Ruidoso Village Council Monday the animal control contract will come up for renewal on June 30.

The \$48,000 animal contract, awarded last year to D&J Services, which is owned by Jim Wooldridge, is for three years with an option for yearly review.

Wooldridge is paid \$4,000 a month, including sales tax, and provides an office, telephone, vehicles,

employees, equipment and shelter. He collects pick-up and license fees and turns them into the village along with a monthly activity and revenue report.

"We need to look at all avenues," noted Eggleston. He said he and the village attorney were checking to see if the village can enter into an agreement with the Humane Society to house animals in exchange for providing funds to help complete the Humane Society building.

"We have a consensus—we definitely want to help the Humane Society and do animal control bet-

ter," said Village Councillor Jerry Shaw Monday, after the council discussions.

In a telephone conversation Wednesday, Eggleston said councillors were taking a close look at the animal control contract because they are interested in having stray and lost animals housed by the Humane Society instead of in Fort Stanton. Eggleston said he knew of no problems with the current contract.

He said he learned from Humane Society board member Earlene Phillips that the group now has the

funds to complete its building, which is located on village land.

Eggleston and village manager Frank Potter also described a plan to use the Police Department communications network to receive animal calls and dispatch the animal control officer. The previous contract asked the contractor to supply a telephone and communications equipment.

With the Humane Society possibly providing shelter, and the Police Department providing communications services, then the animal control contract will simply

be for picking up animals, said Eggleston. He said the village should be able to save money if that sort of arrangement is implemented.

If the new contract can't be negotiated by the end of the month, the present agreement can be renewed a month at a time, said Eggleston.

He said Wooldridge has been notified his contract is being reviewed, but when contacted Wednesday, Wooldridge said he hasn't been told his contract is being reconsidered.

"Here's what gets me—it's a

three-year contract up for renewal," said Wooldridge. "They're going to have to have some basis for changing that contract," he added.

Wooldridge said both times he has negotiated a contract with the village he has had problems.

"Somebody always fights it," he said.

But Wooldridge said he's willing to work with the Humane Society.

"I don't even think they realize what they're getting into," said Wooldridge.

Chino blasts Carruthers over water rights case

Wendell Chino, president of the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe, criticized Governor Garrey Carruthers Tuesday for granting state funds to help fight tribal claims to water in the Hondo stream system, according to published reports.

An El Paso Times story quoted Chino as comparing Carruthers' position in the water rights battle to the "anti-Indian" views of his former boss, U.S. Interior Secretary James Watt.

The Department of Finance last week authorized a \$75,000 emergency grant to help Lincoln and Chaves counties gather information to use in the upcoming court battle over water rights throughout the Hondo stream system.

Hubert Quintana, director of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District, said last week the grant will be administered through the Department of Natural Resources and used to develop technical evidence in the case.

But, according to the Times article, Chino claimed the counties will use the grant to help the Water Defense Association, a group of Lincoln County water right owners. He said donating state funds to a

private group would violate the state Constitution.

Chino was out of town and unavailable for comment, according to a member of his office staff.

According to the story, Chino disagrees with the state's claims that the tribe is seeking about 18,000 acre-feet of additional water rights, and said the tribe is asking for only 3,400 acre-feet from the Ruidoso, Bonito and Hondo rivers.

Chino reportedly said the state already has spent \$1 million to fight the tribal claims, and criticized Carruthers for "shelling out" \$75,000 more.

The federal government has joined with the tribe in the extended lawsuit, and an attorney for the Water Defense Association has stated several times that the government has spent well over \$2 million in the suit.

Carruthers, while in Lincoln County last month, told area citizens the state will help them protect their water rights and fight challenges to those rights by the tribe. He said the state will have limited funds to contribute, but will offer information to help prepare a case.

Suspicious grave actually contains pet remains


Bones found Tuesday in a shallow grave on U.S. Forest Service land near Hale Lake turned out to be those of an animal, according to Chief Deputy Rex Skellett of the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office.

What was originally reported as the "decomposed body of a child," was discovered early Tuesday by hunters in the isolated area about 15 miles from Ruidoso.

Sheriff Don Samuels, Skellett and investigator Paul Wersich responded to the call and found a wooden box, about three feet long and 12 to 18 inches wide, buried about two feet deep. A partially chewed-up lid was found several feet from the box. The box contained an assortment of small bones and the remains of a plastic bag.

"Something really stout got into that," noted Samuels, speculating that a wild animal had dug up the box and chewed off the nailed-down lid.


Although the bones in the box were not identified at the scene, Skellett said Wednesday a laboratory test on one bone reveal-



ed them to be those of an animal. Skellett said the bones were apparently the remains of someone's pet. He said Sheriff's deputies

reburied the hand-made casket and its contents in the same location, but deeper.

Saragosa survivors

Ruidosoan spins tale of relatives who rode out twister

"Everything is rubble," said Jo Perryman of Ruidoso, who has just returned from the tornado-devastated town of Saragosa, Texas.

Perryman's sister and brother-in-law, Peggy and Bob Walker, lived on the outskirts of the small West Texas town when it was ravaged by a tornado May 22, leaving 29 dead and the town reduced to rubble.

"They are very thankful to be alive," said Perryman. "They had

no warning at all."

The tornado destroyed the Walker's flagstone ranch home and barn, yet both survived the ordeal.

"Peggy jumped into the closet," Perryman said, "and Bob drove the pick-up into the barn."

Peggy shut the closet door behind her and felt the wind trying to suck it open. She knew if she let go she would go with it. Then she saw the roof go and the wind passed and the closet was one of the few things left intact, Perryman said.

When Bob saw the walls of the barn coming down around him, he

locked the truck's doors and put on his seatbelt. "He rode out the storm in his truck," Perryman said.

Some of the Walker's livestock survived by huddling against the only remaining wall of the barn, but their cherished mule was badly injured and had to be shot, Perryman said.

The tornado left untouched some of Peggy's sewing items on a table in the center of the house. Nearby, a kitchen fork was found driven into a cottonwood tree.

Perryman said the cleanup is go-

ing well and help is pouring in from all over the country.

What they need now are building materials and goods to help sustain them over the long run and for the immediate future they desperately need funds, she said.

P&Z talks timeshares; ponders zoning plan

With just five members present, the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) spent most of its regular meeting Monday in discussions of the proposed zoning ordinance.

Although minutes of the previous meeting weren't available, the commission unanimously approved them.

"You're demonstrating great faith in your staff," said zoning ordinance coordinator Margaret McDonald Lahey. She said staff members are working on getting minutes to the commission on time.

During regular business, commissioners were asked to give reasons for their votes on a rezoning request denied at the last meeting. P&Z turned down a request to rezone property commonly known as the K.O.R. campground from single family residential (R-1) to multi-family residential (R-2).

Owner Eugene Duvall has since appealed that denial to the Ruidoso Village Council.

Lahey said the zoning ordinance requires P&Z, within 30 days, to provide a written report giving reasons for its action. She said the case can be reconsidered at next meeting, and will be discussed during a public hearing before the Village Council.

"Knowing this was timeshare had something to do with my vote," said Commissioner John White, who opposed the rezoning. He said legal discussions did not clarify why timeshare is not a commercial business.

White, presenting written comments, said he considered residential objections, drainage and sewage problems and propane tanks when he voted against the rezoning.

Commissioner Jess Stinson said he favored the rezoning because the planned timeshare development would be a great improvement over the property's present use. He said the development will bring business into the village.

"I think we have too many timeshares," said Commissioner Ellen Long, who opposed the change. She said the commission needs to consider locals as well as tourists.

Commissioner Marie Rooney, also opposing the rezoning, said she noticed on site review that the development is planned directly across from some "pretty homes." Rooney said the many different people using timeshares don't appreciate the area.

P&Z Chairman David Smith said

he voted "yes," but noted it was a confusing issue. He said the commission looked at development plans along with the zone change request, although the two are separate issues.

Smith said the change requested would be more in keeping with the area than a campground, which presently would be allowed, even though it isn't in operation.

"A number of things have come to light that we'll consider in a hearing for additional facts on June 13," said Smith. He said a zoning map was located that shows the property may have been zoned for trailers and mobile homes (R-3).

"If it should never have been before us in the first place because of a wrong reading of the zoning map ... the issue is moot," said village attorney John Underwood.

He asked Lahey to get statements from commissioners Ken Carr, Pete Thompson and Eddie Nichols, all absent Monday.

Tim Collins, agent for the property owner, said he has been asked by the village engineer for additional information on drainage.

"Am I wasting my time?" asked Collins.

"I would not encourage you to put your client through any further expense," said Underwood.

Also Monday the commission heard a request to move a timeshare public relations booth from the Sierra Mall parking lot to the parking lot of Village Auto Repair, also known as El Cheapo Mechanic.

Smith recalled numerous discussions of such booths about a year ago, and the commission postponed acting on the request until some guidelines can be established.

In other regular business P&Z:

—Discussed a proposed policy statement calling for notifying adjacent property owners when a variance is requested. Lahey agreed to rewrite the proposal and bring it back for further consideration at the next meeting.

—Named a sub-committee to work with Lahey on revising the proposed zoning ordinance. Members of the sub-committee are Smith, White and Stinson, with Rooney as an alternate.

—Discussed a list of suggestions submitted by White, and decided to consider them in the sub-committee.

—Heard from Lahey that she has followed the commission's instructions to initiate an ordinance amendment requiring a site plan before placing a trailer on property. Lahey reported she is working with Dan Swearingin on plans to place historic marker signs.

Council reviews paving assessment possibilities

Ruidoso village councillors, during a workshop early Monday, assigned village engineer Mike Davalos to research all aspects of paving assessments proposed for several areas in Ruidoso.

Councillor Victor Alonso reviewed a process that began last year when Pinecliff subdivision residents asked the Village Council to establish a paving assessment district in their area. Alonso recalled

going out for proposals for engineering, finding that those requests for proposals didn't contain enough information and now going back to the village engineer.

"Have you got the time and wherewithal to do this?" asked Alonso. Davalos replied he won't be able to complete the project this summer, and councillors agreed there's no hurry.

Councillor Ray Dean Carpenter noted that after preliminary cost figures are gathered and an informal public hearing is conducted,

the paving would still be six to eight months away.

"Another fact that we have to face is that we don't have any money to go out and hire an engineer," said Carpenter.

Audience-member Tim Collins told the council that property owners could be asked to put up the money to get the project started.

"One of the things we need to decide is what areas," noted village clerk/finance director Leon Eggleston, and Carpenter suggested requests be cut off as of Monday.

"It's been public knowledge for months—that's fair," said Alonso. Councillor Jerry Shaw suggested the assessment should be by subdivisions, not individual streets.

"It seems silly for anybody to even be able to request it," said Shaw, but Alonso said individual requestors shouldn't just be told "no," but instead should be told the cost.

Village manager Frank Potter suggested letting Davalos come up with some estimates to "get the thing at least rolling."

Plans are under way to open County welfare office

Plans to open an income services office in Lincoln County are still being formed, according to Bob Beardsley of the Department of Human Services (DHS).

Lou Gallegos, DHS secretary, announced plans to reopen an income services office when he was in Lincoln County recently with Governor Garrey Carruthers. Since the offices in Ruidoso and Carrizozo were shut down last year, food stamp applicants have been traveling to Chaves, Otero and Socorro counties to complete the required paperwork.

Gallegos said he wants to offer

the services where the people are who need them.

Beardsley said last week that his field services bureau is gathering figures for him on the whole county. He said his office will come up with a plan within the next two weeks.

That plan will be presented to the Lincoln County Commission, said Beardsley.

County commissioners, State Representative Ben Hall and a group of interested citizens met with Gallegos when he was in Lincoln County. They have been pushing for some time to have an office reopened in the county.

Phyllis Boverie, who was part of a group that met with Gallegos in Santa Fe in April, said she will be thrilled when area residents no longer have to drive 40 or more miles to receive state income services.

Boverie, along with Betsy Seiler, Vernell Hightower and Sara Jackson, followed up their visit with Gallegos with a formal proposal for Lincoln County Services.

Boverie said Gallegos asked for the proposal, which included offers from the county commission and the area DHS office of free office space in Carrizozo and Ruidoso.

Beardsley said his office is looking at the proposal now, and will come up with their own plan.

Pleased to have a commitment from Gallegos for a local office, Boverie and Seiler both credit State Representative Hall for getting the issue in front of Gallegos and his staff.

"If it weren't for all Ben's (Hall) help, we would never have gotten this far," noted Boverie.

She and others working for a local office are anxious to hear the state's plan.

Carpenter serves NM as Grand Master of Masons

Ruidoso Village Councillor Ray Dean Carpenter is Grand Master of the Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of New Mexico.

Carpenter was installed in March to head the 66 chartered lodges and 10,600 members in the state. He has been a Mason for 17 years, is past master of Roswell Lodge #18 and Felix Lodge #29 in Hagerman; is past secretary of Ruidoso Lodge #73; and has served as a Grand Lodge officer for the past 11 years.

By the time his year is over, Carpenter will have chartered one more lodge that is now under dispensation.

Carpenter was appointed nine years ago, and has since been "in training" in the Grand Lodge officer line of succession.

"It's quite a training field—you get a lot of training before you become grand master," noted Carpenter.

The grand master serves as administrative head of the state group, and during his year in office Carpenter will visit each of the 16 Masonic districts in the state.

"I've already traveled 6,000 miles

since the first of the year," said Carpenter, who has three of his 16 official district visits behind him.

Carpenter, responsible for making administrative decisions and granting dispensations, spends at least one day a week in the state office in Albuquerque.

The program that Carpenter has set out for his administration includes literacy training and a child identification program. The grand master has one appointed representative in each district to help implement his program through the lodges.

As grand master, Carpenter also serves as chairman of Masonic Relief, a fund used to meet emergency needs of the people of New Mexico. Carpenter noted that most of those funds are allocated to non-Masons.

A new innovation during Carpenter's term is quarterly communications meetings to be conducted in various locations in the state. Since the state group has just one meeting a year, the quarterly get-togethers have been initiated for information and reports.

Carpenter oversees a budget of more than \$100,000 in the general fund and much more in various charitable and designated funds.

After his year as grand master is completed, Carpenter will serve for one year as chairman of Masonic Charities of New Mexico.

Carpenter said he enjoys serving the Masonic Lodge in New Mexico, an organization that was formed 111 years ago. The Masonic Lodge can be dated back in history to 1717, said Carpenter.

"The teachings are so vital to everyday life," said Carpenter, in explaining ways the Masonic Lodge is important to him.

"They are based on the brotherhood of man under the fatherhood of God."



Dashing Phoebe returns in Rainbow Silver Cup trials

The brilliant race mare Dashing Phoebe joins forces with riding legend Jerry Nicodemus on Friday at Ruidoso Downs when the twosome go after their first major purse of the 1987 season in trials for the \$150,000 Rainbow Silver Cup.

Thirty-one horses are scheduled to face off in four Silver Cup divisions carded as the fifth through eighth races. The 10 horses posting the fastest times in the 440-yard

heats will advance to the final of the Silver Cup on June 14. First post is 1 p.m.

After dominating the female ranks her first two years on the track, Dashing Phoebe is likely to be the prohibitive favorite for her Silver Cup trial.

She was only beaten twice in five appearances last year at Ruidoso Downs where she earned \$127,000 winning the Kansas Derby. The victory boosted her career bankroll to

more than a half-million dollars. Her freshman year, the daughter of Dash For Cash won five of seven starts including the Sun Country and Kansas futurities.

Those back-to-back campaigns earned Dashing Phoebe champion honors the past two years from the American Quarter Horse Association. She may be the No. 1 candidate to take the same honors this year in the aged mare category. Trainer Don Farris opened her

4-year-old campaign last month winning the Gotogether Handicap at Ruidoso Downs. The final time for the 350-yard test was 17.37 seconds, which translated to a 104 speed rating.

Nicodemus pilots Dashing Phoebe from the No. 3 post in Friday's sixth race facing Pancho Native, Zircon, Josies Super Sound, Runnin Roro, Racy Renee, Savy Edition and Zevi Jo Go.

Josies Super Sound deserves mention after finishing third to Dashing Phoebe in the Gotogether and qualifying for the All American Derby last summer. Savy Edition is another strong contender who has run out more than \$100,000. She finished third to Dashing Phoebe in the Kansas Derby last year and checked in fourth to Corporate Bug in the Rainbow Derby.

B.F. Phillips Jr. and Minnie Wood of Frisco, Texas, send out

their veteran dasher Six Popper in the third Silver Cup trial. Six Popper won four of six races last summer at Ruidoso Downs including the \$1.3 million All American Derby.

He'll face James and Jackie Tanton's Cash Fever, who will be making his first appearance off a lackluster campaign on the West Coast last winter after missing the winner's share of the Rainbow Derby by only a neck.

Downs to simulcast Belmont Stakes

The management of Ruidoso Downs Race Track announced Tuesday that an agreement has been signed with Belmont Park to offer simulcast wagering for the 119th running of the Belmont Stakes this Saturday.

The Belmont is scheduled to run at 3:30 p.m. (MST) and will be carried live over the track's monitors. Advance wagering will be offered throughout the program for the final leg of the thoroughbred Triple Crown.

The past performances for the Belmont contenders will be printed in the Ruidoso Downs edition of The Daily Racing Form and the complete field will be outlined in the

track's official program.

Alysheba - the horse owned by the Scharbauer family of Midland, Texas - will become the 12th Triple Crown winner and the first since Affirmed in 1978 if he wins the Belmont Stakes.

The victory would make him racing's second all-time leading money earner with \$5,423,026 with a Triple Crown win and its accompanying \$5 million in purses and bonus. Alysheba was purchased by the Scharbauer's for \$500,000 at the 1985 Keeneland July Yearling Sale.

The Scharbauer's began their career in thoroughbred racing in 1984 when they purchased one horse - Ridge Review. The following sum-

mer they bought Alysheba. While relative newcomers to thoroughbred racing, the family has been a dominant force in quarter horse racing for several years at Ruidoso Downs. Clarence Scharbauer is a former vice president of the American Quarter Horse Association.

Alysheba is listed under the ownership of Clarence's wife, Dorothy, and his daughter, Pamela, who never had a starter in any Triple Crown event before they purchased Alysheba. Dorothy's father, Fred Turner Jr., however, won the 1959 Kentucky Derby with Tommy Lee, 28 years prior to the day of Alysheba's victory.

Curribot and Flemish Slipper to compete Saturday

In Saturday's 11th-race headliner at Ruidoso Downs Race Track, Sunland Park's three-time champion thoroughbred Curribot takes on Ruidoso's horse of the meet last summer - Flemish Slipper - in a mile showdown under allowance conditions.

Both horses are making their first appearance of the season at the mountain track. Glen Murphy will take the riding assignment aboard Curribot, while Darrell Blevins pilots Flemish Slipper.

Facing the two multiple stakes winners are Northern Tip, Farmer Brown, Windy War, Some Other Brother and Shortstop Special.

In minor-division action Monday night, the Noon Lions defeat McDonalds, 7-5, to raise their record to 5-2.


Beau Jarvis and Cory Hood hit well for the winners. Joiner also pitched.

Village plans to get tough on junk, abandoned vehicles

Village manager Frank Potter said Monday the village is "going after junk cars."

few days.

Potter said the enforcement plans are part of his overall beautification plan for the Village of Ruidoso.

"We're going to make the whole world beautiful," said Potter, adding the village will need the help of all its citizens.

"If you live in a community ... if you live on a street ... try to keep your neighborhood clean," encouraged Potter.

Editorial

A crime is about to be committed, right in the heart of beautiful Ruidoso, Playground of the Southwest.

The blue Chevrolet pickup truck has approached Midtown Ruidoso on Sudderth Drive. The passenger side window is lowered. A hand appears, a cigarette butt pinched between finger and thumb.

As if waiting for just the right spot to commit the crime, the hand pauses as the truck passes a crosswalk and nears the Center Street intersection. Then, the butt is flicked.

Its skyward arc peaks. The butt drops to the asphalt in a shower of tiny red sparks, then rolls to the gutter.

So what's the crime? It's just one cigarette butt.

Had the butt landed in the nearby Lincoln National Forest, perhaps it would have started a forest fire with loss of forestland and maybe lives as the result. The blue truck's passenger may even have faced federal charges.

Had a state policeman witnessed the crime, the passenger could have faced state charges against littering.

Had a Ruidoso police officer or citizen been on the scene to record the transgression, a \$105 municipal charge or a short jail sentence could have been imposed.

But what happened for sure when the hand flicked the butt was a slap of disrespect in the face of anyone who cares about the beauty of Ruidoso, Playground of the Southwest.

Have some respect. Don't litter Ruidoso.—DJP

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Governor Carruthers is clear in his own mind about openness in government. Now what he has to do is communicate his convictions to those who work for him.

Here's how he put it at a news conference last week: "If you have these little quasi-shady, secret deals drawn, there's always an immediate suspicion that someone's profiting from it, that a vested interest has been served which might be alien to the public interest. And it's just not worth the hassle."

Okay, maybe the grammar's a little scrambled there: the quote, after all, is from a tape of an actual "live" conversation. And maybe avoiding hassles is not the finest motivation for being forthcoming with the public. Still, the net result of the Governor's position is to call for openness.

As he added, in Washington he and others "just flat-out learned that the more open you are, the better off you are."

Carruthers also remarked in passing that he prefers the federal government's standards for disclosure of public documents, because he thinks those in use in the state are too restrictive.

Those of us who act as intermediaries between the public and government (or "the media," as almost everybody now calls us) hope those Carruthers has named to high posts in government will fall into line with their boss' thinking. By and large, such people appear to have been pretty unclear to date about how to proceed when requests for disclosure are made of them.

Probably the most ironic aspect of state government as now practiced here is that a majority of the 15 or more individuals on our payroll as "public information specialists" with state agencies tremble in their boots and grow quickly mute whenever they are asked by the media to produce any public information.

Here's how Governor Carruthers put his view of one application of openness (or closedness) at that same press conference:

"It is my perception that the Game and Fish Commission should not have done what they did" when

the majority of members of that group made a planned but unpublicized visit to a ranch owned by a family that had an economic interest in a decision being sought from the Commission.

Carruthers went on to say, "We are very sensitive about open meetings," and to promise that all those he names to bodies governed by the Open-Meetings Act will be provided a full, written explanation of what that requires of them.

Now all we need is an acknowledgment from the Game Commission that they were clearly in the wrong in the applicable instance.

Maybe a term of duty in Washington is good training for those who have to relate to the public as state government officials. Reporters at a luncheon called to discuss this very topic of press-government relations just before the Carruthers news conference agreed that the Cabinet secretary in the present crop who deals with us best is Lou Gallegos of Human Services.

Gallegos, of course, had a long term as top aide to U.S. Senator Pete Domenici in Washington, where he apparently picked up his good habits in this regard.

It's especially ironic that the new boss at DHS should be the winner for honesty and openness, because his predecessors at that spot under Toney Anaya were reluctant to give news folks the time of day.

It will be interesting to see if the Gallegos attitude filters down through his large and very secretive agency, which has dark corners into which the light of day has not penetrated for years.

First National Bank in Albuquerque was the real lead operator in killing this year's proposal before the Legislature to allow interstate banking. Its perception of itself has always seemed to be that of a fiercely independent solo operative in the world of local financial institutions.

That makes it ironic that FNB has just acquired a controlling interest in banks in Santa Fe and Taos by foreclosure. Now its holding company too operates a chain of banks, just like those it has been disagreeing with.

DEAR EDITOR:

This letter is to the citizens, city council, and mayor of Ruidoso Downs. My name is Rod Wright and I am a member of the Ruidoso Downs VOLUNTEER Fire Department. There are a few things going on in the community and government that are extremely upsetting. I, like many of the other members, am tired of this nonsense.

I have been with the RDVFD for well over a year, and I am very happy to say that I have never seen a more dedicated group of guys anywhere else. These guys, including myself, are VERY ambitious, EAGER to learn, and VERY willing to serve you. At the present time we have six members who are EMTs (Emergency Medical Technicians), or who are training right now to be one. Each of these men have taken time out from work, families, and personal time to take this training; and so, they could serve your community to the best of their medical abilities. We have 11 members in our department, therefore, that means that half our members are EMTs. That is very positive and this community could probably not find another community with this much experience and enthusiasm. You

should be proud of your department and the job it does, not put it down.

At this time, we serve the Village of Ruidoso Downs and assist neighboring communities on calls to the Summit, Upper Canyon, Ruidoso, Hondo Valley, and to the county line in between here and Roswell. Actually, we go to wherever requested, and whenever we are needed. So basically, we cover a very large area. Our response time to any fire in the village and close surrounding area is 3-6 minutes. Which is very good considering that only 5 of the 11 members live in Ruidoso Downs. The rest come from the Circle B Campground area and Ruidoso. Our department is understaffed but it costs money to put a new member on, and that is money that the Village finds hard to obtain.

We get calls for forest and grass fires, structure fires, and automobile accidents. When we respond to these calls we are professionals and we react as professionals. We hope that we don't project a different view, and that is where the rumors come in. Those of you who like to start rumors and who have started rumors should pay close attention to this next part. There have been a few rumors cir-

culating around the area about past incidents and the department itself. Such as the idea that we have our own little clique. NOT TRUE!!! We would love to have new members and we welcome all new-comers. Next, we are just the same as everyone else, and we definitely don't consider ourselves better than everyone else. Unlike what was stated by the same person or persons that said we are a clique. We don't appreciate the bad name certain persons have given our department and these accusations are all lies! But to those who have spend the rumors, I personally invite you to come to our meetings and observe what we do. Or, follow us to a call and watch us there. WHAT I am trying to say is ACTIONS SPEAK LOUDER THAN WORDS.

At the present time there is some bitterness between the council and the Fire Department. If you want to see what it is, just go to the Council Meetings on Monday night. There are many misunderstandings and I suggest that these get worked out or the bitterness will soon spread farther than the Council meetings on Monday nights. Let's get things worked out and proceed with our jobs.

The members of the department are strictly volunteering their time. On a call the department receives \$10 per member that responded to the call. But instead of each member getting that money, we put it into a fund, cordially called the "Fireman's Fund." We use this money for supplies, equipment, and other necessities for the department. This money we spend as we want to or as we need.

Our time is well spent and what we do is dangerous. Every time a page goes out for our assistance we risk our lives. In a large city a firefighter doing the same job makes from \$25,000 to \$60,000 dollars a year. We do it for FREE!!! Also for the learning experience, the personal satisfaction of knowing we helped someone, to help the community, and to give our service to you, the people of Ruidoso Downs. Members take off a week to go to Fire School each year to learn the latest techniques in fire-fighting and life-saving.

One negative little point is the fact that all the firemen in the department know that if they were to be hurt or disabled, there would be no compensation to cover us. This is because insurance costs money, and money is more important than life and people's future lives. The citizens might think that we are crazy for being on the department without insurance, but as I said before, we are very dedicated.

Two years ago, we had a new station built. Since then we have put approximately \$15,000 dollars

worth of labor into that station. Which was all done by VOLUNTEER fire personnel. We have worked hard on our station to make it and the department first class. We have spent much of our own personal money and taken time from other things, such as family and personal time.

With our new station came many improvements, including our pride and joy, a 1,250 gallon, \$90,000 Tanker. But now we have fallen in time of need. Currently, we are driving a Rescuer truck which is a hazard to ride in. Also, our Engine/Pumper truck is one of those trucks that we worry about whether it will work or not when we get to the scene.

At today's estimates, to restore our Engine/Pumper to new would cost around \$35,000. To replace the Rescuer truck would cost approximately \$15,000. That is if we kept the old pump and hose we have at this time. Right now we have another truck, which was donated to us ON LOAN, as long as we use it, from the State Forestry Service, that we would like to restore. We would be using our own money (the department's) and our own time to restore it.

We have many other expenses and equipment we need. Protective equipment is in great need; plus, we could always use more hoses, nozzles, foam detergents, EMT supplies, and other items in those areas.

Our department is run strictly on donations and state money given to the Village. Every little bit of money helps our department become better, and thus better serving you and the community.

Our department has gone from having the "save the foundation" point of view, to saving lives and putting the fire out with the least amount of damage.

Another fact you might be interested in is that home-owners' insurance rates are based partly upon the local environment. The size and how well equipped the fire department is, plays a big part on rates. You, the people of Ruidoso Downs, should recognize that the rates are high; so, the better the Fire Department the lower your rates.

I hope that the eyes of the citizens of Ruidoso Downs are opened so they can see what's going on. We are your department and we are here to serve you. So maybe we all should stand up and place our opinions to the heads of the village, especially the Village Council.

So, now you know—the rest of the story.

Denists have perfected a method to keep injured dental roots growing long enough to lock the tooth in the mouth. Apexification calls for filling the root canal with calcium hydroxide until the root is fully grown.

Researchers at the Center for Molecular Medicine and Immunology in Newark, New Jersey, are using radioactively tagged monoclonal antibodies to spot hidden tumors before they could be seen by ordinary tests.
