Billy the Kid's spurs, holster to return to Lincoln

After four years of negotiation, Billy Bonney's spurs are coming home to Lincoln County.

"I believe they're probably authentic," said Lincoln County Heritage Trust Director Gary Miller. "They were taken off the Kid when he was in jail in Santa Fe in 1880, and presented to the University in 1936."

The brass spurs, and a holster and hunting knife, have been locked in a vault all this time. Miller is now preparing a special display area in the Lincoln County War section of the Visitors Center on Highway 380 in historic Lincoln.

"We will have the artifacts for five years or so," Miller said. "A lot of people are pretty excited about seeing them. Billy Bonney has been dead for 106 years next month but his popularity is still on the upswing."

State provides airport approach beam funding

The State of New Mexico has agreed to fund a non-directional beam instrument approach at the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA), Tim Morris, Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) chairman, announced Friday.

Morris said funds may be available in time to have the safety equipment installed before the regional air facility opens on December 1. He said details of the system and its development will be discussed at the SBAC meeting next week.

Morris, who also manages the Ruidoso Municipal Airport, was pleased with the state's willingness to provide even more funding for

the regional air facility on Fort Stanton Mesa.

"We're trying to build this airport without a lot of local funds," said Morris, adding that most of the facility is being built with state and federal monies.

But few people realize that those Federal Aviation Administration and State Transportation Department funds are derived through the aviation industry—not through general tax funds, said Morris.

"The general taxpaying public is not footing the bill on this facility to this point," said Morris. He said the federal aviation trust fund is made up of taxes on tickets, tires, parts and the like, while the state funds


come from taxes on aviation fuel.

Morris said the new airport will probably be "uncontrolled," meaning it will not have an air traffic control tower. He said the state funds 50 percent of the cost of the tower at the Ruidoso Municipal Airport, but has agreed to do so only until a new, and safer, facility is in operation.

Ruidoso Municipal Airport, said to be the most unsafe in the Southwest, has had no major crashes since the air traffic control tower was added two years ago.

Morris said he'll meet and talk with the tower contractor next week about the change. He said he doesn't feel the village can pay the entire cost of a tower once the state withdraws its participation.

"We still own all our radio equipment," noted Morris, explaining that airport personnel will be able to communicate with pilots and provide directional and other information.

School Board calls for bids, hires new personnel

The Ruidoso Board of Education has opened bids for a new wrestling mat for the high school, a floor covering for the gymnasium, and a storage building.

The board is now considering the bids received for the maintenance of its 139 office machines.

At its meeting Wednesday, the organization approved all of its routine business and also accepted resignations from four teachers, and hired six new faculty and staff.

Resigned from the school system are: Barbara Hays, speech pathologist, Nob Hill Elementary; Mickey McGuire (retired), sixth

grade, Ruidoso Middle School (RMS); Cindy Castillo, fourth grade, White Mountain Elementary School (WMES); and Danny Flores, Ruidoso High School music/band director.

New hires include: B.J. Tooley, speech pathologist, Nob Hill; Linda Pehr, sixth grade teacher, RMS; Karla Thornley, second grade teacher, WMES; Nancy Leslie, second grade, WMES; Ronnie Wright, vehicle maintenance/activity director; and Richie McClure, custodian, RMS (to replace Herman Fox, who is transferring to Special Ed aide.)

According to Ruidoso Schools Superintendent Sid Miller, the new faculty applications are "of higher

quality than ever." Miller stated that he "feels very good" about the new teachers.

Associate Superintendent Mike Gladden presented the results of national testing of the students. The overall test scores for PSAT, CTBS and NMHSPE exams show Ruidoso students to be achieving higher scores than they did in past years, and also higher scores than the rest of the state of New Mexico.

"We are seeing sustained effects from curriculum changes. Native Americans seem to have especially steady increases in test scores," said Gladden.

"These scores are an indication of effort that teachers are putting

into the curriculum," remarked Karen Tillman, Special Ed director.

Two high school students have qualified for the National Merit Scholarship. They are Jonathan Dartman and Brian Harris.

Denise Hawthorne, high school guidance counselor, said that 60 percent of this year's graduating seniors are going on to post-secondary education. This breaks down to 69 college-bound seniors and eight who are going to trade school. The graduation rate this year was 89 percent—122 students out of 136 graduated with their class.

Will airport have instant impact?

"On December 1 we're not going to have anything at that (Sierra Blanca Regional) airport that we don't have at this (Ruidoso Municipal) airport," said airport administrator Fred Heckman Friday.

With the date fast approaching to move the Ruidoso facility to the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, Heckman and Ruidoso airport manager Tim Morris talked Friday of services expected at the multi-million-dollar airport.

Heckman said the same planes will be parked on the regional air facility on Fort Stanton Mesa as the ones now parked at the Ruidoso Municipal Airport.

While a great deal of growth has been projected in the master plan, and is expected by airport planners, Heckman said that won't happen overnight.

Morris said the Ruidoso airport handled 882 operations in May, a slight increase over May 1986. He expects an immediate increase in traffic at the new 24-hour facility.

"I know that we still lose traffic to Roswell, Alamogordo and Carrizozo—people that are scared of this airport," noted Morris.

The airport master plan of 1978 projects an immediate increase in traffic, and Morris said he still believes that will hold true.

"The only thing we have in writing at this time is from Mesa Airlines," said Morris. He said a proposal, based on two flights a day and some kind of passenger guarantees, has been received.

"That (passenger guarantees) is

a trend in the whole industry," said Morris. He said the only airport he knows of that has lost substantially through passenger guarantees is Jackson Hole, Wyoming.

Morris said he is discussing commercial services with other companies, including American Eagle, a subsidiary of American Airlines, and Continental Express, an affiliate of Continental Airlines.

"It looks very favorable," said Morris.

An advantage Morris sees for the Ruidoso facility is the area's year-round market.

"As far as larger aircraft—that's going to take a cooperative effort," noted Morris. He said he expects to be able to entice travel groups to come in, not daily, but on a regular basis.

Both Morris and Heckman said that major airlines are looking at real numbers, not projections, before setting up a regular route. They feel sure those numbers will be there once the airport is operational.

Heckman said the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission has just now started talking with airline representatives. He said the opening date was not really known until the last few contracts came in within the funds available.

With the opening date uncertain, the airport commission could not talk officially with airline representatives, explained Heckman.

Morris said he hopes to include the commission, the Mesalero Apache Indian Tribe and the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce in efforts to acquire regularly scheduled airline service to the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

Dashing Phoebe captures Silver Cup

Dashing Phoebe took the pole position for national running champion this year while recording her 15th career victory in Sunday's \$150,000 Rainbow Silver Cup at Ruidoso Downs.

The mountain track hosts an expanded schedule this week with programs Wednesday through Sunday beginning at 1 p.m. each day. First-round elimination trials for the \$700,000 Rainbow Futurity are carded Wednesday through Friday. The \$11,000 Master Salls Handicap highlights Saturday's action. The turf weekend is capped on Sunday when Pass The Hat and Facjaws head the field for the \$125,000 Norgor Thoroughbred Futurity.

Dashing Phoebe was the overwhelming favorite of 3,500 fans on hand for the 7th running of the Silver Cup. The two-time national champion headed Flow Of Cash in the Gotogether Handicap on May 17 and then took the No. 1 qualifying spot for the Silver Cup with a 21.38-second clocking for the 440 yard classic.

Regular pilot Jerry Nicodemus

loaded Dashing Phoebe into the far outside post with 1986 All American Derby winner Six Popper the second choice at 4-1 odds racing from the rail post.

Josies Super Sound, an 18-1 longshot ridden by Jacky Martin, got the early jump on the 10-horse field breaking three doors down from Dashing Phoebe. Savy Edition was only a whisker behind in the eight hole, while Dashing Phoebe gained steadily from the outside.

Nicodemus uncocked his whip a few strides from the gates to get Dashing Phoebe's mind on the race. About 200 yards from the wire, he switched to a left-handed urging when the mare began to drift to the inside. She got back on course immediately and was never headed for the remainder of the journey. The winning margin was three parts of a length with a final time of 21.30 seconds - the fastest of the season for the quarter mile distance.

Dashing Phoebe's clocking was the second-fastest in the history of the Rainbow Silver Cup. Heavenly

still holds the stakes record with a 21.23 time last year.

Art Shahan and the San Jose Cattle Co. of Pleasanton, Texas, earned \$75,000 for Dashing Phoebe's effort. The win boosted her career earnings to \$590,199. After being voted champion filly by the American Quarter Horse Association for the past two years, she now looms as the leading candidate to take national honors in the aged mare category. Don Farris trains Dashing Phoebe.

Savy Edition's second pocketed \$25,312 for John Bauchman of Seguin, Texas. Johnny Bustamante conditions the daughter of The First Edition. Josies Super Sound crossed the wire another three-quarter lengths behind Savy Edition to earn \$14,890 for Clarence Scharbauer Jr., who recently went to the winner's circle of the Kentucky Derby and Preakness with Alysheba.

Reach Together finished fourth followed by Just Six, Racy Renee, Timeto Get Tuff, Cash Fever, Six Popper and King Of Sting.

Lightfoot Lil wins in Norgor Derby

Lightfoot Lil romped to a nine-length winning margin in Saturday's Norgor Derby at Ruidoso Downs after even-money favorite Prince Ego was eased in the final turn.

Saturday's co-feature, the Mescalero Apache Handicap, saw co-favorite Candy Store run down Cupid's Prospect in the final furlong to earn the winner's share of \$12,000 in prize money.

Lightfoot Lil was seeking her second trophy in the 3-year-old ranks in Saturday's \$41,000 Norgor Derby. The California-bred daughter of Muscovite went postward as the 5-2 second choice behind Prince Ego, who already had banked the winner's share of four stakes at Sunland Park and the Downs at Albuquerque this spring.

The two horses broke side-by-side from the No. 8 and 9 post positions and drew off for a heads-up battle through the backstretch. As the field rounded the turn, Prince Ego and Lightfoot Lil held a five-length advantage and it appeared the two sprinters would battle down to the wire for the \$21,000 winner's check.

Just as they were approaching the top of the stretch, Prince Ego

appeared to have problems with his footing and jockey Casey Lambert was forced to ease the multiple stakes winner from the race.

"His back end went out from under him and I had to pull him up," Lambert commented after the race.

Joe Martinez was all alone through the final furlong aboard Lightfoot Lil, who went on to win by 9 1/2 lengths with a final time of 1:11.1. The clocking knocked a fifth of a second off the season's best time for 6 furlongs.

"When she made the lead at the quarter pole, she pricked her ears, took a breath, and I knew I had a lot of horse left," Martinez said. "I knew nobody was going to catch her."

Brent Davidson trains Lightfoot Lil for Jacqueline Spencer of Alto. The filly opened her sophomore campaign winning the Las Cruces Handicap at Sunland Park and then went on to finish third to Prince Ego in the Riley Allison Derby at the same track. She was clocked in 1:13 flat while going wire-to-wire in her trial for the Norgor Derby.

Royal Platoon, a 7-1 shot ridden by Mike Clark, took home \$9,100 second-place money in the Derby.

Sid's Ego checked in a nose behind Royal Platoon followed by Showboat, Make My Mark, Mr Willoughby, Jazz Tonight, Dial Draconic, Clendestine Stash, Quillman and Glory Jet.

Royal Platoon carries the colors of George Williams of Lovington, N.M. Terry Walker trains the Platoon Leader colt. Sid's Ego is the property of the Double B Ranch in Santa Teresa, N.M. Cliff Lambert Sr. conditions the Bold Ego son.

Jockey Pedro Benitez brought Candy Store from just off the pace to run away with Saturday's Mescalero Apache Cap. The 7-year-old Against The Snow gelding caught Cupid's Prospect in deep stretch to post a 1 1/4-length winning margin. The final time for the 6 furlongs was 1:11.2.

Candy Store is owned by El Pasaon Robert Haynsworth and San Angelo businessman Edwin Mayer, Jr. The victory was worth \$9,400.

Cupid's Prospect finished more than five lengths in front of Flemish Slipper, who shared the role of favorite at 2-1 odds. K. Jack was fourth followed by Bedex, Splendid Apple, Jr. Astaire, Dewan Who and Moolah Smoke.

Fan hits \$80,000 Twin Trifecta

An electrical contractor from Snyder, Texas, invested \$300 for an \$81,000 Twin Trifecta payoff on Thursday at Ruidoso Downs. Bobby and Darlene Lack held one of three exchanges in Thursday's Twin Trifecta wager at the mountain track and then were the only ones to peg the second half of the back-to-back trifecta bet that returned \$81,164. Bobby Lack, a partner in Western Power Line Co., said he in-

vested "a little more than \$300" to hit the large pool. "We've been trying to hit one of these big ones since the beginning of the season, but we always missed it by just one horse," the Texan said. "We just got lucky today." Thursday's Twin Trifecta pool opened with a carryover of \$61,260 when no winning tickets were cashed for six consecutive programs. The jackpot climbed to \$81,000

when more than 2,500 fans chased the large carryover on Thursday. The hefty return came close to Ruidoso's record Twin Trifecta payoff last month when two fans cracked a 10-day carryover that paid each of the players \$82,836. A winning Twin Trifecta ticket correctly picks the top three finishers in the third and fourth races.

Florentine is top qualifier for Derby

Florentine, the filly touted as the best 3-year-old horse in California, may earn the same bragging rights in the Southwest after stepping off the top qualifying time in Thursday's trials for the \$600,000 Rainbow Derby at Ruidoso Downs. Ruidoso's six-day Twin Trifecta carryover was paid out on Thursday when one fan held the only winning ticket worth \$81,164. The Snyder, Texas, businessman said he spent \$300 to peg the back-to-back trifecta wager.

More than 2,500 fans wagered \$50,000 on Thursday's Twin Trifecta. Total wagering for the afternoon program topped \$311,000, representing a 20 percent increase over the same program last year. Thursday's card featured 111 sophomore sprinters facing off in a dozen trial divisions for the

440-yard Rainbow Derby. The 10 horses posting the fastest times advanced to the final of the Derby on June 28. Due to a change in the wind, nine of the finalists qualified from the first three trials. Conspicuously absent from the qualifying list are Kansas Derby winner Lil Bit Shilney and All American Futurity champion Ronas Ryon - although both horses won their respective divisions. West Coast rider Kenneth Hart steered Florentine to a three-quarter length winning margin in the second Derby division to stop the electronic timer in 21.635 seconds. A Rainbow Derby victory would almost cinch the 3-year-old national title for the filly who already has won two Grade 1 events in Califor-

nia this year. The Dash For Cash hauler is owned by Ginger Hyland of the White Oaks Ranch in Lake Hughes, Ca., and trained by Russell Harris. Florentine's clocking was fast enough to yank the four horses that crossed the wire behind her into the final of the Rainbow Derby. Joining the swift miss will be Blulady Chick (21.730), Chick Rocket (21.835) and Jet Go Chick (21.855). Will Be Easy, another West Coast import, turned in the second-fastest clocking while winning the opening Rainbow Derby division. Bruce Pilkenton drew off to win by three parts of a length in 21.695. The chestnut Comin' Easy filly is trained by Charles Casco and owned by the Keeling Family Partnership based in Huntsville, Texas.

Rainbow Futurity trials begin Wednesday

Kansas Futurity finalists Lady Pass Oak and By By Yawl head off a list of 107 quarter horses facing off in elimination trials for the \$700,000 Rainbow Futurity on Friday at Ruidoso Downs. The top two finishers in each of Friday's 12 elimination trials will join the 48 qualifiers from Wednesday and Thursday's divisions in time trials scheduled for July 1. Only the 10 horses posting the fastest times that day will advance to the final of the Rainbow Futurity on July 19. The Rainbow is the middle jewel

in the mountain track's quarter horse Triple Crown. The Triple Crown series opened on May 31 with the \$500,000 Kansas Futurity and is capped on Labor Day with the \$2.5 million All American Futurity - the world's richest quarter horse race. The three-race series has only been won by one horse since its inception 24 years ago. Special Effort took home the Triple Crown in 1961. Only one horse has managed to win even two of the races for the past five years. Ronas Ryon captured the Kansas and All American trophies last year. The colt's

Southern owners opted to pass the Rainbow Futurity. The quarter horse Triple Crown is generally regarded as one of the toughest series of races in the nation. To win all three legs, a horse must make eight trips to the starting gates in less than four months - an average of one race every two weeks. While there is only one round of time trials for the Kansas, Triple Crown hopefuls must get through elimination trials for both the Rainbow and All American to be eligible to run in time trials for those races.

Something different is occurring at the Convention, Learned Reader, and it is our duty to report it to you.

This Convention was called especially to revise our Articles of Confederation, and make our Congress work properly. This was our understanding, and the sacred promise of the Annapolis conventioners. But there is more noise in the air than just Revision; there is the beginning of radical change.

With Mr. Randolph's fifteen Resolutions, which are becoming known as the Virginia Plan, our Learned Readers would do well to revisit the term Revision and replace it with the word Change.

This Change is so great it would eliminate completely our Articles; it would subjugate our States to a Central Authority - reflect upon the central authority we have now dear Reader, its impotence is so great it can neither rise up in the morning or evening to quell rebellion or gather taxes! Most importantly, these Changes would throw us into Anarchy!

Mr. Randolph calls for a Legislature of two or three branches. Now in New York City we have only one, and it hasn't been able to meet since May 14 for a Quorum cannot be found - and it has only met THREE TIMES this whole year! Will not Three Branches multiply Our Problems by the same number? Would we want Three times the number of politicians we now have visiting and swilling Shrubs and Ciders? The whole of New York would float on hot air each time these Branches condescended to meet (if ever).

And from where will we get this mighty Multitude? Mr. Randolph suggests we get them from the votes of the people. What people? Will it be every uninformed miscreant who can stagger into a voting place without vomiting up his supper? Ridiculous!

No where in the World can we find a government which works in the fashion Mr. Randolph has described. It may be that others already know better, or it may be that we don't know enough, in either instance Anarchy would result.

These Resolves would make our Sovereign States states in name only. The people (?) of New York and Virginia would crow loudly at the people (?) in Delaware and Connecticut about what they Must Do, and how much it would Cost Them. The Small States would be completely under the Tyrant's boot once again!

No, Mr. Randolph, we cannot agree with your Resolves, they go too far.

We suggested earlier that the Delaware Instructions voiced by Mr. Read, insisting on a one state one vote Congress brooded ill for this Country. Your suggestions, Sir, are just as deadly; they are the other edge of the axe.

We are confused ... is this one Country or thirteen? Are we revising our Articles or Changing our Government? Are we dividing or are we uniting?

The Convention in Crisis!

The affairs of the United States have reached a Crisis! Today, the plan proposed by the Virginia delegation which has been discussed by the Committee of the Whole for almost two weeks, was reported back to the Convention. At once, Mr. Paterson of New Jersey rose and asked for an immediate adjournment in order to present another, quite different plan to the Convention.

The cause of this crisis is the rule of suffrage in the National legislature. Under our existing Confederation each state receives one vote in Congress regardless of its population. The small states like New Jersey and Delaware are devoted to the Principle of One State One Vote because they believe it is essential to their survival as sovereign powers. It is true that within those delegations there are men like Mr. Dickinson of Delaware who wish for a stronger National Government and will go a great way to support it, but they will not consider any plan which they believe will swallow them up.

The discussion of the rule of suffrage stretched over two days, starting last Saturday. Mr. Paterson and his fellow representative from New Jersey, Mr. David Brearley, spoke against changing the rule that each state have an equal vote in Congress. Mr. Brearley pointed out that representation in proportion to population would mean that Georgia would have one vote and Virginia sixteen. The nation would be dominated by the big states of Virginia, Pennsylvania and Massachusetts.

Perhaps, he suggested, the map of the United States should be redrawn to make thirteen equal states - that was the only solution he could think of. Mr. Paterson was equally eloquent. He reminded the gentlemen that their job was only to amend the Articles of Confederation. Then he responded to a hint thrown out by Mr. Wilson of Pennsylvania that if the Virginia plan failed, the Large States would confederate among themselves. New Jersey, he said, would never confederate on the plan before the Committee. As for himself, he would rather be ruled by a Despot!

Mr. Wilson replied that as all authority came from the people, they ought to be equally represented in Congress. And, if the Small States would not agree to this plan, Pennsylvania, and some others, would agree to no other. The question was about to be put, but Mr. Paterson begged that it be postponed, which was agreed to.

On Monday, the question was taken up again; however, Dr. Franklin spoke at length in an attempt to calm the gentlemen. He reminded them that Scotland, when it united with England at the beginning of this century, had had fears similar to those of Delaware and New Jersey, but those fears had proved by experience to be groundless. Scotland's liberties were secured and no complaint had been made. Immediately, the question regarding the basis of representation in the lower house of Congress was put and all states, except Maryland


whose vote was divided, and Delaware, New Jersey and New York, voted for proportional representation.

Anxious no doubt to secure something for the small states, Mr. Sherman of Connecticut proposed that in the upper house each state would have an equal vote. His motion was lost and the gentlemen then voted, six states to five, that the ratio of representation in the upper house should be the same as in the lower. Thus were the hopes of the small states dashed to the ground and their worst fears realized.

The Committee decided to count each slave as three-fifths of a citizen for the purposes of representation of a state in Congress, which is, of course, the present rule. Mr. Elbridge Gerry of Massachusetts asked why slaves, who were property in the South, should be counted more than the cattle and horses of the North? No gentleman responded to his remark.

Today when the whole Virginia Plan was presented to the Convention, Mr. Paterson having asked for and been granted an adjournment, told the Delegates that he expected to have his plan ready to put before the Convention tomorrow. Feelings are running high and the mildest expression of them was probably Mr. Dickinson's remark to Mr. Madison: "You see the consequences of pushing things too far!"

Another gentleman picked up the paper and not knowing to whom it belonged, handed it to the President, General Washington. At the end of the day His Excellency reprimanded the anonymous gentleman for carelessness and threw the paper onto the table for the miscreant to claim. Since the delegates hold the General in awe, they were greatly disturbed by this incident and NO ONE claimed the paper!

A Close Call

Mr. William Hamilton was returning from the city to his seat at Bush Hill, he was attacked in Market, near Twelfth Street, by a band of foot-pads, consisting of eight, armed with blunderbusses and pistols, who surrounded the carriage and fired on the postillion. Mr. Hamilton ordered the driver to push the horses, by which he and the amiable Mrs. Hamilton escaped being robbed and perhaps murdered by these atrocious offenders.

New York City ... June 15, 1787

It was my good Pleasure enroute from Carolina to home to stay in Philadelphia and to enjoy the hospitality of Roger Sherman, one of our Delegates to the Convention there. While he was Constrained by the Reprehensible Rule of Silence so foolishly adopted by the Convention, he dropped succinctly Hints so that I may say with Certainty what the Convention is likely to Propose.

There has been Great Discussion about a Chief Executive or President. Mr. Sherman seems to believe that we shall have three Presidents, elected by Congress for three years each and eligible for reelection. The Congress in turn will be composed of Two Houses, both appointed by the State Legislatures. There will be a Supreme Court, but it will only hear appeals from the State Courts. It is Mr. Sherman's conviction that the proper objects of the National Government are few and that only a minor alteration of the Articles will be Proposed.

We were informed by sundry Persons in Philadelphia that many of the Delegates, especially those from the southward States, hardly knew what to make of Mr. Sherman. They cannot easily understand his accent, nor are they sure that his origins as an Artisan makes him acceptable. But of one thing the people of Connecticut may be Proud: in every major Vote yet taken, Mr. Sherman has voted Nay.

A thought for the Delegates to the Convention, now Being Held in Philadelphia:

Instead of attempting to amend the present Articles of Confederation, and instead of attempting to form one general government for the whole community of the United States, would it not be preferable to distribute the States into Four Separate Confederacies or Republics?

It is easy to see that the Confederation cannot long continue in its present form containing, as it does such an immense territory, extending through such a variety of climates, and over people whose manners, customs, and religion are so different. The members of the present Confederation must perpetually differ in opinions and interests and cannot long remain on cordial terms with each other.

All political writers agree that a republic should not comprehend a large territory. No law makers can govern a people so radically different, living in such varied climates and expect to compel their Obedience. Good government must be adapted to the habits and manners of the people and calculated to the climate.

To solve these problems I suggest that the Honourable Delegates divide the United States into Four Republics viz.: the first to contain the Eastern States of New-Hampshire, Massachusetts, Rhode-Island and Connecticut; the second to contain the Middle States of New-York, New-Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware and Maryland; the third, Virginia, the two Carolinas, and Georgia; and the Fourth the States of Franklin and Kentucky, and the lands lying on the Ohio.

This is a division that seems to be pointed out by climate, whose effect no positive law ever can surpass. The religion, manners, customs, exports, imports, and general interests of these Four Republics being the same, no opposition would any longer divide their Councils and they would be Secure at Home and Respected Abroad. This is the outline of a plan, which I humbly submit to Able Men who may reduce it to a permanent system, from which may result peace, liberty and security for our Country.

The leaders of the Abolition Society expect resistance from Prime Minister William Pitt. Yet men such as Mr. Phillips are confident that, should the issue be given full and public scrutiny, there will be a great storm of popular revulsion at the evils of the trade in bondmen, and the ministry will have no choice but to support legislation to outlaw the Slave Trade. Whatever the cost in lost trade, England must someday awaken to her responsibility to respect the lives and Liberty of all Men. The nation that gave the world John Locke can do no less.

News From Britain ...

Opposition to Slave Trade in England

Slavery within Great Britain hath been effectually outlawed since 1772. Then, in the case of James Somerset, a Negro man born a slave in Virginia but brought to England by his owner, the courts ruled that domestic slavery could not be reconciled with the ancient constitution of this realm, and that Somerset could not be held to service against his will and was a Free Man.

ENGLISH CONTINUE TRADE

Why do English ships continue in the trade of slaves between Africa and the Americas? Despite much publicity on the evils of the slave trade, Parliament hath thus far given no notice to the question. Even the notorious case of the Ship Zong - from which, in 1783, some 133 slaves were thrown overboard to die at sea when the Ship's rations ran low - has failed to win sufficient support to the cause of ending the slave trade.

Among those opposed to slavery and the slave trade, members of the Society of Friends (the Quakers) have taken a leading part. In the belief that direct political action is needed, a group of Quakers and non-Quakers alike has been organized to take the case to Parliament and the public. On 22 May a dozen men met at the shop of James Phillips, official printer to the London Meeting, and there agreed to form a Society for Effecting the Abolition of the Slave Trade.

Morality alone is not at issue; while many men might condemn the Trade as vile and sinful, others excuse the institution as natural and an ancient part of our Civilization. Moreover, English ships, employing thousands of men, make great profits for their owners in carrying slaves to the Indies, and sugar and other goods homeward. To abolish the trade by British ships, the apologists say, would allow a valuable trade to fall into the hands of Commercial Rivals such as the French, the Dutch or the Americans. Thus to outlaw the slave trade must be discounted, given the great political weight of the mercantile interests.


Little League results

Merchant Milestones: The Village Cobbler does more than repair shoes

In an age of polyester and plastic, two Ruidoso craftsmen continue to produce hand-worked goods in leather and steel the old-fashioned way.

The Village Cobbler, 2807 Sudderth Drive, has been repairing boots, shoes, saddles and chaps ... skis, bindings, seats and hats ... since 1981.

Partners Mike Garrett and Bill DeNell met while swapping parts for their cherished Willys jeeps. By combining their talents and machinery the two could handle any kind of leather work imaginable.

Garrett once worked for Ed Bullard who owned a cobbler's shop here in Ruidoso. After doing con-

struction work at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, Garrett decided to open his own cobbler shop.

"I have the largest boot cemetery in town," Garrett said. "People bring in boots that are beyond repair and they ask me to get rid of them ... sometimes I can use them for spare parts. I call the pile 'Boot Hill.'"

Garrett does custom work and will build anything a customer wants in the way of shoes or boots.

"I have done some orthopedic work for people. There was a guy who was on 'That's Incredible' named Henri Lamothe who was the only man in the world to dive 40 feet into 17 inches of water." Needless to say the man had a bad posture and had to have his footwear adjusted accordingly, Garrett said. Garrett's work is well-known by

"Some of the guards have had me put big tacks on their boots," Garrett said, "so the prisoners can hear them coming."

Garrett figures he has repaired more than 8,000 pairs of boots since opening. Most of his business is local and when the cowboys leave town he cranks up his ski rental and repair portion of the business.

Bill DeNell has been making handmade chaps and accessories for many of the cowboys and horsemen in town. He specializes in leatherwork and is well-known for producing sheepskin coats and his sheepskin hats.

"We sold about 50 of those hats to the ski lift operators and other locals last winter," DeNell said. "Most of my work is custom and


word has a way of getting around about the quality."

DeNell also does upholstery work and has an interest in auto restorations.

In addition to their shared experiences in construction and leatherwork, the two craftsmen possess another talent.

"We have a band. We play at a lot of private parties around town. It's called Willy and the Dots, after our fondness for our jeeps," DeNell said.

The Village Cobbler is open 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Saturday and can handle traditional to custom leatherwork, shoe and boot repair, upholstery, custom clothing and accessories and will belt out the blues to boot.



Inside the Capitol

I think this column provides a real service for the readers of New Mexico. When I decided it was time for me to retire, that thought led me to search carefully for a successor.

There were a gratifying number of applicants anxious to fill my shoes. Most of them, of course, were present or former newsmen from around the state, all of whom had qualifications that made likely candidates.

But I based my analysis of the talents needed to turn out a daily column of commentary on New Mexico politics on my own experience. That led me to look for something other than the most obvious of abilities.

After ten years doing it, I am sure this job needs somebody with a sense of New Mexico's political history, who has deep convictions about what should and should not be done here. It also takes someone of more than average imagination to turn out daily commentary with enough pizzazz to keep readers interested.

That self-made "design" for the next person to succeed those of us who have produced this, the nation's longest-running column of its kind, since the days of Will Harrison, its founder, led me to Jay Miller, who will take over my spot full time on July 1.

Jay is a fourth-generation New Mexican, a descendant of homesteading grandparents, who has at one time or another lived and observed local conditions in Santa Fe, Albuquerque, Silver City, Demings and Lordsburg. For the last 22 years he has literally been "inside the capitol" as a professional lobbyist; that means he knows the faces, names, dates and histories, and needs nobody to tell him where the dark corners are that need light shone into them. He has bachelor's and master's degrees, and for many years edited "Capitol Alert," an internal house organ for members of the teaching profession that, along with his columns and action memos, kept them aware of what was actual-

ly taking place in the Roundhouse.

He also has a sharp eye for satire; he heads an organization named "Jay Miller & Friends Fiesta Float-Building Society, Inc.," which has won awards for almost two decades in Santa Fe's fiesta parades. They produce what amount to mobilized editorial cartoons making healthy fun of the state's political vagaries. In other words, Miller already knows how to make people laugh at the fatuities that often overtake New Mexico's chief citizens.

Those thoughts led me to make you a promise: You will enjoy Jay's columns and find them enlightening.

Those columns will begin coming to you soon, in alternation with some of mine, so everyone can grow used to having Miller in for McCaffrey. I promise you his work will continue to provide insights about state government that will complement your own, and that he will continue the cause of helping New Mexicans understand how their government actually operates.

Jay will be on the road shortly after I depart on the first day of July, to get personally acquainted with you and your specific needs. He will also be working out plans for getting production of this column into the late twentieth century by arranging to deliver it to those who desire it by computer, instead of the outmoded U. S. mails.

As for me, I shall remember you with considerably more gratitude than you may be aware of, as I contemplate my past history from a Caribbean Island. You have allowed me to express a wide range of opinions over a long period of time, and have even lightly recompensed me for doing it.

I think Jay Miller is lucky to be able to take over this job, and I predict you will be pleased that he has.

Mayor Coker sees life in Capitan 'on the upswing'

Capitan Mayor Benny Coker's father gave him two major pieces of advice: "Liquor ain't for drinkin' it's for sellin'"; and, "the one thing in life you can't do without is water."

Coker has paid close attention to his daddy's words. He is co-owner of the Rusty Anchor bar in Capitan, and he calls himself a "wine salesman" by trade; and, as village mayor, his primary community concern is water.

"The reason I ran for mayor was to oversee the water well system," he explained. "I've been in office now a year last March. The well system is, I would say, about 95 percent complete. I'm the president of the Rural Water Users Association; I think about water all the time."

When asked what the current population of Capitan is, Coker returns to use his favorite theme as

a reference point. "The census will probably list the village population as around 1,070 people, but there are 560 water meters, and you can figure that means about 3.2 people per meter, so that means the actual figure is closer to a population of 1,300 people."

Coker came to Capitan in September of 1974 after spending time on the road with Shell Oil. He was based in Houston, Texas, and quickly tired of city life. "It's real nice here," he points out. He was born in Oklahoma and raised in Hobbs, and prior to becoming mayor spent eight years on the Board of Trustees of Capitan.

He guesses that most of the payroll in the town comes from ranching and employment at Fort Stanton and Camp Sierra Blanca.

"I think that Capitan is on the upswing," Coker said. "The quality of life here is improving."




