## Project examines airport site uses

John Petronis, president of Architectural Research Consultants, Inc. (ARC), said Friday his project team is looking at alternatives for the Ruidoso Municipal Airport land.

ARC is under contract with the Village of Ruidoso to perform a land-use study on the 160-acre tract expected to be vacated soon after the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport opens on November 30.

"We've pretty much collected all the economic information and market overview," said Petronis.

Just two months into the six-month project, Petronis said he and his staff have identified the constraints and opportunities of the site. He said he'll meet again with a citizens' advisory committee in about a month to present alternatives.

Petronis said members of that advisory board brought up some new issues during a meeting last week, and the project team will follow up on those items before generating alternatives to be presented in the next advisory board meeting.

While discussions at a meeting last week included plans for several public hearings, Petronis said the advisory board meetings are open to the public.

"In essence, when we're working with a task force it's a form of public meeting," noted Petronis. "I have no problem with the public attending those meetings," he added.

Petronis presented preliminary results of his research during the first meeting of the citizens' advisory board. He said goals for developing the airport land include: to strengthen the area as visitor destination, diversify the local economy and bring people into

the area at times when they don't normally come.

He noted that Ruidoso, "for a resort community," has very limited recreational facilities.

Petronis displayed a chart showing the amount of business and commercial square footage in the village. He said that amount has nearly tripled over the past seven years—from 700,000 square feet in 1980 to 1,600,000 square feet in 1987.

Concluding that Ruidoso is overbuilt in both the non-residential and residential markets, Petronis said his market consultant recommends a non-competitive development to enhance the community and provide a focus for the center of town.

"I think the downtown ought to stay the downtown and this ought to complement downtown," said Petronis.

Recommendations from the market consultant include an educational entity, community

center, small hotel and/or light assembly industrial.

Petronis stressed that whatever development plan is finally adopted should seek to stabilize the seasonal nature of the area economy.

"The runways are an opportunity," said Petronis. "My own personal vision is of those not being there," he added.

Petronis said the runways could possibly be "mined" and the aggregate sold to help develop the project. Frank Kolb, a member of the citizens' advisory board, told of a project in Fort Worth, Texas, where developers mined the old runways to earn \$800,000 after receiving bids to remove the runways for about \$1.2 million.

Petronis said village planning officer Margaret McDonald Lahey, also a member of the citizens' advisory board, will be his liaison with the appointed group.



## White Sands officials to discuss FAAD project

Activity on the White Sands Missile Range near Carrizozo seems to be on the increase.

Representatives from the Missile Command, Fort Bliss, White Sands Missile Range and the Army's Office of Testing and Evaluation will meet members of the press Tuesday, June 30, for a press conference

in which details of development of the Forward Advanced Air Defense (FAAD) system are to be revealed, according to Don Montoya, of the White Sands public affairs office.

Companies who are competing for contracts on the project also will be represented at the event.

An environmental assessment

has been done on the site, on the range southwest of Carrizozo, by the Army Corps of Engineers, according to a Corps of Engineers spokesperson who declined to be identified. The site apparently was used for testing of the "Sergeant York" project, a defense project that has since been scrubbed by the Army.

It is estimated that about 200 people will begin work on the FAAD project for the first six weeks, and a peak level of 550 people will be reached sometime later, said the spokesperson. Other details of the project, including start-up dates and the length of the project, were not released.

## Municipal bond rating quest led to New York trip

Village manager Frank Potter said Friday a trip he and other village officials made to New York last week didn't cost the village anything.

Potter, Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., village clerk/finance officer Leon Eggleston, airport manager Tim Morris and village attorney John Underwood traveled to New York, apparently at the expense of Rilee and Associates, the village bonding company.

Potter said the purpose of the trip was to get a rating on bonds to be issued for the \$2.7 million value of the Ruidoso Municipal Airport. Village voters last year approved a .50 cent gross receipts tax increase to repay those bonds.

Potter apparently disagreed with comments made while he was away

by infra-structure division director Becky Durham, who was the top ranking village employee with both Potter and Eggleston out of town.

"It's not any concern of mine ... or yours," said Durham early this week when asked about the trip.

"It's people's business," said Potter Friday. "We're at the pleasure of the public," he added.

"The bonding company requested that I go," said Potter, who was away from the village for three days. He said Monday was spent getting to New York, all day Tuesday in meetings with bond company representatives and Wednesday in getting back to Ruidoso.

Potter didn't comment on why five people made the trip, but confirmed that Underwood and Eggleston left Ruidoso on Friday to attend the Tuesday meeting.

He also said he had no problems with a bonding company footing the

bill for village employees and elected officials to attend a business meeting.

"If it's beneficial for the village they can do that," said Potter.

He said the Village of Ruidoso has for years used Stearn Brothers to handle the village's bonding business, but that company recently merged with Rilee and Associates. He said there are other bonding companies, but bonding services is among professional services exempt from competitive bidding.

"They don't go out after each other's business," noted Potter. He said Rilee and Associates is working to get the village the best rating.

The rating process included Tuesday's meeting with analysts and insurance division representatives of Moody, a bond rating company.

Potter said he and other village representatives were asked "every

question imaginable."

He said that information will be evaluated and used by the group that will assign a rating, such as A, AA or AAA.

"It's like you're borrowing money from the bank and they're wanting to know how you'll pay it back," said Potter.

With no exposure at the new airport and a number of changes to the tax laws, Potter said obtaining a good rating is critical for this bond issue. He said the Federal Aviation Administration is already asking when the \$2.7 million will be available for the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport construction project.

Once a rating is assigned the bonds can be offered for sale, said Potter.

"It was definitely a worthwhile trip," he added.

## Council OKs water defense funds

The Ruidoso Village Council conducted a special meeting Thursday for an executive session to discuss litigation.

Deputy clerk Tammie Maddox said councillors went into regular session and voted to accept a contract with Western Research Cor-

poration to work with water attorney Neil Stillinger on the Mescalero Apache Indian water case.

Maddox said councillors set a maximum of \$25,000 and reasonable expenses for the water research contract.

## Girl hurt in accident

An 11-year-old Ruidoso girl is in stable condition at Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) with injuries she sustained in a vehicle/bicycle accident on Cree Meadows Drive about 6:30 p.m. Friday, according to official reports.

Police said Jannifer Daly was riding her bicycle on Cree Meadows Drive when she was hit by a 1979 Jeep CJ-7 driven by Todd Morris, 16, of Ruidoso.

No statements were taken at the scene, as Morris was also taken to LCMC where he was checked for shock, according to the accident report.

Officer David Perkins said when he arrived at the scene, near the entrance to Ruidoso Municipal airport, the vehicle was stopped in the oncoming traffic lane with the bicy-

cle pinned under the jeep.

Perkins reported that evidence at the scene indicated Morris was driving east on Cree Meadows Drive near the top of a hill when he apparently saw the child riding a bicycle in his lane and veered left to avoid hitting her. Perkins said the bicyclist apparently heard or saw the vehicle and "made an evasive move in the same direction."

Police said the driver hit his brakes, but still hit the left side of the bicycle knocking Daly to the pavement and then under the Jeep.

The child and bicycle were dragged from 90-95 feet under the vehicle in the westbound lane, according to the report.

Police said the investigation is continuing. No citations were issued, according to the accident report.

## Gymnasts are 'Tops'

The Ruidoso Mountain Tops brought home two team trophies from the Hawaiian Invitational gymnastics meet in Las Cruces last week.

The Mountain Tops Class III competitors won first place over Zia and Mesilla Valley Gym advanced teams. 

## Longshot clocks fastest time in Rainbow trials

Dance Hall Maskeo, a 50-1 longshot ridden by Jimmie Hunt, surprised a crowd of 2,600 fans on Friday at Ruidoso Downs when the gelding turned in the fastest clocking in eliminations for the \$700,000 Rainbow Futurity.

Trainer Johnnie Goodman saddled Dance Hall Maskeo to a whisker win in Friday's fifth race - the 29th division of the Rainbow Futurity elimination trials. More than 300 horses faced off in 36 heats during the past three days at Ruidoso Downs. The top two finishers in each race advanced to time trials on July 1. The 10 fastest horses that day will line up in the final of the Rainbow Futurity on July 19.

Only two winners managed to step off Ruidoso's 400-yard course in less than 20 seconds on Friday - Dance Hall Maskeo and Elans Special. Hunt steered Dance Hall Maskeo down the track in 19.88 seconds. The Make Em Blush son is owned by Bobby and Margaret Whitenor of Republic, Missouri, who also bred the gelding.

A two-dollar win ticket on Dance Hall Maskeo returned \$108. The quintela combination of Dance Hall Maskeo and 6-5 favorite Wicked Dash paid \$138.

Elans Special was clocked in 19.91 while winning her division by three lengths under rider Alex Baldillez. John Buchanan trains the Special Effort filly for

owner/breeder Dr. Lindsey Burbank of Leesburg, Florida.

Elans Special is a leading candidate to make the finals of the Rainbow after qualifying easily for the \$500,000 Kansas Futurity at Ruidoso Downs last month.

Lady Pass Oak, the filly who took home a \$34,000 third-place check in the Kansas, posted a decisive victory in her Rainbow division. Texan Duane Hartsell gave the leg-up to jockey Steve Fuller. Lady Pass Oak is campaigned by the Oak Hill Trio partnership based in Franklin, Texas.

Frisco, Texas, rancher B.F. Phillips teamed with trainer Dwayne Gilbreath to qualify three horses in Friday's eliminations. Wicked Dash opened their streak followed by second-place finishes with Bugged Ego and Beautiful Dash.

A \$6,500 first-place check went to Jane Phillips and Minnie Wood of Frisco, Texas, who also bred Cherokee Lake. The gelding is sired

Financial Aid's second earned \$2,500 for Ruidosoans James Pirtle and Frank Saylor. Trainer Johnnie Goodman gave the riding assignment aboard the 4-year-old Silver Charge gelding to veteran Luke Myles.

Fine Loom Handicap winner Dash Te checked in more than

three lengths behind Financial Aid for a \$1,000 third-place check. Kenny Lewis rode the Roy Barrington trainee.

Imarealesterbunny finished fourth followed by 2-1 favorite Senator Billy B., Runaway Bandit, Fols Bid, Sudden Avenger, Jack Dugan and Short Shift.

## Lubbock County to debut Thursday

Lubbock County, last summer's champion thoroughbred filly, takes her bow at Ruidoso Downs this summer in Thursday's allowance headliner.

Facing the stakes winner in the 6-furlong main event are Blind N Love, Bandolino, Gorheadon, Go West Young Lady, Captain Codex, Chapter Closed and Inconvenient Miss. The 12-race card gets under way at 1 p.m. with the track's gates opening at 11 a.m.

He should show considerable improvement in Thursday's feature race, however, and deserves mention after lighting the board in two stakes events this season.



## Jockey ends bad luck with Norgor win Sunday

Things finally went right for El Paso jockey Casey Lambert as he upset odds-on favorite Pass The Half on a clever ride aboard Fearless Ego in Sunday's Norgor Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

"I've had so much bad luck since I've been up here this summer," Lambert said. "I knew it was going to have to give sooner or later - and I was just hoping it would be this one."

The 9th running of the Norgor Futurity offered a \$120,000 jackpot to the fastest horse over Ruidoso's 5 1/2-furlong course. The 10-horse field was trimmed to nine when trainer Bill Leach scratched Quick Qui shortly before the race.

Pass The Half and Fearless Ego went postward as the two strong favorites for the sprint. Pass The Half was bet down to 1-5 odds, while Fearless Ego was let loose at 9-2 on the board.

Lambert took the field by surprise as he rocketed out of the gates, settling Fearless Ego on the rail for the shortest trip around the course. Jockey David Lidberg pressed the pace aboard Pass The Half to the quarter pole before trying to overtake the filly as they approached the stretch. Fearless Ego held on to win by a neck.

For the second time, Pass The Half was beaten by a neck for the winner's share in a major stakes race. He lost the Riley Allison Futurity last month at Sunland Park by the same margin. The \$26,000 second-place check in the Norgor took his earnings this year to \$178,000 from only six starts, making him the nation's leading 2-year-old money earner. Before banking runner-up money in the Riley Allison, he won the Jean Lafitte Futurity at Delta Downs.

Its Called Class was no less than dazzling while winning her elimination trial by more than five lengths in Thursday's second race. Jockey Nicky Wilson never uncocked his

whip for the 400-yard journey that stopped the electronic timer in 19.99 seconds. None of the remaining 11 winners were able to break the 20-second barrier.

Trainer O.S. Carlton IV saddled Its Called Class for her first official start in late March at Bandera Downs near San Antonio. She missed qualifying for the \$74,000 Bandera Downs Futurity in her next trip to the gates and then broke

her maiden in impressive fashion at Ruidoso Downs on May 29.



With the beginning of summer, our wild flowers are beginning to greet us by the wayside with their bright colors—more brilliant and sparkling

than ever on account of the good rains; and wonderfully framed by the vast background of the emerald world, which adds the magic tints of its color to bring forth all the tints and hues of the blooms. The North won the first and third games, 15-11 and 18-16. The South took the second game (15-11), the


third game (18-16) and the final game (16-14).

Do you feel any differently today, Learned Reader? A decision occurred this week that will have a grand effect on our very lives and fortunes. The Gentlemen in Convention voted to rid us of our Articles of Confederation. For many this is no sin. The Articles were an ineffective, ponderous machine causing more problems than they solved. They are gone, and no longer are the Gentlemen working under the sham Revision; they are doing what many have predicted in the past, changing our Government completely.

Many decisions must now be made; primary among these concerns Power: where should it be placed, from whom should it be taken, to whom should it be given?

The Ravens of Europe are perched, anticipating failure so they can once again feed on American wealth. The jealousies of the Sovereign States to retain their power are abundant and noised about by many. The Land Speculators - and there are many in Convention and Congress - stare coolly from under rocks, poised to strike and savor an explosion of profit from lands to be exploited. The hard Backcountrymen lean indolently on their rifles anxious for an excuse to separate from their Eastern cousins.

Can the Gentlemen in Convention lay out a rope of law which we can all pull together, or will they give us the hangman's knot?

We will be the ultimate decision makers and will tolerate no dictatorship in our lives. ## Small States' Plan Is Defeated!

As he promised last Thursday, Mr. William Paterson of New Jersey presented the Convention with an alternative plan, a substitute for the one proposed by the Virginia Delegation. The delegates decided to consider both plans together in Committee. Mr. John Lansing Jr. of New York begged the Convention to postpone discussion for a day so that he and others could prepare their arguments in favour of the New Jersey (or Paterson) plan. His request was agreed to and debate started on Saturday. During the interlude, many gentlemen hastened to make copies of the new proposals.

New Jersey's plan has some features of the Articles of Confederation and some of the Virginia proposals. Of course, it keeps a one-house Congress in which each state has one vote - that is what the small state men are here for. Under the Virginia plan with its Two-House Congress, in which membership is assigned to a state according to population, the Small States would lose their power and the Big States - Pennsylvania, Virginia and Massachusetts - would become mighty. To appeal to those members who wish to make the present government more vigorous, the New Jersey plan calls for an executive and a judiciary, as well as giving Congress the right to tax and to regulate commerce. Very important is New Jersey's willingness to agree that the Laws and Treaties of Congress shall be Supreme and Obedience to them. Compelled.

### PLAN SUSTAINS SOVEREIGNTY

On Saturday the debate began in earnest. Mr. Lansing addressed the gentlemen forcefully, saying New Jersey's proposals sustain the sovereignty of the states, whereas the Virginia scheme destroys it. Mr. Paterson said his plan is the one the people want and it embodies what Congress asked the Convention to do - revise the Articles of Confederation.

### HAMILTON OFFERS RADICAL SOLUTION

Instead of the debate on these two plans continuing on Monday, Mr. Alexander Hamilton of New York interjected with yet another plan, one of his own devising. His plan is a radical one. He wishes for a sovereign national government that would make the states' responsibilities only small and local. Despairing of the Confederation, he also feared that the states, unless weakened, would continue to overshadow the central government because they had on their side force, habit, interest etc., which are the maintainers of all civil governments.

If a stronger central government could be created, the best model to follow was that of the British Monarchy! (Several gentlemen who had nodded off during the speech because of its length and the extreme heat, jerked into consciousness here.) But, he continued, America was best fitted to be a Republic. Nonetheless, its government must be stable and permanent. He acknowledged, too, that its structure must be based on the inevitable struggle between rich and poor. Therefore, property holders would vote for an upper chamber whose representatives would serve for life. The lower house would represent the Mass of the People whose chosen delegates would serve for three years. To check both houses, an executive with an Appointment for Life would hold an Absolute veto over Congress.

### SPEECH TAKES 5 HOURS!

Mr. Hamilton's speech took over five hours to read; when it ended the Committee adjourned at once and with relief. That is not to say that Mr. Hamilton's efforts were unappreciated. Members were awed by his brilliance, but no one, apparently, was prepared to pay his arguments the compliment either of support or refutation, for the next day they continued to debate as if

he had not spoken at all.

Yesterday, at the end of a long speech which examined the many deficiencies of New Jersey's plan, Mr. James Madison pointed out to the Small States the consequences of "pernicious adherence to an inadmissible plan." What would happen to them if the Large States, disappointed in their efforts to strengthen the United States, formed themselves into Separate Confederacies? What role could the small states demand then? There was no solution to the problem of representation in Congress except that proposed by

Virginia: the Large States must be represented in proportion to their population!

Immediately the question of whether to support Mr. Randolph's or Mr. Paterson's plan was put, and carried overwhelmingly in favour of Mr. Randolph's plan. Only New York, Delaware and New Jersey voted in the negative. The gentlemen delegates then proceeded to go through the Virginia plan again - this time acting as the Convention, not the Committee of the Whole.

## News from Europe ...

### Lafayette and the Assemble

On 25 May, King Louis XVI dismissed the Assembly of Notables which has been meeting since February to discuss affairs of state. Although it is quite clear that France is approaching bankruptcy, the Notables have refused all suggestions that a general property tax, to be levied upon all, be approved. Opinion among the notables - representatives of the nobility, clergy, and propertied classes - is quite divided. Most, and especially the higher nobility led by the princes of the Royal Blood, seem determined to defend their privileges, and will yield nothing to the King. Despite the general respect with which Louis is regarded, it is widely thought that he is too young and inexperienced to force effective reforms in taxation; if concessions are to be made, the aristocratic party seem confident that it is the King, and not themselves, who must yield.

Others, however, have used the meeting of the Notables to issue a call for a greater popular voice in French government. There is talk of provincial assemblies being given a greater voice in affairs, and even calls for a meeting of the national Estates General, a body which hath lain silent since 1614. Foremost among those advocating reform is the young Marquis de Lafayette, late the companion of Washington in the war of American Independence. Some in France find Lafayette too "American" to be relied upon, but he has won great popular approval for his speeches in the Assembly attacking government extravagance and inequitable taxation. In one speech Lafayette noted that "unequal, arbitrary and ruinous taxes" are pressed upon those in France who "have no representatives in this assembly." Lafayette is one of the first to openly call for a meeting of the Estates General to discuss reform, a prospect many attack as dangerous and revolutionary. Yet the Marquis is sanguine that the cause of liberty deserves no less than to consult the genius of the people. If France would but follow the course of the United States toward a more liberal government, many of the evils here would be cured.

### Possible War Again?

It seems all but certain now that War between Russia and Turkey will be renewed, if reports reaching this city are to be believed. The Empress Catherine of Russia has just completed a most provocative progress to her southern territories, including the Crimea, that land North of the Black Sea which was wrested from the Turk some dozen years ago. While inspecting fortresses and observing Russian Black Sea squadron maneuvers, Catherine was joined by her ally, the Emperor Joseph of Austria. The import of this Joint Visit to the Crimea, a territory whose incorporation into the Russian empire

hath never been accepted by the Turk, could hardly be clearer. Both Russia and Austria are widely thought to have further territorial ambitions which could only be satisfied at the expense of the Turk. Russia, having gained access to the Black Sea, desires free passage to the Mediterranean Sea, for which purpose possession of Constantinople and the Straights there are essential. For her part, Austria covets the Slavic lands of the Balkans, where Christians have long been held in thrall by the Moslem Turks.

The latest intelligence to be had here is that the Turks, much alarmed by Catherine and Joseph's Crimean tour, are determined to send an Embassy to Moscow, demanding satisfaction on the Crimean question. Failing Russian concessions, which hardly seem likely, war might ensue by Year's End. In such case, wider troubles might be anticipated. Sweden would wish to regain her former Baltic provinces, where Catherine's predecessor Peter the Great built St. Petersburg. Prussia, for her part, might well take advantage of the occasion of war to seek territorial gains in Poland. The peace of all Europe now rests on the most fragile Foundations. Much depends on the Empress Catherine, but those who would hope to see her act as peacemaker will surely be disappointed. Her Highness was reported much pleased by the Crimea, and seems little inclined to avoid a new war which she believes, perhaps mistakenly, will add to her Dominions.

### Lafayette on the Convention

The Marquis de Lafayette we have learned, has just received communications from American friends Messrs. Washington and Franklin confirming the impending meeting of a federal convention in Philadelphia. In a letter to John Jay shewn to this correspondent, Lafayette expressed his approbation and his hopes for a happy conclusion of America's exertions. "May the Convention," he writes, "be the happy epocha of federal, energetic, patriotic measures! May the friends of America rejoice! May her enemies be humbled, and her censors silenced at the news of her noble exertions in continuance of those principles which have placed her so high in the annals of history and among the nations of the earth!" Not all here concur in Lafayette's opinions, of course, but those Americans who have witnessed the tyrannical and autocratic spirit of French government will understand both the great popular regard in which the Marquis is held here, as well as the mistrust many of the aristocratic party feel for him. Let us all hope that the present crisis in France will result in Greater Liberty as the parent studies at the knee of the child - young America teaching elder France the lessons of Republican Government!

### Youngest Delegate Arrives

Twenty-six year old Jonathan Dayton of New Jersey arrived at the Pennsylvania State House to assume his role as New Jersey Commissioner to the Constitutional Convention. His late arrival was caused by the failure of two previously selected New Jersey delegates to appear, and of his father, Colonel Elias Dayton's, decision to defer the position to his son.

The younger Dayton is known for his brashness. William Pierce, who served with the nineteen-year old captain in the Continental Army in a 1779 campaign with the Six Nations Iroquois, said that Dayton has "an impetuosity in his temper that is injurious to him," but that he also possesses an "honest rectitude."

Even at his young age Dayton has already seen much public service. He has served two terms in the New Jersey Legislature, and is currently Speaker of the House.

The ambitious young man will have his Abilities and Temper challenged by delegates from larger states like Virginia and New York who want proportionate representation in a national Congress. Dayton has made it very clear that he wants to see that Equality is maintained among the States.

Convention now sitting there, are much interrupted by the noise of the same - RESOLVED that a Quantity of Gravel now hauling out of the Sewer in Fourth Street, be laid on Chestnut Street, in front of the State House.



## Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—Can you stand a few more words on the old man's political "philosophy"?

Just the question is probably enough to scare you off, without even waiting to see what comes after it.

But as I pack my portmanteau for departure to an island somewhere over the horizon, certain thoughts keep welling up insistently, carrying with them a strong suggestion that if I do not get them off my chest now I may never have the chance to share them with you, how terrible to miss that opportunity—"terrible," that is for me, though not necessarily for you.

What has been working away in my mind at present has to do with a degree of inconsistency that I find endemic among New Mexico politicians of the moment. Why do they go one way one moment and quite another the next? It was a notable characteristic of the Anaya years; and now, only six months into the Carruthers term, it bids fair to be as much a hallmark of the present time. We hire Dave Sierra, we fire Dave Sierra; we discover Bill Dally, and we discharge Bill Dally. On again, off again; here today and gone tomorrow. What does it all come from?

Well, let me put it this way. People (a word that even includes "politicians") who operate in accord with a deeply embedded set of principles almost always display a high degree of that consistency I find so lamentably lacking from much of New Mexico politics.

Principles, after all, construct a kind of fence around human conduct, simply because they direct the avoidance of certain specific actions, which are viewed as "forbidden," or at least undesirable.

Those not constrained by such ethical consideration, however, obviously suffer from no such limits. They may do whatever they want, and they usually do. Since that is true, they are often perceived as erratic and unpredictable—which is just what I am complaining has been all too true of New Mexico governors in recent years.

Take a deep breath. I want to add to that thought this one: Those who are principle-less, or nearly so, often lack resonance and depth. Since the

motives for their actions are almost always simply emotions, which are near the surface, their performance is usually notably discontinuous, marked by abrupt accesses and losses of interest. They go, as I have complained our chief executives of late have been given to going, now one way and now another.

Example: Here in Santa Fe, the Highway Department tells a group of people who have been parking beside the highway to sell firewood and flagstones from their trucks directly to customers who stop for the purpose that this is an illegal use of state-owned right of way.

That action is first upheld by the chief executive. Then the phrase "free enterprise" comes into play, and someone reminds the governor that he should be encouraging such efforts, not discouraging them.

Wham! The compass needle slams around to the other side, and the Department of Economic Development is now publicly recommending that we set aside a space in every county so small entrepreneurs can use state-owned land on which to conduct their businesses.

Enthusiasm has once again won the day. Nowhere, however, is there any suggestion that others already legitimately in business might resent this kind of activity. Nowhere has there been a discussion about licenses for such itinerant vendors. Nowhere has a question been raised as to whether these sellers are transmitting to the state, as the law requires them to do, gross receipts tax on what they sell.

No. Instead of that kind of thought-out procedure, what we get is like Mickey Roney telling Judy Garland we can raise the money by putting on a show in his uncle's barn. This impetuous changing of direction isn't government; it's show biz. It clearly isn't planned in advance, anymore than was the choice of Dally, the late lamented film commissioner. What's worse, it does not appear to be rooted in any philosophy of government or set of political principles. Like a Potemkin village, it's all facade, with nothing much behind it.

A state I think deserves the best seems to me to be getting mostly sounding brass and tinkling cymbals.

## Editorial

Let us not allow vague suspicions to lead to a blatant disregard of our rights guaranteed by the U.S. Constitution.

Such is the case in Carlsbad, one of several towns that requires mandatory testing of city employees when they are hired.

The Carlsbad case came to light last week when a man hired as city attorney withdrew from the job rather than submit to a drug test. He disagreed with the policy "as a matter of principle."

So do we.

The Fourth Amendment of the Constitution is specific. "The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no warrants shall issue, **but upon probable cause**, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized."

A drug test is a search of someone's body.

Probable cause is "a reasonable cause for supposing that a criminal charge is well-founded," according to Webster's Third New World Dictionary.

So what probable cause can be claimed in the case of mandatory drug tests for city employees? Do the officials in Carlsbad suspect that every person who applies for a job, now, or next month, or next year—even someone they've not yet met—is a user of drugs?

If probable cause for a search can be claimed in that case, then **everyone, everywhere** (all of whom could someday apply for a job in Carlsbad) may be using drugs and so should be tested.

That's quite unreasonable, and, we believe, unconstitutional.

Let's have no such disregard of rights in Ruidoso.—DJP
