Proposals sought of T-hangar operators

Contractors interested in developing T-hangars at the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport were invited Thursday to design their own proposals.

"We've left as much flexibility in the project as possible," said Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) attorney Steve Sanders, who drafted the request for proposals.

Sanders said "commissioners will not be expending any money." He said most other items in the request are subject to negotiation.

"There is really nothing fixed in concrete—everything will be subject to negotiation," said Sanders.

In the SBAC request, developers are asked to invest \$120,000 as the local share needed for a Federal Aviation Administration grant to pave the area up to the T-hangars.

"Obviously, if nobody offers that we're going to have to look at a different number," said Sanders.

"You can offer more," said airport administrator Fred Heckman.

"We're going to want you to design it... tell us what you're willing to build," noted Sanders.


While the exact amount of land isn't fixed, Sanders said the engineer has a preliminary plan showing a layout with 32 singles and 10 double hangars with 75 feet between each unit. He said that is subject to change by the contractor.

Sanders said he'll answer in writing any questions submitted by Wednesday, July 15, and send those responses to all prospective bidders. He said proposals are due Thursday, July 23, with interviews to be conducted Friday, July 24, in executive session with proposers.

Request for proposal documents are available from Sanders or Heckman for a \$50 non-refundable fee.

Also during Thursday's workshop, SBAC Chairman Tim Morris, questioned about commercial service expected at Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, said he has talked with Mesa Airline and Continental Express. He said Air Ruidoso is expected to have regularly scheduled flights.

It was learned that a pilot made an apparently unauthorized landing on the airport construction site on June 23. No details of that incident were available through the Ruidoso Municipal Airport or the Federal Aviation Administration.

Airport users question operator requirements

Proposed minimum standards for operating at the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport got a cool reception from the handful of people at a public hearing Thursday.

"It's going to be difficult for anybody to operate out there," said Steve Hightower, a charter pilot at the Ruidoso Municipal Airport.

As Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) attorney Steve Sanders reviewed the 30-page draft document, Hightower, charter pilot Merle Miller and others at the meeting continued to raise questions over the proposed requirements.

Sanders said much of the information he incorporated in the proposal came from standards used at Santa Teresa Airport, Double Eagle Airport in Albuquerque or recommended by the Federal Aviation Administration or the state Department of Transportation.

But he stressed that the document is subject to change, and asked for input from prospective airport users.

"We don't want a standard so strict nobody can comply... or so lenient you might as well not have one," noted Sanders. "If these restrictions are too burdensome... they may need to be changed," he added.

Users were invited to submit

written comments by Wednesday, July 15.

Items of contention included liability insurance, commission approval on rates to be charged and floor space minimums for commercial operators.

"We want to satisfy everybody," said SBAC Chairman Tim Morris. He encourages anyone interested in the airport to review the minimum standards proposal and make recommendations.

Copies of the draft document are available for review at the Ruidoso Municipal Airport or by contacting commission members, administrator Fred Heckman or Sanders.

Highway 37 repairs continue; four-laning in plans for 88-89

District traffic engineer Tim Basler of Roswell asks area motorists to be patient with any inconvenience caused by continuing maintenance operations on State Highway 37 (Mechem Drive).

"They're doing some extensive blade patching," said Basler in a telephone interview Friday. He said state crews are scheduled to restripe the road next week since the repeated repairs have apparently obliterated the center stripe.

Basler admitted the district office has received a number of complaints from area drivers, but said if maintenance is postponed the road surface will continue to deteriorate.

"If we were to just lay off that road and not do anything we'd get even more complaints," noted Basler. He said State Highway 37 (Mechem Drive) is severely cracked and the asphalt is generally in poor condition.

"Hopefully our state forces can hold it together until we can get that total reconstruction job started," said Basler. He said Mechem Drive is scheduled for a complete reconstruction in the newest five-year plan—1987-91.


Plans call for rebuilding the road in two phases. In 1988-89 the 2.6-mile section from Ski Run Road south to Ruidoso Downs will be redone, and in 1989-90 the project will continue to the Sudderth and Mechem drives intersection, said Basler.

During the second phase, a signal is planned for the corner of Mechem at Cree Meadows Drive, said Basler. He said a study two

years ago identified a need for signalization at that five-point intersection.

Basler said present plans call for redesigning and installing a cul-de-sac at the end of Country Club Drive to make it a safer

intersection. "I'm sorry I can't give you a magic answer," said Basler, again asking for cooperation and patience from drivers as maintenance operations disrupt traffic on the busy road.

Natale is convicted of heroin trafficking

A Lincoln County jury took just over an hour Wednesday to convict John Natale of trafficking heroin, possession with intent to distribute, according to Harry Wilcox Jr., senior trial prosecutor for the 12th Judicial District.

"Trafficking heroin is a heinous crime," said Wilcox, who is asking for the maximum sentence allowed by law on the second-degree felony conviction—nine years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

District Judge Robert M. Doughty, after reviewing conditions of release, remanded Natale to the Lincoln County Jail pending sentencing, said Wilcox. Bond was set at \$50,000 with no 10 percent for Natale, who had been on bond awaiting trial.

several witnesses, including Ruidoso Police detectives Dan Stewart and Mike Lovelace, former Ruidoso Police officer Dave Pfeiffer, Dr. Paul Echols and Ruidoso pharmacist M.R. Delhotal.

The state offered into evidence a prescription bottle, found in a blue bank bag containing "10 hits" of heroin, said Wilcox. He said the bottle had Natale's name on it and was offered to show proof that he was the owner of the bag.

Wilcox said police testified the bag was found on June 26, 1986, in a trailer in Ruidoso Downs. He said evidence was presented showing Natale was also located at that trailer on that date.

Larry Pederson of the state crime lab, who was qualified as an expert witness, told the jury the substance he analyzed, reportedly found in the bag, was heroin.

During the two-day trial the state

introduced numerous other items into evidence that were found in the bag, including hypodermic needles and other narcotics paraphernalia, said Wilcox.

"The defendant did not testify," said Wilcox. He said the defense called just one witness, David Lambert.

"He took the Fifth (amendment) on some questions and answered others," said Wilcox.

The prosecutor declined to answer questions of Natale's past record, saying any comment on that subject would be unethical.

Official records show Natale was bound over for trial in district court last year on armed robbery charges, charged with robbing Bennett's Shur-Sav grocery store.

Wilcox said those charges weren't pursued because of lack of evidence.

In another Lincoln County case,

Wilcox said he asked the jury, during a sentencing hearing, for victims' restitution as provided by state law.

After a jury in Carrizozo convicted Theodore Christian of criminal sexual contact of a minor, a third-degree felony, the prosecutor asked for the maximum incarceration under law and asked the defendant to restore victims for damages, said Wilcox.

"The crime had a devastating impact on the whole family," said Wilcox. Maximum sentence for a third-degree felony is three years in prison and/or a \$5,000 fine.

Wilcox said he asked for \$150,000 restitution to the victims.

District Judge Sandra Grisham will schedule an evidentiary hearing in the near future to determine those issues, said Wilcox.

Christian is out on bail awaiting sentencing, said Wilcox.


Tonight there will be a possibility of isolated thundershowers or otherwise mostly fair skies with light and variable winds. Probability of rain is 10 percent.

Dash Te wins Sunday's Flying Charm Handicap

Dash Te took advantage of a poor break by favored Financial Aid and a late scratch by recent Master Salls winner Cherokee Lake to claim the lion's share of the \$10,000 Flying Charm Handicap on Sunday at Ruidoso Downs.

The seven-horse field for the 1987 renewal of the Flying Charm was whittled down to six starters when the royally bred Cherokee Lake was scratched from the 870-yard test. A crowd of 4,000 fans backed Financial Aid down to the odds-on choice, with Fine Loom Handicap champion Dash Te the second pick at 2-1 on the board.

When the gates opened, Financial Aid appeared to take a bad start, opening the door for jockey Mike Short to take the early lead aboard Dash Te as the field rounded the turn. Almas Bunny, a 20-1 longshot ridden by Leroy Coombs, turned in a surprising effort. Coombs drew the colt alongside Dash Te on the final bend and raced an even second chasing the leader to the wire.

Dash Te won by a head to earn \$6,000 for John F. Maner and Bobby Brand of Lubbock. The final time


was 45.37 seconds. It was the second stakes win for the 6-year-old son of Dash For Cash, who chalked a whisker win over Financial Aid in the Fine Loom before finishing third in the Master Salls. His victory in the Flying Charm pegs Dash Te as a strong candidate for champion honors in the 870-yard category this summer at Ruidoso.

Roy Barrington gave the leg-up to Short aboard Dash Te. The veteran rider was taking his first assignment on the stakes winner.

"Financial Aid fell coming away from the gates," Short said after the race. "I thought if I could beat him to the turn, I could win. Once he got in trouble and I got the lead, I figured the rest would be pretty easy."

Almas Bunny pocketed \$2,300 for trainer Jack Bruner and owner Sue Zargas of El Paso. Fols Bid checked in a distant third under Salustio Burgos. Raymond Houtchens of Brownfield, Texas, owns and trains the 5-year-old Fols's Native gelding. Quickie Quick finished fourth, followed by Financial Aid and Geers Pat.

Jockey Joe Martinez and Big Bold Boz hold off a late charge from Prince Ego to capture the \$12,000 Jockey Club Handicap Saturday at Ruidoso Downs Race Track. The victory rolled Big Bold Boz' earnings to more than \$250,000. Brent Davidson saddled the winner for owner Jacqueline Spencer of Alto.

Crowd favorite Big Bold Boz bumped his career earnings to more than a quarter million dollars after winning Saturday's Jockey Club Handicap at Ruidoso Downs.

Under a clever ride by jockey Joe Martinez, Big Bold Boz stalked Prince Ego through the early stages of Saturday's 7 1/2-furlong Jockey Club Handicap. The two sprinters were neck-and-neck as the eight-horse field rounded the turn. When they straightened out for the final drive to the wire, it was Big Bold Boz who held a two-length advantage.

Casey Lambert got Prince Ego

rolling in the final furlong, but could not catch Big Bold Boz, who scored a half-length victory in 1:33 flat.

"When I got on the easy lead, I didn't think they would get by me," Lambert commented after the race. "But my horse was just kind of playing out there. He just had his ears up and he wasn't digging in."

"When Big Bold Boz came running by me, my horse couldn't see him because of the blinkers. When he realized he had been passed, he came back running and if the race had been just a bit longer I would have gotten back by him."

Fearless Ego has never finished out of the money in six lifetime starts and has won four of those races for owner Jim Wilburn of Tulsa, Oklahoma. Regular rider Casey Lambert will pilot the swift miss from the far outside post position in Thursday's 11th-race headliner.

Facing the stakes winner from the rail out are Jaemin, My Dear Betty, Daring Renee, Happy Katherine, Flying Joyce, River Bend Bell, Special Answer and Bold

Seaducer. Flying Joyce appears to be in top form after drawing out to a three-length victory over maidens on July 1 at Ruidoso Downs. Jockey Quiet Bui piloted the chestnut daughter of Foreign Control in that 5 1/2-furlong test and will be back aboard the filly in Thursday's featured Kachina division.

My Dear Betty also could be primed for a first-rate effort after finishing second as the 3-5 favorite in a 6-furlong race for maidens on July 2. The filly held a half-length lead in the early stages of the that sprint before tiring in the final furlong. My Dear Betty should improve at the 5 1/2-furlong distance with former leading rider Glen Murphy aboard.




In Wednesday's only reported game, the Diablos edged Mescalero, 14-13.

"We have a trail that goes over in back and looks over the whole valley," said Scrimshire. "It's a beautiful ride."





Building permits drop in April and May

An upsurge in village building reported for March was shortlived as construction permits took a sharp nosedive in April and fell further in May.

March's \$1,274,546 total fell to \$510,138 in April with 20 permits issued in all categories. Only 21 permits were issued in March, but a \$651,859 condominium project at Rancho Ruidoso beefed up the dollar total.

Building valuation fell slightly in May when 28 permits were issued worth \$456,367.

In 1986, April permits numbered 29 for \$702,927, and May permits totaled 31 at \$809,681.

This year, by the end of May the village had issued 95 permits with a year-to-date value of \$2,654,282, lagging way behind May 1986 when year-to-date totals hit 128 permits worth \$6,333,075. Village building in May 1986 remained down by more than \$2 million from May 1985.

Residential building continued to hover near the half-million dollar mark with six single-family homes worth \$416,584 started in April—down a bit from eight new homes worth \$565,793 started in March. Last year in April the village saw seven residential starts worth \$580,880.

In May, single family home permits fell to just four with valuations totalling only \$261,896—less than half of May 1986 totals of eight new home permits valued at \$613,354.

Residential remodeling permits numbered seven with a value of \$35,816 in April, but jumped to 15 at

\$132,733 in May. Residential redos in March were at 11 worth \$59,895, and last year in April 14 remodeling permits worth \$63,910 were issued. In May 1986 home fix-up permits numbered 16 for \$122,776.

Commercial building remains at a standstill with no new commercial building projects started in 1987.

Two commercial building permits valued at \$57,552 were issued in May 1986, but none were issued in April 1986.

Commercial addition/alteration permits were at seven with a value of \$57,738, nearly even with April 1986 when seven commercial remodeling permits were issued with a value of \$58,117. No commercial redo permits were issued in March.

May's commercial remodeling projects were at eight with a value of \$60,235, way over May 1986 when just one such permit valued at only \$1,000 was issued.

Memories are golden of National Senior Olympics

Olympic flames may be extinguished, but the glow lingers on—the glow of excitement that was the first National Senior Olympics.

For the seven Lincoln County senior athletes and their support group, the thrill of participating in the history-making event in St. Louis last month will never be forgotten.

"It was like a dream come true," exulted Dorothy Payne, one of the state's 61-member team. "Just getting to go was a thrill, but being there ... and the competition. But the biggest thrill was when I got the gold medal. When they hung it around my neck, I almost choked up. It still seems like a dream, but I've got it hanging on my horseshoe trophy in the living room so I know it's no dream!"

Payne, the group's only medal winner, pitches horseshoes and "really earned her medal," according to husband Bud, also a state representative at the games. "The most any opponent got off her was 11 points. Why, in the championship round, she won 35-3!"

Also watching and cheering Dorothy were Zia Center director Barbara Ward and Josie Tenorio. "We were so proud," they said, "because we knew this was New

Mexico's first gold."

Even for athletes who didn't wear medals home, pride in participation and representing their state shone in their eyes.

"I was real proud to be from New Mexico," smiled Pat Bailey, who finished 11th in bowling. "The whole state went out for us and we really appreciated it."

Her feelings were echoed by all the athletes. "Our support group, headed by Olivia Reid of Roswell, provided outstanding service during the games. Our uniforms provided by Sunwest Banks were the subject of much praise, even envy, among the other participants," said Lester Lanelli, who tied for fifth place in men's singles table tennis.

"When the New Mexico team, in those bright red uniforms, marched past the reviewing stand during the opening parade, they got the loudest cheer," recalled Ward and Tenorio. "And we made the front page of the Sunday sports section of the St. Louis paper—in color!"

Athletes also raved about the support system offered by Reid, president of the New Mexico Senior Olympics, and her staff.

"They were terrific. They ran vans for us to the sites and picked us up. We didn't have to worry about a thing," said Virginia Danielson, who finished in the top group of bowlers. "Other states were envious because no one else

had that kind of support."

"Our state legislature really helped," confirmed Ward. "They gave \$25,000 toward this event. Participants from other states said they were going back home and tell them how well we were taken care of by our state."

All agreed they relished national competition. "Although I've competed in three state Olympics and won two silver medals, this was my first national meet," said Bud Payne, who tied for seventh place in men's horseshoes. "I sure had a good time, even if I did run hot and cold!"

Confirmed Dorothy, "He was real hot in practice."

"I found it quite stimulating and exciting. I'd never experienced playing with world-class players before," said Lanelli.

"Just being there was great," recalled Lucy Griego, who finished 10th in bowling. This was her second national level competition, and "I just loved it."

While sightseeing and competing, the local New Mexicans never lost an opportunity to "PR." Danielson passed out Smokey Bear pens from the Capitan Chamber of Commerce, reminding everyone "New Mexico is a state, too. You'd think some of them never had a geography lesson in their lives," she moaned after a conversation with a Pennsylvania bowler.

Also finishing in the final group of bowlers was Fabian Valderrama, who enjoyed figuring out the computer scoreboards at the bowling center. "We don't have these at home," he confided.

Media attention also added to their "esprit de corps." Not only were they front page items, one was the subject of an ABC television interview.

Recalls Dorothy Payne: A TV crew interviewed me right before my championship game. Then, while I was pitching, the cameras followed me from one end of the pit to the other. Good thing they caught me when I hit a couple of ringers! Then, when I won—wow! Back they came. I never saw it on TV, but a lady in Carrizozo stopped me in the store and said, "I was in Florida visiting my family and saw you on TV. They didn't believe me when I jumped up and yelled, 'I know that woman!'"

One final accolade remained for the returning athletes. KOB-TV welcomed them at the Albuquerque airport, naming the entire team "Players of the Week."

"We're looking forward to the next Nationals in '89," said Ward. "We're contemplating establishing a permanent fund so we don't have to do last-minute fund-raisers."

Athletes, too, anticipate the upcoming contest. "Wait till next year," they promise.

Jockey Quyet Bui: a case of determination

"I just want to keep on riding and keep on winning," said Quyet Bui, a thoroughbred jockey at Ruidoso Downs.

Bui got his start in the horse racing industry after approaching

trainer Gerald Marr at the 1984 state fair in Albuquerque.

"I kept calling him and one day he said, 'If you wanna be a jockey that bad you can come down to Tularosa and if you like it you can stay and if not you can go.'"

Bui climbed on a bus in Albuquerque and headed for Tularosa and a

new career. The bus ride was the first time Bui had been out of the Albuquerque area and he had no idea what Tularosa would be like.

The town was so small that "you didn't know if you had gone through it," Bui said.

Bui spent a year at the Marr Training Stables learning all there

was about horses and racing.

"He knew nothing when he first started," said Charlene Marr. "But he had his mind made up that's what he wanted to do. He was very eager and dedicated and became very special to us."

The jockey went on to win his first professional race at the Albuquerque State Fair on a Marr Stable horse.

Bui, who has been racing at Ruidoso Downs for two years now, said he won 112 races last year as an apprentice and was awarded the Apprentice Jockey of the Year Award.

Bui recently lost his apprentice "Bug Boy" status and the weight allowance. Now Bui is a working journeyman jockey and must prove his worth.


"People always think of me as a bug," said Bui. "I have to show them I can ride and win."

Bui has had a winning attitude since being forced to leave his homeland of South Vietnam during the fall of Saigon in 1975.

"I hope my story can help someone," Bui said. "If you want something go out and get it. The opportunities are there and anyone can do it if they want to ... this is America."

Gas company official rebuts state claims

Claims that natural gas rates in the village would "skyrocket" were disputed Friday by Ken Johnston, manager of Ruidoso Natural Gas.

In an article in the Thursday, July 9, edition of The Ruidoso News, Gilbert Quintana, public utility engineer for the Public Service Commission (PSC), said he believes a proposed new pipeline would result in a tremendous jump in prices for gas consumers.

But Johnston said the rise would not be too high, keeping natural gas "still the most economical fuel that's available in Ruidoso."

"We have the lowest natural gas prices in the state," Johnston pointed out. Johnston said the present

transmission charge is 11 cents per thousand cubic feet (mcf) of gas. The new transmission charge would be about 80 to 95 cents per mc, partly depending on costs of materials for the pipeline.

The transmission charge is a small part of the gas bill, and other charges apparently would be unaffected by a new pipeline.

The pipeline proposed by Apache Mountain Pipeline of Hobbs would cost about \$2.5 million. Gas charges would reflect the increase for about 20 years to retire that debt, said Johnston.

The pipeline was proposed to PSC early last spring due to Ruidoso Natural Gas company officials' belief that the present four-inch line

is inadequate. PSC staffmembers apparently disagreed that a new pipeline was the best solution, and delayed making a decision for three months. That prompted gas company President Robert Maddox to announce a moratorium on new hookups, effective June 16. PSC staffmembers have said they'll fight the moratorium.

Johnston agreed with Quintana's assertion that the company's system has a peaking problem in winter when temperatures are low and consumption is up. But Johnston disagreed with Quintana's suggestion that major consumers could be placed on interruptible systems that would switch to other energy sources when gas pressure

falls. "I think it's kind of ridiculous," Johnston said of the plan. He said one study indicated the cost to set up a backup propane system equals the cost to build 7.7 miles of pipeline. Lengthy start-up times and other costs make such systems additionally prohibitive, he noted.

"It would just create more problems," he said.

Johnston also protested Quintana's actions and the control state government exercises on the way utilities conduct their business.

"It's kind of Communistic," he commented.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—If you're wondering why the governor's name appears at the top of this column instead of Fred McCaffrey's, it's because a one-time shot at writing the column was part of an agreement the two of us made when Fred served as governor for a day on June 8. We agreed he wouldn't pull any punches as acting governor, and I wouldn't pull any punches as acting political columnist.

First of all, I very much enjoyed spending the day with Fred McCaffrey. On a personal level, I find Fred very warm and very funny. (Some of his columns, I must admit, have not left me with the same feeling.) I also found many of his remarks throughout the day—which included a staff meeting, a cabinet meeting, a news conference and numerous other public and private gatherings—to be highly insightful and pragmatic.

Let me also say that I appreciate Fred McCaffrey's contribution to New Mexico during the past 10 years.

I often have referred to Santa Fe as "The Company Town," and to state government as "the company." Every company must have critics—very necessary players in the system of checks and balances that has made our democratic society workable for more than 200 years. Fred McCaffrey is perhaps the best known of these critics on New Mexico's political scene today.

While I'm not aware of a single occasion during my six months in office on which Fred called me or any member of my staff to confirm any item that ran in his column, I recognize that his function as critic is different from that of other writers and reporters.

While relying less on quotable sources and factual data, such critics must call on insight, satire, humor, a keen interest in the workings of state government and their own writing skills to do their jobs. No one I can think of has combined all of these qualities with more style and wit during the past 10 years than Fred McCaffrey.

That's not to say I think Fred McCaffrey is always right about everything he puts in his column.

But that's not really the point. The really vital function that Fred McCaffrey has provided to his many readers throughout New Mexico during the past 10 years is that he has made them—and their elected leaders—stop and think.

Whether or not we agree with what he writes, his columns have provided us with an insight we would not have found elsewhere. While Fred's remarks often are caustic, anyone who knows him understands that his words come from his heart. Fred McCaffrey cares about New Mexico and its political process.

We'll miss you, Fred. Best of luck in Montserrat.

As a subscriber of about ten years, I have come to think of your political cartoons as something like viewing a bad car wreck—you know that if you look, you will get sick at your stomach, but you look anyway. The one on July 2nd is a case in point. It shows a riot policeman with shield and nightstick contending against a little oriental, labeled "moderate", waving a flag demanding "Democracy Now." Holding the little demonstrator off the ground, as a kind of shield, is a sinister figure, club in hand (hammer and sickle emblazoned on his jersey), who represents the everpresent Communist conspiracy. These two are captioned "A well equipped leftist". The inference is disgustingly obvious, i.e. the demonstrators in the streets of South Korea are just pawns of the Communists.

This is, quite simply, a lie — a most dangerous lie. Why, Mr. Editor, should we find something sinister in a people demanding the basic elements of freedom?

No credible journalist believes that the mass of South Korean students, the supporting middle class, and even the number of government officials, who in concert demand free elections and a Bill of Rights are pawns of some imagined Communist conspiracy.

The suggestion is sick!

Our own founders never heard of communism, but they managed anyway to revolt against King George III, who by comparison with modern dictators was as benign as a fairy godmother.

Furthermore, the cartoon implies that all those living under and demonstrating against western tyrannical governments are just communist lackeys. Mr. Editor, communism is not the only form of repressive government. It would be difficult to find a notion that has caused more mischief in our time: it has given birth to a kind of national paranoia that has led our government to embrace the likes of Marcos and Pinochet and Duvalier and Samozza and Botha and Chun Doo Hwan and virtually every sleazy dictator who has the smarts to proclaim that he is holding back the "flood tide of worldwide communism" and, therefore, has a claim to our support. There are no greater enemies of democracy (indeed, of humanity) than such men as these. Should we assist them, Mr. Editor? To our shame we have. Are people who demand freedom a threat? We have often treated them as such.

Your cartoons, virtually without exception, are lousy journalism, just propaganda. Spare us this rubbish, please! If you cannot afford better, just leave them out. And be content to do what you do best: tell us what is on at the movies, what time of day the Noon Lions are to meet, who the Mayor has insulted lately, etc.

We will be better served.


