Group forms to promote economy

"As a county, you can't become too dependent on any one source of income—you must diversify," said David Henkel, Ph.D, director of Economic Development for the State of New Mexico at the introductory kickoff reception of the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County at Cree Meadows Country Club on Thursday night.

"You can increase tourism by treating business visitors well, and by providing the best community you can for its residents."

Henkel's organization is a non-profit group whose specific function is to attract selected new enterprises, aid them in securing the necessary funding where needed, and help them identify existing facilities or land appropriate to their needs. There are currently 110 branches of the corporation in New Mexico.

A group of Lincoln County civic leaders have been working for a year to put together a local branch of the corporation. They have now come forth to solicit memberships throughout the county. Some 33 new members joined at Thursday's reception. Each new member donates \$200, tax-deductible, and becomes a voting member of the corporation. The members want to raise \$50,000 before they elect a board of directors for the local concern.

Dr. Henkel spoke of the state's goals. "Studies show that people in southern California and the East Coast are travelling more than residents of the Southwest," he stated. "Governor Carruthers believes that New Mexico could be a 'product' to sell to these travelers. But when you want to sell a product, it's important to know what that product is.

Air Ruidoso plans to start this week

Air Ruidoso is ready to fly. President Helene McCoy announced Friday Air Ruidoso has been certified by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), and FAA aviation safety inspector Greg Nickerson of the Flight Standards District Office in Albuquerque agreed.

"Yesterday we did certificate them as an on-demand charter flight," said Nickerson in a telephone interview Friday.

"We'll be starting next week," said Air Ruidoso operations director George Matz.

Ruben Gonzales, FAA operations unit supervisor, said an on-demand

certificate authorizes the company to provide up to four flights a week to different destinations.

McCoy said Air Ruidoso will schedule four flights a day to El Paso, Texas, and to Albuquerque, and may also have flights to Roswell.

Nickerson said Air Ruidoso went through a number of inspections and reviews to be given the charter approval. They include a rigorous mechanical inspection of the aircraft, thorough investigation of people involved in the company and review of insurance coverage. He said Air Ruidoso fulfilled all the re-

quirements before the certificate was issued.

Although negotiations are not yet finalized for using facilities at the Ruidoso Municipal Airport, McCoy said she already has arranged for facilities at Albuquerque and El Paso international airports. She said Air Ruidoso passengers will load and unload in El Paso at the Southwest Air Ranger gate and in Albuquerque at Robertson facilities.

Air Ruidoso has an office in Ruidoso Financial Center, and may be reached at 258-4900.

Missing youngster is located here

An 11-month-old girl, reported missing six months ago in California, was located in Ruidoso and reunited Thursday with her father, according to Ruidoso Police Detective Lanny Maddox.

"I received information from (local attorney) Karen Parsons that she was attempting to locate an 11-month-old female for her father," said Maddox, who quickly located the tot, placed her in the hands of Human Services social workers and notified her father, who had court documents showing he had sole custody.

While police couldn't enter into a civil dispute, Maddox said the case became a criminal matter when he found information on the child in the National Crime Information Center (NCIC) computer system.

"I got a hit out of the Escondido (California) Police Department and the U.S. Marshal's office in San Diego (California)," noted Maddox. He then had the authority to act on the case.

Parsons said she was on hand for the emotional reunion, when the father and the child's grandmother flew from California to El Paso, Texas, and met in Alamogordo at a late-night court hearing at District Judge Robert Doughty's home.

"It was just a very touching reunion," said Parsons. She said the father, who flew to the scene as soon as he heard his daughter was located, said "he would have walked if he had to."

Parsons said the baby was in good shape and appeared healthy. "She is a very very well-tempered child," added Parsons.

Neither Parsons nor Maddox could provide the child's name, or information on the woman who had the little girl in Ruidoso. That woman apparently was the child's mother, according to statements made by Parsons and Maddox in discussions of the case. Maddox said no criminal charges were filed.

Parsons said a California court had entered a warrant for the arrest of the woman for flight, but that same court refused to file for

extradition in the case.

Parsons and Dan Bryant, another member of the local law firm involved in the case, both commended the Ruidoso Police Department for responding quickly in the case. They said the child was located once before in Texas, but the woman who brought her to Ruidoso fled that court's jurisdiction as soon as a court order was entered.

"Our primary concern was to get the child before the mother took off again," said Parsons.

"This father has been through the mill trying to locate his daughter," noted Bryant.

The two lawyers said Judge Doughty "graciously allowed us to meet with him at 11 p.m. in his Alamogordo home."

"We're real lucky," said Parsons, reiterating that without the cooperation of the police and judicial system the youngster would have remained just one more number in the growing numbers of missing children in the United States.

"It's a huge problem," said Bryant. He said the California tot is the fourth his law firm has helped to locate and return to a legal guardian.

He said he and Parsons "agonized" over this particular case, as they have other similar ones, since missing children cases have so many varied ramifications.

"You get a telephone call from a lawyer somewhere ... you never know what you're dealing with," said Bryant. "It takes a lot of consideration and prayer whether to even take the case," he added.

But in the case they just closed, Parsons couldn't be more "thrilled" after the happy get-together she witnessed in Alamogordo.

"It isn't without feelings for the mother," said Bryant, noting both parents were "hurting" over the situation.

"Her mistake is running in the first place," said Parsons. She said the child's mother may still have her "day in court" in California.

Dash For Speed captures \$600,000 Rainbow Futurity

Jockey Steve Fuller blasted to a two-length victory aboard Dash For Speed to walk away with the winner's share in Sunday's \$600,000 Rainbow Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

Racing resumes Thursday through Sunday this week when the mountain track hosts the finals of the \$100,000 Kachina Stakes and the \$125,000 World's Championship

Quarter Horse Classic. Thursday's card opens with a \$27,000 Twin Trifecta carryover.

Dash For Speed went postward as the 3-1 second choice behind top qualifier Elans Special for the 24th running of the Rainbow Futurity after Wicked Dash and Dash S Diamond were scratched from the 400-yard classic.

Racing from the rail post, Fuller

and Dash For Speed rocketed out of the gates to take the early lead. Fuller went to a left-handed whip when Dash For Speed began to drift toward the rail in the opening strides. After setting the Texas-bred miss on a straight course there were no challengers for the remainder of the journey.

Dash For Speed sped to a daylight margin in 19.73 seconds.

The final time was the second fastest in the history of the Rainbow, equalling Little Bit Shiney's clocking last year.

"I got after her pretty hard in the first part of the race just to keep her rolling," Fuller said. "Our main concern was to keep her off the rail. She gets a little scared down here on the fence. I had to hit her left-handed to get her away from the

rail."

Fuller said it didn't take him long to realize he had the race won.

"About 100 yards from the wire, I didn't think there was any way they would catch her."

The Rainbow Futurity trophy was trainer Larry Keiter's second major stakes score after saddling Sir Alibi to victory in last year's World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic. The Rainbow Futurity win earned \$212,730 for Thomas Bradbury and Bob Blakeman of Blakeman Farms in Fort Worth.

Imparting a bit of trivia, Blakeman said after the race that he and Dash For Speed share the same birth date - March 14 - the same day that he purchased the filly.

Blakeman said Dash For Speed's next assignment will come in the trials for the \$2.5 million All American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs. The All American is contested at the classic quarter mile

distance.

"I think she just proved she can handle the 440 yards of the All American," Blakeman said.

Oh Bid Go, a 22-1 longshot ridden by Roy Brooks, turned in a surprising effort to pick up a \$97,248 second-place check for Scott Roberts of Maysville, Ok. Boyd Morris, who rode 1966 Rainbow Futurity winner Top Ladybug, trains Oh Bid Go.

Elans Special overcame problems at the break to finish a head behind Oh Bid Go in third. The Special Effort filly earned \$49,840 for owner and breeder Dr. Lindsey Burbank of Leesburg, Florida.

Here's the remaining order of finish for the Rainbow Futurity with purse money earned: 4th - Its Called Class, \$26,135; 5th - Chrises Smash, \$23,704; 6th - Sailortown, \$23,096; 7th - Miss Daylight Run, \$22,489; 8th - Dance Hall Maskeo, \$21,881. Wicked Dash and Dash S Diamond each received \$20,969.

WRITE IT AND REAP!

Writing a classified ad that gets results—whether it be for real estate, employment, announcements, transportation, or merchandise—is easy if you follow the guidelines below.



1. Give the reader specific information. Pretend you are someone reading the classifieds. What would you like to know about the item, service or job you are advertising? Be sure to add details such as color, size, condition, brand name, age, features and benefits. Be accurate! Don't embellish your ad with misleading information. Stick to the facts and reap the rewards!



2. Include the price. Don't waste your time or a potential buyer's time. If you advertise the price of the item or service you offer, the people who respond to your ad will be those who are genuinely interested. Surveys show that readers are more interested in those items and services they know are within their price range.



4. Include phone number and specify hours. Be sure to let potential customers know when and where to call. Surveys show that even if a person is very interested in your item or service, he or she will not call back after the first attempt. Stay near the phone during the hours you indicate you will be available. Don't risk missing a sale!



3. Avoid abbreviations. Don't make a potential customer work too hard! Although you may be tempted to cut down on the cost of your ad by using abbreviations, surveys indicate that many people don't understand such abbreviations as EW (eat-in kitchen) or WSW (white side walk tires and won't take the time to figure them out. A confused reader is a disinterested reader. Get the most for your money and use complete words.



5. Run on consecutive days. Your ad will not get results if people don't see it. Therefore, it is important to set up a consistent and consecutive ad schedule with your telephone salesperson or outside sales representative. Run your ad for at least one week. Remember, you can cancel your ad as soon as you get the desired results!

Sonic Shecky speeds to Sierra Blanca Cap win

Sonic Shecky set a new seasonal record while posting an easy upset over Forever A Ruler in the \$12,500 Sierra Blanca Handicap on Saturday at Ruidoso Downs.

Taking his first assignment aboard Sonic Shecky, jockey Mike Lidberg stalked the pacesetter duo of Quickle Quick and Moolah Smoke to the head of the stretch before drawing out in the final furlong to win Saturday's Sierra Blanca Handicap. The final time for the 6-furlong sprint was 1:10 1 - the fastest clocking this season for the three-quarter mile distance.

Trainer Matt Mattox snapped a streak of second-place finishes with the Sierra Blanca victory. Sonic Shecky checked in second in the Sunland Park Derby, El Dorado, Herald-Post and Memorial Day Handicaps at Sunland Park, Albuquerque and Ruidoso Downs.

"I'm glad to see him coming back against these older horses after that bad race last time," Mattox said, referring to Sonic Shecky's seventh-place finish in the Jockey Club Handicap on last weekend.

Owner Morris Cannan of San Antonio picked up \$7,400 for Sonic Shecky's sharp performance. The first-place check pushed his earnings this year to nearly \$30,000.

Jesse Jim closed strongly in the deep stretch to bank \$2,700 for second under Carlos Rivas. Brooks Claridge trains the Jim J colt for Charles Smith of Arlington, Texas. Quickle Quick held on by a head to beat out Moolah Smoke for third. Duane Sterling rode the Fred Danley trainee, who earned \$1,200 for Phillip Mote of Alto.

The father-and-son team of Cliff Lambert and Casey Lambert made two trips to the winner's circle to dominate Thursday's trials for the \$105,000 Kachina Stakes at Ruidoso Downs.

Thursday's card featured 39 freshman fillies facing off in four trial divisions for the Kachina Stakes. The top three finishers in each 6-furlong division advanced to the final of the Kachina on July 25.

The Lamberts figure as leading contenders to pick up a \$52,000 first-place check in the sprint after two of their charges drew off to impressive victories in the trials.

Casey cruised to a four-length score aboard Trigo Dancer to upset odds-on favorite Deep River Woman in the third Kachina division. The Florida-bred miss is owned by Seven Rivers Inc. of Carlsbad. Shes Mighty Too checked in a distant second, followed by Tex Air.

The Lamberts' second victory was no surprise as Norgor Futurity winner Fearless Ego put 2 1/2 lengths between herself and the field in the final Kachina trial. The Bold Ego daughter is leased by Jim Wilburn from the Fearless Ego Joint Venture based in Tulsa, Oklahoma. Daring Renee qualified by finishing second, while Happy Katherine crossed the wire third.

Also winning their divisions were Ampaphella and Miss Blackhawk. Joining those two horses in the final will be Ego Dancer, Little Codo, Pressing The Issue and Stanny Palacios.

The Kachina qualifying field struck a note for New Mexico horse breeders. Four of the finalists are products of the Land of Enchantment. Three of those juveniles went through the sales ring in last year's Select Summer Sale at Ruidoso Downs.

Californian clocks fastest time in Classic trials

The West Coast filly Florentine appears headed for her fourth Grade I trophy this year after stepping off the top qualifying time in Friday's trials for the \$124,500 World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic at Ruidoso Downs.

Jockey Kenneth Hart never uncloaked his whip while piloting Florentine to a two-length winning margin in Friday's Classic trials. Racing in the 2-5 favorite from the rail post, Florentine stormed down the 440-yard straightaway in 21.835 seconds racing into a strong headwind.

The clocking was the fastest of the day and pegged the daughter of Dash For Cash as the leading contender for a \$63,000 first-place check in the final of the Classic scheduled for July 28.

After romping to a two-length margin in the Rainbow Derby three weeks ago at Ruidoso, it was announced Florentine would return to California for this winter's Quarter Horse Breeders Classic and Champion of Champions at Los Alamitos.

"She came back so well from the Derby that we decided to enter her in the Classic," said Ginger Hyland, Florentine's owner. "The

Los Alamitos races aren't until November, so she'll have plenty of rest."

Florentine won the El Primera del Ana Derby at Bay Meadows this spring, before capturing the Golden State Derby at the same course. The Rainbow Derby was her third major stakes victory, rolling her earnings this year to more than \$533,000.

Joining Florentine in the final of the World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic will be Illusivo (21.955), Barbarys Pokey (21.960),

Hiclass Girl (21.965), Keene Jet (22.040), Flow Of Cash (22.065), Big John Mito (22.100), Revengful (22.160), Runaway Bud (22.180) and Copper Bugs (22.190).

Hiclass Girl, Flow Of Cash and Illusivo each won their divisions. Luke Myles, who rode Flow Of Cash for trainer Dwayne Gilbreath, also qualified Gilbreath trainee Big John Mito. 

 "Once you compile a list of all we have—and use this as a 'comparative advantage'—then you know exactly what you have to sell, and if you know how to sell what you have, you can attract a better class of tourists."
 "You have to define your areas, because it isn't practical to have 100 different communities competing against one another in the same state. That's why a county-wide corporation makes so much sense."

You have different economic regions and different local directions.
 "The Economic Development Corporation helps reconcile a total state overview. We help use all the facilities the state has to offer, together, to try and improve the business structure of New Mexico."
 "We know that the economy is down all over the state. But so often, when a new business shows interest in locating in New Mexico, the local government says 'that's

great, we really want you here,' and the business says 'well, what kind of businesses are you trying to attract?' and the locals will say 'oh, anything,' out of desperation. This is not well-thought-out, and 'anything' usually ends up meaning 'nothing' because it's not cohesive."
 "The most important thing you can do as a community is to define what you have to offer, define what you need, and then go after that instead of adapting a piece-meal approach."

Don Shaw, one of the people who has worked on the corporation idea for the past year, remarked, "We've needed a corporation that everybody could agree with—property owners, businessmen and civic leaders. We've also needed one that is county-wide, one that would benefit the entire county and bring the fragmented communities together. We need to broaden our economic base, not just attract tourists."

 teach Special Ed at Ruidoso Middle School; and Bill Morris, who will teach Special Ed at the high school level.

Superintendent Sid Miller called for bids on milk products, meat products, and cafeteria equipment and supplies at Wednesday night's meeting.

Bids were awarded to Design Concepts for a gym floor covering. This will cost \$4,577.44. A bid has been awarded to Resliffe for a wrestling mat, which will not be purchased until late fall. And the board has decided not to award a bid for the new storage building, to be built on the northwest end of the high school athletic field by the pole vault pit. "I believe we can do this locally," stated Miller, who hopes that the high school wood shop can do at least part of the work in the fall.

Miller recommended that the board purchase a 2.6 acre triangle of land adjoining the high school from the Forest Service for \$35,000,

although he wants to have the board's appraiser make a counter appraisal before committing. The land purchase has been under consideration for the past few years. The board elected to purchase the land in April if funds are available then.

The Mescalero student attendance and transportation issue was also discussed, and the board is considering limiting Mescalero enrollment to those students living north of the Summit, because of transportation problems. This restriction would not affect those students already enrolled in the Ruidoso system, said Miller, regardless of where they live on the reservation. At the present time there are 280 Mescalero students enrolled in Ruidoso, and about 80 of these are from the southern side of the Summit.

"If we don't make a policy on this, the state will come in and set a policy for us, and then we may lose some of our Mescalero students," Miller explained. "It will be best for

us to make our own decision before this happens." No policy was adopted at the meeting, but board members are considering the options.

Superintendent Miller stated that he was "real pleased" with the construction work at Nob Hill School and the middle school, and invited board members and the public to tour the work in progress. He also commended the work that the school system's staff has been doing all summer.

"I get annoyed when people say 'well, you all must be having a nice summer vacation,' assuming that because the students are on vacation, so is everyone else in the system. We work hard all year around, and wish that the public would recognize that," he said.

Miller gave special recognition to Caron Snow, who had just balanced 15 local budgets and six federal budgets totalling \$10,000 and came up just nine cents off.

"But I found that nine cents," Snow commented.

A Capitan High School student will be completing his senior year of school in South Africa as part of a Rotary International youth exchange program.

Clint Henson is one of five Ruidoso area students who has been chosen to attend an overseas school next year.

Henson had heard of the program from friends who had been involved and became interested enough to apply.

Henson underwent an extensive application and interview process and was accepted.

"It came down to my personality and good grade point average," Henson said. Since discovering his

acceptance into the exchange program Henson said, "It has completely taken over my life." Earl Randall, a Rotary member involved in the selection process, said, "Henson has a real strong background as a kid who perseveres. He'll make it and do real well."

Henson was asked how he felt about American involvement in South Africa.

"America is meddling by divestment," Henson said. "It's putting mostly blacks out of work and increasing crime and poverty."

"I'll know more when I get back," he concluded.

Ruidoso Downs Trustees give OK to airport funding

"We're crowding the deadline," said Ruidoso Downs Mayor J.C. "Jake" Harris as the Ruidoso Downs Trustees attended a special meeting Friday to discuss the fate of the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

The trustees had until 5 p.m. Friday to sign a \$4,700,000 grant agreement for work to proceed at the new airport. The trustees had approved the grant at their last meeting and were waiting for the mayor's final

approval.

Tim Morris, chairman of the Airport Commission, waited for the signed grant documents which would allow the new airport's paving schedule to remain uninterrupted. The mayor approved and signed the grant before the 5 p.m. deadline.

The trustees discussed at length with attorney John Underwood the language of a new Sierra Blanca Airport Commission agreement.

The old agreement gave the five original government members equal say in decision making con-

cerning the development of the new airport. The new commission, of which Ruidoso Downs will not be a voting member, will be solely responsible for further development and operation of the airport.

The new commission will have three voting members from Ruidoso and three from Lincoln County. Ruidoso Downs would maintain an ex officio status.

The mayor and trustee Conrad Buchanan felt that the new commission should allow the ex officio members to vote in the case of a vote deadlock. Both men voiced

their reservations to Underwood, who wrote the new agreement, and then the two approved the agreement.

The only other item on the afternoon's agenda was an announcement by the mayor that he had informed the village's bonding agent of the recent resignations of former village clerk Jo Ann Jenkins and former village administrator Charles Robinson.

The board then adjourned what was the third meeting of the week for the trustees.

New law may benefit Crime Stopper organizations

A new state law could provide a shot in the arm for Ruidoso Lincoln County Crime Stoppers bank account.

During a regular meeting Thursday, Crime Stoppers board of directors discussed a state law authorizing reimbursement of crime stopper programs as conditions of deferred and/or suspended sentences. Reimbursement, according to the new law, may also be a condition of parole.

"We don't have to worry about our party being our only fundraiser," said vice-president Lanny Maddox. "We'll be reimbursed," he noted.

"While we do have a new contract public defender effective July 1, 1987, there will probably be a substantial number of deferred or suspended sentences," said District Judge Richard A. Parsons in a let-

ter to the board. He said that could result in a "substantial amount of money to both the Police Department and/or crime stopper programs."

Parsons recommended keeping in contact with the 12th Judicial District Attorney.

Also Thursday, the board discussed a payment approved during last month's meeting. Maddox said the board authorized paying a tipster \$300 for a tip that resulted in the arrest of three men suspected in a residential burglary.

Maddox said the caller hasn't yet been paid, but arrangements are being made for payment.

According to court records, the case involved Paul Daniel Oliver of El Paso, Texas, and Albert Renaud and Michael Ross Smith of Ruidoso, who were bound over for trial in district court. Charges were subse-

quently dismissed against Oliver.

Maddox, stressing that he doesn't know the identity of the person who called Crime Stoppers in the case, said he is sure none of the three accused made the call.

Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor and Harry Wilcox, senior trial prosecutor for the 12th Judicial District, both said the charges were dropped against the third defendant because of problems with extradition.

In a telephone conversation, Wilcox said the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office apparently picked the suspect up in El Paso, Texas, and transported him to Ruidoso without completing extradition paperwork.

Wilcox said when he discovered there was not a proper extradition order, he prisoner was released from

custody and taken back to Texas.

In other regular business Thursday, the board:

—Heard final details of a fundraiser golf scramble planned for 2 p.m. Sunday, July 26, at Cree Meadows Country Club. Cost to enter is \$45 each.

—Agreed to order 150 caps imprinted with the group's new name. Members stipulated the caps be bought after soliciting bids from local distributors.

—Heard from Maddox of three calls since the last meeting.

—Saw an award plaque to be presented to former president and founder Richard Sandoval.

—Heard that a 15-minute videocassette is available for groups interested in learning more about Crime Stoppers.

Stab victims' autopsy results still not in

The Lincoln County Sheriff's Office (LCSO) is still waiting for the results of autopsies on the victims of the double-slaying that occurred two weeks ago in Ruidoso.

LCSO Detective Paul Wersich said the Office of the Medical Investigator in Albuquerque hasn't yet sent him results of its autopsies and laboratory tests on the bodies of Constance J. Schiller and Jose S. Jiminez.

Schiller, 43, and Jiminez, 41, were fatally stabbed Friday, July 3, in front of Something Special at 2204 Sudderth Drive, according to official reports.

"We don't know who stabbed who

first," said Deputy Medical Examiner Jim Stover. He said the manner of death was stab wounds, but a cause of death will be determined by the state medical investigator.

The Sheriff's Office has continued its investigation, and Detective Mike Chapel said on Sunday, July 5, he expected the autopsy results the next day. Wersich attributed the delay to the medical investigator's office being the only one in the state.

Chapel said Schiller and Jiminez are believed at one time to have been partners in Mr. Joseph's Hair Styling Salon.

Council to meet Wed.



And that's how it should be.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—The governor is on the right track in his efforts to correct the electronic security system at the penitentiary. He has taken the positive step of exploring the possibilities of working with the six different companies which were involved in any way with the electronic security system.

Obviously, there is much blame to be placed on state officials and company officials for the many failures of the system. But the governor realized that the highest priority must be to finally get the system working.

The governor met with high level officials of all the companies last Friday and convinced them that it was to their benefit to prove to the world that their product will work. Protecting their good reputations was sufficiently important to the companies that they agreed to do much of the work free of charge.

It is highly likely that these companies are keenly aware that the next step is a suit against them if the system cannot be made fully operational. Anyone who has been involved in litigation knows that solution takes years to evolve and it seldom ends up pleasing anyone by the time it is over. The governor has chosen a course which fosters cooperation rather than immediate polarization.

The companies made only two requests. One is not only logical, it is absolutely crucial in determining whether the companies have fulfilled their obligations when work is completed.

The companies requested that a "scoping" committee be formed to carefully define the function of the security system and what it will look like when it becomes "fully operational."

The second request makes less sense. The governor's press release states that he "agreed with company officials that we need to expand and improve the training we provide to correctional officers at the penitentiary with regard to operation of the security system." The question is who asked whom to do what?

The Corrections Academy under the capable direction of Suelly Porter, does a very competent job of providing basic training in all aspects of corrections work despite frequent moves and staff cuts. Even if the Academy were adequately financed and staffed, the problem appears to lie not with basic computer and technical literacy, but with the ability to operate a highly sophisticated security system. To accomplish that end is going to require trainers from the companies which made and installed the equipment.

I hope it was the governor who asked the companies to expand and improve their training programs for correctional officers. That is something the companies should be will-

ing to do because the best system in the world won't look any good without people who know how to operate it. Even the personal computer on which I am typing this column came with training sessions to show me how to use it.

The governor and companies are correct in believing that training is the key to success of the system. The hysteria that followed the 1980 penitentiary riot caused great amounts of money to be thrown at the problem. We may have become too much like some of those oil-rich countries that can buy sophisticated tanks but when they break down, the tank has to be discarded.

Training may have become the forgotten area in the Department of Corrections, which The Corrections Academy, which trains all corrections employees, has never had a permanent home. It has moved four times since 1982. It was in the South Facility of the Santa Fe penitentiary until the decision was made to occupy it with inmates. It is now located in Albuquerque in the juvenile secure treatment facility, which Representative Bob Hawk got the money through the legislature to build. Reportedly, Hawk is not too pleased with the diversion in usage so we may not see the academy in that facility much longer.

Corrections training certainly is the forgotten area for Santa Fe Mayor Sam Pick, who was upset enough with an Alamogordo proposal for moving the Law Enforcement Academy that he cracked one of his frequent jokes and greatly upset the good people of Alamogordo. When the Corrections Academy moved to Albuquerque, Pick was completely unaware of the move despite the Corrections Academy training more people than the Law Enforcement Academy.

In addition to training, which new secretary Lane McCotter says is going to be his top priority, it is also necessary that employees have the right attitude about learning the sophisticated security system and that management be thoroughly committed to maintenance of the system.

Possibly the governor and top corrections officials deserve much blame for not making the security system work. The investigation by the Attorney General's office, which was requested by a group of legislators, should still be conducted to ascertain whether there was any activity or inactivity sufficient to take action against anyone.

Fortunately, the governor is not dwelling on the negative aspects of the situation but, instead is taking the statesman's role all of us hoped to see from him. Let's hope this sets a pattern for the administration of our state for the next three and a half years. It's a great start.






