Rairdons return to face local charges

Two people convicted in Texas of kidnapping and rape are in Lincoln County Jail, charged with first degree criminal sexual penetration and kidnapping.

Harold Rairdon, 40, and his 20-year-old wife, Bobbie Sue Rairdon, were transported Wednesday from El Paso, Texas, to Carrizozo, to stand trial on charges originated by Ruidoso Police Detective Lanny Maddox.

The two appeared late Wednesday afternoon before District Judge Richard A. Parsons, who explained

the charges against them and informed the Rairdons of their legal rights.

Parsons said the Rairdons are charged with five counts of first degree felony criminal sexual penetration and one count of kidnapping, a second degree felony. He said the first degree felony charges have a maximum penalty of 18 years in prison and/or a \$15,000 fine, while the kidnapping charge could result in nine years in prison and/or \$10,000 fine.

Airport site ideas abound

About 40 people gathered at Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center Wednesday to share hopes and dreams for the Ruidoso Municipal Airport land.

In a public meeting called by the Airport Land Use Advisory Board, members of the public heard a presentation from airport planners and had the opportunity to throw their ideas out for consideration.

John Petronis, president of the planning firm of Architectural Research Consultants, Inc., displayed a huge array of maps, charts and visual aids that add up to a huge list of constraints and opportunities for the 160-acre tract of

land. "We're very much in the planning phase," said Petronis, stressing that no decisions have been made on developing the prime property.

Wednesday he presented an overview of existing site conditions, a market analysis and recommendations from the marketing firm, other ideas for the site, preliminary planning concepts and planning alternatives.

Petronis said two months remain on the planning contract, and his team is about three-fourths through. He said he'll make final recommendations in September, following at least one more public meeting and a couple of task force

Cable's Crown confronts councillors

Emotional appearances by an angry citizen, the village attorney and the chairman of the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission peppered a regular meeting of the Ruidoso Village Council Tuesday.

Paul Crown of Lincoln Cablevision faced the councillors to rebut charges he claims were leveled against him during a previous meeting.

"I'd appreciate it if when you want to talk about me, I be invited to give some response instead of reading about it in the paper," said an angry Crown during the council's regular meeting.

Crown commented on his 15-year franchise, a recent rate increase, no longer filming council meetings and cable rates for Ruidoso Care Center.

During the last meeting Village Councillor Jerry Shaw said she regretted voting for the Cablevision franchise and listed a number of concerns. Shaw said many citizens have complained to her since the council meetings are no longer televised.

Shaw said she had learned Cablevision furnishes its service free to Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC), while Care Center patients are charged full rates.

Crown said his 15-year non-exclusive franchise was drafted to

meet village specifications, and is the shortest of any utility company in town. He said a viewer survey discussed during franchise agreement negotiations is being written and will be sent to customers in October.

"I'm a little different than the city... when I implemented the (rate) increase I gave a product," said Crown. He said his customers got seven new channels.

He said the village even netted a \$800 a month franchise tax revenue increase with the new rate structure.

As for filming council meetings, Crown said he's stronger than some of his employees who were subjected to "snide comments" over the Cablevision equipment and their own attire when operating the camera at past meetings. He said the administration repaired the sound system and discontinued using a table that put speakers with their backs to the camera only after filming was stopped.

But Councillor Elmer Pirelli disagreed, saying the table was removed and the podium brought back the day he discussed the problem with Crown.

Crown read a portion of his franchise that constrains him from granting an "advantage" to any person, and noted that LCMC, where he provides free service, is a non-profit organization, while the Care Center is part of a multi-

million dollar organization.

He added that just two months ago he learned of the financial circumstances of many of the Care Center patients, and began working with the administrator on an agreement. Crown announced that an agreement had been reached whereby the Care Center administration will pay for cable in the facility.

"It happened the day the newspaper came out," noted Shaw. Crown then read a letter from Mary Lou Gooch, librarian at the Ruidoso Public Library, thanking him for providing free service to the library.

Councillor Victor Alonso, who was absent from the last council meeting, told Crown, "Not everybody talks behind your back," and then called on him to "work with us on this deal."

"I really believe you're missing an opportunity to provide a public service," added Alonso.

Before the heated interchange was finally called to a halt, Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. told Crown his \$600 is "no tax dollars at all in comparison to what you're taking," and called his new channels "gimmick stations."

"Mr. Mayor, this could go on all night," inserted Councillor J.D. James.

Crown left the podium and the council chambers followed by about half a dozen people.

"That's a pretty tough act to follow," noted Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) Chairman Tim Morris as he took the microphone. He added his progress report on the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport was a more "positive note."

After that report, Morris, with a catch in his throat, tendered his resignation as Ruidoso's appointed representative to the commission. He made his termination effective with the final signing of the new joint powers agreement.

"I think that I and the commission have effectively and efficiently implemented the master plan," said Morris, thanking the mayor and council for giving him the opportunity to serve.

During a break in the meeting, Morris said resigning was a very emotional thing for him as his service on the commission has meant a great deal to him.

In discussions of the new joint powers agreement, village attorney John Underwood announced that the fifth and final member of the group, the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe, approved the document on Tuesday.

Citing an editorial in The News that he said "painted a very bad picture" of the make-up of the new six-member Sierra Blanca Commission, Alonso asked Underwood

Downs Trustees name new judge in wake of absence

Harold Ray Mansell was sworn in as acting municipal judge Wednesday morning in Ruidoso Downs after the Ruidoso Downs Trustees learned Municipal Judge Martin Valenzuela's whereabouts apparently were unknown.

Mansell was appointed as acting judge after an executive session that followed the trustees' Monday night meeting.

"We had to have a judge," said Mayor J.C. "Jake" Harris in a Wednesday interview. He reported that Valenzuela had not conducted court as usual Thursday evening, and apparently had not gone to work. Efforts to reach Valenzuela by telephone were unsuccessful, his Downs telephone number is disconnected.

Harris said Mansell, who has a background in law enforcement and was runner up to Valenzuela in

the last election, will serve until the next municipal election.

Also Monday, the trustees called for a complete state financial audit of the courts on the recommendation of village auditor Donald Wingfield. Harris said Wingfield was doing the regular village audit and found the court records were "messed up so bad" a more thorough audit would be necessary.

Harris believes the state probably will appoint Wingfield to conduct the special audit.

Also during their Monday meeting, the trustees accepted the letter of resignation, effective August 25, of Trustee Conrad Buchanan. Contacted Monday, Buchanan reported he submitted the letter to the mayor a week and a half ago, and was resigning due to a need to spend more time on his business.

Buchanan has served more than four years in village government. August 25 is the day voters in

Ruidoso Downs will fill seven seats on the Board of Trustees, and Buchanan had been a candidate for reelection.

In other business, the trustees: —Approved the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission budget as submitted.

—Approved Resolution 87-15, correcting budget overruns from the previous village budget.

—Approved an agreement with the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District. Dues for a year are \$215, based on population.

—Agreed to advertise for bids on a lawn tractor.

—Agreed to direct Harris to meet with the village attorney to draft a resolution to uphold the restrictive covenants in Spring Park Subdivision.


—Gave approval for as many as nine Ruidoso Downs Volunteer Fire Department members to attend an annual fire school in Hobbs Satur-

day through Friday, August 9-14.

—Tabled a request by Fire Chief Chet Southard for purchase of a pre-lube kit for a fire truck engine until a representative of the Caterpillar company can meet with the mayor.

—Heard Harris read three letters of commendation, one from Ruidoso Downs Police Chief G.L. "Skip" Hazel to village clerk/treasurer Jean Stillman and village deputy clerk Janice Polk for their fine work since the recent change in administration. Letters from Stillman and Polk commended Hazel for his help in making the transition in administration.

—Heard audience member Ruben Sandoval inquire when paving will be done on Heights Drive. "It's in the works," Harris replied, who said the engineer and contractor are working on the project.

 "In my opinion the paper would do well to hire their own legal counsel to interpret agreements," said Underwood vehemently, continuing with a long explanation of the background of the new agreement. Underwood said the agreement is the first time in a long time Lincoln County and the Village of Ruidoso have been able to put "political squabbles" aside.

He said the arbitration process, as laid out in the agreement, will not result in costly legal fees, as predicted in the editorial.

Councillor about recalled asking Underwood about the votes, noting her question wasn't mentioned in the paper. "Then we have this editorial," said Shaw.

Mayor Davis, noting that Ruidoso alone accounts for 60 percent of the taxes collected in the county, and if the Alto area is included, the two make up 80 percent of the county taxes, said funds for all the county come from this small geographic area. He said surely six grown people can try to cooperate.

After accepting Morris' resigna-

tion, Davis learned from Underwood that the three new commissioners need not be appointed until the agreement is signed by the Federal Aviation Administration and the Department of Finance Administration.

Before going into executive session at the end of the regular meeting, Davis said he hasn't identified who will be appointed, but held up an ashtray with folded bits of paper, saying the members might draw straws for the job.

In other regular business Tuesday the council:

- Adopted unanimously an ordinance bringing municipal traffic regulations into conformance with the Uniform Traffic Code.
- Unanimously adopted a resolution making changes to personnel rules.
- Voted unanimously in favor of a resolution to renew membership in the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District.
- Authorized village manager Frank Potter to negotiate with the county on an animal control contract.
- Accepted the low bid for asphalt concrete aggregate submit-

 aggravated circumstances are shown, the maximum sentences can be increased by a third. He said if mitigating circumstances can be shown the sentences could be reduced by a third.

"Ordinarily the sentences could be either deferred or suspended," noted Judge Parsons. He said they can be served consecutively or concurrently.

Parsons told the Rairdons they will appear Monday before Magistrate Judge Gerald Dean, who was on vacation Friday.

Public defender Richie Askew was on hand to advise the Rairdons. He told the judge the accused are unsure whether or not they have an attorney in Carlsbad who will represent them on the charges.

Harry G. Wilcox, Jr., senior trial prosecutor for the 12th Judicial District, said Judge Dean will set bond on Monday, but the Rairdons won't be eligible for release. He said they are in Lincoln County on an extradition order from Texas, and have "holds" on them from both Texas and Oklahoma.

The Lincoln County charges involve an incident in which a 15-year-old Carlsbad girl was allegedly brought to Ruidoso, held hostage and raped repeatedly, according to Wilcox.

He said he'll coordinate with Ed-dy County prosecutors, since the Rairdons are charged with crimes in that jurisdiction, too.

The Rairdons were sentenced earlier this month in Texas to 60 years each after pleading guilty to kidnapping and raping a University of Texas at El Paso student. She was reportedly robbed, threatened with a knife, driven to a motel, sexually assaulted and kept overnight.

 meetings.

Goals for the land were restated, with the recurring theme of diversifying the local economy.

Board members of the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County were out in force to agree with the diversification goal, and to remind the group of the Ruidoso Village Council's commitment, through a resolution, to retain the airport land for that very purpose.

Corporation Chairman Buddy Burchard said the group is researching performing arts colleges to be developed in conjunction with a cultural center.

Ideas discussed include strengthening the Ruidoso area as a visitor destination and meeting public needs that are unique elsewhere.

Noting that few recreational facilities exist in Ruidoso, a recreational community, Petronis listed recreation ideas, including: amphitheater, cross country skiing, hang gliding, bicycling, snowmobile area, park for small children, camping, lake with fishing, recreational fields and courts and horse trails.

Merle Miller, a member of the audience, reminded Petronis that Ruidoso is surrounded by recreational facilities in the Lincoln National Forest. Village planning administrator Margaret McDonald Lahey said those areas don't meet the needs for small children.

Commercial ideas listed by Petronis include resort hotel, drag strip, RV camping, industrial, a college and home activities. For public uses he named a culture center, cemetery, heliport, post-

office and village office expansion.

After presenting a number of statistics on residential and commercial property already available, Petronis said the village will need to apply common sense in deciding what's supportable on the land.

Petronis stressed his preference for multiple uses in a flexible development plan. He showed maps with different combinations of preferred uses, all with a perimeter of green space reserved for trails and amenities.

The study recommends a focus for the land, such as a pond or lake in a visible area near the center. A road is discussed as an opportunity to connect Mechem Drive and Gavilan Canyon Road with Warrior Drive.

After members of the audience heard from Petronis and his

associate, Tim Price, and had their say, advisory board member and Planning and Zoning Commission Chairman David Smith noted it's up to the task force to communicate ideas to the Ruidoso Village Council.

Petronis stressed, early in the meeting, that the council is his company's client, with the task force in an advisory role. Smith noted that councillors "are largely not here tonight."

Councillor Elmer Pirelli, a member of the advisory board, and Councillor Jerry Shaw were present at the meeting.

"I think that public input is important," said Pirelli.

Petronis said the public will have at least one more chance to meet, adding that task force meetings also are open to the public.

Chamber considers big role in pageant

The decision of whether to take on a big part of the November Miss New Mexico USA pageant was referred to a committee by the Board of Directors of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

Board members learned that the pageant again will be conducted at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, this year from November 10-14. The pageant determines who will be Miss New Mexico USA, and that person will go on to represent New Mexico in the national pageant. Last year, the Miss New Mexico USA pageant took place at the Inn for the first time, and pageant planners have indicated this area could become the pageant's permanent home. Previously, the pageant was conducted in Las Cruces.

During their meeting Wednesday, the board heard a presentation from Helen Kowall, state director of the pageant. She proposed that the chamber board take on sales of tickets to two pageant activities and sales of advertising in the pageant brochure. In exchange, Kowall asked for guarantee of a "negotiable" \$25,000 from the chamber.

She said ad sales in the brochure for the recent Miss New Mexico Teen USA pageant brought in between \$18,000 and \$18,000, and predicted the Miss New Mexico USA brochure would bring in even more revenue. Last November at the Inn, the two pageant activities brought ticket sales of more than

300 for the presentation show and more than 550 for the pageant itself. Kowall said tickets sold for \$5 to the presentation show and \$10 to the pageant.

She predicted several hundred people will accompany the 40 to 50 pageant contestants during their stay, which will bring added revenue to the community.

"I'm sold on Ruidoso," Kowall said in seeking the chamber's help. "I want you to be with me."

Board members adjourned into executive session and board President Barbara DiPaolo appointed a committee to consider the request and report back to the board by Monday. A meeting for the committee was set for Friday.

In other business, the chamber board:

- Heard Convention and Visitors Bureau director Liz Groenendyk report on the promotion of the 1987 Art Festival. She listed publications, radio stations and television stations by which the festival was promoted, and made note of other promotional efforts such as posters, postcards and the Ruidoso Downs RaceTrack scoreboard.
- "She did a fantastic job on this," DiPaolo commented. The chamber president pointed out that attendance at the event was up 15 percent from that of last year.
- Heard DiPaolo report on the success of the festival, and note the many volunteers who helped out.
- "For the most part, the artists were extremely happy," she added. DiPaolo also asked that the Art Festival Committee start consider-

ing new locations for the event.

- Voted to retain the food booth as the property of the chamber. Board member Charlie Smith reported that the food booth netted more than \$2,600, but costs to build the structure overran estimates. A committee was formed to oversee usage of the booth, including members Smith, Bill Hirschfeld and Becky Durham.
- Heard Jeffers report on the Membership Focus Meetings. Conducted every other Thursday at lunchtime, the meetings include Jeffers, DiPaolo, President's Club Chairperson Peggy McClellan and a dozen invited members of the chamber. The meetings are intended to give members a chance to offer input on how the chamber is being operated. Jeffers said comments so far have been mixed, and attendance has been 50 percent over the first two meetings.
- Heard Jeffers report Advertising Committee Chairman Robert Boverie's announcement of Phil Price Advertising of Lubbock, Texas, as the successful candidate to become the chamber's new ad agency. Six companies made presentations to the committee, and the Lubbock company was selected. Members of the Advertising Committee for the coming year were named, including Boverie, Carla Trapp Beasley, Tony Wilcoxson, Bill Hirschfeld, Mike Warren and Roland Ramos. Requests also have been made to Mescalero Apache Tribe President Wendell Chino and Ruidoso Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. that they or a represen-

tative join the committee.

- Learned from DiPaolo that she, Jeffers and Duane Byars had a meeting with Chino in which the tribal president spoke of several projects he'd like to see accomplished, which the chamber representatives agreed with. A circle tour of the reservation and surrounding areas was suggested, which would include signs designating points of interest. Chino also pointed out the benefit of having a billboard at the San Antonio exit (near Socorro) from Highway 25. Chino apparently will designate a representative from the tribe to work on projects with the chamber.
- Heard Jeffers report that the chamber annual meeting is scheduled for 6:30 p.m. today (Thursday), July 30, at Cree Meadows Country Club. The evening will include a presentation by the new chamber advertising agency.
- Heard Durham remind board members that a meeting for that evening (Wednesday) was planned to gather public input on uses of the present airport land when the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport is opened. The meeting has been conducted by the mayor's committee on the land use and members of Architectural Research Consultants.
- Heard Groenendyk give a report on the numbers and types of groups she's working with that visited in July and plan visits in August. Group sizes range from 30 to 150 people.

Warriors well-represented on South All-Star team

South hopes to repeat 1986 win

Ruidoso High School will be well-represented when the South plays the North in the 44th annual All-Star Football Game at the University of New Mexico Stadium in Albuquerque Friday, July 31.

The game will start at 7:30 p.m. Warrior head coach Cooper Henderson and his assistants will coach the South team. Joining Henderson are assistants Ronny Maskew, Gene Segura, Mike Speck, Ridge Bowden, Clendon Kirkpatrick, Rocky Willingham and Herman Fox.

Former Warrior stars Brian Davis and Jeff Willingham will be among the South players.

Davis made all-state first team as a split end the past two seasons. Willingham made all-state first team as a defensive back the past two seasons and made all-state as a quarterback last season. He will play defensive back in the All-Star game.

Both played well in the Warriors' 21-19 victory over Silver City in the 1985 state championship game.

Lovington, which defeated the Warriors, 20-7, in the state AAAA-division title game last fall, has three players on the team.

They are wide receiver Hal Roueche, quarterback Robert Arreola and defensive lineman Aaron Ochoa.

Roswell, the AAAA-division runner-up to Highland last fall, has six players on the South team.

They include offensive tackle Mike Bratcher, quarterback Derek Coffman, running back Pete Sanders, defensive lineman Marvin Smith, defensive end Bryan Cain and linebacker Brian Clark.


Del Norte head coach David Williams and his staff will coach the North team.

Highland will have running back Kevin Caldwell, defensive end Sam Morse and defensive back Kim McCall on the squad.

Caldwell was the state AAAA-division 100-200 meter sprint champion in track.

The South won last season, 40-20, and leads the series with 26 victories to 14 for the North. There have been three ties.





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
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
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Let's all band together

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
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

"I don't know why everyone is crying about Grandpa. God needed him to be judge of all the angels, and say order in the court."

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Nobody knows the hysteria I've seen. Nobody knows but Santa Fe residents.

It's plagiarism of a popular gospel song, I know. But it's true. Santa Fe residents are hysterical about the four prison escapees who remain at large. And the hysteria isn't just limited to Santa Fe County residents nor will it be in the future.

There have been reports of the escapees in other parts of the state. Some have committed crimes in other parts of the state. There are now satellite prisons scattered around the state which house criminals whose escape should strike fear in the hearts of nearby residents.

Most Santa Fe residents are being a lot more careful about locking their houses and cars and about venturing out alone at night. That is good.

Many Santa Fe residents are buying a firearm for the first time. That is scary. The possibility of an untrained person having the advantage over an escapee with or without a weapon is not great. The possibility of an untrained, hysterical person using a gun in an inappropriate manner and hurting innocent people is more likely. It should be enough to discourage much of the hiking and jogging that normally takes place in the hills of Santa Fe.

This time it wasn't just the southeast part of Santa Fe that was affected by the escape. By the time the prison break was a week old, two escapees were captured on the affluent north side of town, one of them only two blocks from the governor's residence. There were reports of another escapee being with the two who were apprehended. He apparently fled into the pines and juniper covered hills which hide many residences that could be easy pickings for a desperate escapee.

The effect on the Miller household has been a bit more subtle. Our children have always loved helicopters. On nearly every summer vacation we have happened across some location of scenic beauty that can only be truly appreciated by means of a helicopter tour of the area. So Dad has shelled out the necessary bucks and the kids come home to tell their friends about the helicopter ride. Somehow the part about Miami Beach or South Padre

Island or Mt. St. Helen's crater being so beautiful from the air gets lost in the excitement of the copter ride description.

Their feelings about helicopters started changing during the 1980 prison break when 11 inmates escaped. For days, whether at school or at home, the sound of helicopters was constantly present as they combed the arroyos looking for the escapees. Less than two months later the prison riot was in full swing and the sound of choppers overhead was again an all-day, all-night phenomenon as they brought the dead and mutilated to nearby St. Vincent's Hospital. For many hours the sound of the helicopters was accompanied by radio reports that no one had been hurt in the riot.

The only conclusion from that information at the time was that there must have also been a massive escape. Possibly the authorities felt their reports of no injuries would calm the public. The effect was just the opposite. And the sound of helicopters overhead still strikes fear into our family.

The coverage of the riot injuries leads to the reason for writing this column. Whether true or not the street word among those who have some reason to know is that there is again a coverup of the identity of the perpetrators of many crimes in Santa Fe during the three weeks since the escape.

The word is that there have been at least four and maybe as many as six rapes by escapees. There have been numerous robberies and there have been break-ins at which only food and clothing were taken. The charge is that the police blotter has eliminated the information that the description of the assailants matched those of some of the escapees. Residents are also wondering why the news media isn't asking more questions.

Be these charges true or not there is one certainty. Santa Fe residents are hysterical and are going to demand that the penitentiary start doing its job of keeping its "residents" on the inside. We also hear reports that the Los Alamos National Laboratory uses an electronic security system very similar to the one at the prison. They reportedly have no problem keeping the wrong people out.

DEAR EDITOR:

To the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission, attorneys for same, and the Lincoln County Commissioners.

Speaking as a Lincoln County resident for many years, but not of the village of Ruidoso, please permit me to express my feelings of anger, frustration, and sorrow. I am not an adversary of our new airport and my voting record will certainly bear this out.

As everyone knows by now, there are only two entities who will control the new airport and will make any decisions which will certainly have to be made in the future. These entities would be the village of Ruidoso and the Lincoln County Commission. The Mesalero tribe, Ruidoso Downs, and Capitan are now "Ex-Officio" members. The reason behind this decision was because these entities could not or would not contribute financially to the design and construction of the new airport.

On the contrary, these "Ex-Officio" members along with the other two, contributed \$500⁰⁰ per year each for ten years. It wasn't much, but it was all we could afford, and it did serve to get the airport on the drawing board.

Since the county commission has passed a tax increase to further the construction and cover the short falls, every citizen in Capitan will continue to contribute to the cause, like it or not.

Now enters Carrizozo and Corona. These villages were asked ten years ago to become entities on the airport commission but due to their remote locations or other reasons,

politely refused. But now, since their money is needed, they have been drafted, and the grand title of "Ex-Officio" members has been bestowed upon them.

Has anyone ever stopped to think what the combined population total of Capitan, Carrizozo, Ruidoso Downs, Lincoln, Corona, Hondo, Nogal, and all the other small communities of Lincoln County would be as opposed to the population of Ruidoso?

Consider where these communities do most of their shopping and also consider the taxes, both past and future, and tell me again who is paying the most on this so-called shortfall.

With six voting members on the new commission, sooner or later there will be a deadlock and the five other "Ex-Officio" members will be offered no say so what so ever.

Just for public record, I think our Mayor, Benny Coker, has done an outstanding job for you during the past several years on the airport commission and deserves at least some recognition for his contributions.

Speaking for myself, I feel that every resident of Lincoln County, Ruidoso notwithstanding, has been violated to some degree.

All in all, I still feel we need this airport and I wish you well.

Weldon addressed the problem of distrust in the world, concluding trust is best placed with Jehovah.

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


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

This week in Convention the vexacious question of choosing an Executive to run our government was hotly debated. In past weeks suggestions have ranged from Col. Alexander Hamilton's proposed single executive to serve for life, to Mr. Roger Sherman's suggestion of three executives serving for three years. Thursday instant, a term of seven years with no eligibility for re-election had been agreed to by the Delegates.

We foresee grave problems with this decision. We think it is fair to assume that His Excellency G. Washington will be the Executive chosen to lead our Country. No other Gentleman in America can match his National Appeal. To whom do we turn in seven years? Doctor Franklin? Sadly, very sadly, he is too infirmed, and although his wit and genius still shine, it must be admitted that Great Man is in decline.

Under the Agreement above, we are left in only Seven Years with the hope that another Washington or Franklin will emerge from a morass of sectional politicians which our Country, in its vastness, breeds so profusely. No, Learned Reader, we must have the ability to keep the proven best in office if WE choose to. The ineligibility for re-election could leave us a badly divided Country which has waged its very existence on the possibility of another Great Man of proven National Interest arising in only Seven Years!

As grave an issue as re-election, is the length of the Executive's term in office. Consider the quality of politicians available to us. What we have discovered so far in our coverage of this Convention, and what has caused the apparent failure in our Confederation Congress is the inability of our Sister States to develop and implement a truly National Policy. Generally it has been true that our politicians are more interested in Their State's interest than in Our National Interest.

To place in our Highest National Office for seven years a sectional politician would cause the dissolution of our Young Republic, whose Citizens must learn to be Americans first, instead of Virginians or Pennsylvanians. A sectional politician could easily fan the flames of discontent, playing one State against another. Our Country is weak, a child still learning, and it must be taught to be a Nation; and only an Executive with a National Vision can accomplish that.

If, elected under the guise of being a National Leader, we discovered a politician whose intent and purpose was parochial, the majority must be able to turn him out of office quickly to save the Country from ruin.

Also, inside our grab-bag of politicians, after General Washington, could be a Gentleman of Vision ... say for example, a Connecticut man whose mannerisms, style, and speech falsely suggest the limitations of sectional thinking, but who, through his experiences in dealing with other sections of the country, develops a genius for compromise and a feel for Union so vital to our very survival as a Nation; would we not be willing to "try him out" for a short period of time? Then, if he proved as honest and steady as he seemed when elected, would we not want to try him again, and possibly again, as long as he kept our Faith, enhanced our Republican Experiment, and helped develop a Strong America?

We suggest to the Gentlemen in Convention a shorter term for the Executive as being safer for our Country; and the ability to be re-elected if WE wish him to be as being better for our Country.

Convention Discusses Resolves, Executive Strength and Election

This week the Convention continued its discussion of the remaining Resolves of the Virginia Plan. The unhappy divisions of past weeks between the large and small states seem to have been healed and the members, although disagreeing often, did so without threats or unseemly language.

On Monday, July 23, the delegates from the State of New Hampshire were present for the first time. Their delay was caused by the unwillingness of their Legislature to pay the costs of attendance. It was only when Mr. John Langdon agreed to pay that he and Mr. Nicholas Gilman were dispatched to Philadelphia as the State's Representatives. Mr. Langdon has a high reputation in his state, and in Congress where he has twice served, but Mr. Gilman is not so well regarded. One disgusted observer unkindly remarked that his selection cast a poor light on the other available gentlemen in the State of New Hampshire!

FEEBLE EXECUTIVE?

When the gentlemen of the Convention organized their procedures in May, they agreed that any question, even if members had already voted on it, could be reopened during their meetings. By this means, delegates may change their minds or suggest new ideas. Nevertheless, when Mr. Wilson of Pennsylvania took up the question of the Council of Revision again, Mr. Gerry of Massachusetts was exasperated. The Virginia Plan gives the chief executive, along with a number of judges of the Supreme Judiciary, a negative over the laws of Congress and the States. The idea is that the Chief Executive in our system of Republican government will be too feeble (as Mr. Gouverneur Morris put it) to stand against the Legislature and needs the additional power of the judges as a check. Mr. Madison, supporting Mr. Wilson and Mr. Morris, noted that Legislatures will always suck power to themselves, so that the Executive must be strengthened as much as possible.

Other gentlemen held to the maxim that the three powers must be kept separate at all costs. Mr. Luther

Martin saw the plan to mix executive and judicial power as a dangerous innovation. Mr. Wilson's motion to include judges with the executive in the negative power was lost, so the executive will exercise his veto alone.

PEOPLE TO CHOOSE?

After a lengthy discussion the delegates agreed that for ratification, the *New Constitution* (as one gentleman now calls it) should be referred to Congress and then to assemblies chosen directly by the people. Mr. Mason could see no other course since, in his view, it is with the people that all power remains. Mr. Ellsworth of Connecticut believes that the State Legislatures are competent to ratify the Constitution, but Mr. Madison persuaded members that ratification by assemblies chosen by the people would give the new government validity and authority. As has so often been the case, Mr. Madison's argument carried the day.

Tuesday, Wednesday and part of Thursday were spent discussing the election of the chief executive. The delegates seem unable to agree on this question. Many fear that if he were elected by Congress, he would be dependent on that body. On the other hand, no satisfactory way of choosing electors can be found. The members have decided to leave the election to Congress for lack of a better scheme.

On Thursday the convention adjourned until August 6 in order to give a Committee of Detail, consisting of Mr. Rutledge, Mr. Randolph, Mr. Gorham, Mr. Ellsworth and Mr. Wilson, time to draw up a more detailed version of the Constitution. This ten-day recess will be much appreciated by the Delegates who have found the Convention tiring. Some have already left the City seeking diversion and cooler weather elsewhere.

commendable property of having no piers to encumber navigation of the stream spanned.

ORIGINAL MODEL DISPLAYED

An original model of Mr. Paine's design, built of wood, was strong enough to hold four men. Thus in 1786, Mr. Paine set to work on a cast iron model. This having been completed by the autumn of that year, Mr. Paine placed his model on display in the Pennsylvania State House yard on New Year's Day 1787. Despite much admiration expressed for the model and the endorsements of men such as Benjamin Franklin and David Rittenhouse, the Pennsylvania Assembly proved unwilling to provide funds for a full scale bridge of Mr. Paine's design to cross the Schuylkill River. Some feared that the cost - estimated at \$330,330, would prove too great for the State to bear, while other parties wondered whence would come the 5200 tons of iron demanded for the task.

Much disappointed by this turn of events, Mr. Paine determined to take his model to Europe in hopes of discovering a more receptive audience in Paris or London. He departed New York City on April 26, reaching Havre-de-Grace this week. Just yesterday Mr. Paine came to Paris, bearing letters of introduction from Dr. Franklin which assuredly will obtain audiences with many important persons here. The Academy of Sciences is expected to look upon Mr. Paine's project with favor. A new bridge across the Seine has lately been commissioned, and Mr. Paine reports that his design would be cheaper and more durable than the stone bridge now contemplated.

MR. PAINE CONFIDENT

Nonetheless, the city of Paris is now attending more to politics than to bridges, for the Assembly of Notables was dismissed by Louis XVI on May 25. Despite the king's promises of financial reforms and greater voice to be given to the provincial estates, no one knows yet how events will proceed. Mr. Paine is confident, however, that the people of France will be wise and wealthy enough to build the bridge which Pennsylvania disdains. Perhaps Mr. Paine's arrival here will, as he hopes, mark the commencement of a new and brilliant chapter in his career.

Boston Celebrates July 4th

The city of Boston held patriotic celebrations to mark the anniversary of the Declaration of Independence. All who participated in the celebrations found them to be both stirring and elevating.

The military began its celebration first, commencing at nine o'clock in the morning. At that time, the regiments, both the select corps and the independents, assembled in uniform at their respective parade grounds. At ten o'clock, they all marched to the Commons where, at eleven o'clock His Excellency, the Captain General, together with the Lieutenant Governor, the French and Dutch Consuls, and other distinguished gentlemen, reviewed the troops. Later, after marching down School Lane and other streets of the town, the troops disbanded at the Commons. There they drank thirteen toasts, including toasts to the United States of America, to the Congress, to the convention assembled in Philadelphia, and to the Marquis de la Fayette.

The civil celebrations were conducted with no less honor. In the morning, the Supreme Executive and the members of the legislature assembled and marched to the Stone Chapel for the celebration. At the Stone Chapel, as was previously announced, the crowd heard an oration celebrating the anniversary of the Declaration of Independence delivered by Mr. Thomas Daws. Then an "Ode to Independence," set to music by Mr. Selby, was performed by a select company of singers. The solo parts were performed by Mr. Deverell.

At the same time, the Society of the Cincinnati held celebrations in the city. After their annual meeting, members marched to the Old Brick Meeting House to hear General Brooks speak. Royal Visit to Whitbread's Brewery

King George III, ever anxious to see whatever is new in mechanics or art, made a visit on May 26 to Mr. Whitbread's brewery in Chiswell Street. The time appointed was 10 AM, but, impelled by curiosity, the Royal Party arrived a quarter hour early. The King, Queen and three Princesses being received by Mr. Whitbread and his daughter, graciously declined an elegant breakfast prepared for them, so anxious were they to see the works. Their majesties spent some two hours inspecting the brewery, which is distinguished by a great new steam engine, which the King most judiciously explained in all its parts to his family. The Queen and Princesses were so amused by the huge storage cistern for beer that they all insisted upon entering the same, even though the doorway was so small as to hardly admit their entrance. The cistern has a capacity of four thousand barrels, and on this day held some three thousand.


The Royal Party also inspected the stables, where Mr. Whitbread maintains eighty horses, one of which, at upwards of seventeen hands, was shown to His Majesty as "the highest horse among his subjects." While being too polite to demur such a claim, the King nonetheless displayed his knowledge of livestock by noting that the horse's muscle was not in full proportion to his bone.

For all of Mr. Wilson's admirable characteristics, he has become obsessed with speculation in Western Lands. He is the former president of the Illinois-Wabash Company and has wide-spread Business Interest as well as highly speculative land holdings. Lately, his investments have taken on the feverish proportions of gambling ventures. His friends fear for the health and reputation of this brilliant man.
