

Elans Special wins million

A last-minute decision to withdraw Shoot Yeah from Monday's \$2.5 million All American Futurity left the door open for Dr. Lindsey Burbank's filly Elans Special to win the 29th running of the world's richest quarter horse race.

Burbank, a dentist from Leesburg, Fl., took home a \$1 million winner's check for Elans Special's impressive 1 3/4 length victory - the second largest winning margin for the All American in 22 years.

After capturing two of the nation's top events for 2-year-old quarter horses, Shoot Yeah was the overwhelming choice to win this year's edition of the All American. He suffered a leg injury in the trials for the race on Aug. 26, however, and the owners announced two

hours before post time he would be withdrawn from the All American. "It was my hope that the two horses could meet," Burbank said. "But you also realize that's a tremendous race horse you won't have to outrun."

Jockey Alex Baldillez and Elans Special led into the gates of the All American as the 2-1 favorite of 9,240 fans - the largest crowd of the summer season. The royally bred filly had won six of nine starts going into the race with Baldillez at the helm for seven appearances.

"Our worst competition is ourselves," the 28-year-old rider commented on Elans Special. "The two times she's gotten beat here, she beat herself. She's either acted up in the gate or left there wrong."

There were no problems when the bell rang for the 1987 All

American. "Today, she kind of took a step forward right when they kicked the gates," the Kilgore, Texas, native said. "She did it all right today."

Baldillez had Elans Special in command of the sprint a few strides down the lane and threw his whip into the air after crossing the wire in 21.49 seconds - the third-fastest clocking in the history of the All American.

"I've always wanted to do that," the young jockey joked at the All American press conference.

"When she left in front I never saw anybody," he said. "I looked back with about 150 yards to go to see if I was really that far in front. I hit her a couple of times, but that was more to assure me." Please see Elans Special, page 2A

Warriors fall to top-ranked Wildcats

Now it has to start getting easier for the Ruidoso High School varsity football team.

The Warriors dropped their second game in as many outings Friday night, losing 28-0 to defending state AAA-division champion Lovington at W.D. Horton Stadium.

With losses to Lovington (second ranked in the state) and Artesia (ranked first in the state) in the first two games, the Warriors will host winless Goddard Friday, September 11.

Against Lovington, the Warrior offense never really got going.

Lovington scored on the first drive of the game, going 41 yards in six plays.

Quarterback Dave Brown, who ran well all night, ran in from nine yards out for the touchdown.

He then kicked the extra point and Lovington had a 7-0 lead with 6:20 left in the opening quarter.

Lovington added a second touchdown late in the second quarter, when Matt Alexander scored from two yards out.

Brown again kicked the extra

point and Lovington led, 14-0.

Rusty Shelton got a good runback on the ensuing kickoff, but the Warriors were penalized for clipping, putting the ball back on the 20.

Ruidoso got one first down on the series, much of the yardage coming on a 16-yard run by quarterback Michael Swanner.

However, after a short run and two incomplete passes, the Warriors were forced to punt.

Lovington then added its third touchdown on a keeper by Brown, who went in from three yards out.

Brown made his third extra-point kick and Lovington led, 21-0, with 5:54 left in the second quarter.

Ruidoso opened the second half with improved play on defense.

After stopping the Wildcats on a series, Ruidoso got a good punt return from Matthew Griego, who returned the punt 44 yards to the Lovington 28.

But again, a clipping penalty put the Warriors back.

Lovington added its final touchdown on a 44-yard pass from Brown to Robert Arreola on the first play of the fourth quarter.

The extra-point kick was again good and Lovington had its final

28-0 margin.


Ruidoso had 97 yards total offense to 305 for the Wildcats.

Both teams had three turnovers. "As far as bright spots go, the defense improved in the second half and we saw some good things in the kicking game," said Warrior head coach Cooper Henderson. "We've still got a lot of improving to do, particularly on offense."

Goddard is the Warriors' next opponent and lost a 48-0 game to AAAAA-division powerhouse Roswell Friday.

Goddard's first loss was a 31-10 game to Ruidoso's District 3-AAA rival Deming.

A close race for second found Elaina Rae finishing a head in front of Send The Gals Candy. Both horses were supplemented to the race for \$50,000. Jody O Toole, another late supplement, finished a head behind Send The Gals Candy in third after being bumped by the grey colt a few steps away from the gates.

Kisses To Yawl, the 9-2 second

favorite, never recovered from a bad stumble on the first jump under West Coast rider Bruce Pilkenton. Dashing Encounter checked in fifth, followed by Teller Belle, Back To Cash, Kisses To Yawl and Cool Rainy Night.

Elans Special is a homebred product of Dr. Burbank, who also campaigned her mother, Dash Again. Elans Special was the only horse in the All American who was a finalist in the two opening legs of Ruidoso's quarter horse Triple Crown. She

finished eighth in the Kansas Futurity in May and was third in the Rainbow Futurity on July 19.

She was the first filly to capture the All American Futurity since Hot Idea won the race in 1977. Her sire, Special Effort, is the only horse to win the All American by a larger margin than Elans Special since the race was extended to 440 yards in 1973. Special Effort romped to a four-length victory over a sloppy course in the 1981 All

American.

Elans Special had a noticeable limp when she paraded past the grandstand after winning Monday's All American. Trainer John Buchanan said she suffered an injury in the first round of trials for the race on Aug. 13.

"She bruised her left front hoof in the elimination trials," explained Buchanan, who was sending out his first All American winner. "It's sore, but she has enough heart to

run with it."

The mutual payoffs for Elans Special were \$6.80, \$4.40 and \$3.20.

Elaina Rae's second earned \$43,500 for Doyle Rice of Chouteau, Ok. The Zevi filly was born the same day as Rice's daughter and carries her namesake. Robert Turner conditions the Oklahoma-bred miss. Roy Brooks, a veteran of 20 years, rode Elaina Rae.

Send The Gals Candy pocketed \$153,500 for Carl Pevhouse of

Ratliff City, Ok. Dwayne Gilbreath trains the grey son of Disco Jerry ridden by 38-year-old Richard Vaughn.

Here's the remaining purse distribution: Jody O Toole, \$105,500; Dashing Encounter, \$77,500; Teller Belle, \$73,500; Back To Cash, \$69,500; Kisses To Yawl, \$65,500; Cool Rainy Night, \$60,500. Although he did not race, Shoot Yeah received \$51,000 10th-place money.

Overage sets new track record in Ruidoso Mile Handicap

Overage had little trouble adjusting to the altitude at Ruidoso Downs on Sunday as the Kentucky-bred speedster broke the mile record at the mountain oval while daylighting competition in the \$30,000 Mile Handicap.

The Mile Handicap featured one of the finest fields of thoroughbreds ever assembled at Ruidoso Downs. Energetic King, who finished fifth in the Cornhusker Handicap at Ak-

Sar-Ben this summer, shared the role of favorite with Southwest stakes star Curribot. Lorb Rubic, winner of the Governor's Handicap at Santa Fe Downs last month, was next on the board followed by Cesar T., who was making a comeback off an injury at Hollywood Park last year.

Casey Lambert and Farmer Brown set a sizzling pace in the early stages of the Mile Handicap as

they showed the way through the backstretch to the far turn, stepping off the first 6 furlongs in 1:11.4.

Jockey Kenny Iles and 14-1 longshot Overage stalked the leader to the quarter pole before taking command of the race to draw off down the lane for a three-length victory. The final time of 1:38.3 knocked three-fifths of a second off the track record (1:39.1) shared by Twisted Affair and

Ganardo since 1986.

The Mile Handicap victory earned \$18,000 for trainer Daniel Switzer, who owns Overage in partnership with James Cody of Omaha, Neb.

Cesar T. charged down the stretch to finish second under leading rider Joe Martinez. The effort earned \$6,500 for Irvin de Cordova of Groesbeck, Texas. Curribot flashed his patented

stretch kick to steal third-place money from Farmer Brown. Juliana Winters of Oklahoma City, Ok., pocketed \$3,000 for third.

Following Farmer Brown across the wire were Lord Rubic, Celsa, Energetic King, C. Gable, Makum Trimble, Medieval and Jubilero.

The \$145,000 2nd Consolation of the All American Futurity was less of a surprise as odds-on favorite Spring Action went wire-to-wire for

a half-length victory over Ruidoso's

440-yard course in 21.84 seconds. Jacky Martin rode the Moon Lark colt for owners William Burrows and Agnes Wilson of Ada, Ok.

The Federal Express checked in second followed by Meddlin Dash, Honi Wins, Spend A Bucket, Montana Del Rey, Reverend Jonah Black, Harwell and Maggie Falisa. Dash For Speed was an early scratch.

In other action on the afternoon program, 15-1 longshot Pacific Sail posted a whisker win in the \$65,000 All American Futurity 3rd Consolation, while El Pasoans Tom Dawson and Steve Jay watched their speedy colt Tilt The Odds set a new 5-furlong track record.

Jockey Salustio Burgos had Ar-

rowhead's Pro on the lead throughout Saturday's Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity - the premier event for 2-year-old thoroughbreds at the mountain course.

Racing as the 7-2 second favorite behind Business Reply, Arrowhead's Pro took command of the 6-furlong sprint as the 12-horse field rounded the final turn. Burgos held a five-length advantage at the head of the stretch and appeared to have the race in hand in the drive to

the wire.

Casey Lambert got Business Reply rolling from well off the pace, but was forced to make his bid around horses on the turn. Business Reply charged down the lane to trim Arrowhead's Pro's winning margin to a half-length. The final time was 1:12.

Peggy Jo Hall of Ada, Oklahoma, took home the \$64,000 first-place check. The colt is named after the Arrowhead Ranch operated by Peggy Jo and her husband, Dr.

Dale Hall. The Halls made headlines in 1984 when their quarter horse Eastex won the \$2.5 million All American Futurity in 1984. Fred Danley conditions Arrowhead's Pro.

"The first time we ran him up here this summer he was injured," Danley said. "We backed off him and brought him back and he ran a heck of a race in the trials. I thought he was a top contender all the way."

Business Reply's effort was

worth \$28,000 to R.D. Hubbard of Irvine, California. The Kentucky-bred son of El Baba is trained by Don Farris.

Strokomo, who raced in a mutual field with Boldsonog and Cornjaws, finished a distant three lengths behind Business Reply in third. Rider Joe Martinez survived two objections aboard the Unfurl gelding to earn \$15,000 for Guy Bowers of Ruidoso. Lewis Germany is the trainer.

Boldsonog finished fourth

followed by Miss Blackhawk, Stormin' Dancer, Ravisher, Princess Telary, Silent Boxer, Cornjaws, Darlin Emma and Ampaphella.

Saturday's All American Futurity 3rd Consolation found Pacific Sail posting a nose verdict over Cash Is Mine. West Coast rider Bruce Pilkenton was aboard for trainer Jake Cascio. The victory earned \$9,600 for a Clovis partnership comprised of Ray Starbuck, Claude Burger and Elton Green.

Council may sell airport plot to post office, if price is right and offer made

If the U.S. Postal Service wants a chunk of the Ruidoso Municipal Airport land it will have to come up with more than the \$11,830 offered in an August 24 letter.

Mayor Pro-Tem Jerry Shaw and councillors Elmer Pirelli, J.D. James and Larry Simon turned thumbs down on the Postal Service offer during a special meeting last week. Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. said he agrees with that decision, but nobody is sure if that closes the chapter on a possible new post office, or if more negotiations will follow.

Davis said he and members of the council might be willing to consider

selling a piece of the 160 acres on Cree Meadows Drive "if they want to come back and talk a more reasonable price."

Mayor Davis said he is concerned over "cutting the throats" of local real estate businesses if the land is sold at the appraised price named in the letter from U.S. Postal Service representative M.C. Matthews of Matco Real Estate.

"If we sold that land it would be a drag for the real estate industry in town," noted Davis Thursday. But the mayor said it's realistic to expect that some of the land may have to be sold at some time.

"This land can only remain (village property) if it pays its own way," said Davis.

Councillor Pirelli said he was

shocked by the low bid, adding he expected the Postal Service to offer about \$350,000 for the 2.852 acre site being considered for a new main post office.

Pirelli, who voted to reject the postal offer, said he'd be "more prone" to vote for selling the land for a higher price.

Pirelli admitted that when the council turned down the low offer it alleviated a controversy over locating a post office on Cree Meadows Drive.

But if the price is right, Pirelli agrees with the mayor that some of the land eventually will be sold to help develop the rest of the land, or to retire the bond debt early.

Councillor Ray Dean Carpenter said his vote to reject the offer was

strictly a financial decision.

"It's a ridiculous offer," said Carpenter. And apparently Councillor Jerry Shaw agreed, for when the offer was announced she said "you've got to be kidding."

Councillor J.D. James was concerned with more than just price when he cast his ballot to reject the land sale.

"As far as I'm concerned the voters dictated in their election that they wanted to retain the land for economic reasons," said James in a telephone interview. "That's what I've got to go by... the wishes of the people," he added.

James said he went "up and down the street" talking with citizens about the proposed sale of a piece of the old airport, and found that

everybody he talked to opposes selling off any of the land.

Councillor Victor Alonso was absent from the special meeting, but said in a telephone conversation he was "relieved" over the council decision. Alonso recalled that he and fellow councillors agreed initially to "go out and see" what kind of an offer the postal service would make.

While he had concerns about access at the proposed location, Alonso said he agrees with the idea of selling a small part of the land and using the money in developing the property. But Alonso, too, is convinced the airport land is worth "much, much more" than the price offered.

"I don't think you can tie the

village's hands to strictly keep it," noted Alonso, adding he interpreted the decision by voters to keep the land as a vote to use it for economic development—and that could mean selling a portion at some point.

"I was never convinced the village couldn't sell an asset because a real estate salesman might lose a commission," said Alonso.

A master plan for the prime village property is in the hands of Architectural Research Consultants, Inc., working with the Airport Land Use Advisory Board. The citizens group and the land planners have had several meetings, and have said more will be scheduled before a final plan is unveiled.

Two killed

Two people were killed Sunday in a two-vehicle crash near Corona, according to New Mexico State Police reports.

Three Stewart, 61, of Pueblo, Colorado, and Dealva Smith, 57, of Las Vegas, Nevada, were pronounced dead at the scene of the early morning accident, according to police.

Stewart was driving a 1978 Mercury that collided head-on with a 1982 Ford pickup driven by Juan Galindo, 20, of Amarillo, Texas, said police.

The accident report indicates the Stewart car was northbound and the Galindo vehicle was southbound on State Highway 54 south of Corona near mile marker 161. Police said Galindo admitted to falling asleep at the wheel.

Galindo apparently veered across the center of the highway, Stewart swerved to avoid a collision, Galindo veered back and the two vehicles crashed head on, said police.

Galindo was cited for left of center, no drivers license, DWI and careless driving, according to police. A spokesman for the State Police in Alamogordo said charges are pending.

Two wrecks hurt eight

An early morning accident August 29 and a mid-afternoon crash August 31 sent eight people to Lincoln County Medical Center. A hospital spokesman said victims of both wrecks were treated and released.

Ruidoso Police reported a one-car rollover at 4:40 a.m. August 29 on Crown Drive about 6/10 of a mile west of U.S. Highway 70. Police said John McNeil, 25, of Ruidoso, was driving a 1984 Chevrolet pickup owned by Mary McCown.

The vehicle was on a downhill grade "going too fast as it approached the curve," when the driver applied his brakes, left the roadway and was airborne before colliding into trees and coming to rest on its side, according to the official report submitted by Officer B.J. Barnes.

Four passengers in the vehicle, Patrick Padilla, 17, of Ruidoso; Michael Padilla, 15, of Ruidoso; Joe Gonzales, 16, of Ruidoso; and Joseph Rue, 17, of Ruidoso Downs, walked into the hospital emergency room where they were treated, according to the report.

Police said the driver, McNeil, left the scene, but was later cited for failure to give immediate notice

of an accident and careless driving. A three-car crash Monday sent four people to the hospital by ambulance.

Police said Gabriel Lucero, 28, of Ruidoso was headed east on U.S. Highway 70 driving a 1978 Oldsmobile, when he attempted to make a left turn onto Glade Drive as Millette Cochise, 18, of Mescalero was headed east on Highway 70.

Cochise, driving a 1984 Ford pickup, reportedly pulled to the right to avoid a collision, but the two cars hit and then both collided into a 1983 Chevrolet pickup stopped at the stop sign on Glade. Jennifer Scholl, 27, of Ruidoso, was the driver of that vehicle, said police.

Robbery, heavy traffic keep Ruidoso police busy

Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor said traffic counts were about normal in the Village of Ruidoso over the Labor Day Weekend, with the village experiencing nine accidents and an armed robbery.

Although the five of the nine accidents in village limits involved injuries, Chief Swenor said he was basically pleased with the way things went. Swenor said there were three fatalities on area highways—two near Corona and one near Cloudfcroft.

He said his officers spent the busy weekend answering "an inordinate amount" of medical runs, fights and domestic problems. Swenor said the village continues to be plagued by automobile break-ins.

Two Texas women staying at Innsbruck Lodge on Sudderth Drive told police they answered a knock on the door about 8 p.m. Sunday, and were faced with an armed man who pushed his way into their room, ordered them into the bathroom and robbed them of nearly \$3,000 in cash and checks and \$3,344 in jewelry.

Betty C. Brown, 66, of Houston, Texas, and AnaLee Smith, 72, of San Antonio, Texas, said the in-

truder told them to wait in the bathroom while he went through their luggage. After waiting for about five minutes, the two women said they left the bathroom and found that the man had left with their purses and jewelry.

Both Brown and Smith reportedly told police the man was armed with a handgun and wearing a jacket and blue jeans. The man reportedly was six-feet tall, white with dark complexion, weighing about 180 pounds. The victims said he wore a yellow or beige cap, and were unsure whether his hair was blond or dark.

Detective Mike Lovelace said discrepancies in the suspect's description have made it difficult to send out information on the incident.

Items of jewelry reported missing include two silver wedding bands—one with six small diamonds and the other with one large diamond with a small diamond on each side. Also reported missing is a gold chain bracelet, a Bulova watch and five silver and turquoise rings.

Lovelace said the investigation is continuing.



Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Garrey Carruthers ran for governor as a reformer. But then, don't they all?

The only difference with Carruthers is that it appears he is following through on some of those campaign promises.

A couple of weeks ago Nick Jenkins was telling his state Economic Development and Tourism Board, in the presence of Gov. Carruthers, that the issuance of the state advertising contract had gone smoothly and that everything had been done in a businesslike manner with no favoritism shown to anyone. He ended by saying that he had not received any complaints.

The governor quickly interjected, "That's because I got all the complaints. There are some people out there who would have liked to see a little of that favoritism."

This pattern of playing it straight seems to be manifesting itself in several departments of state government. Nowhere is it more evident, however, than in the state Personnel Office. The directorship of that office is usually reserved for someone who was close to the governor during the campaign for office and, therefore, knows which of the job seekers truly helped the governor in his campaign and which are just blowing smoke.

But not this time around. Carruthers chose a Democrat, of all things, to run that office. Natalie Babcock wouldn't know a good Republican from a bad one. She says she hasn't had any orders from the governor to find anyone a job and she hasn't received any requests from legislators or other politicians to give jobs to friends or constituents.

Governors always appoint a few people from the opposite party to high state positions just to make things look respectable but this may be the first time a governor has ever chosen a personnel director from the opposite party.

The biggest test of Carruthers's personnel office is going to be how well the performance pay plans come off in each department. The governor's cabinet has been working overtime to design plans which are as objective as possible and to train managers to implement the evaluation systems which are required.

The target date for announce-

ments of the results is November 11. When I was a kid we called that Armistice Day, commemorating the termination of hostilities in World War I. The announcement of who has gotten the merit increases may signal the commencement of hostilities in this case. Any plan which involves subjective decisions by supervisors is going to ruffle feathers, whether the decisions were equitable or not.

Credit Carruthers with sticking to his guns, however, Babcock says the thing which makes her so loyal to the governor is that when the legislature started giving her trouble over the merit pay proposal, the de-emphasis on seniority and the elimination of some of the policing and regulating functions of the personnel office, the governor asked her if she felt they were doing the right thing.

When Babcock answered in the affirmative, Carruthers said, "Well, let's keep at it." Many politicians would have taken a more pragmatic stance in such a situation and pulled in their horns a little.

The dangerous feature of the governor's uncompromising stand is that, if these decisions do go sour, he comes off with egg on his face. Watch for state employee personnel matters to be a big issue in the 1988 Legislature.

It is unusual for a governor to already be talking about taking the legislature into "extra innings" with a burdensome number of issues to address during next year's short 30-day session. Previous governors have always announced their desire to limit the number of non-fiscal measures in the "short" session. The law provides that the subjects to be addressed in these sessions be limited to items of a fiscal nature and items introduced by the governor.

Carruthers has the authority to put anything he desires on the legislators' plates but in the interest of working together and not loading down a session, previous governors have been very sensitive about pushing too many issues into consideration. This may be another hard lesson for Carruthers to learn as a chief executive who did not come up through the legislative ranks.




