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Council rejects second postal service offer

Tuesday's meeting of the Ruidoso Village Council might have set an all-time record for brevity. In just over 15 minutes Mayor Pro-Tem Jerry Shaw and councillors Elmer Pirelli, Larry Simon and J.D. James whipped through a short agenda, rejected a second offer from the U.S. Postal Service and adjourned.



The Lincoln County Commissioners voted in Tuesday's regular meeting to advertise the new Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA) Zoning Ordinance in newspapers in order to meet Federal Aviation Administration rules and regulations for distractions along flight patterns and runway lines.

Planning group is set back on setbacks

A recurring question over property line setbacks was back to plague the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) Tuesday. Whether the 20-foot front and back and 10-foot side setbacks established in the 1976 master plan apply in subdivisions established before the plan's adoption is a question P&Z and the Ruidoso Village Council continue to volley back and forth.


"They directed me that they wanted different setbacks ... or no setbacks," said Lahey. "I think what they want is illegal," she added. Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. has stated over and over that the setbacks were never meant for older subdivisions, and variances should be given automatically.

they overturned it," noted Lahey. P&Z Chairman David Smith said the village seems to have four- and six-year plans instead of 30-year plans. He said if setback requirements are lifted for every area platted before 1976 it will include as much as 75 percent of the buildable area.

an adjacent neighbor. The property owner, Ruby Greenhaw, and her son, David Greenhaw, apologized to the commission for beginning construction of a storage shed without obtaining a building permit. Greenhaw said he was told by a local contractor that he wouldn't need a permit since the structure is to be on skids.

"These regulations shall be known and may be cited as the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport Zoning Regulations." According to the printed restriction, "no structure or tree shall be erected, altered, allowed to grow, or maintained in any zone created by these regulations to a height in excess of the height limit established for each zone."

Item 1: estimated 20,000 cubic yards of base course for Fort Stanton and other roads. This bid went out to two companies, Beavers Sand and Gravel Company, Ruidoso Downs, and Bonnell Sand and Gravel, Glencoe. Either company can be called upon depending upon their proximity to the site location where the gravel is needed. Item 2: estimated 10,000 cubic yards of select fill material. This was awarded to Patrick Huey of Capitan.

Police seek rape suspect

Ruidoso police have obtained an arrest warrant naming Boyd Bartlett as a suspect in the August 13 rape of a Texas resident at her Ruidoso summer home. Harry Wilcox Jr., senior trial prosecutor for the 12th Judicial District Attorney's office, said Tuesday that a young hispanic female was allegedly raped on August 13. He said Detective Larry Maddox, heading the investigation, put together a photo lineup and the victim was able to identify Bartlett.

Brazel Ranch turnover to the Magado Creek Ranch cattleguard, about one mile southwest of the intersection of County Road B-028 and State Highway 48. This road is only one-quarter of a mile long.

Commission Chairman John Hightower stipulated that maintaining this road will not necessarily include base course, only laying of culvert and blading.

—The Zia Senior Citizens Mini-Van which was for sale was awarded to the Lone Tree Bible Ranch for their lone bid of \$500.

—The town of Carrizozo and Glen Ellison, Chairman of the Carrizozo Bicentennial/Diamond Jubilee Celebration, asked for and received a proclamation stating that September 19, 1987, be recognized as William C. McDonald Day in Lincoln County.

William C. McDonald came to Lincoln County in 1880 and was in-

strumental in forming Carrizozo, and later was elected governor of New Mexico for the first five years. Later, he returned to Carrizozo and is buried in the White Oaks Cemetery.

—A proclamation was also passed to declare the week of September 21-27, 1987, as Emergency Medical Services Week in Lincoln County.

—A grant submitted by the Sheriff's Office for funding for traffic safety was approved by the commissioners, but only on the provision that county manager Suzanne Cox and attorney Mitchell correct the numerous errors in the grant application submitted by the sheriff's office.

The submittal contained typographical errors and misinformation, including the wrong dates, the wrong phone number, and the wrong county name—"Curry" county instead of "Lincoln." Some of the figures submitted were in er-

ror, for example, claiming that there were 1,349 traffic accidents in the county in 1985, when the actual number was 510 accidents.

"There are some serious problems and errors in this grant application, and it must be rewritten," said Chairman Hightower.

Bettye Dean, secretary in the sheriff's office who was representing the grant application, stated that she wasn't really "all that" familiar with it and would proofread it again.

—Chairman Hightower apologized to the Carrizozo Soil and Water Conservation District for remarks he had made to them at the last meeting and said that he and the commission would do all they could to help in any way possible. "Sometimes you jump to conclusions," Hightower said. "I was wrong in my conclusions."

—Resolutions 76-14 and 76-15, to achieve wilderness designation of Carrizozo Lava Flow and Little

Black Peak, caused some discussion among commissioners. "Is this another one of those things where our opinion don't mean a?" asked Hightower, apparently also referring to the Conservation District discussion of the previous meeting.

"I'm afraid it is, sir," answered attorney Mitchell. No action was needed or taken on the issue.

—The commission also voted to pay their \$200 membership fee to the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District.

—It was decided that the county courthouse would change its hours and be open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily, with an hour for lunch for employees. However, the offices will remain open throughout the day because employees will take staggered lunch shifts.

The next meeting of the Lincoln County Commissioners will be at 9 a.m. Tuesday, September 29.

Service Club Council learns of busy fall schedule

"This weekend is a big weekend," said Mildred Crocker Monday as the Service Club Calendar looked forward to a fall full of activities.

Crocker listed the Ruidoso Downs Muleskinners Mule Races, the Kiwanis Club fishing tournament and the Harmony Festival as things to look forward to this Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

During the regular monthly SCC meeting, Ronnie Paulger of the Economic Development Corporation gave an update on that group's progress. He said members of the organization want to speak to

various clubs and organizations to "sell the program."

Paulger said he and other members of the interim board already have spoken to many groups, but are asking to speak once more.

The Economic Development Corporation has 60 members, but want 150 before reorganizing and electing a board.

"We want to have a broad membership," noted Paulger. He said the \$200 membership fee is "money well spent when you look at the results."

Paulger said the group has form-

ed to bring new businesses. He said utilities and other services already are in place, but more people are needed to relieve the tax burden on area citizens.

"There's no free lunches ... it's going to take some money to try to entice these companies to come into Ruidoso," said Paulger.

With the target membership of 150, the group will have a "voice" in the area and "clout" with the companies being encouraged to settle here.

"We have to take charge of our own destiny," said Paulger.

Also during Monday's meeting

SCC members:

—Heard that the Noon Lions Club is placing aluminum can receptacles at the four Ruidoso fire stations as a means of raising funds for community service projects. Lion Jack Robertson called on SCC to spread the word for people to deposit crushed aluminum cans in the containers.

—Learned that Family Crisis Center is providing temporary shelter and other services, and has a 24-hour hotline, 257-7365, that is answered at the Ruidoso Police


Department. Betsy Seiler, site coordinator, said the backbone of the organization is volunteers. Seiler said a training series will begin in October, and more volunteers are needed. Seiler said she is available to talk to service clubs about the crisis center.

—Heard from Jack McNeil of the Noon Lions that his group will again provide a meal for area bands in town for Aspenfest. McNeil said the club has funds left over from last year.

—Discussed a proposal to help

organize a home living center at Ruidoso High School for students in special education classes at both the high school and Ruidoso Middle School. Nancy Radziewicz said space is available and the special education teacher favors the idea, but household items are needed to furnish the room. A letter will be sent to clubs explaining the need.

—SCC President Barbara Duff reminded representatives to get dates of upcoming events on the calendar as soon as possible by calling Jill Blanks at West Winds Lodge.

Nob Hill Elementary has new look

Principal Roger Sowder has a couple of reasons to smile.

For one, he is that kind of person; the kind who wears funny hats, who keeps cheerful stuffed animals in his office and who has the sign on his office door, "Principal," turned upside-down.

The other reason is that his school, Nob Hill Elementary, is now larger, prettier and even stylish in terms of physical features.

The school was first built in 1955 and this year's remodeling and enlargement is essentially the first large improvement made to the building since then.

"The teachers and staff all had input into how to remodel and redecorate," says Sowder as he walks the halls of the elementary school, pointing out the new features. The inside walls are painted with horizontal stripes in striking yellow, beige and turquoise. Carpeting is Williamsburg blue. New bathrooms are spacious, with pink walls for the girls' room and blue for the boys'.

The renovation cost \$435,831, which was under budget. Walls were knocked out, spaces enlarged and dozens of new bookshelves and cabinets added. The addition, which cost \$358,257, included 12 new classrooms and bathrooms.


The outside of the structure is

traditional orange adobe, with jewel-like turquoise trim. The addition is currently unpainted, but will look the same as the original part when it's through.

Enrollment this year at Nob Hill Elementary is 173 in the kindergarten and 133 in first grade. "Our kindergarten enrollment has increased quite a bit," Sowder comments.


There are 13 certified teachers on the Nob Hill staff, and 12 non-certified employees, counting the principal.

"I think it looks beautiful in here," Sowder says enthusiastically. "We're a lucky bunch."



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

Handle tops \$31 million

RUIDOSO DOWNS, N.M. - Ruidoso Downs capped the 1987 horse racing season on Labor Day with the largest handle of the summer as 9,240 fans wagered \$1,069,182.

The daily total was 12th highest in the history of the mountain track. The final program was up 4.5 percent over last year when wagering reached \$1,023,559 on the last day of racing.

More than 30,000 fans bet \$3.6 million for the five programs over the holiday weekend that closed out the season.

Ruidoso Downs ended the 75-day meet with a total handle of \$31,600,471, which represented a slight increase over last year's \$31,079,040 total.

A total of 287,133 fans attended the 40th season of racing compared to 297,252 over 67 race days in 1986.

Seven other tracks bet \$240,000 on All American

Nearly \$240,000 was bet at seven racetracks that offered simulcast wagering on the 29th running of the All American Futurity on Sept. 7 at Ruidoso Downs.

Hollywood Park topped the outlets handling \$117,884 on the \$2.5 million classic that saw Elans Special post the second-largest winning margin in 22 years. The filly's impressive 1 1/3-length victory returned \$4.20 on a \$2 win ticket at the California track.

The West Coast players were more confident in Elans Special's

abilities than handicappers at Ruidoso Downs, where the All American winner paid \$6.80.

Quarter-racing fans at Blue Ribbon Downs in Sallisaw, Ok., wagered \$46,927, while Delta Downs in Louisiana handled \$29,473 for the 1987 renewal of the world's richest quarter horse race.

Blue Grass Downs in Paducah, Ky., checked in fourth with \$12,542 wagered. Betting totaled \$12,024 at Yakima Meadows, while Sedalia Park and Les Bois Park handled \$9,707 and \$10,769 respectively.

Select Sale sees \$2,465,500 worth of horses sold

Led by a healthy yearling session, the Ruidoso Super Select Sale Company's annual Quarter Horse Yearling and Mixed Sales saw \$2,465,500 worth of horses sell at Glencoe on August 29-30.

The average price for the 85 yearlings sold was \$25,806, up 30 percent on last year's average of \$19,846. The median price, which indicates that half of the yearlings sold for more than that figure, was \$17,500, up 75 percent on the 1986 median.

In addition to the \$2,193,700 for the yearling session, \$271,800 was paid for 39 head in the mixed

sale. "The market for top Quarter Horse yearlings seems to be on the upswing again," said Richard Thompson, president and general manager of Ruidoso Super Select Co. "We were especially pleased to see that 85 percent of the yearlings offered were sold, and that the prices were strong in the upper range. Eleven of the yearlings sold for \$50,000 or more."

The top price was \$175,000 for Dashette, a Dash For Cash-Easy Inclination filly consigned by Brookhill Ranch of Fresno, California, and purchased by Nancy Mc-

Joe Kirk Fulton of Lubbock, Texas, consigned the second high seller, Ultimate Outcome, a colt purchased by R.D. Hubbard of Irvine, California, for \$85,000. The colt is by The Signature, whose first yearlings are being offered this season, and out of Dashes Lass, a stakes-placed mare that is a half-sister to the Champion Sixty



Some way had to be found to quell these complaints and Mr. Roger Sherman, assisted by Dr. Hugh Williamson, came up with a solution. He proposed that elections where no majority candidate is chosen be decided by the House of Representatives.

PRESIDENT'S TITLE

As to a title, General Washington favored: "His High Mightiness, the President of the United States and Protector of their Liberties." The Convention chose a simpler form: "His Excellency, the President of the United States."

Philadelphia ... September 7, 1787

We are aware of the outrage bordering on hysteria noised about by Mr. Elbridge Gerry of Massachusetts as regards whether or not Our Republic shall have a Standing Army.

Mr. Gerry's opposition can be understood by all who were trampled down by the damned Bloodybacks of George III before our Independency. A Standing Army is always a threat to the people, but that must be weighed against the protection offered in repelling our Enemies, or voicing our displeasure to those who would curtail our Liberties lately gained.

The Supreme Executive Council, with President Franklin presiding today, ordered the Pennsylvania Treasurer to pay the Wardens of the Port of Philadelphia 920 pounds "to be applied toward the further improvement of the navigation in the bay and river Delaware." This is to be paid out of the duties arising from tonnage.

It has been whispered about that the tempestuous Chief Warden, Mr. David Head had threatened havoc in the Port unless these improvements were forthcoming!

Louis XVI Exiles Paris Parlement Judges; City Riots!



Marquis de Lafayette is in constant turmoil with King Louis XVI. Emotions run high in France.

In a decision certain to further enflame public opinion against the monarchy and ministry, Louis XVI and his head of the Council of Finance, Archbishop Lomenie de Brienne, have exiled the Judges of the Parlement of Paris to Troyes. This action, by means of royal lettres de cachet delivered to the Judges in the dead of night, is intended as punishment for the Judge's refusal to register the King's latest financial decrees.

Since the end of the Assembly of Notables on 25 May, all here have watched anxiously to see whether that Assembly's call for financial reforms would bear fruit. The King accepted the Assembly's suggestions in several respects. Louis XVI has recently issued decrees establishing advisory provincial assemblies, establishing internal free trade in grains, and commuting the peasants' corvée (service to repair local roads) into a money payment to landlords. These decrees were all duly registered by the Parlement of Paris giving them the full force of Law. None of these decrees, however, dealt with the critical question of government finances, which is the central problem facing France. Royal officials now

concede that the budget is over one hundred million livres in deficit! The Assembly of Notables, led by such as America's friend the Marquis de Lafayette, refused to agree to new taxes, professing no power to do so. But the King and his ministers have declared that, without increased revenue, the state was on the brink of bankruptcy.

THE KING'S PLAN

Early this month, Archbishop Brienne revealed the King's plan for dealing with the crisis, announcing two new edicts imposing new taxes. These include a stamp tax (a measure of some familiarity to Americans!) and a general land tax, both to be paid by all citizens, nobles and commoners alike. This principle of equality of taxation, which may seem obvious and necessary to Americans, is viewed in France as a direct assault on the ancient rights of the church and nobility.

In an act of defiance, the Judges of the Parlement of Paris, who own their offices by hereditary right and are considered nobles, refused to register the decrees and are grounds that the people of France must give their consent to new taxes. This principle is a revolutionary one in France, for the absolute power of the King to rule has been unquestioned for nearly two hundred years!

In response to the Parlement's failure to register the tax decrees, Louis XVI summoned the Judges to the palace of Versailles on 6 August. There, in a ceremony known as the lit de justice, the King appeared before the Judges and ordered registration of the decrees. The Judges, as required by ancient tradition, complied. The next day the Parlement met and voted to rescind their registration, announcing that the decrees were null and void, and thereby claiming a sort of veto power over the act of the King! This action received much approbation from the people of Paris, but, as the King has now shown, the dispute is far from over.

Lettres de cachet -- administrative orders under the king's direct authority -- commanding that the Judges of the Parlement of Paris go into exile at Troyes were delivered the night of 14-15 August. The effective arrest of the Judges resulted in a day of riots and protests in Paris.

ASSEMBLY A FAILURE

It is clear now that the Assembly of Notables was a failure, and that the King cannot look for support from the aristocracy in carrying out reform. The privileged orders, are the King's greatest problem rather than allies in dealing with the realm's difficulties. France is still very far from a resolution of the financial crisis. Whether all can be put right by peaceful means is overroaring to be doubted. While few here openly call for the overthrow of the monarchy, there is much discussion of the weakness of Louis XVI and the incompetence of his ministers. The present crisis demonstrates that there is great possibility of further conflict between the supporters and the enemies of royal authority!

Bartram's Garden: A Botanical Treasure!


On Sundays, the Gentlemen attending the Grand Convention seek entertainment and exercise by riding out of the city to visit various farms and houses near this city. His Excellency, General Washington, as well as other Gentlemen, have visited the Botanical Garden of Mr. John Bartram where they were received by the proprietor, Mr. John Bartram Jr. and his brother, Mr. William Bartram. His Excellency, after inspecting the garden, said that while it was not so well laid out as other gardens he had seen, it contained many curious plants, shrubs and trees, more than he had ever seen in one place before.

THE EMINENT LINNAEUS PRAISES BARTRAM

Mr. Bartram's Garden surrounds his house and overlooks the pleasing meadows of the Schuylkill River, an easy ride from the city. The garden was created by the late Mr. Bartram who died at the age of eighty-seven in 1777. Mr. Bartram's renown as a naturalist was well known in this City, but his fame extended far beyond America's shores. His scientific papers were presented to the Royal Society in London, and he was elected a member of the Royal Academy of Science in distant Stockholm. He corresponded with members of the British nobility and with scientists and botanists in Europe. Mr. Linnaeus, the most eminent botanist in the world, was full of praise for Mr. Bartram's talents. While Pennsylvania remained within the British Empire, Mr. Bartram was appointed King's Botanist in the Floridas and it was a royal pension that made it possible for him to travel to Florida on a botanical expedition. Mr. William Bartram accompanied his father on his travels and showed General Washington some of the drawings he had made.

BARTRAM DISTRIBUTES AMERICAN PLANTS TO EUROPE

Mr. Bartram secured seeds and cuttings from distant parts of our Continent. After he had cultivated these treasures, he distributed them in the form of cuttings and seeds to his many correspondents in Europe. Many trees which Americans know well, such as sugar maples,

mountain laurels, hemlocks, and river birches, as well as shrubs like the wild honeysuckle and the witch hazel became familiar in Europe because of the efforts of Mr. Bartram. It is estimated that one hundred and fifty of our plants may now be found in English and other foreign gardens.

Company Approves Purchase

Our Intelligencers tell us that the Directors of the Ohio Company met today at the Bunch of Grapes Tavern to listen to a Report from Rev. Manassah Cutler, their Lobbyist in Congress.

Rev. Cutler negotiated a contract with the Board of Treasury for the Company to purchase 1,000,000 acres (\$1 million) in the newly created Northwest Territories at (\$1 per acre, less 1-3 of a dollar per acre allowed for bad lands and the cost of surveying. The money is to be paid in two installments.

We understand the Board approved this purchase by Rev. Cutler.

Boston ... September 7, 1787

Cherokee Gifts

Representatives of the Cherokee Nation continue their visit to our fair city. Friday instant, three of them visited His Excellency B. Franklin and were presented with 2 silver meddles done by the hands of Alexander Dragoale for their Great Chiefs. Also given was his Excellency's picture in silver to the Beloved Woman of Chota.

The three Cherokee Representatives present were Kattahee or Corn Tassel, Scolecata or Hanging Man, and Kattaeha or Beloved Woman, who presented Doctor Franklin with a present of tobacco.

Philadelphia ... September 7, 1787

Hostilities Commenced

Accounts from St. John's (New Brunswick) say that Indians have commenced hostilities on the Canadian frontier. Several soldiers of his Majesty's 65th regiment have been killed in a skirmish.

SANTA FE—Remember the controversy that arose a few years ago when New Mexicans discovered that a movie filmed in Albuquerque, called "Private Lessons," contained some pretty steamy scenes? That may end up being a mere whirlwind compared to the tempest which is likely to be unleashed when state residents view Roger Vadim's newest movie, a remake of the 1957 Brigitte Bardot classic, "And God Created Woman."

We may never know all the lurid details because the magazine reports that "come February, Americans will see a tamer version than Europeans." No matter how tame the version, there is likely to be much embarrassment over the decision to provide state buildings and state personnel to assist the production of this movie. The film was shot in Santa Fe during February and March of this year so it is obvious that the recruiting was done by the previous administration's Film Commission and Department of Economic Development and Tourism but the red faces spill over into this administration for being the ones to let it go on.

While we are bashing the economic development folks, the New Mexico Magazine deserves some attention. A reader wrote about a frustrating experience sending a gift subscription last Christmas. The card announcing the gift never was sent but the reader was billed. The bill was paid promptly put a past due notice was sent. 

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
