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## Forest Service volunteer gets presidential honor

President Ronald Reagan sent a letter. High-ranking Forest Service officials made special airplane flights to be present. A sea of green Forest Service vehicles made their way to South Fork Campground in Lincoln National Forest. Many were moved nearly to tears.

Bill and Clara Riggs were retiring.

As Bill reached to quiet a wind chime crinkling in a chilled autumn breeze that skipped down high hillsides into South Fork Campground Tuesday morning, Forest Service Regional Office Deputy for Administration Lou Volk read the presidential letter commending Bill for more than 15,000 hours of volunteer service as summer host at the campground—the largest number of hours volunteered by anyone in the entire Forest Service.

Bill always was one who stuck with something, constantly doing a good job. During his 35-year career as a railroad fireman and engineer, he set records for hauling the heaviest load (17,000 tons of potash at one time), and hauling the longest freight train (180 cars long).

After retirement, he and his wife, Laura Mae, started working in the Volunteers in the National Forest Program in 1976 as hosts of the South Fork Campground on the banks of the Rio Bonito. Every year in May, they'd pull the long, white travel trailer into their hillside spot overlooking the South Fork entrance road and set up camp. Summers would buzz by with the activity of helping and directing campers, maintaining campground facilities and using Bill's "Mr. Fix It" skills to keep everything in proper running order. Together, they accumulated 10,000 hours of volunteer service.

After Laura Mae's death, Bill married Clara, and they kept the tradition alive, notching 15,000 hours altogether by the end of this summer.

"I wouldn't take anything for the experience," Bill said as he stood under the trailer awning, his arm around Clara's shoulders. The two were surrounded during Tuesday's presentations by campers and Forest Service officials, and undoubtedly more than a few friends watching from the forests surrounding the high mountain campground—Bill and Clara went through 40 pounds of sugar this

summer for mixes in hummingbird feeders.

Forest Service Supervisor Jim Abbott introduced guests, Smokey Bear District Ranger Steve Sams presented the couple with a mounted wild turkey, Smokey Bear District Recreation Lands and Staff Officer Richard Carlson gave awards and presents, and a letter from Forest Service Chief F. Dale Robertson was read.

"I wish I could keep going, but, you know, there comes a time when you just have to quit," Bill said. And the two will be leaving soon, packing camping gear, lawn chairs, generator, wind chimes and hummingbird feeders into the white trailer. And they'll head down the mountain away from the campground they came to know so well.

But the expressions of Forest Service and camping friends gathered around the elderly couple Tuesday suggested the forest meadows, mountainsides and chattering waters of the Rio Bonito, and the people who have come to know Bill and Clara Riggs, will not soon forget the impression the hillside hosts have had on South Fork Campground for so many years.

## Two killed in wreck; DWI charge levelled

Two Oklahoma people are dead and two Lincoln County residents injured following a head-on collision late Monday afternoon on U.S. Highway 70 near Circle B Campground.

Amy Sue Roeske, the 29-year-old driver of a 1985 Chrysler, and her brother, Steve Roeske, 30, both of Tulsa, Oklahoma, were killed in the crash, according to New Mexico State Police Officer Steve Standridge.

Ruidoso Downs resident Adolfo Garcia, the 37-year-old driver of a 1977 Ford two-door, and 52-year-old Willie Sanchez, a passenger in his vehicle, both were taken to Lincoln County Medical Center. Sanchez is in critical, but stable condition, and Garcia in stable condition, according to a hospital spokesperson.

Standridge said Garcia was east-bound near mile marker 266 when

he attempted to pass another vehicle, pulled out into the westbound lane and collided head-on with the Roeske car. Standridge said the two vehicles hit squarely, knocking the Chrysler backward 25 feet, and smashing the car's engine into the front seat.

Members of the Ruidoso Downs Volunteer Fire Department used the "jaws of life" to cut the doors off the Chrysler and get the two bodies out of the wrecked car.

Both the Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs fire departments were dispatched to the scene as a "precautionary measure," said Standridge. Ruidoso Police officers stopped traffic on U.S. Highway 70 at the "Y" while the wreckage was cleared away.

"Garcia is currently under arrest for DWI, second," said Standridge. He said his investigation is continuing, and felony charges probably will be filed.

Magistrate court records indicate

Garcia was free on his own recognizance following his arrest on September 8, for defective equipment (no tail lights) and driving under the influence of intoxicating liquor or drugs. Court records show that Garcia was arraigned before Magistrate Judge J.R. "Jim" Wheeler where he entered a plea of "not guilty," and trial was set for 1:30 p.m. September 23.

"He satisfied the law for a second offender ... spent two days in jail before I arraigned him," said Judge Wheeler. He said Garcia has never been convicted of DWI.

"I still don't have a signed criminal complaint, I only have a traffic citation," noted Wheeler of the September 8 incident.

Court records indicate Garcia's blood/alcohol count tested at .13, .12 and .12 after his arrest on September 8. According to state statutes a driver is legally intoxicated with a blood/alcohol level of .10.

## Helicopters join search for Fort Stanton man

A late-night and early morning search so far has not been able to locate a man reported missing from the Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School since around 11:30 last night.

White Mountain Search and Rescue volunteers are seeking Kevin Taylor, a retarded and slightly disabled resident of Fort Stanton, according to official reports. His date of birth is December 16, 1963, and he is 5'3" tall, weighs 128 pounds, has black hair and brown eyes, and is wear-

ing tennis shoes. He is a Native American from the Las Cruces area.

Taylor and a companion, Billy Joe Martin, left the hospital grounds together. Martin apparently was picked up by a motorist early this morning near the Devil's Canyon turnoff on Fort Stanton Mesa. He had apparently hitched a ride and was found by searchers as he walked alongside the road between Capitan and Carrizozo.

According to White Mountain Search and Rescue president Mike Pritchett, helicopters from Holloman Air Force Base in Alamogordo will be conducting an

air search this morning, and there is already one volunteer chopper in the skies near the hospital.

"We found two sets of footprints leading into the Devil's Canyon area," said Pritchett. "One of the prints is definitely from Martin's shoes, and we are assuming that the other set of prints is from Taylor's. It appears that the two split up around the Devil's Canyon turnoff on the mesa. Possibly Taylor is trying to get to Las Cruces, where he is from."

Because the men left the hospital at night, no one saw them and there is no clothing description for Taylor other than that he is wearing tennis

shoes. Taylor walks stiffly and has stiff movement in the fingers on his left hand. He is not considered to be dangerous.

Anyone spotting a man of Taylor's description should notify the White Mountain Search and Rescue Team at 354-2211.

The White Mountain Search and Rescue Team is composed of 30 volunteers and was formed in 1970. Most of the volunteers are members of law enforcement teams from the Lincoln County area.

## Airport commission delays paying attorney, administrator

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission, during a regular meeting Wednesday, put a hold on paying \$38,711.58 in bills from the previous commission's administrator and attorney.

Outstanding bills tabled Wednesday included one from Heckman & Haworth for \$10,495.16, and three from Steven K. Sanders: one for \$6,799.56, one for \$8,239.50 and the third for \$13,177.36.

After learning that itemized bills from former airport administrator Fred Heckman and former commission attorney Steve Sanders haven't yet been submitted to the Federal Aviation Administration

(FAA) for reimbursement, commissioners voted unanimously to delay paying their final invoices. The commission agreed to ask Heckman and Sanders to resubmit the bills divided into "eligible" and "ineligible" items.

During a previous SBAC meeting Heckman explained a process he was using to derive a formula for obtaining FAA funding for 90 percent of his pay on eligible items. He said he would complete that process and submit his bills for FAA approval.

SBAC Chairman Bill Karn said the FAA has not received any paperwork on either Heckman or Sanders. "I don't think we should pay those bills until we get information from FAA," he added.

"They should have been doing this all along," said Commissioner Ralph Dunlap.

County manager Suzanne Cox said if the administrator and attorney charge the commission for time spent in preparing their bills, it will put Sanders' over \$20,000, and could cause problems with the state purchasing act since his contract with the county is expired.

"I don't see that we should be paying them for something they've already done," said Dunlap.

County attorney Gary Mitchell said the Sanders bills won't present a major problem, but the Heckman and Haworth bills will, since they aren't broken down.

Mitchell said it could take Heckman a "lot of hours" to break

down his bills, but agreed with Dunlap that he should have been doing that all along.

Dunlap said Heckman has been unwilling to relinquish SBAC files, and the motion that finally passed Wednesday calls for him to turn over SBAC records within 10 days, as well as resubmitting his bills.

Karn said he tried unsuccessfully to reach Heckman last week, and Ruidoso Municipal Airport manager Tim Morris said he went by Heckman's office and learned that the former administrator will be working in Albuquerque for a while. Morris said Heckman told him he wants to keep SBAC records in his possession until after the up-

Mitchell said Sanders, who was in California and unable to attend Wednesday's meeting, also has not given over his files. But Sanders has given the commission permission to have someone go to his office and make copies of the documents. He said it could take two or three days.

Karn wondered who owns the files and Mitchell said they belong to the commission.

"Fred (Heckman) needs to return this stuff ... I don't know what his problem is," said Mitchell. Although other copies are available for some of the files in Heckman's office, Mitchell said he wants to avoid the expense of making copies of everything.

"He has the commission's executed copy of contracts," noted airport engineer Earl Cook. He said his firm still has original design plans and specifications on the project.

"I think Fred will see the light," said Mitchell after the commission set the 10-day deadline.

Heckman couldn't be reached for comment after the meeting.

Also Wednesday Mitchell reported that a contractual dispute between Tricon-Kent and base coarse suppliers, Beavers Sand and Gravel and Hoyt Graham, is in the hands of the court.

Mitchell said the disagreement between the earthwork contractor, Tricon-Kent, and sub-contractors, Beavers and Graham, is over the actual amount of gravel hauled to the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport construction site. He said the engineer indicated it would take 5,400 cubic yards of compacted base coarse, but the suppliers say they delivered 8,600 cubic yards.

During an arbitration session Monday, everyone agreed to deposit \$25,693 of the amount the commission owes Tricon-Kent with

the district court until an agreement is reached, said Mitchell.

"Those people will either reach an agreement or they'll have the judge rule," said Mitchell. "We're out of it," he added.

In other regular business Wednesday, the commission:

—Authorized paying Betty Schreengost the \$66,500 as agreed for water rights transferred to the airport site, after learning the long-standing water case was settled.

—Learned from Karn that the Village of Ruidoso has received the bond money for airport construction. He said the commission needs to check interest rates and deposit the funds.

—Agreed to a request from Morris to write a letter to FAA official Weston Hampton asking for a waiver of one of the requirements to obtain funding for a crash fire rescue area. Morris said criteria for FAA funding includes scheduled air service and serving 30-passenger or larger planes. The commission agreed to ask FAA to waive the 30-passenger requirement.

—Heard from Morris that FAA will make a final inspection of the earthwork contract at 10:30 a.m. Thursday, September 24.

—Learned during the engineer's report that the paving and lighting contractors have just started, and the paving contractor is 30 days behind schedule. Cook presented cost estimates and funding sources for essential and support facilities.

He said the electrical distribution system, water distribution system, pump station and reservoir and wastewater collection and disposal, including design, administration,

engineering and contingencies, will cost \$1,405,585. He said the Economic Development Administration (EDA) is a potential source for 80 percent, or \$1,124,468, of the funds. The balance, \$281,117, would be paid by the commission.

The local share for support facilities was estimated at \$68,956.

Cook said Heckman has done some groundwork for an EDA grant, but Dunlap noted that none of the local costs were included in the budget adopted by the commission.

—Authorized Suzanne Cox to apply for the EDA grant, as well as other grants, to pay for capital projects.

"If we apply for all these grants and get them how are we going to come up with the local share?" asked Commissioner John Hightower.

"I imagine someone will come up with some money somewhere," said Commissioner Lloyd L. Davis Jr.

—Discussed when airport opening ceremonies can be scheduled after hearing from Dunlap that the post office is considering issuing a special envelope. Although the airport is set to be operational on December 1, Cook warned that it would be risky to set the dedication that day.

"That's the day the contractor's time is up and they're 30 days behind schedule," noted Cook. Commissioners agreed that spring or summer would be the best time for a ceremony.

—Heard from village attorney John Underwood that an agreement was reached to sell water to the contractor for \$2.50 per 1,000 gallons.

## Trustees delay action on CDBG loan proposal

A proposal seeking federal Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding for economic development in Ruidoso Downs was postponed for two weeks by Ruidoso Downs Trustees.

The CDBG Gap Financing program offers money for communities to disburse as loans to eligible businesses that are to use the money to provide new jobs and further economic development. Last winter, the program was first presented to the Downs by Steve Massey of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District. A public hearing took place, several businesses showed interest in the program but just one pushed on, completing a complex application to the program.

That proposal was submitted by Conrad Buchanan, who until his resignation last month was a member of the Board of Trustees. A provision declaring elected officials exempt from the program has proved to be a stumbling block for Buchanan through several Downs meetings at which the program has been discussed, and Monday night that stumbling block again was evident.

Trustees voted unanimously to postpone the proposal after Trustee Bill Smith pointed out the new trustees had received the complicated application just last Friday.

Buchanan, owner of C & S Distributors, seeks \$214,000 in his application, and promises to retain present jobs and create new ones. If trustees decide to go forward with the program, the application will be sent to Santa Fe, then submitted to the Community Development Council. That group will decide the fate of the application, and rule whether Buchanan's conflict of interest as a former trustee invalidates the application.

If the council gives the go-ahead,

the \$214,000 will be disbursed through the Village of Ruidoso Downs to Buchanan as a loan. When he pays the loan back, the money will be reloaned to another business, then repaid, then reloaned again. On the final repayment, the money reverts to the Downs for whatever the Board of Trustees at that time deems necessary.

Audience member Jack Black spoke against the application, pointing out Buchanan's conflict of interest and asking why the trustees were considering submitting the "illegal" application. Mayor J.C. "Jake" Harris also spoke against the proposal, noting his belief that "maybe a dozen" Downs businesses could use the money and if the funds are not paid back, "it's gone."

"You've got to treat it like a banker," Harris said, stressing the need to secure collateral before making the loan.

After the vote to postpone, Buchanan said if the matter is settled at the next meeting, in two weeks, enough time will remain to meet October deadlines and secure 1987 funding.

In other business, the trustees:

—Conducted a public hearing to determine needs in the village that could be met by CDBG grants. Massey outlined regulations and objectives of the program, which can fund community infrastructure, housing, economic development, planning and emergency contingency projects. Under the program, federal funds are administered to communities through the state. Suggestions voiced at the meeting that could be funded by CDBG grants included a continuation of the paving program, a community, senior citizen and youth center, and housing rehabilitation.

—Accepted the Police Report, and a proposal by Chief G.L. "Skip" Hazel for the purchase of new patches for officers.

—Accepted the Animal Control Report, and heard Trustee C.L.

among Downs governing officials at the meeting, the first official regular meeting of the newly elected group.

"Bones" Wright suggest that the village look into making arrangements to work with the Humane Society of Lincoln County's animal shelter.

—Accepted the Court Report, and heard Judge Harrold Mansell give trustees an update on court activities and procedures. In addition, Mansell reported that fines now may only be paid directly to the court either through the mail or during court nights, Tuesdays and Thursdays.

—Heard notes of praise about the efforts of the Downs Volunteer Fire

Department, and accepted that department's report.

—Learned that 3,200 people visited the Ruidoso Downs Ladies Auxiliary's Arts and Crafts Fair during the Labor Day Weekend. Plans by the Auxiliary to construct a pavilion on the fair site continue.

—Heard Harris read letters of commendation of village deputy clerk Janice Polk from clerk Jean Stillman; the Ruidoso Downs Police Department from Ruidoso Downs Race Track Chief of Security Ken Shockey; Downs water technician Robert Zamora from

Polk and Stillman; and Downs Police officers David Hightower, Bobby Angermiller and Frankie Hooper from former Trustee Jackie Branum.

"Now that's what we like to hear," Harris commented.

—Adjourned into executive session, after which they reopened the meeting and voted to amend Resolution 87-10, in which the village will now pay 50 percent of employees' Public Employees Retirement Association costs rather than 75 percent as before.

## Year-to-date building permits half as high as last year's

After an upward swing in July, village building topped in August to the lowest level since January, leaving year-to-date totals lagging behind last year's by close to 50 percent.

Permits issued in August for all categories numbered just 22, valued at \$340,923, bringing the totals for the year to 187 permits worth \$4,931,857. In 1986, through August, the village had issued 224 permits worth \$9,095,293; in 1985, 443 permits for \$16,773,283; and in 1984, 405 permits at \$32,487,565. July's big upswing—36 permits

for \$1,279,944—was shortlived, as the August building slump continued a two-year trend.

Most of the August permits were for remodels—17 for residential redo's and two for commercial additions and alterations.

The 17 home remodeling permits totaled \$152,934; while the two commercial redo permits were valued at \$16,614. In July there were 22 permits worth \$177,151 in the residential fix-up category; and one commercial addition/alteration valued at \$13,000.

Last year, in August 1986, the village issued 18 residential fix-up permits for \$59,799 and four commercial remodeling permits at

\$21,500.

In August only two new residence permits were recorded, with a total value of \$169,844; down from July's nine new home starts valued at \$608,664; and below last August's six single-family residence permits worth \$485,355.

No new commercial building permits were issued in August, leaving July's two commercial starts, valued at \$468,026, as the only two commercial permits for 1987. In August 1986, one commercial permit was issued, with a value of only \$3,000.

One demolition permit was issued in August with a value recorded at \$1,600—the first demolition permit

issued by the village building inspector this year.

Carrizozo, and in Homes in Lincoln (Called the House Church).

All those present expressed their love and appreciation of Father Stampley, and he in return spoke of the blessing they all are in his life.

The Reverend Ken Cole, Pastor of Ruidoso First Christian Church, came over, dressed in the uniform of a house painter, to show his appreciation of Father Stampley's Christian service all throughout.

In this theme Father Stampley said: "It has been a real privilege to be a part of the beginning of two things our community has long needed: The Family Crisis Center and the Lincoln County Food Bank."

Among the well wishers was a lovely little lady, Beverly Day, who sat next to Father Stampley at dinner.

Father Stampley smiled at her and said: "This is great. Birthday, balloons and Beverly."

Father Stampley has often spoken of his deep fondness for the natural beauty of Lincoln County, and the inspiration the mountain country has always been to him. His love for and devotion to the people of Lincoln County and the surrounding area have grown through the years. And he has endeared himself forever to all of us. We look forward to many more years of his Christian Service among us; and we wish him many happy returns of the day, and all God's Blessings.

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

## School board inspects athletic field

The Capitan School Board took a walk around the new athletic field before its September meeting, and except for a few changes, things looked good to them.

Architect Jim French apparently changed the accepted plans when he supervised construction of the track/runway around the football field, and board members insisted that he take it out and have it rebuilt according to the specs they approved.

"We ran into a problem," explained French, "and I had to make a judgment about it, so I changed the plans a little."

"I am personally dissatisfied with your judgment, Mr. French," declared board member Kenneth Cox.

When the board discussed what to do about the runways, Preston

Stone said, "Take it up and do it right." This decision passed unanimously.

The board decided to hold its \$82,000 check for Ballard and Son, Carlsbad, the asphalt subcontractor, until work is completed to the satisfaction of the board. However, Superintendent Dr. Scott Childress agreed to write a check for \$28,000 to Conley Landscaping of Ruidoso Downs, who were to be paid by Ballard, because their work was finished satisfactorily.

When asked how the athletic field construction budget is coming, Childress said, "Looks like we have enough to pay for the project."

"All and all, it's looking good, and we'll have a handsome field when it's done," commented architect French.

In addition to replacing the runway, more work will be done on the asphalt driveway, which is not level, and soil sterilization must be

done. "This seems like nitpicking, but every little thing means something to us," explained board member Tom Trost to the architect.

"We're not asking for a whole lot, just good work," reiterated Ken Cox.

The board was pleased to learn that enrollment in the schools has exceeded predictions. Kindergarten is up six students over prediction; grades 1-3, up seven; 4-6, up six; C level, up six; D level, up four; and high school, minus three.

Enrollment figures stand at 504 students, up from a projection of 481. The high school was projected to have 223 students, and the actual count as per the meeting date is 220.


In personnel action, the board accepted the resignation of Barbara Willard and accepted the employment of Michael Katko, a business ed teacher who has recently

graduated from New Mexico State University. Katko will also serve as junior high girls volleyball coach and junior high girls basketball coach.

Other coaching assignments were made. Mark Daugherty was named junior varsity boys basketball coach, and Clayton Allen was selected to be assistant junior varsity girls basketball coach.

The board accepted Childress' request that the phones in the office not be answered after 4:30 p.m. to enable teachers and staff to get some work done without having to answer them. "By 4:30, emergencies are mostly dealt with and most of the calls we get are routine, calls that could have been made earlier in the day," Childress explained.

"I believe that's a reasonable request to make, that phones be answered only during business hours," said Board President James McDaniels. The board's opinion backed him up.

## Trustees take care of bills, well, animal fees

The agenda was short, but the meeting was long for the Capitan Board of Trustees on Monday night.

Trustee David Rouleau was absent.

The board voted to pay their bills, including one for \$4,053.33 to village attorney John Underwood. \$3,000 of that was in regard to the museum lawsuit, \$1,053.33 was the standard monthly services payment.

"Isn't that a little high?" asked Trustee V. Kelly Beavers.

"Well, you know, attorneys are like taxicabs," mused Mayor Benny Coker. "They always got their meters running."

Adoption of an amendment to the dog ordinance was approved, concerning dog impoundment fees and redemption fees. It will now cost five dollars to license male dogs and neutered female dogs, and \$10 to license unneutered female dogs, with the exception of guide dogs for the blind and deaf.

Loose dogs in Capitan will cost owners \$25 the first time it is picked up, \$50 the second time and \$75 on all subsequent offenses. The high fees are specifically designed to make people pay attention to them.

Jack Pogue, Capitan resident, stated his opinion that some of the wording in the animal control ordinance should be reworded to save the village the possibility of a future lawsuit. Mayor Coker tabled the suggestion until the next meeting, on October 13, when an attorney will be present.

Mayor Coker issued a proclamation to declare September 17-23 Bicentennial of the Constitution Week in Capitan. The proclamation was issued to Mary Dean and Alice Traylor of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Cyndi Livingston and Betty

Joiner asked the trustees for a donation toward trophies for next year's Capitan Junior Riding Club rodeo. The women were told that it is illegal for the village to contribute to groups with select membership, such as the Junior Riding Club, the Boy Scouts or the Senior Citizens.

"Believe me, we would like to make this contribution but we were informed by our attorney recently that it is illegal for us to give money to membership groups," explained Mayor Coker. "I wish the law were changed." The women were informed that they might contact County Commissioner Ralph Dunlap, who serves on the Fair Board and Representative Ben Hall in order to voice their complaints about the law to their elected

representatives.

Mayor Coker noted the gathering that the new water well is now functioning but that it still needs some fine-tuning. The electric bill for last month came to \$1,200, about \$120 more than the previous month. "We're trying to make a deal with the Otero Co-Op people concerning the demand meter," explained Coker. "Our bill can be lowered if we restrict our pumping between the hours of nine at night and five in the morning."

When someone commented about milky water coming from the tap, Coker laughed. "It'll clear up, and the color won't hurt you," he said. "We really don't have the worst water in the world in Capitan, you know. We just think we do."


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Homeowners, age 55 or over, may exclude for their taxable income all capital gain up to \$125,000 from the sale of their principal residence. They must have lived in the home at least three of the five years before they sell it and the exemption may be claimed only once in a lifetime. This tax break has not been changed.  
Deductions for moving expenses remain at \$3,000 (real estate commissions, mortgage costs, etc.) If you are forced to purchase a home due to a job change over 35 miles away. Up to one half this total (\$1,500) may be deducted for pre-move househunting expenses and temporary living expenses (up to 30 days) at your new location. In order to take the deduction, you have to itemize your return.  
There has also been a change in the area of capital gains. With the new tax law, any capital gains made when you sell real estate (starting in 1987) will be taxed at your regular income tax rate up to a maximum of 28%.



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
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

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First governor

County sets Sat. as McDonald Day

Saturday, September 19, has been officially declared, by proclamation of the Lincoln County Commissioners, to be William C. McDonald Day in Carrizozo.

The date honors the first governor of the state of New Mexico, who was from, and who retired back to, Carrizozo.

Festivities include a tour of McDonald sites and a barbecue in his honor. The tour will begin on Saturday morning at 9:30 at the office of Johnson Stearns in Carrizozo, and will include a tour of McDonald's house, the Bar W ranch, and his gravesite in White Oaks.

Admission is \$3, and proceeds will support the barbecue costs.

McDonald was the son of John and Lydia Marshall (Biggs) McDonald and was born at

Jacksonville, New York, on July 25, 1858. He was educated in the public schools of Herkimer County, New York and attended Cazenovia Seminary, also in New York. He worked as a teacher while attending school and was admitted to the bar at Fort Scott, Kansas, in 1880.

McDonald came to Lincoln County in 1880, living at first in White Oaks. He became deputy U.S. Mineral Surveyor for the territory and held that position until 1890. During that time, McDonald was engaged in civil and mining engineering.

In 1890, McDonald became manager of the Carrizozo Cattle Ranch Company, one of the largest cattle companies in the territory. He served as assessor of the county from 1885-97, and was elected a member of the Territorial House of Representatives in 1891.

McDonald became chairman of the Board of County Commis-

sioners from 1895-97; a member of the Cattle Sanitary Board from 1895-1911; Chair of the Democratic Territorial Central Committee in 1910; and was elected on November 7, 1911, as first governor of the State of New Mexico.

McDonald died in April 1918, and is buried in White Oaks.

He married Frances McCourt in 1891 and they had one daughter, Frances, who married Truman Spencer Sr. The Spencers had four children, and Truman Spencer Jr. and his wife, Marion, continued to run the Bar W ranch, along with their son, Stephen.

Marion Spencer and her son, Stephen, will give a historical presentation on Saturday to those participating in the McDonald sites tour.

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## Economic development group seeks larger membership

The possibility of opening an office and recruitment of new members were major topics of conversation at the September 2 meeting of the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County.

Secretary Bob Moore reported that Buddy Bundick, chairman of the interim board of directors, said some 60 inquiries by businesses considering relocation or expansion to New Mexico have been received by the group. Board member Don Shaw reminded the group of the vital need to get all information in one office instead of having information in several locations. Others spoke of the difficulty of functioning when everything is dependent on volunteer services.

It was noted that Pioneer Savings & Trust has offered free office space for the corporation, but furniture and equipment still are needed.

Discussion turned to whether new or used furniture would be used. Members offered a desk, typewriter, phones, chairs and other equipment, apparently answering the question of new or used.

As of the meeting date, the group had 50 memberships paid in full, five partially paid and six pledged but not yet paid. The importance of

reaching a base membership level was stressed—the group hopes to maintain at least 150 memberships. Chairman Bundick noted that it is important to reach that membership level soon so the membership can elect a permanent board of directors. That is necessary so that board can make decisions requiring expenditure of funds.

A list of prospective members was divvied up among the 33 members present, with hopes of doubling the membership by the next meeting, set for 7 p.m. today (Thursday), September 17, at Texas-New Mexico Power.

In other business, the group: —Heard a report from Promotions Committee member Cindy Lynch, who noted that a program of media coverage and/or public meetings for the areas of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs is scheduled for the next 30 days. Needed now are plans to reach the entire Lincoln County area.

—Heard reference made to an "excellent" article that appeared recently in the Lincoln County News by Al Jurege.

—Heard treasurer Roy Crocker report that \$8,860 has been received to date, with \$1,562 paid to Cree Meadows for the kickoff meeting and \$205 paid for postage and post office box rental.







## Racehorses test positive

Arizona lab tests indicated the presence of a medication drug in the urine of racehorses in the All American Futurity and the first consolation to the All American Futurity, according to published reports.

A statement released earlier this week by the State Racing Commission said the drug prednisolone was found in the urine of All American eighth-place finisher Kisses To Yawl and First Consolation second-place finisher Bennys Dancer.

Prednisolone is a legitimate medication used to treat racehorses, but its use might be in violation of State Racing Commission regulations, since commission rules prohibit the appearance of any foreign substance in the urine of a horse after a race, according to Commission Chairman Harris Hartz.

Hartz said no action will be taken until a later commission meeting. He said although a violation is apparent, it does not seem to be a situation that affects the integrity of racing. "It is therefore appropriate to defer action until the full commission can act on complete information," according to an Albuquerque Journal story.

Purse money that otherwise would be awarded to the two horses will be withheld until the commission takes action on the matter, the Journal reported.





# States Agree To Constitution!

## Some Delegates Disenchanted

### Mason, Gerry, Randolph Distressed!

At the end of last week the Grand Convention appointed a Committee to organize the Resolutions it has agreed to into an orderly document. Also, the Committee will set down the new Constitution in happy, resounding, and clear words. Mr. Gouverneur Morris of Pennsylvania is the member who is most interested in this final work of the Convention and it is thought that he will have the honour of actually writing the Constitution.

As the Committee worked, however, the other gentlemen continued to debate the Constitution. Mr. Gerry of Massachusetts was distressed by the ease with which the Constitution can be amended: If two-thirds of the states request a change, then Congress may call a Convention for that purpose. Mr. Gerry fears that this provision will permit Congress to subvert the state Constitutions with the aid of a majority of the states. His objection was taken seriously and the Convention agreed that changes shall be ratified by three-fourths of the states.

### CONGRESS CAN ACCEPT CONSTITUTION; CANNOT NEGATE IT!

Mr. Gerry, this time supported by Mr. Randolph of Virginia, made a further objection. The Confederation, Mr. Gerry said, cannot be lightly dissolved by the consent of a mere nine states; nor should Congress be bypassed as is planned. Mr. Randolph would submit the Constitution to the states and, when their views are known, to a Second Convention. It was agreed that Congress should receive the new Constitution but should not have the power to negative it; that power will be given to the States Themselves.

By the middle of the week the CONSTITUTION was presented to the Convention along with a letter describing it which is to be sent to Congress. Both were ordered printed, so the Delegates can consider them.

### WE, THE PEOPLE, NOT WE, THE STATES!

One curious feature struck your reporter when he saw a copy of the document. It starts with the words, "We, the People of the United States ..." When the work of the Convention began, it was the work of the States, not the People! Your reporter enquired of a distinguished member of the Committee of Style as to what was meant

by the wording of the preamble of the Constitution. He said that the Committee considered that to say, "We, the people of the states of etc. etc." was clumsy. Also, of course, no one can tell which, or how many states will join the new government, so to list them may become embarrassing.

### MASON WANTS BILL OF RIGHTS

Mr. Gerry and Mr. Randolph are two men known to disagree with some parts of the Constitution -- now Colonel Mason of Virginia joins them. On Wednesday, he moved for the addition of a Bill of Rights to the Constitution. Such a document, he said, could be drawn up in a matter of hours. Doubtless, he was referring to the Virginia Bill of Rights, of which he himself is the famous author. His suggestion was disregarded because, as Mr. Sherman said, the States have Bills of Right now and nothing in the new Constitution overrides these rights. The gentlemen agreed with Mr. Sherman on this question and, without debate, decided *not* to add a statement of the rights of Americans to the Constitution. Colonel Mason was deeply mortified.

### GERRY, RANDOLPH AND MASON WILL NOT SIGN!

By Saturday, the Convention had reviewed the Constitution in detail and found it satisfactory, with only minor changes. However, Mr. Gerry, Mr. Randolph and Colonel Mason are unlikely to sign it. Mr. Randolph is adamant that a Second Convention must be held when the views of the people are known; Colonel Mason agrees. Mr. Randolph and Mr. Gerry fear that the document will produce either a Monarchy or a Tyrannical Aristocracy. Mr. Gerry was very particular in his objections: that trial by jury is not guaranteed in civil cases, that the Legislature may make any laws it considers to be necessary and proper; and that it may raise armies and money without limit. Colonel Mason said that this new government has been "formed without the knowledge or idea of the people." None of them will sign the Constitution.

But, nevertheless, when the question was put as to whether to agree to the Constitution, all the states answered "Aye!"

### Paine Presents Bridge Design To French Academy of Sciences

Thomas Paine, recently arrived in this city with a model of a bridge of a new design, to be constructed of cast iron, has been received with much interest. Due to the good offices of Mr. Thomas Jefferson, American ambassador to France, a committee of the Academy of Sciences has been appointed to study Mr. Paine's model and to report on whether it would be feasible to construct such a span across the Seine. The members of the committee, Messrs. LeRoy, Bossou and Bord, are expected to issue a favorable report on the principles of construction, but many here doubt that an actual bridge will be commissioned -- a single span 400' iron bridge may prove too radical and too costly for the government here, especially considering that Louis XVI's treasury is empty and the state is on the verge of bankruptcy.

Nevertheless, Mr. Paine has taken advantage of his presence in Paris to make acquaintance with many leaders of government and letters. In a recent meeting with Cardinal Lomine de Brienne, Mr. Paine made a proposal even more startling than that of bridging the Seine with iron. Noting that England and France have recently concluded a commercial treaty easing duties on many items, Mr. Paine proposed to Cardinal Brienne that England and France could further this amity by building a "bridge of Friendship" across the English Channel. Mr. Paine has given the Cardinal a sketch of his design for such a bridge, and although the Cardinal has expressed his admiration for the plan, the idea of such a bridge is certainly one many years ahead of its time.

### Delaware's Dickinson Leaves -- Expresses Approval

The Honourable John Dickinson of Wilmington, Delaware left Philadelphia today, authorizing fellow Delaware Delegate George Read to sign the proposed Constitution on Monday, September 17, in his absence. The fifty-five year old lawyer has been in poor health all summer, but remained at his chair in the Pennsylvania State House nevertheless, until the final form of the Document was agreed upon.

Mr. John Dickinson has proved himself an able defender of the rights of Small States while insisting on the necessity of a strong national government. Originally concerned about the Delegates desire to scrap the Articles of Confederation, he has become one of the strongest supporters of the work of this Convention. Mr. Dickinson was largely responsible for the proposed method of selecting two Senators from each State through their Legislatures. Like many of his fellow Delegates he fears a government controlled by the propertied masses. Said Mr. Dickinson, "The most dangerous influence are those multitudes without property and without principle with which our country, like all others, will soon abound." Fortunately, the Grand Convention has limited the power of this element through an intricate system of Checks and Balances.

The Honourable John Dickinson has distinguished himself often in his long career. He wrote the influential *Letters from a Farmer in Pennsylvania to the Inhabitants of the British Colonies* in 1768 after serving in the Stamp Act Congress. His service in the Continental Congress included a term from 1774 to 1776, and another in 1779. Although he urged caution on the movement toward Independence in 1776, and refused to sign the Declaration of July 4, he served ably in the militia during the war. He also served in both the Delaware and Pennsylvania Legislatures, becoming Speaker of Pennsylvania.

Although this reporter has often had questions about Mr. John Dickinson's tireless support for his home state of Delaware and his opposition to proportionate representation in the National Congress, the moderate and knowledgeable Delegate from Delaware deserves the thanks from people throughout all Thirteen States. We wish Mr. Dickinson a complete recovery from the malady that has plagued him this summer.

### Indians Declare War Against Western Settlements

Reliable information from the frontier indicates that the westward push of white settlers into Indian country has led to more hostilities. Representatives of the Creek, Chickamaga, and other Indian nations held a council in the past month or two. It was decided that if they were to preserve their way of life and land, they would have to declare war against the intruding white settlements on the Cumberland river. In accordance with this decision, Alexander McGillivray of the Creeks sent out a force of men to drive all white men from Indian land. It is reported that Captain Davenport and his men, except three who managed to escape, were cut off and killed.

Colonel Robinson has written a letter describing the severity of the situation. He says that signs of a large party of Indians have been discovered near Nashville. Settlers in that region are living in constant fear of an attack. Other reports tell that the Indians destroyed 40 families in one day and cut corn on several plantations. They also inflicted heavy casualties on another force of men sent to give them battle. Robinson states that unless immediately reinforced, the whole country is in imminent danger of being overwhelmed by a superior force of enemy.

New Bern, North-Carolina ... August 21, 1787

Sir: Every citizen seems suspended till it is known what kind of government we are to receive from the national Convention. The states neglect their roads and canals till they see whether those necessary improvements will become the object of a national government. Trading and manufacturing have suspended their voyages and production till they see how commerce will be protected and promoted by a national system of commercial regulations. The lawful user locks up or buries his species till he sees whether the new frame of government will end the curse of paper-money and tender laws. The wealthy farmer who desires a plantation for one of his sons waits to empty his chest of his hard dollars till he is sure that the weight of state government and taxes will not take it away in a few years. The public creditor who fears that the deranged state of finances in every state will cause his certificates to perish in his hands now places all his hopes of justice in an enlightened and stable government. The embarrassed farmer and the oppressed tenant who wish to become free by migrating to a frontier country are waiting to see whether they shall be protected by a national force from the Indians and by a national system of taxation far removed from the clutches of the state and county tax collectors. In short, the pulse of industry and enterprise in every art and occupation of men now stands still in the United States. Every look and wish and hope and prayer is only for the safety of our country and the present august Convention.

### Onondaga Chief Assassinated!

Cornelius Sturgeon, the great Onondaga Chief, was assassinated in June at Tyoga Point by one of his own tribesmen.

The killing stemmed from two reasons. First, the Chief was an absolute despot who imposed implicit compliance to his orders. His people punctually obeyed him through fear, not love. Secondly, the Chief and his family had begun to adopt the dress and customs of the United States, which gave great umbrage to the other Indians. As he was a man of some literature, he had some ideas of the values of letters. On the eve of his death, he told Captain Spalding that he had intended to send his son to an American college for education. In the Indian fashion of justice, the friends of the murderer purchase his life by giving the Chief's family 375 dollars. A poor recompense for the life of a great man but too much for a tyrant.

### "Pretended" Bishop Seabury Defended

Dear Sir:

I must not allow the mean-spirited and Godless sentiments printed in your journal the week of 24 June to 30 June to pass without comment from one who is himself a member of the Episcopal communion and a friend of the Right Rev. Mr. Seabury, Bishop of Connecticut, as well as of his brother prelates, Bishops Provost and Apostle.

Since Christ Himself empowered the Apostles to preach and to baptize and to lead His Church, there has been an unbroken succession of episcopal ordination down to the present day. To suggest that the ordination of American bishops is a British ruse to erect a religious tyranny over these states, is to display the most profound ignorance, both of the circumstances of the ordination of these men, and of the Import of the presence of an Independent Episcopacy in America. The Episcopal Church in these United States this is alive and abiding, despite the ill-spirited attacks of those who, abjuring all religion, attempt to defame the character of both the Church and its leaders.



## Reporter's Round

If you couldn't read, you probably wouldn't have purchased this newspaper. And you certainly wouldn't be reading this column.

As many as 26 million American adults can't read. That's about one in five people over the age of 18.

It's a serious problem, one that is documented in cases like the one where a young mother, unable to read simple instructions, fed her baby a substance that made the child very sick. The well-meaning, but functionally illiterate, woman thought it was baby food.

And that illustrates what functional illiteracy really is—an inability to use reading, writing and computational skills in everyday life situations.

A study commissioned by the U.S. Office of Education in 1975 tested adult literacy skills in five functional areas, including occupation, health and consumer skills. That study identified the number of functionally illiterate adults at 23 million, but the agency since upped the estimate to 26 million to coincide with later population statistics.

According to information provided by the Coalition for Literacy, the U.S. Bureau of the Census in 1980 counted 24.4 million Americans over the age of 25 with an eighth grade education or less. While eighth grade skills are enough to guarantee a high school diploma in some states, those skills aren't always enough to read common reading materials.

A commonly accepted index on "readability" of materials shows that 11th grade skills are required to understand the owner's manual for a popular American car. That index places direction for most cleaning products at an eighth grade, sixth month level (8.6); and a guide to Social Security benefits is at 9.9.

Most journalists I know, including The News editor, say that newswriting should be geared to readers with a sixth grade reading level. But the Literacy Coalition published results of a test where nine news articles picked at random from a daily newspaper required reading skills on the 12.5 level.

Who are these people struggling through daily life with limited or no reading skills? A University of Texas study indicates the percentage of blacks and Hispanics who are functionally illiterate is higher than the percentage of whites in the over 18 age category, but the actual number of illiterate whites is more than double that of blacks or Hispanics.

The study found, for those over age 18, 16 percent of the white population (23,154,880); 44 percent of blacks (7,793,280); and 56 percent of Hispanics (5,057,024) are illiterate.

By age, the study identified:  
16% 18-19 year olds (7,387,200)

11% 30-39 year olds (3,467,310)  
19% 40-49 year olds (4,323,640)  
28% 50-59 year olds (6,530,440)  
35% 60 and older (12,470,850)

How could this happen in a nation with public education, not only available, but required of youngsters under 16? The answer to that question varies from learning, physical and emotional disabilities to lack of interest and/or leaving school early. Functionally illiterate parents often have children with the same problem.

Besides the tremendous toll it takes on individuals through erosion of personal dignity and feelings of worthlessness, functional illiteracy is costing this nation billions of dollars.

One estimate, published in U.S. News & World Report in 1982, puts the cost of welfare and unemployment compensation due to illiteracy at \$5 billion each year. Many experts equate crime, with its multi-billion-dollar pricetag, with functional illiteracy, since offenses are often committed by people incapable of functioning in society because of limited literacy skills.

Since illiteracy has been clearly identified and recognized as a drain on the American people and economy, literacy groups have formed to combat the growing problem. The Coalition for Literacy, headquartered in Chicago, Illinois, maintains an information center at P.O. Box 81826; Lincoln, Nebraska 68501. The toll-free number for literacy information is 1-800-228-8313.

But Lincoln County residents can get information and help right here:

Adult Basic Education classes are offered in Ruidoso through New Mexico State University-Alamogordo. The free classes are conducted Tuesday and Thursday evenings at Ruidoso High School. For information on those classes, contact NMSU-A Adult Basic Education office in Alamogordo, 437-5015.

The Altrusa Club of Ruidoso already is providing literacy tutoring, and is forming a Lincoln County Literacy Council.

Volunteers were trained in a workshop and already are providing tutoring services. Classes are free and completely confidential, with materials provided.

Of course, volunteers and funding will be needed to keep the new Literacy Council going, and the Coalition for Literacy encourages community involvement in such programs.

"Volunteer against illiteracy," reads literature provided through the coalition. "The only degree you need is a degree in caring."

## Editorial

Be a friend for life ... designate a driver.

It's a simple message, but it can mean a lot to someone whose life it saves.

It might have saved the life of 20-year-old Christi Lanahan, an honor student at the University of Texas, who was killed as she walked with friends in downtown Austin. The driver of the vehicle that killed her had a history of six speeding tickets and five accidents. He admitted to driving drunk, pleaded guilty to involuntary manslaughter and was sentenced by a jury to 10 years in prison.

Right here in Lincoln County, we have a problem, too. Last month, a woman was killed on a county road in a two-car accident in which police have charged the driver of one vehicle with DWI. Just this week, another accident, this time two dead, and another charge of DWI.


People in this county are being killed by drunk drivers.

In Texas, Christi's parents, Susan and Don Cox, and brother, Sean, have started a program to do something to stop the killing ... a program that requires no new laws, no new fines, nothing but making a responsible decision. After Christi's death, they began a public education program that keys on the importance of getting the drunk out of the driver's seat. The program includes a poster that states "Be a friend for life ... designate a driver." It urges groups of drinkers to name a member as a "designated driver"—one who'll not drink, whose responsibility it will be to drive home group members who do drink.

The program has had outstanding support and success in Texas. Restaurants, in particular, have cooperated with the project of designating a driver, offering free non-alcoholic soft drinks to those so named. The Texas Automobile Dealers Association and Alcoholic Beverage Commission have offered full support. President and Mrs. Ronald Reagan have sent letters of support, and the National Safety Council has added its support.

## Birgit LaMothe: a counselor for all reasons

"I'm sort of a circuit rider," says Birgit LaMothe with a smile.

A counselor and mental health therapist with Professional Counseling Associates (PCA), LaMothe recently joined PCA's full-time staff, and takes her services throughout the county—working Mondays and Fridays in Ruidoso, Tuesdays and Thursdays in Capitan and Wednesdays in Carrizozo.

Those services include individual counseling, groups, parenting classes and marriage and family counseling, explained LaMothe, who said she likes working with children and teen-agers, as well as with adults.

LaMothe, born and educated through high school in Denmark, served for nine years as a school counselor in New Jersey. She has been in Lincoln County for five years. Besides her work through PCA, LaMothe continues her private practice through Capitan Counseling and Consulting Services.

The newest item on LaMothe's packed calendar is a spouse abuse group offered jointly by PCA and Family Crisis Center. The guided self-help and therapeutic sessions for those in abusive relationships is offered at noon Mondays at the counseling center in the Sierra Professional Center.

Sessions are free and completely confidential, explained LaMothe, a member of the crisis center advisory board.

Parenting classes are set to begin in Capitan, Carrizozo and Ruidoso this fall. LaMothe said she'll repeat her course for parents of elementary and pre-school children in a five-week series and offer a class for parents of teen-agers next spring.

LaMothe recently completed a group for step families. "I learned so much," said LaMothe seriously, noting that today's mixed families have a unique set of problems.

A graduate of Walden University in Florida, with a master's degree from Lehigh University in Pennsylvania, LaMothe said the philosophy in all her parenting classes is based on raising responsi-

ble children—not on reward and punishment. She said her courses stress logical consequences and encouragement.

"The more you're with children, the more you get angry at the situations that exist—not angry at the people," noted LaMothe.

"Ideally I'm so opposed to all forms of force ... children, spouses, corporal punishment," said LaMothe. "If I had the time I would crusade for that ... an end to corporal punishment," she added with a slight shake of her head.

LaMothe, averring that force is an ineffective and cruel way to discipline, said people often confuse discipline with corporal punishment. "To be a disciple is to be a follower ... by choice," said LaMothe, who encourages parents and others involved with children to serve as models for the youngsters.

With recent court decisions against several school boards who have allowed corporal punishment, LaMothe is in hopes parents and teachers will turn to alternative methods of discipline.

As proof that physical force is ineffective, LaMothe said she has gathered a box of evidence weighing more than seven pounds. "All it (force) proves is that might is right," said LaMothe, adding that "violence begets violence." She laughingly relates how some

people say they use physical punishment "only as a last resort."

"If it is so effective, why not use it first?" asks LaMothe.

"It will never develop self-discipline, and that's what you want in a responsible child," said LaMothe, who sees the effects of violence and force in all areas of her practice.

"Children often see a pattern in their own home where one parent submits to the domination by another," said LaMothe. "Very often little boys see physical power exerted by their fathers and they believe that's the way to grow up to be a man," she added sadly.

But LaMothe said she hopes to clarify some of those issues in her groups and classes. The spouse abuse group in particular, is designed to help people in conflict situations make their lives more manageable, explained LaMothe.

stay in a particular relationship," she added. A goal of the group is to help participants develop self-concepts so they don't feel they need to lash out, she said.

Healthy self concepts and self-discipline are threads that run through LaMothe's reflections on her work with all ages.

"Working with people is very similar to acting," noted LaMothe, who calls on past experience in show business and as a precision swimmer. She spent her early years in show business, and said that experience helps her put herself in the place of people she is counseling.

"You have to learn where they're coming from," said LaMothe. She said her emphasis on self-discipline may have strong ties to her swimming. LaMothe has performed in water shows in Canada and South America.

## DAR celebrates U.S. Constitution


The Daughters of the American Revolution began their year-long celebration of the Bicentennial of the United States Constitution with a luncheon at Cree Meadows Country Club on September 10.
