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Village begins to fill Grindstone Dam

The Ruidoso Village Council discussed water, weeds, paving, partnerships, conventions and compacting during a regular meeting Tuesday.

"Water started flowing into the Grindstone Canyon Dam at 5:30 p.m.," announced village attorney John Underwood during the regular council meeting.

But after hearing that news, councilors heard of an additional problem on the special valves that have delayed the entire project for nearly a year.

Underwood explained that, technically, the valves installed on the tower assembly of the multi-million-dollar dam are not those called for in the bidding specifications. He said the valves that are in place meet the State Highway Department standards.

Village engineer Mike Davalos explained that he and Water Department head Richard Sanchez asked for the valve that would give the maximum use with the minimum maintenance, noting that any maintenance and repair will require the services of a diver, since the assembly will be as much as 130 feet underwater.

Councilors unanimously OK'd the valves, but not before Councillor Victor Alonso wondered about Boyle Engineering dam engineers' part in the problem.

"Where were they when we were doing that... getting ourselves in trouble?" asked Alonso. Audience member Al Junge asked about the worst that could happen with the valves that have been installed, and Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. answered, "The dam's going to crack open, fall over and we don't need the valves anyway."

Underwood stressed that the valves installed meet all state and federal standards.

Also Tuesday, Councillor Jerry Shaw questioned village manager Frank Potter over village street crews working on a U.S. Forest Service road at Bonito Lake. Both Shaw and Alonso told of receiving complaints of the village doing road work in competition with private enterprise.

Potter, admitting he forgot to tell the council of the \$5,400 project before leaving on his vacation, said his intent was to improve relationships among governmental agencies and save the public money by going into partnership on some projects.

Audience member Don Shaw questioned how the Street Department has time for such projects, naming various streets in the

village that need repair, including the first bridge in the Upper Canyon that has been without a guardrail for some time.

Alonso questioned District Ranger Steve Sams over his thinking in receiving a "windfall," going out for prices and then contracting with the village for the work, and Sams replied he was looking for the most work for the money. "We were under the time gun," added Sams.

"We feel like we're partners in this community in providing an environment that people will want to come to," said Sams. He said the Forest Service was able to accomplish more by utilizing village resources, and still used contractors for some jobs.

Discussion followed on the differences in private and public jobs, as well as the condition of village streets.

"It seems to me the private sector is always very quick to scream," noted the mayor, telling a story of one of his friends, "a Republican of the first order," who totally opposed the Job Corps program when it began and some years later was screaming when the program was discontinued.

Councilors also got a six-month report on Tuesday from Convention and Visitors Bureau director Liz Groenendyk and Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce executive director John Jeffers.

Groenendyk said the CVB was established to promote conventions and special events and to work as liaison between the chamber and the advertising agency.

Noting that conventions are the perfect way to stimulate the economy, Groenendyk said 1,244 people have been counted as coming to Ruidoso over the past six

months for conventions, meetings and family reunions. Those people stayed an average of 2.5 nights, amounting to 3,214 room nights. The average visitor spends \$90 per day, said Groenendyk. Using the accepted turn-over factor of 2.5, that amounts to \$725,000 to the village economy, she said.

Groenendyk reported on promoting the Art Festival and Aspenfest. She said 7,500 Aspenfest posters have been distributed throughout New Mexico, Arizona, Texas, Oklahoma and Louisiana.

Results of a direct mail campaign were explained as Groenendyk presented a slide show over the advertising campaign used to promote Ruidoso. Jeffers then showed samples of slides in the chamber's photo library showing the beauty of the area during different seasons.

In other regular business Tuesday, the council:

—Authorized clerk/finance officer Leon Eggleston to publish a notice of public hearing on a proposed weed control ordinance.

—Set a workshop to discuss paving and paving assessment districts for 6:30 p.m. Wednesday, October 7, in council chambers of the Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center. Residents of Pinecliff Subdivision who approached the council requesting an assessment district some time ago were on hand for some answers. Potter said the issue is so complicated that he can't promise any answers even after the workshop.

—Unanimously accepted the low bid of \$21,542 on 100 three-cubic-yard side loading refuse containers. Purchasing agent Fonda McLain said two bids were received. She recommended accepting the low bid from Waste Control of New Mexico. Kollander Truck and Con-

tainer bid \$25,154.
—Heard some "highlights of the transfer system" from Junge, who called the trash compactor and transfer system the most profitable operation in the village. He said purchasing the new containers is a giant step, and estimated the village has wasted \$50,000 on the rear loader. Junge said the new containers will free two men to repair dumpsters.

—Heard from Eggleston that the state has approved the village budget.


—Approved the mayor's appointment of Mike Warren to the Lodgers Tax Advisory Board. Davis said Warren is a resident of Ruidoso and manager of a radio station in Ruidoso Downs.

—Accepted the low bid of \$3,209.59 for a sprinkler system at the Eagle Creek Sports Complex. Successful bidder was B&C Turf Equipment. The other two bids received were \$3,401.70 from S.W.T. Distributors and \$3,743.55 from Sprinkler Irrigation Equipment.

—Heard from Councillor Shaw of a meeting with the Ruidoso Federated Woman's Club to discuss the lease on a van purchased for use by the Senior Citizen's Center. The village attorney and village officials will attend the next regular Woman's Club meeting.

—Learned of an inquiry received by the mayor from American Cable Services, Inc. on providing cable services in the village. Davis said the group wants to make a presentation at a council meeting.

—Heard Ron Andrews of the Golden Aspen Rally thank the village for supporting the recent motorcycle festival. Andrews said riders from Switzerland, Canada and Mexico were among the 2,000 or so registrants at the festival.

DA's office files against Forest Service in ranch dispute

The State of New Mexico will prosecute a case that began with a Lincoln County woman making a citizen's arrest and taking two men into custody she found on her ranch.

In a telephone interview Wednesday, Harry Wilcox Jr., senior trial prosecutor for the 12th Judicial District Attorney's Office, said he filed an entry of appearance on behalf of the state to prosecute the complaint previously filed by Carolyn Lietzman. Wilcox said the amended complaint alleges criminal trespass naming U.S. Forest Service employees Mario Ramirez and Lindburg Abney, and further names the U.S. Forest Service.

Wilcox said the complaint alleges that Ramirez and Abney "while in the scope of their employment did unlawfully enter or remain upon the lands of another knowing consent had been denied or withdrawn by the owner."

The defendants also are accused of causing injury or damage on the property, that was lawfully posted, explained Wilcox.

Lietzman and an employee on her ranch, Fernando Pena, filed affidavits of record the day she arrested Ramirez and Abney, said Wilcox.

After the August incident, Lietzman said she was "fed up" with the Forest Service ignoring the posted

signs on her ranch. She said the two were five miles into her property when she arrested them and confiscated their government vehicles.

"After visiting with Mrs. Lietzman and reviewing the facts and evidence, I felt constrained to enter an appearance on behalf of the people of New Mexico to prosecute the case," said Wilcox. He said the criminal rules for Magistrate Court provide for the district attorney to take action on behalf of the people in the case of a citizen's arrest.

He said his oath of office requires him to seek justice in all matters brought before the district attorney.

Wilcox said the defendants are being prosecuted under the criminal statutes of criminal trespass, a misdemeanor. The maximum penalty for the charge is up to 364 days in jail and/or a fine of up to \$1,000. The law also provides if a person convicted of criminal trespass has been found to have damaged the "realty" that person may be liable for double the amount of those damages, said Wilcox.

A first appearance hearing will be conducted in Carrizozo after Magistrate Judge Gerald Dean has copies of the amended complaint and affidavit of record served on the defendants, said Wilcox.

Zoning ordinance nears end of long journey

Members of the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission currently reviewing a proposed zoning ordinance are not the same ones who began the draft ordinance nearly three years ago.

During Monday's meeting, commissioners Jess Stinson, John White, Ken Carr, Eddie Nichols and Ellen Long set a special meeting to peruse the thick document. But when the original draft was presented to P&Z, none of the present members were on that appointed commission.

The long-drawn-out process began when the village entered into a contract in 1984 with the planning firm of BRW, Inc. Research by

planners led to numerous meetings with P&Z, the Ruidoso Village Council and members of the public. A flurry of revisions and rewrites prefaced the final public hearing last February, when the proposal was actually accepted by P&Z.

During that same period of time the village has gone through several P&Z Department staff changes, with the current administrator not taking over until the document was accepted. Lahey was named planning officer on July 1, and has since made a thorough review of the proposed zoning ordinance she handed commissioners this week.

Commissioners Monday gave the document a quick once-over and set a workshop for 1 p.m. Thursday, October 15, to take a detailed look

at the ordinance.

The commission rescheduled the October meeting, allowed a variance, approved a commercial development and considered a request to name a private drive after long-time summer resident, Dr. Jeness, now deceased.

In regular business Monday, the commission:

—Approved site development plans displayed by Tim Hoyt for commercial storage and office space at the corner of Tomahawk Trail and Carrizo Creek Road. Hoyt, a building contractor, revealed plans to construct a "duplex-type" commercial building with enclosed outdoor storage space.

—OK'd property line setback variances for an existing trailer at 113 Fir Drive. Commissioners also

authorized a 12-foot rear lot line variance for new construction.

—Tabled a request to name a private drive after a former citizen until adjacent property owners can be notified. Commissioners reviewed maps to determine whether the area in question is a dedicated road or a private drive.

—Scheduled October's meeting for Monday, October 19.

Commission Chairman David Smith, Vice-chairman Pete Thompson and Commissioner Marie Rooney were absent from Monday's meeting. The commission has been one member short since J.D. James resigned his post to join the Ruidoso Village Council in May.

Tractor, travel trouble trustees

A tractor, a loan and the use of a village vehicle by the mayor kept Ruidoso Downs Trustees busy Monday night.

After an executive session, the trustees voted that Mayor J.C. "Jake" Harris not be allowed to use a village vehicle for personal business.

"I don't do that anyway, so what's the deal?" said Harris when contacted early this morning. Harris said an out-of-town city manager had a car exactly like the one Harris uses for village business, and that may be the vehicle apparently spotted at Casa Mendoza. He said the Downs' vehicle has never been taken to the restaurant.

"I've got no problem with it," said Harris, who repeated that he hasn't used a village vehicle for personal use.

"I never did, and I won't do it now."

Also during Monday's meeting, the trustees narrowly approved a motion to send to Santa Fe an application, by businessman Conrad Buchanan, to participate in a Community Development Block Grant program that loans money to municipalities to further economic development.

The program grants money to communities which then loan the federal funds to private businesses. Goals of the program are to create new jobs and boost economic health of a region. When the money is repaid the municipality, it can then be reloaned to another business, repaid again, reloaned again, then, when repaid the final time, the funds revert to the municipality, and can be spent at that time for whatever purpose chosen by officials.

Buchanan has requested \$214,000, which he believes will help his business enough to provide some economic growth in Ruidoso Downs.

Trustee Bill Smith made the motion contingent on all rules and guidelines of the program being followed.

"I just don't want the village to be held responsible," he commented. Voting for the motion were trustees Smith, Fred Bernard, Wilma Webb and C.L. "Bones" Wright. Voting against were trustees Leonard Bergeron, LeVerne Cole and Joe Smith.

The application will be screened by the Community Development Council staff before being presented to that council.

The purchase of a mowing tractor was questioned by Wright, who wondered why one mower was pur-

chased when another apparently was available at a lower cost. It was noted that the board of trustees prior to the present group approved the purchase, with the choice of mowers being left at the discretion of Mayor Harris. Harris made his selection, then phoned trustees who affirmed his decision.

"Next time we should take low bids," Wright commented. "Next time you'll have a say on it," replied Harris.

In other business, the trustees:

—Heard village clerk Jean Stillman read a letter of commendation from former Prime Time manager Bill Bertsch, praising the Ruidoso Downs Police Department and Chief G.L. "Skip" Hazel for cooperation over the years.

—Turned down a bid from Melessia Helberg to assist at the March election.

—Tabled a bid from Helberg to rework the village personnel policy until village attorney Richard Hawthorne reviews the document.

—Approved a request that the fire department be allowed to take \$250 from the Fire Fund to use for materials in presentations to schoolchildren during Fire Prevention Week, October 4-10.

Seven wrecks hurt six people

Ruidoso Police dispatchers logged seven accidents last Friday through Sunday—five involving injuries and two without.

A three-year-old, listed as the driver of a vehicle that crashed into a house at 104 Encanto Drive, was taken to Lincoln County Medical Center by private car, according to police reports. The youngster, Sidney Davis, of 107 Encanto Drive was treated and released, according to the report.

Police said the three-year-old girl apparently got into her father's 1986 Isuzu to "play at driving ... disengaged the emergency brake and took the vehicle out of gear. The vehicle then, with Sidney still

inside, rolled backwards out of the driveway and into the street."

The car traveled across the street and came to a stop after hitting a redwood house at 104 Encanto Drive, said police. The Isuzu's ignition was locked and the steering wheel straight ahead, according to the report.

No citations were issued.

Ruidoso Police also are investigating a one-vehicle rollover reported at 7:20 p.m. Friday on Gavilan Canyon Road near the Hull Road intersection. Chief Richard Swenor said three people were injured but the investigation is continuing as the driver of the vehicle hasn't been determined.

Another accident was reported at 8:19 p.m. Friday on Aito Hill. Police said a single motorcycle was involved and an injured person was taken to LCMC in a car. The motorcycle was removed and no report taken, according to police.

New Mexico State Police responded to a one-vehicle accident at 6:43 p.m. Friday, between mile markers 52 and 53 on Highway 380. One motorcycle was involved and one person injured, according to police.

State Police also responded to an accident at 2:21 p.m. on Saturday near mile marker nine on State Highway 37, but details were not available on that incident.

Bids were opened at the Lincoln County Commissioners' meeting Monday for new hospital equipment.

Lincoln County Medical Center administrator Steve Keller opened and evaluated the bids. Commissioners approved the lowest bid in each category. Keller will be purchasing his equipment from the following low-bid sources:

—Cryosurgery unit, Professional Medical Supplies of Albuquerque, \$950.

—Grason-Stadler Auto Tymp, E.A.R. Inc., Colorado, \$3,010.

—Kodak Chemistry Analyzer, West Texas Medical Supply, \$8,560.

—Kavo Fiber Optic Handpiece System, Patterson of Albuquerque, \$3,252.

—Dentsply Cavi-Jet Prophylaxis Unit, HealthCo of El Paso, \$1,950.

Total costs for hospital equipment will be \$18,586. This money is in a special fund for this purpose.

In other purchasing decisions, commissioners opened bids for mini-vans for the Zia Senior Citizens Center, and decided to purchase each van from a different place.

For the Carrizozo center, they will purchase a 1978 GMC with rear-wheel drive from Sundance Motors of Alamogordo at a cost of \$12,501.


The Corona center will receive a 1978 Dodge four-wheel drive from Bob Crane Motors of Roswell at a

A contract with the New Mexico State Library was approved to continue Bookmobile service in Lincoln County.







Superintendent: Now we're rolling

Capitan Schools Superintendent Scott Childress and High School Principal Larry De Wees may be new to Capitan this year, but they are New Mexico natives with roots deep in the Land of Enchantment. Childress was born in Albuquerque, educated at the University of New Mexico and Eastern New Mexico University, and has recently come from Bloomington, where he was assistant superintendent of curriculum and instruction.

He has been in Capitan since June 15. When questioned about his new role as superintendent of Capitan schools, Childress replies that it's "hard, frustrating work."

"The roof leaks like a sieve, which is no problem unless it's raining. And this has been one of our more rainy autumns," he explains. "Sometimes it seems like for every

step you take forward, you take two backwards."

Still, his job has its rewards. "Money is tight, but we've got good kids, a good faculty, good administration and a good school board."

Childress' goal is "to make Capitan schools the best in New Mexico."

"I'm thinking in terms of quality education," says Childress. "We've developed a strong written curriculum in the elementary program, and will have finished our secondary level curriculum by November." Capitan schools have never before had a written curriculum.

"One of our major strengths is in the shared desire by the teachers to excellence. We had to start from scratch to put together a curriculum program, but now we're rolling."

Childress also cites strong community support as one of Capitan's positive aspects. "The board is given the latitude to operate, and they're serious and understand our needs as well as those of the community."

"We're finally going to come into compliance with state standards, which will be new for Capitan. In the past, the curriculum has been very weak. You can't evaluate a program with no written curriculum. We've redesigned that, improved it, put it into action and now it will be evaluated."

Capitan schools has 38 teachers, 505 students, and 12 percent of their students participate in some form of special education. "The school system has a good reputation," says Childress. "Soon, it should have a great one."

Scott Childress is married to Jacqueline, and they have one daughter, Stephanie, 5.

Principal De Wees: The kids get the opportunity to get a good education

Larry De Wees talks more like a coach than like a high school principal. He is enthusiastic, informal and has a sense of humor—his wife, Judi, and he have two sons, named Denver and Dallas, a dog named Detroit, and a bird named Minnesota. Why Minnesota? "They were hot that year," says football fan De Wees.

In fact, De Wees has spent most of his career in coaching-related work. He has come to Capitan from Farmington, where he was assistant principal and athletic director. Previous to that, De Wees received his education at Chadron State in Nebraska, and at Texas Tech.

"Capitan is a good place to live. The kids, the faculty, the parents, the school board—the teachers deliver, and the kids get the opportunity to get a good education."

De Wees thinks that the Capitan students want to learn, which makes the school a "super situation."

"We had to redo the entire high school curriculum seven days before classes started. We took a Macintosh computer and a new school curriculum package, and we

developed totally new schedules, in record time. The people at Macintosh tell us that, to the best of their knowledge, nobody else has ever put things together as quickly as we did. But we did it out of necessity."

DeWees' major goals are to make sure the teachers and students have an optimum chance for education, and to make sure that the curriculum schedule allows ample time for extracurricular activities.

"We have a fantastic staff," De Wees declares enthusiastically. "Fantastic. They're exceptionally professional. I'd put our current staff up against anybody in the state. They are dedicated, dedicated professionals who love their jobs despite things like the remoteness of the village and the shortage of housing. They are above and beyond simply being 'dedicated.' I can't say enough for our teachers. We don't have one that won't donate all the time needed to make our school exceptional.

When they're not in the classroom, they're selling tickets or working at the football games. Their work doesn't stop when class is over."

De Wees also credits the Capitan

parents for making his school exceptional. "The parents have done an amazing job at raising their kids. They've put all their time, energy and knowledge into their families. These people are the salt of the earth. They've struggled to make their land produce, they're sort of the last remaining Will Rogers-type people."

De Wees laughs and tells a story. "Last week a mother called in the morning and said, 'our children might be a little late to school this morning. The pigs got out, and they're rounding them back up.' Sure enough, the children showed up as soon as things were back to normal at home. They know about responsibility and nurturing. These are very important things and can't always be taught in school."

De Wees claims that Capitan is "tangible America."

"People here have an encompassing knowledge of all things," he explains. "They're living in an old history, they eat, sleep, and breathe history, and they appreciate that. They have the opportunity to spend their lives in a unique place, and they know it, Capitan isn't just a small town, not with all this history." De Wees lives between Capitan and Lincoln, and admits to lying awake at night wondering if Billy the Kid used to ride through his back yard.

"I've never been in such a friendly place. You know, you can't drive down the highway without everybody waving at you from their cars and pickups."

"One indication of the caring that is all around us took place at student elections. These kids really took it seriously. The candidates

developed actual platforms, and the voters considered the issues.

"I took a walk through the halls to take down posters that had been defaced and vandalized, you know, you assume routinely that there will be vandalism. Those posters were up for a week, and there was never a mark or smear on them. I did not have to remove one of them."

I couldn't believe it; it shows the respect our students have, not only for property and for authority, but for each other. That's what makes our school unique, this respect for human beings that Capitan parents have instilled into their children.

"This is what makes my job a joy to have."

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

They say it's a natural American right, which is absurd.

But they don't have to live all year in the city where their team plays. Most of them make enough money to own two homes.

And most of them end their careers in their late 20's or early 30's, more than enough time to start another career living off their famous names.

The NFL players should be thankful they don't have to make their living on a ship in the Persian Gulf or in the jungles of Central America, while the rest of the country debates their presence or morality there.

And the worst thing about the whole scenario is that many of the NFL players have been behaving like goons during the strike.

Some of them have damaged buses bringing replacement players to the camps. Others have brought guns (even if they are empty) to the picket lines.

They haven't been behaving like professionals, but more like goons who threaten people and ridicule them for the way they eat, talk or look.

Yes, I think I'll enjoy watching the NFL games this weekend. It should be interesting watching average players making mistakes instead of watching overpaid stars.







Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Garrey Carruthers is a confused man. The poor guy doesn't know when his term of office ends. Someone must help him out soon so that he can start planning his future.

For the record, gubernatorial terms begin and end at midnight as December 31 ends and January 1 begins. In the case of our current governor, his term began on January 1, 1987, and ends on December 31, 1990.

At first glance, that might appear to only be three years but, if you hide behind your paper and use your fingers to count, you will realize there is a fourth year in there.

The problem began when Carruthers coined a class-looking, brass medallion for a commemorative key chain, which he presents to special guests who visit his office.

One side of the medallion has an inscription which reads, "New Mexico. New Beginning." Below that is a scribble which Carruthers claims to be his signature. I know he didn't learn to write like that in the Aztec Public Schools. Possibly he was confused, once again, when he received his Ph.D. and thought that entitled him to write like an M.D.

The other side is inscribed "Office of the Governor 24th Governor 1987-1991."

Recently, Rep. Murray Ryan, R-Grant-Luna, chided the state Senate for its arrogance in unconstitutionally extending the terms of some of its members to six years on two different occasions. This appears to be an unconstitutional extension of the governor's term of office.

Carruthers now appears to be trying to atone for his blunder by shortening his term a year. The Santa Fe paper reported last week that the governor has announced goals which he hopes to achieve before he leaves office in 1989.

Somebody has to set this guy straight!

A surprise goal listed by Carruthers was the calling of a state constitutional convention. Our last constitutional convention was in the summer of 1969. Gov. Jack Campbell stumped for a convention during his

term in the mid 1960s but it didn't end up taking place until the David Cargo administration.

That streamlined constitution was rejected by the voters by a scant 2,500 votes. The closeness was amazing considering the proposal contained a feature which has always been repugnant to New Mexico voters. It removed most of the state elected officials from the ballot and provided for them to be appointed by the governor.

There are several reasons we probably won't see a convention called by the legislature.

First, it's expensive and the state isn't rolling in money at the moment. Second, there is a mechanism allowing the legislature to completely revise the constitution, itself, without calling a convention.

Third, the last time the legislature allowed a constitutional convention to happen, a large number of the convention delegates decided they liked politics so much that they ran against the same legislators who had given them the chance to get their political appetites whetted. Some of our legislators may not look too smart but they ain't stupid!

Although it may seem early, there are several people who know exactly when the Carruthers term ends.

Part of the reason for the interest in the 1990 gubernatorial campaign is the opportunity to run for a second four-year term. You tell me what governor in the last 20 years could have successfully run for a second term and I'll be sure you are not on my list of top political advisors.

Bruce King did get elected to a second four-year term but with an intervening term by Jerry Apodaca. Jack Campbell is my choice for the last Governor who could have been elected for a second four years.

King is the 1990 governor candidate most organized already to make the run. He has been meeting with former campaign chief and top aide Linda Kehoe to make plans for opening an office.

Former Attorney General Paul Bardacke is only a step away and don't rule out former Lt. Gov. Mike Runnels.

"Melody Hall" has something for everybody: a butler, a singing ghost, three cowboys and a lady's companion whose lady has long since passed on.

And Ruidoso Little Theatre (RLT) has put together just the right cast to infuse the charming musical comedy with energy, zest and lots of fun.

Saturday's production got off to a slow start, but it didn't take director Dave Hall and his six-member cast long to have the small audience in the palms of their hands.

The Nashville Chorale ... or maybe that's the Nashville Corral ... had audience members tapping their toes and humming to the guitar beat of country and western (that's C&W) melodies. R.J. Hall, played by Jerry Perry; Cal, played by Roger Sowder; and Andy Anderson, played by Jett Crouse teamed

up as a struggling musical ensemble.

The audience loved it when those guys picked up their guitars (that's git' taahrs) to belt out the show's original music. The three voices, as different in tone as they could be, blended to form a smooth sound, set off by two acoustic and one electric guitar. They call that picking and singing ... that's plik 'in' & saing' in'.

Sowder's Cal may have been the buffoon of the C&W trio, but he stole the show on Saturday and won the hearts of his audience. He played his part to perfection, timing his moves and lines just right and making frequent eye contact with the audience. He was repaid with uproarious laughter and more than his share of applause.

Little Theatre fans will remember Sowder as the bumbling

doctor in RLT's spring production of "Harvey."

Newcomer B.J. Tooley was cast as the naive Jane Becket, and the audience was treated to her superb portrayal of a young woman's transformation from the quiet refinement of a Massachusetts lady's companion to a rhinestone cowgirl—Texas-style.

When Helen Kilgore, as Melody Hall, sang in her lovely, clear voice, it served as the transition from the major fast-moving comedic theme to the minor more nostalgic theme of the show.

Harley Campbell as the butler, Leland Becket, was pompous enough to be believable, but flexible enough to be likeable. Campbell, too, displayed his considerable vocal talent.

Music director Carl Mori used his talented players well to weave a sometimes haunting, but mostly upbeat, musical thread through the entertaining play. The recorded piano accompaniment, by Donna Willard, was so well-done that one would have expected to see her sitting at the piano on-stage.

Sound, a problem on some past RLT musicals, is working well for "Melody Hall," freeing the au-

dience to enjoy the production, undistracted by the sound system. The bright attractive set was well-designed and a great backdrop for the play, but scene changes seemed to drag just a bit.

RLT should be congratulated for choosing a play that is ideally suited to community theater, and producing it in an efficient and professional manner.

Director Hall said one of the play's authors, Lois Fleck, was in Ruidoso last Friday, and enjoyed the play very much. Hall said Fleck, a Houston, Texas, resident, was impressed enough with RLT's production that she plans to incorporate some of the local touches into her next presentation.

Lois Fleck's co-author was Marty Fleck, who also co-wrote the music with Fred Koller.

It's not too late to see "Melody Hall." The play will continue at 8 p.m. today (Thursday), Friday and Saturday, at the old Gibson's building at the "Y." Tickets are still available at Don's Pharmacy, Schlotsky's, the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce and at the door.

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



"Just look around," he beams, posing on a jungle gym. "Wouldn't you have loved to have had a playground like this? The mountains on the horizon, the air, can you smell the pines?"

Cannella, a Chicago native, got his degree at Northern Illinois University, and then moved to New Mexico in 1975. He's been here 12 years, but he's still enchanted. "My wife, Marge, and I were in the Peace Corps in western Samoa, and when we got back to the states we thought we'd like to move west. We kind of stumbled on the Ruidoso area, and we taught in Mesalero for three years. After that, I got a job at the Middle School, I was there for nine years. I enjoyed that, but I'm glad to be here now."

The Cannellas have three

daughters, Donna, Michelle, and Jennifer. "I like to exercise, hike and climb mountains," he says.

He enjoys his job as principal and is relieved to find that he still has plenty of contact with the students. "We have no guidance counselor, so I function in that capacity," he explains. "It takes a lot of coordination to do this job. During the summer, I was concerned mainly with physical buildings and worrying about the cafeteria, the bus schedules, stuff like that. Now I'm concerned with curriculum and the students."

"I get goose bumps watching kids learn. I have such a good feeling for this school. We're really fortunate here. Not every small town has the quality that Ruidoso has."

New teachers at White Mountain Elementary School include:

RON HARDEMAN, third grade. Hardeinan taught fifth grade in Austin, Texas, schools before coming to Ruidoso, and got his degrees from Northern Texas State University and Southwest Texas State. "I

really enjoy it here," he says. "There's a lot of parental concern and involvement here, and I really have a sense of the community. Also, the students are really polite and well-behaved, which is rare." Hardeinan and his wife, Beth, have a 5-year-old named Stephan.

"I'm impressed with the commitment that the administrators have in Ruidoso," he states. "They are anxious to make the teachers' jobs easier."

NANCY LESLIE is one of three new second-grade teachers at WME. She has her degree from Indiana University, and has lived "a little bit of everywhere." She taught second and fourth grade on the Zuni reservation before coming to Ruidoso.

"It's fun here," she says. "The kids are just great. Just coming to school is a highlight. The area is breathtakingly beautiful and the people are friendly, happy, calm and caring." Nancy's husband is Allan Leslie, a cabinetmaker, and they have two children, Nathanael, 4, and Collin, 2.

KARLA THORNLEY teaches second grade too. She has a degree from Utah and has lived in Wyoming, Utah and Florida before coming to Ruidoso. Her husband, Neil, manages a Mesalero cattle ranch. The Thornleys have four children, Stacy, 16, Neil Jr., 14, Teresa, 11, and Travis, 10.

"I'm really loving it here," she admits. "The school personnel are really caring, and it's wonderful to work in a system where the needs of the children come first."

RENEE RUBIN is the third new second-grade teacher at WME. She received her degree from New Mexico State University and taught in Mesalero. Her husband, Michael Delesantro, is a teacher in Carrizozo.

"I grew up in Chicago, but now I can't get far enough out in the country to suit me," she says. She has been here now for 10 years. "This school is fine, it's great, I particularly appreciate the enthusiasm of the students."

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Motorcyclists will tour, show, parade


Rev up those engines and snap on those helmets for the 1987 Golden Aspen Rally, expected to be the biggest and most exciting motorcycle festival yet.

crime fighter will ride in a Ruidoso Police unit.




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

Tickets are available from FOP members, and are \$3 each or \$5 a couple. Proceeds will be used for FOP scholarships and service projects.



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
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

Mountain areas offer aspen viewing at its best

If you want to get a good look at this year's aspen trees, there are two recommended places to go for viewing.

One place to see the trees in their yellow splendor is near the Mon Jeau Lookoff off Highway 37 (via Forest Road 117). The roads are sometimes rough here but if you go slow enough, you'll get through. This is a beautiful spot even when the trees are not in season; if you climb up to the tower you may want to bring binoculars.

Another site is up Ski Run Road (state highway 532), leading to Ski Apache. The road is paved and the Oak Grove Campground is your best bet for aspen spotting.

The mountains provide a spectacular backdrop for colored leaves. An autumn picnic would be a real treat, and don't forget to load your camera with color film.

Aspens aren't the only trees changing color now, of course; there are locust, oak, Chinese elm, cottonwood and maple leaves to collect. Some people preserve leaves between sheets of waxed paper, sealing them with a hot iron. Others press them in books, and while they will inevitably lose their brilliant coloration with time, the experience of fall foliage in the mountains near Ruidoso is a colorful sight not soon forgotten.



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
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Spicy fun in store at Chili Cookoff

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


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Bike race challenges road to Ski Apache
