Newman is named chief

A career Dallas police officer will take over the helm of the Ruidoso Police Department on Monday, October 26.

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., during a special Village Council meeting Wednesday, appointed William J. Newman as chief of the Ruidoso Police Department. Councilors unanimously approved the mayor's choice.

Newman served with the Dallas Police Department from 1968 to the present, as assistant chief since 1984, and deputy chief from 1982 to 1984. He began his law enforcement career in 1968 in the patrol bureau, and worked his way up through the ranks.

The 50-year-old Dallas native is married and the father of six. Newman said just one of his six children, a 13-year-old, is still living at home. The new chief said he and his family already had decided to make Ruidoso their home upon his recent retirement from the Dallas force.

Newman said he's looking forward to serving in his new position. "We're proud of our choice," said

Councillor Elmer Pirelli after the Wednesday morning session. The council interviewed three candidates for the slot, discussed the applicants in executive session and then convened to take action.

Pirelli said Newman got top marks in the rating system established in the village personnel policies.

Newman has a bachelor's degree in criminal justice from Abilene Christian University in Dallas, Texas, and an associate's degree in police science from El Centro College in Dallas. He also has a long list of special schools and training to his credit, including "advanced" and "instructor" certificates from the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education.

Newman was honorably discharged in 1962 from the U.S. Naval Reserve.

According to village personnel director Debbie Rogge, the pay scale for the chief of police position ranges from \$22,709 to \$36,990.

Former Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor recently submitted his resignation to be effective October 15. Swenor said he plans to remain on the force, but not as chief.

Teacher pay cut proposal delayed

The Ruidoso Board of Education postponed coming to a decision Wednesday on a proposal by Schools Superintendent Sid Miller to solve the schools' economic "crisis situation."

At the noon special school board meeting in the Ruidoso Middle School library, Miller recommended that the board approve a 1.5 percent pay cut for personnel in all areas, including administrative, certified and non-certified staff members.

"When you come up short in enrollment, you have to do something to make up the deficit," he commented. It was learned the schools still are 64-65 students short of projections, representing a revenue shortfall of about \$80,000.

Miller indicated all other expense areas of the budget already have been pared to minimum levels, leaving just staff or salaries to be cut. Rather than cut staff, Miller said he'd recommend a salary cut.

Associate Superintendent Mike Gladden then presented a fact sheet which indicated the majority of "new money" already is tied to teacher salary increases and benefits. He pointed out the 2.7 percent average increase in teacher salaries for this year, and noted most teachers would still have a slight increase even with the 1.5

percent cut. "Unlike many districts, we have maintained (the) \$2,200 increase mandated by (the) Legislature without reducing staff," Gladden said in the fact sheet. "Therefore, we have maintained staff and more importantly, maintained the quality of education in Ruidoso. That is our #1 priority."

The district has maintained communication with the State Department of Education, which administrators said supports the decision for a salary cut. In addition, application has been made for emergency funds, but Gladden said the district does not meet criteria to qualify for the funds since Ruidoso still shows a slight increase in salaries and no staff members yet have been cut.

Speaking from the audience, Ruidoso High School teacher Kathy Travis spoke of some teachers' decreased confidence in the central administration as a result of the incorrect projections of enrollment, the decline of which she termed was "obvious to everybody."

She wondered whether the problem was in budgeting, rather than funding, since state and federal revenue sources are "static." Travis said she was not objecting to the 1.5 percent pay cut, but asking for an explanation of exactly how the cuts would be implemented.

She pointed out that the 2.7 per-

cent increase was not across the board, some teachers were not increased at all while administrators received a seven percent increase and non-certified staff were boosted by 12 percent.

It was learned that teachers who did not receive a raise would not be subject to a cut. School board member Mike Morris asked why administrators didn't get a higher cut since their raise was higher. "They've got to be done right along with the rest of them," he said.

More discussion of salary raises ensued, with the question of who would and who wouldn't get a pay cut never precisely answered.

"Outside of personnel or salaries, there is no other way," Miller insisted. All indicators used in the past to project enrollment were followed, he said. A housing project in Mesalero that was planned for 70 families was completed, but a lawsuit halted the project before occupancy, delaying any new students from that area until January or February, Miller said. Then, at least 70 students will enter the Ruidoso school system, he predicted, making up the shortfall.

"It would have been easy to not have given raises (to teachers)," Miller said. "If we would not have given those raises, we would not be here today." The administration chose to emphasize personnel in the budget, "and that was a mistake,"

he added. Later in the meeting, Miller protested the actions of some teachers who apparently telephoned the State Department of Education and State School Board members with questions on the financial situation of Ruidoso Schools. Miller indicated teachers could have had their questions answered here.

An audience member asked why the meeting was scheduled when most teachers couldn't be present, and asked that the decision be delayed until a meeting more teachers could attend.

Board member Don Swalander proposed having a meeting Tuesday evening.

School board President Stormy Edwards suggested that people concentrate on how to remedy the situation rather than wondering why the problem developed.


"Our number one priority is to the kids," he said.

But Swalander continued to push for a special meeting.

"We may very well end up with the exact same solution," he said, but added, "I'd like to see if there are any other possibilities."

Board members agreed to table Miller's suggestion, and call for a special meeting of the board for 7 p.m. Tuesday, October 27, in the Administrative Office.

Edwards requested that two representatives from each school attend the special meeting.

P&Z allows eight requests after late start

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) got a late start on a lengthy agenda Monday, as four members waited nearly a half hour for the arrival of a fifth com-

missioner to form a quorum.

Commission Chairman David Smith, Secretary Jess Stinson, commissioners John White and Ellen Long, and a handful of audience members waited for Vice Chairman Pete Thompson before beginning the meeting.

The commission, set at nine members by a village ordinance, has been one short since former member J.D. James resigned in May to accept an appointment to the Ruidoso Village Council. Commission members are appointed by the mayor.

Smith recommended that members notify planning administrator Margaret McDonald Lahey if they are to be absent. White asked for information on absences and suggested the group

Trio added at RHS

Bill Morris, Brett Argo and Beth Powers are the newest teachers at Ruidoso High School, having joined the staff this fall.

BILL MORRIS: came to Ruidoso after two months of teaching special education at Capitan last spring.

He is a special education teacher at Ruidoso, and teaches courses in civics, English, resources, math and science.

Morris got a bachelor's degree from Sul Ross University in Alpine, Texas, in 1970.

He first started teaching in 1972 as an art instructor at Alameda Junior High School in Las Cruces.

After teaching at Alameda for three years, Morris moved to Lincoln in 1975 (where he still lives). He started a farm in the historical town and began work at Fort Stanton Hospital and Training Center in 1976, teaching there for a total of seven years.

Morris worked for the Lincoln County Heritage Trust in Lincoln in 1985, but went back to school at New Mexico State University in 1986 to get a certificate in special education.

During the 1986-87 school year,

Morris worked as a substitute teacher in the Ruidoso School District before getting the job at Capitan last spring.

"I like it a lot here," Morris said about Ruidoso. "It's where I like to be. I wanted to move to a place with a lot of mountains."

BETH POWERS: taught six years at Ruidoso Middle School before transferring to the high school this school year.

She also works in special education and has classes in civics, reading, English, resources and math.

Powers graduated from West Texas State University in Canyon, Texas, in 1976.

She taught special education in Denver City, Texas, for five years before coming to Ruidoso and the middle school in 1981.

"I like helping the students," she said about her classes.

Powers grew up in Crowell, Texas, a small farm town.

She also likes Ruidoso. "It's just the friendly attitude of the people," she said. "I really like the atmosphere around town."

BRETT ARGO: is the band director at the high school, replacing Danny Flores, who moved to Portales.

Besides being the band director

at the high school, Argo also is the director at Ruidoso Middle School.

Argo and his wife, Mary, moved here from Cedaredge, Colorado, where he taught fifth-grade general music and directed the marching and jazz bands as well as the choir.

Readathon benefits MS

Many fund drives serve many important charities; but few are as worthwhile to the participant as the Multiple Sclerosis Readathon, begun this week at the White Mountain Schools.

As in a raceathon or walkathon, participants find sponsors to pledge, for example, 50 cents per book read by the participants, and 10 books to be read.

Participants read books, then review them for a teacher or, in the case of White Mountain Intermediate school students, to their librarian, Viola Montes. A form is signed, and the participating student collects money from the sponsor and turns it in to the MS fund.

Lawanda Strong is helping the schools run the fund drive. Her daughter, Karen Foster, has MS. Before the disease progressed, Karen taught at Ruidoso Middle School and then was transferred to the library when she became confined to a wheelchair.

Strong is not weepy or naive about MS. "I do think a cure will be found," she says. "That's why fund-raising is so important. You know,

if everybody in Ruidoso contributed as little as a quarter each, that would be \$2,000 for research." She smiles, and adds: "I always aim for the stars."

Multiple Sclerosis is a progressive disease involving deterioration of the sheaths surrounding the nerves. It usually hits adults in their late 20s or early 30s, although, "Many MS patients have symptoms for years before that, but until they have a complete history of symptoms, doctors cannot diagnose the disease." In fact, Strong notes, the only true way to diagnose MS is through an autopsy.

Foster lives in Albuquerque now where she is involved in a special exercise program for MS patients under the auspices of the University of New Mexico. In the program, her muscle strength has improved 180 percent. The slogan of the program is: "Physically challenged, and determined."

"One of the most valuable things they have in Albuquerque is a support group. When MS patients are with others with the disease, they realize they are not alone, and their families and friends can talk to each other and help each other," Strong explains.

Lawanda Strong would like to start a support group in Lincoln County, called "Friends of MS." It would be for people with the disease, families, friends, medical personnel and interested residents of the county.

"There are several people here who have the disease, and some who want to keep it a secret, and some who have probably not been diagnosed as of yet. When you add their families and friends, there are

quite a few in the community who have been touched by MS. I know how much the Albuquerque program has done for Karen, and I would like to see something like that started here in Ruidoso."

Ruidoso students will be reading books and looking for sponsors between now and December. The funds they collect will go to help find the clues as to what causes, and what prevents, and what cures Multiple Sclerosis.

Safeway sale soon?

Safeway stores in Ruidoso will continue to operate as full-service groceries after the expected November 7 takeover by Furr's, according to Furr's Chief Executive Officer Jan Friederich.

Friederich spoke Saturday to members of the New Mexico Press Association during an association convention in Albuquerque. Furr's expected takeover of 29 New Mexico stores in the Safeway El Paso Division, and the sale of 10 New Mexico Safeways to Safeway Retail Operations Manager Bob Jaynes of El Paso, awaits Federal Trade Commission approval before being finalized. Friederich indicated while Furr's will examine profit and loss statements for each of their new stores, an emphasis will be placed on "business as usual."

The grocer disputed contentions that Furr's will raise prices. If Furr's raised prices, competitors

would be much more likely to enter the market, he said. Furr's will profit otherwise from the purchase, in particular by saving about \$10 million a year in transportation costs through the acquisition of a second distribution center, in El Paso.

Also this week, the union representing Safeway employees reported those employees voted 1,073 to 348 to approve a contract with Furr's. Among contract provisions are stipulations that qualified Safeway employees will have preferential status in hiring up to a year after takeover as long as they reapply every 90 days, if necessary. Former Safeway employees may drop a pay level or two, but most will not go below \$8.68 an hour and can expect to recover the former pay level within a year. Some will receive raises.

NM First to have Town Hall meeting

New Mexico First will sponsor its first Town Hall meeting Sunday through Wednesday, October 25-28, at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

Subject of the meeting will be "The Marketing of New Mexico."

Some 125 group members will spend the three days discussing the topic and arriving at recommendations and conclusions that will benefit New Mexico, according to a press release.

discuss attendance policies at a future meeting.

Members approved all eight agenda items during the three-hour meeting.

Commissioners learned that construction was started without a building permit on a driveway and retaining wall at 141 Juniper. The wall extends into public right of way.

After extended discussions, the commission voted unanimously in favor of vacating the property and recommended the council charge owner Annie L. Utsch \$1 a square foot.

It was learned that construction was under way when the village building inspector attached a red tag to the project, but work was later allowed to continue on the private property, but not the right of way. According to information provided at the meeting, the applicant's husband is restricted to a wheelchair and could not get in or out of the house with the drive and steps torn up.

"They tried to stop her three or four times and they'd leave and she'd start back up," noted Stinson, with White reupping his question

of why the building inspector doesn't attend P&Z meetings to present reports.

"Why would we continue to allow this sort of thing?" asked White, wondering if the village has provisions for fines.

Lahey said such applicants pay double for building permit fees, and village engineer Mike Davalos said the law has a provision involving court action.

"Basically what she's done is affect property not owned by her," noted village attorney John Underwood. He said the owner can't be forced to buy the vacated right of way.

Building inspector Jimmy Neeley sat in on part of the discussions, explaining that he had "many interactions" with the property owner. He said he tries to work with citizens.

"The camera got her to stop—the red tag didn't," noted Neeley, who videotaped the construction job in progress.

In a separate case, discussions over a replat led Underwood to recommend turning the request down, only to rescind that advice later. Underwood said he had a "legal problem" with allowing a replat of two small lots into two lots below the minimum allowable size.

He said the owner should have to make the two into one large lot.

But Underwood changed his mind after Tim Collins, on hand as agent for a separate case, quoted from a village ordinance allowing such replats as long as the number of lots isn't increased.

The case involved moving the lot line on two lots at 161 Ponderosa Drive owned by George and Patsy Wilkison. The replat, approved by the commission, changes the configuration on two lots without changing their size.

Commissioners also authorized a property line setback variance. After the replat, the structure in place extends 4'6" into the south side setback and 14'8" into the rear lot setback.

During regular business the commission: —Approved a property line setback variance of no more than seven feet at 116 Eagle Drive. Owner Patricia Adkins revealed plans to build a carport, and commissioners stipulated the structure never be totally enclosed, but left open above four feet. White opposed the request "because of procedures."

—Unanimously approved a replat to build a carport 12'6" into

the front property line setbacks at 111 Torreon Loop. "It would not be a cheapie carport," said applicant Charles Wiley. Commissioners stipulated the carport never be enclosed.

—Authorized a nine-foot property line setback variance at 111 Riverside Drive for the applicant, Welzie W. Webb, to build a carport to within one foot of the side lot line. Chairman Smith abstained from discussions and the vote, saying he "materially advised" a client on the possibility of putting a carport on the property. Commissioners stipulated the structure never be enclosed.

—OK'd, subject to Village Council approval, a vacation of right of way, replat and variance at 101 Royal Drive. P&Z recommends the council charge applicant Richard Neff 50 cents a square foot for the 634.6 square feet to be vacated. Staff reports indicate the structure has been in existence since 1972, and extends into public right of way. It was noted that the paving is "quite a distance" from the mobile home.

—Unanimously authorized a replat for a land trade between Continental Telephone Company and

Johnny D. Durham at lots one and two, Block 7, Palmer Gateway Subdivision.

—Recommended the Village Council work out "just compensation" with T.E. Arrington over land he donated for a street that apparently hasn't been used. Arrington said "the city paid somebody \$1,250 to cut down close to 100 trees," adding the woodcutter then hauled off the wood. He said he donated the entire right of way for Chipmunk Avenue, but wants the portion back that won't be needed for a street.

—Discussed the zoning on property belonging to Joe Malloy, and agreed to research the question of the legal zoning in the area where he has a mobile home park. "Let it be in our ball court for 30 days," suggested Smith.

—Heard during a staff report that work is nearly finished on a proposed zoning ordinance. P&Z set a public hearing on the ordinance for 8:30 p.m. Monday, November 16. Lahey said meetings over the Main Street Program are scheduled at 2 p.m. and 6 p.m. Thursday, October 29.

More members is group's goal

Increasing membership again was central in the conversation at the October 8 meeting of the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County (EDCLC).

EDCLC Vice President Ronnie Paulger said membership stands at 66 paid-in-full, with 17 others committed, for a total of 83. Names of people who signed pledge cards at the July kick-off meeting were distributed to members, who promised to make a personal contact before the next meeting (set for 6 p.m. today (Thursday), October 22).

Later, those at the meeting selected names from a list of prospective members, and agreed to contact them before the next meeting.

EDCLC President Buddy Bundick reviewed the reasons for seeking a membership of 250 before electing a board of directors. That number of members from across the county would provide the solid base on which the concepts of EDCLC can build. Bundick also noted the importance of reaching that point soon, as important decisions need to be made quickly, and should be made by the elected board of directors, rather than the present temporary officers, to more closely represent the members' wishes.

Member Richard Mound reported that the Promotions Committee has obtained support from most local media and EDCLC presentations have been made to most civic groups. The committee will attempt to schedule presentations with other membership groups. Paulger announced a meeting was scheduled between EDCLC officers and the Capital Board of Trustees. (Last week at that meeting, the trustees voted to become Class A members.)

Airport commission ponders, then pays overrun

Members of the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC), during a regular meeting Wednesday, questioned cost overruns on the close to \$2.5 million earthwork contract.

Commissioners learned of substantial cost overruns on a contract with Tricon Kent, and asked the engineer why change orders haven't been submitted. The commission finally approved a \$258,540.73 invoice for payment, along with other bills, contingent on receiving a written change order.

Airport engineer Earl Cook said the contractor encountered a great deal of substandard material at the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA) site, causing the overruns in the unit-price contract. Cook said his company, Leadshill-Herkenhoff, is thoroughly reviewing Tricon's final pay estimate before authorizing payment.

"They had some gross errors in the submittals they gave to us," said Cook.

According to Leadshill-Herkenhoff's project estimate number eight, Tricon Kent's original contract was for \$2,479,385, and the current contract, after 240 days, is for \$2,484,595. But the estimate further indicates total construction to date is at \$2,804,487.13, plus the cost overrun so far at \$319,892.13.

Cook said the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) has authorized its 90 percent share of the overrun. He warned that the final pay estimate may include further increases.

The project estimate shows the contract 100 percent complete with more than 112 percent of the allocated funds spent.

Cook said a 10 percent performance bond, or \$280,487.13, still is being retained. He said an upcoming contract with Nielsons may come in below original estimates, freeing some funds to make up the

difference in the local share on the Tricon Kent payouts.

The commission, after hearing from Gene Parker of New Mexico State University (NMSU), directed the airport engineer to meet and discuss with Parker the possibilities for easements and fencing on SBRA land.

"We had a long, heated battle, but that's over and we're neighbors," said Parker. He said NMSU's federal contract runs out in 1990, so the future of the range program is undecided.

In other regular business Wednesday the commission:

—Heard a financial report from county manager Suzanne Cox showing \$4,673,534.73 has been spent on the airport project thus far, with \$4,264,507.60 projected as eligible for FAA participation, and \$409,027.13 ineligible. She distributed a list of dates when the county mill levy will be collected and available for airport construction expenses. —Unanimously approved a replat to build a carport 12'6" into

and subject to change. She said questions remain over FAA participation in Heckman and Haworth's and Steve Sanders' bills. According to her report the SBAC has paid Heckman and Haworth \$114,877.87 to date, and has an outstanding bill for \$109,495.16; and has paid Steve Sanders \$87,149.45, with three outstanding bills totaling \$28,166.42.

—Questioned Village of Ruidoso's \$2.6 million bond issue that is committed to the airport project, and learned the bonds have been sold and the money placed in an interest-bearing account.

—OK'd paying three Contel bills totaling \$198.25; a \$3,778.35 bill to Bixby Electric; and a Nielsons bill for \$902,073.02. Cook said requests for payment have been sent to FAA for 90 percent of the Bixby and Nielsons bills.

—Heard a brief description of problems over the use of the Fort Stanton Training Hospital water well, with Commissioner Ralph

Dunlap reporting the problems have been solved. Cook reminded the commission of an agreement between the SBAC and the training hospital involving the seal-coating of the Fort Stanton quadrangle in exchange for using the water supply.

—Approved an easement for Otero County Electric Cooperative upon the recommendation of village attorney John Underwood.

—Discussed briefly subcontractors working on the airport, with Dunlap asking Cook for a list.

Lodgers' Tax Committee faces revenue downturn

Dan Kelley, Hank Evaro and new member Mike Warren served as the Lodgers' Tax Committee for its meeting Wednesday at the Ruidoso Village Hall.

Kelley, acting chairman, reported that the lodgers' tax revenues dropped one-third in August. He believes that this drop was caused by a variety of factors, including a total reflection of the economy, less lodges in business than a year ago, and because many hotel-motels have lowered rates. "All these things have a compounding effect," Kelley said. "I don't think there's any need for concern over these figures."

The committee revenues are off \$9,000 so far this year.

John Jeffers, executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, requested that the organization not join Sun Country this year, because of its reorganization, but instead allocate the \$2,000 dues elsewhere. Jeffers asked that \$1,000 go to the general advertising budget, \$500 to the Tourist Association of New Mexico (TANM) and \$500 to the winners of the Texas Family of the Year Award last year. His requests were approved.

Jeffers told of the possible lack of matching funding from the State of New Mexico for this coming year, beginning in spring. There is some conflict at the state level whether the state can match local funds, and

the Attorney General's office has not issued an opinion.

If no funds will be matched, Jeffers said Ruidoso would be missing out on a promised \$23,700. "I believe that all state contracts for these matching funds are now frozen," Jeffers explained. "Until we know for sure, I would advise you to be very judicious with your contingency money."

Committee members spoke of ways to spend limited funding to promote tourism in Ruidoso. Board members wondered what the public felt was the best way to increase tourism, and expressed an interest in taking a poll to that effect. No action was taken regarding this discussion.

Liz Groenendyk, director of the Convention and Visitors Bureau, presented a report on Aspenfest and said record crowds attended the arts and crafts fair, and the chili cookoff. Figures are not yet in for Woorstfest, but it is estimated that 1,500-2,000 people took part in the German celebration, and the festival ran out of sausage by Saturday afternoon and had to buy an additional 250 pounds to feed the crowd.

Nancy Radzewicz of Ruidoso to You, a promotions company, asked the committee for \$1,500 to cover the costs of handing out chamber brochures at conventions. She asked that her concern be tabled until the Wednesday, November 18, meeting when a full committee may be present to vote.

Burdett was a key element in Ruidoso's infancy

(Editor's note: The following article was researched and written courtesy of Barbara Duff and Dan D. Swearingin.)

A memorial Mass and graveside service for longtime Ruidoso resident Madeleine Alice Burdett is scheduled for today (Thursday), October 22, at Mount Carmel Cemetery in El Paso, Texas.

Burdett was born on August 23, 1894, in Hazelhurst, Georgia. Her parents, four sisters and two brothers all have preceded her in death.

Burdett started her career as a teacher in Georgia and came west in the early 20s with her younger brother, Gary, thinking the climate would benefit his health. She taught in the El Paso and Trinidad, Colorado, school systems until she became associated with Smadbeck & Company from New York. They established an office in the old Herald Post newspaper building in El Paso and launched the first subdivision in Ruidoso, which was named Skyland. Later the company moved her to their logging facilities in Ruidoso (the present Woman's Club location).

In the meantime, through mutual

friends, she met Stella Campbell who joined her in the adventure of bracing the New Mexico winters and selling real estate in the summertime. They used newspapers to insulate the headquarters building as evidenced by a 1928 Liberty magazine retrieved when remodeling work was done in the mid 70s.

In the early 30s, they contracted for building the Adobe House at the corner of Main and Laurel (now 1210 Sudderth Drive) and maintained that location as their permanent address. Later they established their own real estate and insurance business under the name of Burdett

& Campbell and became well-known for their enterprising efforts in community development.

They were charter members and co-founders of the Ruidoso Woman's Club, established the first Woman's Chamber of Commerce in the United States, started the first library in the village, sponsored the first garbage pick-up service with a truck supplied by Tony Lama and rejoiced when Bill Hart was able to run a short electric line down Main Street.

Burdett was instrumental in the establishment and advancement of St. Eleanor's Catholic Church in Ruidoso, established the Stellamaris Clinic in Kenya, Africa, for underprivileged children in memory of her longtime friend and business partner, Stella Campbell.

A plaque with her name as sponsor of the "Father Walter Memorial Child Care Center Pavilion" is prominently displayed on the Pavilion wall in Montgomery, Alabama. Her ardent interests there were the physical, recreational and occupational therapy programs.

Many of the 22 countries served by the Maryknoll Sisters of New York were recipients of contribu-


tions from Burdett. She established scholarships for the handicapped along with providing educational trusts for youngsters in her own family. She also worked with Father Braun, who built the church at Mescalero.

She often stated that God had helped her provide assistance where she could not do things physically. All who knew her well were aware that her faith was the ultimate in sustaining her through her handicapped life.

Survivors include nephews Malcolm Burdett of Las Cruces, Anthony Burdett and Thomas Burdett of El Paso, Greg Hurley of West Point, Georgia, and John Stiles of Brunswick, Georgia; nieces Frances Seymour of Melrose, Massachusetts, Eleanor Cate of Brunswick, Georgia, and Mary Frances Surratt of Fabens, Texas; and several grand nieces and nephews.

Twin Mountain affirmed as airport road bid winner

Judge Bill G. Payne, hearing officer for last week's protest hearing by New Mexico Nielsons, Inc. concerning the county's second bidding for the Sierra Blanca Access Road, has stated that it is his conclusion that the protest be denied and that the bid, as submitted, be awarded to the low bidder, Twin Mountain Rock Company.


The reasons given for the denial were as follows: That no objection was made, nor request for clarification

made, prior to the opening of the bids by any of the bidders; and that the two lowest bidders had neither advantage or disadvantage over each other.

Payne's denial also states that Section 13-1-108 does not require the bid solicitation documents to exclude the taxes, only the resultant contract to exclude the taxes; that the bidders were presumed to have knowledge of existing laws; that the subject has already been rebid;

that another bid solicitation would take additional time; that the source of gravel to be used in the project has no bearing on the bid letting; and that it is the best interest of Lincoln County that the bids stand as submitted.

New Mexico Nielsons, Inc. has 30 days to file an appeal in the Santa Fe District Court. If they do not do so, the bid will be awarded unconditionally to Twin Mountain Rock Company.

Commission delays airport zoning decision

A public hearing concerning Ordinance No. 87-2, Airport Zoning Regulations, was tabled to the next meeting in order to give Lincoln County Commissioners more time to study the 13-page document entitled "Airport Zoning Regulations of the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport."

"There is some ambiguity in the language of the document," said Commissioner Bill Karn. The next public hearing has been scheduled for 9 a.m. Tuesday, November 10, in the county courthouse meeting room.

A road review committee to consider the request to vacate county roads A-034 and A-035 has been formed by the commission. Named to the committee are Betty Schreengost, Bill Rawlins and Bill

Elliott, with Frankie Silva and Mack Bell as possible alternates.

The commission approved Resolution 76-27 to appropriate \$10,000 for expert witnesses during the Mesalero water rights litigation. This money is already allocated and is a designation of the same line item. "It was spent mainly for research into past records," explained Commissioner Ralph Dunlap.

The commission approved the Emergency Medical Services Fund Act Grant Application, the Co-Op agreement between the U.S. Government and Lincoln County, the State Department of Finance and Administration Rule 87-2 concerning mileage and per diem, the

payroll and accounts payable registers, voted for non-local members of the New Mexico Self Insurer's Fund and heard engineer Joe Shain's report concerning roads in Deer Park Woods, which are in poor condition.

The commission also accepted the resignation of Colleen Salazar from the Lincoln Historical Preservation Board, due to ill health. Commissioner Dunlap suggested that Bob Hart, Lincoln, assistant director of the Heritage Trust, take Salazar's place on the board.

In executive session, county Superintendent of Roads Earl Krieg resigned his position, effective upon replacement.

This beloved man has left a great blessing among us and we are happy he is safe and happy with our Lord in Heaven.


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



The round-robin play will determine the seeding for next week's district tournament.

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



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Reporter's Round

A plexiglass replica of the Vietnam Monument wrapped up its stay in Albuquerque this past weekend. Close to 100,000 people visited it at the fairgrounds, kneeling before the list of around 58,000 Americans who died or are missing in action in Vietnam. The devotion of New Mexicans to the monument was reported in the Albuquerque papers and on TV; many folks visited the fairgrounds in the middle of the night so as not to be seen crying in public.

I saw the actual monument when I took a trip to Washington, D.C. last spring. The list of names, in order of the date of their deaths, are engraved on black granite walls, which are polished to a mirrored surface, reflecting back the images of other monuments surrounding it. The actual stone tablets are set into the earth, not protruding from it. It is intimate and personal; when I was there, there were mementos and personal possessions leaning up against the wall, symbols of the lives of the dead, the memories of the survivors, meaningful as chapel candles in a dark and lonesome church.

This monument of granite and earth is so powerful it has become, in six years' time, the most beloved work of art in America. People touch it, run their fingers over the names, cry while leaning against it for support, photograph it and etch it into their memories. As proven in

Albuquerque, they will even turn out to see a replica or model of the original.

It's interesting to remember the controversy surrounding the creation of this magnetic project.

In 1980, the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund (VVMF), under the leadership of Jan Scruggs of Washington, D.C., raised money specifically to construct a national memorial. Land was allocated and between the VVMF, the National Capital Planning Commission, the National Commission of Fine Arts and the Department of the Interior a national juried design competition was created, open to all American citizens over the age of 18. Eight men were the jurors, two landscape architects, two building architects, three sculptors and the editor of "Landscape Architecture" magazine.

There were two design requirements: First, the names of the 57,939 Americans who died in the war must be listed. (Due to more thorough identification, this list has since grown.) Second, contestants were required to be sensitive to the Lincoln Memorial and the Washington Monument, whose presences border the site.

1,421 Americans entered the design contest. No names were attached to the entries, which were given identification numbers. A winner was selected in May 1981.

To everyone's surprise, the win-

ner turned out to be a 21-year-old female Chinese-American architecture student from Yale. Her name was, and is, Maya Lin.

Young Lin's design was probably chosen because of its simplicity, its form and function, and its harmony with the landscape it had to fit into. The design was to be "without political content," and Lin included no particular symbolic references with her entry, other than her desire to have onlookers "see their own reflection in the names."

The immediate emotional turbulence that ensued following the judges' decision made it seem as if Lin had designed a monument to the Viet Cong. Some people were outraged.

Did the controversy have anything to do with the fact that Lin was female or amazingly youthful? I don't have enough space in this column to debate that. Instead, let me tell you what some people said about Lin's design.

"National Review" magazine ran an article in its September 18, 1981, issue called "Stop That Monument." It read: "The American soldiers who died in Vietnam fought for their country and for the freedom of others, and they deserve better than the outrage that has been approved as their memorial. It will be a perpetual disgrace to the country and an insult to the courage and the memory of the men who died in Vietnam."

Vietnam veteran Tom Carhart, an outspoken critic, called it "a black gash of shame."

"It is a degrading ditch," Carhart said. He objected particularly to the black color of the granite. "Black is the universal color of shame, sorrow and degradation in all races, all societies worldwide," he said, demanding a white memorial.

Sculptor Frederick Hart, who was commissioned later to create a traditional-type war statue of Vietnam soldiers to appease Lin's detractors, said: "Lin's memorial is intentionally not meaningful. It doesn't relate to ordinary people and I don't like art that is contemptuous of life. Maya Lin's design is elitist."

Hart's vituperative condemnation of Lin's work even poisoned the evaluation of his own work. "My statue is just an awkward solution we came up with to save Lin's design," he said in a 1983 interview with "Art in America" magazine.

Thankfully for America, Lin had some loyal backers who supported her and stuck with her to completion of the project. Norman B. Hannah, in a later issue of "National Review," wrote: "The monument is beautiful, imposing and fitting. This is the 'open book' memorial. That is what it looks like, and that is what it means."

Michael Sorkin, writing for "Vogue," said: "It is genuinely 'reflective and contemplative'...it's a place with a rare capacity to move."

What critics said is unimportant now, six years later. The American people have claimed the monument as their own, adopting it, cherishing and treasuring it and all that it stands for to them. Each viewer brings his or her own associations, memories and emotions to the monument. Each viewer takes away an equally individual memory of the work as they turn to leave, often with tear-filled eyes.

Now that the controversy has dissipated, and the memorial's detractors have been proven wrong, and the public has established an unabashed love affair with her design, the name Maya Lin has

pretty much been forgotten.

I wondered what had become of her, so I made a series of phone calls to New Haven, Connecticut, to try to track her down. I found her within 10 minutes, and we conducted an on-the-spot phone interview.

Ms. Lin, now 28, is working for a design firm in New York City. She was awarded her Masters Degree in Architecture from Yale in 1986, and had the recent honor of receiving an Honorary Doctorate from that prestigious university.

She is articulate, ambitious and extremely bright. "After three years of no sleep, I got my degree," she said, referring to her university days with their intense competition and long studio sessions. "I am working now designing homes. The firm I am with is small, which I like. You have to work professionally for several years before you can take the architectural board exams and become licensed, so I'm preparing for that."

She is happy that her monument has now been accepted by the American people and that it is no longer controversial, but confesses that she doesn't spend too much time thinking about it.

"I am totally involved with whatever I'm doing at the time," she admits. "The monument design work seems like a long, long time ago. It's a slower route that I'm taking these days. I'm still competing, though. I recently entered a competition to design a 600-foot mural in Connecticut, and I'm in the second leg of that competition now. Living in New York is pretty exciting, there is a lot of creativity going on all around. But, I'm from Ohio and I sort of follow in my parents' footsteps. They are both academics. I got tired of the attention the memorial generated, and I

wanted to get on with my life."

Maya Lin may visit New Mexico for the first time in February, if she decides to be a "visiting critic" at New Mexico State University's architecture department. "They invited me, and I haven't committed yet, but I would like to do it. I miss the university environment, and all that energy."

The Vietnam Memorial is a part of living history now and most people don't care who the designer was. Like many works of important public art, the tribute stands by itself and has a life of its own. It is interesting to remember, however, that it did not spring from the earth or drop from the sky; that the concept was born in the mind of a human being with talent, imagination and sensitivity. The fact that Lin is not famous, was not paid a lot for the design, and has not stopped dreaming with one commission makes the monument even more endearing to me.

The controversy over the design concept was fascinating, and the criticism it evoked has proven to be unfounded, at least in the eyes of the millions of Americans who love the memorial. At the time of the great debate, "The Washington Post" noted, in an editorial:

"The argument over the memorial dissolves the moment you get there."

"Time" magazine theorized this, in 1981: "Those bothered by abstract design might consider that grand obelisk, the Washington Monument. We have come to love it. Some day the Vietnam Memorial, too, may win the hearts and minds of the American people."

That prediction was true. The Vietnam Memorial, thanks to Maya Lin, will live in our hearts and minds forever.
