

Texans OK pari-mutuel wagering

Texas voters approved a referendum Tuesday that will allow pari-mutuel betting on horse and dog racing in the state.

The issue has long been a subject of much debate in the Lone Star State, but such betting has been outlawed for the past 50 years.

Racetracks in New Mexico, particularly Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park, have greatly benefited from crowds of Texas bettors and the vote's effect on those tracks still is uncertain.

With 94 percent of the vote tabulated, the edge for legalizing betting is clear, with 57 percent of voters opting for pari-mutuel and 43 percent opposing the measure.

According to the statewide referendum, voters in each Texas county would have to give their approval in addition to the statewide vote. Those local option elections were being held concurrently with the statewide election in some counties. The referendum will allow major racetracks to be established in Houston, Dallas-Fort Worth and San Antonio. Smaller tracks, with shorter seasons, will be allowed in other areas. Greyhound tracks will be limited to three counties: Cameron, Nueces and Galveston, if local approval is achieved.

Racing may begin at existing tracks by late 1988, but major tracks, at construction costs exceeding \$50 million, could take years to establish, according to a published report.

Will Airport Commission solve problem of big bills?

Members of the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) worried Wednesday over money.

Commissioners, after hearing a financial report from Lincoln County manager Suzanne Cox, figured and refigured how to come up with enough funds to cover the local share on the current contracts at the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

With a current balance of \$251,028.95, the group reviewed outstanding bills of around a half million dollars.

Cox said the State of New Mexico still is holding the final \$200,000 of the \$1 million grant from the Transportation Department. She reminded commissioners county mill levies won't be available until mid-December when just over \$64,000 is expected.

Chairman Bill Karn instructed Cox to work with Bob White of the State Transportation Department to expedite receiving the state funds.

Engineer Earl Cook recommended withholding the \$258,540.73 pay request from Tricon-Kent until a final review is complete. He said the \$14,770 bill from Southern Avionics will be reimbursed by the state through a special allocation for equipping a non-directional beam, but recommended withholding payment until the equipment is received.

Bills to former SBAC attorney Steven Sanders and former com-

mission administrator Heckman and Haworth still are on hold.

The commission authorized Cook to submit a Neilsons pay estimate of \$2,417,000 for Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) approval. The commission will be responsible for the 10 percent local share when FAA OKs that bill.

Discussions followed over the Village of Ruidoso \$2.7 million bond issue, with Commissioner Lloyd L. Davis Jr. suggesting some of that money should be "ready to go."

"As soon as we run out of gas on the federal money, that bond money becomes the 90 percent," said Cook, adding the money is for eligible items. "Everything we do is eligible," noted Cook.

To a comment by Cox that Senator Jeff Bingaman gained approval for interest earned on those funds to be used for the local match, Davis retorted, "that interest is ours ... for operation."

"I don't understand what Bingaman has to do with it," added Davis. "We've never discussed this ... Bingaman's name has never been mentioned."

Ruidoso village manager Frank Potter said such a decision is up to the bond counsel—not a senator.

"Seems like Senator Bingaman was asked to do a favor, which wasn't needed to be done," commented Karn.

Attorney Gary Mitchell agreed the FAA has deemed Ruidoso may use the bond interest any way it sees fit, but added the problem of where the rest of the money will be

obtained still exists.

Potter advised the commission, over and over, to follow up on the state grant. "You have to stay on them on that turnaround," he warned. Potter also warned against matching federal funds with federal money. He said the commission should exhaust all federal and state funds before turning to the local money.

Davis said FAA has said not to call the \$2.7 million federal money, but to use it as local match on the new facility.

"Based on what they told you, I think you're free to use it," said Cook, recommending the FAA be notified of such plans.

"The bills are due—we've got to pay them," said Commissioner Jerry Shaw.

Also Wednesday the commission: —Instructed the engineer, attorneys, village and county managers to work out the details of a cooperative agreement to install a water system at the air field.

—Unanimously approved a change order reducing the total on the Neilsons contract.

—Authorized a change order with Bixby Electric for \$9,200 to install the non-directional beacon, although commissioners agreed it is an item that is ineligible for FAA participation.

"Where's the money going to come from?" asked Commissioner Ralph Dunlap.

"It may come out of interest ... who knows? We'll get it somewhere," replied Davis.

Assistant DA to seek death penalty in Glencoe murder case

A Lincoln County grand jury, meeting Monday in Carrizozo, returned an indictment against John Richard Baudino, alleging murder in the first degree and possession of marijuana with intent to distribute, according to Harry Wilcox Jr., senior trial prosecutor for the 12th Judicial District Attorney's office.

Baudino, 25, is charged in the October 13 death of Brent Colson, said Wilcox. The 30-year-old Colson reportedly was beaten to death on the Storm Ranch near Glencoe.

The defendant, who remains in the Lincoln County Jail without bond, will be arraigned on both charges by District Judge Richard A. Parsons. Wilcox said he'll ask at the arraignment for a trial date to be scheduled.

"I intend to file official notice to seek the death penalty in the case," said Wilcox Wednesday. He said attorney Gary Mitchell has recently been appointed to take over the case as part of his contract over cases where the death penalty may become an issue.

"There is no aggravating circumstance, so I would assume this is not a death penalty case," said Mitchell, contacted on Wednesday. He said his copy of the indictment returned by the grand jury made no mention of aggravating circumstances. Mitchell said aggravating circumstances would include kidnap, rape, murder for hire, killing a police officer or a prison guard.

"What Harry (Wilcox) wants to do is circumvent the grand jury," said Mitchell, stressing that the grand jury did not find aggravating circumstances.

"My client told them from the first it was self defense," said Mitchell, adding Baudino even turned himself in to a Lincoln County deputy sheriff. "My client claims self defense and he's totally innocent," contended Mitchell.

Wilcox wouldn't confirm or deny reports that Baudino confessed to the crime.

"I really despise DAs and ADAs who use cases like this for political purposes," said Mitchell, accusing Wilcox of using the case in some future bid for the District Attorney's office.

"When's this kind of nonsense going to end?" asked Mitchell. "It's not a game," he added.

Mitchell compared asking for the death penalty in this case to "pulling out a gun and shooting somebody in the head with it."

Wilcox said the Sheriff's investigation is continuing in the case. He said results of tests relating to the crime scene are expected soon from the New Mexico State Police crime lab. He said the exact quantity of the marijuana taken as evidence at the scene will be determined at the lab.

In an unrelated case, the grand jury returned a 14-count indictment alleging 14 counts of fraud against David M. Greene, said Wilcox. He said the indictment resulted from an investigation by Ruidoso Police Detective Mike Lovelace.

Wilcox said Greene is out of the state and formal documents have been filed to have him extradited back to New Mexico. Wilcox said he has proceeded with a formal requisition to Governor Garrey Carruthers asking for a governor's warrant of extradition.

Chino reelected; council seated in Mescalero vote

Mescalero voters returned Tribal President Wendell Chino to office, retaining an unbroken 25-year chain of terms as the tribe's highest ranking officer.


Voters turned out in slightly higher than usual numbers in the Tuesday election. Total vote was 852, with Chino garnering 537 votes to challenger Joseph Via's 290.

Chino has held the highest elected office of the tribe since 1962.

In the race for tribal vice president, Keith Miller received 453

votes to Paul Ortega's 367. Tribal Council seats went to Silas Cochise Sr. with 592 votes; Harlyn Via Geronimo with 539; Raymond Kirgan with 499; and Frederick Peso with 495. Unsuccessful council candidates included Evelyn Breuninger with 447 and Joylynn Kanesevah Wyatt with 416.

The News received a report early today (Thursday) that some candidates in the election will be challenging the results of Tuesday's vote.

Sheriff Samuels seeks alleged drug makers

Lincoln County Sheriff Don Samuels is looking for a couple of alleged drug manufacturers, who checked into the Arrowhead Motel in Ruidoso at 8 a.m. last Sunday.

Shortly afterward, according to Samuels, the owner checked the room and discovered a sulfurous smell. She called the sheriff's office, but by the time they arrived, the pair had fled.

A wooden coffee table had been stained by an acidic substance, which, according to Samuels, may

have been part of the ingredients used to make methamphetamines.

Samuels described the duo as two males in their mid 30s, one Caucasian weighing about 180 pounds, and one Hispanic weighing about 170, both around six feet in height. They were driving a 1985 or 1986 red over white Ford pickup.

Evidence from the room has been taken by the state crime lab, and arrest warrants will be issued pending the results, Samuels said.

Adoption of parks pondered

Parks and medians in the village are up for adoption, according to Bobby Bailey, head of the Parks and Recreation Department.

During a regular meeting of the Parks and Recreation Commission Wednesday, Bailey unveiled plans to solicit the help of groups and individuals to take on the care, landscaping and maintenance of various public areas in the village.

Ruidoso Beautiful, the proposed program, got the unanimous endorsement of the three commissioners present. Donations and cash contributions will be solicited, as well as commitments from various people to "adopt" an area of right of way or other property.

"I really hope we have enough interest to spark some competition," noted Bailey in answering questions over how areas will be allocated.

"There's no telling what kind of response we'll get from this," said village manager Frank Potter. "I think it will spread like wildfire," added Bailey.

The proposal will now be presented to the Ruidoso Village Council, explained Bailey.

Also Wednesday, the commission discussed absences with Bailey wondering who determines if an absence is excused or unexcused. The five-member commission was unable to make a quorum for the October meeting, and only reached that number on Wednesday after a call to a member after the meeting began.

Three of the group's five members were on hand, but Bailey said one member, W.O. Rucker, will be out of the village until April. Bailey said vacancies are to be filled by mayoral appointment, but the mayor must be notified when openings occur.

Chairman James Stephens suggested attendance would improve if an agenda is prepared before the meetings. Bailey said the procedure established for making an agenda calls for anyone with an item to be included to forward the topic to Betty O'Dell, commission secretary, at PO Box 3572, Hollywood Station; or to the attention of the Parks and Recreation Department, Drawer 69, Ruidoso.

Agenda items are due a week before the regular meeting, set for the first Wednesday of each month. Bailey also reported that fall basketball and volleyball programs are under way with enough participation to form leagues for both sports. He said gymnastics enrollment is up over the same time last year.

Potter reported the Street Department took some materials out of the river and stabilized the road leading to the running track, soccer and Little League football fields. He said the road is located on school property, but the improvement was completed as a service to the many citizens who use that road.

Other discussions centered on obtaining funding to have paid referees in Little League sports and utilizing the Eagle Creek Sports Complex for soccer and Little League football. Commissioner Charlotte Jarratt suggested initiating an exercise program for senior citizens.

Bailey said such a program would be an ideal use for the Activities Center at times when it isn't in use for gymnastics. Potter noted the gymnastics program is a "perfect example" of how successful an enterprise can be with the cooperation of the village and parents.

Hearing ends with reinstatement of deputy

Ruidosoan Ron Harrison was reinstated as a deputy sheriff and awarded back pay during a grievance hearing before the Lincoln County Personnel Board Friday.

Harrison, who was terminated from the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office August 19, has returned to his duties as animal control officer for the sheriff, but apparently will not take on additional duties as a deputy sheriff until further training and attendance at the state police academy is achieved.

The Friday hearing, open to the public at Harrison's request, had just seen completed a series of discussions on procedures Sheriff Don Samuels followed in terminating Harrison when attorney Dan Bryant, representing Samuels, and attorney Elizabeth Simpson, representing Harrison, apparently agreed to terms and the hearing was ended.

The hearing began with objections by Bryant on having the merits portion of the case open to the public. But Simpson restated her client's request that discussions of both procedure and merits of individual situations be open to the public.

Simpson opened with an explanation of personnel ordinances, stressing the importance of correction notices and letters of reprimand prior to termination. She alleged that Harrison received no such notice and had no chance to rebut charges, and said some charges against him were documented even after he was terminated.

Simpson then questioned her client on 14 items listed in a letter from the sheriff of alleged misconduct by Harrison. Harrison said 10 of the 14 were either not discussed or only partly discussed the day of his termination.

Attorney Bryant then asked Harrison whether he had ever been reprimanded by the sheriff on each of the 14, or had any superior officer ever disciplined Harrison on the charges.

Harrison admitted being "counseled" on a few items of the 14, but testified on most that he had never been reprimanded.

It was learned that Sheriff Samuels first told Harrison at the August 19 meeting that he could resign and would be allowed to reapply later. Harrison testified Samuels said he'd terminate him if he had to. Harrison said he agreed to resign, left the sheriff's office and returned to Ruidoso. But after talking to friends, including his Deming attorney, Harrison called the sheriff and withdrew his resignation. At that time, Sheriff Samuels terminated Harrison.

A discussion between Samuels, a member of the personnel board and the attorneys ensued, with Samuels saying the board had instructed him not to use written documentation of oral reprimands and others contending the board had only objected to the type of form Samuels was using, not the practice of documenting corrections.

But the agreement later between the attorneys made moot the questions of procedure and merit.

"Both sides realized that it would be to the benefit of the county if he (Harrison) were to return," said Lincoln County attorney Gary Mitchell, who presided over the hearing. "Hopefully, everything will work out just fine. I think they got it all ironed out."

Harrison declined to comment.

One man is arrested on drug charge by Ruidoso PD

A Ruidoso man was arrested Monday and charged with possession of marijuana with intent to distribute, a fourth-degree felony, according to Ruidoso Police Detective Lanny Maddox.

Jim Bennett, 41, was arrested Monday at his Fifth Street residence, said Maddox. The suspect was jailed with bond set at \$2,500, no 10 percent, according to official records. Bennett was scheduled for arraignment before Magistrate Judge J.R. "Jim" Wheeler on Tuesday.

Information provided by a confidential informant led police to obtain a search warrant in Magistrate Court Monday afternoon. While acting on that warrant, police took as evident a plastic baggie containing a green leafy substance of approximately one pound, said Maddox. He said the substance was found to be marijuana.

Monday's operation was part of an ongoing investigation, said Detective Maddox.

Plane crash report unfounded

Reports Tuesday of a downed aircraft set off a search and rescue operation throughout the Lincoln National Forest.

But within an hour, it was learned the smoking plane observed in the skies near Ruidoso was a sky-writing aircraft performing equipment tests.

White Mountain Search and

Rescue, along with area fire departments and area law enforcement officers, reacted quickly when a resident called police about 3 p.m. and reported an air crash near Fort Stanton.

The operation was just as quickly scratched when officials learned the actual cause of the smoke.

SCC meets new PD chief

Also Monday, Nancy Radziewicz and Barbara Downs told of their new promotional business, Ruidoso To You. The two explained the purpose of their business is to distribute literature, and presented a list of nine trade shows they have attended or will attend.

Radziewicz said Ruidoso To You represents 53 individual businesses. She said she and Downs used to attend trade shows on behalf of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

After learning that Ruidoso To You is not non-profit, but is a private business, Junge asked, "If it's so good, why isn't the chamber doing it? Why isn't it subsidized by lodgers' tax?"

"Really, you're setting up a little mini-chamber of commerce," added Junge.

"We were allocated \$6,700 to do trade shows and it was voted down by the council," explained Downs, to which Junge responded by reminding the group of elections next March.

Radziewicz responded to questions over the elimination of trade

shows by the chamber by directing SCC members to ask those questions of the chamber.

He has played quarterback for three years, linebacker two years and safety one year.


Sam Whitey: is the son of Henrietta Stonerod and the grandson of Henry and Wanda Stonerod.

Police investigate armed robbery

Ruidoso Police are investigating an armed robbery that occurred just after noon Friday at Pat Walker's Figure Salon in the Gateway Shopping Center on Sudderth Drive.

Two gun-wielding hispanic males allegedly confronted the salon manager, Cruscita Chavez, and made off with \$400 in cash, according to Ruidoso Police Detective Lanny Maddox.

The subjects reportedly fled to the east on foot, possibly to a waiting vehicle, said Maddox. He said no one was physically harmed in the incident.

During an interview with Chavez on Monday, Detective Maddox prepared composite drawings of the two suspects. One is described

as 19 to 20 years old, 5'1" to 5'2" weighing 110 pounds, having long curly hair. The second suspect is alleged to have carried a blue steel gun. He is described as from 25 to 30 years old, 5'9" weighing 170 pounds, and having long, black, matted hair and a day's growth of beard.

Maddox said the investigation is continuing.

In a separate case, police arrested a 25-year-old Ruidoso man, David W. Lambert, in connection with a series of tire thefts at Sierra Blanca Motors and High Country Motors, according to Maddox.

Police received information Monday night of a suspicious person on the lot at Sierra Blanca Motors and

picked up Lambert, apparently in the process of removing spare tires from vehicles on the lot, said Maddox. He said the suspect was interviewed and linked to the previous thefts of tires. More than a dozen spare tires have been reported missing over the past month, according to police reports.

Police said six tires and wheels were recovered, some at the scene of the arrest and some the next day.

Lambert was formally charged in Magistrate Court on three felony counts of larceny over \$250, and one count of possession of marijuana under one ounce, said Maddox. The suspect remains in Lincoln County Jail with bond set at \$5,000, no 10 percent.

Valenzuela officially removed as Downs judge

Former Ruidoso Downs Municipal Judge Martin Valenzuela has been officially removed from his post although Ruidoso Downs Trustees named a replacement for him soon after he disappeared in July.

The New Mexico Supreme Court Wednesday removed Valenzuela

from the bench and released Ruidoso's salary from paying the judge's salary of \$450 a month. Harold Mansell has been conducting court in the Downs since being named to the spot by Downs Trustees July 27.

Valenzuela, 40, faces two charges of criminal sexual contact of a

minor and has not been seen since July 21, the last day he held court. Valenzuela is believed to be hiding in Mexico.

The ruling was made retroactive to July 21, and Ruidoso Downs will be able to recover paychecks issued since then.

Indian Summer Arrives In The Mountain Land

One story goes that up in the middle west or northeast, this little warm spell after the first hard frost or snow was looked upon by the Indians as a chance to gather in their corn, squash, pumpkins and other crops—and to collect their maple syrup before the winter.

The bees working on the apples would make you think of this story.

Apples Are Great

The apples in the valleys are maturing into full ripeness. Let us go over one or two more popular varieties of the five favorites:

The Jonathan is a fine all-purpose apple, good for pies, applesauce and eating out of the hand. When you bake the Jonathan, there will be left in the pan what we used to call Apple Candy.

The Winesap is a favorite apple because of its keeping qualities. Sometimes out under the tree in the deep snow you may find Winesaps perfectly preserved in the late winter. It is a favorite for cider and vinegar, and all cooking purposes.

The Rome Beauty is one of the latest to ripen and therefore a great keeper through the winter. The Rome is a grand apple for baking, applesauce and cobbler; and can fit in well wherever an apple is needed. Our local apples are as fine as you may find anywhere in the world. And the health qualities of our old friend the apple have become more important to us through the years.

Let us send up a prayer of thanks to our Lord for the beautiful Indian Summer.

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
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

Ruidoso gridders must beat Cobre to have chance at state playoffs

Not one, but two football games will be on the minds of many Ruidoso High School football fans Friday night, November 6.

The Warriors will host Cobre at 7:30 p.m. in a must-win situation.

If Ruidoso beats Cobre, and Socorro tops Silver City on the latter's field, the Warriors will make the state playoffs.

Ruidoso is 1-2 in district play. Cobre has already clinched the district title with a 3-0 record.

Silver is 2-1 and has beaten Ruidoso. But a Socorro win over Silver (plus a Ruidoso win) will give all three teams 2-2 records.

The Warriors will then go to the state playoffs because they would have a point difference advantage (they beat Socorro by 13 points and lost to Silver by four).

But first things first for the Warriors. That is beating Cobre.

The Indians lost two non-district games this season, but have been very tough in district, crushing Socorro and Deming and edging Silver.

Cobre runs out of the Wing-T on offense (like Ruidoso).

Ricky Lozano is the Indians' top running back.

"He's quick and really hard to bring down," said Warrior head coach Cooper Henderson.

The Indians also have big offensive and defensive lines, with several players weighing over 200 pounds.

"They're a physical ball club," Henderson said. "They're a lot like Silver City."

But Ruidoso has improved greatly in the last three games.

The Warriors handily defeated Socorro, 21-8, last Friday, and are 2-7 overall.

Ruidoso's offense, which was very inconsistent in the early part of the season, gained 358 yards against Socorro.

The defense again played well as it stopped a Socorro drive near the end of the first half, which could

have turned the game around.

Junior Michael Swanner will again go at quarterback.

Tailbacks Rusty Shelton and Matthew Griego ran well against Socorro. Griego scored two touchdowns and Shelton scored one.

Jef Sherwood has done well at fullback, while Eric Ford and Jeff Arvizu had been standouts catching the ball in the past three games.

Senior Steve Terry (6-3, 210 pounds) is the biggest starter on the Warriors' improved offensive line.

Defensively, All-District first team returnee Sean Moore, cornerback Bubba Lane, tackle Shawn Mowdy, outside linebackers Griego and Dusty Beavers and inside linebacker McCabe Turner have been standouts.

"I think the key will be whether we can play to our potential," Henderson said.

The 4-4 Warrior junior varsity will end the season at Deming Saturday, November 7. The game will start at 2 p.m.



The pairings for the state AAA-division football and volleyball playoffs this year offer mixed blessings for Ruidoso High School sports teams.

The Warrior volleyball team already has qualified for the state tournament, but its final seeding will be decided on whether it takes first or second in Saturday's district finals.

If Ruidoso wins the district tournament, it will play at 10:45 a.m. Friday, November 13, against the District 5-AAA champion in the Goddard gymnasium.

If the Warriors lose the district finals, they will play at 10:45 a.m. the same day in the Roswell gymnasium against the 1-AAA champion.

But assuming the Warriors would beat their first-round foe in either scenario, they probably would end up facing a District 4-AAA team in the semi-finals.

Assuming Ruidoso wins the district title and wins its opening state-playoff game, they would play Friday night against either the District 1-AAA champion, 4-AAA runner-up or 2-AAA champion.

If Ruidoso takes second in the district and wins its opening state match, it probably would have to tangle with the 4-AAA champion in

the semi-finals.

Portales is favored to win the District 4-AAA crown and already has beaten the Warriors three times (although it took the Rams five games to win in the final match) this season.

"We don't really want to face Portales until the championship match," said Warrior head coach Pixie Arthur. "That's why it's important to win our district."

Portales took second in the state tournament last year and beat Ruidoso in the first round. Goddard, another 4-AAA team, won last year's state title but had a tough time beating the Warriors in five games this season.

Turning to football, the Warriors must beat Cobre Friday and hope Socorro tops Silver City for Ruidoso to make the playoffs.

Ruidoso would then play the District 2-AAA runner-up in a pre-playoff game Friday, November 13, or Saturday, November 14.

That probably wouldn't be too much trouble for the Warriors since District 2-AAA is not nearly as strong as District 3-AAA or District 4-AAA.

But if the Warriors won that first game, they probably would play the 5-AAA champion in the quarter-finals.

That probably would be St. Pius, a team that topped the Warriors, 23-14, earlier this season.

However, Ruidoso played St. Pius tough before losing, having a 14-7 lead early in the second half.

And if the Warriors do win that quarter-final game, they probably would have to face the District 4-AAA champion in the semi-finals (more than likely Artesia).

Artesia defeated the Warriors, 26-6, in the season opener but Ruidoso has improved since then.

So the Warrior gridgers could have an advantage in the pre-playoff game, but the going would get considerably tougher after that.

Sunland Park's record Twin Trifecta carryover was finally hit this Saturday. The excitement and tension had been building all season

as the public had not hit the wager in twelve consecutive race days and was shooting for a total of \$155,569.

Sunland will give the trip away on Saturday, Nov. 14th.

The track is anticipating a big day for Breeders Cup on November 21. The track will offer simulcast



major stakes victory of the year for Fearless Ego, who was piloted by Casey Lambert.

A \$47,640 race Fearless Ego captures Sale Futurity Sunday

Fearless Ego stormed to the lead shortly after the break and then held off a fast closing Ran A Route to earn the win in the \$47,640 Thoroughbred Sale Futurity at Sunland Park.

Piloted by Casey Lambert, Fearless Ego ran a 1:11.4 for the six furlongs and seemed to hold the track well, despite a pre-race thunderstorm that left the surface in muddy condition.

Leased to Joint Venture by James Willburn, Fearless Ego sprinted to the lead, and despite the off-track, ran a :22 second first quarter. Lambert seemed to have plenty of horse left at the end of the race when pressed by Ran A Route in the final sixteenth of a mile. The two-year-old daughter of Riley Allison Futurity winner Bold Ego, Fearless Ego was bred by J.D. Barton. After the win, Barton said, "She has the potential to race well on either the west or east coasts, but for now we'll concentrate on the Sunland Park Fall Futurity."

The filly pushed her career earnings to \$118,033 with her first prize paycheck of \$23,820. Her sixth win in 10 starts, Fearless Ego now has two major stakes wins in her first year of racing having also won the Norgor Futurity at Ruidoso Downs earlier this summer. She was third to Crusher Run in the Riley Allison Futurity here last May and her fifth

place finish in the Kachina Stakes has been her worst showing to date. Sunday marked only the third time in her career that she was not the public's favorite.

Both trainer Ralph Black Jr. and rider agreed that her trial race in which she lost a heart pounding stretch duel with Pressing The Issue, seemed to sharpen the filly for today's final. "She has a big heart, and a desire to win," said Lambert. "When she kicks in she won't let anyone pass her," he finished.

Fearless Ego paid \$9.80, \$4.20, \$4.20.

Ran A Route was made the favorite on the strength of the fastest trail time and a three-length win in the A.C. Kemp Handicap at Albuquerque. The altered son of Trade Route settled eighth in the backstretch and when asked to run, responded well, but had too much ground to make up, finishing just behind the leader to pay \$3.40, \$3.20.

A surprise third place finisher was Blue Hoss. The Charles Mattox-trained was placed near the front of the pack for most of the race and was outrun by one length for it all paying \$3.40 to show.

The rest of the field finished: Bold Serena, My Turn To Tango, Strokomo, Bold Sonogo, El Paso Gus, V.J. Pullaway, Woulda Ben, Pressing The Issue, Cornjaws.


Permits to be available for Christmas trees

Some 4,500 area families can get a Christmas tree this year for \$5 from Lincoln National Forest.

There is a limit of one application per family, and the tree must be for personal use.

Applications will be processed on a first-come, first-serve basis beginning on Thursday, November 12. These permits may be used between November 20 and Christmas. Permit holders, including organizations, are entitled to cut or dig one tree up to 10 feet tall. Trees obtained under permit may not be resold. Forest officials report 1,500 fir trees will be available along the Sunspot highway on Cloudford Ranger District, and 1,200 pinons will be available south of Glencoe or northeast of White Oaks at Chupadera on the Smokey Bear Ranger District near Ruidoso. Another 1,200 pinons are available in two areas in the Guadalupe Ranger District near Carlsbad and 600 in McDonald Flats are on the Mayhill Ranger District.

Forest officials express concern about damage caused by careless tree cutters, including cutting large trees and removing only the tops, cutting trees and abandoning them, driving vehicles off roads and littering. "The actions of a few are jeopardizing the future of the program for the many who follow the rules," says Forest Supervisor Jim Abbott. "The public has a role in promoting good forest management, and we need their cooperation in following the few simple rules listed on the permit."

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Woodcutting areas to close Nov. 30

All fuelwood areas on the Smokey Bear Ranger District will close November 30, according to a release from the U.S. Forest Service.

Permits issued after November 1 will expire on November 30.

Although, in the past, a single dead/down area has remained open throughout the winter months, all areas are included in the November 30 closure this year, to avoid resource damage resulting from vehicles using the areas during period of wet soil conditions. According to the Forest Service, the situation was compounded by the scarcity of dead/down wood available and the distance to be driven to obtain a load of wood.

The Smokey Bear District has announced green fuelwood areas have been established to alleviate this problem and provide a source of fuelwood. This allows the gathering of wood during the normally dry late spring and early summer months.

The Forest Service said low humidities in the Southwest allow for rapid drying, so that wood cut and split in the late spring and early summer will be ready to burn in the winter.

The news release continued, "The forest area is currently quite dry due to lack of rainfall, increasing the potential for wildfire. The grass fuels are cured and windy conditions will result in a rapid rate of spread if ignited."

"Precautions should be taken when refueling chainsaws, smoking or using a cooking or warming fire. The weather conditions can change quite rapidly during this time of year."

"Forest users should provide for the cold and wet of a fall storm. It is always advisable to have informed someone of your anticipated location and travel route."

Fuelwood areas, both dead/dn and green, will re-open in April 1988, if weather conditions permit.
