## Water trial starts Mon. for Village

The Village of Ruidoso will be first in line to defend its water rights against claims by the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe when the long-awaited water trial begins at 10 a.m. Monday, November 16, in Federal Court in Roswell.

Water attorney Neil Stillinger said Wednesday the village is scheduled to begin presenting witnesses at 10 a.m. in the wide-ranging case that is expected to last far into the future. The Water Defense Association and other downstream users of the Rio Ruidoso will begin testimony after the Ruidoso testimony is complete.

But, even before the case begins, Ruidoso has suffered a setback. Stillinger said the village "didn't fare too well" in a preliminary hearing on Tuesday.

Hubert Quintana, executive director of the Water Defense Association, said the results of Tuesday's hearing in Santa Fe could make it hard to present a good case.

"The judge ruled that we wouldn't be able to put on the economic impact on the village," said Stillinger. He said the village may show the impact of the Indian's proposed project on the water rights, but not the economy.


The Mescalero Apache Tribe has revealed plans to divert as much as 91 percent of the Rio Ruidoso at the point where it leaves Indian land, to the Tularosa Basin through an intricate and expensive underground pipeline system. In previous testimony, tribal witnesses have described plans to use the water for irrigation in an agricultural project.

Plans also include drilling "40 or so" deep wells in the Pajarito Mountains, with that water to be used for cattle grazing and irrigation.

Stillinger said Tuesday's ruling constrains the village from entering evidence as to the economic impact on the village economy.

"Let's say we don't have water in the Rio Ruidoso and have to go to the Eagle Creek wells, those costs won't be considered," said Stillinger. While the village will be allowed to show the impact on water rights to losing as much as 60 percent of its effluent credit, witnesses won't be allowed to place a monetary figure on that loss. He said the judge's ruling disallows the village from showing the fishing

## Stinson seated as councillor



Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. appointed Jess Stinson to serve on the Ruidoso Village Council Tuesday. Stinson will fill the slot vacated by the resignation last month of Ray Dean Carpenter.

Councillor Stinson was immediately sworn into office and took his place at the council table.

Later in the meeting the mayor made a flurry of appointments, filling out village boards and commissions that have been short members for as long as a year. The council unanimously endorsed the following mayoral appointments:

- Betty Beachum to the Economic Development Board;
- Candyce Garrett, Robert

Donaldson and Lisa Wiggins to the Planning and Zoning Commission;

- Councillor Victor Alonso to the Lincoln County Economic Development Corporation;

- Billie Clarke to the Cemetery Board;

- Walterine Hughes to the Parks and Recreation Commission;

- Councillor Elmer Pirelli to the Extra-Territorial Zoning Commission;

- Jim Baker to the Village Personnel Board.

In recommending the citizens to serve on the various groups, Davis thanked them for their willingness to serve, echoing the sentiments of Councillor Alonso who noted his appreciation of volunteers willing to serve and "try to make this a better place to live."

Also Tuesday, Ruidoso Municipal Airport manager Tim Morris reported the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport project is within a week and a half of having the paving completed. Morris asked if the council wanted to see a 20- to 30-minute videotape showing progress at the airport site from August 1 through Tuesday.

"I think we can spare 20 minutes after 20 years," noted Councillor Jerry Shaw.

Morris showed the tape, noting

"quite a bit of difference in just three months." He explained the process being used to construct the 18,000-foot runway, as well as the taxiways and tie-down aprons. Morris said the brand-new design should be economical to maintain.

The service road was completed on Monday, and work was scheduled to begin Wednesday on the gang hangar and related facilities, said Morris.

In other regular business Tuesday the council:

- Unanimously approved a retailer's liquor license for Three Bee's, 1137 Mechem Drive. It was learned that the agenda mistakenly said the license was to be "from" instead of "to" Three Bee's.

- Granted a request by Planning Administrator Margaret McDonald Lahey to continue with an application for the MainStreet Program.

- Approved vacations of right of way in two locations as recommended by the Planning and Zoning Commission. The first, at 101 Royal Drive, involves 635 square feet at 50 cents for a total of \$317.50; and the second, at 141 Juniper, is for 221 square feet at \$1 a square foot for a total of \$221.

- Enthusiastically endorsed plans by Bobby Bailey, Parks and Recreation Department head, to implement an "adopt-a-park/median" program. Bailey said the Parks and Recreation Commission recommended the program that allows individuals or groups to take on the landscaping, care and maintenance of pieces of village property under a set of strict guidelines.

- Adopted, by resolution, four minor changes to the Personnel Rules and Regulations.

- Voted unanimously to join the Water Defense Association.

- Heard from acting attorney Mike Runnels that a court case, Ruidoso Land Company versus the Village of Ruidoso, was dismissed by a District Court judge in Alamogordo. Runnels said the owner of Ruidoso Land Company, Keith Mills, demanded the village to annex certain lands, and when the village declined Mills filed the suit.

- Learned from village manager Frank Potter of plans to initiate a Keep New Mexico Beautiful project. Potter also reported he is making progress on an "ad hoc" committee he's organizing to "put small entities pulling in one direction."

- Heard a report from village engineer Mike Davalos on a rebuilding project for the first bridge in the Upper Canyon. Davalos presented his plans for the bridge and got approval to go ahead on redoing the river crossing.

- Learned from Becky Durham, Infra-Structure Division Head, that the State Highway Department will provide several directional signs requested by the village. An Upper Canyon sign will be placed at the traffic light at Sudderth and



## Eagle Creek bids high \$250,000

The low bid to build the second phase of the Eagle Creek well project is more than a quarter of a million dollars over the engineer's estimate.

Village engineer Mike Davalos and water engineer Jack Atkins opened three bids Tuesday on the pipeline and road construction project, and declared Bill McCarty Co., Inc. of Ruidoso the apparent low bidder at \$768,001.

Atkins said design engineers estimated the project would cost \$494,243.

Cons Construction had a bid of \$865,980, and Interwest offered a bid of \$957,000.

The project will include laying 8,518 linear-feet of water pipe in the roadway and constructing a road from the wellfield to the diversion structure near State Highway 37. Davalos said the U.S. Forest Service, owner of the land on which the

wells were drilled, has asked the village to move the road and place the pipeline in it.

Davalos said he wasn't surprised the bids came in over the estimate after hearing some of the concerns voiced by bidders. Storage of construction materials was one concern mentioned.

"We can do some things to help the bidders," noted Davalos, who said the village will keep the bidders' abstracts until the Ruidoso Village Council has a chance to review the bids and take action—whether that be letting the contract, or making changes and going out for bids a second time.

"Any time you come up with a project like that you hope you're in the ball park on the bids," said village manager Frank Potter after the bid opening. He said the kind of rock found in the area and floods over the past few years may have

influenced the bidders.

Potter said the village has budgeted \$500,000 for the project this year.

Village records indicate \$2,369,855 has been spent on the project since it began in 1983, with \$207,000 spent in 1984, \$1,570,263 in 1985, \$146,788 in 1986, and \$445,805 thus far in 1987.

Those funds were spent on: professional services, \$103,970; utilities, \$4,385; pipeline materials, \$9,830; replacement of distributor, \$61,763; equipping wells, \$203,273; engineering and inspection, \$137,314; water development, \$521,111; and water rights \$1,328,210.

Davalos and Atkins said they'll evaluate the components of the bid before Davalos gives his report to the Ruidoso Village Council next week.

# County commissioners rehire Road Superintendent Krieg

Lincoln County Road Superintendent Earl Krieg, who resigned from his position last month, asked the Lincoln County Commissioners to reconsider his resignation at their regular meeting on Tuesday.

A letter to the commissioners signed by 12 county road department employees asked the board to reinstate Krieg.

"The morale of the Road Department is at its highest that we have ever seen in the past six years. The personnel respect Mr. Krieg, and they go beyond their regular duties to do things right," the letter states.

"In the last two and one half years, the Road Department has upgraded more roads than was done in the last six years, and we believe the work was done right, due to the supervision of Mr. Krieg.

"Mr. Krieg and the personnel of the Road Department know that Lincoln County is short of funds, and also know that we have to get by with the equipment we have, but the mark of a good supervisor is always trying to upgrade his department. Since Mr. Krieg has been Road Superintendent, we have received a number of pieces of equipment that the Department needed."

Commissioners agreed to reinstate Krieg, who had not been replaced. There was applause in the gallery when the unanimous vote was passed. "Maybe we should have made you reapply, and then hired you at half your salary," joked Chairman John Allan Hightower. "That would have been the way to save the county some money."

The county's finances are occupying Hightower's mind, and he issued a statement to his fellow commissioners, Ralph Dunlap and Bill Karn, and to county manager Suzanne Cox and Treasurer Shirley Goodloe.

His statement reads as follows:

"I am concerned about the financial condition of Lincoln County. We continue to get requests for more money. It is a fact and should be common knowledge to the heads of the departments in the county government, that we have no excess cash balance to go to. All of our projected income has been budgeted; therefore it is critical that the departments stay within their budgets. If you have an unexpected expense it will be necessary that you make cuts within your budget to cover it. There is no general fund bail out.

"The county manager is the budget officer for the commissioners. As she well knows, it is her job to control the expenditures to keep them within the budgets. Purchasing procedures must be strictly followed or her job is impossible. As a commissioner I expect you, Suzanne, to do the job well, as you have in the past, and I give you my undivided support in the task.

"Concerning the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, I want to remind the three members of that commission who are sitting here that we passed a one mill levy to match federal grants only and not to be spent on developing the airport. I expect to defend that position vigorously.

"The treasurer's office is presently faced with the Alto Paving Assessment District collections. Shirley, I support you in enforcing this ordinance as we must and I expect you to have full cooperation from the County Attorney as needed."

In other business, the road inventory was approved, showing a slight reduction in the number of roads the county is maintaining. "We've had some closures in the Hondo Valley," Commissioner Ralph Dunlap explained.

Commissioners voted to release the funds for the Meals on Wheels program under the auspices of Ruidoso Care, Inc. The \$2,250 cost already is budgeted.

A contract with the U.S. government was signed for a lease for the Income Support Division of the Human Services Department in Carrizozo. "This lease is ridiculous," Chairman Hightower stated. "But it's what the federal government requires, and we have no recourse but to sign it." The lease is for office space for the next four years at no charge.

Steve Massey, of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District, spoke at a public hearing to explain the Community Development Block Grant program, which is available to assist with community development and housing needs within the county. No one else spoke in regard to this.

Two bids were received and opened for the purchase of a Kodak Chemistry Analyzer. Low bid, at \$7,875 was from West Texas Medical Specialties in El Paso. The other bid, from an Albuquerque firm, was for \$9,000, so the bid was awarded to West Texas Medical.

The commissioners voted to sign the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport Zoning Regulations ordinance. There was no input from the audience.

and property losses involved in the loss of water.

"We contended we could show the direct costs since the Indians showed the direct benefits," said Stillinger.

Before the first witness is called, Stillinger said he'll renew his efforts to be allowed to present the "full panoply" of evidence, by asking Judge LaFel Orman to reconsider the motion that was denied on Tuesday.

"Not allowing us to do this (present economic impacts) is, in effect, denying us due process," said Stillinger.

But, even if Judge Orman stands by his first ruling, Stillinger said he'll still have his expert witnesses enter testimony into the court records. He said he'll stick to his order of witnesses that begins with hydrology issues, goes on to the overall economy and ends with the economic impact on agriculture.

Hydrology witnesses include Sherman "Pinky" Galloway and Jack Atkins. Gary Watts will testify

over the cost/benefit ratio and feasibility of the Indians' intended projects. Miles McInnis will offer testimony over the impact of the case on the Fish and Game Department's practices in stocking the Rio Ruidoso. David Brookshire, an economics professor at the University of Arizona, will be among the village's expert witnesses. Ron Green will testify on the impact of the case on the farm economy.

Stillinger said the U.S. Attorney has told him he'll present rebuttal witnesses after each topic.

The Village Council voted Tuesday to join the Water Defense Association, but Stillinger said that won't change the way the village case will be presented.

"The only thing the Water Defense Association was going to bring in was the history," said Stillinger, adding that still will happen. "Our evidence is all geared to the village ... there is no duplication that I can see," he added.

Stillinger predicted the village case will continue through Thursday or Friday, November 19-20.

Mechem drives. A letter from the Highway Department also revealed plans to place a directional sign for Gavilan Canyon Road for west-bound U.S. Highway 70 traffic and a sign at State Highway 37 at Sutton Drive directing traffic to Gavilan Canyon Road.

—Set a meeting to review the airport master plan at 1 p.m. Tuesday, December 8, in council chambers of the Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center.

—Voted unanimously to change the polling place in municipal elections from the Ruidoso Public Library to Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center after hearing from village clerk/finance officer Leon Eggleston that the change will save the village money. Eggleston reported on changes to election laws he learned of during a recent election school in Santa Fe. He said declaration day for candidates in

March municipal elections is January 5. He said the new law requires write-in candidates to declare for office.

—Heard from Councillor Shaw of an upcoming Municipal League meeting she'll attend.

—Heard from Councillor James: "I've been reading in the newspapers quite a lot of negative things about the village and the council. I like constructive criticism, but this continued griping gets under my skin." James called for more coverage of positive issues.

—Heard Mayor Davis report on a conversation with a woman "seething" over a published report that was apparently uncomplimentary toward Ruidoso.

"We live in a very good place and we live in a very good time and our attitudes can help us quite a bit ... and I'm not quoting scripture," said Davis.

## Master Plan bids are solicited

Bids are now being taken for individuals and firms interested in developing the Capitan Master Plan, according to Mark Sawyer of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District. Sawyer addressed the Capitan Board of Trustees at their regular meeting on Monday night.

"We've already received about 18 responses," said Sawyer. "We've heard from a variety of firms." The final date to apply is November 30. Sawyer will present his findings to a special meeting of the planning and zoning committee at 7 p.m. Monday, December 7.

Mayor Benny Coker reported that he has met with Otero County Electrical Co-op concerning the demand meter billing, and had expected that this month's bill would reflect the adjustment, but it didn't. He said that he would call them again this week to remind them of the new agreement.

There was informal discussion about the electrical bill for the new water pump and a couple of the trustees wondered if perhaps a new power source should be found. "We've put \$45,000 into a power line," said Mayor Coker. "The electric company promised to give us a better deal." Currently, the village is paying \$1,064 per month for the demand meter rating, although they are pumping between 9 p.m. and 5 a.m., the off hours.


Bids for the Phase 1A and 1B work of the water plan will be let during the next two weeks. Funding for this comes from the general obligation bond that was passed last year.

Mayor Coker reported that he is working on a plan for better drainage around the high school with Superintendent of Schools Scott Childress and architect Jim French. As soon as a plan is drawn up, it will be presented to the planning and zoning committee.

## Spikers take on Kirtland Central in state tournament opener Friday

What is past is past, and the future is now.

Ruidoso High School's varsity volleyball team will open its play in the state AAA-division tournament Friday, November 13, when it meets Kirtland Central at 10:45 a.m. at Roswell High School.

All matches in the tournament will be conducted at either Roswell or Goddard High School.

The Warriors are 11-6 overall on the season after losing a heart-breaking match to Deming in the District 3-AAA finals Saturday night.

After Ruidoso won the first two games, 15-10, 16-14, Deming rallied to win the next three games, 15-13, 15-7, 15-8, for the match win, twice during the regular season and had gained the top seed for the district tournament.

But now the Warriors must con-

tend with 1-AAA champion Kirtland Central (14-2 on the season).

But if the Warriors beat Kirtland Central, they will play a semi-final match at 6 p.m. Friday in the Goddard gymnasium against the winner of the Friday match between Goddard and either St. Pius or Las Vegas-Robertson.

St. Pius played Robertson Wednesday night to determine Goddard's foe for the Friday-morning match.

The winners of the semi-final matches will play for the title at 12:30 p.m. Saturday, November 14, in the Goddard gymnasium.

The losers of the semi-final matches will play at 10:45 a.m. in the Goddard gymnasium Saturday for third place.



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

## Reporter's Round

Every now and then, I appreciate a little culture shock.

I got a good dose of that this past week. It was my birthday weekend and my longtime friend David Evan Glasser sent me a plane ticket to visit him in Philadelphia for four days. I hadn't been in Philly for ages, and it sounded like fun, so I packed my bag and hopped on a plane for the Far East.

Philadelphia is, as you know, an old city by Yankee standards. The streets of the central area are narrow, many paved in cobblestones, and the housing units are rows and rows of two-story structures made of dozens of different kinds of brick. I didn't even know there were so many kinds of brick. But I know now.

David picked me up at the airport and as we walked from the car to the apartment, at about 1 a.m., I met my first Philadelphia—a policeman who was dragging his leg and screaming (expletives-deleted) about someone who hurt him. Despite our offers to phone for an ambulance (he was limping, but we saw no blood), the policeman declined assistance but described graphically what he would do to his assailant, should their paths cross again. Then he shuffled off.

"Welcome to Philadelphia," said David.

Actually that was the scariest part of the trip. Being an ever-watchful reporter, I made notes to share with you along the way, because I couldn't afford to send everybody postcards:

I spent Friday on the beautiful campus of the University of Pennsylvania, where David teaches architecture. I walked around and eavesdropped. At one point, a panhandler approached a nearby student and asked for money. The student ignored him. "Hey, I'm trying to save up \$48,000 to buy a condo," said the panhandler. Later David and his roommate, James Moore, told me that is a standard panhandler line in the Cradle of Liberty.

—Went into the bookstore and asked the clerk if they had a Native American section. "Indians don't sell, honey," she told me, but I noticed one of those new-wave plastic wristwatches in the jewelry case. It was sort of orangey, had a stylized Indian design on it and the words "Santa Fe."

—Went into the campus bar, The Palladium, and ordered a beer. When the bartender brought it, I surprised myself by saying "Well, thank yew very much," in a thick West Texas accent. I sounded more like Franke Jarrell than like me. That caused me to laugh out loud.

The Palladium is one of those gorgeous old bars with marble-topped tables, carved gargoyle, peach-colored walls and parquet floors. There is a big mirror across

the bar, forcing you to stare at yourself as you drink beer. Within an hour of looking at my another-year-older-and-deeper-in-debt reflection, I decided to devote the rest of the weekend to panhandling, using this as my rap: "Spare change? Hey, I'm trying to save up \$5,000 to have a face lift."

Finally when I couldn't stand it any longer, I gave my seat to a Wharton business student, a young woman in a shirt and tie who was drinking a martini. I don't hang out with women in business suits who drink martinis too much down here in Nueva Mexicana so I enjoyed the novelty.

—David took me to an Italian restaurant called Victor's where all the waitpersons sing opera. I mean, right there in the restaurant, one minute the waitress is writing down your order of lasagna and the next minute she's belting out an aria from Carmen. It was really something to see and hear.

I was wearing an enamel rattlesnake pin (designed by Fritz Scholder) on my coat that night, and a nice woman came up, pointed and said "What's that?" and I replied, in my new Texas accent, "Why, that's a rattle moccasin," and she peered at it real close and said "Oh, well, it looks like a snake to me."

—We drove all around. David said: "To make sure you feel at home, I'll try to maintain an average speed of 75 miles per hour." He knows me! My favorite stop was the Mercer Museum in Doylestown (Bucks County). I had never heard of the Mercer Museum, but David promised I would like it, not telling me what kind of museum it was. The first thing I noticed is that the structure is six floors tall, made of cast concrete. Cast concrete is—well, concrete, not in blocks but smooth, like a cellar wall. You probably hadn't given much thought to this before, I know I hadn't, but you don't see too many large buildings made of cast concrete. Even the windowframes and dormers were concrete. Pretty amazing, I thought.

Inside was a huge collection of tools! Not just hammers and saws, but things like 1,000 molded metal stove fronts, tortoise shell and bone haircombs, butterchurns, winepresses, soup ladles, tiles, baskets, a gallows, a wicker coffin (my favorite), more wooden implements than you can shake a stick at, and candlesticks, carved bowls and boat prows to boot.

This guy, Henry Chapman Mercer, had made his living making tiles and meanwhile collected all the tools he could get his hands on. Then he designed and poured a fire-proof building to house them, in stages, prior to his death in 1925. It's a fascinating, thought-provoking space and well worth

seeing if you're up that way.

The only improvement I can suggest to the Mercer Museum is for them to hire guides who sing opera.

—David and James have a three-room apartment in the central city. "This is real nice," I said, looking around. "How much rent do you pay?"

"Oh, about \$325," answered David. I thought, well, that's not too bad. "That's my half," he added. "\$650?" I blurted, incredulously. "Y'all pay six-hundred-and-fifty bucks per month for this place?"

"That's real cheap, by New York standards," David explained.

That's real outrageous by New Mexican standards, I thought, Santa Fe not withstanding.

That's when I gained an insight; about how easterners work and work and work and earn and earn and what's the best they can do from all their intense work and eventual earnings?

They can buy a place in the country, a place away from the rat-race and tension of the city.

Seems to me that we in Lincoln County are already way ahead in this game.

—On Sunday we took a little six-mile walk through the crisp yellow maple and ginkgo leaves to the river, where a big boat is anchored that you can go into. It was fun to watch the waves on the water, as you know we don't have too many waves down here and I wanted to memorize them.

As we were walking to the river,

David said "Isn't it fun to think that Ben Franklin walked on these same stones?" Whew, what a concept. Despite the red, white and blue everywhere I had forgotten that Philadelphia is the birthplace of the Constitution. So, I made a point of trying to step on each and every stone in a block-long section of street to be sure that I followed in Franklin's footsteps. I probably looked like a drunk, but what did I care? Tourists can look as stupid as they want to and the natives just shrug it off.

We saw a sundial in a park but the part that casts the shadow had been broken off by vandals. David improvised by using a felt-tipped pen. Then we checked our watches, and the sundial was right on the mark.

Late on Sunday night as my plane glided down toward the little basket of jewels that is Albuquerque at midnight, I breathed a sigh of relief. It was great fun to spend some time in the big city but I missed my mountains. As I drove home Monday morning I noticed that the chamisa looked like lace in the amber waves of grain, that there was snow on the purple mountain majesty that hadn't been there when I left just four days earlier, and as soon as I hit our county, people started waving at me from their pickups. I realized then that I have even come to love those familiar signs alongside the highway cautioning us to watch for water, curves, rocks and cows.

Be it ever so humble, you know?
