## Ruidoso's up first in Mescalero water suit

A federal attorney said last year that "facts, not emotions" will decide the complicated water dispute involving water right owners in the Pecos River Basin.

And gathering those facts is proving to be a long, drawn-out process.

The Village of Ruidoso is having its "day in court" this week in Roswell, and village water attorney Neil Stillinger said after Wednesday's session the trial is moving along "slower than expected." Stillinger had expected to complete the Ruidoso case, which began Monday, this week.

"We're still plugging away on hydrology," said Stillinger, predicting testimony and rebuttals on that issue will continue through this morning (Thursday). "By tomorrow afternoon we'll be talking about economics," predicted Stillinger Wednesday.

The case, involving a claim by the Mescalero

Apache Indian Tribe to 17,941 acre-feet of water rights, has been through several stages, including the case presented last year by the State of New Mexico in five weeks of testimony. In that phase, it was learned the tribe has plans to divert as much as 91 percent of the surface water on the Rio Ruidoso at the point where it leaves the reservation. Witnesses for the tribe also revealed plans to drill deep wells in the Pajarito Mountains.

Retired Judge LaFel Oman was appointed to hear the water case that is expected to extend well into next year. The current trial is taking place in the federal courthouse in Roswell.

In a recent hearing in Santa Fe, Oman upheld motions offered by the tribe to limit testimony by one of Ruidoso's expert witnesses, to limit some hydrology testimony and to eliminate consideration of the dollars and cents impact of the loss of water rights on the village economy. Stillinger renewed his efforts to have that decision overturned when the current trial began

on Monday, but Judge Oman upheld his ruling.

Stillinger said he'll still put those witnesses on the stand so their testimony, while not considered in the judge's decision in the current case, will be a part of the record for any future appeal. Attorneys in the case have said they expect the case to end up in the U.S. Supreme Court.

Hubert Quintana, executive director of the Water Defense Association, said one reason the judge gave for not allowing the village's economic impact testimony is his belief that those impacts are secondary. Stillinger argued that they are primary, citing tourism and fishing losses.

"The judge is concerned if he allows Ruidoso to come in and quantify its losses in dollars and cents, it will open the door for all other water right holders to come in with similar cases," noted Quintana.

Attorneys for the Water Defense Association will base their case on the theory that "you can't take somebody else's property without proper compensa-

tion," said Quintana. "The judge is willing to listen to that, but he's not willing to listen to dollars and cents," he added.

The Water Defense Association is scheduled to begin presenting testimony on Monday, November 30, but the principals in the case aren't sure how the length of this current testimony will affect that part of the hearing. The trial will be in recess next week because of the Thanksgiving holiday.

The pre-trial conference, where water right owners joined in the case being heard now, was conducted just a year ago on November 24, 1986, in the courthouse in Roswell. During the year since that conference, water right owners have worked closely with attorneys, engineers, hydrologists, historians and other experts to prepare a defense against claims to water that flows through the reservation, the Village of Ruidoso and on through the Hondo Valley.

## New airport

### Tie up loose ends; prepare for opening

It's time to dip into the Village of Ruidoso bond money.

Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) Chairman Bill Karn, during a commission meeting Wednesday, instructed county manager Suzanne Cox to work out details of using those funds after the commission voted to pay bills in excess of cash available. Village manager Frank Potter said the \$2.6 million bond proceeds will be in the bank next week.

Commissioners OK'd paying Tricon-Kent, \$258,540.73; Neilsons, Inc., \$2,417,000; Leedshill-Herkenhoff, \$78,669.18; Bixby Electric, \$10,599.46; Contel, \$55.88; and Mitchell and McCormick, \$2,651.85. Cox reported that if all bills were paid, and all federal and state monies received the commission would be short \$101,432.83. Commissioner Lloyd L. Davis Jr. noted the shortage adds up to the local match to be provided by either the county or the village.

"Technically, we don't have a deficit," said Karn.

During discussions of accounts payable, Karn said former airport administrator Fred Heckman told him he has submitted his bills to the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) for review. It was noted that Heckman's bills and those of former commission attorney Steve Sanders (totaling over \$38,000) are being held until they undergo FAA scrutiny.

Cox said the FAA confirmed receiving Heckman's bills, but didn't give an estimate as to when they'll rule on how much is eligible for reimbursement. Davis said the commission is obligated for those bills, whatever the outcome of the FAA perusal.

Leedshill-Herkenhoff engineer Dumas Slade said things look good for the December 11 target date for opening the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA). He said paving is completed, and lights should be operational by December 10.

Commissioners discussed opening ceremonies, and learned from Davis that the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce and the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County (EDC) have volunteered to help put together a celebration. Davis suggested the commission begin compiling a list of people who have helped on the airport project so that they may be invited.

Ruidoso Municipal Airport manager Tim Morris said he met with chamber and EDC officials, and preliminary plans include having the opening ceremony to coincide with the inaugural flight of Mesa Airlines.

In other regular business Wednesday the commission:

—Approved a \$464,175.10 change order for Tricon-Kent, increasing the contract from \$2,484,595.00 to \$2,948,770.10. Commissioner Ralph Dunlap opposed the action, saying he just received the change order and hadn't had time to review it.

—Unanimously approved an easement agreement with the owners of property where a non-directional beacon will be located.

—Authorized expenditures of up to \$25,000 for the Village of Ruidoso to install water pipes to the interim terminal building at the new airport.

—Discussed a possible agreement with New Mexico State University over cattle grazing on or near airport land. Morris, who warned the commission of the danger of fencing off some areas of airport land, was instructed to work out details of fencing and cattle guards and report back to the commission.



### The north face

Sierra Blanca's northern side is framed by bare aspen trees as snows begin to accumulate on the rocky peak. The cold northern side of the 12,003-foot summit, not visible from Ruidoso, will be snow-covered until spring—unlike the sunny south side, where snows melt more quickly. Ski Apache Resort, now being prepared for a Thanksgiving Day opening, also has mostly northern slopes, and snows there, too, will be preserved.

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## Grindstone Dam leaks, just like most dams

"All dams leak," answered village manager Frank Potter when asked if the Grindstone Canyon Dam is leaking.

Potter said there's no problem with the dam, which passed an inspection by the State Engineer. During the final inspection of the

gigantic structure, engineers with the State Engineer Office said little cracks, such as those in the Grindstone Canyon Dam, are to be expected, explained Potter. Engineers who designed and supervised the construction, as well as those with the State Engineer, said

as more water is pumped into the dam, the concrete will swell and settle.

Fill operations are currently at a standstill while water engineer Jack Atkins is working with the State Engineer on details of how the water will be taken and recorded,

said Potter. "That's the only thing we lack," he added.

While the dam was being filled, the reservoir was gaining two feet of water every four days, said Potter. He said the small leaks "are just what we expected."

## Lodgers' Tax Committee backs trade show group

The Lodgers' Tax Committee, at their regular meeting Wednesday, voted to recommend to the Ruidoso Village Council that \$1,500 be paid out of the council approved advertising fund to the Ruidoso To You organization, to enable them to hand out brochures at two trade shows on their upcoming calendar.

Hank Evaro, Dan Kelley and Don Parsons voted for the recommendation, with Mike Warren voting no.

"The main thing is that these women hand out Ruidoso brochures, and they need to be funded," said Dan Kelley. "The community showed their approval of the trade show idea, 56 local businesses support Ruidoso To You. We've received some positive feedback about this. I think they are a worthwhile form of advertising for the community."

Ruidoso To You is headed by Nancy Radziewicz and Barbara Downs.

The council previously vetoed support for trade show handouts and instead agreed to spend advertising money on Ruidoso pins.

When questioned by Convention and Visitors Bureau Director Liz Groenendyk as to why the village is being asked to pay 3.5 times as much for their handouts as private businesses are paying, Radziewicz replied that 1.5 cents per brochure is a standard rate, and that the for-profit organization hands out more village brochures than it passes out individual business literature.

Bill Hirschfeld, committee chair, agreed to write a letter expressing

the committee vote to the council, and to have their concern listed on the agenda for Tuesday's meeting.

There was a 46 percent increase in lodgers' tax collections in the month of September, according to a report by Tammie Maddox. "This includes a lot of delinquent collec-

tions, but it's a solid increase." In September, \$17,360.91 was collected.

"This is the first time I've seen an increase in the one and a half years I've been on the committee," said committee member Kelley. "We

should analyze this, ask 'why?'"

"I believe our fall efforts, and the work of the Convention and Visitors Bureau, is paying off," commented Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce executive director John Jeffers. "We should also see a good October accounting."

# New zoning ordinance

## P&Z approves, sends proposal on to council

"Once again we find ourselves in a public hearing for the zoning ordinance," said Planning and Zoning Commission Chairman David Smith as he opened the "last" such hearing on Monday.

After three years of writing, rewriting and review, at least two public hearings and one "final approval," the commission unanimously adopted the proposed zoning ordinance during Monday's public hearing. Smith said the action by P&Z is simply a recommendation for the Ruidoso Village Council to enact the ordinance.

"It's up to them," said Smith, noting the council will conduct its own public hearing before acting on the ordinance.

Just three members of the public were on hand for the hearing.

"I'd be more concerned about public input if this wasn't essentially the same document reviewed in a past public hearing," said Smith. He said changes were made to the forest-hillside protection zone after testimony during that previous meeting by Steve Makowski of the U.S. Forest Service.

Tim Collins questioned the commission over the minimum lot width in neighborhood commercial zones and the three percent grade recommended for commercial parking lot, with the commission amending the allowable grade to five percent.

Discussions followed on a section in the ordinance requiring a property owner requesting a variance to obtain names of property owners within a 100-foot radius so they can be notified of the request.

Commissioner Ken Carr suggested a lot of burden was being

placed on the property owners. Planning administrator Margaret McDonald Lahey said she provides a map and shows the requestor how to figure what lots are included in the 100-foot area. She said the county provides the names and addresses.

It was learned that the new ordinance sets the application fee on a zoning request at \$500 and the fee for a variance at \$100. Lahey said the attorney's charge on a variance is in addition to the application fee.

Lahey said when the ordinance is officially adopted a blanket variance will make every structure in the village legal, with variances needed only for new construction in the future. She said a section describing "sub-standard" lots will take care of past problems of building on small lots in older subdivisions.

"I don't think you're going to be


able to write an ordinance where there's no need for a variance," noted Commissioner Robert Donaldson. "The Village Council is trying to figure out how to do that," retorted Lahey.

"There is no pride of ownership (the ordinance) has been written by so many," noted Commissioner John White as the document was amended Monday.

"This would make the constitutional convention look simple," quipped acting village attorney Mike Runnels.

"Hopefully this will be the beginning of the end," said Smith after the commission voted unanimously in favor of sending the proposal on for council scrutiny.

Public input will be solicited on a zoning map and the comprehensive plan to be enacted along with the new zoning ordinance.



## Council delays taking action on Eagle Creek bids

The Ruidoso Village Council, during a special meeting Tuesday, tabled bids to build a road and pipeline for the Eagle Creek well field.

But not before Councillor J.D. James objected strongly to several points in the bidding documents.

"Who is the engineer that made out the estimates?" asked James, red-faced over huge differences in the estimate and the lowest bid on pipeline. "What I'm looking at here is ridiculous," said James.

James apparently was speaking of water engineer Jack Atkins, who holds the contract as water engineer for the village.

Village engineer Mike Davalos explained that cost estimates were prepared at least a year before the bids were solicited, and members of the council agreed that time could impact the cost of materials.

"Not that much—\$17 to \$32," inserted James angrily. He wanted to know why the village doesn't buy its own pipe.

Acting attorney Mike Runnels said the bids weren't written for the village to buy materials, but that could be offered as an option if the current bids are rejected and the bidding process repeated. Later in the meeting purchasing agent Fonda McLain described some problems that could accompany the village going out for bids separately for materials.

Village manager Frank Potter said the village normally bids an

entire public works project of over \$25,000—including labor, materials and equipment.

James also questioned the 15 percent engineering fee, estimated at \$74,000. "If this bid goes up... then he'll be due some more money," said James. Davalos said the engineering fee is already paid, and Potter said it isn't subject to change unless further work is contracted.

"From the looks of this bid, he (the engineer) didn't make a field visit," opined James.

Councillor Jerry Shaw, noting that she, too, is tired of bids coming in over the estimate, said the engineer on the project should be very familiar with the Eagle Creek well field.

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. said the Water Department head was surprised that bids were as low as the ones received since the last two winters "have taken a toll up there."

Potter said money is available for the project in spite of a change in the village cash flow. He said auditor John Varley had prepared three options for phasing the project, but the whole thing was tabled before hearing from Varley.

Issues brought up include the amount of money being spent on the water case with the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe, and the water treatment plant planned for Grindstone Canyon Dam.

Potter said the bids are good for 30 days, and Davalos said that

details of those bids are not public information during that time. Davalos also warned of a possible need for Eagle Creek water during next spring and summer.

"It's a probability," noted Davalos. "What action do we take to protect our water source?" he asked.

"Run it down the creek bed," said James. But the mayor reminded the council of an obligation to the U.S. Forest Service to provide a road.

Also Tuesday the council heard a report on insurance coverage from Tom Rabourn, and accepted his recommendation on auto and general liability insurance coverage through New Mexico Self-Insurers' Fund (NMSIF). Dave Parks of Perreet-Parks is the local agent for the plan.

Rabourn said the village previously has had coverage spread among a number of agents, but will get better coverage for less money by combining the policies.

Annual cost with NMSIF was listed at \$114,649, with an additional extended coverage amount of \$7,000 for the first year. The other bid received was for \$132,292, from Twin City represented by the Insurance Center of Ruidoso.

"Without question the NMSIF program offers better coverage at a lower cost," said Rabourn.

Ken Buckley warned that NMSIF is not under the authority of the state insurance commission, and

warned that self-insurance could bankrupt the village. He said participants in the plan are subject to assessments.

Runnels said NMSIF was established by state statutes, and Shaw said the plan was formed through Municipal League to stabilize the insurance market.

Parks, who submitted the self-insurance plan noted his own mixed feelings, as an independent insurance agent, in offering the bid. "It's like your 18-year-old daughter bringing home a Gideon's Bible," quipped Parks.

He said he knew of no assessments, and assured the council the plan has secure backing.

"As far as I can tell they're equitably financed," said Rabourn, standing by his recommendation. The council adopted the plan in a unanimous vote.

In other business at the special meeting the council:

- Approved a dispenser's liquor license for Nottingham's Pub.
- Heard from Potter that the water case involving the Village of Ruidoso and the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe is under way in Roswell. He said the village already has spent about \$240,000 in defending its water rights.
- Councillors then went into executive session to discuss personnel and pending litigation.

## Sen. Bingaman pushes for new Ruidoso post office

Senator Jeff Bingaman has asked that Ruidoso and two other New Mexico communities be put on a priority list to receive new post offices in fiscal year 1988, according to a news release from the senator's office.

Bingaman included Ruidoso, Belen and Alamogordo in a letter to Postmaster General Preston R. Tisch, which urged the new post offices be given top priority.

"I understand the Postal Service has conducted site reviews in these three communities and has determined that new facilities are critically needed," Bingaman said in the letter to Tisch. "I support this analysis and request that these projects be included in this year's project priority list."

Bingaman also told Tisch: "As you know, New Mexico is largely a rural state and thus requires local post office service in order to adequately meet the needs of individual communities."

Present facilities in all three towns are considered inadequate by the Postal Service, which is now in the process of reviewing and establishing priorities for new post office projects throughout the country for fiscal year 1988.

## Planning and Zoning gains three members, loses one

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z), plagued during past weeks with attendance problems, welcomed three new members and learned of another resignation during Monday's regular meeting.

Commission Chairman David Smith welcomed Candyce Garrett, Lisa Wiggins and Robert Donaldson, and learned of Commissioner Marie Rooney's resignation. That left the nine-member group with only eight members, even after the mayor's three latest appointments.

Former Commissioner Jess Stinson tendered his resignation last week when he was appointed to the Ruidoso Village Council. Former Commissioner J.D. James also left P&Z when he was appointed to the council last May.

Two recent meetings were cancelled for lack of a quorum, but Monday the commission was seven members strong as the three newcomers were seated along with Chairman Smith and commissioners Ellen Long, John White and Ken Carr. Commissioner Eddie Nichols was absent.

In regular business Monday the commission turned down a request for a rezone, approved two

variances, approved a replat and tabled action on a request to name a street after a former resident.

Discussions of a request to name a dedicated street after long-time summer resident Burt F. Jenness ran into a snag when a counter-request was announced by a property owner asking to have the short circular street vacated.

Rosalva Jenness submitted a petition signed by various property owners asking to have the unnamed circle in Lot E of Central Subdivision named in memory of her husband, who practiced medicine in Ruidoso during the summer seasons for nearly 20 years. Dr. Jenness died October 13, 1971.

But attorney Ron Harris, representing the Ogilvies who own the property closest to the street, which commissioners said resembles a private drive, asked to have the street vacated and offered to provide an easement to the one lot which is accessed through the street. Harris contended the village has never maintained the road.

Harris said his client has no opposition to naming a street after Dr. Jenness, in fact "encourages it," but asked that village staff locate another street to be so named.

In the discussion phase of the meeting, Commissioner White continued to press for an opportunity to speak in closed session of problems

with village staff. Acting village attorney Mike Runnels explained the Open Meetings Law to White, who was advised to take personnel problems to the Ruidoso Village Council.

"You've got to deal with the people who have the authority to hire, fire and discipline," said Runnels.

In regular business the commission:

- Denied a zone change for property at 225 Oak Drive, located on lots 11 and 12, Block 21, Unit 3 of Ponderosa Heights Subdivision. The applicant asked for a rezone from multi-family (R-2) to mobile homes (R-3), but commissioners voted no for a variety of reasons, including the opposition by adjacent property owners.
- Approved unanimously a seven-foot side property line variance for the owners of 212 Coconino Lane to construct a free-standing carport. The commission stipulated the carport not be enclosed on more than two sides.
- Approved, subject to approval by the Lincoln County Commission, a replat of a two-and-a-half acre lot in Block I, K and M of Middle Cedar Subdivision.
- Amended a variance granted previously upon hearing new evidence.

## The Silver Lining

### First Snow Flakes

On the fifteenth of November, right in the middle of the Thankful Month, the west wind began blowing down the vale about mid-morning. And about early afternoon there was a flavor of snow in the taste of the air, laden also with the fragrance of the autumn leaves which had been touched with the frost of the night before, and which now came flying over the land, bouncing along over the meadows, swirling over banks and draws. Some flew into the river where they became little dreamboats of Thanksgiving time, bobbing and whirling on the wavelets of the clear winding stream.

Some of their wind-borne leaves landed in the evergreens and in the oak trees, where some golden leaves still waved, braving the western gale. The flying leaves, wandering pilgrims in the western wind, seemed not ready to leave their trees—having had their hold loosed by the western blast—so they had landed in the branches of other trees along the way where they clung and lingered, happy to remain on their adopted trees.

### The Pilgrim Fathers

Somehow these air-wandering leaves reminded me of our Pilgrim Fathers. One hundred and two men, women and children, sailing on the Mayflower, left Plymouth Headed for September six, 1620, headed for

Virginia. They lost their way and finally landed away to the north on the coast of what is now Massachusetts, December twenty-one, of the same year. Here they founded the first colony of New England writing a sacred chapter in the history of our country.

In a strange land during one of the most severe winters in many years, the Pilgrims knelt upon the new ground in thanksgiving to God—for their deliverance from the waves of the raging sea, and for their new home, although it was a strange land

of deep forest mountain wilderness. Their struggle through that first winter was hard; and for one thing they were especially thankful was the help given them by the Native Americans.

Although thankfulness filled their hearts all through that winter, the Pilgrims had still more reason to be grateful the following autumn. The Indians had helped them plant new food crops, especially pumpkins, squash, beans and corn.

That November of 1621 the Pilgrims invited their Indian neighbors to a feast, celebrating their thanks to God for the bountiful harvest. This was the first Thanksgiving celebration, which has been handed down to this day. This season is especially and typically American, for one reason because the Native Americans and Pilgrims from across the vast ocean joined together in thankfulness on that first thanksgiving.

### Crimson Snow Clouds

Getting back to the snow on the fifteenth, after the west wind had been

singing down the valley all day, late in the evening just at sunset, there came a lull in the gale.

You looked up the valley, and all across the western hills and the sky you could see the silvery veil moving down towards you. Suddenly from the sun behind beams crimson and gold light of sunset colors transforming the vast snow cloud into an airy mass of gold and crimson snow. As the cloud came closer and closer each of the numberless snow flakes carried with it the sunset colors of ruby and crimson-gold.

Very soon the flakes came flying and swirling into the vale, across the meadows, up the little road and around the house. The sun faded behind the hill, and the flying flakes caught the lighter faint gold of the gloaming.

And then in the dusk the flying snow drops were white against the gray world.

The blessed snow, the first flakes of the year, awakened within you a deep gratefulness for the simple precious blessings given to us by Our Lord.

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
### Strange bird

## High parent-teacher conference attendance reported to school board

Parent-teacher conferences at Capitan High School met with a 97 percent attendance rate, principal Larry DeWees told the Board of Education at their regular meeting on Monday.

"It became sort of a social event," said DeWees. "97 percent is almost unheard of. Usually if a school can bring out 50 percent of the parents, that is exceptional. The fact that we got 97 percent to attend shows the moral character of the community, and how much they care about their young people."

Elementary school principal Jerry Newsom reported a 85 percent attendance for his parent-teacher conferences. "I believe we can solve any problem, if the parents and the teachers can get together and talk like this," he said. "We want the parents involved at everything at the high school," Principal DeWees stated. "We want and need input from the parents in every aspect of schooling."

In other business, the board did some routine bill paying, approved a change order to American Fence Co. for changes in the fencing surrounding the new athletic field, approved the joint powers agreement in order to allow a four-year-old Capitan resident to attend special education classes in Ruidoso, and approved a request to purchase a new bus to replace an old one that was manufactured in 1974.

An addition to the discipline policy was approved, stating that school authorities will attempt to contact parents before disciplinary procedures are instituted, rather than reading that contact would

definitely be made. "Sometimes parents simply cannot be contacted by phone, and days go by between a student's disobedience and the disciplinary procedure," explained Principal DeWees. "The time lapse renders the punishment ineffective."

The board, led by acting president Preston Stone (because of the absence of Board President James McDaniel), had some discussion and agreed that the less lapse of time between the disobedience and the disciplinary action, the better as far as they are concerned.

Parents still have a right to indicate that they do not want their child to be spanked, but it should be put in writing.

Don Eckland, president of the Athletic Booster Club, made a report to the group praising the efforts of Capitan high school sportspeople and thanking football coach Blaine Miller for allowing the parents and boosters to see films of the previous games in the recent state semi-finals. However, Eckland felt that there was good coaching but poor officiating at the playoffs, and wondered if something could be done about choosing more professional officials.

Board member Tom Trost voiced his belief that as a rule, officials do not win or lose a game for a team.

Eckland replied, "But that's exactly what did happen in our game with Cloudcroft. The officials made a bad call in a 0 to 0 game during sudden death overtime."

Principal DeWees explained that the schools have no say in who officiates at state athletic events, that schools can only turn in their

schedules to the state Athletic Activities Association. The Association then assigns officials via the state commissioner system.

Superintendent Scott Childress informed the board that Allan Roofing of Roswell has agreed to fix the high school roof.

Jim French, architect of the new athletic field, reported that the athletic track is now completely finished, and that the field lighting has been determined to have an average foot candle rating of 33.56. This is over the average rating specified at 30.

The lighting system, which has been discussed at past board meetings, consists of four T-shaped light trees on poles, each holding nine high-power bulbs. There had been some concern on the part of the school board as to how burned-out bulbs would be replaced, and a study was done showing that adding climbing pegs to the poles would cost around \$4,000, but calling in a special truck to replace bulbs would cost around \$410. Therefore, the board has decided not to add climbing pegs to the poles.

"The bulbs are guaranteed for an average of six to 10 years each," explained board member Hollis Fuchs. "So it is more cost-efficient to have professionals deal with replacing them when the time comes, rather than installing climbing devices to do it ourselves."

Childress recommended to the board that \$1,600 of a payment due to Ted Conley of Conley Nursery for seeding the field be held until spring, when it can be determined how much of the seeding actually germinated.

Conley protested this action. "I

did as the architect specified," he told the board. "I'm only asking for payment for the work I did. I am not an architect, and I did exactly what was specified."

"We are taking the architect's recommendation and withholding part of your payment until we can see how much growth is actually present in spring," Childress replied, reiterating that the payment would not be immediately forthcoming.

Conley then left the meeting room abruptly.

There was discussion about the discus throw area of the track, and several board members and Principal DeWees commented that they had never seen a throw area paved in track surface before. Architect French agreed to work with them to modify the throwing surface.

Although American Fence has submitted its final bill, French informed the board that they did not charge for some additional fencing that was added onto the original order. "They must have overlooked it in their accounting," French

stated. "Although they have submitted their final bill, it is my opinion that there is a moral obligation to pay for the additional fencing, and would recommend that you inform them of their under-billing."

Childress told the board that he is working with architect French and the Capitan Planning and Zoning Committee, and with the state, to develop a better drainage system around the playing field.

"This is a historical problem, and not the fault of our construction," stated board member Fuchs, whose home is located in the path of the heaviest part of the drainage during rains.

"The state is willing to help schools with problems like this, so in turn we can help the community

solve it," explained Childress. The board approved Childress' supervisory model, and also the new termination policy.

Also approved was a facilities use policy developed by the law firm of Simons, Cuddy and Friedman of Santa Fe, stipulating insurance liability and suggesting ways in which the community, as well as the schools, can make use of the new track and field.

Enrollment of Capitan schools is currently at 508 students, up from a count of 481 at this same time last year. The board discussed, but did not act on, the possibility of hiring another special education teacher although finding classroom space would be a problem.

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

Operational took the lead late in the race, but could not keep up with the winner and settled for second to pay \$8.20, \$2.60.

Addendum was third, \$2.40. Owned by Ben Peeples, Painted Warrior covered the mile in 1:40.2. Trained by Bill Thompson, the four-year-old roan was the first of two winners for the owner/trainer combination.

Also on Friday, Grady Overton's Breezings Tera breezed to lead all qualifiers for the Tri-State Futurity. The two-year-old ran six furlongs in 1:12.1 and will head the field for the \$40,000 est. final on Sunday, November 29.

The final field will include Cuban Jinski, who won the other trial heat

by a big 3 and 1/2 length margin, and the others in the race include; Wonder Walk, Cindyntina, Darren's Pride, Snow Pal, Hot And Dry, Clipper Rig, Spook's Speed, E.E.'s Angel, Miss Rhonda, and Glitter Palace.

On Friday jockey Mike Lidberg went down after the running of the first race when his mount Pass N Play stumbled after the finish. Lidberg was thrown to the ground and was taken to a local hospital where it was determined he had sustained a broken right ankle. Lidberg was later released and will be out of action for a few weeks. Lidberg is seeking his third straight riding championship at this track and had just crept to the top of the standings last Wednesday.

Rider Pedro Benitez rode three winners on Friday to earn a tie in the leading rider standings along with Lidberg. Benitez rode winners in the sixth, eighth, and tenth races to notch his 17th win of the season.

Cash Is Easy ran the race of his young career at the two-year-old stepped off a come-from-behind win in Sunday's \$83,290 All American Sale Futurity.

The gray had been running against the best on the west coast before traveling to Sunland for the Oct. 30th trials and had not won a race in nine previous starts. Owners Hal Earnhardt and Mike Pegrani had enough confidence in their runner to bring in Eddie Garcia to ride. Garcia currently leads the rider standings at Los Alamitos, and he brought Cash Is Easy flying down the lane for a head win in :19.80. That wind-aided effort earned a 96 speed index and the fastest 400 yard time this year at the distance.

First prize in the event was worth \$41,645.

Following the winner across the line was Chilita. My Easy Quest, Kung Fu Rebel, Dark Terminator, Blue Effort, Masters Moon Bar, Cash Event, Bobabon, and Maurys Moolah.

Also on Sunday rider Quyet Bui took riding honors with a triple. He rode Free World to a narrow nose win in the third race, then followed with two dramatic late charges aboard Swancey boy in the eighth and Draconic Scoutess in the 11th.

Saturday, Nov. 14th action saw Woodyouance continue her domination of the two-year-old ranks here with a big four length win in the \$4,000 added City Of Alamogordo Stakes.

Mike Clark piloted the distaffer to her fifth win in twelve starts pushing her career earnings over the \$132,000 mark. The New Mexico-bred daughter of Choreographer ran off six furlongs in 1:13 flat and beat Woulda Ben and My Turn To Tango.

Saturday saw Strate And Easy win by the narrowest of margins and post the fastest qualifying time in the trials for the grade III Sunland Park Fall Quarter Horse Derby.

Other trial winners were The Red Rocker and Flight Wind. Ridden by Richard Bickel, Strate And Easy notched the fastest time of :21.685 for 440 yards, and beat out 20 other hopefuls for the top spot. Strate And Easy will be looking for top money in the \$22,886 final on November 29th, but will be challenged by: Miss April 001, :21.690; Armajet, :21.760; The Red Rocker, :21.765; Flight Wind, :21.775; Raise A Roula, :21.830; Special Victory, :21.845; Interstate Ten, :21.865; Desperate Woman, :21.900; Charge It To Go, :21.910.

After the third trial was run, rider Robert Roller was thrown completely over the rail and into the infield when his mount Granny Polly stumbled and fell while easing up.

Roller was admitted to a local hospital for observation, but after the accident x-rays showed no broken bones or other serious injury.

Jockey Mike Lidberg was also injured after the running of the first race on Friday, Nov. 13th. Lidberg was aboard Pass N Play when the four-year-old fell after the wire. Lidberg's x-rays showed Sunland's two time riding champ had suffered a broken right ankle and will be sidelined for at least four weeks.

Friday trials determined the final field for the Tri-State Thoroughbred Futurity. Grady Overton's Breezings Tera breezed to a six furlong win in 1:12.1 to lead all qualifiers for the \$42,590 final on Sunday, November 29th. The other trial winner was Cuban Jinski and joining the top two in the gate will be; Wonder Walk, Darren's Pride, Snow Pal, Hot And Dry, Clipper Rig, Spook's Speed, E.E.'s Angel, Miss Rhonda, and Glitter Palace.

Jockey Pedro Benitez had a three win day on Friday and with his weekend performance has crept to the top of the rider standings.

Sunland Park is off to a record breaking pace for the 1987-88 season. Through the first 21 days of the season, the pari-mutuel handle is up 47.18 percent over one year ago.

Total attendance to date is up 22.66 percent, from 44,443 to 54,515 this year.

Thus far, a total of \$5,982,049 has been sent through the mutuel machines as compared to \$4,064,462 last season. Figures represent 21 race days compared to 17 last year, but when throwing those extra (Wednesday) days out, the track's Daily Average Handle is still up 27.60 percent.

Saturday, November 21 is Breeder's Cup Day and to fit in all the action, Sunland Park has announced an early post time of 11:45 a.m. In addition to live racing, Sunland will host five Breeder's Cup races for fans to watch and wager on.

The track will present 10 live races that day including the \$8,000 added City Of El Paso Handicap. The race for three-year-old and up fillies and mares will cover five and one-half furlongs and has drawn Queen Draconic to challenge 11 others.

Queen Draconic won the Don Lewis Memorial handicap here on October 16th by an impressive 2 and 1/2 lengths and has been assigned highweight of 120. The others include; Laurels Prospect, 119; Ruffetta, 116; Two Eyed Tootie, 116; Fleet Foot Colleen, 116; Night Girl, 116; Scouts Partner, 115; Lovely Glass, 114; No Help Belle, 114; Barbara Seville, 113; Lestor Quest, 111; Miss Pecos County, 110.

Fans will be able to see and wager on the best horse racing in the world on Saturday including; Breeder's Cup Sprint- The six furlong test will send Pine Tree Lane against tough competition that includes Groovy and world record holder Zany Tactics.

Breeder's Cup Mile- Though she finished last in the Yellow Ribbon on Sunday, Short Sleeves will be among the favorites in a field that could include European Group 1 winner Miesque, and Temperate Sil.

Breeder's Cup Juvenile- Tejano, Parlay Me and Young American Stakes winner Fliry Ensign are expected in the field.

Breeder's Cup Turf- Theatrical, Rivlia, Louis Le Grand, and Allez Milord are a few of the names mentioned for running in the \$2,000,000 1 and 1 mile test.

Breeder's Cup Classic- A \$3,000,000 purse makes it the richest race in the world and includes such standouts as Alysheba, Ferdinand, and Candi's Gold.

Fans will also be able to see the best in college football that day as Sunland will show live the Oklahoma-Nebraska, and Notre Dame-Penn State games on closed circuit.

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





There are 1,100 members anticipated to gather for the meeting, according to Ken Stone, spokesman for the local group.



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

Unemployment is unemployment, right?

Perhaps not.

In Monday's testimony in federal court in Roswell, the opening statements from lawyers were heard in the water rights case in which the Mescalero Apache Tribe has claimed nearly 18,000 acre-feet of water annually from the Hondo Basin.

Attorneys representing Mescalero and Ruidoso made statements, but here's the catch.

On one hand, attorney Leslie Seckler, representing the tribe, was allowed to speak of the "very real concerns of poverty and unemployment" on the reservation; and the tribe's plans to grow Christmas trees and strawberries with the water were mentioned (cash crops that will provide jobs).

We understand unemployment and poverty are problems on the reservation, and agree they should be addressed. But wait.

Ruidoso water attorney Neil Stillinger was not allowed to discuss the economic impact the loss of water would have on this village, namely a reduction in property values and a loss of tourism.

But wouldn't fewer tourists and a drop in property values really translate to "very real concerns of poverty and unemployment" in Ruidoso?

For an answer, think about the effect the oil and agriculture crises have had on Ruidoso, then pick up a 1983 phone book and remember all the friends and neighbors who have left the village since then to seek work elsewhere. Many others have stayed despite losses in income or employment. Fewer tourists and lower property values mean fewer jobs in Ruidoso.

Fair is fair, unemployment is unemployment. Each side in this important case should be allowed to present all the facts.—DJP



## Inside the Capitol

**SANTA FE**—To many people in the evolving Santa Fe-Albuquerque metropolis, the eastside of New Mexico is a monolith.

Everybody over there thinks alike, votes alike, looks alike, dresses alike, talks alike and they must all do about the same thing for a living.

To some extent all those characteristics are true but there are issues that separate them.

Last week, the Legislature's interim Energy, Natural Resources and Extractive Industries Committee must have decided to see if it could devise an agenda to split that monolith as soundly as possible. The agenda consisted of eminent domain issues in the morning and ethanol issues in the afternoon.

My daughter, who is a political science student at the University of New Mexico, was in town that day to interview some political leaders, pick her father's brain and attend a legislative committee meeting of her choice, on which she would write a report.

When I gave her the alternatives of committee meetings to attend, she volunteered that she couldn't think of anything much duller than hearing about eminent domain and ethanol all day. She opted to go watch Paul Kelly try to get confirmed by the Senate Rules Committee to serve on the state Personnel Board.

Actually, I hadn't given much thought to the energy committee's agenda for the day until I ran into New Mexico Oil and Gas Association Director Darwin Van De Graaff and inquired as to what he was doing that day. Van swallowed hard and said, "I've got eminent domain this morning and ethanol this afternoon."

As those of you who are familiar with the eastside know quite well, it is the oil and gas people who are in the middle of both those battles.

The eminent domain battle

centers around the problems created when oil and gas people dig up ranchers' property to bury pipelines.

Obviously, the public benefits when oil, gas and carbon dioxide are transported by underground pipelines to their destination points. These pipelines, of course, have to travel through land owned and leased by ranchers.

The problem faced by legislatures and courts throughout the years has been how to protect the rights of both groups while ensuring the public good. Eminent domain is the lawyers' terminology for the right of the state to take private property for public use.

The energy committee's vice chairman is Sen. John Morrow, who represents the four counties in northeast New Mexico. Most of it is ranchland, crossed by various pipelines. Morrow, himself, is a rancher who has gone to court to seek relief from what he feels are broken promises of a pipeline company which crossed his land.

Morrow is a man who feels strongly about the price of tea in China so you can imagine how he expressed himself on this issue. The morning session did not lack for fireworks.

The ethanol session was no less lively. I finally learned why gasoline without lead costs more than gasoline with lead.

Lead is added to gasoline to increase its octane rating, which is very important for engines. When the environmentalists said, "Get the lead out," because it was fouling up our air quality, it became necessary to find an alternate catalyst or oxidizer to boost the octane rating.

Ethanol is one of the alternative additives which has this quality. Since it is made from grain and since grain is the principle crop of east central New Mexico, we have a large group of people who are interested

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in getting that industry going in our state.

Since ethanol costs more than some other high-octane additives, the Legislature has accorded the ethanol industry a tax incentive to get started.

The ethanol industry has suffered a public relations problem from almost the very beginning. Its most serious problem has been a reputation, whether deserved or not, for causing engine problems.

Some oil companies claim that people don't want to buy their gasoline if they know it contains any ethanol. They say they wouldn't have any objection to adding ethanol to their gasoline if it would sell just as

well.

Another problem arises over liability and whose neck is on the line if someone feels he has had engine problems from gasoline with ethanol.

Rep. Blake Curtis of Clovis is not only from ethanol country but is involved in the grain business. Rep. Bob Wallach of Hobbs is in the oil business as is Rep. Dan Berry from Eunice. All are close, but not necessarily on this issue.

The only committee member who seemed disaffected was rancher, grain farmer, lawyer and Ph.D. chemical engineer Rep. Gary King who was more interested in how ethanol is made.

Just read what I wrote, thinking of you:

What can make our dreams come true or change a cloudy sky to blue?

What is the key that keeps us strong to brave the storm and carry on?

What inspires us to say, tomorrow is another day?

Another chance to do what's right, to overcome and win the fight?

What mystery gives birth to goals, and satisfies our thirsty souls?

What I'm describing we all need; without it no one's fit to lead.

It always helps when put to use and helps us bear this world's abuse.

All these needs are met with hope; that unseen strength that helps us cope.

When hard times come, hope lifts us up and, then refills our empty cup.

Today I wish from me to you, I wish for hope to see you through. What ever troubles come your way, hope promises another day!


