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Kerrville man first to land at new airport

When the wheels of Bob Woodward's T-Tail Kingair twin-engine plane touched the runway at Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA) Tuesday morning, he became the first pilot to land, officially, at the new facility on Fort Stanton Mesa.

Woodward left his home in Kerrville, Texas, last Tuesday with plans to fly into the Ruidoso Municipal Airport where he keeps his Ruidoso vehicle. He'd done the same thing many times before.

But, according to Woodward's longtime friend Greg Masters, when the pilot called in and filed his flight plan a bulletin declared the Ruidoso airport closed, with all pilots directed to land at the new airport.

And, that's just what he did. Woodward was welcomed with a handshake from SBRA manager Tim Morris.

Stranded at the new airport, Woodward called on Masters to get him back to Ruidoso to pick up his car. Masters said Woodward was pleased to be the first to land at the long-awaited airport.

"It was kind of neat," said Masters.

Meanwhile, Air Ruidoso owner and operator Helene McCoy said the transition wasn't going so well for her company on Tuesday. Her passengers ended up at one airport, while her plane was told to land at the other.

"I'm all for the airport, but it's so confusing," said McCoy. She said she asked for more public notice so her passengers could be notified.

McCoy said SBRA was scheduled to open on Tuesday, but still had barriers on the runway at 7 a.m. when Air Ruidoso had its first scheduled flight of the day. The airport apparently opened at 8:30 a.m., but that was too late for the 7 a.m. flight.

"This is very hard to run a business," said McCoy, adding she expected to receive a "letter of notice" on the move from acting village attorney Mike Runnels.

The airport's official opening is set for Friday, December 11.

Airport opens Grand opening plan: Greeters, leaders, balloons and tunes

"It's sort of everybody's show," said Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. as plans were formed for a grand opening celebration at the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA) for Friday, December 11.

And everybody will have a chance to get into the act with flags, a flying ribbon cutting ceremony, balloons, music and lots of important people.

At a planning meeting Tuesday, it was learned that 1,000 invitations will be mailed, and a public invitation distributed through an insert in The News. State Representative Ben Hall agreed to issue personal invitations to state and national lawmakers. SBRA manager Tim Morris offered to telephone officials with the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA). Planners continued to add to a growing list of people who have helped get the regional airport on Fort Stanton Mesa, and voiced concern that all the principals be invited and introduced at the ceremony.

Morris said a Mesa Airlines flight, carrying members of the news media from the Dallas, Texas, area, will land at 12:25 p.m. He said an Air Ruidoso plane will land soon after that time, bringing news media representatives from the El Paso, Texas, area.

Former Governor Toney Anaya, who was in office when the land was finally acquired for the airport, is one of the dignitaries expected to be on hand for the ceremony. Governor Garrey Carruthers has been invited, but will be unable to attend. The color guard from New Mexico Military Institute and the Ruidoso Valley Greeters are among the many groups taking part in the grand opening celebration, sponsored by the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce and the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County.

A stunt pilot will fly his small plane between two poles to cut a red, white and blue ribbon before releasing hundreds of balloons into the sky.

A reception is planned from 5-6 p.m. on opening day at the Ruidoso Financial Center.

Commission turns to business of operating newly opened airport

When the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) met Wednesday its members entered a brand-new era. After years of dreaming, planning and working, the commission was meeting to oversee an operational airport.

The Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA), the end product of the commission's years of dreams and efforts, opened for business on Tuesday.

Even as the first planes were landing and taking off from the runway on Fort Stanton Mesa, the airport commission was looking ahead to the next stage in developing the

regional airfield. Engineer Earl Cook reported the contractors at the site are finishing the current contracts, and commissioners looked ahead to further paving and developing the T-hangar area.

Pilot Merle Miller was on hand to question the commission over plans for privately owned hangars at the old airport.

SBRA manager Tim Morris explained that funding for the interim terminal and gang hangar, as well as the crash-fire-rescue building and equipment, has priority over developing an area for commercial operators to lease space. He said a

Hangar use, details still unresolved in switchover

The Ruidoso Village Council took action Wednesday to officially close the Ruidoso Municipal Airport on December 4.

With the opening of the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport on Fort

Stanton Mesa, Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. said the matter of closing the old facility was one concerning the Village of Ruidoso personnel and the Federal Aviation Administration.

"We've already moved the control tower," noted Davis.

It was agreed during the special

meeting that the transition to 10 hangar lessees and sub-lessees who had contracts as of June 30, 1987, would be allowed to fly in and out of the airport, even though the runway will be X'd out. The facility will be restricted to those few pilots, who will be asked to enter into agreements with the Village of

Ruidoso.

Village manager Frank Potter said the village will provide minimal snow removal at the facility, and the letter adopted stated that police patrols will continue at

County commission OKs paving assessment, hospital requests

The Alto Special Assessment Paving District and the Lincoln County Medical Center contract were topics of discussion during a short special meeting Wednesday of the Lincoln County Commission at the Sub-office in Ruidoso.

Joe Shain, spokesperson for Pajo Technical Services, Inc., asked the county to release the bond money to pay for the work that has been completed in Alto, and to ask for an additional \$250 change order for work to be done in spring. The commissioners approved this item.

Steve Keller, director of the Lincoln County Medical Center, asked the commission to consider signing a new contract with the Southwest Community Health Service in Albuquerque, who manage the medical center, to replace the current contract, which was in effect until 1992.

The new contract, which is a 10-year agreement, allows the possibility of acquiring additional land, if necessary. The previous contract did not allow for that option.

Commission Chairman John Hightower and Commissioner Bill Karn approved the request. Commissioner Ralph Dunlap was not present at the meeting.

The next regular meeting of the county commission will be in Carrizozo on Tuesday, December 15.

the current levels. Potter said the village has discussed the airport move with its insurance provider and "beefed up" its coverage at the new facility. He said the company will insure a restricted airport, so long as no commercial operations are carried on at the facility.

Morris explained that ground preparation for the T-hangars to be constructed is awaiting funding. He said applications are in for both the paving around that area and the crash, fire and rescue project. Davis noted that FAA has approved both applications, but the funding is on hold as Congress acts on a new Airways Improvements Program (AIP).

Davis said there has been some confusion over plans and their effects on those who lease land at the old airport and own their own buildings.

Councillor Victor Alonso explained that two kinds of hangars are involved, with T-hangar lessees able to move to new T-hangars at the SBRA on a "one-for-one" swap. Alonso said the problems seem to be with the other category—hangar owners at the old airport.

Alonso asked if a verbal "deal" had been made with those people claiming an "implied promise" was made that they could move their hangars to the new airport.

"I don't think the people that have talked to me are going to be willing to lay down and accept our interpretation," said Alonso. "I don't know what the lawyers are going to make out of the implied promise we've made them," he added.

"We've told them we're going to close the airport and we're going to move," inserted Potter. He said there are no existing contracts, and Davis said he couldn't think of anyone who was ever told they could move their hangars.

"How could anyone at the present airport have bound the new airport?" asked Davis.

Councillor Larry Simon, noting that the Village of Ruidoso has leased ground on which hangar owners have invested in buildings, asked if a special deal could be offered on the T-hangars that will be leased.

Mayor Davis answered no, adding the problem concerns less than a dozen people. "We can work this out," he said.

Later in the meeting Alonso, a pilot, questioned why the airport is open with no windsock.

"That ought to be the very first thing we need out there," said Alonso, suggesting that installing a windsock be moved up "priority-wise."

But Mayor Davis, raising his voice, told Alonso a windsock is ready and will be installed.

"There's no point in hashing it around over here for hours," said Davis. Alonso disagreed, and pressed for an answer.

Morris said three windsocks have been ordered and will be in place by December 11. Morris said some long survey flags can be placed at the end of the runway as an interim measure.

In other regular business the council authorized the final payment to Atkins Engineers for the water suit under way in Roswell. A letter from Jackie Atkins revealed the bill exceeds the \$150,000 limit by \$5,909.84. The length of court testimony and water quality analyses for Village of Ruidoso supplemental wells were given as reasons for the overrun.

Potter confirmed that expert witness testimony was lengthier than expected. He said the village intends to "recoup every penny" spent on the case.

"Lord only knows what they (the Mescalero Apache Tribe and U.S. government) spent on it," added Potter.

Davis said the case should be called the Justice Department and BIA case, rather than the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe litigation.

modular building will be on the site Monday, with space for car rental agencies and commercial operators.

After learning that the Ruidoso Village Council has declared the Ruidoso Municipal Airport a "restricted" airport, not open to commercial operations, Miller complained that he can't run his business "off a ramp out there." Miller, who said he was speaking for a group of aircraft owners, said they were all interested in expediting the move "without getting into litigation." He warned of a "case of indirect condemnation in regards to an ongoing business."

But Commissioner Lloyd L. Davis Jr. reminded Miller his pre-

sent lease is with the Village of Ruidoso—not the SBAC. He said a future lease will be negotiated with the commission. Davis said Miller was mistaken in his belief that hangars could be moved to the new facility.

Miller and Morris disagreed over past conversations involving the two and several other aircraft owners. Miller, Morris and Davis referred to possible litigation. Davis called a halt to the continuing exchange, reiterating that the matter of his present lease is one for the Village Council.

"If your intention is to sue—then it will just have to be," said Davis. During other regular business Wednesday SBAC:

—Approved paying bills, in-

cluding those of former SBAC attorney Steve Sanders and former administrator Heckman and Haworth after Cook announced the FAA has reviewed the legal/administrative bills and found \$126,633 eligible for FAA participation.

—Heard a request by Gene Parker of New Mexico State University to fence the airport property at the east end of the runway. Commissioners voted unanimously to cooperate "whenever possible," but to ask for a legal opinion before entering into an agreement with the university.

—Got a summary of costs from Cook that shows the airport project is at \$10,066,851, close to a half million dollars under original

estimates.

—Discussed opening day events set to begin at 12:25 p.m. Friday, December 11, at the airport site. SBAC Chairman Bill Karn agreed to act as master of ceremonies.

—Agreed to take action on a minimum standards document during a future meeting, after Davis read minutes of a public hearing conducted last July. He said the document went through the proper publications and hearing, but formal adoption was postponed by the old commission to give the new group a chance to review the proposal.

—Heard village manager Frank Potter say, "Up until today the Village of Ruidoso hasn't put a penny into the airport."

'Latch key' kids

Program could offer after-school activities

Are "latch key kids" a problem in the Ruidoso area?

The Parks and Recreation Commission, during its monthly meeting Wednesday, heard from educator Karen Tillman that many youngsters ride the schoolbus home each day, only to be on their own until their parents arrive after work. The group voted its unanimous support of a possible after-school program as described by Tillman.

"We just have more and more families that are not able to afford childcare," said Tillman in describing a "seed money" grant that is available through New Mexico State University. She said the grant application for \$3,000 to \$5,000 is due on December 21.

Tillman described a concept for a program that might include tutoring and a variety of activities. She said White Mountain Elementary School principal Frank Cannella has agreed the program might be housed in the White Mountain building, and school lunch coordinator Elaine McClure has said after-school snacks might be available through the commodities program.

The program as described would reach an estimated 75 youngsters and utilize volunteers in the community to offer short-term classes or programs.

Costs of the program would include paid supervision and exten-

ding the insurance coverage through the day, explained Tillman.

Bobby Bailey, head of the Parks and Recreation Department, described the sports programs already sponsored through the Village of Ruidoso. He said his department basically obtains a facility for programs that can break even, with parents taking on responsibility for the programs.

"We're not in a position to take on another program," said Bailey.

The five-member group unanimously endorsed the idea of a latch-key program that Tillman will now present for the School Board's consideration.

Also Wednesday, Chairman James Stephens welcomed new member Walterine Hughes.

In other regular business the commission:

—Heard from Bailey that his department is in the midst of installing Christmas lights in the village and irrigation at the Eagle Creek sports complex. He said he's involved in Little League and adult basketball and adult volleyball.

—Discussed the Ruidoso Beautiful project.

—Learned that a Christmas tree lighting ceremony is planned for 5:30 p.m. Monday, December 7, at the "Y." Bailey said Christmas carols will be led by Churchill Cooke, Santa Claus will distribute candy and K-Bob's will serve refreshments at the restaurant on U.S. Highway 70.

Others charged, according to a U.S. Forest Service report, include: —Ramon S. Vaguera, Algodones, possession or utilization of motorized equipment in a wilderness area. —Carlos R. Chavez, San Patricio, failure to fulfill terms of a permit. —Robert D. Bell, Roswell, cut-

ting timber without a permit.

—Prentice O. Towers, Roswell, cutting timber without a permit.

Forest Service officials report citations have been issued and cases are pending.

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
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Talent, through and through

Ruidoso State Bank Chairman of the Board Johnny Durham said after the 1985 death of his brother, Billy, a decision was made recently to sell the stock held by his estate. Johnny Durham, too, sold some of his stock, but will continue as chairman of the bank and the

holding company.

Presently, no one owns more than 15 percent of the bank's stock. The stock is held by more than 150 shareholders, mostly "spread out in the community," according to bank officials.

Two purchasers of bank stock identified during a Tuesday interview with bank officials were Phillip Mote and Bob Haynesworth. Durham, who has been in business in Ruidoso for 23 years,

said he has no intention of selling any more shares, and disputed rumors that he would be selling his business or leaving town.

"We just sold some stock," Durham said.

Durham and bank President Jack Foster reported that the bank is growing and now represents about two-thirds of the market.

"Our bank is a profitable bank," said Durham. "We're excited about the prospects in our community."


competition. Breezings Tera now has a perfect three-for-three record, having never been beaten.







Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Help! Wait! Stop!
The Capitol City and its surrounding county are about to get devastated by our own elected leaders.

First, Santa Fe Mayor Sam Pick took on the nation's third-ranking art community by resorting to some heavy-duty name-calling in order to hold his own in a heated art discussion.

Now comes Santa Fe County Commissioner Dr. Patricio Larragoite with a proposed ordinance opposing "the nuclear fuel cycle as a whole" in Santa Fe County.

This may be the classic case of biting the hand that feeds you. According to the Economic Review of 1986, published by Sunwest Bank, the Los Alamos National Laboratory is the largest employer in New Mexico with over 8,000 full-time-equivalent employees. That translates into an even larger number of total employees when part-timers are figured in.

A great many of these employees live in Santa Fe County, which extends to the eastern doorstep of Los Alamos.

In fact, Los Alamos County was carved out of parts of Sandoval and Santa Fe counties following the end of World War II when the U. S. government finally admitted there was something going on up on "the Hill." Prior to that, Los Alamos had officially existed only as a Santa Fe post office box.

Larragoite has admitted that his ordinance may adversely affect Santa Fe County's economy because of the number of residents who work at Los Alamos' major nuclear research facility. But he says he is more worried about the devastating effect on tourism if Santa Fe had a nuclear accident.

The ordinance is aimed at prohibiting any work on nuclear weapons in Santa Fe County, restricting the transportation of radioactive substances through the county, minimizing county contracts and investments with the nuclear weapons industry and opposing the nuclear fuel cycle as a whole.

Whew! That pretty well covers everything. The county has seen some successful nuclear subcontractors for Los Alamos. That would be wiped out.

Perhaps the major impact of Larragoite's ordinance would be on the transportation of nuclear weapons, the fissionable components of nuclear weapons, enriched uranium and plutonium and radioactive waste.

Larragoite's "nuclear-free" coun-

ty proposal was prompted by the transport of Los Alamos low-level nuclear waste through Santa Fe county to the Waste Isolation Pilot Project south of Carlsbad. He is worried about highway accidents and terrorist attacks on nuclear transport vehicles resulting in deadly radiation.

The radiation threat from laboratory coats and test tubes, sealed in double-walled containers, carried in crash-tested vehicles does not strike a great deal of fear in me. Neither does the threat of terrorists wanting to steal a bunch of used lab coats and equipment.

The concern about low-level nuclear waste transporting is misplaced. Why has no one ever gotten paranoid about the radioactive material which has had to be transported into Los Alamos for the past 45 years. I know they don't grow that stuff up there and they've got to have something on which to experiment.

There are stretches of both Interstate-25 and Interstate-40 in southern Santa Fe County. Larragoite wants public disclosure of any nuclear shipments through the county. That would include the nuclear weapons we hear are produced at Albuquerque's Sandia National Laboratory.

If the stories I have been hearing for years have any truth to them, the government goes to great lengths to disguise these shipments in order to protect them from terrorist ambushes. Larragoite's plan for 12-hour public notification doesn't fit too nicely with our nation's security.

Larragoite says his proposal is now in a 15-page rough-draft form. It represents three months work by "a qualified group of citizens." He plans to formally introduce the ordinance at the County Commission's Dec. 14 meeting. He had planned to wait until January to make it public but decided to release it during the Republican governors' conference to gain some extra publicity.

I've seen no evidence of the announcement garnering any extra publicity from the national media. If it did they may be scratching their heads at why the economically depressed home of "the Bomb" now wants to rid itself of anything nuclear.

Larragoite is a dentist. It may be that Santa Feans receive more radiation sitting in his dentist's chair than from the deadly trucks driving through town.

What's next for the purveyors of nuclear paranoia? Maybe they'll try to convince the Cibola County Commission to outlaw uranium mining.

If you've ever had a houseful of kids, you'll know just what I mean.

Catherine, our oldest, led us down the paths of ballet, baton twirling, Bluebirds and Camp Fire girls, softball, tennis, choir, band, French and more. We made costumes, went to recitals and concerts, traveled to tournaments and contests and went to football games—especially for the half-time show.

We even became opera fans when Catherine was in "La Boheme."

With Chuck we found ourselves drawn to soccer, Little League baseball, basketball, tennis, Indian Guides, Cub Scouts, drama, DECA, rock concerts and football. We ate hot dogs and hamburgers at the baseball field at least five nights a week for a few years and sat through millions of hours of various sports.

Bud coached soccer and baseball, and even called himself "Big Buffalo" when he and Chuck donned their feathers to attend Indian Guides. He admits he wouldn't do that for just any kid.

By the time Bethany came along, we thought we'd done it all. And we said we weren't going to do it again—"We're getting too old for all this," we warned Bethany, the baby of the family.

But we did ballet, Brownies, soccer, band, choir and school musicals. The whole family got into the act—after all hadn't this little child spent her first years going to big sister's and big brother's events?

The whole Jarrell clan traveled to a pig farm once to borrow a baby pig for Bethany to show off to her kindergarten class. Catherine said she wouldn't hold a piglet during its first trip to town for just any kid.

And so our lives have gone. We've learned that a kid can do anything he or she sets out to do, with lots of work and effort. We celebrated the successes and grieved over the

The Tops, age seven through 13, have been undaunted by teams with lots more members and much better equipment.

For gymnastics, somehow, builds a determination that I haven't seen in many other areas. They rip their hands on the bars, they fall off the beam, they sprain their ankles learning handstands and sometimes land headlong when vaulting. But the gymnasts who compete are the ones who get right back up and keep trying.

I've watched the Mountain Tops work and progress, and have noticed as their bodies get stronger and healthier, they attain a marked degree of self-confidence and personal pride. These girls may not be jumping vaults when they're 40 years old, but they've developed mental and emotional strengths that will carry them through whatever their age.

So, I keep learning, from all the bright, hard-working young people I know. They're expanding my understanding in directions I wouldn't even know enough to seek.

Thanks, kids. Keep up the good work!
