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Zoning ordinance gets dusted off for another look

The Ruidoso Village Council took a step Tuesday toward adopting a new zoning ordinance that has been in the works for close to four years.

During a regular meeting, councillors set a public hearing on the proposed zoning code and zoning map for 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, January 26, in council chambers of the Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center.

Councillor Jerry Shaw noted the proposal has been worked on during her entire four years on the council, and Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr.

agreed it has been a long time coming. Village attorney John Underwood apparently got the document back on track by coming up with a way to "grandfather" subdivisions platted before 1976 so they won't be subject to property line setback regulations.

That issue has plagued this council over and over, with the mayor insisting the setbacks established in 1976 were never intended to apply to older areas. In thanking Underwood for solving the recurring problem, Davis noted he wasn't speaking for himself when questioning the setback rules. He said he and other members of the council often

are responding to telephone calls and conversations from citizens when speaking and voting on various issues.

Members of the public will have a chance to comment on the proposal during the hearing that will take place during a regular council meeting.

Also Tuesday, councillors unanimously adopted a new agenda format, that village clerk Tammie Maddox said will make for smoother meetings. Under the new plan, the agenda will be approved and then closed at the beginning of each evening.

Audience member Al Junge ques-

tioned the council over the new agenda format, wondering if it will discourage or even shut out public comment. Mayor Davis said members of the public may be added before the agenda is closed at the start of each meeting. He told Junge that audience members always have the option of speaking to items on the agenda.

But Junge recalled a time when he asked to speak on an agenda subject, and was told he should have been on the agenda.

With barely a handful of people on hand, the mayor and councillors wished the citizens of the village a happy new year, and commented

on their optimism over the village economy. Davis said Ski Apache had its biggest attendance ever on Tuesday.

Councillors also praised village departments for their work in continuing village services in recent snows.

In other regular business Tuesday the council:

—Adopted an ordinance amending the flood hazards ordinance, enabling the Village of Ruidoso to continue participating in the National Flood Insurance Program.

—Recommended Frank Sayner, an appreciation by Mayor Davis, to serve on the Eagle Creek Inter-

Community Water Supply Board. —Unanimously approved participating in the Regional Law Enforcement Assistance Program. (RAP).

—Watched as Becky Durham of the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Chamber of Commerce presented Councillor Shaw, and her husband, Dick Shaw, with a plaque for winning first place in the residential Christmas lighting contest. Councillor Shaw noted there were only two entries in this year's contest.

Councillors J.D. James and Victor Alonso were absent from the meeting.

McKnight murders

Sheriff may make arrests in case soon

According to Lincoln County Sheriff Don Samuels, a suspect or suspects in the November 1984 Thomas P. "Cotton" and Judy McKnight slayings will soon be charged with the murders.

"It's too early to speculate how soon charges will be filed," Samuels said in a phone interview. "But I can tell you that we do have a suspect or suspects in this case. We're just waiting until we have enough evidence for an indictment."

This involves retracing three years' worth of evidence and questioning. "We did place someone under hypnosis, and that person guided us to more evidence," Samuels said. "I'm hoping to make an arrest or arrests real soon."

New Mexico scores in El Paso water case

A decision early this week by State Engineer Steve Reynolds should constrain El Paso, Texas, from taking any water out of New Mexico for the next 40 years.

Santa Fe attorney Peggy Bowen, who represented Lincoln County in the El Paso water suit, said Wednesday Reynolds found that El Paso had not shown any need of New Mexico water over the next 40-year period.

Former Lincoln County Commissioner Ken Nosker, a member of the commission that entered into the water case, said he was pleased with the decision in the case. Nosker, who testified for a week as an expert witness on the economics

and demographics of Lincoln County, praised attorneys Bowen and Steve Sanders for their work on the case.

"It's real critical that they don't get that water out of the Hueco," said Nosker. He said the Hueco Basin is located just 35 miles from the Lincoln County line. He said El Paso's plan to drill wells in that basin would have had the same effect on Lincoln County as pulling the plug and draining a bathtub.

Bowen said she was pleased with the decision, and especially pleased that Reynolds referred to some Lincoln County exhibits in his carefully worded decision.

"He was very, very careful in delineating the issues," said Bowen. Some reports indicate El Paso may appeal the ruling, but

they were not willing to use water of as poor quality as most of New Mexico," said Bowen. She argued the city of El Paso could take slightly saline water and blend with higher quality water—the practice used by more than one New Mexico municipality.

Issues in the case included water quality and the right of a municipality to condemn water rights.


Bowen said Reynolds ruled first that El Paso has to show a need for water, and second that the need is within the 40 year timeframe. He also found the city has the right to condemn water rights.

"El Paso wouldn't go out on the market and pay good, legitimate prices for water rights," noted Bowen, adding the city also was unwilling to use water with lower than average quality due to high numbers of "totally dissolved solids."

"They were arguing they were going to run out of water and yet

"We're going to have to watch every claim on our water in New Mexico," said Nosker, who is on the board of the Water Defense Association. He said water is the "lifeline" of the state. He compared another state taking New Mexico water to coming in and taking any other natural resource—like silver or oil.

"We've got to protect what we've got," said Nosker.

The regular meeting of the Board of Directors of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce opened with the pounding of a red-balloon festooned gavel as the board met for the last time in 1987.

Three new members were named to the board. They are: Steve Keller, Lincoln County Medical Center; Mike Cobb, of Cobb Commercial Service; and Ron Andrews of West Winds Lodge. These three replace Bob Bailey, Roy Crocker and Bob Boverie, who resigned in recent months.

Ronnie Paulger reported on the Economic Development Division, Leon Eggleston reported that all committees are in place with the Organizational Development Division, and Bill Hirschfeld reported on the Advertising/Promotion Division. "We are advertising, and we are promoting," Hirschfeld said in a seven-word report.

Liz Groenendyk submitted a report from the Convention and Visitors Bureau stating that the CVB has assisted 11 specific groups of people who came to Ruidoso. At

an average of \$70 per day spent on vacation, Groenendyk figures that approximately \$73,000 was spent in Ruidoso during these visits.

There was a discussion of creating a special Convention Brochure for the CVB to distribute to interested groups of people, and it was decided that the topic would again be discussed in the future.



An account has been established at The Bank of Ruidoso to aid a Ruidoso family whose home and possessions were destroyed in a Christmas Eve fire.

Kerry Rager and her five children were left homeless when their apartment at Redwood Cabins burned last Thursday. The family escaped with just the clothes they were wearing, according to a family friend.

Ruidoso Fire Department records indicate the fire, which caused \$60,000 in damages, was caused by an electrical short.

Donations of money may be made to the Kerry Rager fund at The Bank of Ruidoso, account number 838-136. Clothing and household items may be dropped off for the Rager family at KBUY/KTNT Radio Station in the Pinetree shopping center.

"She and her children lost everything," said Louise Puckett. The youngsters range in age from four to 12 years old.



Bogard had resided in Ruidoso for 10 years.

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

Willa Stone proves that you can wear pearls and stack wood at the same time! The family twins, Troy and Tracey, help their parents in all aspects of ranching, and belong to 4-H.



Stones follow challenge of ranching

The ranching life doesn't become easier in winter; it just changes focus with the season.

The Stone family of rural Capitan is one ranching group who keeps busy all year round. "All the upkeep of the ranch still needs to be done," explains Willa, who along with her husband, Preston, manages the Stone Ranch. "Every morning the ice has to be broken on the drink tubs for the stock, and of course the animals have to be fed, and we also sell wood during the fall and winter season."

The Stones have 22,000 acres of land north of the Capitan range. Whenever they clear meadowland, the wood is chopped and split and helps to provide income during the cold season. They harvest sweet-smelling cedar, pine and juniper. "We start clearing in January, and do it continually through the year," Willa says. She estimates that they stack between 70- and 100 cords annually.

The wood business is a family affair, with Willa tossing logs off the back of the red truck to Preston, who stacks them for the buyer. The couple's children, 11-year-old twins Troy and Tracey, help with all the work.

"Everything we do is family oriented," explains Willa Stone.

Young Troy expects to continue the family ranching tradition, while Tracey is fascinated with computers. "So far Troy seems more interested in working the ranch eventually, but you never know how it'll go. Tracey may be just as interested when she grows up. Ranching isn't 'just for boys,'" laughs Willa.

And she ought to know; Willa Stone is the fifth generation in her family to work the same land. Born Willa Edgar, Mrs. Stone is a "local yokel from way back," as she puts it.

The Edgar-Stone house is over 100 years old, being built in 1883. Although Willa and Preston's family occupy the dwelling now, Willa's parents, Bill and Marie Edgar, live less than a half mile away.

Preston's father worked in ranching, and Preston always wanted to make a life of working with livestock and with the land. He is one of Capitan School Board's more colorful members; he often uses animal stories to illustrate his views on child-raising and school policy. Once, during a discussion on disciplinary action in the schools, Stone remarked: "Whenever my horse needs spanking, I feel it's best to do it right away before he forgets what he did wrong."

In addition to their wood business, the Stones have an annual antelope and mule deer hunt on their land in fall. "It's an interesting way to learn about people

from other places and other backgrounds," Willa says, noting that the hunters who come each year are not locals.

Besides the 300 head of cattle the Stones keep, they also have a housecat and several "outside pets," including dogs, peacocks, pigs, cats, guineas, chickens and sheep. "Preston and I say that we have all these animals 'for the kids,' but really, it's for us," Willa laughs.

It's hard work but it's worth it, says Stone. "I just love havin' a country life," she remarks enthusiastically. "At times we get discouraged, especially financially. But we love the freedom that comes with ranching, and we love living with natural things. It is truly a way of life. When you're a rancher, you become sensitive to all life, and to the earth. Ranching makes me feel very close to all that is natural and good."

Preston Stone catches an 18" log, turns and stacks it before the next is in midair. Selling wood is one of the ways ranchers can make

a living in the winter. The Stones own a 22,000-acre spread that has been in Willa Stone's family for generations.

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

Like the Warriors, Capitan had a young team and should do better next season.


The fifth spot on the year's highlights goes to the Warrior golf team.







Former Municipal Judge Martin Valenzuela, clerk Joann Jenkins and administrator Charles Robinson left the village abruptly during 1987 and have not been seen in Ruidoso Downs Village Hall since. Their disappearances have created havoc with village records, it was learned during a report by auditor Don Wingfield. Records for the court were never turned in by Valenzuela before his disappearance, but what Wingfield could recover indicated little or no apparent criminal wrongdoing, and he advised trustees not to pursue

recovering what minimal shortages might be substantiated. But he indicated the village will recover some funds from a bonding company that covered Jenkins and Robinson, who apparently wrote their own final paychecks before leaving town. "I think they overloaded their comp time," reported the accountant. His audit noted other problems, such as too few fidelity bonds on employees, disorganized timekeeping procedures, inadequate documentation of travel expenses, incorrect accounting of grants received and segregation of duties. Many of the problems listed already have been corrected, Wingfield indicated. In other business, the trustees:

—Were introduced to court clerk Ramona Wheeler by Judge Harrold Mansell. Trustees did not act on a request by Mansell to have access to the village offices when conducting court in the adjacent meeting room. —Learned the final inspection has been done on the paving project. —Directed attorney Richard Hawthorne to prepare a measure proposing to issue revenue bonds to pay for more paving. —Heard Mayor J.C. "Jake" Harris report on the Downs Ladies Auxiliary and Texas-New Mexico Power Company's roles in hanging Christmas decorations. Trustee Leonard Bergeron was absent.

January 5 is deadline for voters in Capitan, Hondo school board elections



Editorial

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—If the Legislative Finance Committee can't agree on state budget figures now, can it get its act together by the end of the 1988 Legislature?

The general appropriations act always ends up in a House-Senate conference committee on the last night of every legislative session. The conferees appointed by each house are always LFC members so it is very likely that the disagreements of today will still be present in February.

In the meantime, House and Senate finance committees will be working without an LFC budget document in front of them for the first time in many years.

House Appropriations and Finance Committee Chairman Max Coll terms it "a strategist's dream." No one knows what effect the lack of an LFC proposal will have on the appropriations process. LFC assistant director Don Garcia says, "We're making history. There are no precedents for something like this. There's no way of knowing what will happen."

The procedure since the early 1970s has been for finance committee members to have two thick budget proposals in front of them as they deliberate the appropriations bill. One document is presented by the governor's finance people and the other comes from the LFC.

When an agency budget is considered, analysts from the governor's office and the LFC will each make a brief recommendation and then a finance committee member will usually say, "I move the governor's recommendation" or "I move the LFC recommendation."

This session there will be only the governor's written document from which to work.

That is if Gov. Garrey Carruthers gets his act together and has a document to present.

The likelihood is great that Carruthers will have something to present. Otherwise, he will be throwing away the best opportunity a governor has ever had to wield extra influence over the budget process.

The Carrutherses have not been without their budget-making problems, however.

Because the administration was not prepared, department chiefs were allowed to go before the LFC, when it began its budget hearings two months ago, and present a wish list. Carruthers had told his cabinet they wanted three budgets from each of them—a zero-increase budget and budgets five percent above and five

percent below current levels. Except for Carruthers' chief budget man, Willard Lewis, who asked the LFC for a 2.7 percent cut for his Department of Finance and Administration, all other administration requests were for tidy increases, considering the state's budget crunch.

This had presented House Democrats with a huge strategic weapon. They have taken all the budget requests, which were submitted by individual departments, lumped them together, and said we consider these to be the executive recommendations—and we support them!

The only additional recommendation we need from Carruthers at this time, continue the House Democrats, is to identify the sources for the additional revenue which will be needed.

In other words, if we're going to raise taxes, we're going to blame it on Carruthers and he's given us the perfect opportunity to do so.

The LFC Republican conservatives are not about to let that happen. They want to see about a 2.5 percent increase in the overall state budget—well within existing revenues.

Well within existing revenues, that is, if some of the food and medical rebate money is used.

If you will recall, a couple of years ago the Legislature "temporarily" suspended the food and medical rebates on our income taxes. We are supposed to start getting those rebates again in 1989. That means next year will be the last year the rebates will be suspended.

The \$45 million question is should we continue budgeting that revenue for recurring expenses such as salaries, which compose well over half the state budget.

The conservative Republican LFC members are saying the revenue is no longer recurring so we can't use it the way we have been. The liberal House LFC members are saying, gee, we need this money to fund the governor's program.

It is significant that the Senate LFC members were willing to compromise by using about \$20 million of the rebate money for recurring expenses. The House members saw that as a victory but both sides will polarize once the Legislature convenes.

The one consoling thought about New Mexico's budgeting process is that we get it over in 30 days. Congress can't get it right when given a full year.
