## Petition calls for grand jury probe of council

Ruidoso Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. and village councillors are concerned over a petition calling for a grand jury to look into their actions.

"I have violated nothing as far as state statutes," said Councillor Al Junge, and his sentiments were echoed by other members of the council contacted on Friday.

"I think that would be marvelous," said Mayor Davis, adding he can't imagine anything a grand jury could find.

The petition, if signed by the requisite number of registered voters, will be submitted to District Court, asking the judge to convene a grand jury to investigate and report on actions by Ruidoso Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. and the six members of the council.

Petitioners question if action to abolish the Engineering Department and the deputy chief of police position took place in executive session, contrary to New Mexico public policy laws.

Former village engineer Mike Davalos, whose job was wiped out in that action, is among those circulating the petition. Former build-

ing inspector Jimmy Neeley, fired last month by village manager Frank Potter, also is distributing the document.

Former Deputy Chief Jim Alston, during a Personnel Board hearing Wednesday, questioned if the action took place, contrary to the Public Meetings Act, during a closed meeting. The former employees told the Personnel Board their termination notification stated "council action" as the reason for dismissal, noting they could find no such council action in the official minutes of recent meetings.

Davis said the positions were eliminated when the Village Council adopted the budget that was submitted for approval to the State Department of Finance and Administration. "We certainly made no decision in executive session," said Davis, and members of the council agreed.

Davis said the village engineer was hired in Ruidoso's "heyday when things were going wild." He said the council was not targeting anyone in its budgetary decisions.

He said he, as well as members of the council, have had a "barrage" of complaints against Neeley, not regarding his professional abilities but over his attitude.

But petitioners have not limited the investigation to the issue of decisions in closed session, and the petition continues: "The undersigned petitioners request the grand jury to determine whether or not these elected officials have committed any capital, felonious or infamous crime and/or malfeasance in office with respect to the aforementioned actions and to determine if they have committed a violation of any other state laws."

"I don't think we did anything that wasn't on the up and up," said Councillor Elmer Pirelli. "Let the chips fall where they may," he added.

"In true conscience ... I've acted in the best interests of the village," added Pirelli.

"It's no big deal," remarked Village Councillor Tom McNeil, of the prospect of a grand jury investigation.

Councillor Larry Simon, while he has no problems with a grand jury investigation, added, "You never know what a grand jury is going to do."

Junge, unwilling to discuss something that could end up in court, questioned Neeley's and Davalos' timing. He said since the two testified before the Personnel

Board he would have thought they would wait for that decision before circulating a petition.

"Suppose either or both of them is reinstated," speculated Junge.

"We didn't start this," said Neeley Thursday. While village employees are prohibited from political activity, he and Davalos currently are not employed by the Village of Ruidoso.

Using a pop game analogy, Neeley said the village dealt the hands, forcing terminated employees into a situation that would result in the "fight or flight syndrome."

"We chose to fight," said Neeley, adding the village set the stakes as the former employees' jobs. "We are responding with the same stakes," said Neeley.

"We're getting overwhelming support," said Davalos Thursday. He and Neeley said citizens are not only signing the petition, but also asking for copies to circulate.

The two said citizens are concerned about lack of leadership, with some people voicing concern "for the basic lack of moral values among some elected officials."

Lincoln County Clerk Fran Siddens, who hasn't seen the petition, said such forms, when signed by

the required number of voters, are presented to a district judge. If the judge accepts the petition, it is passed on to the county clerk for verification and certification, she said.

According to state law, a petition to convene a grand jury must be signed by not less than 200 or five percent of registered voters, whichever is less. Lincoln County has about 6,000 registered voters, said Siddens.

District Clerk Margo Lindsey said she hasn't seen the petition, explaining it's up to the judge how the matter will be handled. District Judge Richard A. Parsons was out of his office Friday afternoon, and unavailable for comment.

The grand jury petition is one of two being distributed by Neeley and Davalos. They also are circulating a petition calling for the reorganization of village government from the council-mayor to the commission-manager form.

According to village clerk Tamie Maddox, that petition, to be valid, requires 195 signatures of registered voters who live within village limits. If it is certified, councillors will be required to call for an election on the question of

reorganization. If villagers approve the change, then the council will be charged with districting the village into five commissioner districts, and conducting a municipal election.

"It appears this is aimed directly at Mayor Davis," said Junge, who was forced to resign after a petition called for a reorganization of a former village council. In that case, Junge said some citizens wanted to replace then Mayor George White, but found their petition didn't affect the mayor's position.

Mayor Davis said that could be true. He said changing to a commission-manager government could be very expensive, recalling that Albuquerque changed from that to the mayor-council form about 10 or 12 years ago. Davis said Alamogordo and Las Cruces, both commission-manager governed, "stay in a hubbub all the time."

If the petition triggers an election, and if voters opt for the change, Davis said he won't run for office. He said he's accomplished what he wanted to over the past three years, in the development of the airport and airport road.

## Storm rains out Thursday racing

A massive storm dumped nearly three inches of rain in less than 45 minutes onto Ruidoso Downs last Thursday, causing a rare closing of the Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

Max Johnson, comptroller of the track, said the decision was made to close the track after a significant amount of the track washed away, and it was determined that it was unsafe to run horses on the surface.

Johnson said there were several places on the track where the surface soil had run off, leaving deep ruts down to the base of the track, making it a danger to the horses.

Graders and blades worked all afternoon Thursday and Friday

morning to repair the track, and Johnson said it was business as usual by Friday afternoon.

Bettors who had already placed money on horses on Thursday's racing slate were told that they could return their tickets to the track for a refund.

State Highway Department crews spent part of Thursday afternoon removing gravel and dirt that had washed onto Highway 70 after the cloudburst.

Ruidoso Downs Village employees also were kept busy sandbagging overflowing roads and arroyos, in an attempt to prevent the flooding of homes in lower elevations.

## College student electrocuted at campground

James Noel "Jim" Boverie died Friday in an electrical accident at the KOA Campgrounds near Ruidoso.

Boverie was the 21-year-old son of Robert and Phyllis Boverie of Ruidoso, and Diane and John Schattel of Austin, Texas. He was co-manager of the KOA Campgrounds for the summer season.

A 1985 graduate of Westlake High School in Austin, Boverie attended Ruidoso schools for three years. He was a former member of the Ruidoso High School band. At Westlake, Boverie was a member of the cross country track team, and

ran in several marathons in the Austin area.

Boverie had attended Eastern New Mexico University (ENMU) in Portales and the University of New Mexico in Albuquerque. He planned to return to ENMU this fall to pursue his interests in political science and history.

As a youngster, Boverie lived with his family in San Salvador, El Salvador, where he attended the American School and played soccer. When the Boverie family returned to the United States, Boverie attended school and played youth soccer in Scottsdale, Arizona.

Boverie was a member of the

Episcopal Church of the Holy Mount, and was a former acolyte.

He is survived by his parents; a brother, Rob Boverie of Chicago, Illinois; and two sisters, Michele Boverie Baker of Dallas, Texas; and Annette Boverie of Las Cruces.

Survivors include his grandparents, Estelle and Clem Boverie of Lubbock, Texas, and Amy Penny of Austin; aunts, Glenda Boverie of Lubbock, and Nita Shuffler of Austin; and an uncle, Ross Penny of Austin. Survivors include cousins Bridget Childress of Lubbock, Benjamin Boverie Shuffler of Austin and Julie Griffith of San Francisco.

## Sunday liquor sales up to Capitan voters

Once again, Capitan voters will be asked whether they want to allow the sale of alcoholic beverages by the drink on Sundays, at a special election Tuesday, July 19.

The special municipal election polls will be at the Lincoln County fairbuilding and will be open to any village resident registered to vote.

The issue has come before Capitan voters since 1985, when

the question was on a paper ballot during the general election in November. Since then, when the voters said no to Sunday sales, the question has been asked of voters every year, and every year they continue to say no.

This spring another petition calling for a special election asking voters to allow the sale of alcoholic beverages on Sunday was legally started and signed by 38 registered voters. The petition was filed at village hall, according to village

clerk Janet Keel, and the names approved by the county clerk.

Capitan and Corona are the only villages in Lincoln County which continue to ban the Sunday sales. Ruidoso Downs and Carrizozo, which previously had Sunday bans, saw their bans repealed by voters in subsequent special elections.

Those in favor of Sunday sales in Capitan claim the village is losing money in potential gross receipts taxes charged by businesses that

serve alcoholic beverages. They also claim other businesses that are open on Sundays suffer from the decreased number of people in the village because no alcoholic beverages are available.

The village businesses collect 5.75 percent of each dollar spent and send the money to the New Mexico Taxation and Revenue Department in Santa Fe. From that

## I Got It surprises field in Flying Charm 'Cap

On June 19th, I Got It, a 4-year-old quarter horse, was claimed by Bill and Janie Moore for \$3,200. Sunday, in his first race since then, I Got It won the \$10,675 Flying Charm Handicap.

Sired by the thoroughbred Master Hand, I Got It was ridden to victory by Mike Clark for trainer Tommy L. Hill.

The Moores, of Seminole, Texas, collected a first-prize check worth \$6,405.

I Got It covered the 870-yard distance in 45.76. His 112 pound assignment was the least of all the horses competing in the Handicap event. His victory, which came by a nose in a photo finish with Karl's Elfriede, boosted his lifetime earnings to almost \$24,000.

Karl's Elfriede, a 16-1 shot running in only the second race of his career, set the pace and just missed the win.

Versatile reinsman Larry Payne guided the Pat's Victory mare to the wire. Rick Anderson trains Karl's Elfriede for Nath T.B.'s Private Sale and Keith Pickering (et al) of Water Town, Minnesota.

Billy Waddell left the gate the favorite off his upset win June 18th in the Master Salls Handicap and finished third. David Lidberg rode the Blood Of The Best gelding for Billy J. Waddell and Joe B. Bates Jr. of Odessa, Texas. Rick Anderson tightened the girth.

Racing resumes Thursday at Ruidoso Downs with the Kachina Stakes Trials for 2-year-old thoroughbred fillies.

## Longshot, favorite split Jockey Club 'Cap

Split divisions of the \$15,000-added Jockey Club Handicap for 3-year-olds went postward Saturday, with longshot San Rafael Pass winning the first half of the 7 1/2 furlong test, while odds-on favorite A Bit Of Style captured the second.

Pedro Benitez kept San Rafael Pass just off the pace, then put the 3-year-old son of Pass The Tab in high gear down the stretch. The colt responded with a commanding two-length victory. It was San Rafael Pass's first stakes win in ten starts. Of those ten, he has won four and finished out of the money only twice.

San Rafael Pass, who went off at odds of 9-1, covered the distance in 1:32 over a slow surface. He is

saddled by Danny Mirabal. Mirabal shares ownership with R. Narramore and N. Frangos of Grants. First-place prize money came to \$5,760.

The consistent Winaben gelding Blue Hoss launched a late stretch kick to finish second. Charles W. Mattox saddles Blue Hoss for Mollie B. Kelly and Lorann M. Mattox of El Paso. Richard Bickel was in the irons.

Race favorite Shutup And Deal and Joe Martinez hugged the rail the entire trip to finish third. Ruidoso's E. Lee Ivey owns and trains the Draconic colt.

In the Jockey Club Handicap nightcap, the crowd's betting choice, A Bit Of Style, fared better.

A Golden Eagle II gelding, A Bit Of Style carried high-weight of 122 pounds around the Ruidoso oval and emerged with a 4 1/4 length triumph. His time for the 7 1/2 panels was 1:32 2/5.

Glen Murphy was on board A Bit Of Style for trainer Doyal Roberts Sr. Carl Davidson, of El Paso, owns the classy 3-year-old, who has now won half of his 16 lifetime starts.

El Rayito, an Advocate colt with Larry Payne on board, held second the whole trip. Doyal Roberts Sr. conditions El Rayito for Jay C. Childers of Borger, Texas.

Owner-trainer E. Lee Ivey's Knight's Odds, ridden by Duane Sterling, finished third.

Joe Martinez is on board Just Like Lace once again for the Kachina Stakes Trial.


Swap With A.J., Five R. Winner and Tricky Ego are likely to contest



## Cattle Country Art Center holds promise for promising artists

If all goes according to plan, Capitan may very well be the new arts center of southeastern New Mexico.

Kent Anderson and Tom Hilbern have undertaken an ambitious enterprise to bring artists to Capitan by offering free artists' space to anyone interested in working on and selling their art in one of the two galleries on the premises.

The two have bought out a whole block in the center of town, and are rapidly converting it into a small art community.

"We just want to give artists a place where they can come and work on and show their art for free," Anderson said.

If the artist is determined to be good enough by Anderson and Hilbern, he or she will be allowed to show their work in either the "Poverty Flats Art Gallery," or the Boarding House Art Gallery across

the street.

Hilbern said that most of the paintings in the Boarding House Gallery will be in the price range of about \$3,000 to \$5,000; which is why he will require a high standard of excellence from the artists who show there.

The nucleus of the center is the Cattle Country Art Center. The center has a large front porch, which the proprietors hope to use to attract weekend demonstrations by local artists. The inside of the center boasts a large studio space, with enough room for several artists to work at once.

Anderson has set up a photographic darkroom for anyone interested in putting some photographic work into the galleries on consignment.

Across the street is the Boarding House Gallery—an old remodeled house that Anderson said actually once served as a boarding house. The house was owned by a Mrs. Larson in the early 20th century,

who used it as a post office and boarding house. It burned several years ago and was recently restored by Hilbern.

The two-level structure has a somewhat abstract look on the inside, as about half of the upstairs floor has been cut away, making for an impressive 20-foot ceiling, and lots of hanging space for paintings.

There are living quarters on the top floor of the gallery, and a large kitchen has been added to the back of the bottom level.

Next to the center is the Cattle Country Laundry, and next to that is Anderson's Lincoln County Alabaster and Cattle Country Sculptures and workshop.

Anderson mines his own alabaster from the Capitan Mountains, and aside from selling the raw stone, he teaches classes on the art of alabaster carving. He said he will soon begin to offer a two-hour introduction to alabaster carving course. The groups will be limited to 10 students and the \$20

fee will include two hours of instruction, an eight- to 10-pound chunk of alabaster and studio space for his students to work on their creations. Anderson said he would provide tools and polishing equipment and supplies for finished creations, as well.

Around the corner is the Lincoln County Co-op, which is something of a gallery itself. The co-op offers hand-crafted items ranging from kitchen witches to ceramic works. There is also a year-round Christmas shop, with nothing but Christmas related items for sale. All pieces in the co-op are for sale on a

consignment basis, and anyone who has craft items is encouraged to submit them to the co-op for sale, said manager Cathy Chapman.

Other artists in the complex are John Miller, a wood craftsman who creates spinning wheels, chairs and many other objects in his workshop, and Cindy Livingston, a creator of greenware ceramics.

Anderson and Hilbern are currently in their third year of a five year plan to develop the arts center, and plan to have the project into full swing soon. Construction has been completed on the two galleries, and workshops, and plans

are under way to build booths and possibly living quarters for artists who may want to stay a few days.

But the most important thing, the men say, is the fact that they're having a lot of fun putting the project on its feet.

With Anderson at the helm as director, Hilbern's hands are freed to do what he enjoys most—paint.

Somewhat Anderson finds time to continue mining and carving his alabaster, while still at the controls of the center.

"If we can't make any money," Hilbern said, "We might as well have fun doing what we're doing."



## Cattle Country Arts Center holds promise for promising artists

who used it as a post office and boarding house. It burned several years ago and was recently restored by Hilbern.

The two-level structure has a somewhat abstract look on the inside, as about half of the upstairs floor has been cut away, making for an impressive 20-foot ceiling, and lots of hanging space for paintings.

There are living quarters on the top floor of the gallery, and a large kitchen has been added to the back of the bottom level.

Next to the center is the Cattle Country Laundry, and next to that is Anderson's Lincoln County Alabaster and Cattle Country Sculptures and workshop.

Anderson mines his own alabaster from the Capitan Mountains, and aside from selling the raw stone, he teaches classes on the art of alabaster carving. He said he will soon begin to offer a two-hour introduction to alabaster carving course. The groups will be limited to 10 students and the \$20

fee will include two hours of instruction, an eight- to 10-pound chunk of alabaster and studio space for his students to work on their creations. Anderson said he would provide tools and polishing equipment and supplies for finished creations, as well.

Around the corner is the Lincoln County Co-op, which is something of a gallery itself. The co-op offers hand-crafted items ranging from kitchen witches to ceramic works. There is also a year-round Christmas shop, with nothing but Christmas related items for sale. All pieces in the co-op are for sale on a

consignment basis, and anyone who has craft items is encouraged to submit them to the co-op for sale, said manager Cathy Chapman.

Other artists in the complex are John Miller, a wood craftsman who creates spinning wheels, chairs and many other objects in his workshop, and Cindy Livingston, a creator of greenware ceramics.

Anderson and Hilbern are currently in their third year of a five year plan to develop the arts center, and plan to have the project into full swing soon. Construction has been completed on the two galleries, and workshops, and plans

are under way to build booths and possibly living quarters for artists who may want to stay a few days.

But the most important thing, the men say, is the fact that they're having a lot of fun putting the project on its feet.

With Anderson at the helm as director, Hilbern's hands are freed to do what he enjoys most—paint.

Somehow Anderson finds time to continue mining and carving his alabaster, while still at the controls of the center.

"If we can't make any money," Hilbern said, "We might as well have fun doing what we're doing."

## Cattle Country Art Center holds promise for promising artists

If all goes according to plan, Capitan may very well be the new arts center of southeastern New Mexico.

Kent Anderson and Tom Hilbern have undertaken an ambitious enterprise to bring artists to Capitan by offering free artists' space to anyone interested in working on and selling their art in one of the two galleries on the premises.

The two have bought out a whole block in the center of town, and are rapidly converting it into a small art community.

"We just want to give artists a place where they can come and work on and show their art for free," Anderson said.

If the artist is determined to be good enough by Anderson and Hilbern, he or she will be allowed to show their work in either the "Poverty Flats Art Gallery," or the Boarding House Art Gallery across

the street.

Hilbern said that most of the paintings in the Boarding House Gallery will be in the price range of about \$3,000 to \$5,000, which is why he will require a high standard of excellence from the artists who show there.

The nucleus of the center is the Cattle Country Art Center. The center has a large front porch, which the proprietors hope to use to attract weekend demonstrations by local artists. The inside of the center boasts a large studio space, with enough room for several artists to work at once.

Anderson has set up a photographic darkroom for anyone interested in putting some photographic work into the galleries on consignment.

Across the street is the Boarding House Gallery—an old remodeled house that Anderson said actually once served as a boarding house. The house was owned by a Mrs. Larson in the early 20th century,

who used it as a post office and boarding house. It burned several years ago and was recently restored by Hilbern.

The two-level structure has a somewhat abstract look on the inside, as about half of the upstairs floor has been cut away, making for an impressive 20-foot ceiling, and lots of hanging space for paintings.

There are living quarters on the top floor of the gallery, and a large kitchen has been added to the back of the bottom level.

Next to the center is the Cattle Country Laundry, and next to that is Anderson's Lincoln County Alabaster and Cattle Country Sculptures and workshop.

Anderson mines his own alabaster from the Capitan Mountains, and aside from selling the raw stone, he teaches classes on the art of alabaster carving. He said he will soon begin to offer a two-hour introduction to alabaster carving course. The groups will be limited to 10 students and the \$20

fee will include two hours of instruction, an eight- to 10-pound chunk of alabaster and studio space for his students to work on their creations. Anderson said he would provide tools and polishing equipment and supplies for finished creations, as well.

Around the corner is the Lincoln County Co-op, which is something of a gallery itself. The co-op offers hand-crafted items ranging from kitchen wicks to ceramic works. There is also a year-round Christmas shop, with nothing but Christmas related items for sale. All pieces in the co-op are for sale on a

consignment basis, and anyone who has craft items is encouraged to submit them to the co-op for sale, said manager Cathy Chapman.

Other artists in the complex are John Miller, a wood craftsman who creates spinning wheels, chairs and many other objects in his workshop, and Cindy Livingston, a creator of greenware ceramics.

Anderson and Hilbern are currently in their third year of a five year plan to develop the arts center, and plan to have the project into full swing soon. Construction has been completed on the two galleries, and workshops, and plans

are under way to build booths and possibly living quarters for artists who may want to stay a few days.

But the most important thing, the men say, is the fact that they're having a lot of fun putting the project on its feet.

With Anderson at the helm as director, Hilbern's hands are freed to do what he enjoys most—paint.

Somehow Anderson finds time to continue mining and carving his alabaster, while still at the controls of the center.

"If we can't make any money," Hilbern said, "We might as well have fun doing what we're doing."



department some of the money is returned to the municipality and some to the school.

Two percent is funneled to Capitan Schools, 1.25 percent is sent back to the village for municipal funds, 5 percent goes to the village infrastructure fund, and the remainder goes to the state.

Two businesses in the village are directly impacted by the Sunday sales ban. Rusty Anchor Bar and B and L Pizza both have liquor licenses. B and L has a beer and wine license which, according to owner Bonnie McEuen, legally allows her to serve beer and wine only after a meal is ordered.

"I don't see what it would harm (allowing Sunday sales)," she said.

Owners of Rusty Anchor Bar, Van Norman and Benny Coker, favor the repeal, citing increased revenues for the village through increased business for themselves and other village businesses.

Norm Renfro, owner of the Smokey Bear Motel and Restaurant, said he has experienced a decrease in business on Sunday, particularly in the evenings. He believes passage of the issue would help Capitan.

Dick Beck, owner of The Big Bear Shop, a gift shop in Capitan, stated his business on Sunday has dropped significantly in the last few years. Beck also said he could not definitely attribute the decrease to the Sunday sales ban.

Capitan Chief of Police Randy Spears said the village has experienced no change in the number of citations issued for driving while intoxicated since the ban began in 1985. He said there were no problems associated with the bar on Sundays before the Sunday sales ban began. He added there are no problems now either.

Registered Capitan voters will have their chance to voice their opinion on Sunday sales of alcohol in the July 19 election.

## Preliminary hearing for murder suspect delayed

A preliminary hearing for Steve Hutson, accused of killing his 39-year-old brother, Danny Hutson, has been delayed.

The hearing, originally scheduled for Friday, was then rescheduled for July 18, but now will be reset due to a time conflict. Judge J.R. "Jim" Wheeler granted a motion for a time extension on a request by Assistant District Attorney Scot Key, over objections raised by public defender Richie Askew, representing the accused.

Hutson, 34, was arrested at his 112 Begonia home by Ruidoso Police on June 28. He remains jailed on an open count of murder. Police found the body of Danny

Hutson lying outside the back door of the family residence, shot through the head.

The victim was pronounced dead at the scene, and the accused was taken into custody. Deputy Medical Investigator Dave Pfeiffer examined the body at the scene and said Hutson died of an apparent gunshot wound. The victim's body was taken to the state Office of Medical Investigator for an autopsy, and that investigator confirmed the cause of death as gunshot wounds.

Among items taken as evidence at the scene was a .22 caliber revolver, according to police, who have continued the investigation.

## Proposals will gauge need for conv center

Village staff members are reviewing nine proposals to evaluate the need for a convention center in Ruidoso.

Planning administrator Cleatus Richards said the village received nine proposals, many of them joint ventures, in response to requests published recently.

"A team will do a complete analysis," said Richards, adding he hopes to have a recommendation for the Ruidoso Village Council within 30 days.

The four-phase project includes an evaluation of the current market activity and facilities, followed by

an analysis of potential markets. Richards said based on the results of those two phases, the successful proposer will continue on with phases three and four.

"If we find the market potential is not there, we won't continue," said Richards. He said that eventuality was made clear in the proposals packet.

The third and fourth phase are designed to identify what type of facility the village can support, including price, type of building, staff and advertising and promotion considerations.

Richards said proposal prices

ranged from \$38,000 to \$119,000 for the whole package. The final contract will provide for paying 10 percent at the end of phase one, 40 percent after phase two, 20 percent on completion of phase three and the final 30 percent after the fourth phase.

The evaluators will be looking at price, as well as other parts of the nine proposals, said Richards.

"We'll be looking strongly at similar studies the companies have done in other areas," said Richards. He said they'll also be comparing the strength of the teams to be assigned to the project.

## Group hopes to bring concerts to area

Residents interested in revitalizing cultural activities here met recently to explore the formation of a Community Concert Association.

The Community Concert Association (CCA) is a membership group that will be in direct partnership with Community Concerts. According to a brochure, Community Concerts is North America's largest and oldest concert service. Operating without interruption since its founding in 1927, Community Concerts is a division of Columbia Artists Management, Incorporated.

Concerts are offered through Community Concerts, giving indi-

vidual CCAs a choice of artists from which to select. Musicians will vary from jazz to classical to folk.

CCA is a self-supporting, no-profit, no-loss organization. It is supported financially by a membership audience whose annual dues provide the funds to finance each concert season. No tickets are sold to individual concerts. Season concerts are financed with an annual membership campaign.

Bob Rowe, one of the local CCA organizers, stated he missed having cultural activities in Ruidoso. He said CCA will not be the same situation as the former Ruidoso

Music Festival as CCA is strictly a membership group. He noted CCAs in Carlsbad, Hobbs and other New Mexico towns.

Rowe said the first organizational meeting had a "very favorable" response. The group plans to meet again sometime in early August to organize a board and to begin a membership campaign. By November, Rowe said the group hopes to begin working on concert bookings for the 1989-90 season.

## Eye On The Capitol

**"The Battle for The House"**  
The House is expected to remain firmly in Democratic control.

That, according to *The Albuquerque Journal* in its post-mortem piece on the June 7th primaries.

"Democrats hold 46 of the 70 seats," *The Journal* noted, "a margin Republicans concede is too great to overcome." (June 9)

Is *The Journal's* judgment right?

Yes and no.  
Yes, the margin is too great for Republicans to overcome.

No, the Republicans don't have to overcome it to take control.

In 1979, 11 dissident Democrats sided with the Republicans, and ruled the House.

The coalition returned to power in 1981 and 1985. Both times, 10 Democrats teamed up with the GOPs.

In 1987, "loyalist" Democrats regained control. The question: Will they keep it?

In the 1988 elections, the following house races were won by fewer than 500 votes:

1. San Juan. Richard Cheney (Republican) over Margaret Mathes (Libertarian).

2. San Juan. Charlie Winters (Democrat) over Tweeti Blancett (Republican).

3. Valencia. Fred Luna (D) over James Blea (R).

4. Bernalillo. Bob Hawk (D) over Hessel Yntema (R).

5. Bernalillo. Pat Baca (R) over John Ellefson (D).

Only 5 of the 17 toss-up seats are held by Republicans. Clearly, they have less exposure than the Democrats.

That's the background. Republican coalition counters, take note:

First, of the 24 Republicans, scratch Murray Ryan who, consistently supports the "loyalist" Democrats.

Since 36 votes are needed to take control, the Republicans would have to keep all their other members in line, plus pick up 13 more supporters.

13?—How?

Actually, the Republicans already have some of them.

The dissident Democrats are either still around, or their seats are contested by Republicans, resulting in a win/win situation for the GOPs.

Give the prospective Republican coalition another 4 seats. Result? Now they need 9.

The Republican strategy emerges (stand it upside down, and the Democratic strategy appears):

(1) Protect their flanks against nasty surprises not even considered in the above count. (Example: keep the seat vacated by Republican Maurice Hobson).

(2) Hang onto all Republican toss-up seats.

(3) Help Hurlbut beat Ferrari. Then knock off at least 8 of the following Democrats: Winters, Luna, Hawk, Taylor, Casey, Gallegos, Sanchez, McSherry and Eisenstadt.

Will the Republicans succeed?

I saved the best for last. The

crunch comes in beating 8 of 9 incumbent Democrats, without suffering a single casualty in the Republican ranks.

That's a mighty tall task—particularly when Republican priorities this year are on winning the senate.

Why do Republicans face such an uphill battle in the house?

First, in 1986, they turned over the following seats to loyalist Democrats:

1. San Juan. Tweeti Blancett lost to Charlie Winters.

2. Bernalillo. Linda Carraro was beaten by Gary Hovevar, for what had been Republican Hal Stratton's seat.

3. Dona Ana. Pat Dominguez lost to Paul Taylor.

4. Curry. Susan McDowell was defeated by Vincent Gallegos. And second, from a total of eleven, the Democrats who coalesced with the Republicans have shrunk to four.

Before you count the Republicans out, keep in mind that there may be some buried coalition Democrats waiting to sprout—if provided the proper fertilizer.

## Letters to the editor

### DEAR EDITOR:

I received a copy of the June 30, 1988 article, in which representatives of the New Mexico Horsemen's Association attacked the Racing Commission for freezing horse urine specimens so that they can be retested at a later date.

It may be of some interest that Illinois has been engaged in this practice for several years and California announced a few months ago that it will retain samples for three years. I suspect that within the next few months most of the racing commissions in the country will decide to preserve urine specimens for extended periods of time.

Also, even if the racing commissions did not wish to engage in this practice, law enforcement agencies clearly have the right to do so. For example, the Federal Drug Enforcement Administration has subpoenaed the official test samples of the New Mexico Racing Commission. The DEA might test those samples two years from now and then bring criminal charges against persons who may have attempted to influence the outcome of a horse race.

There are two reasons why we need to preserve urine samples for retesting. First, experience has shown that when racing chemists develop techniques for detecting unlawful drugs that are used on the backside, the dishonest people in the business then switch to new drugs that cannot be detected. There are now a number of drugs reported to be used unlawfully at racetracks throughout the country for which there is no means of detection at this time. The only way to deter this misconduct and finally put a halt to unlawful drug use at racetracks is to let everyone know that someone who uses a drug that cannot be detected today may have pay the consequences six months from now when a new test is developed for that drug and the urine sample from today's race is retested to see if that drug was present. I have heard of no other procedure that would have even a ghost of a chance of preventing the use of drugs that cannot be detected with today's technology.

A second reason for retesting is cost. It would be prohibitively expensive for the Commission to subject every urine sample to every test available today for unlawful drugs. We would not have enough money to test even the winner of each race. We therefore test for some drugs on one day and other drugs on the next day. If, however, we find a drug that has been used to any significant extent, then we can go back to old urine samples and subject them to the test for that drug.

I find it amusing to hear that horsemen upset with New Mexico's crackdown on unlawful drug use will seek refuge in Texas. I have spent enough time with the members of the Texas Racing Commission to know that their efforts will make ours look feeble by comparison. The Texas statute allowing parimutuel racing will need to be modified if racing is to be successful in Texas. But the political support for those modifications will be absent if the Texas Racing Commission is perceived as less than extremely tough on the drugging issue.

The greatest threat to New Mexico racing at this time is the potential of unlawful drug use. I urge the horsemen to spend as much effort trying to end unlawful drugging practices (for example, they could set up a Crime Stopper program for the backside) as they have in taking potshots at the Commission's efforts to ensure clean racing.




