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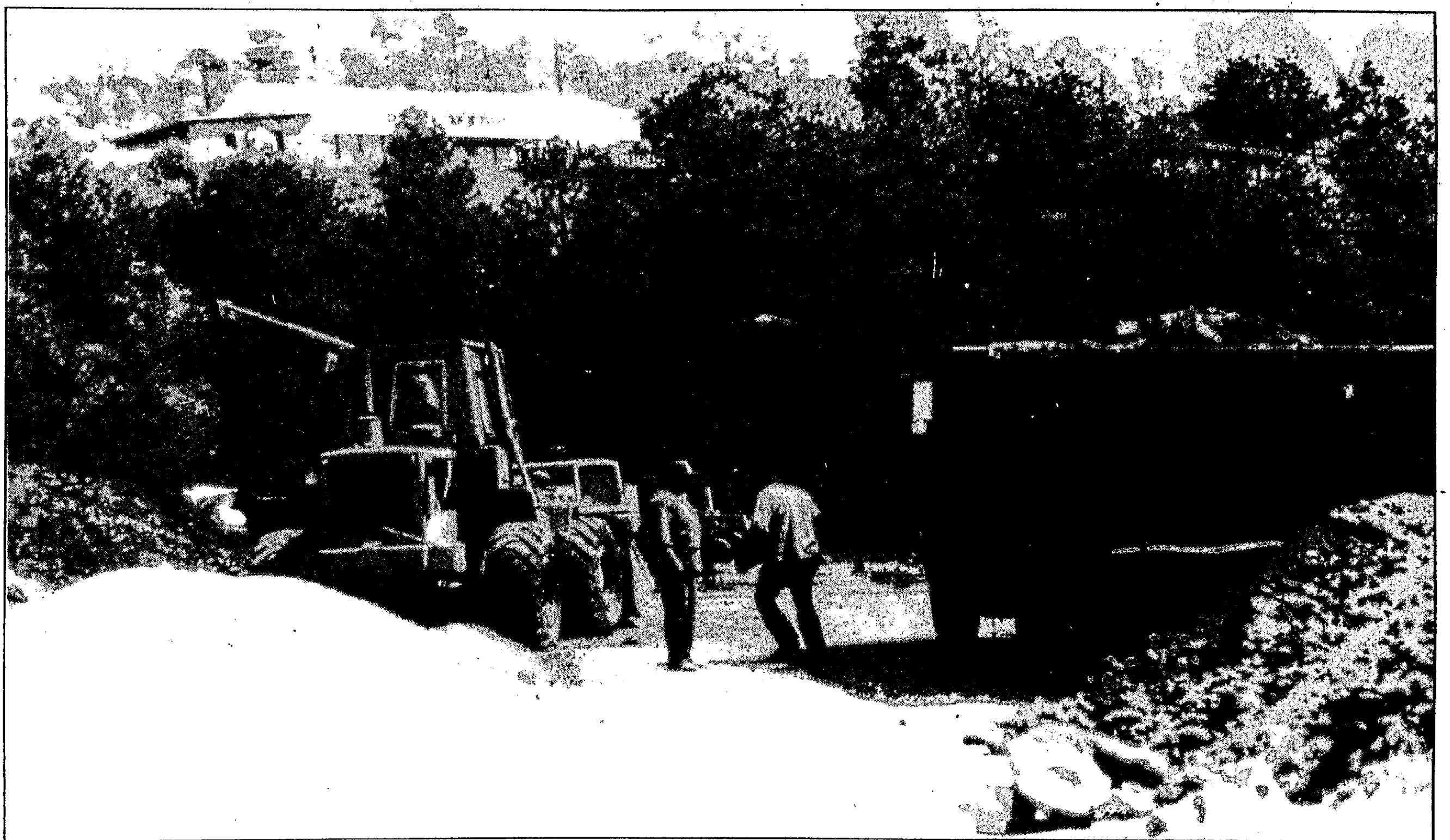
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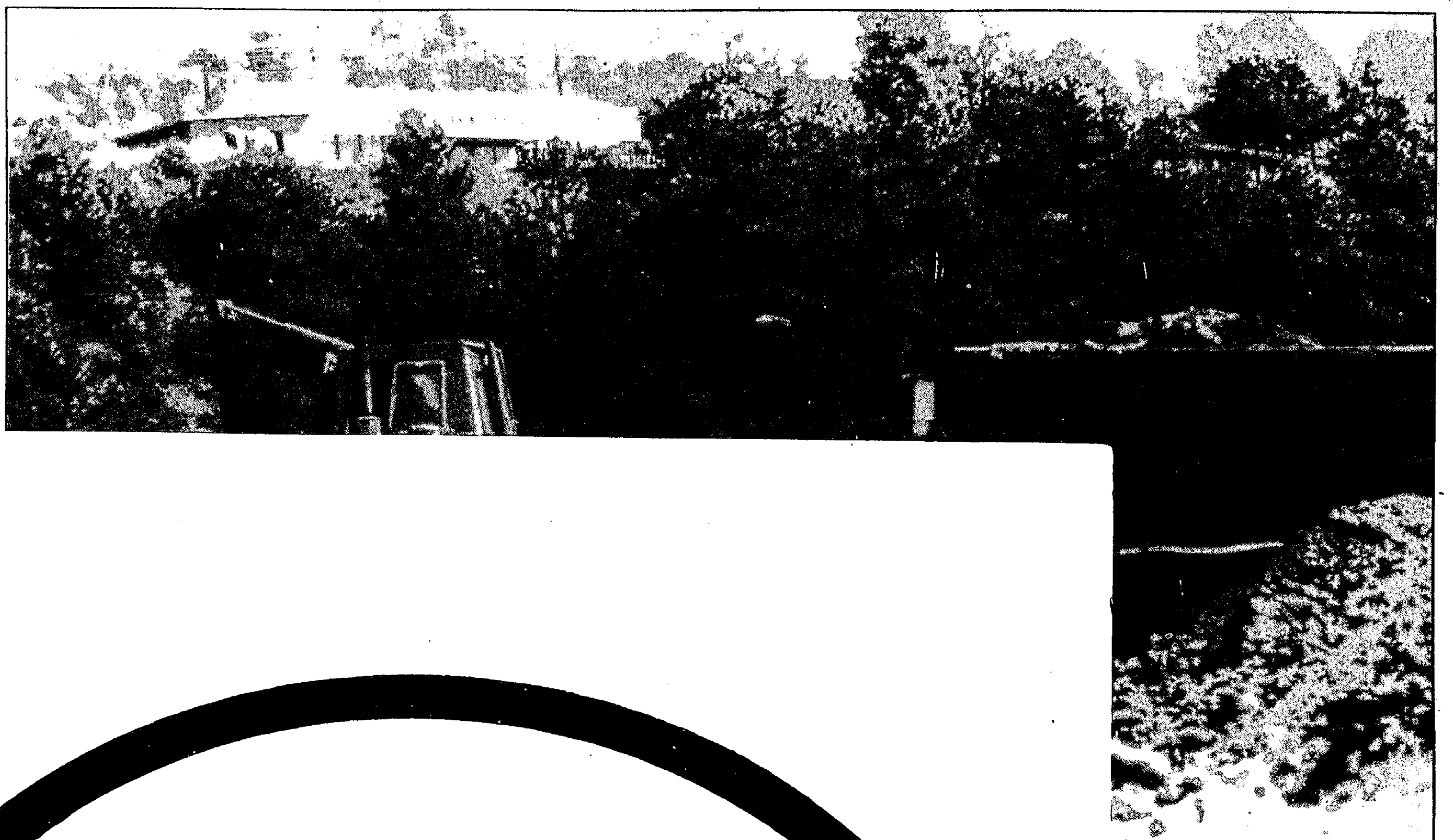
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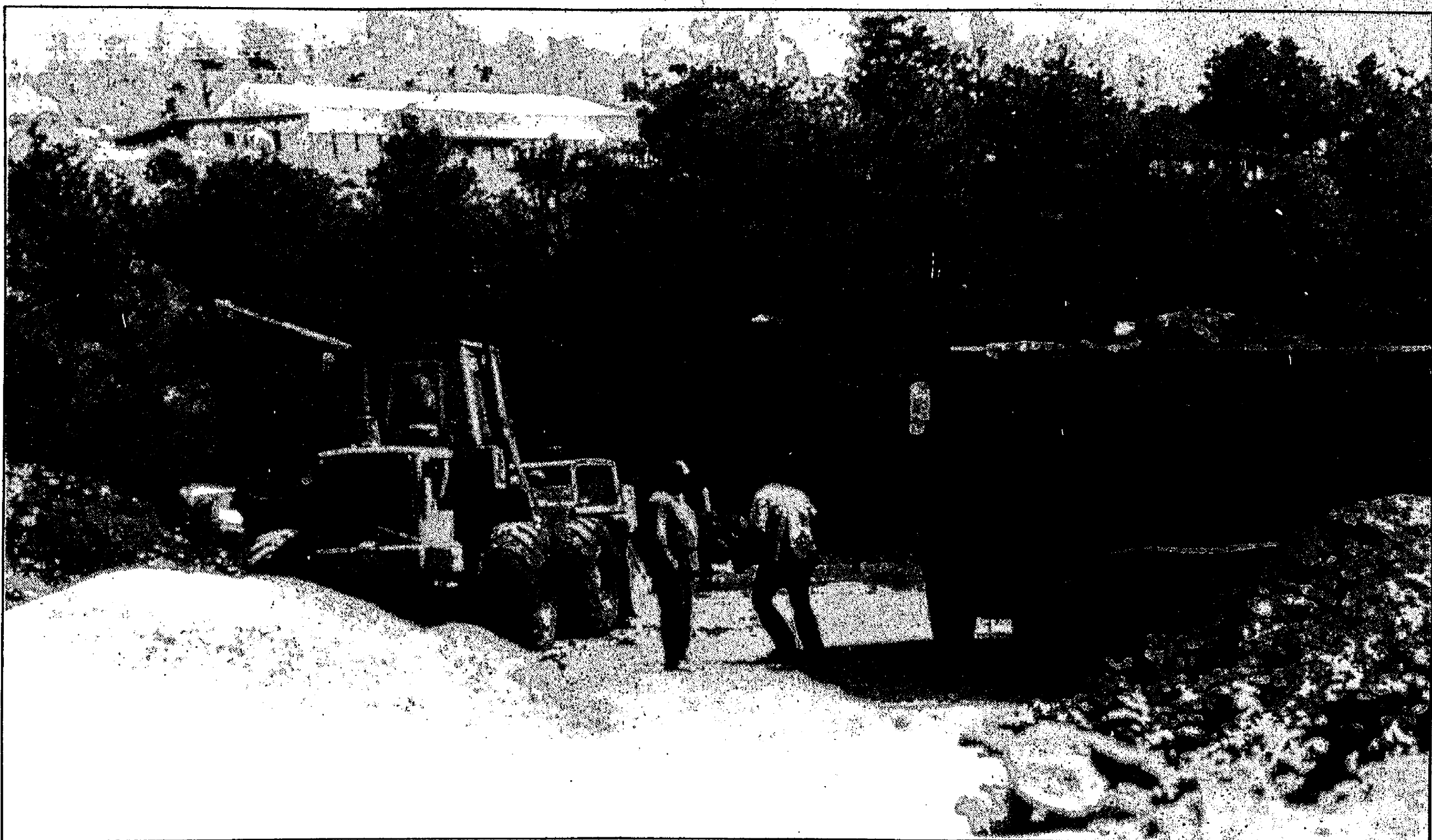

with Davis saying: "I'm sure this is a very unpopular thing. Sitting here just prolongs the agony." He called on the council to "do it or adjourn."

The council, with three members present, voted unanimously in favor of the tax increase, and Mayor Davis asked village clerk Tammie Maddox to record him in favor of the resolution. McNeil had to leave the meeting before the votes were cast, and councillors J.D. James and Elmer Pirelli were absent.

Junge predicted *The Ruidoso News* will come out with headlines saying "the council raises taxes," and village manager Frank Potter said the report might say "council saves \$400,000."

"I wish we had a little bit more time ... (to) sell it to the people," said Village Councillor Larry Simon.

After the councillors voted "reluctantly" for the mil levy, Simon said "it's about time we quit paying 90 percent of the burden of this county," and not getting much back.

"That's my line," quipped Davis. "I think it's time we figured out that Ruidoso is part of Lincoln County," said Simon.

According to Leonard Padilla, financial specialist supervisor with the Local Government Division of the Department of Finance and Administration, the village budget was approved, and the extension on

the three mil levy was approved. Padilla said the resolution approved by the village was sent to him, and he will insert that new levy into the certificate of tax rates he sends Lincoln County.

"The first payment is due in December," said Padilla.

He said the Village of Ruidoso can impose a maximum of 7.65 mils, and currently is at a rate of 5.225. Lincoln County currently is a 9.35 mils, and is authorized to impose a maximum of 11.85, according to Padilla.

Varley said the average residential taxable value in Ruidoso is from \$15,000 to \$16,000, and the three mil levy will convert to a \$50 a year increase on the average residential property.

Using 1987 figures, Varley said Ruidoso has a total residential taxable value of over \$96 million and a commercial tax base of \$37 million.

After Tuesday's meeting, Varley said the \$24,158 auto sunshades are included in the same lease-purchase agreement with the terminal building, with the payments set at \$537 a month for five years. He said by paying for the sunshades, the village will save from \$6,000 to \$7,000 in interest.

Although the sunshades aren't built, they are under contract, said Varley.

The village already owns the aircraft sunshades, said Varley. He said they cost \$44,000, and already are generating monthly revenues of \$780.

Lawmen spotlighting Chavez slaying anew

Ruidoso/Lincoln County Crime Stoppers is spotlighting the Katina Chavez murder investigation as the crime of the week.

Following is the text of a news release provided by Crime Stoppers:

"The crime: Homicide
"On February 20, 1988, Katina Chavez, a high school standout athlete, was found face down in the Rio Ruidoso, 1/2 mile from her home in San Patricio. An autopsy report indicated the cause of death to be cervical compression and drowning.

"On the evening of the 20th, Katina was to receive an all district basketball award at a ceremony at Cloudcroft, New Mexico. Katina Chavez was last seen at her home in San Patricio at approximately 3:30 p.m. Katina was playing basketball outside her residence.

"Katina's coach and her mother last spoke to her on the telephone at approximately 3:45 p.m., at which time everything appeared all right.

"Katina's coach traveled to her home shortly thereafter to pick her up for the award ceremony and was unable to locate Katina. The coach

found the gate to the Chavez residence open and also found the door to the residence open.

"Law enforcement agencies are requesting any information pertaining to Katina Chavez's whereabouts prior to her death, or the events leading to the murder of the young female.

"Anyone having knowledge of Katina Chavez's companions or activities after 3:45 p.m. on February 20th is urged to call Crime Stoppers.

"Crime Stoppers will pay up to \$1,000 for information that leads to the arrest and grand jury indictment or magistrate court bind over of the person or persons who committed these crimes. Crime Stoppers will also pay cash rewards for information that leads to the recovery of stolen property and the solving of other felony crimes.

"The Crime Stoppers phone number is 257-4545. People calling Crime Stoppers may remain anonymous and are issued a code number which can be used for the payment of rewards. People outside the local exchange may call collect within Lincoln County."

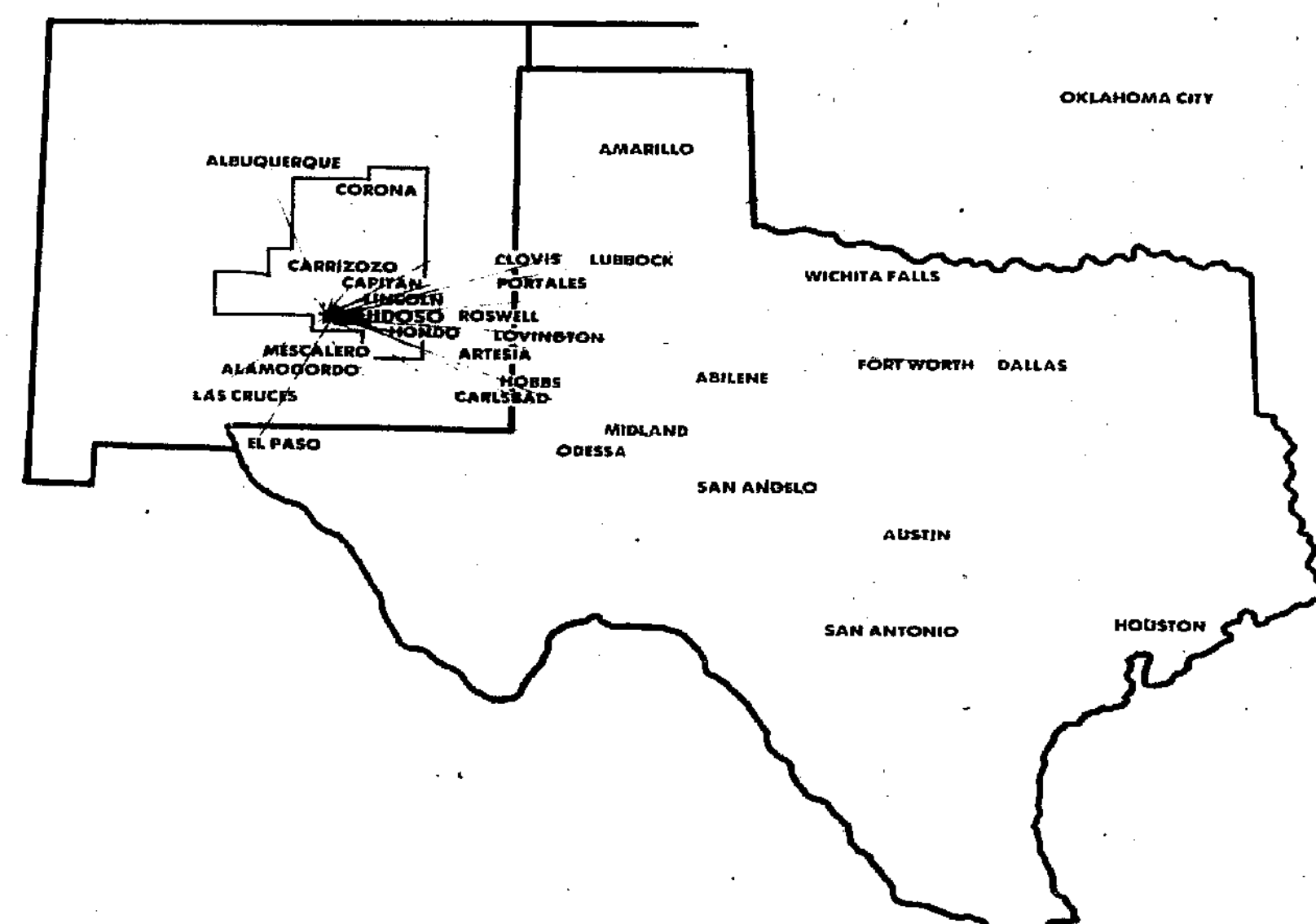
The victim said she had

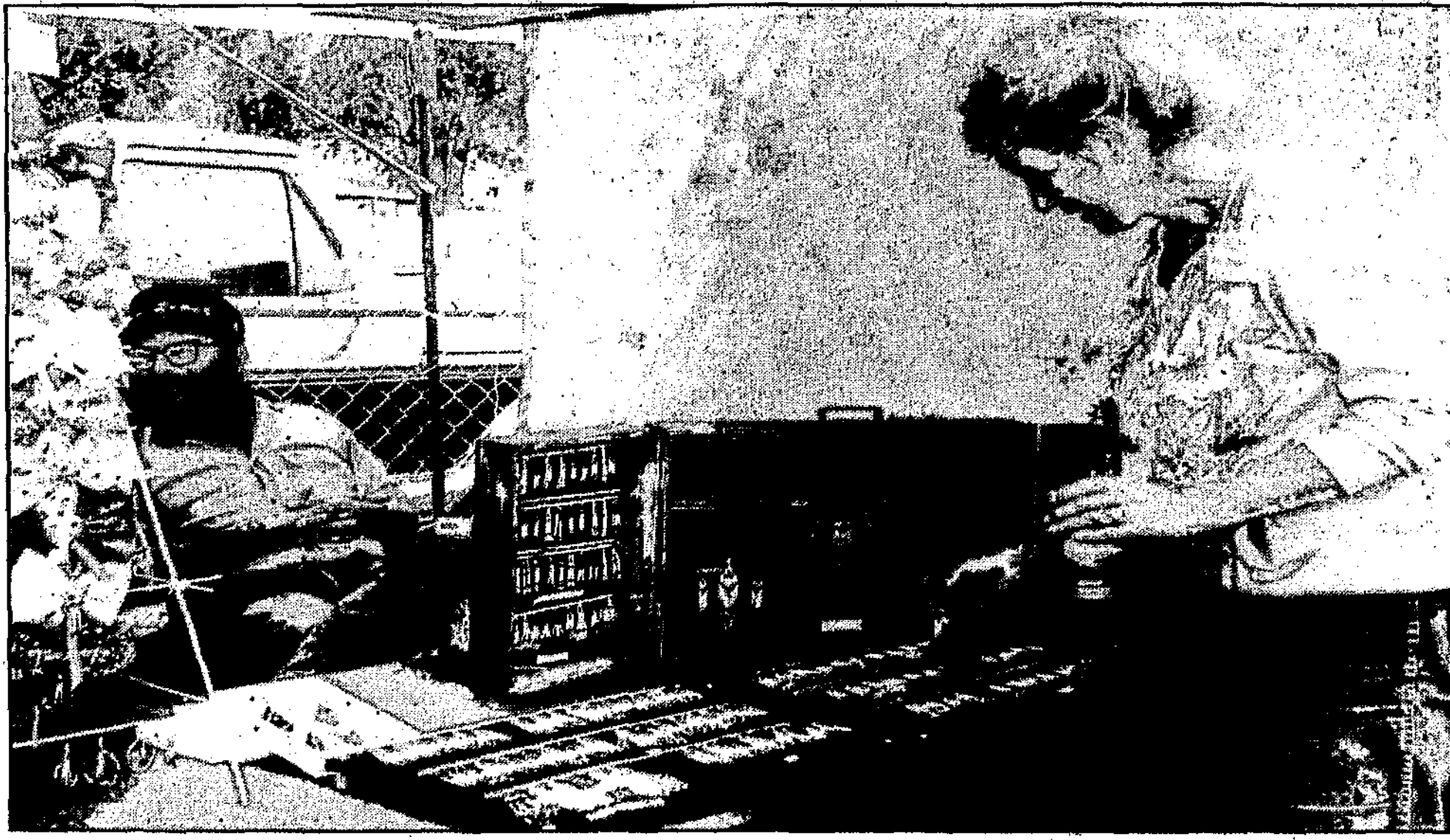

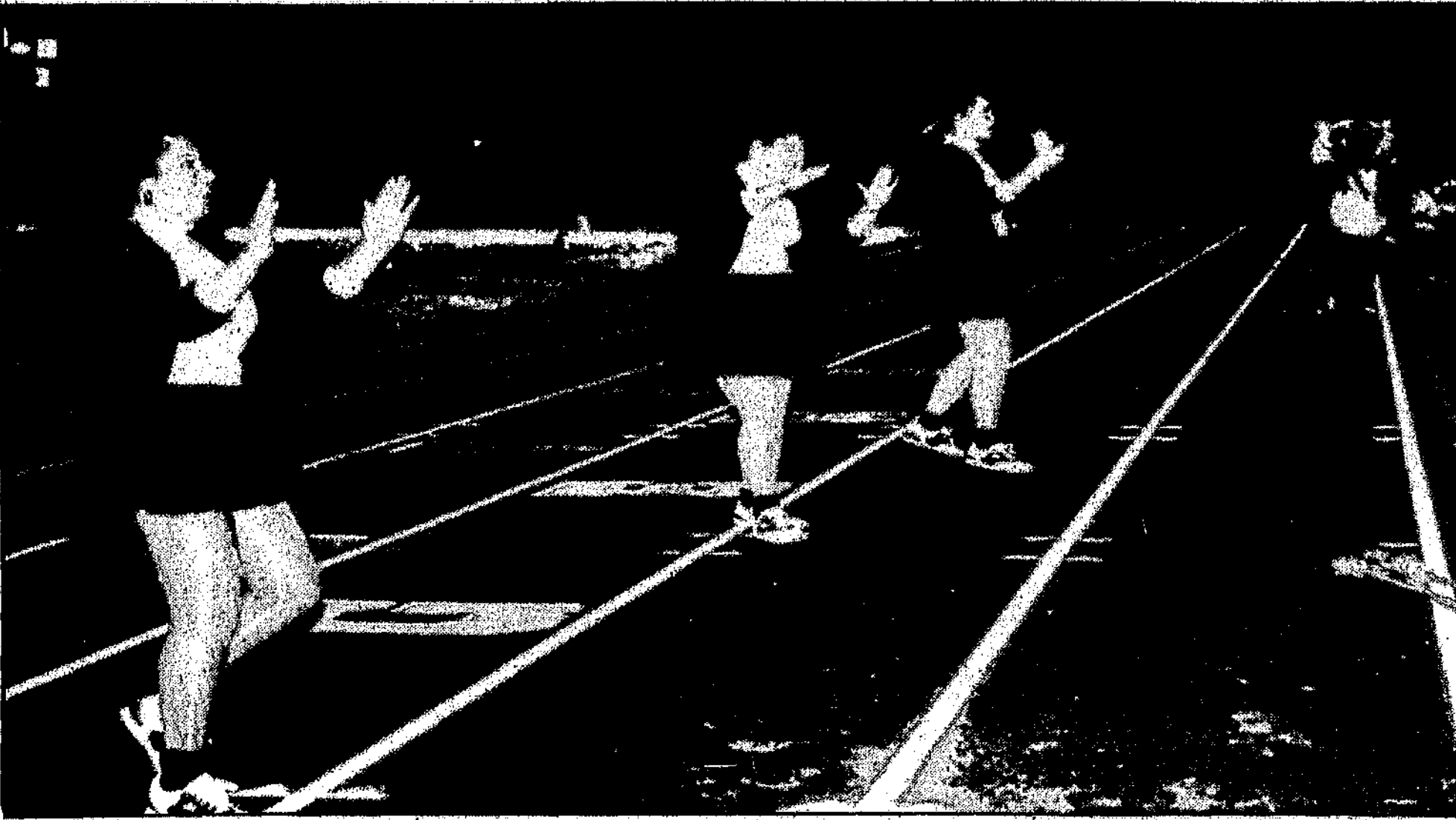

Jerrod Martin gained the most yardage with 163 yards, which included 52 yards for a touchdown. He made 22 carries and was responsible for six points.

Anthony Sanchez scored two touchdowns with a total of 114 yards in 19 carries in the game. He added 12 points to the winning

score.

Johnny Castillo made a goal with a three-yard run and added the two extra points on to the score in that particular touchdown. He also added another two points with an extra point run with the first touchdown. Castillo was responsible for 10 points.

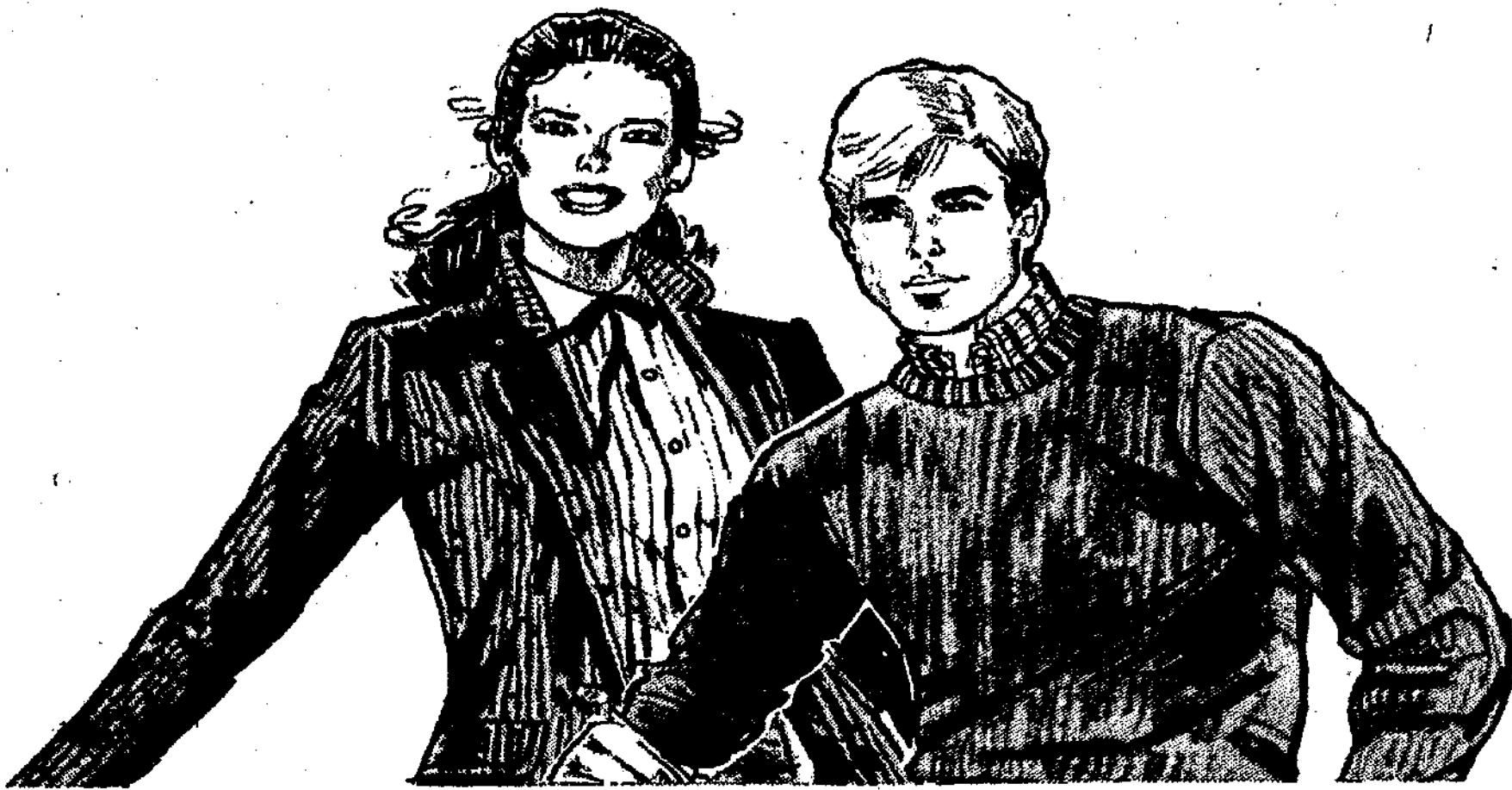
Justen Washburn of the Corona area, was named a Silver award winner in regional competition for the National Future Farmer's of America (FFA) Horse Proficiency Award.

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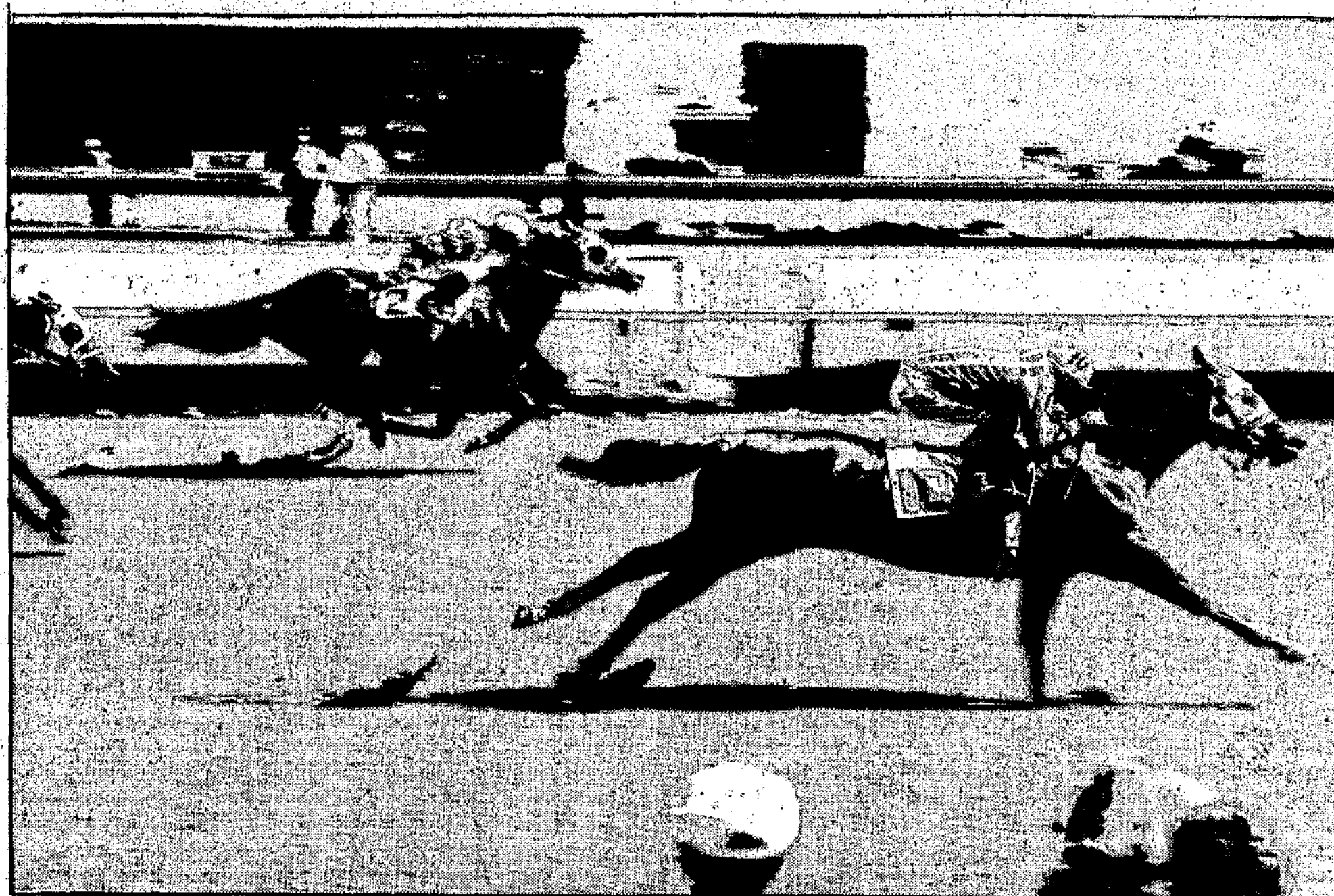

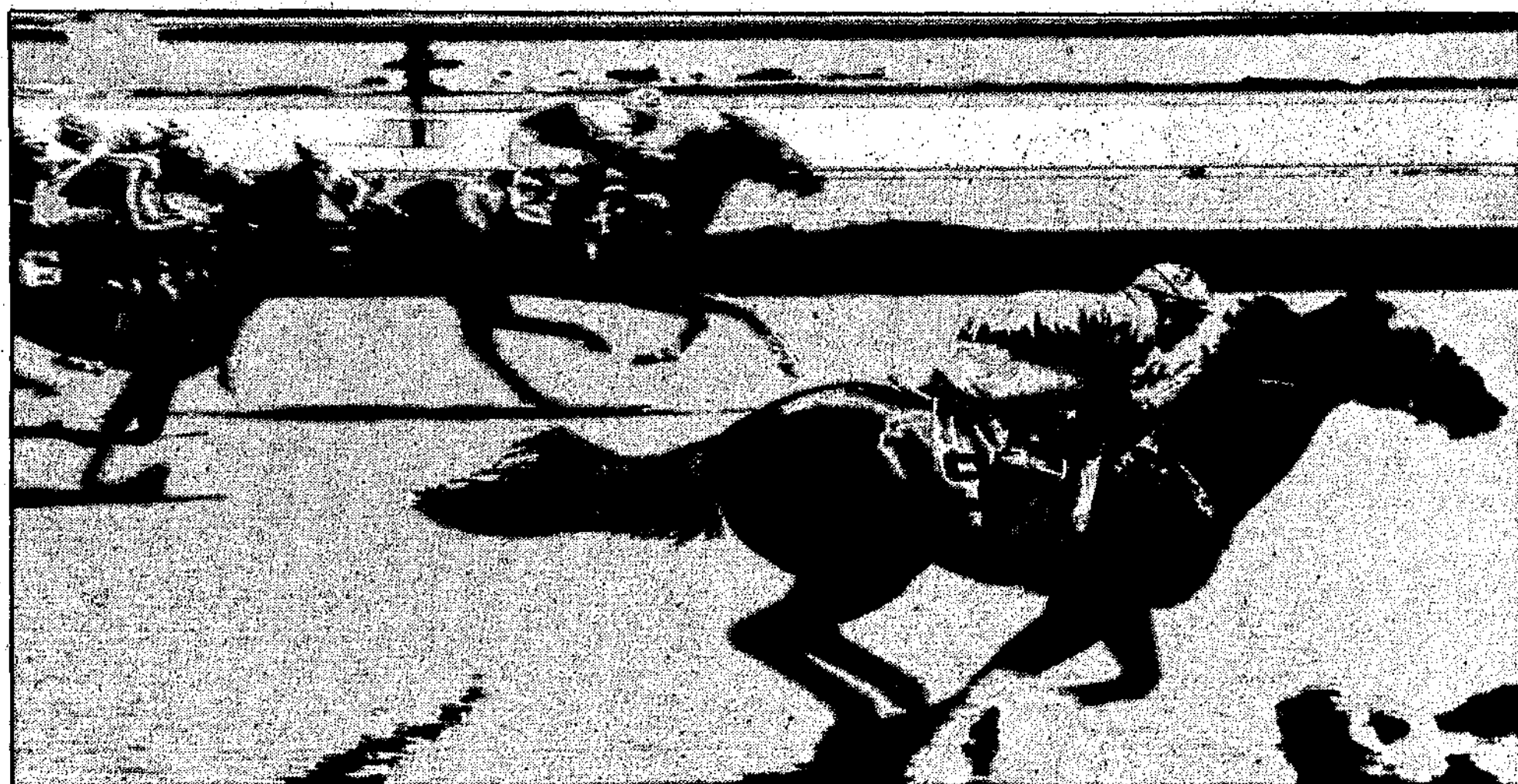

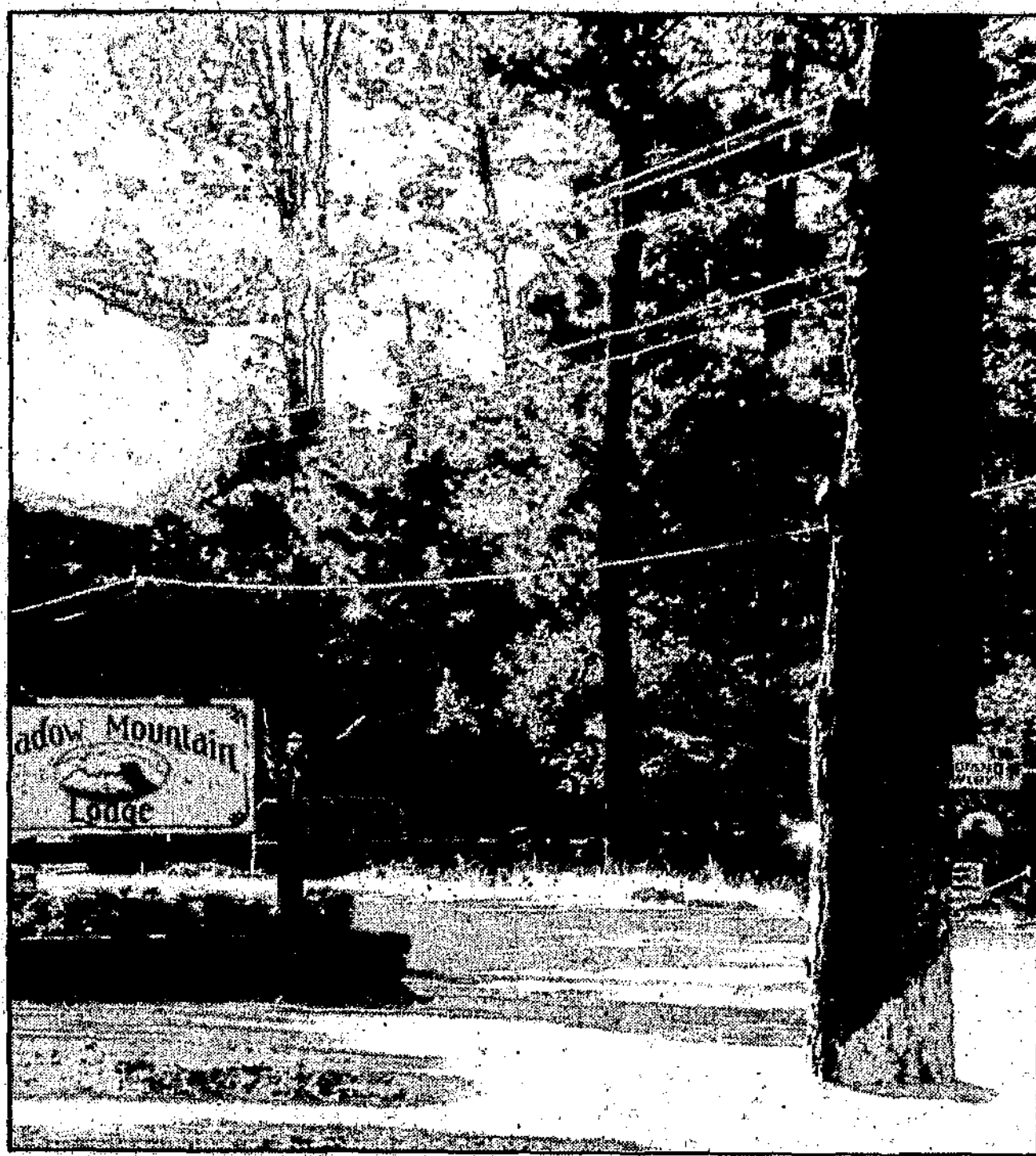
The Sun Flower

The Plant Corner

Dear Sally: We just recently purchased a Hibiscus plant. Please give us some of your growing tips. Thanks, David Lee.

Dear David: There are at least 30 varieties of the Hibiscus. The most popular and easiest to grow is the Rosa-sinensis (rose of China or Chinese hibiscus).

The majority have large single flowers, though there are doubles. They come in many colors.

Light, position and regular feeding are essential needs. A constant temperature will prevent this deciduous plant from losing its leaves and be a year-round bloomer.

For your newly purchased plant I recommend re-potting when you bring it home. It will need a large pot about the size and shape of an ordinary five-gallon can, with an extra large tray. Not one of those that are fitted to the pot.

The fitted tray won't allow you to place the pot on damp pebbles for added humidity and air to get up to the roots. Fill the pot with about eight inches of plastic packing do-dads and use a very porous soil. For some reason these plants like a partner, so try to plant two side by side.

Light: Arrange your grow bulbs coming from all sides and there must be good overhead light to make the blooms. Try not to have to rotate the plant. This can cause the newly formed buds to drop. You can use a sunny window for one side of the light source. Just make sure the plant does not get too cold or hot from the window exposure.

Temperature: Try to maintain a temperature of just about 65° for plants to remain fully evergreen with attractive blooms throughout the winter. Temperatures can go up

to 90° in the spring and summer. Pests: Aphids and red spider most affect the Hibiscus. So, check often for these pests. An attack of red spider can kill the plant in a week's time.

Water: Try to maintain a moist condition by small, frequent waterings. Good, fast drainage is essential and if too dry the buds will drop.

Pruning: Prune poorly shaped young plants to develop good branch structure. To keep mature plants growing vigorously, prune out about one-third of old wood in early spring. Pinching out tips of stems in spring and summer increases flower production. If you plant two plants, try to prune one low and let the other grow tall on a trunk with a bouquet effect of branches only at the top.

The Hibiscus will bloom year round for your with proper pruning, food, light and water, giving you pleasure every day.

It is the state flower of Hawaii. It is sometimes eaten raw to aid digestion. It is a wide-spread custom throughout many tropical, romantic countries to wear the blossom over the right ear to indicate the "adonee" is not married.

Fertilizer: The Hibiscus responds to BR-61 which is high in phosphoric acid. You can switch to tomato plant food for four to six weeks in late summer. Mix this solution to one-quarter the manufacturer's recommended use and use it each time you water.

Good luck with your new plant, I hope you didn't think you would just buy this cute little plant, bring it home, place it on a window sill and let it go at that.

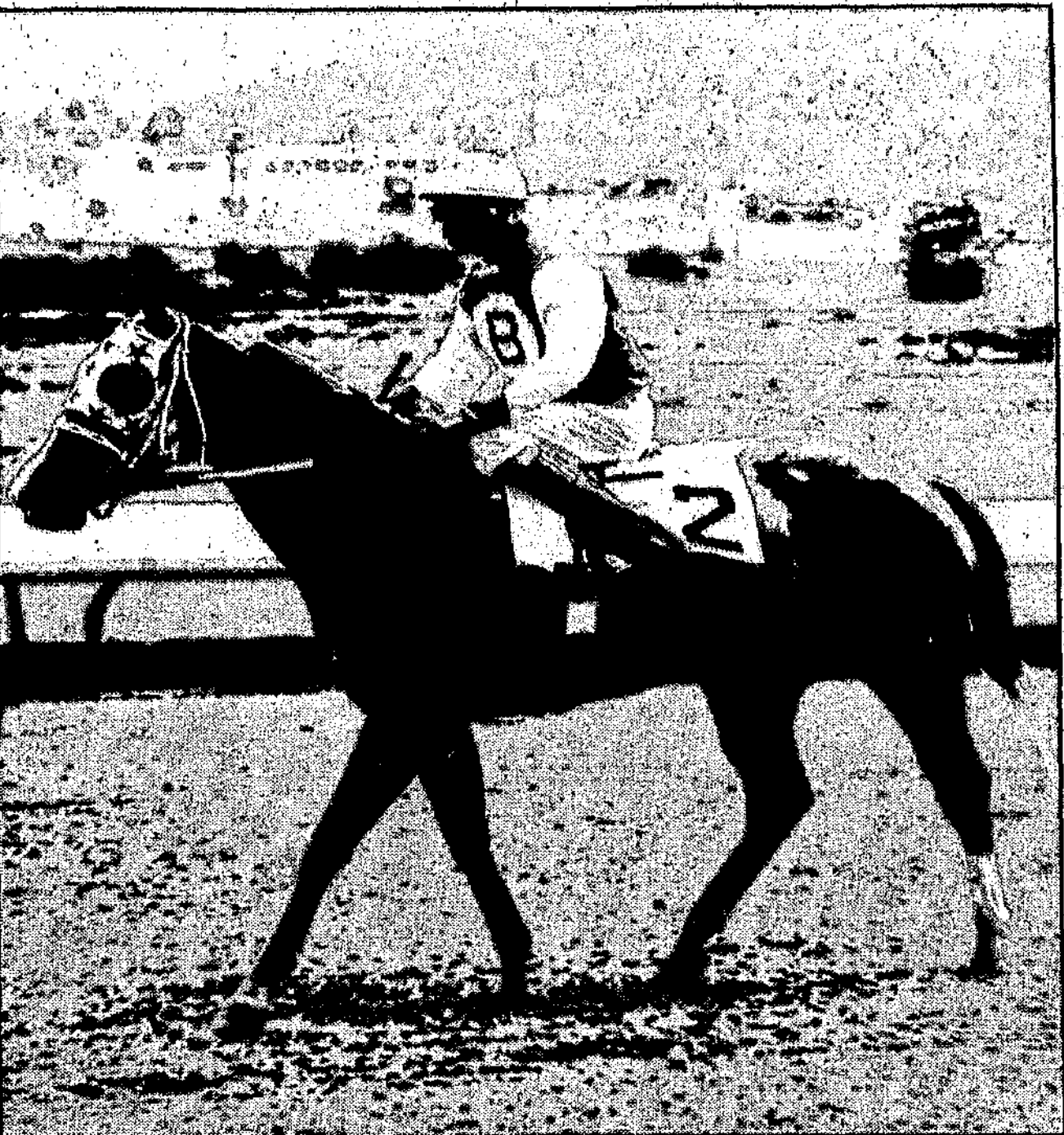

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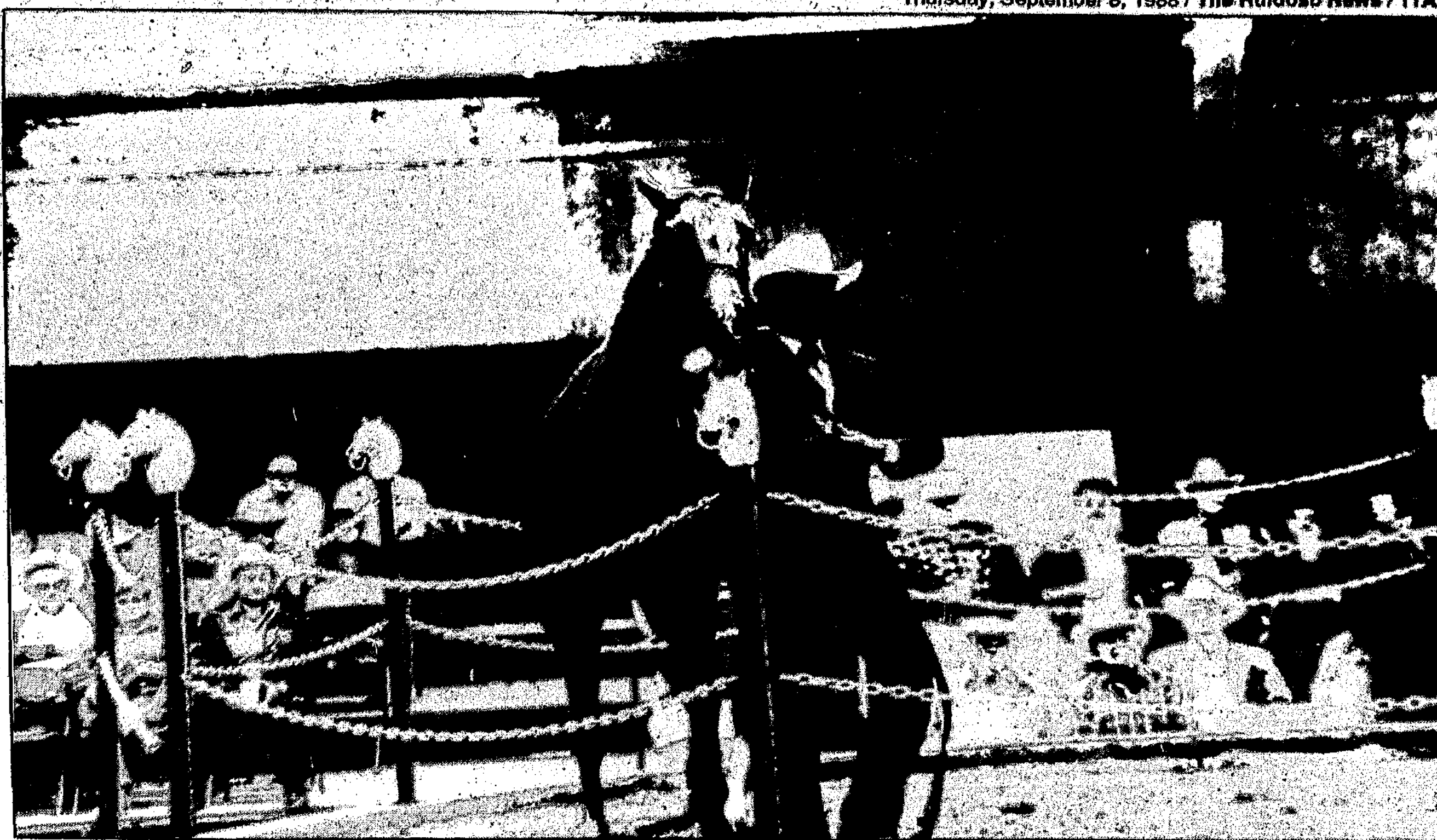

Client's offer is clarified on True Value deal

A real estate agent who made a presentation to the Ruidoso Village Council recently asked for a clarification of his client's offer.

James Paxton said his client offered to sell the True Value building for a total price of \$675,000.

The building, not counting the land, has been appraised at \$743,520, and in one sentence that figure was mistakenly used as the offer amount.

Paxton stressed that his client is offering the building and land to the village at less than the appraisal amount on the building alone.

The True Value building is one of several empty properties that have been considered as possible sites for a community/civic/events center.

The council opted to delay any action on Paxton's offer until a proposal can be presented on building an events center on the airport property. The Economic Development Advisory Board is expected to present a plan to convert and add to airport facilities for a multi-purpose center.

The information required includes the organization, address, description of entry, category and a telephone number and contact person.

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

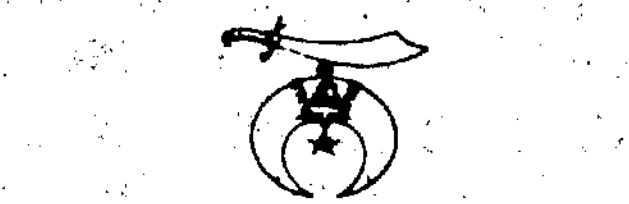

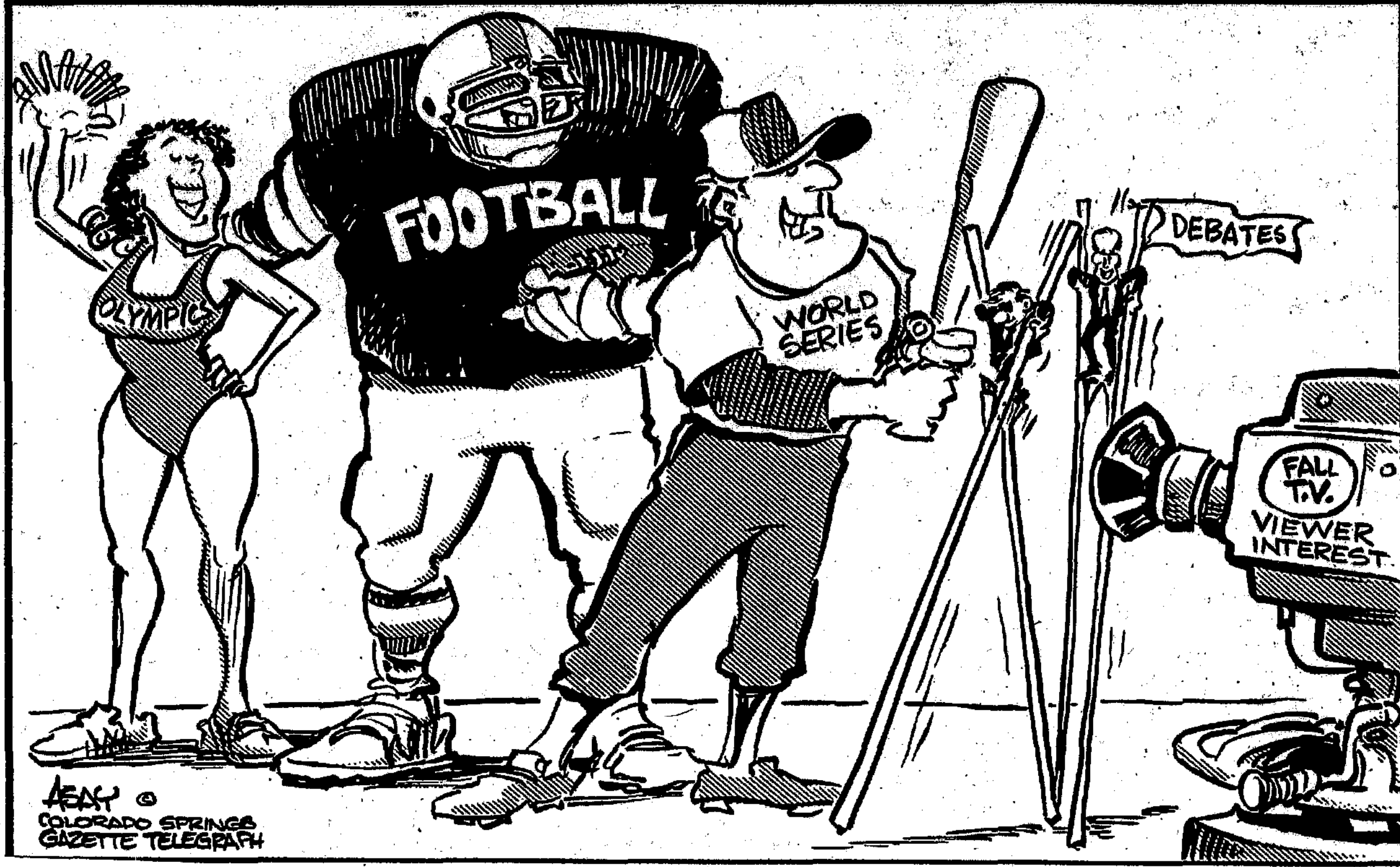

DEAR EDITOR:

In your Sept. 5, 1988 biweekly issue, there was an editorial concerning the cost to play golf in Ruidoso. It was written by Mr. Walter Smith a permanent resident of Ruidoso, retired.

The following is my estimated figures of his cost to play golf in Alamogordo, N.M., all figures are based on 52 weeks).

1. Annual mileage. 125 miles x 52 = 6500 miles @ 18 miles per gallon = 360 gallons of gas @ \$.99 = \$356.00
2. Wear and tear on tires (based on 40,000 miles life expectancy = \$80.00

3. Exposure to an accident in vehicle = \$7.00

4. Six quarts of oil @ \$1.50 = \$9.00
5. Maintenance on vehicle due to 6,500 miles extra driving to Alamogordo = \$50.00

6. Green fee and golf cart - Alamogordo, 16.35 x 52 = \$850.20

Annual estimated cost to play golf in Alamogordo = \$1,345.00

If you owned a Cree Meadows Country Club membership:

1. Purchase membership (one-time fee): \$4,000.00

2. Loss of interest @ 8% on \$4,000 = \$320.00

3. You can own your own golf cart and pay annual trail fee, including tax: \$319.50

4. A used electric golf cart and trailer - estimated cost \$1,500.00. Loss of interest @ 8% on 1,500.00 = \$120.00

5. Monthly dues, including tax - \$53.50 = \$642.00

6. Estimated annual mileage from your home to Cree Meadows (not knowing where you live), 10 miles x 52 weeks = 520. 24 gallons gas @ \$.99 = \$28.71

7. Wear and tear on tires: \$6.40

8. Maintenance on vehicle driving back and forth to Cree Meadows: \$4.00

Est. Annual Cost: \$1,380.60

This amounts to spending \$35.60 more per year if you accept the Cree Meadows plan. Plus the \$7,800.00 you are now spending to support another town could be spent in good ole' Lincoln County New Mexico.

I'm not upset with you at all, Mr. Walter Smith. Just as you had a right to write an editorial in our local tabloid, so do I.

My golf handicap is 13 effective 8-12-88 with all games played at Cree Meadows Country Club.
