## Snowfall creates different challenges for school students, administrators

Want to know who it is who makes the decision whether to cancel school in Ruidoso, or whether to start it two hours late?

"I'm the culprit," admits Don Weems, principal of White Mountain Intermediate School.

"We have three possibilities in inclement weather," Weems explains. "One, school can go according to its routine schedule. Two, we can begin two hours later. This is disruptive but we don't have to make up the time lost this way. The third alternative is to close school for the day. This time must then be made up at the end of the spring term."

This week, classes were delayed for two hours Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday due to heavy snows and poor driving conditions.

On snowy days, Weems and bus contractor Rick Simpson leave their homes at 5 a.m. to drive the bus routes and check the road conditions. They meet at 6 a.m. to decide what to do, and notify the two Ruidoso radio stations after that.

"Yesterday someone called the stations and said that school was canceled, but this was a prank call. It created a lot of havoc when it was announced on the radio that there was no school." When asked why Weems and radio station personnel have not worked out some kind of code to prevent disruption by pranksters, Weems said that, until yesterday, there had never been a need to do so.

Parents' Group. "These two-hour delays help John Parker and I to clear the walks before the students come in," Cannella explains.

"Sometimes most of the buses can get through, but not all," Weems continues. "For example, this week the buses in Mesalero couldn't make it, but the others could. You know how it is here, road conditions could be completely different in Alto than they are in Glencoe."

Weems admits that sometimes he "goes on instinct" as to how clear the roads will be later in the morning. "At the Intermediate school, we had about 75% attendance this week," he said. "These snowy days create a different atmosphere for the students. They're kind of wound up. It's just a different time."

Ruidoso Middle School Principal Texanita Cole estimates that two-thirds of her students have attended classes this week. "They don't mind the snow at all," she said.

White Mountain Elementary Principal Frank Cannella estimated a one-half to two-thirds attendance rate at his school. "It's kind of a relaxed atmosphere on days like this," he says. "Because classes are smaller, things are more intimate. For example, one teacher here had her students working on their Mother's Day presents already. Because attendance is down, teachers play spelling games or attendance activities that can only be done in a small group. We also let the children play outside. Kids love snow. I really enjoy these days, myself."

## Council to vote Tues. on hiking own pay 100%

Members of the Ruidoso Village Council will vote Tuesday on a proposal to increase their pay by 100 percent, which would make Ruidoso councillors the second highest paid city officials in the state.

During a regular council meeting at 6:30 p.m. the group will decide whether to increase their monthly stipend to \$500 from the present \$250 a month. An ordinance was proposed last month by Councillor Jerry Shaw, seconded by Jess Stinson and passed in a three-to-two vote, with councillors Elmer Pirelli and Larry Simon op-

posing the increase.

According to information provided at that meeting, a council may vote to increase pay, but the higher pay won't benefit the current group. The new pay will affect only councillors elected after the ordinance is passed.

Pirelli noted that councillors Shaw, J. D. James and Jess Stinson, all candidates in upcoming municipal elections, are giving themselves a raise. He said the increase isn't needed.

Simon said he wants to hear what the citizens think about the proposal.

According to information provided by New Mexico Municipal League, members of the Santa Fe

municipal governing body draw the highest pay in the state for their elected positions, making \$506 a month. Santa Fe has a population of 48,953.

City officials in the state's largest city, Albuquerque (population 331,767) are paid \$438 a month.

Lincoln County Commissioners, who oversee county government for a population of 12,190, are paid \$725 a month. Village trustees in Capitan are paid \$10 a meeting, and members of the Ruidoso Downs village board are paid \$25 per meeting.



## Write-ins

## Ruidoso, Downs races gain one write-in each

Thomas B. McNeil filed Tuesday as a write-in candidate for a two-year term on the Ruidoso Village Council.

McNeil, of 400 Paradise Canyon Drive, will oppose Councillor Jerry Shaw, the only declared candidate for the one two-year slot on the March 1 municipal ballot.

According to state election laws, write-in candidates for municipal office are required to file in the

municipal clerk's office in order to be counted in the elections. McNeil is the only official write-in candidate for the Ruidoso election.

McNeil joins a field of six candidates seeking four village council positions. Besides McNeil and Shaw, both seeking the one two-year term; four men have declared for the three four-year slots. Vying for those terms are councillors J. D. James, Jess Stinson, former mayor George White and former councillor Al Junge.

Seven men are seeking the office

of municipal judge. They are current Municipal Judge Bill Payne, David Greenhaw, Hugh Johnston, Robert Jarvis, Otis Spears, Sam Pilgreen and Kenneth Shockey.

Voters must be registered by February 2 to vote in the municipal election. For information on voter registration, contact municipal clerk Tammie Maddox, 258-4014, or County Clerk Fran Siddens.

In Ruidoso Downs, Joe T. Southard signed up as a write-in candidate for the office of municipal

judge.

Incumbent Harold Mansell declared his candidacy for the office on sign-up day, January 5, and so will be the only candidate listed on the ballot.

No write-in candidates were recorded for the three four-year trustee seats. Declared candidates for those seats include incumbents Bill Smith, Leonard Bergeron and Fred Bernard and candidates Alice Allison and Thurman Gartman.

## Papers to be served in county-versus-sheriff suit

Lincoln County Sheriff Don Samuels is now up and about, but still recovering from back surgery performed on January 13.

"I have not been served with any suit papers," he said in a telephone interview, concerning the pending lawsuits against him to be filed by county attorney Gary Mitchell, representing the commissioners of

Lincoln County. "Therefore, I am not giving those absurd charges in Thursday's Ruidoso News any consideration or response."

Samuels said that he understands that the "absurd charges" mentioned were not the product of the newspaper, but explained that the news account is all he has seen to date.

"I want the people of Lincoln County to know that I am very ap-

preciative of their support and concern. I am still recuperating from surgery and hope to be back in the office soon."

Samuels said that he is still mostly in bed or trying to walk around to strengthen up his back muscles. He plans to be back at work by Monday.

According to Mitchell, the petition for declaratory judgment, or in-

the alternative, application for a writ of mandamus, and complaint for damages, has been filed against Samuels with the district court and Samuels have been issued. "Because Monday was a legal holiday, they haven't been served yet, but will be within the next day or two," Mitchell said. "I have been working for the sheriff to return to work so this can be done properly. I don't want to serve them to his home, because they are work-related."

### Church group provides chance to interact



Rev. Bill Garrett, Associate Minister at First Christian Church, invites singles of all ages to attend the Fellowship Group meeting at the church tonight at 7 p.m. "We're going to laugh, giggle and have fun," Garrett says. Nursery services are provided for single parents.

It's hard to be single in Ruidoso. Ruidoso's social scene is built mainly upon couples' activities, centered around church, club or school, or around a bar scene, in which one meets a lot of people from out-of-town who may never pass this way again.

It's a common assumption of married people to conclude that the major goal in the life of a single person is to be married.

"This isn't always the case," explains Associate Minister Bill Garrett, of First Christian Church of Ruidoso. Garrett has begun a singles fellowship group that meets at the church on Thursday nights at 7 p.m.

"A lot of single people are happy being single, but feel left out of the social scene because they are not part of a couple. Our fellowship group is a community-wide support group for all single adults, whether divorced, widowed, separated or

never married. Its purpose is to provide singles with fellowship and interaction with other singles within the context of our Christian faith."

Tonight's meeting, for example, will involve playing "Pictionary." Next Thursday will feature a potluck supper, and on January 31 there will be a Super Bowl Party.

"32 people came to our initial meeting last week, ranging in age anywhere from the low 20s to retirement. Beginning this week, we will provide nursery services for single parents who need child care."

All of this is free of charge. The group meets in a comfortable, carpeted meeting room, and after the meeting, those desiring more sociability can join the others at an "afterglow" meeting, taking place in a local lounge.

"We're not a stuffy bunch," commented Garrett. "We want to provide a nice, warm atmosphere and

we're putting together a real balanced program. We're going to laugh and giggle and have fun. Just because this is church-sponsored doesn't mean people will be lectured to, or that we can't have fun."

"Through common needs and interests, singles will have the opportunity to not feel so isolated and alone. They will know people to call, people with whom they have things in common, all being done freely out of love and compassion in Christ."

The February meeting program includes a speaker on February 4, a sing-a-long on the 11th, a speaker on income tax on the 18th, a small group discussion on the 25th and dinner out on the 27th.

## Rairdons will face more charges in Eddy County

Convicted in a Lincoln County district court and a Texas court in separate rape and kidnapping cases, Harold W. and Bobbie Sue Rairdon have been transported to Eddy County to face further criminal charges.

According to court clerk Margo Lindsey, the Rairdons entered a plea before District Judge Richard

A. Parsons. They pled no contest to five counts of criminal sexual penetration, first degree, and to kidnapping and were each sentenced to 18 years in the state penitentiary. Lindsey said the sentence will run concurrently with a 26-year sentence imposed by a Texas court.

Lindsey said the defendants are expected to enter a plea in Carlsbad to the Eddy County sex offense charges.

Harold Rairdon, 40, and his 20-

year-old wife, Bobbie Sue Rairdon, were arrested in El Paso, Texas, last year on information provided by Ruidoso Police Detective Lanny Maddox. They were apprehended in Texas and pled guilty to kidnapping and raping a University of Texas at El Paso student.

The Rairdons were sentenced in Texas after pleading guilty in that case. The young woman was reportedly robbed, threatened with

a knife, driven to a motel, sexually assaulted and kept overnight.

Detective Maddox was in the midst of an investigation over the Lincoln County incident in which a 15-year-old Carlsbad girl was allegedly brought to Ruidoso, held hostage and raped repeatedly. Maddox linked the two cases, and the defendants have been in Lincoln County Jail awaiting a trial that had been set for Wednesday.


Sierra Blanca Regional Airport Access Road is one step closer to

## School bond election

### Superintendent: Taxes will not be raised one penny

The Capitan School Board and Superintendent of Schools Scott Childress discussed the upcoming February 2 election at their regular meeting on January 14.

Capitan voters will be asked to approve a Capital Improvements Act, which will authorize a bond issue financing of a school building improvement program.

The current needs of the district can be financed through a continuation of the tax levy authorized by the Capital Improvements Act. This tax levy has been in place within the district for more than 10 years, and provides the district with approximately \$65,000 per year.

This revenue is used to update facilities and equipment needs.

"It is important that people understand that their taxes will not be raised one penny," said Childress. "This is a continuation of a tax levy already in place."

Childress repeated, "There will be no additional cost to the taxpayer."

Explanational brochures have been printed, detailing where the money goes.

Projects to be funded, if the bond issue is passed by the voters, will include: general renovation of the old gym, including replacing ceiling and floor tile, handicapped access and roof repair; general renovation, roof repair, and remodeled rest rooms for the high school; general renovation, replaced heaters and new sidewalks for the elementary school; two new vehicles, a computer lab, landscaping and maintenance equipment for the entire district; second floor for computer lab to be installed in the library; and a new sub-floor and floor for the cafeteria.

"This is a very important election in terms of the school system, and I can't over-emphasize that there is no additional cost to the community for this funding that they haven't already been paying for over a decade," Childress said.

In other business, board members James McDaniel, Preston Stone, Hollis Fuchs, Kenneth Cox and Tom Trost toured the new sports field prior to the meeting and informed architect Jim French that the scoreboard needs to come up, and that there is some planning and building detailing left to complete.

French agreed and stated that there were just some little odds and ends on his "punch list," and that then the job will be finished.

Board members and French decided to sign a change order asking that the concession stand be redesigned, so that there would be a half-wall and awning in the front to improve access to the stand, instead of the planned window.

French indicated that this would present no problem to him.



## It's Up Front Runner in \$41,986 Maturity

Up Front Runner fought his way to the winner's circle again when the jet-black horse held on for the win in Sunday's \$41,986 West Texas Maturity.  
 Up Front Runner made it four wins in five starts on the Sunland Park straightaway for owners Eddie and Karen Jacobs of Mission, Texas. The winner took Stuart Dolphus 400 yards in a seasonal best timing of :19.67 and returned \$7.00, \$4.20, \$3.00.

3,269 witnessed the event under near-perfect conditions and saw Up Front Runner get the first call for the fifth straight time. The six-year-old son of Dr. Hank out of the mare Young Delight opened up a comfortable lead on the competition midway through the dash, but he had to turn back the powerful closing strides of Revengeful to win by a neck and take the first place check of \$20,993.

Revengeful paid \$5.40, \$4.00 for his third straight runner-up finish. Revengeful has been the only one to head the winner since last November's second part of the Jess Burner Handicap Series. In that race, Revengeful scored an identical neck win at 400 yards.

Third-in-the-10 horse field was Just Another Jet, \$4.40 with Texelka lighting the board to finish fourth. Pre-race favorite and fastest qualifier Bully Bullion did not break sharply and was never in contention finishing fifth.

The rest of the field finished Dark Thriller, The Ole Creek, Viking Royale, Foals Dancer, Reflections Of Belle. After the race, trainer James Gerhards complemented his runner on his consistency. "He's one of the best gate horses I've ever had. He stays calm and runs so hard he starts to slip inward - just like a car on ice." Up Front Runner's efforts were recognized last year when he was named Champion Aged Quarter Horse of the Year in New Mexico.

On Sunday, Elvie Robinson finally did something that no one else was able to do in 1988 at the track. The El Paso resident won \$77,377 for correctly picking the Twin Trifecta. The wager had gone uncashed for eight straight race days, but Robinson took his one and only exchange and parlayed it into the biggest Twin Trifecta payoff this year at Sunland.

Two accidents happened at the track on Sunday when J.R. Valenzuela and Pedro Benitez were both thrown from their mounts during racing. J.R. Valenzuela's mount, Mr Black Tie, was interfered with by I Got It as they raced in the stretch during the second race. Valenzuela's mount clipped heels and threw the runner to the ground, but Valenzuela was not injured and returned to ride.

Benitez was aboard Doc Action who also clipped heels coming out of the gate in the third race. Benitez was thrown but was not seriously injured, though he did take off of the rest of his mounts for the afternoon.





how the metal building will be enhanced by landscaping. Potted trees purchased for the airport opening will be planted in front of the terminal.






## Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Congressman Manuel Lujan's retirement may be part of a master scheme to retain Republican control of the top spots they currently hold, but it also isn't going to hurt Democrat Jeff Bingaman's chances of retaining his Senate seat, either.

With Manny running for reelection, the money, the volunteers and the campaign organization would have happened as automatically as they have in past elections. A 10-term veteran knows the buttons to push to activate all needed campaign resources.

In an open race, those resources are not as readily available—even to the popular, respected brother of the retired incumbent. Somehow, it's not the same, even for Ed Lujan, who also knows all the right buttons to push. He is going to have to get out and prove himself all over again, especially to the Democrats who were longtime supporters of Manny.

This is going to take time and money the Republicans could otherwise have poured into the campaign to win back the Senate seat Jeff Bingaman captured from Republican Harrison Schmitt six years ago.

The vacant congressional seat has taken a Republican Senate hopeful out of the race to pick a candidate to run against Bingaman. Jeff considers this as a positive effect of Lujan's retirement announcement.

Since most candidates in a challenging party's primary race try to run against the incumbent's record instead of running against each other, that makes one less candidate to be taking potshots at Bingaman.

Political consultants, especially those with media campaign skills, are reaping the benefits of Lujan's retirement announcement more than any other group at this point.

Of course, in just a few months, it will be Albuquerque media, itself, which will get to enjoy the luxury of a whopping increase in campaign advertising.

Albuquerque Democrat Representative Kiki Saavedra may have flushed out another contender for the Lujan seat. During a House committee meeting last week, he presented Duke City GOP Rep. Linn Tytler with a one dollar campaign donation.

A few weeks ago I predicted that, despite all the evidence point-

ing to the imminent resignation of Santa Fe County Democratic Chairman Robert Rivera, it would never happen.

Rivera had come under heavy attack for being AWOL whenever other party officials needed him.

State Demo Chairman Sam Pick had accused Rivera of putting Hal Stratton in the Attorney General's office by not delivering the usual Santa Fe County Democrat majority for statewide candidates. Stratton won a very narrow victory over Bob McNeill.

Rivera agreed to resign. That took the heat off long enough for the legislative season to roll back around and make it convenient for him to be in the Capitol City for lobbying chores.

Last year Rivera lobbied for the Horse Racing Association, the Canopy Association, the Independent Community Bankers and for Southland Corporation. All of those folks could have major issues before this year's session.

Rivera announced last week that he would not be resigning. He had found the reason the party wasn't going anywhere and it had nothing to do with him. It was the other party officers, who were spending their time complaining about his constant absence rather than tending to their jobs.

The 22nd vote has now been identified for the newest coalition of 18 Republicans and four Democrats who will run the Senate this year.

Speculation had centered around Republican John Budagher returning to the fold or Demo Fernando Macias investigating the other side of the fence as he did for awhile last year.

Both guesses were evidently wrong. Sen. Joe Harvey, D-Lea has been tabbed as the deciding vote to join fellow Demos Tom Benavidez, Manny Aragon and Ben Altamirano in this year's coalition.

When U. S. Rep. 

All nongovernmental entities (property owners) which claim to be exempt from the property tax must report their property and claim their exemption for 1988 if the exemption was not claimed in 1987.  
Reports for mobile homes, livestock, land used for agricultural purposes, property not valued last year and claims for exemptions by nongovernmental entities must be completed and mailed or delivered to the county assessor not later than the last day of February.  
If you made improvements to your real property and: 1. the improvements cost more than \$1,000 and 2. a building permit for the improvements was not issued, you must report the nature of the improvements and their cost to the assessor. Not later than the last day of February, these reports must be on forms provided by the assessor.  
If you believe your property decreased in value during the preceding year, you must report, on forms provided by the assessor, a signed statement which: 1. describes the property affected, 2. states the cause and nature of decrease in value, and 3. states the amount you contend the value has decreased.  
This statement must be filed with the county assessor no later than the last day of February.  
If you are a veteran, and have a veterans certificate of eligibility and wish to claim the exemption for 1988, the claim must be made by the last day of February by presenting the certificate to the county assessor's office.  
If the head-of-family exemption was claimed and allowed in 1987 no new claim for that exemption is required to be filed. However, if that exemption was not claimed and allowed in 1987 and it is now claimed, claim must be made by the last day of February by filing with the assessor the form provided by the assessor.  
Beginning in the 1982 tax year, taxpayers are responsible for declaring their property classification to the assessor, as residential or nonresidential. When the declaration is accepted by the assessor, it shall remain as such and need not be made in subsequent years unless the classification changes. If a taxpayer has not declared their property to be residential in 1987 and desires that classification for 1988 they must complete a declaration of residential classification and return the signed declaration to the county assessor's office by the last day of February, 1988.
