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Council to apply for \$5 million FmHA loan

The Ruidoso Village Council, during a regular meeting Tuesday, took the first step toward borrowing more than \$5 million from Farmer's Home Administration (FmHA), granted three requests to use the old airport land and got an update on legislative issues affecting the Ruidoso area.

Leon Eggleston, division head, told the council he was contacted by FmHA and told of the availability of "cheap" money. He said he researched various long-range projects and prepared a pre-application for council action.


Councillors authorized Eggleston to pursue a pre-application for \$5,619,000 to be used to install sewer in Town and Country North and Pinecliff subdivisions, to construct a treatment and storage facility at Grindstone Canyon Dam and complete Eagle Creek well lines and treatment facilities. Approval of this pre-application will set in motion a process that will include extensive FmHA reviews and further council action, said Eggleston.

Money to repay such a loan would come from water and sewer revenues, he said.

"I will vote aye, but I hope I'm here to vote no for more money for Grindstone," noted Councillor Jerry Shaw. "As I remember, when we floated bonds ... we projected we could finish Grindstone Dam and Eagle Creek with that," noted Shaw. She wondered why the council was asked to consider borrowing for a treatment plant, when the dam isn't expected to be filled with water for two or three years.

"Why do we want to go and get

Citizens say no to council pay increase

A petition is being circulated in the Village of Ruidoso concerning a proposal under consideration by the Village Council to increase councillors' pay from \$250 to \$500 a month.

Charlotte Jarratt brought a copy by The News, and said a group of people asked her to help distribute the petition. She said she doesn't live in village limits, but has a personal interest in Ruidoso's economy since this is where she works and pays taxes.

Following is the text of that petition.

"We, the undersigned, wish to go on record as opposing ANY increase in the pay of the elected officials of the Village of Ruidoso, at this time, due to the economic conditions in the Village of Ruidoso, as well as throughout our nation, and we would suggest that this issue be resolved by placing it on the ballot of the March 1, 1988 election, for the residents to vote upon, as opposed to being acted upon by the

present Council."

The petition leaves space for signatures, addresses and telephone numbers and then continues:

"This petition will be picked up prior to the Village of Ruidoso Council meeting, scheduled for 6:30 p.m., on Tuesday, February 9, 1988, in the council chambers of the Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center. Publication of the notice of the public hearing has occurred and the council will act on the proposal at the February 9th meeting."

Petition seeks grand jury probe of commission

A group of concerned citizens have circulated a petition calling for the District Court to convene a grand jury to investigate the Lincoln County Commissioners, county manager Suzanne Cox, and county attorney Gary C. Mitchell.

By state law, the petition needs to be signed by five percent of all registered voters. There are 5,781 registered voters in Lincoln County, so 290 signatures would validate the petition.

576 people signed the document, virtually 10 percent of the registered county voters.

A copy of the petition was brought to The News office by two signees, who asked not to be identified and who would not make statements for publication.

However, Audean Franklin, of Alto, was quoted as a petition organizer in Tuesday's El Paso Times, saying: "People were fed up with all the garbage in the newspaper." She was also quoted as saying: "They're making up a lot of accusations against Don Samuels that are not true. We feel that they are trying to discredit the sheriff before the coming election."

The petition was submitted to the District Court of Judge Richard A. Parsons, and the Lincoln County Clerk's Office is in the process of validating the signatures against voting rolls.

Once this is done, the petition will then be sent to District Attorney James Weldon, who will appoint a special prosecutor to complete the investigation.

The petitioners do not have to produce any evidence of wrongdoing to call the grand jury investigation.

The petition, dictated by state laws, says:

"The undersigned registered voters of Lincoln County hereby petition the District Court within and for the County of Lincoln to convene a Grand Jury for the purpose of investigating the Board of Lincoln County Commissioners, John Allen Hightower, Ralph Dunlap and Bill Karn; the County Manager, Suzanne Cox; and the County Attorney, Gary C. Mitchell. The Grand Jury is hereby petitioned to investigate and report on the actions of the above referenced individuals and entities in their official and individual capacities to determine their compliance with New Mexico law in their dealings with the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department, the Lincoln County Clerk's Office and other offices of Lincoln County, and to determine whether or not these individuals and entities have committed any capital, felonious or infamous crime with respect to their dealings with the above referenced County offices, and to determine whether they have committed a violation of any other State law."

"I have nothing to hide or fear from a grand jury investigation," said Mitchell in a phone interview. "In fact, I welcome it because it's my opinion that if the public becomes aware of what the sheriff has really done and all the problems, they'll not only applaud the commission, but they'll wonder why we didn't take action on this matter sooner."

Mitchell has filed the writ of mandamus against the sheriff, but it has not yet been served. The writ against Siddens is still not filed, pending negotiation.

"I also think that the petition

Young Guns: Why isn't it being filmed here?

The good news is: A new film is being made about Billy the Kid. It is the 21st movie made about Lincoln County's most notorious resident, who allegedly was murdered at the age of 21 after having killed 21 men. The movie is called "Young Guns."

The film, which stars Brat Pack member Emilio Estevez and "La Bamba" star Lou Diamond Phillips, as well as Casey Siemaszko and Kiefer Sutherland, begins filming in early February.

Before you get a new hairdo, iron your western duds, polish up that jewelry and get ready to stand in line to be cast as "extras" in the movie, here's the bad news: They are not shooting the movie in its authentic site.

They are, instead, shooting the movie in Cerrillos, located on Highway 14 between Albuquerque and Santa Fe.

Why Cerrillos? Why not Lincoln? Because, according to the producers: Cerrillos looks a lot more like they want Lincoln to look than Lincoln does.

According to news reports, writer John Fusco and co-producers Erby Smith and Paul Schiff want the film to be "reasonably accurate." Fusco even spent time in Lincoln, according to sources. Still, production has begun near Santa Fe.

Lincoln is not the only locale to be ignored by the film industry lately. "Juarez," a dramatic television series to be shot in El Paso, Texas, with a mainly Hispanic cast, has just been canned by ABC because the El Paso setting was "too

gritty."

Jeffrey Bloom, the show's writer, director and executive producer, was quoted in the El Paso Times this week as saying that the El Paso shots did not meet the image that the network executives had wanted. "They kept asking for beauty shots," Bloom was quoted as saying. "They said, 'Where are the cactuses? Where are the adobe houses?' They wanted it to have the coffee-table look of a Georgia O'Keeffe painting."

Cancellation of the film is costing the El Paso area about \$2 million in potential revenues from the filming.

John Jeffers, executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, sighs when asked about losing the potential income and prestige the Billy the Kid film would have brought to the Ruidoso area.

"Providing locations for film making is a form of economic development and revenue-producing that doesn't take much effort to carry out," he says.

Getting the county considered as a film location is something Jeffers is interested in, and he has offered brought up the subject to local businesspeople. "When I first came here, Bill Hirschfeld was president of the chamber and we discussed starting up a Southern New Mexico Film Commission," he says. "It would cost \$1,000 for someone to be on the Board of Directors. The money would go to hire a full-time lobbyist in Los Angeles to present tapes of all we have to offer. I thought it was a great idea, and there were some very interested people."

"When Governor Anaya ap-

pointed Paul Lazarus as the Director of the New Mexico Motion Picture Promotion Bureau, now the New Mexico Film Commission, Lazarus asked if we would hold off on our plans, in order that he could 'unify' the state under one umbrella plan."

"Lazarus did come down, and he talked to us, and he promised to help send business our way. However, that promise really hasn't held up."

After Lazarus left the job, actor Bill Daley came and went in the role of director, and then Linda Hutchinson became director.

"I would think we would have a shot at having some films, TV or videos produced here," says Jeffers. "The thing is, to promote Lincoln County, we really have to stay on their cases in Santa Fe. And of course, we don't have the money to hire a full-time lobbyist."

There have been films made in Lincoln County; "Casey's Shadow," which was shot partially in Virgil Hall's Capitan garage and mostly at Ruidoso Downs Race Track, was filmed here; the "Grizzly Adams" TV show featured the rolling hills of Lincoln County, and some remember a movie called "A Tiger By The Tail" in which a heist is pulled off at Ruidoso Downs.

"If southern New Mexico continues to be ignored, we will put together our original organization," claims Jeffers. "We realize there are some things you can't do here. You know, you can't pretend Lincoln County has pueblos or a metropolitan area, or a Miami Beach look. But we've got such a vast difference in terrain mile-for-mile here, we can do Sonoran desert, high plains, and mountains.

And I don't have to tell you about the light. Ruidoso is surrounded by a million acres of forest. We will always be an oasis in the wilderness."

"And, now we even have an airport. The southern part of the state is a lot more diversified than people in the film industry know."

Hutchinson concurs. "I know, it seems as if you've been ignored down in Lincoln County. In the time I've been here, we have shot feature films, commercials, music videos and industrial films in 12 counties - but not Lincoln. Not yet."

"Where to shoot is purely a creative decision. We encouraged that Lincoln be looked at by Hollywood. The guy who's writing the screenplay even lived there for six months. But they decided to go with Cerrillos. That was their decision. It wasn't ours to make."

In calendar year 1987, Santa Fe profited \$26.2 million dollars through the movie industry. In fiscal year 87-88, which began last July, there have so far been 42 separate projects.

Hutchinson adds that there are a variety of reasons producers choose to use New Mexico as a location. "You see more and more on-location productions, because viewers have become well-traveled and more sophisticated in what they see. They don't believe in 'Hollywood sets' anymore. They want the real thing. The state has clear air and clean skies, and the geography is remarkably varied."

"We are in competition with Arizona and Texas for film dollars, and we have to work hard to promote the state."

a loan when we have the money?" asked Councillor J.D. James. He recalled approving laying the pipeline after learning the money was on hand.

"We're just looking at everything," said village manager Frank Potter, encouraging the council to do more long-range planning.

"Isn't this a long-range project?" asked Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. Eggleston answered, yes, even if the pre-application is approved, the money won't begin for a year to 18 months.

Projections on the form include \$561,125 to install sewer lines in the Town and Country North subdivision; \$457,875 to extend sewer into the Pinecliff Subdivision; \$4 million to complete the Grandstone Canyon water project; and \$600,000 to complete a water line from the Eagle Creek well field directly into the village distribution system.

Also Tuesday, councillors heard from attorney Mike Runnels of legislation pending in Santa Fe to reimburse Ruidoso for expenses in the ongoing water litigation involving Rio Ruidoso water right owners

and the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe.

Runnels said he's working with the Water Defense Association on a bill to be introduced by representatives Barbara Casey and Dick Knowles. The bill will ask the Legislature for \$275,000 for the Village of Ruidoso, \$131,000 for the Water Defense Association and \$225,000 for the appeals process.

"That represents a significant amount of the Legislature's discretionary funds," noted Runnels. "We've got a tough row to hoe," he added.

However, there are precedents for the request, said Runnels. In his written report, the attorney warned that failure to regain funds spent on the case could result in the Village of Ruidoso withdrawing from the suit and reduce by \$250,000 the funds for water capital improvement projects.

Councillors heard legislative updates from Sierra Blanca Regional Airport manager Tim Morris and Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce executive director John Jeffers.

Morris said a bill will be introduced asking for \$150,000 to con-

tinue the next phase in developing the regional airport. He said that amount would serve as matching funds for federal funding of \$1.5 million.

Jeffers warned of deep cuts in the Economic Development and Tourism Department budget. "It could really put a dent in what the state's trying to do," said Jeffers.

Councillors OK'd three requests to use the old airport for special events. They gave the go-ahead for a St. Jude's Wheels for Life Bike-athon on April 30; the Lincoln County Homebuilders Association first annual home show on June 24, 25 and 26; and the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Art Festival on July 29, 30 and 31.

In other regular business Tuesday, the council:

—Learned that State Transportation Director Bob White is retiring after 25 years of state service. "He's been very instrumental in helping us with the airport," said Potter after reading aloud a letter from White.

—Accepted without comment monthly department reports included in the agenda packet.

—Adopted a resolution accepting

a Community Development Block Grant for the MainStreet Program. Shaw questioned if this council, in authorizing the \$18,000 MainStreet director's salary, has obligated future councils to the three-year program. Councillor Elmer Firelli said, although the program is for three years, the council has pledged only one year's salary.

—Adopted a resolution making minor changes to the Personnel Rules and Regulations. The changes are over the way Police Department overtime will be computed.

—Adopted a mid-year budget resolution. "The other day at our workshop I asked was the budget on target, and it was answered yes," noted Councillor J.D. James, and accountant John Varley nodded. "These things happen every year and they go to the Department of Finance for their approval," added Mayor Davis. "I think it's in line," said Davis.

The council is still one member short since the resignation of former councillor Victor Alonso.

Past police chief demoted

Ruidoso Police Chief William Newman confirmed Wednesday that former chief Richard Swenor was demoted from sergeant to corporal for a 30-day period beginning the first week of January.

"We had a personnel complaint ... I was the complainant," said Newman. He said the disciplinary action resulted from an incident that occurred on December 7, 1987. Two Ruidoso Police officers who were assigned to Sergeant Swenor's command were alleged to have been involved in a prank call to the Ruidoso Police Department, said Newman.

Chief Newman said an investigation revealed that on that date, at about 9:20 p.m., "one or more of our employees were present and participated in making a prank telephone call to the Ruidoso Police Department that resulted in an unnecessary emergency response by police and fire personnel."

Newman said the investigation showed that Sergeant Swenor was told that an off-duty Ruidoso Police

officer and a communications dispatch officer (CDO) were both involved. Newman said allegations against the CDO proved to be unfounded. The investigation revealed that the officer was present and participated in the call, said Newman.

The officer was suspended without pay for two days, said Newman.

The charges against Swenor, the commander on day shift, resulted from Swenor being informed of the allegations and failing to take appropriate action, said Newman, adding that Swenor was demoted for 30 days.

"That was the ruling, that's what they came up with. Whether I agree with it or disagree with it, that's the name of the game," commented Swenor, when contacted by telephone early today (Thursday).

"He is still the acting sergeant, but at corporal's pay," said Newman. "This is over and done with," he added.

Petition

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was an obvious reaction to the commission's taking action against the sheriff, which was not taken in a vindictive fashion, nor in a political manner, but only after he has jeopardized the county so many times and in so many ways that we could no longer allow the sheriff to continue in actions which we feel are improper and not in compliance with ordinances and budget procedures.

"He has been doing things regarding the budget that would be extremely detrimental to the county, and frankly, we do not have the money to pay for his actions," continued Mitchell.

"Hightower, Dunlap and Karn are the finest commission I've ever seen in this county, and I've been here all my life. I'm used to people going after me all the time, it's the nature of my job; but to go after those three men and Suzanne Cox is a downright crime. This is get-

ting to be just like the old days of the Wild West. The only difference between this and shooting it out in the street is the absence of guns."

Mitchell feels the grand jury petition is motivated by the desire for political power. "We're in a situation now where the sheriff's liable to get bit by his own grand jury," Mitchell commented.

"It's going to be interesting to see how fair of a grand jury we get," said Commissioner Bill Karn. "If the sheriff and his supporters really wanted quick and speedy justice, they could have filed in District Court to get a writ of mandamus against the commissioners to follow the state laws and statutes. But instead, using the grand jury as a smokescreen, it's going to become a political tool to affect the outcome of future elections."

Karn, a Republican, said that he doesn't feel that standard party politics are the underlying cause of the friction between the commission and the sheriff and county

clerk.

"I've been a Republican ever since I registered to vote, and I have nothing political against Don Samuels or Fran Siddens. The politics here are in the grand jury itself. It's deeper than just 'Republican' or 'Democrat.' Some people want to gain power in this county, and they're going to use the grand jury as a tool."

"I just hope the people are honest and honorable people."

Commission Chairman John Allen Hightower had a brief comment to make concerning the petition and grand jury investigation. "I think it's regrettable, but I hope it brings out everything so people know what's going on."

County Clerk Fran Siddens, attending the New Mexico Association of Counties meeting in Santa Fe, said in a telephone interview that she has not seen the petition herself, and so has no comment. Siddens indicated that her staff is

short-handed and very busy at this time, but that they will be verifying each signature on the petition to make sure they are the signatures of qualified voters.

Sheriff Don Samuels was out of town yesterday but phoned in a reaction on Wednesday night. "I don't feel I've done anything wrong," he said. "I'm looking forward to the outcome of the grand jury. But you know, I had nothing to do with this petition. I've always run an open-door administration, anyone is welcome in my office at any time."

Samuels agreed with the commissioners that he would like to sit down with them and talk about all the problems between his office and county management. "I don't like all this bickering," he said. "I lose, the commission loses, the taxpayers all lose. I wish we could just sit down and talk about these problems, and then everyone could go about their business."

P&Z can't meet Mon., no quorum present

With just four of eight members present, the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) canceled Monday's meeting for lack of a quorum.

Meeting for the first time since December 21, the commission was unable to act on four scheduled agenda items, but rescheduled the meeting for 2 p.m. Wednesday, January 27 (see related story).

"Unfortunately some things have

come up and we're not going to be able to have a meeting," announced Chairman David Smith to the handful of citizens gathered in council chambers of Village Hall. Commissioners Smith, Candace Garrett, Eddie Nichols and Robert Donaldson were present for the meeting. Commissioners Ken Carr, Lisa Wiggins, John White and Ellen Long were absent.

According to village staff, Wiggins, White and Long had reported they would be unable to attend, but attempts by staff to locate Carr

Monday afternoon were apparently unsuccessful.

P&Z, created by ordinance as a nine-member commission, remains one member short awaiting a mayoral appointment of the ninth member.

Before the four members, village staff and village attorney John Underwood dispersed, audience member C.P. Holstun Jr. of Roswell asked to join the group.

"I don't have any input—I'd just like to know what you guys have got planned," said Holstun,

questioning a request for a property line variance at 217 Fifth Street. Holstun noted the house was just built, and wondered why the owner or builder was asking to extend the structure into the setbacks.

"I could see this on an old house—but you just built that house," said Holstun, addressing the applicant, Otis W. Pearson.

Discussions between Pearson and Holstun continued as commissioners left.

P&Z Commission Chairman Smith resigns

Chairman David Smith resigned Wednesday from the Planning and Zoning Commission.

"I didn't want to do it," said Smith, who said he has moved outside village limits, and is no longer eligible to serve.

"I'll be here pushing for the new ordinance," he added. Smith has been on the commission for nearly two years and has served as chairman for the past nine months. He has been heavily involved in drafting the proposed comprehensive plan and zoning ordinance.

During Wednesday's special meeting, called when the group was unable to attain a quorum Monday, the group voted to delay electing new officers until the March 1 municipal elections. The nine-member commission, already short one member, is now two short, and commissioners agreed to wait until the new council organizes and the mayor makes his appointments to bring the board up to its full membership before electing a new chairman.

Vice-chairman Eddie Nichols chaired Wednesday's meeting.

In regular business Wednesday, the commission:

—Heard from village staff member Mary Maxwell that a planning administrator has been hired and will report for duty on February 16,

—Unanimously approved a property line setback variance at Lot 13, Block C, Ruidoso Springs Subdivision.

—Unanimously approved a property line setback variance at Lot 13, Block Q, Ruidoso Pine Lodge Subdivision.

—Authorized a replat of Lots 4, 5 and 6 of the C.E. Webb Tract, subject to a review by the village attorney. Agent John Shaw said the replat will result in two tracts and straighten out property descriptions and deeds. "Fortunately this is all in the family," said Shaw, ex-

plaining that one tract will be the Ruidoso Athletic Club (RAC) tract belonging to Paul and Jeanie Whitwam and the other will be the Richard Whitwam tract. Shaw said the Whitwams plan to build an addition on at the RAC to add a lap pool.


—Learned a request to replat property in Sierra Blanca Subdivision was withdrawn.

—Tabled a request from Tammie Maddox, Ruidoso/Lincoln County Crime Stoppers secretary, to place signs in village neighborhoods. She said the metal signs will have the

Crime Stoppers telephone number and be added to signposts already in place. The commission asked to see a picture of the signs, as well as a plan for where they'll be placed.

—Heard that a public hearing is planned for Monday, February 8, to act on the proposed zoning ordinance, all zoning maps and the airport master plan. Village attorney John Underwood said it's important to have a quorum at that meeting.

—Set regular meetings for February 16 and February 22.

Chamber board names Jeffers to serve on EDC Young Guns

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors meeting dealt with routine business, prior to the board's Mid-Year Retreat to be held at the Incredible from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday, January 30.

The board took action by naming Executive Director John Jeffers to the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County as a Class A board member, representing the chamber.

Also named to a position was Kent Beatty, from Ruidoso Downs Race Track, as an ex officio member of the board of directors.

Divisional committee reports were heard. Ronnie Paulger reported that \$17,850 was raised for advertising for Mesa Airline's Ruidoso/Albuquerque and Ruidoso/Dallas-Fort Worth commuter flights. "We were supposed to provide from \$15,000 to \$20,000 for this purpose, and as you can see, we're right in the middle," Paulger said.

A total of 129 people have utilized the Mesa flights during the month of January thus far, according to Paulger.

Bill Hirschfeld reported that three new members have been named to the Advertising/Promotions Division. They include: Kent Beatty, Mary Maul and Jim Biggs.

According to Jeffers, long-awaited padded maps of Ruidoso will be produced soon. "The artwork has been found, is being redone, and should be ready to print by the end of the week," he said.

Meanwhile, John Jeffers is getting impatient for a local production. "We've got to quit mealy-mouthin' around. We need to raise about \$2,000,000 for a full-time Hollywood lobbyist, or we're never going to see any film crews in Ruidoso. That's just the fact of the matter."

Jack Rigney, chief ranger for Lincoln State Monuments, would entertain the possibility of a live film shoot in Lincoln. "I read the same thing you did in the Albuquerque paper," he said. "You know, the usual deal. We've researched the area and found it unacceptable. But no one has ever approached me about the possibility. If this Fusco guy, the screenwriter, lived in Lincoln, I never ran into him, and I see almost everyone in town every day."

Would Rigney permit the somewhat fragile historical buildings to be used as film sets? "We would permit research into that idea," Rigney admits. "We'd have to check it out, but I certainly wouldn't turn a project like this 'Billy the Kid' movie down without seeing what we could do to accommodate the film makers."

"It seems crazy, doesn't it, that someone would have the chance to shoot a film in the actual historical location where it really happened, and would choose not to do so. We would oblige the film industry in any way we can, short of permitting our structures to be damaged. I wish they really would send somebody down to check us out, like they always say they will. People have the mistaken idea, I think, that Lincoln is so remote it would be impossible to film here. Of course that's not true, especially considering the new airport and all."

Director of the Lincoln Historical Trust, Gary Miller, echoes Rigney's sentiments. "I think it comes down to the fact that Santa Fe is more convenient," he says. "It's just logistics. These people have no desire to be 'authentic.' I'm kind of disappointed in the state, quite frankly. Lincoln is a State Historical Monument, something New Mexico should be promoting. If anybody came down here to check out the town, they didn't check with

me, and if they did 'a lot of research,' as it was claimed, they never came to the Historical Trust, the obvious place to conduct research, or at least they didn't identify themselves to us."

Like Rigney, Miller has no knowledge of writer John Fusco.

"Believe me, we would welcome film-makers here," says Miller. "I have a feeling that they don't come here because they don't even know about Lincoln. Everybody knows Tombstone, Arizona, but for some reason you can say 'Billy the Kid,' and people don't automatically go, 'Oh, Lincoln, New Mexico.' We have such a unique set-up here, there is nothing like it anywhere else, and it's completely ignored by film makers. That's a shame. They don't know what they're missing."

John Fusco is from Vermont. "I've spent a lot of time in the West," he said in a phone interview from Santa Fe. He did not, however, live in Lincoln for six months as reported. "I came down to visit during the spring of '87," he said. "I stayed about two weeks. While I was here, I stayed at the Inn of the Mountain Gods."

While he was in Lincoln, Fusco "basically crawled around nooks and crannies," speaking to someone at the Tunstall store, and some of the Coe family.

"I'm a very low-key individual," he says. "You know, I didn't run around saying, 'I'm making a movie, I'm making a movie.'"

"I passed through several times to get feel of the town. And, I've read everything and anything I could get my hands on for the past 18 years about Billy the Kid. The guy just fascinates me. When I first saw his photograph, I was haunted by it. The hands, the face... I kept having dreams about it. I was so grabbed by the photo. I said to myself, 'This face does not correspond to the legend of The Kid being a bad guy.' I'm a pretty good judge of faces."

Fusco also wrote the screenplay for the movie "Crossroads," about folk legend Robert Johnson.

"I think it would have been great to shoot in Lincoln. When I first sat down with the director and talked to him about it, he said he'd like to shoot on location. Went off to work on another project, and when I came back, I heard that they were

in Santa Fe looking for location. So many hurdles are involved. You know, the screenwriter has no say as to where the film is shot. Just getting it done at all becomes sort of a miracle."

Fusco lists Fulton, Tuska and Adams as his favorite writers in the Billy Club. "My area of interest has always been The Regulators," Fusco admits. "That's the focus of this movie. Bonney, Bowdre, Brewer, Scurlock and Chaves are the major characters."

"Young Guns" ends right after the Lincoln County War. This, obviously, leaves room for a sequel involving the 1881 jailbreak and Billy's eventual death in Fort Sumner.

Fusco boasts an all-star cast for his film, including Estevez as Billy, his brother Charlie Sheen as Dick Brewer, Keifer Sutherland (son of actor Donald) as Doc Scurlock, Phillips as Chaves y Chaves, British actor Terrance Stamp as John Tunstall, and Jack Palance as L.G. Murphy.

He was not sure who would play the roles of Susan McSweeney, Alex McSweeney or Jimmy Dolan yet. "I haven't seen the list," he admitted.

The director is Chris Cain, and the film is due for release in August.

The question of shooting in northern New Mexico bothers Fusco. "As far as location... well, you know, I did what I could. There are all kinds of variables involved. I'm the writer, not the producer. Sometimes it comes down to crew. In larger cities like Santa Fe, you have access to instant crew. There is so much production going on there, everything is more routine and smoother."

Fusco plans to make another trip to Lincoln in the near future, just to hang out a little. A true enthusiast, he loves to talk about Billy the Kid.

"I care about authenticity, because I'm a writer. But the production people want convenience, and the people who buy tickets to the movies, well, they don't care where it's filmed. They mainly care who's starring in it, and if there's enough action."

Crime Stoppers select officers

Rich Seeley was elected vice-president and Roy Seay will again serve as treasurer.

board and elected recording secretary. Mildred Crocker was elected corresponding secretary, and Rick Silva will fill the new office of sergeant at arms. Jane Parnell was elected board member at large.

Maddox, who has served as vice-president of the group this year, will now act as coordinator and liaison with the Ruidoso Police Department.

It was learned at the meeting that the January 3 burglary of the Ronnie Paulger residence was solved by the Ruidoso Police Department using a tip received on the Crime Stoppers line. A reward was authorized in that case.

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



School levy Superintendent hopes voters give OK

"It's important to maintain present facilities and to provide a room or space for a computer lab so that we are able to educate our students in the computer age," explains Superintendent of Capitan Schools Scott Childress, as to why it's important to Capitan for the voters to continue the Capital Improvements Act by voting "yes" in the February 2nd special school election.

"This funding, which is already in place, is to be used as a source of funding for capital improvements, which can include maintenance, or to equip classrooms, it can be used to renovate existing facilities," Childress said.

"This is probably the only source of the funding for these types of items, and we need them because what we are attempting to do here is provide the very best educational opportunity for kids, and I think that we will be able to do so with a continuation of this levy."

Childress, along with school board members and school principals, stresses that continuation of the Capital Improvements Act will not cost Capitan taxpayers any more in taxes than they are already paying.

Specific facilities and equipment needs are:

-General renovation of the old gym, including replacing ceiling and floor tile, handicapped access and roof repair.

-General renovation of the new gym, including roof repair, and upgraded locker rooms.

-General renovation of the high school, including roof repair, computer purchases, and remodeled rest rooms.

-General renovation of the elementary school, including replacing heaters and installing sidewalks.

-The district needs two vehicles, a computer lab, landscaping and maintenance equipment.

-The library needs a second floor for its computer lab.

-The cafeteria needs a new sub-floor and floor.

Many of these renovations and repairs were mandated by the State Department of Education

evaluators, who noted that the restrooms, in particular, need tile and drainage repair and handicap access.

If the Capital Improvements Act is not passed, the school district will not be able to make the necessary repairs:

"Since this is an extension of a levy that's already in place, there will not be any additional increase in taxes," Childress reiterated. "I can't stress that aspect enough. We need this money badly, and are counting on Capitan citizens voting 'yes' in Tuesday's election so we can begin all the work that is involved in making our schools even more appropriate to education than they are now."



Warriors drop close game to Tularosa

cat rebounder. Before time elapsed, Tularosa added three to the tally for the 73-68 final.



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



Eight volunteer firefighters were presented with Firemanship I certificates. They were Bob Palko, D.A. Kincaid, Ed Pennington, Greg Lane, Bob Messick, Diane Palmer, Carl Palmer, and Ray Tuthill.

Capitan Bob Palko was also recognized for a year of perfect attendance at meetings and training sessions. He was presented with an engraved brass key ring.

Also recognized were retired members C.R. Patterson, Jo Kirk, and Bob Finley.

Puckett announced the appointment of the following lieutenants: Greg Lane, training; Jack Orto, vehicle maintenance; Steve Hez-mall, building-maintenance; Lillian Puckett, fund-raising; Gene Viele, rescue; and Tony Rank, finance.

Members of Bonito Volunteer Fire Department (BVFD) got their hands on their department's latest acquisition, a full set of Hurst extrication tools, at their regular training session Tuesday, January 12.

Hurst extrication tools are popularly known as "Jaws of Life." "These tools can be used to open car doors that are wedged shut during a car accident," said Howard Puckett, BVFD Chief. "Their primary purpose is saving lives and extricating persons trapped in motor

vehicle accidents. In light of the new airport opening up in our district, 'Jaws' is useful in aircraft accidents, too."

Smith "Smitty" Allen of Artesia Fire Equipment demonstrated the tools. "This set consists of a power unit, 6 1/2-inch cutter, 27-inch spreader, 22-inch ram, manifold block for multiple tool use, two sections of 30-foot hose and one section of 16-foot hose. It is the largest and most complete set presently in this county," Allen said.

"There are the original 'Jaws of Life,'" he continued, "invented by a fellow named Hurst who was a race car driver. He saw a need for get-


ting drivers out of wrecked cars in a hurry. The first tool he invented was a spreader. Originally it was huge, but over the years, technology led to a smaller yet more powerful tool. Also over the years, the cutter and ram were developed, as well as the manifold block so you can use more than one tool off the same power unit."

On Saturday, February 6th, a factory representative will give the complete eight-hour certification course to area personnel. All firefighters or Emergency Medical personnel in the county are welcome to attend the class whether or not their particular department has the Hurst tools. The class will be held at Sierra Blanca Motors beginning at 8 a.m. There is no charge, but participants must wear face shields, bunker coats, heavy gloves and boots.

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

EDITORIAL

It's refreshing to see an instance of public officials realizing that what they're doing is public business.

An example was the Monday night meeting of the Ruidoso Downs Trustees. A suggestion by Trustee C.L. "Bones" Wright was unanimously approved by his fellow trustees. His suggestion, to conduct an executive session in the office adjacent to the meeting room, enabled audience members to remain in the meeting room until the executive session was concluded.

At previous meetings, audience members would step outside while trustees discussed the closed-session business. Usually, the night's chill was enough to send home all but the most hardy, and the trustees would reopen the meeting to an almost empty meeting room.

But Monday, members of the public were on hand to hear what action had been taken or learn of executive-session discussions. It also gave trustees an opportunity to make public statements about what happened in their closed-door session, a First Amendment right they have that they should be allowed to exercise.

It's a step to ensure the public is not being left out in the cold, weather-wise, and public information-wise.—DJP

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—The occupants of the Capitol Building are getting too big for their britches.

Yes, there may be a problem with oversized egos but we're talking about office space today.

The Legislature is looking for someone to study the long-range space needs of Capitol Building occupants and recommend how those needs can be met.

The Governor, Lt. Governor, Secretary of State and some offices of the governor's finance and administration department occupy the top floor of the building. The Legislature occupies the lower three floors.

The Legislature requires space to meet in session and in committee. It needs space for offices and for its three permanent interim committees and their staffs and it needs space for its maintenance department. The Legislature also provides space for the press so that when anyone gets the urge to make news, coverage is only minutes away.

The Legislature is the landlord of the Capitol Building. It is governed by the Legislative Council, composed of the leaders in both houses of each party. The Legislative Council Service is its staff. The top executive officers are there as guests or tenants or whatever the Legislature feels like calling them at the time.

The arrangement seems unfair to the executive. There have been charges in the past that maintenance needs of the Legislature come first. During the Anaya administration, Toney got so little respect that the Legislature joked about evicting him.

Perhaps that is the best thing that could happen, assuming that the governor would have a place to go.

In calling for the study, the Legislative Council has that in mind as a possibility.

Land on the block west of the Capitol has been purchased by the state. When the Capitol was constructed in 1965-66, the plan was to buy all of the block west of the Capitol, which was then private property owned by several organizations and individuals.

Tunnels were excavated heading in two directions from the west side of the Capitol to proposed buildings across the street. One building was to be a cafeteria for Legislative employees.

The grand plan by the Capitol Buildings Improvement Commission under Gov. Jack Campbell was

to buy at least a half-block of property on all sides of the Capitol Building for state offices.

Somehow, somewhere that plan got sidetracked during the Cargo administration and the property was never purchased. For that reason, we now have a South Capitol Complex a couple of miles away composed of several huge buildings and other state offices leasing from businesses all over town.

It may be that Gov. David Cargo never intended for state government to grow the way it has. If that is so he was naive to ever think it.

That was 20 years ago, when most of state government was contained on a few city blocks near downtown Santa Fe. The person the Legislature is seeking would have to project space needs for all the present Capitol Building occupants for the next 20 years.

The Legislature also wants the parking problem studied in the same manner. Anyone who has been to the Capitol, especially during a legislative session, knows the situation is nearly impossible.

Lt. Gov. Mike Rummels set out to solve that problem when he was in office but the wheels of state government ground too slowly. His top solution reportedly involved underground parking on the block west of the Capitol but the land never could be purchased. The state started running out of its sources for construction money about that time.

The method for seeking the services the Legislature desires no longer called bidding. State agencies now put out requests for proposals.

In this particular request, cost of the services is only 15 percent of the total evaluation. The other factors considered are experience, qualifications, references and ability to get the job done on time.

For anyone who might be interested at taking a shot at this planning project, requests for proposal documents can be obtained from Paula Tackett, Deputy Director, Legislative Council Service, 334 State Capitol, Santa Fe, New Mexico 87503. The deadline for submitting proposals is Feb. 26. Work must be completed by Aug. 15.

In case anyone has any ideas to the contrary, the last paragraph in the request for proposals states that New Mexico criminal laws prohibit bribes, gratuities and kickbacks.

Aw, gee. That's taking all the fun out of it.

Reporter's Round

Secrets ...

Here we go again. We, the public, are being "protected" from too much knowledge. Elected and appointed officials, as well as all sorts of bureaucrats, continue to "know best" what we private citizens should and shouldn't know.

Reporters take on the job of reporting on the workings of public institutions—being on hand for various meetings and events—serving as the eyes and ears of the general public. It's not up to us to decide on the various issues, but it is our responsibility to gather and pass on ALL the information available so our readers can use the facts to make informed judgments.

The open meetings law is quite clear, in fact: the formation of public policy should be conducted and considered in public. Period. Exceptions to that requirement are clearly lined out, and meetings of public bodies may be closed to discuss just seven subjects including personnel matters and litigation. That's it.

Other laws cover public information available through the courts, law enforcement and other public agencies. The Arrest Records Information Act of 1976 places few, if any, restrictions on information provided by local police departments.

So, what's the big deal? You may recall previous columns and editorials in this newspaper on this very subject.

The tendency of public officials continues to be toward secrecy. Maybe one group is having fewer executive sessions, and another is providing more public information; next thing we know someone else is "protecting" us from knowing more than we need to know.

For instance, the Ruidoso Village Council is clear on the law governing executive sessions and is careful to cite an exception when going into closed meetings. However, the recently adopted agenda form includes "information items" that may or may not be talked over during the meetings. One such item on a recent agenda was over how to increase the councillors' pay. The memo called for consideration of increasing the pay from \$260 to \$500 a month.

One member of the council was angered that the information was provided to and published in The News. That councillor said information items were only to be distributed among council members for their consideration.

Do we really want councillors passing secret notes among themselves to be made public only when

a consensus has been reached privately? Come on, councillors; hash it out in public.

If information items are disseminated through the council packet without public discussions, and consideration is done privately, then votes could be accomplished quickly, quietly and with little or no public input.

Then the council, since its members know best, could double its own salary or take other such action as quickly as six councillors could vote "aye."

Secrecy isn't limited to elected officials. Appointed public servants want to have their secrets, too.

For months the Planning and Zoning Commission tossed around a suggestion by one member to have an executive session over personnel. The commission, appointed by the mayor, has no personnel, and no authority to hire, fire or give orders to any village staff member.

In spite of the village attorney's advice to the commission that its members had no reason, under any exception to the Public Meetings Act, to have closed meetings, at least one commissioner has pressed to discuss something in private.

Law enforcement officials sometimes make it difficult to obtain public information.

Police officers sometimes write "not for publication" on incident reports. Maybe the person reporting the incident asked them to, or maybe they just thought it was something that was nobody's business. If it's not public information, why fill out an official incident report?

Just tracking down some law en-

forcement officers and their reports can be a mission impossible. For instance, if only one person can make official statements and that official can seldom (or nearly never) be reached by telephone and doesn't return calls, then some public information is never released.

One lawman, finally reached by telephone to discuss a burglary arrest, asked the reporter not to reveal the names of the arresting officers.

Private citizens, too, want to use the public process and remain anonymous.

Citizens who delivered a copy of a petition filed in District Court didn't want their names mentioned in a report of the petition. They wanted the information published, but refused to comment and asked not to be identified.

I have been asked not to publish the names of certain people convicted in the courts. They might find it embarrassing to have their names associated with the crimes. Well, who wouldn't? If we intentionally leave out one name, shouldn't we protect everybody and just close court records?

Speakers in open meetings sometimes say, "now this is off the record," and continue talking in the open forum. Sorry, folks; an open meeting is just that—you can't speak off the record during an open meeting.

I just don't think we can know too much about what's going on in the public sector. The days of "Father Knows Best" are long-gone, and we, the public, are all grown up—ready to take on that dangerous burden of knowledge.

Levi's cost big bucks in Europe, say exchange students

A pair of Levi's costs \$60 or more in Germany and upwards of \$80 in Sweden.

The cost to obtain a drivers license is about \$500 in Sweden, and costs as much as \$1,000 in Holland.

The rate of unemployment is at 13 percent in England, even higher for people 16 to 21 years old, and just two percent in Sweden.

Foreign exchange students from England, Germany, Holland and Sweden told the Ruidoso High School student body those bits of information and more in an assembly presented Tuesday by the RHS DECA chapter.

As part of a program to promote the free enterprise system, the assembly was intended "to give a taste of other systems," said RHS DECA President Billie Strohmeyer.

Eddie Putnam from England said his country's educational system is "a bit of a mess" as a result of last year's teachers strike. He said sports and extra-curricular activities are no longer available in the schools.

Eddie said only the top seven percent of students in England have the opportunity to continue in

the educational system after they turn 16. The rest are sent out into the job market.

"If you do go to college, you're going to get a good job," said Eddie, adding the college-bound students undergo a grueling "rat-race" that includes four hours of homework each night. He said students pass or fail according to the results of a final examination.

That's also the case in Germany, said Franciska Krings. She said the comprehensive final exams are almost all that counts. The problem in Germany is getting into the universities, that are overcrowded because so many are qualified to attend, said Franciska.

Martin Anderson from Sweden described a flexible educational system that begins when Swedish youngsters are seven years old. "The university is free, but you have to have good grades," said Martin.

Schooling begins at two years of age in Holland, explained Doswin 'Gizmo' VinDerWielen from Holland. He said children learn reading and writing in pre-school beginning at age four, and go onto another school between the ages of six and 12.

"When you're 12 years old you can choose from 1,000 different schools," noted Gizmo, adding university studies begin for students 16 to 18 years old. College graduates are assured a good income in Holland, said Gizmo.

Taxes are high in the home countries of all four students.

"Our lowest rate of taxes is your highest one," said Eddie. Tax rates in England are 30 to 70 percent, he added.

"If your dad gets a salary, almost half goes to the government," said Franciska, adding that most families in Germany have just one wage-earner. She said tax rates go from 22 to 60 percent.

"Tax in Sweden's quite high—40 to 80 percent," said Martin, and Gizmo said taxes in Holland are "unbelievable."

On the other hand, those high taxes in the four countries provide medical care for all citizens as well as unemployment benefits.

"If you don't have a job you can get money anyway," said Martin, telling how Swedish unemployment is at just two percent. "We don't really have poor people," said Martin.

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

Standards of living described varied among the four countries, with gasoline higher than in the U.S., and students putting off driving and owning a car until they're through school and working.

Eddie said the established class system in England makes "moving up" difficult; and Franciska said jobs are so hard to find in Germany that young people begin looking for a job two years before finishing school.

"It's really a drag to find a job," she said.

RHS students questioned the speakers over alcohol use and DWI, as well as speed limits and traffic deaths. In spite of speed limits of 80 to 120 miles per hour, students said traffic deaths aren't that high in their countries.

"It's (speeding) not a big deal because you're not breaking the law,"

said Eddie. Gizmo said accident rates are higher in the winter in Holland.

The students told of stiff penalties for driving drunk, but said alcohol doesn't cause that many problems. Gizmo said in Holland it's legal to drink beginning at age 15.

With the high cost of Levi's, students were asked if they'll haul

massive amounts home after their stay in the U.S.

"Yes," answered Eddie. "We can make a lot of money off this country," he quipped.

Questioned over what it takes to become a foreign exchange student, Eddie answered, "Guts." How Americans are treated as foreign students depends on a great many factors, including where they go.

Eddie said Britain and Germany are more pro-American than France, but people in all those countries have some misconceptions about the United States.

Franciska laughingly told how some Germans picture all Americans wearing flowery shorts, a Bud-Light shirt and hat.

"Everybody in Holland wants to go at least once to America," said

Gizmo. "We think of America as the land of opportunity."

Michelle Aalbersberg of Australia, the newest foreign exchange student at RHS, was also introduced during the assembly.
