Texan Denton still fastest

Morris Denton captured the men's division of the ninth annual Texas Cup for the third year in a row while the women's division was wrapped up by Letha McClelland for her fourth victory.

In near-ideal weather conditions more than 100 skiers from the Lone Star State battled it out last weekend on a side-by-side course laid out down the Capitan Run at Ski Apache Resort.

Denton, of Fort Worth, came into the competition Saturday as the defending champion and was successful through Saturday's trials and Sunday's finals to secure another year as "The Fastest Skier in Texas."

Second place went to Bill Shirer, of Dallas. Drew Smith, of Texas Tech University at Lubbock, came in third.

In women's competition, McClelland, of Irving, retained her crown, defeating Carol Brown, of Mesquite, for the championship. Third place went to Kim Zimmerman, of El Paso.

Team trophies went to Sun and Ski Sports, of Arlington, first; Southwest Airlines, Dallas, second; and The Nose Pickers, from various Texas cities, third.

Kicking off competition as a fore-runner was Robert Strohshine, representing the Ski Apache Handicapped Skiers Association, who

was a giant slalom bronze medalist in the recent Disabled World Championships in Mutters, Austria.

A telecast of the Texas Cup competition will be broadcast on Home Sports Entertainment network and

syndicated throughout Texas, said race organizer Steve Moss. He said that will include about seven million viewers.

Next weekend at Ski Apache Resort will feature the New Mexico Cup, a new event this year, said

Moss, also organizer of that event. Skiers will race head-to-head in a competition for bragging rights for the Land of Enchantment. Race registration will be from 6 to 11 p.m. Friday, February 19, at the Bull Ring restaurant.

Ruidosoans back water money bill

We need help! That was the message village officials and staff took to state lawmakers on Thursday.

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., councilors Elmer Pirelli and Jerry Shaw and village manager Frank Potter joined hired lobbyist Mike Runnels at the Roundhouse to press for \$375,000 in state funds to defend village water rights against claims by the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe.

The group was on hand to testify and voice support of a bill offered in the House by State Representative Ben Hall and in the Senate by Senator James Martin. That bill, asking \$275,000 to reimburse funds already spent for expert witnesses and legal advice, and \$100,000 for the appeals process, was tabled in the House Appropriations Committee and in the Senate Finance Committee.

That was good news for the group assembled there, since at this point in the 30-day session the committees would have taken two options—either to kill the bill or table until funding is established near the end of the session on

Thursday. "We've been over this time and time again ... a lot of us are in full support," said a member of the Senate committee, joining in the unanimous vote to table the request without prejudice.

State engineer Steve Reynolds testified before both committees, saying he was there neither as an opponent nor as a proponent of the bill. Reynolds said the state spent about \$800,000 putting on its case, while the United States Department of Justice has spent over \$1 million to this point. Reynolds said there is no appealable order yet, but it is certain the case will be appealed.

Reynolds, in answer to a question from a member of the House Committee, said it's unlikely there could be a negotiated settlement. Asked the value of water rights, he said those numbers have changed drastically, but might now be valued in the hundreds of thousands of dollars an acre-foot.

State Representative Maurice Hobson, a member of the House Appropriations Committee, noted the value of the water claimed by the Indians could be well over \$15 million. Please see Ruidosoans, page 2A

Games of chance, state finance and rebate stance still unclear with ending near

Water, gambling and money were on the minds of state lawmakers this week.

While village officials were in Santa Fe last week to get funding for the village's water defense costs (see related story), the issue getting the most attention around the state was a gambling bill.

A measure to allow electronic video gaming machines on a test

basis in Angel Fire was before legislative committees on Wednesday and Thursday.

State Representative Ben Hall said in a telephone interview Sunday that the Business and Industry Committee, on which he serves, passed the bill in a four-to-two vote. Hall, a Republican representing parts of Lincoln, Chaves and Eddy counties, said he wasn't present when the bill was passed out of Business and Industry, since he was presenting the Ruidoso water

defense bill in the House Appropriations Committee.

The gambling measure was tabled in the House Appropriations Committee, and still has to go to Taxation and Revenue before being considered by the full House, said Hall.

"I never got a chance to vote yes or no," said Hall. "If it comes to the floor I'll probably vote no on it," he added.

Although Mescalero Apache Indian Tribal President Wendell

Chino was in Santa Fe asking to have the gambling extended to the Inn of the Mountain Gods, he didn't contact Hall to discuss the bill. He reportedly told a Senate committee he was representing the Village of Ruidoso and the County of Lincoln.

"I haven't heard from many people in my district," said Hall, who opposes allowing Angel Fire to have gambling if it isn't allowed in other areas.

"In my opinion, if we pass gambling in Angel Fire all Indian reser-

vations would get it," said Hall. "Then it wouldn't benefit the state at all," he added.

Hall said he has heard the rumors of a statement made in the 1950s by then governor Edwin Mechem, that if anybody in the state ever got gambling, Ruidoso would be among the first. "What he said 30 years ago wouldn't amount to anything now," said Hall.

"I haven't heard if the governor will sign it," commented Hall. He recalled a similar measure that

made it to Governor Garrey Caruthers' desk last year, only to be vetoed.

"It still has time to get up there," remarked Hall.

This 30-day session will end at noon Thursday, February 18. And as the clock runs out, all the "money" bills are on hold awaiting funding.

Hall said committees consider bills that require funds, and kill the Please see Legislature, page 2A

Jailer discovers hanged prisoner

Robert Vines, 35, Ruidoso, was found hanged in his cell in the Lincoln County Jail on Friday morning at 10:30, according to Sheriff Don Samuels.

Vines has been in the jail since January 30, charged with violation of probations and issuance of three

worthless checks, according to Samuels.

Jailer Russell Beckley found the body at around 10:30 a.m. on Friday. Vines had been seen alive by Beckley a half hour or so earlier.

According to Samuels, Vines hanged himself with a ripped up bedsheet.

Leandro Vega, investigator for

the District Attorney's office, and Steve Standridge of the New Mexico State Police, investigated the hanging. It appeared to be a suicide, according to Vega, and a suicide note was found.

"The autopsy report will not be in until the middle of next week, but we are treating it as a suicide," stated investigator Vega.

Survivors include Vines' parents, of Ruidoso.

According to county attorney Gary Mitchell, the county will investigate and see if there is any cause for liability. "We'll take a look at the autopsy report and then turn it over to the Risk Management Division of the State of New Mexico," Mitchell stated.

lion. "The effect is much more than that ... it's a way of life," said Hobson. "We just don't want to see this whole area dry up because of litigation," he added.

Also on hand for the committee meetings on Thursday were village water attorneys Neil Stillinger and Kay Marr. Stillinger has represented the Village of Ruidoso in the litigation involving a claim by the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe to an additional 18,000 acre-feet of water rights in the Rio Hondo system.

Questioned by Representative Corn over duplication of efforts between the Village of Ruidoso and the Water Defense Association, Stillinger explained that when Justice LaFol Oman finished the case between the state and the tribe, he ordered every party to enter its objections, the Village had to proceed.

"Work we did in the case benefits everybody in the system," said Stillinger. "We were all working together ... I don't think our work was duplicative of their work," he added.

Corn continued to question whether there was duplication, and Reynolds said almost inevitably there is duplication, but it isn't al-

ways a bad thing.

"A judge appreciates hearing two people say the same thing," said Reynolds.

"One other facet ... all of us up and down the Hondo have not always been on the same side of the fence," noted Mayor Davis. "Up to a point parties could challenge one another," he added, explaining that the plan always was to join the Water Defense Association (WDA) when the case was at that point.

Corn wondered where such lawsuits are going to stop, noting a mechanism is needed to fund them.

Two other bills are on the table in the House—one is to set up the sort of mechanism Corn suggested and the other is for \$225,000 for the WDA.

The first calls for establishing an ongoing Acequia and Ditch Association—Fund to be used in the 13 water suits under way in the state. That measure calls for \$600,000, and the WDA initially expected to share in that bill.

Hall said he and other area lawmakers still support that bill, but fear the amount will be cut. That's why WDA supporters offered House Bill 409 asking \$225,000 for that group.

"The state's not going to fund all of them," predicted Hall.

measures or send them on with a "do pass" to await introduction in the House and/or Senate. If passed there they go upstairs for the governor's signature or veto.

A big step in the funding process was taken when both houses concurred on the big budget they sent to Governor Carruthers. Hall said he and others were disappointed that public education didn't get more money in the compromise budget, and blamed Senator Max Coll and his colleagues who held out for raises for all public employees.

"It's up there, and he's looking at it," said Hall.

The budget could hinge on a bill that is being held in the Taxation and Revenue Committee. That bill would permanently take back food and medical rebates, a measure that was passed on a temporary basis for the past two years. Hall said without that money the compromise budget is short \$48 million.

Senator James Martin has offered a bill to provide \$150,000 in funds for the Sierra Blanca

Regional Airport, and Hall said Sunday that bill isn't funded yet. He said capital outlay proposals will be acted on after the budget.

"I did not introduce it in the House—I wasn't asked to," said Hall.

Hall said he was pleased that the Dena Lynn Gore Bill, one he originally authored this session, was signed into law this week.

The House also passed interstate banking—an issue that has reappeared every year for the past four years, said Hall. He said the governor favors interstate banking, and is expected to sign the bill.

Hall voted for interstate banking.

"The Democrats killed a bill to reorganize tourism and economic development," said Hall. He said the proposal, one of Governor Carruthers', was later revived and tabled for further consideration. Carruthers wants to split the department into two agencies.

"They're not doing anything over there," said Hall, who is among those who hope the new secretary in that department will turn things around.

Hangar owners wonder when they can move

Airport hangar discussions that started at the Ruidoso Village Council on Tuesday continued Wednesday at a meeting of the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC).

Private pilots and aircraft owners, some who lease hangar space at the Ruidoso Municipal Airport, pressed the Village Council for answers on when, if and how they'll be allowed to move their facilities to the new regional facility on Fort Stanton Mesa. Told Tuesday by Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. to ask some of those questions of the SBAC, the group was on hand Wednesday to do just that.

Merle Miller, speaking for the group, said he was looking for a firm commitment that he'll be allowed to move his privately owned hangar to the new airport. Assured Tuesday by the village attorney that adequate notice will be given before the municipal airfield is completely closed, Miller asked the SBAC for assurance he can move his building.

Miller and about a dozen other private hangar owners and users have been allowed to continue flying in and out of the Ruidoso Municipal Airport, even though it was closed to the public in December. Village attorney John Underwood said the users have known for some time they'll be asked to move, and are leasing their facilities on a month to month basis.

While the current leases are with the Village of Ruidoso, the new leases will be negotiated with the airport commission.

Members of the SBAC assured the group they'll be allowed to lease ground at Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA), and took the first steps Wednesday to having the taxiway to the private area paved. Commissioners voted unanimously to use funds available from a Village of Ruidoso bond issue to develop the private hangar area.

Commissioner Lloyd L. Davis Jr. said before the SBAC spends funds to develop the private area, it should be determined how many private plane owners will use that area. He said some sort of agreement should be reached before spending the estimated \$71,000 on the private hangar area.

In a separate, but related, discussion over leases at SBRA, Helene McCoy of Air Ruidoso questioned why she'll be required to operate out of the terminal. She cited Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) rules regarding "exclusivity."

Attorney Underwood said the Village of Ruidoso has the right to be the exclusive fixed base operator for the first five years with two five-year options. He said municipalities are excluded from the FAA ruling.

Attorney Gary Mitchell added the airport takes on too much liability if passenger operations are carried on in places other than the public terminal.

"I'm a little concerned over who really oversees signing of contracts for SBRA," said Commissioner El-

mer Firelli. He learned that the joint powers agreement specifies the commission as the authority over fees and leases.

It was learned that Underwood drafted and sent Air Ruidoso an agreement for review. Underwood said he only drew up the leases for charter operators—Air Ruidoso and Mesa Airlines.

Mitchell said a better way to work out the agreements might be for Underwood to draft them, using information provided by SBRA manager Tim Morris and airport engineer Earl Cook, and then have the commission agree to the terms.

"I was instructed by Air Ruidoso not to talk to them, but to talk to their attorney," noted Underwood in discussions over continued negotiations over the lease.

Also Wednesday the commission learned from Mitchell that previous discussions over the \$6,000-plus minimum monthly electric bills at SBRA, never resulted in action over who will pay the amount over monthly metered usage. He said the first bill was received, and is over \$2,000.

Both Mitchell and Underwood recalled past commission discussions, including a suggestion that the Village of Ruidoso, as operator, pay the actual usage bill; and the County of Lincoln, as developer, pay the difference between usage and minimum charge.

"This board never took action on that ... everybody just avoided the issue," said Mitchell.

All agreed that actual usage may soon hit the minimum charge, but

in the meantime, Underwood said the county needs to come up with funds for the difference.

County manager Suzanne Cox said the question was asked during budget hearings and the commissioners were told by former airport administrator Fred Heckman that no funds would be needed for utilities. She said that's why the mill levy proceeds were limited to eligible items.

Members of the County Commission, who also serve on the SBAC, said they'll meet to discuss how the bills can be paid until usage meets the monthly minimum.

In other regular business Wednesday, the commission:

—Authorized the chairman to sign pre-applications for FAA funding for maintenance equipment.

—Heard reports from the engineer, attorney and airport manager.

—Agreed to use proceeds from Village of Ruidoso bonds to pay the \$166,000 for site preparation and paving and \$71,000 private hangar area development costs. Cook recommended discussing funding strategies for the next stages of development with FAA. He gave a report on costs of upcoming phases.

—Authorized paying bills, after reviewing a financial report. A bill of \$3,126.79 from the Village of Ruidoso for work done to comply with an FAA inspection was added to authorized bills.

—Commissioners unanimously voted to go on record in support of keeping the Airport District office in Albuquerque. Morris said plans

beneath a burning overturned truck. He obtained help, put out the fire, and helped extricate the victim.



Filmmaker videos rototillers to gold mining

Gerald Hann, of Ruidoso Downs, is a filmmaker.

"I make films and video for specialized viewers," says Hann. "They get reviewed by international trade magazines, and shown on cable TV."

Hann has been at his craft for five years. "I used to work for a movie company in California, building movie sets. I got interested in gold mining a couple years ago, and I thought there might be a market for videos in this field."

He has one gold mining-related video called "Happy Mining - Cause! Gold Fever Is Contagious," and another called "Dredging and Rock and Gem Identification."

The "Dredging" video was reviewed in "Gold Prospector" magazine last October. The review said: "This tape is a short and cursory look at running a dredge, working shallow bedrock, priming a dredge pump, and dredge cleanup. A portion is devoted to rock identification, with gemologist Ed Kass. Kass makes some very good points about the value of gems and minerals you might find in your sluice box as well as gold: garnets, turquoise, blue topaz, amethyst, and tourmaline, among others."

Hann has also produced videos called "Playing the Ponies for Profit" and "Understanding The Racing Form."

"I've done a couple of music videos for local bands, and some promo films, political and campaign films, business ads and promo films," Hann explains.

He deals by mail order, and shoots footage with a video camera. "I think Lincoln County has the ability to do as good as Hollywood at making videos," Hann speculates.

He is now working on a privately funded film of history of Lincoln

County, which he says will be educational, entertaining, informative and factual. "I've been working for the past 18 months on it," he explains, mentioning that Billy the Kid plays "just a bit part" in his film.

Hann and his wife, Dolores, market their products through trade magazines.

Metal Detector: How It Works," "The Dry Washer: What It Is, How It Works, When To Use It, and When It Can't Be Used"; "The Professional Gold Miner: The Trap Line for Trapping Gold"; "The Gold They Lost"; "Hydraulic Jacks And Air Tools: Repair and Trouble Shooting"; and "Tune Up and Repair Your Own Lawn Mowers and Rototillers, Chain Saws and Edgers."



beneath a burning overturned truck. He obtained help, put out the fire, and helped extricate the victim.







Filmmaker videos rototillers to gold mining

Gerald Hann, of Ruidoso Downs, is a filmmaker.

"I make films and video for specialized viewers," says Hann. "They get reviewed by international trade magazines, and shown on cable TV."

Hann has been at his craft for five years. "I used to work for a movie company in California, building movie sets, I got interested in gold mining a couple years ago, and I thought there might be a market for videos in this field."

He has one gold mining-related video called "Happy Mining - Caution! Gold Fever Is Contagious," and another called "Dredging and Rock and Gem Identification."

The "Dredging" video was reviewed in "Gold Prospector" magazine last October. The review said: "This tape is a short and cursory look at running a dredge, working shallow bedrock, priming a dredge pump, and dredge cleanup. A portion is devoted to rock identification, with gemologist Ed Kass. Kass makes some very good points about the value of gems and minerals you might find in your sluice box as well as gold: garnets, turquoise, blue topaz, amethyst, and tourmaline, among others."

Hann has also produced videos called "Playing the Ponies for Profit" and "Understanding The Racing Form."

"I've done a couple of music videos for local bands, and some promo films, political and campaign films, business ads and promo films," Hann explains.

He deals by mail order, and shoots footage with a video camera. "I think Lincoln County has the ability to do as good as Hollywood at making videos," Hann speculates.

He is now working on a privately funded film of history of Lincoln

County, which he says will be educational, entertaining, informative and factual. "I've been working for the past 18 months on it," he explains, mentioning that Billy the Kid plays "just a bit part" in his film.

"It could be shown as a short series for TV, or as a two-hour long home video."

Hann and his wife, Dolores, market their products through trade magazines.

Some of upcoming titles of videos in the works include: "The

Metal Detector: How It Works," "The Dry Washer: What It Is, How It Works, When To Use It, and When It Can't Be Used"; "The Professional Gold Miner: The Trap Line for Trapping Gold"; "The Gold They Lost"; "Hydraulic Jacks And Air Tools: Repair and Trouble Shooting"; and "Tune Up and Repair Your Own Lawn Mowers and Rototillers, Chain Saws and Edgers."







A lone Robin Red Breast is singing from a cedar tree on the hill side. Here in the yard two snow birds are drinking from their Metates (Indian Corn Grinding



SANTA FE-They are still predicting a legislative trainwreck. I am still insisting peace is going to break out.

Maybe it is because there is more fun in covering battle plans than in reporting truce talks.

That way the press doesn't have to create its own excitement. The controversy is already present.

Certainly the press corps gets as tired as the legislators by about this time of the session. Everyone wants to wrap it up and go home. Maybe, it is a pessimism that "We'll never be so lucky as to get out of here on time."

But the word heard most frequently around the corridors of the Capitol is that there are still too many controversies left unsettled to ever finish in regulation time.

Actually, no controversial items have been settled yet, unless you want to count the "feed" bill that funds the costs of the Legislature. That piece of legislation has always sailed through both houses and been signed by the governor in a matter of days after the beginning of the session.

Always, that is, except once during the Toney Anaya administration. And we all know Toney has many asterisks next to his name for exceptions to the rule.

Gov. Garry Chaudry couldn't resist the temptation to do something that has gotten many others of lesser stature into big trouble.

Carruthers noted in his required messages to the House and Senate announcing that he had signed the feed bill that he was compelled to point out the 20 percent increase in legislative expenditure over the last 30-day session.

That remark has not set well with legislatures in the past when used by unsuspecting public officials to justify large increases in their budgets. But it looks like Carruthers has gotten away with it.

The fact that no controversial items have been settled at this point is not a major problem if one steps back and looks at the total picture.

Can New Mexico survive another year without interstate banking or welfare reform or an increased advertising budget or dogs at the state penitentiary?

The answer to all those questions, and many others, is yes.

Advocates for those issues will find it difficult to agree, but they must.

At this time, Carruthers is saying there are a number of issues over which he will go to the mat, but that is mostly posturing—a very acceptable form of negotiating at this juncture in the session.

What are the issues that could force a special session?

The state needs a budget on which to operate next year. There is a total dollar figure above which Carruthers would use his veto but that figure has already been thoroughly discussed with legislators and won't cause a deadlock.

The most dangerous item in the 172-page budget is contained in the first few pages in a section called "general provisions." It is a new provision, not previously seen in the general appropriations act, which places severe restrictions on every agency's ability to transfer money within its budget.

In addition to being an economist by profession, Carruthers fancies himself as a pretty decent administrator. He says the restriction on budget transfers severely limits his lieutenants' ability to manage.

Since this provision affects all agencies, it is serious in its effect on state government. The House says such a provision is necessary in order to keep the Legislature in control of the budget process.

The primary issue is the canine unit created by the Corrections Department at the state penitentiary following the July 4 escapes. Funding for the unit was scraped together from other items in the prison budget.

The House appropriations panel sent a strong message to Carruthers by not funding the canine unit next year and by placing the restrictive language on budget transfers.

Rep. Linn Tytler, an Albuquerque Republican, called appropriation chairman Max Coll's hand on the dogs by going on Santa Fe radio and asking Coll's constituents, who live next to the prison to let Max know they would appreciate some canine protection.

Look for the governor to get some of his dogs back, a partial restoration of his tourism advertising budget, and maybe a little of his welfare package.

The restrictive budget language will be softened and Coll may get some whistles and bells to warn his constituents of the next prison break.

And they will finish on time.

I recently encountered a minor but upsetting situation with the Vital Statistics Bureau in Santa Fe. I needed copies of my children's birth certificates and sent in the required forms which showed a charge of \$4.00 per certificate. Yesterday, everything was returned to me with a form letter which stated that \$10.00 per certificate was the new charge as of June 19, 1987. The new charge was the result of legislative action.

I called the Bureau today to ask what was involved to justify a \$10.00 certificate charge. The young lady on the phone said the reason was legislative action. I repeated my question and she let me speak with her supervisor. He was very polite, helpful and sympathetic and said he had been before the legislature with some of my same comments. The \$10.00 goes into an indigent day care fund to help indigent working mothers. I have no objections to the fund but the fund does not benefit everyone who needs help with day care. For the past year, we have been unable to have both of our children in full-time day care due to the expense. I do not expect or want help from the state but there has to be a more fair and productive way to provide good day care. The Supervisor stated that due to insurance requirements, etc. some people need up to 20 copies of death certificates and they are hit with the same \$10.00 per certificate charge. The birth and death certificates are computer issued and not embossed with 14 kt gold as I had wondered.

With the Ruidoso economy in the shape it is, my salary is certainly not keeping up with the "legislative action." My suggestion is to file for your child's birth certificate as soon as you receive the notice of registration. Heaven only knows what the charge will be later if "legislative action" has its way!




