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No funds so no Dig in Lincoln

There will not be an archaeological dig at the McSween house site in Lincoln this summer unless funding can be found, according to Human Systems Research archaeologists David Kirkpatrick and Linda Hart.

"Lincoln County Heritage Trust has applied for a National Geographic Foundation grant along with Human Systems Research for around \$90,000, but if we receive it, it wouldn't take effect until the summer of 1989," explains Kirkpatrick. The grant would come under the classification of Community Resources and Exploration.

The archaeologists have been working for the past two summers to explore the site of the Alexander and Susan McSween house, which was burned during the final battle of the Lincoln County War in 1878.

"It's really too bad about this summer, because I think people are expecting to see the dig," comments Linda Hart. "Even if it could be funded for just three or four weeks around the time of the annual pageant, in August, I think it would be worthwhile."

Human Systems Research (HSR) has around 250 people on its mailing list.

"We have permission to dig this summer from the state, all we need is funding."

In the past two years, Heritage Trust has provided funding for the archaeological research, but this year Director Gary Miller says that the Trust simply doesn't have the money.

Key represents DA in Lincoln County

Assistant District Attorney Scot Key, assigned to Lincoln County by Twelfth Judicial District Attorney James Weldon, is returning to familiar territory.

Key, who has lived for much of his life in Rochester, Minnesota, is the grandson of former Lincoln County surveyor and clerk, Ernest Key. And ADA Key has relatives in the Capitan/Carrizozo area.

After completing his undergraduate degree at the University of Minnesota and his law degree at the University of North Dakota Law School, Key returned to New Mexico and studied for the state bar exam, which he passed in November 1986.

That's when he joined the DA's

staff in Alamogordo.

Key, who is single, is commuting between Alamogordo and Lincoln County, but plans to move eventually. An avid skier, Key is looking forward to living near the slopes.

He's pleased to be the ADA assigned to Lincoln County, and looks at the move as a great opportunity from a career standpoint. "I do everything," noted Key, who worked closely with the DA and the chief deputy while in the Alamogordo office.

"Mr. Weldon is a very good man ... I have a lot of respect for him," said Key. "He's given me his vote of confidence by sending me up here," he added.

While Key's office is in Carrizozo, he said he'll spend Tuesdays and Thursdays in Ruidoso at the

Municipal Police/Courts Complex.

Key said his office will continue working with merchants in their efforts to recover losses due to returned checks. "We'll do our best to get their money back," he said.

Another emphasis in the ADA's office is recognition of victims of crimes and their families. Key said he keeps in contact with victims as their cases unfold.

"They really appreciate it when a prosecutor keeps them informed," remarked Key.

On his philosophy, Key said he went to work as an ADA to get trial experience, and found that he really enjoys the work. While the job has a number of pressures, Key said it has plenty of rewards, too.

"So now I'm contemplating another four years," noted Key.

Villages' voters select leaders

Ruidoso

Write-in candidate Thomas B. McNeil was top vote-getter in Tuesday's municipal election, unseating incumbent Jerry G. Shaw by more than three to one.

McNeil, seeking the one two-year slot, garnered 742 write-in votes to Shaw's 206.

Other incumbents on the ballot, Municipal Judge Bill Payne and councillors J.D. James and Jess Stinson, won their races by comfortable margins.

Judge Payne, serving as an appointee since the death of former Judge John Cupp, was elected to a four-year term with 301 votes. Seven candidates sought the judge's slot, with Kenneth Shockey winning 198 votes; Hugh Johnston, 145; Sam Pilgreen, 129; Otis Spears, 128; David Greenhaw, 120; and Robert Jarvis, 44.

James polled 741 votes and Stinson won 644 to win four-year slots on the council. Both men were appointed to their present council positions.

J.A. "Al" Junge squeaked by former Mayor George P. White, winning a four-year term with 621 votes, topping White's 615 by only six. Junge served on the four-member commission removed by petition in 1984 when the council was enlarged to its present size—six.

Village clerk Tammie Maddox said 1,096 of Ruidoso's 2,297 registered voters cast ballots on Tuesday. That 48 percent participation is down from the more than 50 percent of voters, 1,302, who voted two years ago when Mayor Lloyd L. Davis and four councillors were elected.

Pollwatchers reported a steady stream of voters passed through the one polling place at Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center.

The election was plagued by a number of problems, and the results weren't officially certified until late Wednesday afternoon.

Maddox said one of the two machines ran out of paper due to the large number of write-in votes, and the second machine jammed and was removed from service. She said the problem was identified immediately so that no votes were lost.

The 118 emergency paper ballots used when the machines were down complicated the counting process, and kept election workers on duty until past 11 p.m. Tuesday. Canvassing on Wednesday revealed some discrepancies that resulted in further checking and review before Magistrate Judge J.R. "Jim" Wheeler certified the election.

"There was a little problem, but it didn't change the results," said Maddox Wednesday. "Considering

the incidents with the machines, the precinct board handled it really well," she added.

Maddox said the emergency ballots, the 51 absentee ballots and the great number of write-in votes combined to extend the amount of time spent on counting votes.

Newly elected officials will be sworn in at 7 p.m. Monday, March 7, in council chambers at Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center. Maddox said councillors will have an organizational meeting following the ceremony.

Capitan

Trustee Norman Renfro has won another term on the Capitan Board of Trustees, leading the pack with 124 votes. Also winning a seat on the board is Lee York, with 108 votes.

Darrlene Stewart captured the third open seat, with 97 votes. Unsuccessful candidates included James Clees with 94 votes and Bill MacVeigh with 89 votes.

According to Capitan village clerk Janet Keel, 256 people voted in the election, almost half of the 541 voters registered. Eight of the ballots cast listed only one candidate of choice, making a total of 512 votes.

"This was a real good turnout," said Keel.

Ruidoso Downs

Ruidoso Downs voters went to the polls in high numbers to return two trustees to the Downs Board of Trustees and unseat another.

Reelected were Trustees Fred Bernard, top vote-getter with 147; and William (Bill) Smith, with 139. Candidate Alice Allison was elected to the board with 130 votes, filling the third contested four-year term, and unseating incumbent Leonard Bergeron, who received the fewest number of votes in the five-candidate field, with 93.

Also unsuccessful was candidate Thurman D. Gartman, who gathered 112 votes.

In the race for municipal judge, Harold Mansell, who was appointed to the post of judge last summer, was returned to office by a tremendous majority with 170 votes to challenger write-in candidate Joe Southard's 29 votes.

Village clerk Jean Stillman said the 239 votes cast was a "very good turnout" for the village, which lists 430 registered voters.

Swearing-in ceremonies are set for 7 p.m. Monday, March 7, at Ruidoso Downs Village Hall.

Meteorologist Bill Hostetter in Ruidoso has predicted today will be mostly cloudy with snow decreasing this afternoon and easterly winds up to 15 miles per hour. Tonight, snow will be ending, becoming partly cloudy and a little colder. Expect light, variable winds.

Friday will be partly cloudy and warmer, with westerly winds up to 15 miles per hour.

"We have contacted National Geographic Society, and applied for a major grant which would fund the McSween dig, and the grant application will hopefully be approved this summer," Miller said. "I know there has been some discussion about discontinuing for a year. I think it will have some effect on tourism, because once these projects get started it's nice to keep them going. But financing is short this year, and we just don't have it to give."

According to Kirkpatrick and Hart, the dig provides education to the public, because it includes site digging, field schools and lectures; it promotes tourism through promotion and word-of-mouth, helping the economic development of Lincoln County and New Mexico; contributes to archaeological and historical knowledge of the entire state and region; it dispels myths; and it brings people into Lincoln who otherwise wouldn't come.

"Archaeology provides a look at history that cannot be done in books," says Dr. Kirkpatrick. "People can actually see history through archaeology, in a multi-dimension way."

Digging on site is confined to certain "pits" which are measured off. Every bit of soil removed from the pits is then sifted through a screen for artifacts, which are then collected, cataloged and documented.

Last year's dig produced a number of interesting artifacts, including stoneware china possibly belonging to the McSweens; burned ceramics; straight pins; pepper-corns; fabric bits, most of them charred from the 1878 fire; coffee beans; pony beads; door hinges; a block of printer's type ("a real mystery," says Hart); a bridle rosette from a calvary horse; a 1868 nickel; pieces of pressed and milk glass; a canning jar lid liner; melted window glass; a .44 slug; shell buttons; stoneware; pottery with glass melted to it; and cylindrical faceted beads, which Hart identified as being off an expensive Sears Roebuck oil lamp.

It would cost \$15,000 at the bare minimum to finance a four-week

dig this summer, say organizers. "This year, we wanted to concentrate on finding the boundaries of the house," explains Kirkpatrick. "Once we know that we are actually inside those walls, we're likely to find a lot of artifacts belonging to the McSweens. These things will tell us more about them as people than anything written down has been able to. It gives real life to the legends of the McSweens."

"People understand more about history when they can see and touch the artifacts of the time," Hart explains. "Plus, not many people get to see a real, live archaeological exhibit. What we are doing is real. It's not fake, or staged. There's a real excitement about the possibility of discovery in archaeology that onlookers discern immediately. It draws them in and makes them want to be there when we find artifacts."

Kirkpatrick and Hart guess that it could take five to 10 summers to uncover all the artifacts, depending on the number of people working the site.

"During the past summer, we had a lot of people who would return to the site day by day. One woman from Dodge City, Kansas, told us that she decided to go to school and major in archaeology after watching us work," says Hart. "It's very rewarding to hear that. Archaeology is a very intriguing field."

Meli Durans, who worked the dig last summer, says that she thinks that archaeology is an important part of educating the public to their own heritage. "It shows the importance of doing scientific study of relics and artifacts," she says. "New Mexico in particular has seen a lot of 'pot hunters' who have looted important sites and stolen the artifacts. It's a valuable lesson for people to realize that there is a legitimate and correct way to excavate a site."

John Jeffers, executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, thinks that the dig has been valuable to the area. "I think the news releases, letters concerning history and archaeology and features about the dig have state and local impact, because it's supporting the Lincoln County and

Ruidoso area," Jeffers says. "I've never driven past the site in the summertime when I didn't see people standing there, watching what is going on."

"There is a permit to have the dig filed with State Monuments," says Lincoln County Commissioner Ralph Dunlap, who is a resident of Lincoln and president of the Festivals and Pageants Association. "The community is exploring the idea to see if some funds can be developed for the dig itself, if not for cataloging. The cataloging could be done at a later time, but the digging can only happen in summer."

"I can understand why it's not being funded," comments Chief Ranger Jack Rigney of Lincoln State Monuments. "I just don't think that the Trust has that money to work with right now, and that's too bad. It will probably definitely affect the number of people coming to Lincoln who have become used to the dig. I don't think it will affect those who would come anyway just to come to see the Kid, but the dig has worked up

as support group of its own. "Just how much it will affect our economy this summer I can't tell, because we don't have those kinds of statistics. I don't think it's that big a thing for the normal tourist, but those with archaeological interest certainly liked it."

Rigney reiterates that cost is a factor. "It's a very costly proposition," he says.

According to records kept, Heritage Trust reported 3,411 visitors during the month of July in 1986. In 1987, this number jumped to 4,361. There was a 14% increase between 1985 to 1986, and a 29% increase between 1986 and 1987.

"We would hope that sometime the state would allocate some money to be matched by Heritage Trust to keep the dig going but I don't see it on the horizon for this year," says director Miller. "If we get the National Geographic grant, chances are we can have a bigger and better dig next summer."

According to Michael Pitel, marketing analyst for the Tourism and Travel Division of the State of

New Mexico, not having the dig this year will be "a big disappointment for Billy the Kid buffs who've heard about new movies being filmed."

Pitel said, in a phone interview, that some people will come to Lincoln, expecting the dig to progress this summer.

"They'll be unhappy to come to the site and find out that it's not being resumed," he said. "But I have great confidence that it can resume next year. Participating in the dig puts the average tourist on the cutting edge of new history about the Lincoln County War and Billy the Kid."

Grants will benefit recreation facilities

State and federal funds have been allocated that will help complete the Eagle Creek Sports Complex.

Governor Garrey Carruthers announced recently that the Village of Ruidoso will receive \$7,500 approved by the Governor's Recreation Priorities Advisory Committee. Sheriff 'making progress' on Chavez murder case

"We really are making progress," said Lincoln County Sheriff Don Samuels concerning the case of the Katina Chavez murder. "We're continuing to interview anyone who knew Katina, knew of her whereabouts and what she might have been doing the day she was killed, knew who her friends were and who might have had a motive to kill her."

Samuels indicated that he feels that his department has some good, solid leads. "I hate to tell you, 'We

don't know anything,' but there are things we can't disclose because they might hamper the investigation," he said.

Concerning the investigation of the Cotton and Judy McKnight killings, Samuels says that he's still following leads. "We have investigators on the case," he said. "It's still very much on the front burner."

Samuels had announced at the end of December that an arrest or arrests would soon be made in the case, but no arrest has yet been announced.

Pageant organizers look to Lincoln's future

The Lincoln Pageant Festival Committee had a meeting on the upcoming Lincoln season and its future. Around 30 people attended the meeting at the Heritage Trust Visitors Center to discuss the many things that are happening in the village.

President Ralph Dunlap opened the meeting by stating that Lincoln is unique in that it has three major groups involved, including New Mexico State Monuments, Lincoln County Heritage Trust and residents of the community, and that all their properties are intermingled.

Generally state monuments are entirely separate and can be opened or closed on their own schedule, and the same goes to typical Trust-type properties, but

this is not the case in Lincoln, according to Dunlap. "This may be the only historic community in the United States with this type of arrangement," stated Dunlap.

Helmuth Naumer, officer of Cultural Affairs for the State of New Mexico, suggested that Lincoln come up with a plan for growth and development, and that all entities in the community unite behind the goals outlined in the plan for a united front.

Ben Hall and Bob Corn, state legislators, reported on the monies developed for Lincoln in this year's budget, apparently enough to get public restrooms and possibly some exhibits in the old courthouse.

Concern was expressed about the Wortley Hotel and its operation. Sue Graham, treasurer of

LPFC, reported that there had been a \$9,000 loss in the past two years in operation of the Wortley, and that the committee does not have money to operate it this year.

Most people at the meeting felt that the Wortley is an integral part of Lincoln, according to Dunlap, and expressed desire for its continued operation.

People from Lincoln State Monuments and state legislators are investigating the possibility of obtaining help from the state to run the Wortley.

Another possibility would be to sub-lease to a private individual or individuals, yet keep local control.

The third option is to close it down and turn it back to the state. The state has indicated that if this was done, they would probably sell

the hotel, but the legislators replied that it probably would never be sold.

A lengthy discussion was held regarding the Old Lincoln County Courthouse, and whether it should have conducted tours only, or interpretative exhibits with people touring at their leisure, or a combination of these two.

Also discussed was the idea of having residents dress in costume of the period for a week before the pageant.

The next meeting has been tentatively scheduled for Sunday, March 13. For confirmation, or for other information, interested parties can call Ralph or Rosalie Dunlap at 653-4047.

Airport terminal finish expected May 1

A stark metal skeleton taking shape at the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA) offers a preview of what will soon be a modern interim terminal building and multiple-aircraft hangar.

Airport manager Tim Morris said the building, being constructed through a contract with Garland and Malone of Las Cruces, is expected to be complete by May 1.

"We're hoping to get done for race season," said Morris.

Airport administrative offices,

restroom facilities, leased areas for airlines and car rental agencies and an observation deck will be housed in the large metal building. The hangar will include aircraft maintenance facilities.

Work is under way to place sunshades to protect aircraft parked at the regional airfield. Morris said the sunshades should be ready to go by May 12.

The multi-million dollar airport opened in December, after 20 years of research and development. The field includes a state-of-the-art runway, as well as aprons, taxiways and ramps.

Airport operations are enhanced by visual slope indicators in place at both ends of the lighted runway.

The Ruidoso facility was licensed for daylight hours, but the SBRA is open around the clock seven days a week.

An additional navigational aid, a non-directional beacon, is being installed with state and federal funds, and Morris said the approach is set to be flown on May 22.


SBRA is a controlled airport, as was the Ruidoso airfield. Morris said the village contract with Midwestern Air Traffic Controllers was extended, and that company installed a modular structure from which to control airport operations.

Upcoming projects at the airport include construction of a crash-fire-rescue and maintenance building, followed by ramp lighting and

security fencing. Congressional action paved the way for SBRA to receive federal funding on the crash-fire-rescue facility and equipment.

Morris said airport operations are up by 15 percent over the same period last year at the Ruidoso Municipal Airport. That increase is in spite of more snowfall this year than last.


"I'm real pleased with it," noted Morris. "The figures look real good," said Morris, who said recently that he hears many favorable comments from pilots and airport users.

Petition contains grand jurists' names, too

How many of the 24 jurists selected to hear evidence in the current grand jury proceedings also signed the petition that called for the investigation?

Examination of the petition, which is sequestered except to the press, shows that six of the 24 jurors (12 regular and 12 alternate) did sign the original petition.

"This doesn't surprise me," commented District Judge Richard A. Parsons, who convened the jury last week. "About three-fifths of the county voters live in Ruidoso, where the petition was circulated

most widely. Out of 5,792 voters, probably 4,000 are from the village. I think this accounts for the high average." Ten percent of registered voters signed the petition.

Deputy District Attorney Michael McCormick said he sees no problem with the fact that 20% of the jurists signed the original petition. "As long as the jurists were selected at random according to law, any one of them is qualified to serve on the jury," McCormick said.

In other grand jury developments, Judge Parsons was notified by letter that Attorney General Hal Stratton will provide aid to the grand jury by scrutinizing the target witnesses.



Trustees approve salary increase for next mayor

The Capitan Board of Trustees declined to vote themselves a raise from their current salaries of \$10 per meeting but did agree that the mayor deserves more than that, and voted to give the mayor \$200 per month for time spent running the village.

This "raise" won't take affect until after the 1990 elections. "This isn't a raise for me," said Mayor Benny Coker several times in explanation. "I was to accomplish some things during the next two years, and then I'll let somebody else take the job. I do not plan to run again."

At the end of a two-hour public hearing Monday, trustees Dave Strickland and Norman Renfro voted "yes" to increasing the future mayor's compensation, and trustees V. Kelly Beavers and Dr. David Rouleau voted "no." Mayor Coker had to cast the tiebreaking vote.

"There is a lot of liability in this job," Coker is said in explanation. "We get no unemployment compensation or benefits. There is a lot of time involved, and the village can afford to pay a little more for the mayor's time," Coker stated. "The mayor and the trustees work as a team. That's the important thing to remember."

Dorothy Smith spoke up against any kind of monetary increase. "I

am definitely against an increase," she stated. "Saying, 'We can afford it,' is 'famous last words' - look what happened here when the airport needed to be funded, we got our taxes raised."

Village administrator Don Dutton informed the audience of about 15 people that the last time the mayor or trustees had a raise was in 1981, when their meeting stipend was raised from \$5 to \$10.

One Capitan resident said, "Serving your community is a totally idealistic thing as far as I'm concerned. There is no way that money can compensate for the service provided, so it really comes down to, 'Do you want to serve?'"

One man addressed Mayor

Coker. "If you vote the next mayor to have a raise, you'll probably have everybody in town campaigning for your job," he said.

"Great! That's good!" exclaimed Coker. "Nothing could be better for the community."

Beavers, an incumbent trustee, commented that he paid 15% tax on his annual trustee salary of \$120.

Rouleau said that he felt that the mayor deserved compensation, because Capitan has a unique situation in which the mayor also acts as city manager."

Renfro said, "I'm not in this for the money. I agree with Dr. Rouleau that being a trustee is community service. I am in favor of an increase for the mayor, though.

You know, the mayor generates grants for the village and this totals up to a lot of money."

Beavers requested that the pay increase be decided by a referendum vote rather than being decided by the trustees. However, it was explained by Coker and Dutton that because the special meeting was the last meeting under the current council, to wait for a referendum would mean that any raises could not take place until 1992.

"I'm a populist," explained Beavers. "I think the voters should make all the decisions."

Strickland commented, "Capitan is a business, and it's running in

the black. The mayor is the boss of the business, and the boss should be compensated."

The final motion was made by trustee Strickland and seconded by Renfro.

In other business, the village signed a resolution (88-3) to support a court case, Rogers vs. the City of Albuquerque, as amicus curiae, which deals with the definition of "occurrence" as it relates to insurance claims.

They also listened to the results of an engineering report that said the new water system was functioning well and that the existing filler plant could soon be sold.

Tiger girls go on to state

The Tigers remained behind until 28 seconds left when McKay sank a basket tying the game at 31. The third quarter ended with the 31-point tie.


The final quarter belonged to the Tigers for the first four minutes, as McKay made four successive points, aided by baskets from Washburn and McDaniel.

Maskew said Dorley Patton, on


the 300 hurdles, and Chantel Bowen on the high hurdles looked good in Artesia.

Track 'N Tack

The American Quarter Horse Association (AQHA) reports that through February 22nd, Stuart Dolphus currently leads all quarter horse riders in the USA in BOTH number of wins and purse money won.

Since the first of the year, Dolphus has had 33 mounts with 10 firsts, one second, and eight third place finishes.

His mounts have earned \$41,217.

Dolphus leads James Lackey and Henry Garcia who finished 2-3 in last year's national rider standings. Lackey was first on the list of Most Money Won in 1987 with over 1.47 million.

Dolphus currently leads the Quarter Horse rider standings at Sunland Park with 27 wins in 122 mounts. His winning percentage is 22.1 and his In-The-Money percentage is 47.5.

One of Dolphus's favorite mounts, Up Front Runner, has also reached the top of the standings.

Up Front Runner, winner of the Jess Burner Series #1 and #3 at Sunland last year, has a perfect three for three record in 1988 and leads all runners in the nation in BOTH numbers of wins and money earned.

Owned by Eddie or Karen Jacobs, Up Front Runner won the West Texas Maturity here on January 17 setting the season's fastest 400 yard time of :19.67 in the process.

The four-year-old then traveled to Albuquerque Downs where he won the Santo Domingo Handicap on February 7th.

Trainer James Gerhards is second in the national rankings of money earned behind perennial champion Blane Schvaneveldt.

Gerhards's runners have run out \$23,213 with Gerhards logging three wins and one third from eight starts.

Gerhards leads the quarter horse standings here with 15 wins

in 44 starts.

Second in the Sunland Quarter Horse rankings with 12 wins is Fred Danley. Danley is defending back-to-back leading trainer titles won here in 85-86 and 86-87.

Danley is ranked fourth nationally in money won with \$16,319 and with nine wins is second in number of wins behind Schvaneveldt.

The AQHA also named its division champions last week and Shoot Yeah was named Champion Two-Year-Old Quarter Running Colt of 1987.

Owned by Shoot Yeah, Ltd. of Oklahoma City, Shoot Yeah collected earnings of \$301,596 while winning the Sun-Country Futurity at Sunland Park and the Kansas Futurity at Ruidoso Downs. Shoot Yeah had a record of six wins, one second, and one third in his eight starts. He was sired by Easy Jet.

Shoot Yeah is on the Sunland grounds and is working out in preparation for his first start as a three-year-old.

Sunland Park will host some of the best two-year-olds in the nation for this Friday's West Texas Futurity Trials.

86 runners have entered the Grade II event including runners owned by many industry heavyweights.

Clarence Scharbauer, Jr., owner of Kentucky Derby and Strub Stakes winner Alysheba, will have hopefuls in the trials along with Betty Shebster, Jacqueline Spencer, A.F. Stanley, Jr., Shoot Yeah Ltd., Leroy Spires, and the Ancol Farms, Inc.

Nine 330 yard trials will determine the ten fastest that will return in the final on March 20th worth over \$145,000.

Friday, March 4th the first post time is 1:00 p.m.

Saturday, March 5th is Florida Derby Day! The first 2,500 fans

through the gates will receive a Free Sunland Park/Florida Derby cap.

In addition to the live racing beginning at 1:00 p.m., fans will be able to watch and wager on the \$500,000 Florida Derby from Gulfstream Park. The Derby will have one of the best fields running in the past three decades.

Forth Niner, winner of the Eclipse Award for outstanding two-year-old last year, along with Cherokee Colony and west coast invader Ruhlmann will go with others at 1 & 1/8th miles.

Sunland's live feature on Saturday will be the \$8,000 added John Phillips Memorial Handicap at 400 yards.

Sunday, March 6th the track will again race beginning at 1:00 p.m. and added to the venue of live racing will be the simulcasting of the \$1,000,000 guaranteed Santa Anita Handicap. The world's richest handicap race will have Alysheba, Ferdinand, Super Diamond and Judge Angelucci going as the four top weights.

Ridden by Salustio Burgos for trainer James Hambrick, Jr., the pair traveled six furlongs in 1:11.3. The winner was made the public's favorite and didn't disappoint her supporters paying \$5.00, \$2.60, \$2.10.

Tewajet, with Mike Lidberg up, settled for runner-up to the winner again. The two have met twice at Sunland, and Tewajet has just been beaten both times.

Princess Telary used a different tactic than normal in her February 26th win. She took the early lead then and barely held on for a nose win at six and one-half furlongs.

Today, though, she went back to her old style of laying behind the early leaders and then coming from off the pace for a strong stretch drive. The win was her third at Sunland this meeting. In her last eight starts here she has had only one finish worse than third.

Jockey Victor Quintanilla was injured during the running of the third race. Riding Pretty Bombay, his mount clipped heels with the

horse in front and threw the rider to the ground.

The extent of Quintanilla's injuries were unknown at this time, but he is listed in stable condition at an El Paso hospital.

Following Quintanilla's spill, Manuel Toquinto fell after the running of the fourth race when his mount, Jim's Skeeter, bobbed after the wire.

After being taken to Providence Hospital for X-rays and observation, Toquinto was released having sustained no serious injuries.

On Friday, one lucky Twin Trifecta ticketholder correctly picked the 3-5-8 second half combination and collected \$6,696.

There were only 67 exchanges going into the second half of the wager.

Leading rider Pedro Benitez brought in the favored Tommie Six for an easy 4 and 1/2 length win followed by Pickup, the second favorite, and Ima Toot Toot, the third choice.

Leroy Coombs, currently 11th in the jockey standings, earned riding accolades on Friday when he brought both J.G.'s Avenger and Ky Otee to the win circle.

Bedex first in Sat. feature

Bedex sprinted to an early lead, then had enough stamina to outrun a fast-closing Flirting Wink to win Saturday's feature allowance race at Sunland Park.

Ridden by Danny Sorenson, Bedex earned his first win of 1988 by running a 1:05.3 for 5 and 1/2 furlongs. The chestnut-colored gelding is owned and trained by W. Don Driggers of Albuquerque, New Mexico and won his fifth career race to pay \$7.60, \$4.40, \$4.00.

Flirting Wink was far behind as the field turned into the stretch. Jockey Mike Lidberg took the filly to the inside rail and she responded with a strong closing run, still gaining on the leader at the wire to finish 1 and 1/2 lengths behind.

Lidberg was going for his fifth win in a row in the race, but his mount was pinched in at the rail

passing the eighth poll and by the time she made it through, it was too late.

Lidberg fell just short of tying his own record of five consecutive wins set back on February 13.

Third in today's feature race was Raider Red. He stayed with Bedex for much of the race, but had not raced since last September, and the layoff seemed to take away from his effort in the stretch.

For the first time this season, Sunland Park's Twin Trifecta was cashed on two consecutive race days. There were only twelve exchanges for the second half of the wager and when favored Solista came across the wire in front with Field Stripper second and Ilana third, the 3-5-4 combination paid \$2,495.60.

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
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
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

Eye On The Capitol

MONTHLY FOLLOW-UP

From Budagher and Casey, to Vandergriff and Vargas.

Eye on The Capitol columns on the 1988 State Legislature examined bills sponsored by those lawmakers -- among others.

With the session over, it's time to look back and see what happened.

1. The Dena Lynn Gore Bill.

This measure was introduced to keep violent criminals in prison while they appealed their sentences. Dena Lynn Gore, a 9-year old Artesia girl, was murdered in 1986, by Terry Clark who was out on an appeal for raping a Roswell girl.

Senator Bill Vandergriff and Representative Barbara Casey introduced identical bills listing 21 violent offenses for which a convicted person couldn't go free while appealing. "Kidnapping" and "voluntary manslaughter" are two examples.

Senator Budd Hebert and Representative Ben Hall likewise introduced identical bills giving judges discretion over release pending appeal for all convictions except capital offenses.

I argued the Hebert/Hall bill was too weak to merit the title, "The Dena Lynn Gore bill."

What happened: the House Judiciary Committee made a substitute bill, combining the two versions. The 21 violent offenses spelled out in the Vandergriff/Casey measure were cut to 7.

Governor Carruthers signed the combined bill into law on February 12. Vandergriff said he was satisfied with the result. "Maybe we can add a thing or two in there later," he told me, in reference to the listing of violent crimes for which release on appeal could not be granted.

2. The Rube Goldberg Bill.

This measure would eliminate different tax rates on insurance premiums. Presently, companies with 40% of their assets invested in New Mexico pay 3% tax; companies with less than that amount, pay a 3% tax.

Metropolitan Life and a flock of other out-of-state insurance companies cried foul, and filed a lawsuit for equal treatment. If they win, the potential impact on State Government is estimated at \$160 million.

Frederick Peralta's House Bill 34 stated that if New Mexico insurance law was found to be unconstitutional (for restraining interstate trade), then various measures would go into effect.

A U.S. Supreme Court decision could be 5 years away. "So, is this legislation needed?" I asked. "Not now. We literally have years to develop other options."

As of February 24, HB34 had passed both the House and Senate, and was on its way to Governor Carruthers for a signature or veto.

3. Sentencing Guidelines Act.

HB136 was developed by the legislature's interim Criminal Justice and Criminal Procedures Committee chaired by Representative Ray Vargas. It would create a Guidelines Commission consisting of legal people and laymen, who would make sentencing more predictable and uniform across New Mexico.

The Vargas measure is on its way to Governor Carruthers. Vargas told me various amendments helped the bill, and he hoped Carruthers would sign it -- unlike a similar Act, which he vetoed in 1987.

4. Rotate the Ballot.

Representative Dick Minzner sponsored HB249 to rotate the candidates' names in federal and statewide races. The idea: by letting each candidate be first, the advantage going to first place is evenly distributed among all candidates.

The Minzner measure was substituted by an identical bill sponsored by Senator Victor Marshall. As of February 24th, SB189 had passed both chambers.

It's up to Governor Carruthers now.

5. Escape from Superboard.

HB310, sponsored by Minzner, would let the Board of Medical Examiners go its separate way from the Regulation and Licensing Department. Other examining/licensing boards were tacked on in the Senate.

The bill's fate is in Governor Carruthers' hands. So, too, is HB149, sponsored by Representative Pauline Eisenstadt. This bill would let any examining/licensing board become independent if it notifies the R & L Department before July 1, 1988.

6. Hal Yes.

Attorney General Hal Stratton determined that an on-going retirement program for state legislators was unconstitutional.

A proposed constitutional amendment sponsored by Representative Dan Berry would permit such a program. Annuity benefits couldn't exceed \$6,000 per year.

You'll see this measure on the ballot in November.

Other measures:

7. State Lottery Act. Died in the Senate Public Affairs Committee.

8. State Lottery and Sweepstakes.

Failed the Senate by a vote of 0 to 40.

9. Interstate Banking. Governor Carruthers signed it into law on February 17.

10. Canopy License Replace-

ment.

Canopy liquor licenses were doomed to extinction in 1991. SB243, sponsored by Senator Ben Altamirano, let the licenses be exchanged for dispensers' licenses.

Governor Carruthers signed the bill on February 18.

11. Gambling at Angel Fire. SB291 would have allowed the installation of up to 500 video machines at the Legends Resort in Angel Fire, as a "demonstration project."

API on this one. "Action Postponed Indefinitely."

12. Food and Medical Rebates.

The rebates were suspended (not abolished) in 1986, due to State Government's financial crunch. The rebates took \$45 million out of state coffers.

An interim legislative committee chaired by Senator Eddy Lopez voted to "affirm the sunset" -- meaning the rebate suspension would end next year.

SB295, sponsored by Senator Mike Alarid, abolished the rebates permanently. On February 16, Governor Carruthers signed the bill into law.

13. Video Gaming Act.

SB311 would allow nonprofit organizations to use electronic video games for fund raising purposes. The bill passed the Senate by 21-4. In the House, the measure was carried by Representative Fred Luna, who guided it through in the closing moments of the session by 38-28.

Governor Carruthers must now sign or veto it.

14. The Best Bill of 1988.

SB383, sponsored by Senator John Budagher, would have created

a Tuition Guarantee Fund. Tuition paid for 1 year for a child under 10 years old would provide for a full 4 years of tuition payments later at a New Mexico public university.

The Senate Education Committee gave the bill a Do-Pass recommendation. However, it died in the Senate Finance Committee.

15. Judging the Judges.

A proposed constitutional amendment would make judges run the first time in political partisan elections. After that, the judges would run for re-election in non-partisan "retention" elections.

The measure, sponsored by Senator Tito Chavez, passed the Senate by 33-7, and the House by 50-18.

Now its fate is up to you, the voters, in the November election.

16. Yo-Yo Taxes.


Senator Victor Marshall sponsored a proposed constitutional amendment to create a rainy-day fund for State Government. If times got tough, the government could dip into the fund for money, instead of raising taxes.

The problem as seen by the legislation's sponsors: taxes were going up and down, discouraging out-of-state companies from settling in New Mexico.

Governor Carruthers was behind the bill. It passed the Senate by 24-18, but died in the House Judiciary Committee.

Anyone unhappy with the 1988 session, might find solace in the words of a professional football player:

"If the Superbowl is so all-fired important, why do they have one every year?"


