Councillors, judge take office

Newly-elected village officials took their oaths of office on Monday before a small audience made up mainly of village staff.

Village clerk Tammie Maddox conducted the swearing-in ceremony for councillors J.A. "Al" Junge, Thomas B. McNeil, J.D. James and Jess Stinson and Municipal Judge Billy Gene Payne. Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. thanked Maddox for conducting the ceremonies, and gave the councillors the opportunity to speak, with Councillor Junge reserving his remarks for Tuesday's regular meeting.

"I look forward to serving on this council," said Councillor McNeil, who defeated former councillor Jerry Shaw with a write-in campaign that netted him 742 votes to his opponent's 206.

Councillor James, serving his first elected term since he was appointed to his previous position by Mayor Davis, thanked the citizens of Ruidoso for placing confidence in him. "I will try to be a good councillor," said James, who garnered the most votes of any of the candidates in last week's election.

Councillor Stinson, also elected for the first time (he, too, was appointed to his previous term), called on citizens to make comments to him and other councillors rather than leaving decision-making to the seven village officials.

Councillor Elmer Pirelli, starting the second half of his four-year term, was elected mayor pro-tem.

Mayor Davis, in accordance with the law, recommended appointments for the council's approval. The group unanimously approved re-appointing Frank Potter as village manager-treasurer; Maddox, clerk; William "Bill" Newman, chief of police; and John Underwood, village attorney.

The council received written reports from village department heads and unanimously adopted a resolution regarding notice of public meetings. Mayor Davis said the reports from various departments are available to the public.

Also Monday, councillors learned of various vacancies on village boards and commissions, with Davis asking for comments before Tuesday's meeting when he said he would make appointments. Since terms of all members of some village boards expired on the same day, March 1, Davis said he asked

the village attorney to draft a plan to have the terms staggered in the future. He said the new members can draw for terms.

Davis also recommended placing

the Airport Planning Advisory Board under the Planning and Zoning Commission.

The first regular meeting was scheduled for 6:30 p.m. Tuesday.

County insurance may be cancelled

County Manager Suzanne Cox and Sheriff Don Samuels jointly received a letter on March 4, stating that the county's liability insurance is about to be cancelled.

The letter, addressed to Cox and Samuels from the Risk Management Division (RMD) of New Mexico, was read at Wednesday's special meeting of the county commission, and states in part:

"RMD is very disturbed about the number and types of Civil Rights claims which we are receiving from Lincoln County. Our Civil Rights coverage is set up to protect an entity based on the assumption that only an occasional claim will occur. These claims are quite expensive and often it takes several years of loss-free experience in order to pay for the occasional claim which may occur.

"But, in your case, it appears we may have a multitude of claims. RMD already has a 233.6% loss ratio and by the time we increase

our Reserves to what is appropriate plus add a standard loss development factor, we anticipate that your loss experience will exceed 1,000%. This is, as you can imagine, totally unacceptable from a monetary standpoint.

"The letter further states that 'in all probability' coverage will be cancelled effective July 1, 1988, unless coverage and price can be renegotiated.

The county currently pays around \$35,000 per year for coverage.

"\$35,000 per year times 1000%, that's \$350,000," figured commissioner Ralph Dunlap. "We can't pay that kind of premium."

Cox suggested that the coverage be renegotiated with RMD, and also that bids be let for coverage, which is required by law, beginning on July 1.

"Even if the county wins the civil rights suits, the premium rate will still go up," said county attorney Gary Mitchell. "I don't mean to

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Grindstone Lake: Mayor says 'Fill it up'

Start filling the dam was the order given by Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. during Tuesday's meeting of the Ruidoso Village Council.

"I think we ought to fill it up and see if it's going to fall down real quick," said Mayor Davis, and the council agreed, voting unanimously in favor of the mayor issuing an executive order for village staff to begin filling the big lake.

Before hearing the mayor's instructions to begin filling the dam, village manager Frank Potter reported on his discussions with the State Engineer's Office. Potter said the village was working to comply with the last two requirements of that office, and village attorney John Underwood said he asked the state engineer to expedite the matter.

"All they can do is turn it off," said Mayor Davis after issuing his directive. Members of the audience applauded the council action.

In its first regular meeting since the March 1 municipal election, councillors also discussed water defense and proposals for a civic center, and approved a list of mayoral appointments.

New councillors J.A. "Al" Junge and Thomas B. McNeil, sworn in on Monday along with returning

councillors J.D. James and Jess Stinson, were seated to the mayor's right for the first of what Junge said will amount to 96 meetings over the next four years.

Much of Tuesday's meeting was spent in discussions over proposals to acquire a facility for a civic center, with the council finally instructing Potter to organize a meeting for representatives of the various groups interested in an events center.

Potter and accountant John Varley presented detailed written and oral reports over acquiring a municipal center. Potter said he was asked by the council to give such a report after a presentation made last month by Charlie Smith on behalf of a Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce committee.

Potter said a recommendation to negotiate with property owners was premature, because of the Bateman Act that regulates governmental acquisition of real property.

Varley displayed figures that show how the village could pay for a convention center. He compared using various percentages of lodgers' tax funds, in combination with the building fund, that show the village having from \$643,500 to \$1,532,500 available over the next 15 years. His figures assume a facility would be paid out in monthly payments at 10 percent interest over the 15-year period.

As more funds are put into the building, less money

is available for promotion, according to the report.

Potter said the council could ask property owners to submit appraisals of suitable buildings to be considered.

Councillors finally agreed to put off action until Potter has his meeting.

Also Tuesday councillors approved unanimously the following mayoral appointments:

Planning and Zoning Commission-Eddie Nichols, Ellen Long, Robert Donaldson, Candyce Garrett, John White, Lisa Wiggins were all reappointed, with Peggy Jordan, Gregg Pertee and David Harding added to the commission.

Lincoln County Economic Development Corporation and the village Economic Development Board-Councillor James.

Sierra Blanca Airport Commission-Councillor Stinson.

Mayor Davis said various boards expire in March, and he'll make further appointments at the next meeting.

In other regular business Tuesday the council:

—Agreed to pay \$15,000 membership dues in the Water Defense Association and heard a clarification of funds authorized by the Legislature. It was learned the Village of Ruidoso will be reimbursed for water defense costs of \$265,000 and will share in WDA al-

locations for the appeals process.

—Noted that departmental reports, as well as a report from Ruidoso Care, Inc., were included in councillors' packets.

—Learned of plans by the State Highway Department to begin work on four-lane construction on State Highway 37. Engineer Mike Davalos said that construction might make it necessary for the village to relocate a main water line that runs down Mechem Drive.

—Awarded the bid of \$11,349.98 on a 1988 four-wheel-drive truck to low-bidder Reliable Chevrolet, Inc. of Albuquerque. The only other bidder was Sierra Blanca Motors at \$11,928.69, and Councillor Elmer Pirelli questioned if there isn't a local preference. Underwood said purchasing regulations have an in-state, but not a local, preference.

Junge, saying, "I hate to hog the whole meeting," questioned purchasing agent Fonda McLain at length over why the specifications call for long bed, fleetside, tinted glass, extra capacity fuel tank, heavy duty radiator and automatic transmission.

Potter said some items are standard equipment, and disagreed with Junge's contention that the truck would be used only around town.

Principal demoted, Gladden reassigned for 88-89

The Ruidoso Board of Education took a budget-cutting measure following a two-hour-20-minute executive meeting to consider next year's administration contract. Board members decided to double up on at least one administrative salary to trim the budget.

In September, Ruidoso Middle School Principal Texanita Cole will be offered a contract teaching at the elementary level, and Associate Superintendent of Schools Mike Gladden will continue in his present capacity, under the title "Associate Superintendent of Schools on Special Assignment," and will also serve as acting principal of the middle school.

"The board should expect cooperation in this effort from the staff of the middle school and from its students," stated Superintendent Sid Miller.

"Mike Gladden will take over this position in a measure to help us financially," said Lynn Willard, secretary of the school board. "By doing that, it's going to help get us back to where we have a favorable cash flow."

Other principals and administrator Karen Tillman will continue in their present positions.

In other action, the board, after swearing in new member Rod Adamson, approved some budgetary transfers and increases, approved Stephanie Ulbright, Robert Pope and Jacob Villarreal as substitute bus drivers, and listened to nine items on the superintendent's report agenda.

Board blames budget for cutbacks

Gladden presented a Needs Assessment Survey. Its goal is to collect "a large cross section" of community input, which will then be reported to the board.

Anyone interested in participating in the survey should contact Gladden at 257-4051.

The results of the State Department Review were presented.

"A big portion of this deals with the need of a 'needs assessment,' which we are now in the process of completing," Miller said. "We have replied to each citation, most of them concerned with our lack of formal paperwork. We're really pleased with the evaluation," he concluded.

Miller also presented the results of the Office of Civil Rights Review,

conducted by two people from the Dallas office. "We felt good about our paperwork for this one," Karen Tillman stated.

Miller commented that, often, a review is called for when a complaint is made, but stressed that this was not the case in Ruidoso.

The Public Law 874 audit results were announced, and fiscal manager Caron Snow pronounced the district "A-OK."

Sandy Gladden presented an award the district had received for the Region IX Award for handicapped child finding service models. She commended her staff for this, particularly Likis Bowden, child-find coordinator.

Another award was recognized at the meeting, and that was the award White Mountain Intermediate School Principal Don Weems won as Outstanding Administrator of the Year in a seven-state district.

It was decided that students will make up their missed snow days at the end of the year rather than in increments during regular school days. This will be discussed further at the April 12 meeting, in case there are still more snow days to come during the next month.

The 19 DECA winners were congratulated, under the leadership of Billie Strohmeier, and the board said that they would write a letter of congratulations. Also singled out for congratulations were the Ruidoso High School wrestlers, who had four members in the top four in the state championships.

The next regular meeting will be at 7 p.m. Tuesday, April 12, at the Administration Office.

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point a finger, but this is what we've tried to warn people about, and now it's happening. This is the price we're paying for the sheriff's personnel problems."

Commissioner Bill Karn said, "Isn't the state Risk Management Division the cheapest coverage we can get? How will the county pay for coverage now?"

Cox stated that either taxes will be raised, or services be cut.

"Our present claims, through July 1, are covered," explained Mitchell. "This kind of insurance is error insurance, like auto insurance. They raise your rates if you make a claim. It's very unfortunate, but there's not much we can do about it. We filed the writ of mandamus, that was the appropriate action for the commission to take. Taxpayers in Lincoln County will be paying for these lawsuits forever."

Karn made a motion for Cox to begin bid-letting and negotiation with RMD, and Dunlap seconded.

Steve Massey of the South-eastern New Mexico Economic Development District approached the board and asked them to approve the final payment to Kim Williams of Williams and Company, Austin, Texas, for the Fort Stanton Master Plan presented to the community in December.

This payment officially closes the project.

Following Massey's presentation, Sid Goodloe approached the commission with a proposal for what he called "a dream, an extension of the plan, an altogether new idea."

His proposal is the Fort Stanton Restoration and Recreation Project, which would be a "unique approach" to recreation in the West. It would include a monument and museum to the horses of the West, calvary and ranch horses, and would include riding trails from the Fort to Lincoln.

"The Bureau of Land Management is willing to provide \$25,000 in matching funds," Goodloe said.

He was accompanied by a representative from the BLM and also a representative from New Mexico State University, both of whom endorsed the plan to commissioners.

"I would like to ask the commission to contribute \$2,500 to kick off the project towards matching funds, so we can begin the planning process," said Goodloe, who explained that the plan would include 100 miles of riding trails and would in no way interfere with the Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School.

"I hope we can combine this with the restoration project," Goodloe said.

The commission endorsed the idea of the project, but Chairman John Hightower noted that there was no way they could come up with \$2,500 out of this year's budget.

"But I'll give you \$50," said Hightower, meaning, out of his own pocket.

"I'll change my request to \$250 then," said Goodloe.

"Surely there must be a way we can come up with \$250 to support the start-up of this project," commented Dunlap.

Suzanne Cox said that she could find the money in her budget under line item "professional fund - vocational services."

Bill Karn made the motion to do so, and Dunlap seconded.

Steve Massey also approached the commission to ask permission to apply for grant funding for a water system for the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport. He estimated that the final cost would be \$1.4 million, including electrical, water dispensing, engineering, design and other features.

The grant he is applying for is a \$281,117 matching fund. "At this point in time, it's a pre-application," explained Massey. "Applying for the grant does not commit the county to anything, but they need to be the applying agency."

Commissioners approved Dunlap's motion and Massey will pre-apply for funding.

Murder suspect stays in protective custody

Judge Robert M. Doughty ruled at a hearing Wednesday that Matt Surratt, the San Patricio youth accused of the murder of Katina Chavez, should remain in protective custody of the Otero County Juvenile Detention Center.

Surratt, 16, represented by attorney Gary C. Mitchell, listened as Judge Doughty explained his rights and the options of the procedure to him. He answered questions in a soft-spoken voice, displaying a speech impediment caused by his life-long hearing disability.

The open hearing was attended by around 20 people, including Surratt's mother and two sisters and some of his San Patricio neighbors.

The hearing featured five witnesses, and counsel was allowed to examine and cross-examine the witnesses.

Deputy district attorney Isabel Bronzina presented two witnesses to substantiate her case that Surratt should remain in custody and not be returned to his mother and grandfather. Surratt is being held under an open charge of murder.

The first witness was Ron Whiteley, who has been chief juvenile officer in Otero County for 10 years. It is his duty to investigate referrals and make determinations as to delinquency.

Whiteley commented that he had not been able to interview the suspect because attorney Mitchell did not give him permission, and therefore it was harder to make a determination as to delinquency.

Judge Doughty stated for the record that the defendant has a right to remain silent, and that counsel has a right to enforce that right.

Whiteley said that he had conducted no interview, had not looked into school records, and did not do a check of Surratt's driving record through the sheriff's office or the Department of Motor Vehicles.

He did, however, state that it was his feeling that Surratt did not have adequate supervision in his home and should not be returned to the custody of his mother.

"Rumors have been flying that there could be a threat to the defendant's life if he is returned to the Hondo Valley," Whiteley said.

Mitchell asked Whiteley if Lincoln County Sheriff Don Samuels indicated to him that Surratt had, in any way, interfered with the investi-

gation, refused to answer questions or caused any trouble.

Whiteley said that Samuels had not indicated that Surratt had caused any trouble or was not being cooperative in the investigation.

"Did Matt Surratt interfere in any way with the investigation, or were there any instances where he refused to talk, or refused to allow his home and effects to be searched?" Mitchell asked.

"No," replied Whiteley.

Mitchell also asked if Whiteley had any knowledge of any specific threats to Surratt's safety, or threats of retaliation. Whiteley replied that there were no written threats or hard evidence of danger to Surratt, and admitted that threats were "rumors and speculation."

Mitchell asked: "Did you receive any evidence from the New Mexico State Crime Lab connecting Matt Surratt with homicide?"

Whiteley answered: "No. I did not."

Bronzina's next witness was Lincoln County Sheriff's Office Chief Investigator Paul Wersich, who had been on duty February 21, the day Chavez's body was found in the river.

Bronzina asked Wersich if Surratt, were he released to his mother's custody, would be a threat to the community. "I don't know," Wersich replied, "but there might be a threat to his safety."

Wersich testified that the sheriff's department does not have the manpower to guard Surratt if he was released. "There is a good possibility injury might be inflicted on the child if he was to return home," Wersich said.

When asked by Mitchell to elaborate on those possibilities, Wersich testified that he had heard statement as to members of the San Patricio community wanting to injure the person who killed Chavez, but that none of these statements included threats against Matt Surratt himself.

"People say things like, 'An eye for an eye,' or 'If this was the early 1800s, we could take care of this real quick,'" Wersich testified.

Mitchell's first witness was Surratt's mother, Mary Lee Surratt, who testified that her youngest son, Charles Matthew Alfonso Surratt, had never been in trouble with the law or in school. She said that he does not drive, and does not have a driver's license.

She stated that she had no indication that harm would come to Matt if he were released to her. "None whatsoever," she said.

As to allegations that Matt had not been properly supervised, she testified, "We have rules at our house, and those rules have to be followed. That's the way it is."

Mrs. Surratt, who was widowed on February 10, said that her son had never injured anybody, and was not suicidal. "He was passing in school, he belonged to the Future Farmers of America, and he was never suspended or anything," she said, mentioning that Matt received speech therapy all through school because of his poor hearing and difficulty forming words.

"There isn't much to do where we live, sometimes Matt goes to his friends' houses to watch movies on TV," she said, noting that she does not own a VCR. "Once in a while he goes to a dance at the church hall."

Mitchell's next witness was Surratt's 77-year-old grandfather, Alfonso Soto, who has been a Lincoln County resident for 73 years. "We kind of work together," Soto testified of his relationship with his grandson, explaining that Matt earned money by taking care of calves.

"He does a good job. He does not disobey me, he respects me. Since he was two years old, I have never heard one word of profanity from Matt, and I've never heard him say 'I won't do something he was asked to do,'" Soto said.

When Mitchell asked Soto why he wanted his grandson returned to the family home, Soto replied, "I don't want to do all the chores by myself."

Mitchell's last witness was Paul Chavez, who had seen Matt Surratt several times on the day Katina Chavez disappeared. "There are some people in San Patricio who are after blood, or so they say, but they are intelligent enough not to use their guns," Chavez said. "I don't think Matt will be hurt or killed if he comes home."

When cross examined by Mitchell, Chavez stated, "This is double jeopardy for us. First we lose Katina, then they take Matt away."

Mitchell and Bronzina have until Saturday, March 19, to agree on a date for the transfer hearing, which must be held within 30 days of Wednesday's hearing. The District Attorney's office is expected to attempt to get a ruling to try Surratt as an adult. Judge Doughty will rule on that at the transfer hearing, which will determine whether Surratt is tried as a child or as an adult.

Teen hurt in ski road wreck

An El Paso, Texas, teen-ager was treated and released Sunday at Lincoln County Medical Center after the vehicle she was riding in overturned on Ski Run Road.

Anna Cosgrove, 16, was injured in a one-car accident about 4:50 p.m. Sunday near mile marker three on the ski road. According to official records, Edmund F. Eli, 16, of Roswell was the driver of the 1987 Nissan station wagon that crashed.

New Mexico State Police officer Mike Howard said Eli was south-bound and attempted to overtake a

vehicle in front of him when he swerved to the left to avoid oncoming traffic. Howard said the driver then over-corrected to the right, went into a broad-side slide, causing the car to overturn one and a quarter times, coming to rest on its right side off the left side of the roadway.

Howard said Cosgrove was taken to LCMC by ambulance, and the driver and other passengers were treated by Emergency Medical Services personnel at the scene.

Eli was cited for failure to use due care, said Howard.

THE FIRST CALF

One of the favorite cows on the place is black with a white face, with black markings around the eyes which makes you think she is wearing a mask. So I call her "The Bandit." The Bandit is fond of the hills, likes to travel the high and the rough places -- a real ridge runner.

After being gone quite a while in the high country, the Bandit showed up in mid morning on Feb-

ruary twenty-nine. She stood right next to a cedar bush looking at me through her mask. Then out from behind the bush stepped a tiny ginger-bread colored calf with a white face and a tan ring around one eye. In a few quick steps he was at his mother's side, looking at you, calm, unafraid as if he had known you all his life.

At the sight of the first calf in the spring you can always feel your heart within you give a little leap of

joy. There is no feeling quite like it, and makes you know why you would not trade the life of a rancher for any other.

This little guy was one day old, and that means he was born of February twenty-eight, the birthday of our Brother, Joe. So what should we call him? Little Joe makes you happy just to see him drinking his milk, running and playing, nibbling at the hay, trying to be a grown up. He makes the beginning to a favorite time of year -- the blessed season of the little calves.

The Plant Corner

HOW TO REBLOOM A POINSETTIA

When the green leaves begin to turn yellow and the bracts are no longer pretty and begin to fall, the plant is going into a rest period. At this time gradually reduce the amount of water and move the plant to a cooler place, perhaps to a north window, where temperatures will remain from 50 degrees to 70 degrees. Water just enough to keep the stems from shriveling. The

plant should rest the entire months of January and February.

Poinsettia is a true American, a native of the western hemisphere, and not the Old World. It was named after Dr. Joel R. Poinsett, U.S. Minister to Mexico, who brought it across the border in 1828. Botanically, it is EUPHORBIA PULCHERRIMA, also known as Flor de Noche Buena.

In early March, cut the stems back to 4"-6" above the soil line. The plant does not need to be repotted the first year. After the first year, repot in a container 2" larger in diameter than the original pot. Use a good potting mix with plenty of peatmoss because the plant likes to be moist at all times,

but never let the plant stand, even for a few minutes, in a tray of water.

After the stems have been cut back, begin to water and feed the pruned plant to promote regrowth. When new growth begins, fertilize the poinsettia every two weeks with BR-61 or Peters, both have a high phosphorus count. The middle number in the formula is the phosphorus number.

As new growth develops, cut or pinch back the top, leaving three or four leaves on each shoot. Repeat this procedure each time the plant sends out new shoots until the first of July. This will prevent a tall, lanky plant and will give you a shorter plant with more blossoms. Now is a great time to take them outside for daytime only in the sunshine and rain. This will give them added strength, which they will need to produce the dark red bracts, but do be very sure to bring them in at night just in case the temperature falls below 50. If the plant is watered, fertilized, and given a good growing spot through summer, it will again produce a large plant. Most times the plant will have more blooms the second year.

Move the plant to a south or west window around the first of September and see that it get an UNINTERRUPTED long night. Be certain not to admit any light, even briefly, as this will disrupt the flowering process. Plants need 14 hours of darkness to trigger the onset of blooms. If you must turn the light on in the room with the plant, cover the plant with a box or sack first but be sure not to forget to remove the cover in the morning so the plant gets 10 hours of good light.

Poinsettias enjoy warm temperatures of 55 to 75 degrees. Therefore they do best not to put them outside in Ruidoso. Often our night temperature falls below 55 degrees in the summer. To make new plants, when new shoots are 4 to 5 inches long, cut them with a bit of stem, known as a heel (so they will not bleed so much) to root in a 50-50 mixture of peat moss and sand or vermiculite, after dipping ends in a root-inducing powder. Cover with a plastic bag and keep in bright light, and when roots appear, pot singly or in groups of two, three, or more in an average potting mixture. Plants grown this way tend to be shorter and have larger blossoms.





Owned by Mollie Kelly of El Paso, Si A Bit scored his third straight win at Sunland while running a 1:05 and 2/5th seconds for five and one half furlongs. The win-

ner returned \$14.00, \$7.00, \$4.20.

Totality took the lead as the field entered the final turn, but just came up a nose short for second. Colleen's Dream finished third in the seven horse field.

Pre-race favorite, Psychedelic, was in contention until the final sixteenth, but faded and finished sixth.

Henson resigns from Downs post

H. Rick Henson has resigned as director of racing at Ruidoso Downs Race Track, according to a news release from the track.

In making the announcement, Bob Standish, director of operations at Ruidoso Downs, reported, "Mr. Henson will continue to be active in the race horse industry and we at Ruidoso Downs thank him for his years of service and wish him good luck in his future endeavors."

Effort of Love sets fastest time in West Texas Futurity trials Fri.

Effort Of Love took charge from the start and raced to an easy win while setting the fastest qualifying time in Friday's West Texas Futurity Trials at Sunland Park.

Owned by Betty Lou Shebester, Effort Of Love is the daughter of Special Effort out of the Lady Bug's Moon mare, Miss Rocket Bug. She is a perfect two-for-two in her career, winning today's 330 yard test in time of :16.625.

Ridden by Darrell Blevins, Effort Of Love ran the fastest time of the 85 entrants and won the fifth division of the trials by an impressive 2 and 1/2 lengths.

Sharing the spotlight with the Effort Of Love was trainer Jack Brooks and rider Jacky Martin.

The two-year-olds competed in

nine qualifying heats and a Brooks-conditioned runner entered the winner's circle four times.

Three of those winners were ridden by Martin.

Merganser ran a :16.720 to win the first trial for owners Jerry Wells and Ronald Shaiz, running the second fastest time of the day.

The other winners for the Brooks-Martin team were My Dash and Marthas Teeser which both have connections to Lawton, Oklahoma resident Terry Bell. Bell leases My Dash from Liese Gullikson and owns Marthas Teeser outright.

My Dash was timed in :16.740 - good for a one and one half length win, while Marthas Teeser was taking a neck win in the fourth divi-

sion.

All three, Merganser, My Dash, and Marthas Teeser were making their first career start in the trials.

Brooks's fourth qualifier, Lark Special, dead heated for the win with Masters Link in the third trial.

Gotta Be A Dash and Six Kiss tied for the final spot on the finals roster, so the list of qualifiers will not be complete until Saturday morning. The winner of the "shake" will make the final and the loser will be the first qualifier for the consolation.

The Grade II final is worth \$141,744 and will be run on Sunday, March 20 with the \$20,434 Consolation to be on the March 19 program.

Track 'N Tack

Harry Henson Day at Sunland Park will be Sunday, March 13th. Henson's career as a track announcer spanned 46 years, 16 different tracks and over 80,000 races.

The man credited with being "The Voice" of horseracing has been heard in dozens of movies and television shows and has called such greets as Spectacular Bid, Affirmed, Seattle Slew, Kelso, John Henry, J.L. Tobin, and Dr Fager to name just a few.

Henson called races at Longsacres, WA, Hollywood Park and Del Mar, CA, the New Mexico State Fair and Sunland Park. He was the track announcer in 1955 at Arlington Park and then called the first great match race of the modern era between Swaps and Nashua.

Henson began calling at Sunland Park in the fall of 1961 and was the track announcer here until his retirement in 1984.

Fans are invited out to greet the dean of race calling.

Some of his more famous races will be re-broadcast and a special video biography will be aired on the TV monitors plus, the first 1,500 fans through the gates that day will receive a free Harry Henson Commemorative Glass.

Effort Of Love put forth an effort of pure speed to set the fastest qualifying time in the West Texas Futurity Trials.

Run on Friday, March 4th, Effort Of Love's time of :16.625 at 330 yards was better than any of the other 84 entrants and will make the daughter of Special Effort the one to beat for first prize in the \$141,744 final on March 20th.

Effort Of Love is owned by Betty Lou Shebester.

Sharing the spotlight with the top qualifier was trainer Jack Brooks and rider Jacky Martin.

Brooks will have no less than five runners in the Grade II final as Merganser, My Dash, Marthas Teeser, Larks Special, and Six Kiss were all saddled by the veteran conditioner.

In quarter horse purse money won, Brooks ended up fifth leading trainer in the nation last year with his charges totaling \$320,873 in earnings.

Jacky Martin rode three of those trial winners for Brooks and will now have to decide which one he wants to mount in the final.

Martin himself did well in the quarter horse national standings last year, finishing 10th in the nation in money won.

The final qualifiers, with times run are: Effort Of Love, :16.625; Merganser, :16.720; My Dash, :16.740; Master Pass, :16.790; Marthas Teeser, :16.840; Heza Charger Bar, :16.875; Driftin Ty Sackett, :16.910; Lark Special, :16.915; Masters Link, :16.915; Six Kiss, :16.930.

The \$20,434 Consolation will be run on Saturday, March 19 and the ten runners will be: Gotta Be A Dash, Mighty Reliezo, Malibu Nights, Just Gambler, Straight Up Noon, Keep The Cash, Codys Comment, Duval Bug, Dabbit on Em, Cedrico.

The \$10,000 added Sunland Park Derby will be contested at one mile on March 13th. Early indications show that the field will be led by Carl Davidson's A Bit Of Style and Wayne Buehrer's Stormin Dancer.

The pair will meet for the third time in their careers.

A Bit Of Style defeated Stormin Dancer in his maiden win back in July of 87 at Ruidosos Downs. Stormin Dancer was fourth and A Bit Of Style finished fifth in the Dr Fager Stakes at Turf Paradise in their last head-to-head battle on February 28th.

Both are allowance winners at Sunland this season.

After winning on November 14th, Stormin Dancer qualified as a finalist in the Sunland Park Fall Thoroughbred Futurity.

A Bit Of Style was an impressive eight and one half length winner at six panels on November 25th.

The top challengers in the race appear to be Little and Roberts's Texas Attraction and Mike Weatherly's Available Groom.

Jockey Victor Quintanilla suffered serious head injuries during the running of the third race on February 26th.

The rider was near the lead aboard Pretty Bombay when the horse clipped heels with the runner in front and went down.

Quintanilla was thrown hard to the ground and was apparently run over by one or more of the trailing pack. The rider suffered a fractured skull and an injury to his eye. He went through surgery last

Tuesday, March 1 and as of this report he said he was doing well and was improving. He was able to take phone calls and is allowed visitors on a limited basis at Providence Memorial in El Paso.

Sunday, March 6th was a day of threes at Sunland.

Three horses wearing the number three finished first including the tenth race winner Si A Bit.

Si A Bit was last at the top of the stretch, but under the urging of jockey Mike Lidberg, the runner circled the field and just nipped Totality at the wire for the feature race win.

The third consecutive win at Sunland for Si A Bit, it was also the third riding win of the day for Mike Lidberg.

Jockey Danny Sorenson also rode three winners on the program to further tighten the leading jockey race.

Curribot showed his class again, beating a field of seven to notch his 32nd career win on Saturday, March 5. Running in his eleven-year-old debut, he sat off the pace for much of the race, then at the three furlong pole jockey Glen Murphy turned Curribot loose and the multiple stakes-winner responded with a four length win at one mile. Timed in a season best of 1:38.1, Curribot has now earned over \$420,000 for owner Juliana Winters.

Trainer J. Doyal Roberts, Sr. says the crowd pleaser is going to ship to Albuquerque next, but he is going to bring him back to Sunland for the Sunland Park Handicap on closing day, May 9th.



Politics ... that's pronounced @#*%\$#! by lots of folks.

But I just don't, and I won't, buy into the theory that politics is a dirty word. It's not.

Webster reminds us in his Third New International Dictionary that politics comes from the Greek word politika.

Presbyterian minister Winston Prensall, one of the only people I know who has ever studied Greek, said the Greek root word is polis, and that means a city or enclosed and walled town or its inhabitants. The Greek verb politeuo, in its transitive form, means to be a citizen, while in the intransitive it means to administer affairs of state, and in the passive it means to be governed.

It doesn't sound dirty to me. Sounds like politics has a lot to do with being a citizen.

And in the English, Webster defines politics as the art or science of government, as well as the art or science of influencing governmental policy and that of winning and holding control over a government.

So, what's wrong with that? Would we prefer a dictatorship over this open system of selecting leaders and lawmakers? I wouldn't.

Political parties as we know them today have evolved over the

life of this nation as people with similar philosophies joined together to choose leaders and influence policy-making. The names have changed over the years, leaving this nation with, basically, a two-party system.

And those two major parties—the Democrats and the Republicans—show their true colors every four years by the candidates they choose for the presidency, as well as through the platforms they draft during the national conventions. We're in the midst of that process right now, as each state conducts primaries or caucuses to declare its citizens' choice for this nation's president.

As candidates travel from state to state, participate in debates and answer thousands of questions, we voters see them at their best and at their worst. We hear what they say, and we have a chance to check out their records to see if they match their words.

By the time the two groups convene to choose their candidates, all voters have had the opportunity to make their preferences known.

And the whole thing isn't a popularity contest. While each candidate's public personality and ability to communicate effectively is definitely important, their past

Every few years we hear that the Postal Service is going to, or has already, raised the price of a first class stamp.

records and views on the issues are revealed time after time, and then have an impact on their party's platform.

Thus, when voters select a president in November, they're voting, not only for the man or woman, but for the platform and basic philosophies of the party that selected that candidate.

For instance, the candidates of the two parties have very different views on a number of issues:

While all seven major candidates for the Democratic nomination support the Equal Rights Amendment, all but one Republican candidate oppose it. Senator Bob Dole supported ERA, voted against the three-year extension on ratification and refused to co-sponsor the ERA in 1987.

On abortion, the Democrats support on various levels the right to choose, while the Republican candidates oppose it on most levels.

All but one Democratic candidate oppose the MX missile, and all Republican candidates favor it. All the Democrats oppose further aid to Nicaragua, while all the Republicans favor it.

Those major differences illustrate how the nation has divided itself into parties according to basic beliefs on a variety of issues. Of course neither all Democrats nor all Republicans agree on everything, but a strong pattern is established which is likely to be reflected in the party platforms.

And for the citizens in this nation who don't want to align themselves with either of the major parties, there are minor parties that take strong stands on the issues—like the Libertarian Party

that calls for drastic reductions in government. And then there's the option of being an "Independent."

Sure, there are some dirty things that happen in the political arena—like all the dirty tricks of the Nixon era. But that isn't the standard, it's the exception. And we citizen voters are responsible to see that it never happens again by choosing honorable men to run on our country's tickets for every office from county sheriff to president of the United States.

On the local level—where people who drink coffee at the same place are vying for the same office—that's where personalities sometimes override issues. Some of the problems in this very county that have been attributed to politics have very little to do with that word. They have more to do with the people we voters elected.

Let's not blame politics for everything that happens in government and in campaigns. Instead, let's be meticulous in our choice of candidates at every level—looking into their backgrounds and evaluating their experience to see that we never place someone in a job they're not qualified to handle.

And, let's hold our leaders to the highest standards of ethics, openness and honesty. If there are any skeletons in their closets, let's drag them out for public view before we place them in a position of authority.

Don't wrinkle your nose with disdain at the very word "politics." Instead, be the kind of informed and intelligent citizen who takes part in making the political arena an honorable and useful place for the selection of first-rate leaders.

bodice seam, and a gathered skirt. She carried a white basket filled with miniature silk flowers and bows.



'Save Your Vision' advises Marquardt

More than two million people in the United States have glaucoma.

Optometrist T.T. Marquardt, speaking to the Golden Age Club during Save Your Vision month in March, described symptoms and causes of glaucoma, the eye disease that is the leading cause of blindness in this nation.

"We manage the disease—we don't cure it," said Marquardt, advocating regular eye examinations for early diagnosis and treatment. He said early care is important for less devastating damage from the disease.

"Glaucoma is increased pressure," explained Marquardt, showing slides of the open and closed angle types. While the open angle type is the most common, the closed angle disease is far more painful.

Symptoms can include severe eye pain, nausea, vomiting, blurred vision and colored rings around lights. Marquardt said in such narrow angle attacks, an eye care professional works to reduce the pressure as quickly as possible.

"In a glaucoma exam we measure the angle and the pressure of the fluid," said Marquardt.

The incidence of glaucoma is

higher in people over 40.

"If someone in your family has glaucoma, chances are 20 times greater that you'll get it than someone in the general population," noted Marquardt. Diabetics are at greater risk than the rest of the population, but trauma can also cause the disease, which may not exhibit symptoms until years after the trauma incident.

Marquardt said the method of treatment varies depending on the cause of the disease.

In encouraging members of the Golden Age Club to have regular eye care exams, Marquardt commented that Medicare now pays for examinations regarding the health of the eye.
