

Hondo teacher resigns, denies allegations

Amid a flurry of rumors and allegations, Phil Stewart, 29, resigned from his position as teacher at Hondo High School on Wednesday, submitting his resignation to a meeting of the school board.

According to Superintendent of Schools Carlos Thomas, Stewart submitted his resignation in an executive session.

Thomas admitted that there was

some public discussion at the meeting concerning the motion to accept the resignation, but this discussion is not reflected in the minutes of the meeting.

According to Thomas, Stewart taught several classes, including science, language arts and history.

According to an article in the El Paso Times, Assistant District Attorney Scot Key is investigating allegations that Stewart wrote sexually suggestive letters to girl students, gave two students guns, and taught others how to kill in an

after-school martial arts class.

Katrina Chavez, found dead in the Rio Ruidoso on February 21, had received several suggestive letters, which were found in her effects during the investigation. The 15-year-old Hondo High School student had been strangled, and then drowned.

According to the Times article, an 11th grade high school student, who was not named, admitted that

Zoning proposal letters create a wave of input.

Anyone calling Ruidoso Village Hall earlier this week was likely to get a busy signal.

The village was inundated by calls after the Planning and Zoning Department sent notices of proposed zoning changes. Everyone owning property within village limits got a letter—that's more than 13,000 letters, according to division head Leon Eggleston.

The mail-out is one of the final steps leading to action on a new zoning ordinance and map in the works for the past three years. They were drafted with the comprehensive plan adopted late last year.

While the zoning changes impact fewer than 2,500 properties and 1,000 neighboring properties, the village notified all property owners with a letter warning of a change within 100 feet. Notification of

property owners within the 100-foot radius is required by law.

Many people, confused over learning of a change within 100 feet of their property, kept calling until they got through to village staff assigned to answering the zoning questions. Most learned their own property would remain unchanged, as would neighboring property.

Eggleston said four telephones were installed in council chambers so village staff could answer the calls while looking at the large, brightly colored zoning map. He said all the people he talked to were very positive about the zoning ordinance.

"Since we were making such massive changes, we decided to notify everybody," said Eggleston, who determined all property owners should be sent a letter.

"We'd rather over-notify than under-notify," said P&Z staffer Kathy Tetreault. She said the

protest form included with the letters is intended for favorable comments as well as complaints.

Tetreault, who has spent the last several months working on the proposed map, said she's flagging the map in areas where protests have been filed. As of early Wednesday 32 property owners had submitted protests.

P&Z director Cleatus Richards said the Planning and Zoning Commission will meet Monday and work out the process to be followed before, during and after the upcoming public hearing. Richards said the commission will probably group protests by subdivision to identify areas of objections.

Division head Becky Durham, building inspector Jimmy Neeley, Richards, Eggleston, Tetreault and village manager Frank Potter have been answering telephone calls and

Mitchell's status debated in commission vs. Siddens, Samuels—judge to decide

It was a long day in court. There were eight hours of testimony, from 10 witnesses, questioned by four lawyers, concerning four motions.

At the conclusion of Monday's hearing, it was announced that a decision from Judge Robert M. Doughty will be forthcoming.

The motions were filed in district court by attorneys for Sheriff Don Samuels and Clerk Fran Siddens against the board of county commissioners, county manager Suzanne Cox, and county attorney Gary C. Mitchell.

The motions were brought about after writs of mandamus were filed by the county commission against the sheriff and the clerk, stating that, in the opinion of the commission, these individuals were not complying with certain duties and procedures in their jobs.

The writs were to have been heard on March 14; however, attorneys Dan Bryant, representing Siddens, and Risk Management's Kathleen Lebeck, and Michael Gross of Lanphere, McBride & Gross of Albuquerque, representing Samuels, filed motions for their clients seeking to have their clients' legal bills paid for by the county,

and disqualifying Mitchell as attorney for the commission because of conflict of interest.

All four motions were discussed at the same time, so that witnesses only had to be called to testify once on all issues.

Mitchell testified first, and, because he was representing himself, had to cross-examine himself. Judge Doughty injected a bit of humor when he said to Mitchell: "Do you plan to examine yourself as a client? Well, give him heck."

Mitchell stated that he was the attorney for the commissioners of Lincoln County. "I do not perceive a client/attorney relationship with Don Samuels and Fran Siddens," said Mitchell.

Bryant asked how Mitchell views his function. "To advise the county commission as to the law," he said.

Bryant admitted several letters and documents as exhibits, including correspondence written on county letterhead and on Mitchell's letterhead. "According to your contract, it says that you will provide legal representation for the Lincoln County Commissioners, and represent all county departments," said Bryant.

"It doesn't say anything about elected officials," said Mitchell.

This comment provoked laughter

from some members in the audience, causing Doughty to state, "I can close this meeting if the audience chooses to comment." There was silence from the 75 members in the audience following the announcement.

According to Mitchell, the term "county attorney" is a misnomer. "There is such thing as a county attorney in Lincoln County," he said. "We call it that, it's always been called that, but by law the attorney, who is contracted through the board of commissioners, serves only the commission's interests."

Gross showed Mitchell a copy of exhibit #5, a letter on county stationery with his signature above the words "county attorney."

Gross asked if Mitchell was denying that he ever gave advice to other county officials. "No. I'm not denying that," Mitchell stated. Gross then read a statement from The Ruidoso News dated March 7, 1988 in which Mitchell was quoted as saying: "Samuels wouldn't be in all this trouble if he followed my advice, the advice of the commission and the advice of the auditor."

"I did advise the sheriff, but not in a client/attorney relationship," said Mitchell. "The board of commissioners needed to correct the

Group wants village events center

Ruidoso needs an events center—now.

Such was the consensus of a group gathered Monday morning at Ruidoso Village Hall. Village staff, elected officials and representatives of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce and the Ruidoso Lodgers Association (RLA) talked of how they can accomplish the mutual goal of acquiring a municipal multi-purpose events center. By the end of the informal session, all agreed the village should leave advertising and promotion funds intact, spending \$92,000 a year available through the ordinance calling on the village to match lodgers' tax collections annually.

The group decided to ask the Ruidoso Village Council to apply the close to \$700,000 available in that fund over the next 15 years to obtaining a facility. They'll also ask the council to request proposals for a new or empty building.

Village manager Frank Potter, authorized by the council to do preliminary studies, asked chamber representative Charlie Smith to chair a committee to draft specifications for a center. Smith will be joined on his committee by an architect, village engineer Mike Davalos, building inspector Jimmy Neeley, RLA representative Ron Andrews and representatives from the Ruidoso Little Theatre, the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County and the MainStreet Project.

Smith voiced concern that the group charged with establishing specifications be the one the council will listen to. After agreeing to head the committee, he said they will establish a non-biased set of specifications, not weighted toward any building or facility. Those specifications will be intended to form requests for proposals for a new or in-place building.

Potter and accountant John Varley presented various funding options, with all but one calling for

cuts in advertising/promotion spending. People at the meeting were firm in calling on the village to keep those funds at present levels.

"It is imprudent to get a facility and cut advertising," said Smith.

Andrews suggested the figures used for projected revenues might be too low, noting he was prepared to sign a contract for one group willing to pay to use an events center.

"I think, easily, the building would bring in something in the neighborhood of \$30,000, especially if the gymnasts use it," said Andrews.

Potter stressed the importance of following state statutes on acquisition of real property, and Varley encouraged the group to remain flexible on the amount of funds for the building.

"What do you say if there's the possibility of building a building for \$600,000?" asked Village Councillor Al Junge. He presented information provided by his friend who owns

Speed Fab-Crete, a modular building company in Texas.

Information in the packet showed various costs per square foot from \$7.50 to \$40 depending on the structure's size and use. Junge said his friend can provide a fairly close quote with more information on the proposed facility.

"You're talking about dealing with one company," said Potter. "It is totally illegal for the Village of Ruidoso to negotiate with any individual or firm ... for the acquisition of real property. We can't even talk about it," he added.

As planners talked of how to get the project going quickly, Junge noted, "Speed isn't of primary importance." Andrews disagreed, saying he has been working on getting a facility since last September, and some people far longer than that.

The committee formed Monday is expected to report to the Village Council on Tuesday, March 29, during a regular meeting.

Group lists wishes for Lincoln

A public meeting took place in Lincoln Sunday to discuss the future of the community.

The meeting was called by Ralph Dunlap, president of Lincoln Pageants and Festivals, Inc. Dunlap said the state indicated to him in a previous meeting that funding for various projects and needs could be more easily attained if needs were identified and prioritized.

The meeting was attended by around 25 people, and all contributed to a list of around 40 issues and items they thought were most important.

Dunlap defined an "A" priority as being things people would like to have accomplished during the next year or two. Given "A" priority are these: new sidewalks; viable court-house; a family type bar and recreation center (referred to as the "Lincoln Social Club"); increase in tourism; weed control; use of vacant

buildings; an archaeological dig; clean up junk.

Also on the "A" list were: enforce and/or lower speed limit through town; increased cooperation between village entities; pedestrian crossings; volunteer guides for bus tours; clean up roadways; historical preservation and enforcement; drinking fountains for the public, as well as public restrooms; improvement of the pageant grounds; a local law enforcement officer; an emergency vehicle; and that Lincoln remain a 'living town.'

The "B" list meant that these issues could be resolved within the next five years or so. On the "B" list were: power lines buried; tourist facilities; grocery store and filling station; other uses for pageant grounds; an apple fest; match horse racing; hiking and horse trails; a visitor's contact station; a true bypass for traffic; restoration of the Aragon store; and museums open all year.

working with members of the public who visited Village Hall to question the proposed zoning map. All agreed that residents with questions should come in person to view the map and get copies of the many hand-outs they have available.

In spite of the hundreds of telephone inquiries, all the village personnel involved contend it was best to send letters to all property owners.

"In the majority of the cases, people are quite happy with the restructuring," said Richards.

"In my opinion, we're getting what we wanted—we wanted public input and that's what we're getting," said Eggleston.

Some people who received letters were anxious over the proposed change, noting the letter didn't give any specifics.

"For all I knew, they were going to put a garbage dump next door," said an El Paso, Texas, woman. People unable to get through to Village Hall because of the constantly busy telephone lines called the Police Department, other village departments and the telephone company. Some even called The Ruidoso News.

"This is the biggest boondoggle the village has ever pulled," said Gene Turner of Sweetwater, Texas, who called The News when he was frustrated in attempts to reach the village.

Turner said his letter told of a proposed change, but didn't tell

where or what the change would be. Enclosed with the letter was a protest form.

"I love it," laughed Turner. "They enclosed a protest form, but what am I protesting?"

One man who was at Village Hall to check out the map and get copies of information over the zoning, said he, too, was hearing from out-of-town property owners.

"I've had calls from all over the country," he said. "That letter they sent out just confused everybody," he added.

When asked about the level of frustration and anxiety over the letters received by every property owner, village staff said they were able to answer questions and make most callers happy.

"I haven't talked to anybody that's had any anxiety," said Potter. "I think they went overboard on the notification, but I'd rather be over than under," he added.

"By notifying so many people the village was able to increase the awareness of the zoning process," said Neeley, noting that in the village some property outside legal limits is visible to property to be changed. He encourages citizens to go by and see the map and read the new ordinance.

Potter praised village staff for the professional and efficient manner in which they're handling the huge volume of work.

The public hearing over the proposed zoning ordinance and map is set for Monday, March 28.

Judge favors county in airport road dispute

Judge Robert M. Doughty ruled in Lincoln County's favor Tuesday in the matter of New Mexico Neilson's, Inc. protest over the re-bidding of the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport access road.

This is the second time Neilson's has lost in its attempts to secure

the road contracts from Twin Mountain Rock Company.

Doughty's decision grants the respondent, Lincoln County, a motion to dismiss Neilson's petition for lack of jurisdiction.

Attorneys for the county and for Neilson's will submit orders to Doughty's court within the next five days.

"We will call the commissioners and the engineers immediately to set up an emergency meeting on Friday to determine if construction can be allowed to begin on that road," said county attorney Gary Mitchell. The meeting will be held at 9 a.m. Friday, March 18, at the courthouse in Carrizozo.

"Obviously, the order of the

court is not final until it's signed. I will prepare an order for the commissioners to sign on Friday, and hopefully, construction can begin," Mitchell said.

Neilson's can appeal the bid award again through an appellate court. Their attorney is Frank Salazar of the firm Sutin Thayer and Browne of Albuquerque.

Stewart taught his martial arts class how to use a choke-hold to stun, but not kill, an enemy.

School Board President Jimmy McTeigue stated on Thursday that Stewart "just resigned."

"I don't think I want to comment about anything you've heard," he said. "It's a personnel matter and I think I'd rather have it stay confidential."

Board member Ken Pendergrass commented, "Well, he (Stewart) just felt as if it would be best, for his own reasons and for ours, to resign. I can't go into all the reasons but some of the parents and

students have some concerns with, I suppose you would say, his technique of teaching. Rumors are just that, you hear all kinds of things, some true and some not true. Some parents had doubts about his teaching techniques, but his resignation was voluntary."

When contacted at his Roswell home, Stewart said, "The school and I just had a difference of opinion, so I decided to resign on Wednesday." When asked about the allegations about guns, martial arts, suggestive letters, and sexually explicit classroom discussions, Stewart replied, "No comment."

According to the Times story, Stewart denied writing suggestive

letters. But he said he recently handed one student a letter at the request of another student who apparently wrote it. Stewart said he did not read the letter.

Stewart acknowledged, in the Times, lending guns to two boy students who wanted them for hunting.

A Hondo resident who attended the meeting, but did not want his name used, told The Ruidoso News that it was his understanding Stewart had hypnotized some of his students. "I heard that he had one student running around, clucking like a chicken," the resident said. "But the letters seemed to be the main reason he resigned."

According to the Times story, at least two other girls besides Katina Chavez received typed letters of a suggestive nature.

The Times quoted Key as having said that the allegations against Stewart seem to be related to the investigation into the murder of Chavez.

"It's a new development and it seems to be very, very relevant to the Chavez case," Key was quoted.

Matt Surratt, a 16-year-old San Patricio resident, is being held in the juvenile section of the Otero County Jail and has been charged with Chavez's murder. Surratt has not confessed. He did not attend Stewart's martial arts classes.

Hot-line offers an option to victims of domestic violence

When Mary's husband had too much to drink he sometimes hit her. Not always ... but sometimes ... and the times were getting closer together.

Mary wasn't sure what to do ... she didn't know where to turn, and she didn't have anyone to talk to.

That was before Ruidoso Family Crisis Center opened its hot-line.

These days victims of domestic violence do have somewhere to turn ... they have someone who will listen and help them consider their options. The hot-line, answered by the Ruidoso Police Department at

257-7365, is staffed seven days a week, 24 hours a day, with trained volunteers.

These advocates don't claim to have all the answers, but they're good listeners. They also have received extensive training that includes information on services available to victims of domestic abuse. Their training includes information on medical, legal, religious and psychological issues of the epidemic problem of domestic violence.

One night the police were called by neighbors to Mary's house. The neighbors just couldn't take it anymore—the awful sound of slaps and punches, punctuated by Mary's

muffled cries and the louder crying of her young child.

The police, finding evidence of abuse and having cause to believe it was caused by Mary's husband, Bill, hauled him off to jail. Mary knew she'd have to bail him out in the morning so he could go to work. What else could she do?

Before the officer left he handed Mary a "Plan Ahead Card" from the Ruidoso Family Crisis Center. The card had the hot-line number (257-7365) on it, and listed some things to think about in case Bill ever started punching her again.

Weeks later, when Mary called the crisis line, she said it made her feel a little better having that card

tucked away in her wallet. She was glad to know there was someone out there she could talk to when she was scared.

Mary was glad to see the crisis center advocate who met her at the hospital when she was battered badly enough to require medical attention. She said it was nice to have someone hold the baby and listen to her talk about what was going on at home.

When Mary joined the women's support group offered through Family Crisis Center she began to feel a little better about herself. After spending some time in shelter provided by the crisis center, she's back home now. Some things have

changed, but some things haven't.

Bill still drinks too much, and he hasn't learned any new ways of dealing with his anger. But Mary knows she has someplace to turn now—and she knows the number by heart ... 257-7365.

Mary isn't a real person; she's a composite of some of the people who have turned to the Family Crisis Center for help or information.

Working with just a handful of volunteers, the crisis center is available to serve anyone in the county. More volunteers are needed.

Family Crisis Center is looking

for people interested in learning more about domestic violence to participate in the upcoming six-week training course. By the end of the six weeks, members of the class will be trained in advocacy skills and ready to serve as a crisis center volunteer.

Graduates sign up to be "on call" about once a week, for 12 to 24 hours. While on-call, advocates carry a "beeper" to be available in case a call comes into the police station for a crisis center advocate.

The Plant Corner

Tips for Better Container Gardening:

Clean out the fireplace and save the ashes for your spring planting. The ashes are very valuable. But, be careful to store them in a metal can with a tight fitting lid for a couple of weeks before spreading them on or near the plants. Many people learn, tragically, every season, just how long those hot coals can remain alive.

The ashes may be used as a light dusting on tomatoes, peppers, etc., to keep off flea beetles. Also use a ring of ashes around plants to repel slugs and snails both for indoor and outdoor gardening.

Wood ash contains nutrients, too. Unleached ashes have 2% phosphorus, 4% to 10% potash and zero nitrogen. The lime in the ashes is in the oxide form but is converted to the hydroxide and carbonate forms when exposed to weather.

When used in gardening, ashes may contain 20% to 50% lime. Ash of hardwoods, such as maple and oak, contain a third more calcium than ash of softwoods.

It takes about 4,000 pounds of wood ash to equal a ton of calcium

carbonate (lime, which you buy). Ashes unlock all the nutrients in the soil and make them available to the plants. Don't use ashes around acid-loving plants such as gardenias, rhododendrons, azaleas, etc.

Dr. Al Page, soil scientist of University of California, warns us not to use sludge or sludge based fertilizers on or near vegetables or other edibles. The organic fertilizer made from sewage sludge may be adding an unsafe amount of cadmium to our diets, thus increasing the likelihood of us developing heart and kidney disease. So use the sludge-based fertilizer only on grass and shade trees away from all edibles.

Use distilled water for misting plants. Our Ruidoso water is hard and contains harsh chemicals that will spot the leaves of plants.

Plant in plastic pots. Later, put the established plant inside a more decorative pot or basket. Hard water and the salt eat away at our lovely clay pots, causing them to turn white and disintegrate much too quickly. By placing the planted plastic inside the clay pot, the clay

pot will last much longer, and this also makes repotting a lot easier.

Planting in plastic pots makes disease and insects a lot easier to control. Just remove and isolate the plastic pot, treat or throw away and replace a healthy plant in a clay pot.

It's best to prepare all plastic containers with a light weight mixture. I use 1/3 plastic packing peanuts in the bottom of the pot, and add a good potting soil mix not more than two inches below the top.

When the plant is added, pack firmly, leaving plenty of space on top, to water without spillovers. The soil really doesn't matter as the plant soon depends on the fertilizers you feed it. The plant soon depletes the nutrients of any soil you might use for original planting, so make it easy on your back and keep it lightweight.

The Silver Lining

SAINT PATRICK'S DAY WELCOMES SPRING

This is being sent to you on March fifteen, and just after high noon you can feel the approach of spring in the warm air and hear its airy footsteps on the signing west wind. The perfume of newly opened apricot blooms reaches you while you listen to the buzzing, humming, and zooming of the bees working among the blooms.

The temperature is sixty-six -- a quick change from the last several days. The coldest night of the winter was in the early morning of thirteenth -- eight above zero.

New green is appearing suddenly before your eyes, on the ground and on the trees. Even the afterglow of the sunset on the fourteenth had a green glow among the gold.

So here we are today on Saint Patrick's Day itself, three days before the first day of spring. The world's heart is light today, for the music, laughter and song of green Ireland has spread throughout the world.

Today, the day of Ireland's patron Saint is celebrated all over the world, and in the United States more widely than anywhere except The Emerald Isle itself.

The New York parade today will be the world's largest with the possible exception of the one in Dublin.

IRELAND AND AMERICA

In the mid 1840's Ireland was stricken with a failure of the potato crop. And the Irish, always content to live in their land of the shamrock and the rose, faced mass starvation. They came to this country in the hundreds of thousands in the 1840's, the most grateful people in history to arrive in a new home.

HAPPY BIRTHDAY TO BROTHER MILLER

Elger E. Miller, affectionately known in Lincoln County for almost eighty-five years as "Brother" was born March nineteen, 1903, in Tularosa to Fountain Miller and the former Alice Burditt.

At the age of three weeks he was taken to where the Elk's Lodge now stands where his mother took over the Ruidoso Post Office and General Store. Indians came from nearby Mescalero to trade baskets and other handmade articles for groceries. And Navajos came in wagons from their reservation to trade hand woven woolen blankets and baskets and other articles for coffee, sugar, flour, and other provisions.

Brother's father, Fountain, worked for pioneer cattleman, Lord Cree of Scotland, beginning at the age of fifteen, and was foreman most of that time. Brother remembers that the Cree Ranch ran cattle from Tularosa to Roswell, numbering about twenty-five thousand head.

Lord Cree brought a load of Angus bulls from Scotland to Lincoln County; and it was he who named the little settlement of Angus just over the hill from Ruidoso.

MOST OF THIS CENTURY

Brother is hale and hearty today, and little changed from the way I knew him in the early 1920's. His million-dollar smile is bright as ever and his jolly laugh rings out friendly as ever. He has been with us most of this century and the way he is going will live well into the twenty-first century.

In 1926 he was married in Roswell to the former Maide Wilson. They have a daughter, Mrs. Joetyne Wright; a granddaughter, Carol Lynn Wright; and three great-grandsons: Shane, Corey, and Rees Garner.

For fifteen years Brother and Maide ran the Hollywood post office, right there beside where the C. and L. Lumber now stands. The two Douglas fir trees, which were saplings in those days, are there -- living landmarks, with the wind in their branches aloft, humming songs of memory of those days.

Brother was mayor of Ruidoso Downs for two terms, and cattle inspector for forty years.

We congratulate Brother on reaching this milestone along the highway of life, and we wish him many happy returns of the day and all God's blessings.

Jack Atkins of Atkins Engineering reported on Phase 1A and 1B of the water well project, and said that everything is on schedule. Phase 1B will be ready in four to six weeks. Atkins asked for approval to ask for bids on Phase 2, which is the new filter plant. The trustees approved the bid-letting.

Mayor Coker proclaimed March to be Mental Retardation Month.

Paul Crown of Lincoln Cablevision introduced Bob Sanders as the new Cablevision service technician for Capitan.

Susan Ludwick, a resident of

Capitan, asked that the village replace a water meter that had been pulled earlier. Trustees denied her request.

Attorney Dutton introduced Mike Runnels as associate attorney, asking consent of the trustees, which they granted.

Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County member Dorothy D. Smith reported that information is currently being gathered to print and distribute.

Planning and Zoning committee chair Jimmy Wright reported that a goals and objectives meeting is being planned with Easterling and Associates, the firm charged with designing a village plan for Capitan. The date has not yet been set.

An executive session was held to discuss pending litigation.

Dock Keel asked the council to give consideration on higher pressure with the new water system. Trustees asked Dutton to research the question and find out if an ordinance is needed to boost the pressure.

The board accepted the resignation of Mark Daugherty, the vocational agriculture teacher, effective June 30.

A donation was accepted of 24 Capitan High School annuals, from Barbara Beckley, in memory of her mother, Maurildia Perry. Perry was once typing teacher at the high school. The annuals are from years 1957 to 1981, and will be added to the library.

It was decided that driver's edu-

cation would be taken out of the classroom and offered during the summer months, beginning this summer. The project cost will be \$75 per student, with the student contributing \$35, and the district paying the remainder.

The calendar that was passed shows the first day of school for teachers will be August 22, and the first day for students will be August 23. The last day of school will be May 26, 1989.

It was decided that part-time school employee W.M. Raby will help with the track program, beginning immediately.

The next regular meeting of the school board will be Thursday, April 14, beginning at 7 p.m.



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



budgetary procedure, and I spoke under the commissioners' directives. This is altogether a different situation than a client/attorney relationship."

Gross stated a section from the Code of Professional Responsibility stating that attorneys: "... shall not give advice to persons not represented by a lawyer if interests may conflict."

Questions were asked to Mitchell concerning client confidentiality, whether he represented himself to the sheriff as the county attorney, and why he stated publicly, in a Ruidoso News story, that Samuels was being sued as an individual and not as sheriff.

"We are saying that Don Samuels did or did not do certain acts," explained Mitchell. "Not the office of sheriff."

Gross stated that Mitchell had, in the past, represented the office of sheriff. "When Tom Sullivan was sheriff, I did represent him, but as an individual," Mitchell testified.

When examining himself, which is done through narrative, Mitchell stated again that it was his opinion that he was legally unable to represent anyone other than those by which he is directed to represent by the commission.

Mitchell said, in some cases, specifically in open meetings, he is called upon to settle immediate conflict. "Someone will say, 'Gary, what's the law here?', and I will then offer my advice at that time."

"People may perceive more

power is given to the so-called 'county attorney' than is real," he stated.

Gross asked Mitchell if an attorney should make perfectly clear to all whom he or she represents. Mitchell said, "Yes."

County Assessor Marian Schlarb testified that she sometimes seeks legal advice from the Property Tax Division in Santa Fe, and sometimes from Mitchell.

"Have you ever been told that Gary Mitchell will not represent you?" asked Bryant.

"No," Schlarb answered.

Treasurer Shirley Goodloe testified to Bryant that she sends

legal material to the county attorney if she feels she cannot handle the question herself. "My interpretation is that if the question is not controversial, I would call Gary Mitchell. If it is controversial, I'm not sure what course I would take," Goodloe said.

"Were you ever told that you cannot rely on Mitchell as your attorney?" asked Bryant.

"No," Goodloe answered.

Bryant, who had served as Samuels' attorney during personnel hearings, took the stand and said he's been county attorney in Otero County for 10 years, and was county attorney in Lincoln County from August 1978 to March 1980.

Bryant testified that he felt it was the duty of the county attorney to advise county officials on any issue with legal impact, and that, as county attorney, he does have a client/attorney relationship with all county offices. "In a dispute, I try to settle questions at that time. In the possibility of hopeless conflict, I cannot then turn and represent any of the parties involved," he said.

Bryant said Samuels has been told the county attorney would represent him in all matters, but when he found out that he was not represented in personnel matters, Samuels hired Bryant and the county agreed to pay the bill. Bryant stressed that he had been hired only for personnel hearings and that he was not Samuels' personal attorney in all legal matters.

At this hearing, Bryant represented Siddens only.

Don Samuels took the stand next. Gross asked why he ran for sheriff. "I like law enforcement, and I'm good at it. I'm also good at managing personnel," Samuels testified.

Samuels said he met Mitchell after taking office, in Mitchell's capacity as county attorney.

Gross asked Samuels if he understood the relationship between his office and that of the attorney's. "It was my understanding that any time I needed advice, I should go to Mitchell," Samuels said.

Samuels said he asked Mitchell for advice in personnel matters.

Gross asked, "Were you surprised to learn that he was not your attorney and wouldn't represent you in the writ hearings?"

"Very much so," said Samuels.

"Did Mitchell ever tell you that you had to get a private individual for counsel?"

Samuels replied, "No." He said, "Never till now did an attorney sue me after giving me advice."

Under Mitchell's examination, Samuels said that he had never consulted privately with Mitchell. He said that he thought they might have talked once in Samuels' office, but he did not recall what was discussed in that meeting, or who was present at that meeting. He also said that he had visited Mitchell's office once, but he did not recall when that was or who was present at the meeting.

Mitchell asked if any confidences were exchanged between him and

Samuels, and Samuels said that he could not recall any specifics.

Mitchell listed charges against the sheriff in the writ of mandamus one by one. Samuels said that, until he saw these items in the writ, he was not aware of any problems with use of county vehicles by sheriff's department employees, gas purchase violations or purchase order violations.

Mitchell asked: "Am I your personal attorney?"

Samuels answered, "No."

"Have I ever been your personal attorney?" Mitchell asked.

"No," Samuels answered.

Michael Gross asked Samuels in what ways Mitchell had communicated with him. Samuels replied that he was addressed in meetings, and that it seemed to him that Mitchell was responding in his official capacity, and also that he had received letters from Mitchell.

During cross-examination, Mitchell asked the sheriff if it was obvious to him that the commission was not pleased with some of the things that were going on in his office. Samuels said it was.

County manager Suzanne Cox was the next witness for the defense. She produced a complete set of billing from Gary Mitchell to the county, and attorney Bryant went over it item by item. She testified that it was her understanding that the county attorney is hired by the county commission.

"Is it your position that the attorney represents only the county commissioners?" asked Bryant.

Cox said, "Everything in my office goes to the county commission, and they did hire the attorney."

Cox testified that Mitchell has received \$57,835.52 in fiscal year 1987-88, including payment for his work for the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport Commission.

She stated that bills are not paid by the county until they are broken down into specific charges for specific duties by Mitchell's office.

Bryant said Mitchell has received \$90,662.72 since June 1986, for his tenure of attorney for the commissioners. "This is considerably less than the previous attorney received," Cox testified.

Cox said that in regards to Mitchell representing Sheriff Sullivan, he did so at the request of the commission.

When questioned about Mitchell advising the sheriff and the clerk in open meetings, she said, "County officials must understand all the procedures necessary to their positions, so as not to incur liability."

Bryant noted that, on county letterhead, the names and offices of the commissioners, clerk, assessor, treasurer, probate judge and county manager appear, but that the sheriff's name does not. He also noted that the sheriff's department has its own letterhead.

Addressing Mitchell, Bryant remarked, "Maybe when the county has new stationery printed up, they'll put your name on it, Mr.

Mitchell."

Judge Doughty intervened. "There will be no sidebar comments in this court. My response will be time in the Lincoln County jail, and don't think I will hesitate to do it."

Questioned by Mitchell, Cox said the county directed the county attorney to take appropriate action, i.e. filing the writs, against the sheriff and clerk, so that the county would avoid liability.

Cox also said the commission directed Mitchell to write letters to the sheriff concerning problems in his office. She said that, to the best of her knowledge, there have been no confidential conferences between Mitchell, Samuels or Siddens, nor has the county been billed for any.

Cox said that there have been problems since January 1987 in the sheriff's department concerning overtime, purchasing authorization, personnel, procurement and vouchers, and said she realized sometime in February 1988 that the commission could not resolve these problems.

From the stand, Siddens admitted to a disagreement between herself and Mitchell over minute taking for the commission. "As county attorney, he represents each of us in our respective offices, at least that's my understanding."

She testified that she believed Mitchell was trying to settle the dispute for all parties. "I was never advised by the commission, or by Suzanne Cox, that Gary Mitchell was not acting as my attorney."

Under Mitchell's examination, Siddens said she had given him no confidential information, and also said that she had, in an open meeting, asked the commission who would be her attorney in the matter of the writs of mandamus.

"Am I your personal attorney?" asked Mitchell.

"No," Siddens answered.

Mitchell called John Allen Hightower, commission chairman, to the stand as his first witness.

"Who decided to file the writs?" Mitchell asked.

"The county commission," replied Hightower. "The situation demanded it."

Hightower said he felt it was Mitchell's duty to advise the commissioners. "Our main job is to see that the laws are obeyed, and Mitchell advises us on the law."

The defendants' lawyers wanted to ascertain whether or not members of the commission understood the meaning of the word "confidentiality." When asked if he understood the meaning, Hightower pointed to his heart and said, "Something told to you in confidence stays here, rather than putting it out in the open."

Mitchell asked him what his relation is to the commission. "You do

what we tell you to do," Hightower said. "You're not our boss."

Under the examination of attorney Lebeck, Hightower testified that he instructed Mitchell to advise the sheriff to conform to county ordinances. "Our attorney could not defend someone who is breaking the law," he said. "We ask our attorney to instruct the county offices if they might be incurring liability."

When questioned by Mitchell, Hightower answered, "No, I never felt you represented the sheriff."

Commissioners Bill Karn and Ralph Dunlap were the last two witnesses. Mitchell asked Karn if the commission has ever authorized him to represent the sheriff.

"No," answered Karn.

Attorney Lebeck asked Karn if his interpretation of what's lawful is based on what Mitchell tells him.

"Yes," Karn said. "Since we hired him, we look on him as our attorney. We will allow him to advise other departments if the county might incur liability."

Mitchell asked Dunlap if the county should authorize payment for legal services if the subject is violating the law. Dunlap said no.

Bryant questioned Dunlap whether he felt the commission had a "stranglehold on attorney's fees."

"We're not talking stranglehold," Dunlap replied.

Each attorney made closing remarks. Bryant was first. He cited several statutes in out-of-state cases he felt were relative to the motions before the court. He said no New Mexico authority has ever dealt with a case like it. "In reference to Mrs. Siddens, her case cries out for justice," he said.

Attorney Lebeck agreed that there were no applicable New Mexican precedents, in her closing statements, and said that this case was a "case of first impression," meaning that there is nothing in state records just like it.

"I seem to attract these cases," said Judge Doughty.

Lebeck stated that, in her opinion, this was the first time a governmental entity was not providing a defense for an official.

Attorney Gross, in his closing remarks, agreed that this case is a first impression. "This is the first county commission I am aware of to say 'We will not provide a defense' to an elected county official," he said. "As far as I know, this has never been done before. In this particular county, the attorney should have disqualified himself when he perceived a conflict."

Gross also stated that the refusal to accept Mitchell's advice does not violate a client/attorney relationship. "If Mitchell did not represent all elected county officials, he should have said to those people, 'I can no longer give you advice, and you should seek private counsel,'" he said.

Mitchell, in his final statements, said it was not the court's duty to make ethical decisions.

"The court will not put itself in that position," commented Doughty.

Mitchell said he believes only the District Attorney or Attorney General has the power to represent all county officials, via state statutes. "They are the only entities in the state that can appoint counsel for elected officials, and that's their obligation," he said.

"I see no statutes authorizing payment for attorney's fees to elected officials," Mitchell said. "Office holders cannot receive funds other than those set forth by statutes, according to a decision made in New Mexico in 1958."

Doughty said that the clerk and the sheriff were two totally different cases. "What authority states that confidences must be revealed to someone trying to mediate?" he asked Mitchell, indicating that he did not feel specific confidential information had to be exchanged to constitute a client/attorney relationship.

DEAR EDITOR:
This letter is to all pet owners in Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs.

The conditions in Ruidoso Downs have become deplorable, and my experiences in the last week have been extraordinary.

I happen to be a law abiding citizen who has a fenced yard (6 ft. high) to keep my two dogs contained and they have been vaccinated and licensed, and I still cannot protect myself from the dog population running the streets and neighborhoods of the Downs. One of my females came into heat this past week and due to irresponsible pet owners and the dumping of strays, my yard has been inundated with dogs. I have had dogs jump into my back yard with my dogs, and smaller dogs have dug holes all around my fence trying to get into the yard. I have had to get up in the middle of the night and bring my dogs into the house because of the harassment these dogs cause me and my pets. I also have a young son who could possibly be in danger from being bitten from one of these strays.

Due to the fact that at this time there is no animal control officer in the Downs, police officers are handling all canine calls, so therefore the canine problem naturally is not high on their list of priorities. I called nevertheless to try and rid myself of at least part of the problem and they responded and did take one dog into the pound. I however, took another one down myself that I was able to capture, albeit too late for my female. Therefore I have had to take her to the vet to try and administer a shot to alleviate the possibility of having a litter of unwanted pups. The shot, I am told, carries side effects that may be harmful to her and at best 65% effective. So thanks to those who feel they are beyond the law and let their pets run rampant my pet and I must suffer the consequences.

In effect I am asking those irresponsible pet owners who let their dogs wander out of control to please take under consideration the rights of others that their pets may be infringing on and to please contain these animals because they are a nuisance and a possible threat to others.

To those who may think of Ruidoso Downs as a dumping ground for unwanted pets, please consider also the consequences of the threat to children when a pack of these strays run together. Packs of this nature are capable of bringing down and killing calves, so what might they do to unsuspecting children playing in their own yards? These animals revert to their instincts of survival when left on their own without anyone to tend to their needs and are very dangerous.

To those pet owners who have experienced the same problems I have had, and want to correct the situation in the Downs, don't expect the village leaders to do anything as long as no one speaks out about the situation. There are laws regarding pets, but in order for them to be effective they must be enforced. If you want something done about this situation in the Downs, please contact your elected officials and let them know that you are concerned and want something done because if you do not let your

concerns known nothing will change.


DEAR EDITOR:

Being a close friend of Sheriff and Mrs. Samuels I have at times been angry and impatient with them for not publicly responding to front page allegations brought against him. Eye On The Capitol

THE GOOD CANDIDATE

"This is your moment." Then Debi Thomas' coach sent her out on the ice. The words were untrue. And her performance showed it. What could the Calgary Olympics and New Mexico elections possibly have in common? The inner workings of competition. The meaning of success.

Recently, a bunch of eager people filled the hallway outside the Secretary of State's Office in the Capitol. They had come to be candidates in the June 7th federal and statewide primary elections.

I drank punch and ate cookies with them. I stared at the 7 blackboards for the 7 races, on which their names appeared in chalk.

Such fervent faces: I kept thinking of Debi Thomas and Katarina Witt...

Inexperienced candidates always think election night is "your moment." It's an all-or-nothing proposition for them.

In reality, election night is no such thing.

The truth is more dramatic, if less traumatic: If a candidate runs a good campaign, there's no way he can lose.

Sure, the good candidate may get fewer votes than his opponent. But in a well-run campaign, doors open fast. New people and new opportunities constantly emerge.

In fact, the advantages are so enormous, it always amazed me that more people don't run for office. But, not really. "What if I lose?" most people ask, focusing only on election night.

Katarina Witt had the advantage there. As reigning Olympic gold medalist, "her mo-

ment" had come and gone before, and was there again, on Saturday night. She simply had no reason to believe in any mystical "moment." And her performance showed it.

But her performance showed something else.

Commentator Dick Button noted Katarina "played it safe." Well, the Olympic spirit is: Do your best. She didn't.

Neither did Carl Lewis in 1984. Lewis yearned to win 4 gold medals, like his hero, Jesse Owens. Afraid of pulling a muscle and missing a later event, Lewis was satisfied with a winning long jump, and didn't try to beat the world record.

Lewis won 4 gold medals. Because of the way he did it, however, Lewis never equaled Owens.

Therein lies the essence of the good candidate. But if Katarina Witt is similar to Carl Lewis, is Debi Thomas comparable to Jesse Owens?

Maybe. Immediately after coming off the ice, Debi apologized to her coach, Alex McGowan. Then she said something remarkable: "Well, back to school."

Debi had another agenda. It was as though, until her losing performance, Debi's self-view consisted mostly of viewpoints of other people. That's O.K. - as long as they're saying favorable things.

You can see why such people are attracted to politics; also, why it ruins them. As Toney Anaya discovered, those who live by the press - the most tangible incarnation of what other people are saying - die by the press.

But Debi had something else going for her, expressed in her long-

ing for medical school. Maybe on Saturday night, out on the ice, her view of herself finally confronted the views of others. Either way she went, a loss was unavoidable.

It's necessary to accept losses, however, to avoid having to accept defeat. Why is Senator Pete Domenici New Mexico's most successful politician? One hard fact: Bruce King whipped him in 1970, for governor.

As for Katarina, I'm sure offers from Playboy and Penthouse poured in. Megabucks are there, waiting. Yet untouched by tragedy - as all good-candidates must be -

Katarina's fate may always be circumscribed. She'll always be good. It's just that she'll never be great.

Debi Thomas, on the contrary, could be on her way. At least, she's now a good candidate. Like Jesse Owens, who enraged Adolph Hitler, she may even graduate from athlete to artist.

We'll know in a month, when Debi and Katarina meet again in the World Cup competition in Budapest. Perhaps then, by not having "her moment," Debi will have her moment after all.

New Mexico political candidates might want to tune in.
