Survey: Yes on civic center

Ruidoso should acquire a convention center, and it should be in an available empty building.

That was the consensus of the 55 people who responded to a survey published in The News.

Of the 55 surveys returned to The News, 40 answered "yes" to the question: "Should the Village of Ruidoso acquire a multi-purpose center?" Eight people answered "no," and three answered "possibly."

Only seven people want the village to build a new building, with that question drawing a "no" from 34 and "maybe" from six.

"Should the village acquire an available empty building?" was answered in the affirmative by 30, the negative by 11, with six people answering "maybe."

The News offered four choices: the Gibson's building, True Value Hardware, New Mexico Glass and the old airport terminal. Gibson's was top choice of 19, second choice for four, third choice of six and fourth choice of two.

True Value Hardware got 13 top place ratings, with nine seconds, three third-choice votes and two fourth.

New Mexico Glass was favored by one, second choice of six, third choice of seven and fourth choice of four.

While just seven respondents rated the old airport terminal as their first choice, others mentioned the terminal, hangars and surrounding land as a good place for a center. Five people listed the airport terminal as their second choice, two ranked it third and eight, fourth.

Other buildings suggested by people surveyed include the old Moncor building, King's and the old Safeway.

The fifth question on the survey,

"Should lodgers' tax funds, traditionally used for advertising and promotion, be used to finance a municipal center?" drew 17 affirmatives, nine negatives and two "maybes." Many respondents, perhaps because of the survey layout, didn't answer that question, but referred to lodgers' tax in their comments.

Many readers cautioned the village to take the time to evaluate all the options before moving ahead on any of the options.

One reader said the village should not acquire or build a center until cash in full is available to pay for it. That same person reminds citizens that a \$700,000 loan at 10 percent will cost \$1,354,008 over the 15-year payout, with an \$800,000 loan at 10 percent for 20 years costing nearly two million dollars—\$1,852,857.

"It doesn't take near as long to save the cash as to pay a loan. Don't throw taxpayers money away on interest. Be Smart!!!!" advises the person filling out that survey.

One survey suggested the lodgers, through lodgers' tax, should pay since they are the ones who will benefit.

Others said advertising must not be reduced to pay for a center, calling advertising and promotion Ruidoso's lifeblood. On the other hand, one reader said advertising dollars spent by the chamber are "little more than no good," adding, "I feel this money used to support a multi-purpose center would be of great benefit to the village."

Both opponents and proponents don't want new taxes to pay for a center:

"The community cannot support another tax at this time," answered someone calling on the village to look into using existing revenues.

"Just don't waste what little money we have," answered one reader.

"The dollars should come from

all aspects of the community—tax dollars-chamber dollars-public and private donations," answered another.

"People wanting a new building almost all want it on the old airport land, one person called that "the only logical place" for the proposed center.

"In keeping with the promise made regarding the half-cent gross receipts tax election last year, use the old airport site. The village does not need anymore land. Easy access and lots of parking exists."

"We have the land—there is not excuse for buying a stop-gap property when the airport land is crying for a development we can be proud of!"

More than one respondent called on the village to clean up the town instead of buying or building a new building. Two people mentioned the Inn of the Mountain Gods, where a convention center and lodgings already exist, with the village encouraged to work with the Inn.

One person, adamantly opposed to acquiring any center, chastised the village for lack of comprehensive planning and goal setting. That reader, as well as others, said Ruidoso needs attractions to get more tourists to town—not more empty buildings. Another said the village needs more facilities for locals, including a youth center.

More than one respondent suggested renting or leasing a facility for a time. State funding was mentioned as a future source.

A village committee is at work, considering all the options, with plans to make a presentation to the Ruidoso Village Council on Tuesday, March 29.

Meeting centers on domestic violence

Domestic violence was the major topic during a public hearing presented in Ruidoso Wednesday by the New Mexico Commission on the Status of Women.

Commission executive director Diane Wood presided over the handful of people gathered at Village Hall. Wood and liaison officer Elizabeth Martin explained the information, referral and advocacy services offered by the commission, and then showed a video featuring

the five New Mexico women inducted into the new Women's Hall of Fame last year.

Before opening the floor to public testimony, Wood said she and Martin are conducting hearings Please see

Hospital adds three physical therapists

Three new physical therapists have joined the staff of Lincoln County Medical Center.

Randy Torbett is the director of the physical therapy unit, which extends its practice to Fort Stanton, the Ruidoso Care Center, and private homes, as well as treating in- and out-patients at the Med Center.

"We do a lot of orthopedic work," said Torbett. "Ski injuries, car wrecks, back injuries, and congenital problems."

Torbett is president of the New Mexico Physical Therapy Association.

Physical therapists deal with individuals who have had strokes, as well as those with injuries. "One of the best aspects of the work is that we treat people who are getting better," said Torbett.

Quite a few folks needing medical attention come through LCMC; in the month of February, they treated 221 different people.

Michelle Schumacher and Lisa C. Vega are the other therapists. "I really like working with people," said Michelle, who joined the unit in June.

Vega, who came in October, is a Carrizozo native. "I've wanted to be

a physical therapist since I was in seventh or eighth grade," she said. "I'm glad I found work so close to home."

Torbett, who came to Ruidoso on January 1, said, "I began by wanting to be in some kind of medicine, and I like helping people to help themselves."

"We're just now filling the community's need," said Torbett. In the state of New Mexico, a physical therapist can do an evaluation without a physical's referral, but he or she does need a doctor's order to be able to treat a patient, Torbett said.

"The doctors here at the LCMC are open-minded about physical therapy, which is very encouraging," said Schumacher. "My job is very challenging."

Mary Hall is the secretary and Aide II in the physical therapy department. "I've been here for 13 years," she said. "I help with treatment and paperwork."

Torbett feels that the enlarged physical therapy department is a real asset to Ruidoso. "We help people to get well, to heal and mend properly, and to get a good start on the road to recovery," he said. "Physical therapy is an integral part of health care."

Meteorologist Bill Hostetter in Ruidoso predicts partly cloudy, windy and mild weather, with west to southwest winds from 20-40 miles per hour, occasionally gusting over 50 miles per hour. Tonight, partly cloudy and turning colder, with west to northwest winds from 20-30 miles per hour. Tuesday should be mostly sunny and considerably colder, with northwesterly winds from 20-30 miles per hour.

Precipitation possibilities for today, tonight and Tuesday are all five percent.

and accepting written comments all over the state, with a report to be published in October. The Ruidoso meeting was the third of 14 planned, with a purpose of identifying problems and successes of women's programs and forming plans to develop a legislative agenda.

"We hope the women's groups start networking," said Woods.

Ruidoso Police Sergeant Richard Swenor, Family Crisis Center (FCC) board member Ovella Estes and Jenetta Boyden, adult counselor from the Refuge in Roswell spoke of the growing problem of domestic violence.

Swenor, a member of the FCC board, said Ruidoso was averaging 20 domestic violence calls a month back in 1985 when the crisis board was formed. He said the Ruidoso Police and FCC are working well together, noting the Family Violence Protection Act is one of the greatest tools available to law enforcement.

"The one thing ... money. We're

having to really scramble for grants," said Swenor. He said the money spent on domestic violence programs benefits the community as a whole.

Estes echoed Swenor's comments over the excellent working relationship between FCC and the police, and the need for more money.

Estes said FCC delayed offering services for 18 months over the lack of liability insurance. "We had pagers ... trained volunteers ... knew of the need," said Estes, noting the center may have missed the opportunity of helping as many as 60 families during that period.

Estes said the local program, in operation since February 1987, has served 33 families. Funds have been: 36.5 percent, state; 34.2 percent, local; and 29.3 percent, a Chicago Resource Center grant.

"You're quite lucky ... in some areas police don't understand the Family Protection Act," said Woods. She said a bill to simplify the forms and educate people over the act was killed, for political reasons, in the past legislative session.

Boyden, too, spoke of how fortunate Ruidoso is in having the Police Department work so well in cases of family violence. She spoke of the lack of funding for domestic violence programs, and talked of frustrations in her area with the Family Violence Protection Act.

"The bottom line is funding," said Boyden.

Woods described how close state domestic violence programs came to getting nearly a million dollars during the past session. The bill was introduced in committee, with funds to come from increased marriage license fees. Woods said another bill was introduced that would use those fees for child abuse.

The only funding for domestic violence passed last session was \$75,000 for a satellite of the Santa Fe program in Las Vegas. She said the potential for state funds is there.

Woods encouraged crisis groups to work with legislators, adding the best bet is to try to get into the Human Services budget.

Boyden said some people don't

understand the range of problems involved with domestic violence.

"We're into so many areas ... people assume we're just into couples. We're dealing with the whole problem, including child abuse," said Boyden.

Also during the hearing, midwife Debbie Dise voiced concern over changes in midwife licensing requirements. Dise said a proposal to move midwife licensing from one department to another is under consideration.

"We're in limbo," said Dise, adding the proposed change would not be a good one.

Discussions continued over health care, health education in schools, prenatal care and daycare.

Woods said the legislature allocated \$1 million for prenatal care, noting the state is the last in the nation in the amount spent in that area.

She said \$1.2 million is available for childcare—enough to provide care for 4,200 of the 42,000 children eligible for state assistance.

New Mexico has twice the national average of families without




Family Crisis Center board member Ovella Estes makes a point during the meeting Wednesday of the New Mexico Commission on the Status of Women.

health insurance, and Woods said the new trend is to provide health clinics in schools. While concern is always voiced over sex education and birth control information, Woods said most school-based clinics spend most of their time on such ailments as sore throats, pinkeye, anorexia and other teen

health problems.

The clinic in Espanola does provide birth control information, said Woods. She said New Mexico has the seventh highest teen pregnancy rate in the nation, and Espanola, before the clinic was opened, had the highest rate in this state.

On Friday, at about noon, the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office received a call of shots being fired at the Yperrea residence in Gavilan Canyon. A lookout was put out to all area law enforcement, said Sheriff's Chief Deputy Rex Skellett. Officers were told to look for a brown CJ-5 Jeep.

The vehicle was spotted later in the day entering Innsbruck Village by Ruidoso Police Chief Bill Newman and Skellett. Newman placed two occupants in custody, one male and one female, said Skellett.

Arrested and booked for negligent use of a firearm, aggravated assault and DWI was Edward Sweeney, 32, El Paso. His female companion was released pending investigation, said Skellett.

Sweeney was released on \$8,000 bond. Confiscated in the arrest was a .44 magnum handgun.

Further investigation at the site revealed that two shots were allegedly fired by the assailant, and one shot was returned by occupants of the residence. Nobody was hit.

In other sheriff's department

news, Skellett arrested four eight-year-olds in Ruidoso Downs on Saturday, allegedly for "trashing out" two trailers. The second-graders were released to their parents' custody, pending juvenile probation officer's investigation. They are charged with criminal trespassing and criminal damage to property, and burglary, according to Skellett.

Heckman, bank sued by Lietzman for \$110,000

Fred R. Heckman Jr. and Ruidoso State Bank have been named as defendants in a suit filed in district court to recover money apparently paid after order of stop payment, according to a published report.

The action, resulting from events which took place in 1985, was filed by Carolyn Lietzman. Lietzman is trying to recover \$110,000 that was allegedly withdrawn by Heckman after the death of his business partner, Robert Lietzman, Carolyn's late husband.

According to the report, Carolyn Lietzman telephoned the bank on May 31, 1985, to inform them that Robert Lietzman had died and that she was claiming an interest in the account, advising the bank to stop payment on the account and to freeze all activity thereon.

Carolyn Lietzman alleges that after she informed the bank to stop payment, the bank contacted Heckman and advised him to withdraw the balance of the account, which at the time was approximately \$110,000.

Carolyn Lietzman filed the suit individually as personal representative for her husband's estate and as surviving spouse.

Lietzman has requested a six-person jury trial and a disqualification of District Judge Richard A. Parsons from presiding over the proceeding.

Attorney for the bank, William Lipscomb, said, through a bank representative, that the bank can make no comment, because of pending litigation.

Heckman could not be reached on Monday morning for comment.





WRITE IT AND REAP!

Writing a real estate ad that gets results—whether it be for real estate, employment, announcements, transportation, or merchandise—is easy if you follow the guidelines below.

1. Give the reader specific information. Pretend you are someone reading the classifieds. What would you like to know about the item, service or job you are advertising? Be sure to add details such as color, size, condition, brand name, age, features and benefits. Be accurate! Don't embellish your ad with misleading information. Stick to the facts and reap the rewards!
2. Include the price. Don't waste your time or a potential buyer's time. 3. Avoid abbreviations. Don't make a potential customer work too hard! Although you may be tempted to cut down on the cost of your ad by using abbreviations, surveys indicate that many people don't understand such abbreviations as EK (eat-in kitchen) or WSW (write side walk tires and won't take the time to figure them out. A confused reader is a disinterested reader. Get the most for your money and use complete words.
4. Include phone number and specify hours. Be sure to let potential customers know when and where to call. Surveys show that even if a person is very interested in your item or service, he or she will not call back after the first attempt. Stay near the phone during the hours you indicate you will be available. Don't risk missing a sale!
5. Run on consecutive days. Your ad will not get results if people don't see it! Therefore, it is important to set up a consistent and consecutive ad schedule with your telephone salesperson or outside sales representative. Run your ad for at least one week. Remember, you can cancel your ad as soon as you get the desired results!

ing willow. The dandelion are out in golden bloom, and the mountain daisy is showing crimson and white buds. After crisscrossing back during an unusually cool spring all the children of Mother Earth are stepping up their pace to be ready to celebrate glorious Easter.

All the summer birds are flying in, singing their songs of spring - the finch, mountain blue bird, western blue bird, canyon wren. Eye On The Capitol

NEW MEXICO'S LADY LEGISLATORS: PART I

"We've never met but I know you well."

So the letter began. I figured it was from the IRS, and started to pack my bags. Fortunately, I read further. My curiosity was piqued the other day when, in one of your columns, you had a long list of the full names of the representatives or senators...I noticed, low and behold, that Rep. So-and-So or Sen. So-and-So is occasionally a woman.

"Why not do a column some day on these women? Who are they? How often are they elected?...Do they lead any committees?"

"Anyway, you get the idea. I'm sure you get hundreds of letters asking you to do columns on specific subjects but I thought this might be an interesting idea."

Indeed, I do get supplications for columns, the number of which remains a trade secret. My policy always is to put such requests aside for awhile, to see if they stand the test of time.

So, after waiting half an hour, I agreed the subject of the Lady Legislators was indeed an "interesting idea." Particularly since the letter-writer was Mary Beth King: "I'm the person at the Las Vegas Optic [newspaper] who types up your column every day."

Talk about leverage. At present, there are 9 women in the State House of Representatives and 2 women in the State Senate. Last week, I managed to interview all of them.

Here are their stories. **Representative Frances Armijo.** Democrat, Bernalillo. First elected in 1986; beat incumbent Democrat Felix Nunez, 695 to 650 votes.

Member of the Education Committee and the Government and Urban Affairs Committee.

Nunez had been re-elected in 1984, by over 800 votes. There was no reason to think he was vulnerable in 1986. Why did Armijo run?

"Blind faith. My family and friends pushed me." She received no campaign endorsements and few dollars. "It's very hard as a woman...Men seem to think women don't need money."

After her election, Armijo faced another challenge: the male-dominated House leadership. Each Representative submits a preference list for committee assignments. The leadership - the Speaker and committee chairmen - makes the final selection.

Did the fact she was a woman have an impact on how they treated her? "We're an oddity to them. They don't know how to deal with us."

Approximations was Armijo's first committee choice: "You can get a lot done for your district."

She received other assignments. Armijo works at Sandia Lab. "I see what the potentials are for the state," if private industry and government labs work together. House Speaker Ray Sanchez assigned her to an interim legislative committee: Business, Economic Development and Telecommunications.

But aren't women's assignments usually made according to preconceptions of their "proper" role? "Look at [the Education Committee]," Armijo said. 5 of the 15 members are women.

"I'd ask Ray Sanchez, why there's only 1 woman on Appropriations."

Representative Pat Baca. Republican, Bernalillo. First elected in 1984; defeated incumbent Democrat John Ellefson.

Works at Sandia Lab. Member of the Appropriations Committee and Labor Committee.

Why is she the only woman on Appropriations?

"There's not that many women to begin with...They distribute them out to the big committees," Baca said.

I've written before about the Berry Fix, a funding gimmick to take money out of school districts and put it into Eunice. "Norma Hood and I broke with the [Republican] coalition" over that issue, Baca remarked. "Women can stand up for what they believe in, and won't catch as much flack as a man."

But the skies weren't completely clear. "People called me all sorts of names...I still would do it over again if I had to."

Baca will run this year for re-election to the House, but may run for "a statewide office" in 1990. She's seen too many State Legislators get stale; "I don't want to be like that."

Her advice to future Lady Legislators: "Establish yourself right away as an individual and as an equal."

Representative Barbara Casey. Democrat, Chaves/Eddy. First elected in 1984; defeated Republican Melodi Salas by 46 votes.

Teacher. Member of the House Education Committee, House Rules Committee and is Vice Chairman of the Agriculture Committee.

Casey grew up around politics. "My whole family has always been involved. It's in my blood."

What would she tell women who are thinking of running for office? "Get rid of your fear, and jump in and do it."

Given Casey's close race in 1984, the Republicans will likely target her seat for the 1988 elections. As to who the opponent will be, Casey has heard "nothing yet. But I've never gotten a free ride before."

statewide headlines. She is suing Attorney General Hal Stratton over his opinion that teachers are state employees and therefore ineligible to serve in the State Legislature. He must respond to her complaint before April 4; after that, the case will pick up steam.

Being a teacher, her assignment to the Education Committee made sense. However, I asked if committee assignments were often made according to preconceived ideas about a woman's role. "I haven't seen that with either Speaker [Sanchez or Samberson]," Casey responded. Education and Agriculture were her first choices; this year, she has both of them.

Has she encountered an anti-female bias in other corners of the political arena? "New Mexico voters are not used to the idea of having women in office," Casey said. "Women have to work harder at proving themselves. We're constantly being tested."

Things are changing, however. "The voter is starting to see women make viable candidates and good representatives."

As for legislative priorities, she considers the appeal bond legislation known as the Dena Lynn Gore bill to be her major success in the 1988 session. As for another big bill she sponsored, Casey described her HB13 to establish enterprise zones as "one of the most important pieces of legislation to help New Mexico's economic development."

The bill was vetoed by Governor Carruthers. "she described the House as a 'good place', and wants to return. "I don't have any big plans for future political office."

"Competency, accountability and accessibility: that's the important thing."

Senator Christine

Donistorpe. Republican, San Juan. First elected in 1980, by defeating Democrat Ray Sitta, Jr.

Business woman in real estate and farming. Member of the Senate Finance Committee, Senate Rules Committee and the Committees' Committee.

To win an election, "family support is the basic thing."

Then, too, "You can't be afraid." According to Donistorpe, "Women discouraged me more than the men." She feels they were "intimidated by the predominantly male environment" in the legislature.

Why wasn't she frightened, too? "I was raised with 6 men." "You miss the home environment," she says, when the Legislature is in session. The Capitol is "kind of an artificial buffer from the home people."

Unlike the House, in the Senate seniority is the key determinant of committee assignments. Donistorpe's assignments are among the very best that are possible. She got there the hard way: "I survived long enough to have seniority and respect..."

Donistorpe's future political ambitions aren't long-term. "I look forward to going back and serving on the [interim] Legislative Finance Committee."

Regarding bills introduced, Donistorpe is proudest of her role of strengthening the DWI laws. "I was one of the first ones to bring that forth, in 1981."

How to be a successful Lady Legislator: have plenty of prior experience working in groups. "It helps to have served on other committees."

"Got to go get the tractor fixed up", she told me. "Have some work I've got to do."




