Hopefuls file for county slots

Candidates for Lincoln County government elections filed their names and drew for places on the ballot Tuesday, in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo.

Candidates are, in order of ballot position:

Rick Simpson announced on Monday that he was entering the race for a commission seat from District I as a Republican. However, when he filed at the county clerk's office, he learned from his voter's registration that he is actually a Democrat, and therefore filed as such.

The primary election, which reduces the race to two candidates or less for each open position, will take place on June 7.

Three incumbents are unopposed in state legislative elections

Three incumbent state legislators representing parts of Lincoln County are unopposed in upcoming elections, with one spot up for grabs as incumbent Representative Maurice Hobson vacates his seat to challenge Senator William P.

Vandergriff. Hobson, a Republican, has served District 52 (Otero, Lincoln, Sierra counties) for nine terms, and is the second-most senior member of the state House. He filed Tuesday as the only candidate for the Republican nomination for senator from District 40, Otero County. Democrats Vandergriff, S. Thomas

Overstreet and John Mobbs all filed for their party's nomination to that office.

Democrat James J. Walsh and Republicans Paul W. Harrington and Richard Guilez will run for representative from District 52.

State Senator James Lee Martin (District 39, Lincoln, Otero and Socorro counties) is unopposed in

the Republican primary, and no Democrats filed for the seat.

State representatives Ben Hall and Richard Knowles are unopposed in their bids for re-election to the state House of Representatives. The two filed for the Republican nomination in their districts.

Hall represents District 56, Eddy, Chaves and Lincoln counties; and

Knowles represents District 57, DeBaca, Chaves and Lincoln counties.

No Democrats filed in either of those districts.

Two Democrats are seeking the district attorney post for the 12th Judicial District, with no Republican candidates for the office.

Deputy District Attorney Mike

McCormick of Ruidoso, and former assistant prosecutor Bert Atkins of Alamogordo filed Tuesday for the job. District Attorney James Weldon has announced he'll retire at the end of his term.

The 12th Judicial District encompasses Lincoln and Otero counties.

Skeen talks taxes, trade, deficit, drugs and AIDS

"I'm from the government, and I'm here to tell you the truth," quipped Congressman Joe Skeen when he spoke to the Ruidoso Noon Lions Club on Wednesday.

Skeen, a Republican from Picacho, spent the day in Ruidoso Wednesday. Besides speaking to the Lions, Skreen toured Lincoln County Medical Center, met with county Republicans, spoke to county and village officials and conducted a Town Hall meeting.

Taxes, the federal budget, drug problems and the economy were recurring topics as Skreen made his rounds.

"We have provided employment for accountants for the next two centuries with this new tax reform," said Skreen, admitting the reformed tax reporting is "traumatic" for taxpayers.

"We are struggling with the budget process once again," remarked Skreen. He said the yearly deficits have been reduced by cutting next year's budget by \$37 billion. He noted that still leaves the nation with an accumulated \$2 trillion debt.

"Let's put the blame where it really belongs," said Skreen, blam-

ing Congress for the continuing deficits. He said Congress appropriates money, and the President can't spend a "red dime" not authorized through Congress.

Skeen believes giving the President the power to veto line items, the same power given the New Mexico governor, would be a step in the right direction.

Even as the Congress is making progress in reducing federal spending, Skreen said four major new programs have been authorized and funded: catastrophic illness, the homeless, AIDS research and drug interdiction.

"The worst threat to the future well-being of this country is the drug problem," said Skreen. He said the drug interdiction program, designed to stop the flow of illegal drugs into the country, is just part of the problem since drugs are being made and processed right here.

"It still starts right here, with the person you see in the mirror each morning," said Skreen encouraging everyone to work together to combat the serious problem of drugs.

People Skreen talked with Wednesday had questions on a variety of issues.

When asked the chances of ac-

quiring federal funds to help area water right owners protect those rights from claims by the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe, Skreen answered, "slim to none."

"I'm not going to get into that equation because I represent both sides," commented Skreen.

Skeen, answering a question on a proposal to increase the minimum wage, said he opposes any increase, predicting it will hurt small business. The congressman said 13 million new jobs were created in the last eight years, all from small business. He said minimum wage was never designed "to live on," but was started as an entry level wage.

Asked about Colonel Oliver North, Skreen predicted North will "come out all right," adding "North beat Congress at its own game." He said North was simply a guy doing his job, and blamed Congress for its changing stances on aid to the Contras.

"Those folks have been down there fighting, bleeding and dying," he said.

"We're, not me, hounding Meese now," said Skreen.

Congressman Skreen said the United States should demand trade equity and gain access to foreign markets.

During his meeting with offi-

cial, Skreen turned the tables on his audience, questioning village and county officers over the area economy.

"We're flat," said village manager Frank Potter, admitting revenues are down, but explaining the village budget has been trimmed as well.

"The county is in a very good position," said county manager Suzanne Cox.

County Clerk Fran Siddens voiced concern over insurance, not just catastrophic health insurance recently addressed by federal lawmakers, but all insurance.

Skeen responded that the United States continues to turn out lawyers, who now number one for every 45 citizens. Noting his intent to inject "a little bit of whimsy," Skreen referred to a "Wall Street Journal" article suggesting the U.S. export attorneys to Japan where the ratio is one to 4,500.

Questioned on U.S. Highway 70 and airport funding, Skreen offered to do some checking and send information to village officials.

Congressman Skreen's wife, Mary Skreen, and members of his Roswell staff accompanied him on Wednesday.

Dam starts to fill up

"Grindstone Canyon Dam is a household word... it's a tourist attraction," said village manager Frank Potter early this week.

Potter said visitors and locals alike are keeping a close eye on the multi-million-dollar project that reached a milestone last week when water began to pour into the big lake.

"I can't believe it's so controversial... it's so beautiful," remarked Potter, making his second trip of the day to the dam on Tuesday morning. As predicted, a Texas family was taking a drive through, and Ruidoso Village Councillor Elmer Pirelli and John Schuller were inspecting the measuring devices that day.

"Looks like we've got a pretty good dam," remarked Schuller, and both Pirelli and Potter agreed.

The State Engineer Office notified the village on April 1 that water could be diverted into the dam, subject to six conditions, including strict measurement and accounting for water. Devices to measure water diverted, artificial water inflow and release have delayed fill operations for some months, but are now in place, paving the way for the 132-foot-high dam to be filled.

Dam engineers submitted the Engineer's Completion Report, and certified the dam as safe, and Ruidoso Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. signed and submitted the Proof of Completion of Works before the state engineer OK'd the dam.

In his letter, Fred Burns of Boyle Engineering Corporation advised "that the subject dam, to my best knowledge and belief, is safe and stable against sliding or overturning from forces caused by its intended use."

Potter said the state engineer has inspected the dam many times as work on the huge project has progressed.

After receiving authorization to begin diverting water from the Rio Ruidoso into the reservoir, the gates were opened and water began flowing at the rate of about two cubic feet per second, said Potter.

The village has the right to divert up to 1,520 acre-feet of water into the structure, and Potter said

Mesc. Tribal member dies of stab wounds

The Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) is investigating the stabbing death of Pauline Choneska Beller, 28, whose body was found Sunday on a dirt road on the Mescalero Apache Reservation.

FBI Special Agent Doug Beldon said the victim's body was discovered about 7 p.m. near the B section of reservation housing. He said she died of multiple stab wounds, noting the victim received 19 frontal stab wounds, many of which would have been fatal.

Beldon said the body of the victim was fully clothed, and there

were no signs of a sexual attack. He said the investigation is continuing, and declined to comment whether the agency has a suspect or suspects in the case.

The victim used her maiden name, Choneska, and was formerly Pauline Cortez. A member of the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe, Choneska was living in Las Cruces at the time of her death. She is survived by her husband, John Beller, of Las Cruces.

According to FBI records, Choneska was born July 22, 1959, in Mescalero.

County keeps O-Bar-O road open

Roads were much discussed at Tuesday's regular meeting of the Lincoln County Commission.

The road review committee, chaired by Bill Rawlins, with members Mack Bell and Bob Ward, presented their recommendations for six roads located within the county, and the commissioners discussed each separate case with them.

Other committee members, who reviewed some of the roads, include Leota Pfingsten, Frankie Silva, and alternate Patsy Sanchez.

According to commissioners, to "open" or "not open" a road does not mean necessarily physically opening or closing a road, but actually refers to the opening or not opening of a road on the county road inventory.

The road reviews presented are as follows:

1) A road extending west from Schlarb Road, approximately 2/10 of a mile to a dead end in front of Carrizozo Schools Bus Compound and Livestock Facility.

The committee recommended that this road be opened, because it is needed for a public highway. The county does not presently maintain this road.

Commissioners accepted the recommendation, and will now maintain that road.

2) County Road B-036, 2.5 miles. The recommendation of the committee was to close the road, because it is not needed for a public highway, and repairs would be burdensome and in excess of the benefits. The county presently does maintain this road.

Commissioners accepted the recommendation.

3) County Road D-020. The committee recommended closing of the road. Commissioners accepted the recommendation.

4) County Road D-022, 7.5 miles, running east and west between County Road D-021 and State Highway 54. The committee recommended closing the road, because it is not needed for a public highway, and needed repairs would be burdensome and in excess of benefits.

Commissioners voted to keep the road open from D-021 to Section 16, as per a request from the Bureau of Land Management, which stated that to close the road would make

access difficult to possible minerals and oil.

5) Davis Drive of Shangrila Subdivision, Unit I. The committee recommended closing the road, because it is not needed for a public highway, and repair would be burdensome and in excess of benefits. The county presently does not maintain this road.

Commissioners voted to allow a locked gate across this road as long as federal and state agencies and state lessees had keys to the gate. "We don't currently maintain this road on the county inventory, so in terms of closing it, it's like closing a non-existent road," commented county chairman John Allen Hightower.

6) There were three sections of review concerning roads that run through the O-Bar-O ranch. This road is officially known as C-024.

The first recommendation was to not open the alternative route through Indian Divide, which landowner Carolyn Leitzman had asked to be opened by the county instead of C-024, which runs nearby her ranching headquarters.

The committee said that the road is not needed for a public highway, repairs would be burdensome and in excess of benefits, and that the county presently does not maintain this road.

The second recommendation was in regard to another alternative route for C-024, through the Flying W Ranch. This recommendation was tabled by the committee because the road was so impassible that it could not be viewed.

The third recommendation was regarding a road 4.2 miles into the Forest Service land on C-024, past the O-Bar-O ranch. The committee decided that the road is of no benefit to the county, and that the county should not continue maintaining this road. It was suggested that maintenance should continue, but should be done by the Forest Service.

The commission approved taking this section of the road off the county inventory.

As far as C-024, for which improvements have already been agreed upon and signed by the commission and the Forest Service, chair Bill Rawlins of the road review committee wrote, in a letter to the commission: "We further recommend that C-024 county road

remain open and maintained by the county up to the point where it enters U.S. Forest land a short distance north of the O-Bar-O Ranch headquarters."

Commissioners voted to follow the recommendation of the committee.

In other business, the commission held a final public hearing and then voted to adopt the Lincoln Historic Preservation Ordinance No. 1988-1 for amendments to the ordinance.

There was a public hearing held for proposed amendments to the Lincoln County Lodgers' Tax ordinance, and also for proposed amendments to the Lincoln Historic Preservation Ordinance. It was agreed that these ordinances would be advertised.

A public hearing was held for proposed amendments to the Lincoln County Subdivision regulations. The regulations were then adopted by commissioners.

Commissioner Ralph Dunlap was appointed to continue his representation of the county on the Water Defense Association.

It was decided to authorize Steve Massey, of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District and rancher Sid Goodloe to make a pre-application for a grant to fund the Fort Stanton Restoration and Recreation Center, to help initiate a Ranch Heritage Center.


Lincoln County Medical Center Director Steve Keller announced the acceptance of a bid for architectural services to design the new additions and renovations of the hospital.

John C. Cornell, Inc. of Clovis was chosen as the architectural firm. They were low bidders at \$877,110.00, tax not included, which, with tax included, comes to \$934,122.15.

Keller stated that the firm would use as many Lincoln County laborers in construction as possible.

The funding for the addition and renovations come from a mil levy tax passed several years ago.

It was announced that Twin Mountain Rock, Inc., who are beginning construction on the Sierra Blanca Airport Road, are taking local applications for work at this time.

P&Z allows Carters Lane variances

"Looks like we're stuck with old garbage again," said Commissioner John White, as the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) unanimously approved property line setback variances on property at 209, 211 and 213 Carters Lane in Skyland Subdivision.

During a regular meeting Monday, owner Julian Chacon, represented by Michael Radziewicz, asked for variances to improve property he purchased two years ago. Radziewicz said the owner has removed old unsafe structures, and wants to continue to improve the property.

The commission referred to the attorney a request for vacation of right of way on the same property, asking him to draw up a license setting conditions for the property owner to continue to use the right of way.

During his staff report, planning administrator Cleatus Richards described an incident in May 1986 where P&Z acted outside its authority in allowing a variance for a non-conforming use to continue in a residential (R-1) area.

Richards said he discovered the problem when the owners of Cowan Cabins applied for a building

permit and certification on zoning. He said he was unable to issue the permit since the planned improvements wouldn't be allowed under a non-conforming use.

According to the May 22, 1986, edition of The News, P&Z conducted a public hearing on a request by Greg Masters to rezone the land, lots 57, 60 and 60A, Block BB, Flume Canyon Subdivision, from R-1 to light commercial (C-1). P&Z voted to leave an R-1 designation on the land and granted a variance to continue the non-conforming use.

Richards said the P&Z actions were improper and not allowed under the ordinance. Acting village attorney Don Dutton said the property owner could have pursued the rezoning request by taking it to the Village Council.

The owner, Elbert DuBose, said he bought the property to continue its long-time use as a cabin operation, and wants to improve the cabins by adding a lobby and hot tub. DuBose said if the construction isn't started in time to be complete by race season, he might as well not build the lobby. He said if necessary, he'll file a lawsuit.

"You can file a lawsuit, but filing a lawsuit won't get you there any quicker," said attorney Dutton, stressing the desire of the village to

work with DuBose. He recommended placing the case on the agenda for Village Council action.

Richards said the case should have been referred to council in 1986. The current problem, as described by Richards, is two-fold: conditional use does not include the current use, and non-conforming uses can't be altered.

Commissioners agreed to refer the case to the Village Council.

In other regular business Monday, the commission:

—Heard from a citizen protesting commercial zoning in Palmetto Gateway. Alfonso Diaz of El Paso, Texas, said it serves no purpose to zone the area in front of the Ruidoso Public Library as commercial. He said the village has plenty of commercial buildings.

—Learned that Richards issued a stop order on the construction of a Domino's Pizza sign because it extended over the building and was being constructed without a permit.

—Scheduled further public hearings on the proposed zoning ordinance for 2-5 p.m. April 11, and 6:30-9:30 p.m. April 13.

—Conducted a public hearing on the ordinance.

Commissioners Peggy Jordan and Lisa Wiggins were absent.

Lamaze childbirth classes start today

Prepared Lamaze Childbirth classes will be offered, in three six-week series, at 7 p.m. Thursdays, April 7 through May 12, May 26 through June 30 and July 14 through August 18.

Classes take place in the lobby area of Drs. Brown and Spence in the Sierra Professional Building, and are taught by a certified instructor.

"The purpose of this class is to provide couples and individuals with an understanding of the birth process and the ability to work positively with their labors to achieve a safe, personally satisfying child-

birth experience," explained Sally K. Canning of the Family Educational Services.

"These classes will help you to become familiar with what actually happens during prelabor pregnancy, labor, birth and recuperation. They will also help decrease fear, especially fear of the unknown, decrease tension and teach you how to control the effects of tension, and reduce the perception of pain," continued Canning in a course description.

The classes include films, individual assistance and a hospital tour, as well as teaching of the

Lamaze method, Jacobson relaxation, Dick-Read education and anatomy and physiology.

Canning is certified by the American Society of Psychoprophylaxis in Obstetrics as a maternal childhealth educator. She has been teaching in Lincoln County since 1980.

"These classes are recognized and supported by our medical community," said Canning.

The course fee is \$40, but Canning said payment is negotiable.

"I want to appeal to the younger voters," said Inez Marrs, a Democratic candidate for the office of county clerk.

Marrs devoted her time to volunteerism while raising her sons Charlie, who is a juvenile corrections officer at the Reintegration Center in Alamogordo, and Robert, a member of the U.S. Air Force stationed in Spokane, Washington.

Marrs is a certified volunteer from the national EHC with over 2,000 volunteer hours. She is a certified Family Community Leadership trainer, also through the EHC.

Marrs is a graduate of Springer High School and attended Brevard Junior College in Cocoa, Florida. She has worked as a legal secretary, news editor of the Springer Tribune and most recently as a leave replacement for the post-

filling the dam is expected to take about two years.

As water flows into the dam, with the level at the 50-foot mark on Tuesday, it fills the gallery of the dam, and the inflows in excess of Rio Ruidoso diversion, are released through pipes on the back side. A gauge is installed on that side to assure the inflows recorded at one end as entering the dam are released on that end.

The Village of Ruidoso has no

rights to the artificial water in the Grindstone Canyon.

Potter said as the dam fills, some water is expected to seep from the gallery through the walls, causing some discoloration and water marks. He said that doesn't mean the dam will leak.

The Grindstone Canyon Dam project was planned to include a treatment plant and a storage tank. Village officials have said further developments at the dam will be completed in phases.

Lawmen confiscate alleged drug trailer

Lincoln County Sheriff's deputies and New Mexico State Police narcotics agents discovered another alleged clandestine drug lab Monday in a small camp trailer owned by Elmo Silva, located in an adult trailer park on Highway 70,

according to law enforcement officials.

The trailer was seized, and inside miscellaneous chemicals and equipment were found, according to Chief Deputy Sheriff Rex Skellett. Skellett said the confiscated

materials are commonly used in the manufacturing of methamphetamines.

Silva, owner of the trailer, is being held on \$20,000 bond with no 10% for another drug bust which occurred in Ruidoso on March 31.

The Green brothers also own, with their father, Jim Green, the Artesia Daily Press, and with Keith Green, the Socorro Defensor-Chiefstain. Keith Green is not related to the other Greens.

The News-Bulletin had been owned for the past 15 months by Worrell Enterprises, a Charlottesville, Virginia, based corporation

that owns more than 40 daily and weekly newspapers nationwide.

Ken Green expressed his pleasure with returning the Belen newspaper to home ownership.

"The Green family has been in the newspaper business exclusively in New Mexico since 1948. We admired the quality of the News-Bulletin when it was owned by the Lewis family and the Waid family. Our family would hope to continue in that fine tradition."

Walt Green said, "We have always published newspapers in small cities. We insist on local news coverage and total community involvement of the newspaper and its staff. We will, on occasion, take tough, perhaps unpopular stands on local issues. But, those stands

will be from the perspective of people who have their money and lives invested in this community. Ken and I are really excited about taking part in the bright future in store for this area."

The News-Bulletin is circulated to more than 5,000 paid subscribers throughout Valencia County every Wednesday and Sunday. Potpourri, a Wednesday publication, is circulated to every household in Valencia County.

The only change in personnel at the News-Bulletin involves George Gorospe, former publisher. Gorospe will stay with the Worrell organization and will transfer to their newspaper in Las Cruces, the daily Sun-News, as general manager.

The Plant Corner

by Sally Black



This column is devoted to growing healthy indoor plants. Address questions to: Sally Black, c/o The Ruidoso News, P.O. Box 128, Ruidoso, New Mexico 88345.

Now is the best time to plant your container tomatoes. Keep inside for a few weeks. The number one variety for container home gardeners is the "Patio Tomato." It grows about 16 inches tall with a spread of about 14 inches. This plant is small but loaded with fruit. One plant will produce approximately 20 fruits.

Alongside each tomato, plant a marigold, which will repel a large

variety of insects, and also secrete substances which make the soil inhospitable to those wretched little nematodes.

Tomatoes and basil each improve the other, so plant a little basil alongside the marigolds in each barrel, and don't forget to use plenty of wood ashes as a dust and in the soil.

Temperature and humidity are vitally important. The minimum temperature at night should be 55 degrees when plants start flowering. Lower temperatures can cause the flowers to drop, thus, no fruit.

Always use fresh potting soil and materials each season as this

will reduce disease. You may use the old tomato soil and materials from the tomato barrels, just never plant tomatoes in the same place or, in our case, in the same soil two years in a row.

Feed properly with a good fertilizer made especially for tomatoes. Use a "flower set" product, as directed on the package.

Watering properly is so important. A moisture probe or a lot of experience is important too. Deep water about once a week depending on the size of planter and temperature. Full sunlight is always best. For red, clear and firm fruit, allow planter to dry down deep between waterings. Here in Ruidoso, most of our decks face the west for the mountain view, which makes an ideal location for the tomato barrels. Make a tent on a frame from clear heavy plastic to fit over the barrels, should the temperature drop below 55 degrees.

Use your old feather duster to pollinate each flower, or go from flower to flower with a small paintbrush doing the work of the bee. This is just in case you don't see any bees on your deck. Do be ever

so gentle with the flowers if you must do the pollinating.

Plant two tomato plants, one marigold and one basil in three one-gallon plastic pots, and don't forget to put in the plastic packing peanuts in the bottom of each gallon pot, as well as in the bottom of the barrel. Keep inside in a south window, where the room is heated at night. When weather permits, prepare a nice whiskey barrel. Good drainage is essential.

Drill six or eight one-inch holes in the bottom of the barrel. If possible, install casters on the bottom of the barrel for easy moving. Cover the bottom with about three or four inches of plastic packing peanuts, on top of that add about three inches of good fresh potting soil, and place the three one-gallon plastic pots with the well-established plants in the barrel and cover completely with fresh potting soil.

Pack soil firmly. Hide the small one gallon pots completely, and leave at least two inches of space at the top of the barrel for good deep watering without spillovers.


The 1600 meter medley relay team of Tillotson, Cox, McKay and

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

One Bold Draconic pulled to the front in the stretch and outran crowd favorite Shutup And Deal to tally a one length victory in Friday's feature race.

Earlier in the day, Sunland Park's Twin Trifecta wager went unclaimed for the 11th straight day and the carryover pool blossomed to \$80,690. Officials at the track are estimating a six figure total pool of \$110,000 for Saturday.

Ridden by Mike Lidberg, One Bold Draconic beat seven other three-year-olds and paid a good \$18.20, \$5.40, \$4.00. The filly is owned by Cleber and Patricia Massey of Abilene, Texas and she traveled five and one half furlongs in 1:06.1.

Lidberg entered the day's competition trailing Pedro Benitez for leading rider honors by just three

wins. Benitez put some distance between the two when he led off two straight wins, but Lidberg countered with consecutive victories of his own in the eighth and ninth races.

Each rider also piloted a 10-year-old runner to an 870 yard win in the day's happenings.

Music Maker Man, with Benitez aboard, won the sixth race at 870 yards to pay \$32.20 to win his first race as a 10-year-old. Lidberg brought in the thoroughbred dynamic to return for a 1/2 length win to set \$8.00 on the nose.

Sunland simulcast in three races from Santa Anita on Friday. In the 11th race Bold Vegas (\$61.00) was the upset winner and helped the Trifecta to return \$6,294.60.

Bold N Mystical wins Fri.

The Twin Trifecta at Sunland Park went uncashed on Saturday for the 12th straight day and the carryover has reached a near record \$98,966. Track officials estimated the total pool on Sunday to reach \$125,000, which would make it the fourth highest total in Sunland history.

Also on Saturday, Bold N Mystical entered the winner's circle for the second consecutive time by defeating five others in the feature thoroughbred race. Ridden by Carlos Rivas, Bold N Mystical went right to the lead and took a one

length victory at six and one half furlongs to pay \$9.40, \$5.60, \$3.00.

Owned by Dr. Joe Kidd of El Paso, Bold N Mystical held off the favored To Outer Limits to record a winning time of 1:19 and two fifths seconds.

In the quarter horse feature, Gene Stamm's Mandarin Queen, was the day's upset winner. Taking a narrow win at 350 yards, the three-year-old paid \$60.20 to win while beating Boogie Woogie Babe and Touchit Easy. The ninth race was timed in :17.63 seconds.

Easter is a day for believers. A horse named Wild Itch didn't have many followers going into the race, but he converted many non-believers in the Easter Sunday crowd by taking a dramatic win in the \$90,095 West Texas Derby.

Owned by Jack and Michael Williams, the three-year-old remained unbeaten this year and kept his sterling record intact. The son of Ichibon has never finished worse than third in 14 career starts and upped his lifetime earnings to \$86,721.

Ridden by Gary Sumpter, the duo went 400 yards in :19.70 to beat Fols Over by a nose. Pre-race favorite Mystic Ruler took on top in the race, but drifted in from his outside post position and was just caught at the wire by the top two.

Jack and Michael Williams went back to Phoenix with their second straight West Texas Derby trophy. Bravo Forever won the 1987 edition of the Grade II event under the Williams' colors.

Easter was very good to its namesakes at Sunland.

Easter's Discovery, with Harla Webb up, upset the field to win Sunday's fourth race while the Mike Lidberg-ridden Im-arealeasterbunny took the win in the day's sixth contest.

The win by Easter Discovery preserved the track's Twin Trifecta wager for the 13th straight day and pushed the carryover to \$119,572.

Officials are estimating a \$150,000 total pool for the wager come next race day Wednesday, April 6th.

Fastest qualifier and pre-race favorite, Mystic Ruler broke on top but drifted in from the outside post to finish third. Mystic Ruler was a nose shy of Fols Over to earn \$9,009. The top three finished less than a neck apart.

Wild Itch was ridden by Gary Sumpter and the \$45,047 first place check doubled the sorrel's career earnings to \$86,721. The altered son of Ichibon-Wild Mable now has 9 wins, two seconds, and three thirds from his 14 starts and is undefeated as a three-year-old.

Wild Itch was trained by R. Paul Hobbs and was timed in :19.70 - good for a 98 speed index.

For owners Michael and Jack

Williams of Phoenix, AZ, the victory marked their second straight win in the West Texas Derby final. Bravoh Forever won last year's edition while carrying the Williams's colors.

"He's (Wild Itch) a real calm horse - no problems in the gate and that's what helped him win today," said Michael Williams.

The Arizona bred is now going back to his home state for the upcoming Sonoita Fair Meet.

The rest of the order of finish, with money earned, was: My Queen Of Beauty, \$6,306; Native Creek Six, \$4,504; Saloon, \$3,603; Uptown Swell, \$2,702; Wine Smashed, \$1,801; Sound Rocket, \$900; Holymolytsastreaker, \$900.



A particular bonanza in the county races is the sheriff's race, featuring six candidates vying for the voters' attention.

In our democratic system, we are able to choose our leaders through our vote. But the power of the vote is lost in an election with no choice.

HOW TO BECOME A DELEGATE AT THE DEMOCRATIC NATIONAL CONVENTION

How would you like to make history?

You can. On July 18-21. In Atlanta. That's when and where the Democratic National Convention will pick its nominees for president and vice-president.

With the prospects of a brokered convention increasing every minute, the meeting could be a hot one.

And you can be there, drinking beer and busting balloons with the best of them.

The problem is, how? How do you become a delegate?

The State Democratic Headquarters gave me written material on what is required. I also talked with Ernie Baca, member of the State Central Committee and resident expert on the delegate selection process.

If, after weighing the matter carefully, you conclude the trip is worth the pain and anguish of the Atlanta Airport, here's what you must do:

Step 1. Get a statement of candidacy form from the State Democratic Party.

State law requires you to pledge one of two ways:

(1) support a presidential candidate. At the convention, you must vote for that person on the first ballot.

(2) pledge yourself to be an uncommitted delegate.

Step 2. Return the forms to the Party before 5:00 p.m., May 12, 1988.

The Party will put you on a list, along with all the other contenders. Before 5:00 p.m., May 20, the Party will mail the list the presidential candidate you swore to support.

In actuality, the list will go to the candidate's New Mexico representative.

I hope the representative likes you. He/she will go down the list and strike the names of undesirables. Ernie Baca said "striking will definitely occur this time, because the candidates want to make sure the delegates stick past the first convention ballot."

Step 3. After June 1, look in your mailbox. That's the deadline for candidates/representatives to decide. They must approve 3 times the number of New Mexico delegates. There are 28 delegates, so that's 84 people.

No news is good news. The candidates only notify you if you were struck. The lists of approved people go to the Senate Democratic Chairman.

If you were coldly rejected, you can still go to the convention as an uncommitted delegate, provided you checked the appropriate box on

the delegate filing form (see Step 1).

Step 4. On June 7, the primary election occurs.

That politician to whom you swore allegiance had better run well. Most of the delegates will be apportioned among the candidates according to their percentage of the vote.

On the primary election ballot, you'll see a place for uncommitted delegates; they, too, are part of the same apportionment.

On primary day, your aspirations to be a delegate may go up in smoke. A candidate must receive at least 15% of the vote to get any delegates. Uncommitted delegates have the same 15% threshold.

More bad news. Some of the 28 delegate slots are already taken.

Here's how that works:

1. District Level Delegates. There are 16 of them and 5 alternates. You can run for these slots, which are apportioned according to the past vote for Democratic presidential and gubernatorial candidates.

Congressional District I (Lujan): 6 delegates and 2 alternates.

Congressional District II (Skeen): 4 delegates and 1 alternate.

Congressional District III (Richardson): 6 delegates and 2 alternates.

2. 5 At-Large Delegates and 3 alternates. These positions also are open to you.

Then come the other delegates. 3. 4 Unpledged Party Leader and Elected Official Delegates. These are members of the Democratic National Committee from New Mexico: The Chairman, Vice Chairman, National Committee Man and National Committee Woman.

4. 3 Pledged Party Leader and Elected Official Delegates. Here's who is eligible: the Albuquerque Mayor, Members of Congress not previously selected, statewide elected officials, state legislators, state/county Democratic Central Committee members, and "other state, county and local elected officials."

So, if the candidate approves you, and the candidate (or uncommitted) gets at least 15% of the vote, you're in -- right?

Wrong. All you have is a ticket to the Kiva Auditorium in Albuquerque, on June 11. That's when the Democrats will hold their state convention; that's where the delegates will be chosen.

And that's another story.

* Actually, New Mexico can have 30 delegates.

U.S. Senator Jeff Bingaman and Congressman Bill Richardson can go as unpledged delegates if they are selected by the Senate and House Democratic Caucuses. Rep.

Richardson on the platform committee, and Senator Bingaman's office told me he will probably attend.

Those 2 officials, plus the 4 "Unpledged Party Leader and Elected Official" delegates, are the so-called "Super Delegates" from New Mexico. How may Super Delegates are there altogether? Good question. I keep seeing 645 in the newspaper. The Democratic National Committee told me there are 644. The New Mexico State Central Committee said there are 641, and gave me this breakdown: 362 Democratic National Committee Members, 254 U.S. Senators and Representatives, and 25 Democratic Governors. This disagreement just proves my sources were good Democrats.

Although I'm not sure how many there are, the Super Delegates may

be the deciding factor in the convention. Here's why:

Technically, it takes 2,082 delegates to win the nomination. A candidate with over 1,500, however, can easily cut deals and pick up the rest.

Dukakis and Jackson are nowhere near that number. An AP delegate survey after the Connecticut Primary showed Dukakis with 648 and Jackson with 635.

That might not be so bad -- except over 50% of the total Democratic delegate pool has already dried up. Only 1,829 delegates remain to be chosen.

The way things are shaping up, the Atlanta Convention may be without historical parallel.

Then again, if they pick the wrong guy, the convention may be parallel to history.

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
