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## Council reworks staff, considers bridge work delay

The Transportation and Aviation Division, created Tuesday by the Ruidoso Village Council, became the village's third organizational unit with its director reporting directly to the village manager.

After a two hour executive session over pending litigation and personnel, the council reconvened to create the new division and a new staff position—financial director—beginning with the next fiscal year, according to village clerk Tammie Maddox. While neither action was included on the regular agenda, the matters apparently were the subjects for the closed session following Tuesday's regular council meeting.

Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA) manager Tim Morris will head the new division, and councillors voted to advertise for a

financial director. Administrative division head Leon Eggleston formerly served in that position, but for the past several months accountant John Varley has been acting financial director for the village.

In regular business Tuesday, the council established a closing date for the old airport, entered into agreements with the Forest Service and Otero Electric Cooperative, awarded two bids and authorized village manager Frank Potter to apply for a half-million dollars in grant money.

Councillors discussed when work will begin on the Upper Canyon bridge project, with business owner Chester Stone asking that work be delayed until after Aspenfest weekend. State Highway Department funds are to be used on the bridge rebuilding, and councillors voiced concern that a delay in the project could cause the

village to lose state funds.

"Winter has not been the best of everything," said Stone, adding any delay of Upper Canyon traffic will affect the income of businesses in the area. "All I'm asking is to delay things," said Stone.

If the project must begin sooner because of state funds, Stone asked that the construction schedule be shortened to 30 days with work to begin as soon as possible.

"I'll be glad to go out there with my flashlight so they can work at night," offered Stone.

Since advertising for bids is already under way, councillors agreed to discuss the project during the next regular meeting.

Also Tuesday, councillors took action to allow Elbert DuBose, owner of Riverside Cottages, to build an enclosed hot tub and sauna at his cabin operation in the Upper Canyon. DuBose, because of an apparent mistake by a previous

Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z), has been denied a building permit to expand his business, which is located in an area zoned single-family residential (R-1).

It was learned that a request to rezone the property to commercial was denied in May 1986, with P&Z authorizing the continued use as a conditional use in the residential zone. Village attorney John Underwood notified the applicant at that time that the use was "non-conforming" rather than conditional.

When P&Z authorized the owner to make alterations and/or additions to the property, the group was acting beyond its authority, according to Underwood.

Under the proposed zoning ordinance, the cabins will be an allowed use. After discussions of options to get the project going, Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. noted any residential property owner may

build an enclosed swimming pool, and councillors approved the case so the owner can obtain a building permit.

"All I've ever wanted is a building permit," said DuBose, anxious to get his improvements constructed in time for the summer business.

In other regular business Tuesday, the council:

—Voted to close the old airport on June 15, or whenever facilities for airplane owners are ready at the regional airport, with July 1 the last possible date for closing the old airfield. The airport manager reported the Federal Aviation Administration wants the old airport closed as soon as possible. He said the terminal building and large hangar will be completed on or before May 15, the sunshades will be up by May 7, and T-hangars completed by June 15.

—Entered into a cooperative

agreement with the United States Forest Service to receive \$20,000 toward the construction of a replacement road to Eagle Creek wells.

—Contracted with Otero Electric Cooperative to supply power to Eagle Creek wells with a contract minimum of \$475 a month. In discussions over the total cost, listed in the contract as \$91,001, Councillor Al Junge reminded the group that \$61,000 already has been spent to install electrical wires in conduit.

—Awarded the bid on flow metering equipment to the sole bidder, Applied Products Co., Inc. of Corrales, bidding \$5,590. The flow meters are to be used at the Regional Waste Water plant.

—Awarded the bid on a water pump/tank combination to fit into the bed of a Fire Department

## Village still fills dam; suit to be heard in May

"Water is still flowing into the dam," said village manager Frank Potter on Wednesday.

While Potter declined to comment on a court case involving

the Grindstone Canyon Dam, he said fill operations were continuing at the huge reservoir. Potter said he hasn't talked to Rick and Jane Hall, the couple who have filed two separate actions involving the dam.

"I'd like to see the dam full," said Potter. "It's going to be beautiful when it's full," he added.

But as water continues to rise in the big lake, Rick and Jane Hall say the dam is polluting and endangering their home located off Grindstone Canyon Road. The Halls said last week their log house and surrounding ponds and property are located 400 yards from the dam, but attorney Mike Runnels said he measured the distance at a little over 800 yards.

The Halls went to District Court where Judge Sandra Grisham issued an order enjoining the village from polluting the property. She ordered the village to pay \$50 a day as long as the amount of water discharged is greater than the inflow, as recorded on the special equipment installed at the dam. Judge Grisham visited the dam on Thursday before issuing her oral order.

The Halls also have filed for

"inverse condemnation" asking the village to purchase the land where they have lived since 1979. That case is set for trial in May.

Potter said he'll work to take the shortest route in settling the cases, noting he's tired of paying attorney and legal fees. "I'll try to minimize those costs," said Potter.

Village attorney John Underwood was unwilling to comment on the pending case.

Potter said the dam and lake already are tourist attractions, with people questioning him over recreational uses when the lake is full. He said the lake will be stocked, noting the large amount of fishing that goes on at Alto Lake.

Infrastructure division director Becky Bell Durham, declining comment on the court case, said the upcoming budget proposal includes an item for stocking the lake with catfish, not only for game, but also as algae control.

The Halls, who have moved out of their home for fear of flooding and pollution, were on hand for the council meeting Tuesday. They weren't on the agenda, but their case may have been discussed in executive session.

## Police lauded for part in child restraint program

The Ruidoso and Capitan police departments are among 20 state law enforcement agencies recognized for participation in the "Protect A Life (PAL)" campaign during National Child Passenger Safety Week recently.

Governor Garrey Carruthers applauded the Ruidoso and Capitan police, as well as other state police,

sheriff's departments and local police departments, for taking part in the week-long campaign to encourage citizen compliance with the child restraint regulations.

Officers in participating agencies jotted down license plate number of vehicles in which children were riding in child restraint devices or wearing safety

belts. Those numbers were sent to Governor Carruthers who issued letters of commendation to the drivers, thanking them for properly safeguarding children while traveling on the state's roads and highways. According to a news release from Safer New Mexico Now, nearly 2,000 letters were mailed. Law enforcement agencies were given certificates thanking

them for participating in a campaign "vital to reaching the goal of safe highway travel for all New Mexicans."

The governor also presented a certificate to Mary Justice, executive director of Safer New Mexico Now, for the safety belt coalition's role in the PAL campaign.



pickup to the low bidder: Artesia Fire and Equipment Corp. at \$6,499. Thunderbird Fire and Safety Equipment bid \$7,230.

—Authorized Potter to submit pre-applications for two \$250,000 grants, one from the Economic Development Administration and the other through Community Development Block Grants Set-Aside. The \$500,000 would be earmarked for downtown revitalization of infrastructure.

—Discussed the various committees and groups working on acquiring a building to serve as a municipal/events center. It was finally agreed the task force appointed by Potter will continue to

work and at some point will report to the Economic Development Board, an official village board created by ordinance. Potter said he's still obtaining figures on buildings that could be leased or rented. He agreed to make a report at the next meeting.

—Learned that the budget process is under way. "Do all our department heads have a Ph.D.?" asked Councillor Junge noting the policies established by the administration look complicated. "I don't know how a plain old department head is going to understand what you want," said Junge, and Potter replied the policies may be difficult to read, but are not hard for him to explain.

—Approved the transfer of ownership of a dispenser's license located at Win, Place and Show, 2516 Sudderth Drive.

—Tabled a request by Eggleston for a permanent secretarial position for the planning, building inspection and engineering departments. Eggleston said the employee, currently working on a temporary basis, will be needed when the departments move to the old airport terminal. But councillors asked for further information over the proposed move, with the mayor noting no decision was made when the matter came up at a previous meeting. "It was my understanding we were to go ahead with the move," said

division director Becky Bell Durham, but the mayor disagreed. Potter said information will be provided at the next meeting.

—Authorized the attorney to negotiate a 90-day conditional use on the last council meeting. It was learned the council over-rode P&Z's denial of the conditional use, but failed to place the time limit in the motion. Underwood was authorized to schedule a rehearing if the business owner is unwilling to agree to the 90-day limit.

—Retired into executive session called to discuss pending litigation and personnel.

## MainStreet manager named as project makes progress

Ruidoso's MainStreet program is on the fast track.

MainStreet organizers recently hired Donna Edwards of Alamogordo as project manager for the downtown revitalization program.

"I'm really anxious to get started," said Edwards during a board meeting Wednesday. Just back from a project manager and board training workshop in Roswell, Edwards and the local group are gearing up for a visit from a staff member from the National Heritage Trust.

State office staff and the

national associate will be in the village on Tuesday and Wednesday, April 19-20, when they'll tour Midtown, meet with the board and the design committee and help board members establish goals and objectives.

The board will meet at 10 a.m. that Tuesday, and the design committee at 1 p.m. at the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

Village manager Frank Potter informed the MainStreet board that the village is applying for two grants totaling a half million dollars to be used for infrastructure in Midtown. He said coordination and public participation are two key elements in receiving the state and federal funds, noting the

money could be available in six months to a year.

Potter said the State Highway Department has plans to widen Sudderth Drive in 1989, so the timing is perfect for the projects to be coordinated. He said once concrete plans are made and approved, the village can also apply for state cooperative funds for parts of the downtown revitalization.

Edwards, whose office is in the Ski West Center, said she is already getting out and meeting Midtown business people, and has plans to publish a newsletter very soon. The MainStreet office will have a telephone by Friday, April 15.

## Downs trustees move on paving project

The Ruidoso Downs Trustees gave the go-ahead Monday to their bonding attorney to offer for sale \$430,000 in bonds for street paving.

The ordinance was passed unanimously at the trustees' regular meeting, allowing bond attorney Duane Brown, of Modrall, Spurling, Roehl, Harris and Sisk of Albuquerque, to offer the bonds for sale. He reported to trustees that the sale of bonds will probably be closed by May 26, and money for the paving will be available then.

Brown said he'll have a proposed ordinance ready for the trustees' consideration at their next meeting, which will adjust the municipal gross receipt tax arrangement to repay the bonds, but will not raise the tax.

During discussion of the bonds, Trustee C.L. "Bones" Wright was assured by Brown that local banks will be able to bid for the bonds.

Also during the meeting, trustees learned that the Ruidoso Downs Ladies Auxiliary will sponsor a spring clean-up campaign from April 15 to May 1. It will be the group's fourth annual campaign. Village crews will be

available to pick up large trash items. Residents may call village hall at 378-4422 to request trash pick-up. Trustee Wright offered the use of one of his trucks to the village to help out with the campaign.

In other business, the trustees: —Heard Police Chief Skip Hazel announce that Officer Will Hoggard has been sent to the Law Enforcement Academy in Santa Fe where he'll attend classes for 10 weeks.

—Heard Trustee Wilma Webb and Mayor J.C. "Jake" Harris praise the work of new animal control officer Paul Keith.

"I didn't see any loose dogs running around," Harris said.

—Heard Harris proclaim April as Child Abuse Prevention Month.

—Paid dues of \$215 to the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District.

—Heard village clerk Jean Stillman announce the April 21-22 annual meeting of the New Mexico League of Zoning Officials in Las Cruces. Stillman said the group asked that the Downs send a representative.

—Approved sending Stillman to the New Mexico League of Municipal Clerks meeting set for April 20-22 in Las Cruces.


—Agreed to send Stillman to a Cash Management Workshop set for Tuesday, May 10, in Albuquerque.

—Agreed to send village crews to clean out a private property drainage area leading to a culvert near Spring Road and the Ruidoso Downs Baptist Church, which is apparently being clogged with refuse. The blockage causes runoff to flow across the highway, it was learned, and Highway Department crews already have cleaned one side of the roadway. Signs warning passersby against illegal dumping also will be posted.

—Heard Stillman announce a budget workshop session scheduled for Tuesday.

—Conducted an executive session to discuss personnel.

—Reopened the meeting and voted to hire a utility billing clerk and a temporary water laborer and decided to consider for possible purchase two jackhammers.

the people of Lincoln County. Further, I know that I could achieve this goal with or without the well-publicized political pressures, be they there or not.



## Man hurt in trash compactor accident

Spring clean-up left an area man in a real mess Tuesday.

Officials said Arden Eckersley, of Ruidoso, fell into the municipal trash compactor about 4 p.m. Tuesday. Police and Emergency Medical Services personnel were dispatched to the scene.

Village manager Frank Potter said an accident report will be prepared, but hadn't yet reached his office.

Potter said the injured man's wife said he was pushing pine needles off the back of his pickup into the compactor when he slipped and fell into the trash collection area. Potter said the compactor

wasn't turned on when the accident happened.

Potter said Emergency Medical Services personnel had to go into the trash compactor to render aid and get the injured man into the ambulance. He said emergency personnel could hardly stand up in the compactor because it is so slippery.

Ruidoso Police were at the scene, but apparently didn't file an incident report because they thought the man was a village employee. According to one officer, they found out Wednesday the victim was not a village employee.

Eckersley was admitted to Lincoln County Medical Center and is

in stable condition.

"I feel really bad," said Potter. He said he issued a directive Wednesday morning that members of the public will no longer have access to the municipal trash compactor.

"That was the administration's recommendation when it was put into operation," recalled Potter.

"We have free pick up," he added. Potter said anyone in the village can call 257-4080 for special pick up, so there's never a need for citizens to haul trash to the compactor.

"We'll do an accident investigation on it," remarked Potter.

# Tracksters excel

The Capitan tracksters reached for the clouds and won the Cloudcroft Invitational at Tularosa High School last Saturday.

They competed against teams from Tularosa, Cloudcroft, Dexter, Carrizozo, Hatch, Weed and Lake Arthur. Nanette Boyd starred in the girls division, taking the high point individual trophy home for her outstanding performances.

Boyd finished first in the 100 meter dash with a time of 13.62, the 200 meter dash with a time of 27.74 and the 400 meter dash with a time of 1:03.69. The 200 meter was a new track record and the 400 meter was her personal best. Boyd also ran with the first-placed 1600 meter medley relay team of Lora McKay, Joy Misner and Kerry Runnels, with a winning time of 5:14.2. She took second in the long jump with a distance of 14-3 1/4.

Kim Eckland finished first in the 800 meter run at 2:45.63, her personal best. She jumped the highest in the high jump at 4-4, and ran with the third-placed 1600 meter relay team of Tyanna Trollinger, Beth Sweeney and Danna Sime, in 5:04.5.

Leslie LaRue had the first-placed throw in the discus with a toss of 95-2. She finished third in the 800 meter run in 3:00.5.

Trollinger was first in the 300 meter hurdles at 59:74 and took second with a shot put toss of 32-9 1/4, her personal best. She also ran with the 1600 meter relay team.

McKay was first in her long jump of 15-2 3/4. She finished second behind Boyd in both the 100 (14.19) and 200 meter (26.61) dashes. She took fourth in the 400 meter dash in 1:09.21.

Sweeney was second in the 800 meter run, taking her personal best with a time of 2:55.49.

Sime was second in the 1600 meter run, taking her personal best in 6:58.56. Runnels was second in the 200 meter run at 15:03.93.

The girls accumulated 103 points to win the meet.

The boy tracksters also starred Saturday, accumulating 83.33 points with many first-place wins and one state and school record time.

Chris McCarty unfettered his wings and flew his way to a meet, school and state record in the 100

meter dash. He finished in 10.99, a full second ahead of the other competitors. He also ran with the first-place 400 meter relay team of Tino Gallegos, Kerry Clements and Jerrod Martin, with a time of 43.34.

Anthony Sanchez also achieved his personal best and a new meet record with his javelin throw of 143-9. Sanchez was first in pole vault, a personal best, at 11-0.

Jerrod Martin was first in shot put, with a throw of 40-8 and first in the 800 meter relay team with Nathan Roybal, Gallegos and Clements with a time of 1:37.23.

The 1600 meter relay team of Clements, Gallegos, Heath Huey and Jim Leslie finished first in 3:48.29 and the 1600 meter medley relay team of Leslie, Roybal, Huey and Gallegos was second in 4:01.36.

Clements was second with a high jump of 5-6 and third in the 200 meter dash at 24.02.

In the 300 meter high hurdles, Huey finished second with a time of 46.27 and Dallas DeWees finished third with a time of 46.49. DeWees was seventh in pole vault with a vault of 8-1, his personal best.

Nathan Fuchs was fourth in the 110 meter high hurdles with a time of 21.47. Jon McKay was fifth in the 800 meter run, his personal best time of 2:20.14.

Randy Barone was fifth in the 800 meter run at 5:32.48, his personal best. Luke Hall was fifth in the 400 meter dash in 58.89.

The Tigers travel to Tatum Saturday and will compete for state qualifying time. Saturday, April 23, the Tigers host a state qualifying meet on their own neoprene track. The district track meet will be Saturday, April 30, also in Capitan.

## Trustees hear of Neighborhood Watch; annexation moratorium is discussed

The recent rash of vandalism and theft in the village of Capitan prompted the organization of a Neighborhood Watch, village trustees learned Monday night at their regular meeting in village hall.

Pam Imhoff and George Beaudry, chairpersons of the Capitan Neighborhood Watch, discussed the organization of the group, asking for small donations to purchase signs placed in home and business windows and for volunteer block captains.

Imhoff announced the next watch meeting set for 7 p.m. Friday, April 29, at the Capitan Senior Center.

In response to the watch program and the vandalism, Tony Fabry and Rod Brook from New Mexico Security Patrol, Inc. (NMSP), a private company, proposed a contract for their services within the village. Brook stated the service could check businesses and residences several times during the "problem hours" of midnight to 5 a.m.

"We're not here to take the job away from the police," Brook said.

Mayor Benny Coker told Brook that the village was fortunate to have a large number of police, including the sheriff's deputies and village police.

"We are not utilizing the people we have on the taxpayers' payroll," Coker added.

Audience member and village

resident Tom Sullivan questioned the cost and the power of the security service. He said the police were the only ones with arrest power.

Coker dismissed the idea of taxing each water meter to pay for a security service as being too expensive and possibly illegal. He also said the vandalism appeared to be isolated.

"I don't think we've been invaded ... to have us running scared," Coker quipped. "We need to utilize the police here," Coker concluded.

Trustee David Rouleau suggested NMSP contact absentee owners and businesses about their service and trustee Dave Strickland told NMSP to make their service rates available, such as at village hall.

Trustees discussed the annexation of a lot belonging to William H. Smith. The annexation was found unfeasible because of its distance from an actual village boundary. But the annexation revived the question of a moratorium against such, which was imposed in 1985.

The moratorium was created because of the lack of water. Since that time the village added the well and storage tank and is in the process of constructing a new tank. Trustee Rouleau reminded the trustees that water safety also was involved in the moratorium.

Capitan clerk Janet Keel said the Smiths proposed dedicating

water rights from property which adjoins the village and which the Smiths intend to purchase in exchange for annexation.

Village attorney Mike Runnels told the trustees the village has no obligation to annex any property.

Sullivan also questioned the moratorium because of an annexation proposal the village denied to him in the past.

Mayor Coker responded that all annexation proposals need to be submitted and reviewed by Planning and Zoning before consideration by the trustees.

In other village business, trustees:

-Adopted Ordinance 88-2, pertaining to the working of community service hours in lieu of fines. The ordinance updates the village municipal code to state codes. Beaudry asked if he could put in bids for community work needed in the village. Coker said Beaudry could put the requests in the judge's suggestion box in village hall.





After meeting in executive session, boardmembers Ron Adamson, Don Swalander, Stormy Edwards, Lynn Willard and Mike Morris approved rehiring all certified and non-certified personnel, with the exception of three resignations. Pam Anderson, school nurse, Andrea Sams, home economics teacher at Ruidoso Middle School and Cindy Trammel, secretary for Nob Hill Elementary School all resigned their positions.

Ovella Estes presented prints of the Statue of Liberty to the school. The prints, framed and matted, will be hung in every library and in the administration office. Estes said she wanted to give something to the school.

Also discussed was an agreement with Capitan Schools concerning the overlapping of school district boundaries. Capitan had proposed a change in the

Today the world is warm and sunny. The fruit blossom parade is beginning to march into full swing. The giant cherry trees are out in solid crystal white blossoms - here and yon through the orchard world standing as shining landmarks and tributes to the spring time.


The river trees are turning every shade of new green tinged with amber, pink and gold. Two new little calves arrived in the world - one today and one four days ago.

Other teams at the meet included Capitan, 74 points; Tularosa, 66 points; and Dexter, 27 points.



The teams will travel to Tularosa today (Thursday), April 14, for the Rosebud Relays.




Runners lunge from the starting blocks at the beginning of a race Saturday at the Ruidoso Middle School track meet at

## Duo wins \$267,208 in Twin Trifecta Saturday

One winning Twin Trifecta ticket worth \$267,208.80 was cashed by two New Mexico residents on Saturday at Sunland Park.

Michael Pacheco of Santa Fe and Jake Barela of Albuquerque signed for the ticket which was both the biggest Twin Trifecta and biggest mutual payoff in New Mexico racing history.

The Twin Trifecta had carried over for 15 straight days and the pool lured 3,499 fans to the track. The big crowd bet \$608,208 which was the third highest mutual handle in Sunland Park's 29 year history.

Prince Ego was the winner on the track as the four-year-old took command at the top of the stretch and went on to post a one and one half length win in the \$12,325 El Paso Herald Post Handicap.

The win was at 6 and 1/2 furlongs and was timed in a seasonal best of 1:16.4. What made the win even more impressive was the fact that Jockey Pedro Benitez lost his whip when it was most needed. The Fred Danley-trained runner was third at the 1/4 mile pole and Benitez urged the son of Bold Ego to the front at the head of the stretch. But, after just asking once, the whip slipped from Benitez's grip and he had to keep the runner alert with the palm of his hand for the rest of the way.

Prince Ego paid \$8.60 in winning his second consecutive race at Sunland.

The runner won Horse of the Year honors last year at this track for owners Haynsworth, Mayer, Jr. and Mote.

Curribot, the 11-year-old phenom, settled last for much of the race. Then the multiple stakes-winner gained ground quickly on the leader in the stretch, but had too much ground to make up and finished as runner-up.


Ruffetta went out and stayed with early pacesetter Farmer Brown and hung on for third place.

Highweighted at 121 pounds, Farmer Brown tried to run away from the field early. After setting an opening fraction of :21.3, the gelding faded badly in the stretch to finish seventh.

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

# The Plant Corner

by Sally Black



and fall off. The best conditions for foliage plants is to imitate the forest floor as much as possible.

Humidity and good drainage are essential. Make sure the pot's drainage hole are not clogged and do not let the plant stand in water in its saucer for over half an hour. I always have more than one drainage hole. They are easy to make with an electric drill.

If the soil has become compacted, roots may decay for lack of oxygen; repot the plant at once. Water only when necessary to keep the soil moist, never soggy wet or completely dry. You need an overhead light, either skylight or gro-light bulb.

For added humidity, place the pot on a bed of moist pebbles in a leak-proof tray. Keep the pebbles wet at all times. Make sure to place the plant pot on top of the pebbles for good drainage.

If your house is equipped with a hot-air furnace, install a humidifier in the system; otherwise, use a room-type humidifier.

I know of no foliage plant that does not receive benefits from misting the leaves. I think cleaning to be the most important and the added humidity running a close second.

Naturally, you should use only distilled water for misting. Cleaning foliage house plants should be frequent. They benefit from a good wash every two weeks or so.

I am constantly amazed and distressed at the number of things people apply to the leaves of plants in the belief it will make them healthier or more beautiful.

You have heard me say before "No commercial leaf polish, please." I have heard of plant owners applying olive oil, vegetable shortening, milk and mayonnaise to name a

few. Any one of these concoctions not only collects dust but can easily block the pores in the leaves, through which the plant breathes, and kill it.

Fortunately, most people coat only the topsides of the leaves, allowing the majority of the breathing pores, or stomata, which are located on the undersides, to keep working.

Always use a little mild soap, never detergent, and tepid water to bathe plants. For plants with hairy leaves, such as Piggyback, that trap dirt may be bathed in the bathtub filled with soap and tepid water. Just gently dunk them, give a little swish, rinse in clear tepid water—Wa-la, a plant good as new.

Plants do better when grouped. They are very social-minded and they react as if truly interested in the welfare of each other. Plus the extra benefit of furnishing

humidity, one to the other. Now don't tell me I have been living with my plants too long.

Another reason for misting and cleaning plants is to rid them of tobacco smoke. The smoke reaches all areas of the leaves and blocks the pores. Plants have difficulty breathing, the same as human lungs react to smoke. If there is a smoker in your house do have good ventilation, bathe them every couple of weeks and place them as far away from the smoking area as possible.

If you are good to your plants, keeping them clean, watered and properly fed (remember, fertilizer is not a substitute for light and water, from which foliage get most of their food and water) they in turn will give you many years of pleasure.

Thank you Ms. Keel for your letter. I only hope I have encouraged you to grow healthier plants.

It's about time that we plant lovers heard from you again. We have missed you.

Would you please tell me what foliage plants are to be misted and those that are not. I know you can't name them all in one column but I thought you could start on the more popular plant.

Dear Ms. Keel,

A good rule of thumb is, when in doubt—"mist." Most foliage house plants get much too little humidity. A common sight for the foliage plant is for the leaf edges to turn brown and eventually leaves die

## Telephone equipment damaged by vandals

Vandalism to telephone lines occurred in three different Lincoln County locations on April 5, according to Contel spokesperson John Van Tussenbroek.

Service was disrupted in Angus, Nogal, Loma Grande and Bonito for over six hours, overnight in some cases, and damage is estimated at \$5,000.

"We suspect this incident is connected with the vandalism which happened in Espanola last fall causing \$21,000 in damage," said Van Tussenbroek, who is superintendent of Customer Services.

Van Tussenbroek says that the damage was done within a span of 20 minutes, beginning around 2:30 p.m. when padlocks were cut off the doors at a cable cabinet in Angus. The alarm sounded in Bellevue, Washington's monitoring system, which alerted them that something was amiss. Ten seconds later, the cable was cut.

Damage at Bonito Canyon followed, when two bullets from a small-caliber rifle struck a cable. In Loma Grande, a cable stretched over a canyon was also shot.

The FBI and the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department are investigating the vandalism.

## Reporter's Round

In case anyone hasn't heard, a new epidemic is sweeping this nation. The AITS virus is becoming so widespread that I haven't been anywhere lately without seeing at least one victim.

AITS—that's Anti-Income Tax Syndrome—is expected to reach its peak about midnight Friday, April 15. Sufferers who show up at the Ruidoso Post Office at midnight will learn they are too late to get that federal income tax postmarked and will be airlifted to a special AITS rehabilitation and treatment center in Alaska.

Refugees from metropolitan areas sometimes forget the local postal service doesn't have personnel on duty to get those last minute tax forms postmarked right up until midnight. Last year I saw one of those folks, a newcomer from Dallas, Texas, totally freak out after screaming to a halt in front of the post office at 11:58 p.m. April 15, jump from his car, run into the foyer, drop his tax return in the slot and then, pausing for a moment with a small smile on his face, reading the sign that explains hours of operation.

"Aaaaaaaahhhhh!" screamed the Texas taxpayer, who was quickly and efficiently placed in a white straight jacket by special agents from the IRS who hang out at small-town postal facilities for that very purpose. I haven't seen the poor fellow since, and I noticed recently his house was repossessed for back taxes.

That's just one of a volume of stories I know about AITS sufferers. Most never know what's hit them. AITS hasn't hit my family as hard as most, but I wouldn't say that's just good luck. About a third of the people in my family have pursued accounting careers. Now a degree in accounting, preferably followed by a master's degree with special courses in taxes, is the very best protection against AITS.

As AITS victims hang their heads in misery, spend sleepless nights and search out all the 1040s, 859Bs and supplemental forms X, Y and Z, accountants remain calm, and maybe even a little smug.

One year I sought to avoid AITS by asking my accountant brother to do my taxes. That's when I found out that even accountants can suf-

fer from AITS if they're placed under too much stress. For my brother, Charlie, after wading through about a dozen of my shoeboxes filled with "important" papers, began to look a little peaked.

Charlie offered to finance my pursuit of an accounting degree if I would sign an affidavit promising never to ask him to do my taxes again.

AITS symptoms include sleeplessness, fatigue, extreme nervousness, cranky behavior and an unusual "hangdog" look.

In Lubbock last weekend, I diagnosed my brother-in-law as having AITS. We were having a drink on Saturday afternoon when George came in, his head bowed and his eyes sad. He drooped into a chair, sighed loudly and said, "I've been at the office working on taxes."

AITS symptoms are very contagious, so we encouraged George to head on home before we got depressed, too.

AITS II is quite different from the original AITS virus. AITS II, After Income Tax Syndrome, is characterized by euphoria and a lightheadedness that may or may not linger for some time.

I heard that Ronald and Nancy Reagan were infected with AITS II when they learned how much they had benefitted from the President's tax reform. The Reagans were euphoric over earning \$9,000 more this year and paying \$6,000 less in taxes.

AITS II victims, especially the ones expecting hefty tax refunds, should be careful around people in the throes of AITS. After all, those of us suffering over incomplete tax forms and lost receipts, don't really want to hear from friends and relatives that they've just received that tax refund check for thousands of dollars.

There's really no cure for AITS, except AITS II. And that's not a cure-all, since some of us are just as depressed AFTER filing income taxes as we are before.

So if you see somebody suffering any of the AITS symptoms this month, just be kind, offer to buy them a cup of coffee, and ask if they've filed for an extension on the April 15 deadline.

An extension may not cure AITS, but it sure gets you through the April AITS epidemic.

I am writing this letter in regards to the Lincoln County Medical Center in Ruidoso. I am a volunteer E.M.T. with the Capitan Ambulance, and on occasion do transport patients to the Lincoln County Medical Center. ## Meals program needs helping hand

concern that more eligible clients are in the community who need the MealCare services, but haven't been reached.

As for now, the board is concerned with maintaining the program at its current level. To do that, the group is enlisting sponsors to pledge support for MealCare clients.

Pledges are being solicited, with sponsors paying from 25 cents to \$2.50 a meal on behalf of clients. That amounts to no less than \$2 a month to as much as \$25 a month, with pledges to be paid monthly, quarterly or yearly.

Clients are area residents aged 60 and over, with persons younger than 60, but permanently disabled, also eligible. Referrals come from the medical community and from private citizens.

While information as to client income and expenses is confidential, MealCare board members can provide figures to help prospective sponsors decide how much to pledge. School, civic and church groups, as well as private citizens, are asked to sponsor MealCare clients.

**AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO DOWNS, NEW MEXICO GROSS RECEIPTS TAX REVENUE BONDS, SERIES MAY 1, 1988, IN THE AGGREGATE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF \$430,000 FOR THE PURPOSE OF DEFRAYING THE COST OF RECONSTRUCTING, RESURFACING, MAINTAINING, REPAIRING OR OTHERWISE IMPROVING EXISTING ALLEYS, STREETS, ROAD OR BRIDGES, OR ANY COMBINATION THEREOF, OR LAYING OFF, OPENING, CONSTRUCTING OR OTHERWISE ACQUIRING NEW ALLEYS, STREETS, ROAD OR BRIDGES, OR ANY COMBINATION THEREOF, INCLUDING, WITHOUT LIMITATION, TO THE EXTENT NECESSARY, THE ACQUISITION OF RIGHTS-OF-WAY THEREFOR AND RELATED THERETO; PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF SUCH BONDS SOLELY FROM THE STATE GROSS RECEIPTS TAX REMITTED TO THE VILLAGE BY THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO, AND FROM THE MUNICIPAL GROSS RECEIPTS TAX LEVIED BY THE VILLAGE; PROVIDING FOR THE FORM, TERMS, EXECUTION AND OTHER DETAILS CONCERNING THE BONDS, THE FUNDS APPOINTING THERETO; THE APPROVAL, EXECUTION AND DELIVERY OF A BOND PURCHASE AGREEMENT AND APPROVING AN OFFICIAL STATEMENT AND THE USE AND DISTRIBUTION THEREOF; AND RATIFYING ACTION PREVIOUSLY TAKEN IN CONNECTION THEREWITH.**

The following is a general summary of the subject matter contained in the Ordinance:

Preambles recite or include such matters as: the status of the gross receipts tax revenues; the Village's receipt of the proposed form of bond purchase agreement and official statement, which relate to the issuance and sale of the Village's Gross Receipts Tax Revenue Bonds, Series May 1, 1988 (the "Bonds"); the governing body has determined that it is in the best interests of the Village and its residents to issue Bonds secured by a first lien on the pledged gross receipts tax revenues, and the governing body has determined that it is in the best interest of the Village to enter into the bond purchase agreement with, and sell the bonds to Hanifen, Imhoff, Inc. (the "Purchasers").

Sections 1 through 4 define the terms used in the Ordinance; ratify and confirm all previous actions taken by the Village directed toward the authorization of the Bonds; authorize the issuance of the Bonds for the purpose of improving and acquiring alleys, streets, roads or bridges in the Village (the "Project"), including the acquisition and improvement of any rights-of-way therefor, payable from Bond proceeds; and set forth certain findings of the governing body which include: the need for the Project; monies available for the Project from all sources other than the issuance of revenue bonds are not sufficient to defray the cost of the Project.

Section 5 authorizes the issuance of the Bonds in the principal amount of \$430,000 to be payable and collectible from the state gross receipts tax revenues and municipal gross receipts tax revenues received by the Village; authorizes and approves the negotiated sale of the Bonds to the Purchasers; provides a maturity schedule for the Bonds, and that the Bonds shall be issued as fully registered bonds.

Sections 6 through 9 provide details with respect to the prior redemption of the Bonds; provide details with respect to the notice of redemption; for the filing of signatures and execution and authentication of the Bonds; and that the Bonds are fully negotiable. Sections 10 through 14 provide details relating to payment of the Bonds and presentation of the Bonds for payment; for the registration, transfer and exchange and ownership of the Bonds; that the Bonds constitute special limited obligations of the Village; for the form of the Bonds; and determine the period of usefulness of the Project. Sections 15 through 19 provide details relating to disposition of the

proceeds of the Bonds and completion of the Project; for creation and administration of special funds and accounts for deposit of the revenues pledged to the payment of the Bonds; provide for the deposit and flow of funds to pay the Bonds, security for the payment of the Bonds and other obligations of the Village relating thereto.

Sections 20 through 24 provide details relating to the issuance of additional bonds and refunding Bonds secured by pledged gross receipts tax revenues; and provide that all Bonds shall be equally and ratably secured.

Sections 25 through 29 provide protective covenants relating to such matters as the use of Bond proceeds, the payment of Bonds, the existence of the Village, other gross receipts tax revenue liens, the duty to impose taxes, impairment of contract, and the exemption of interest paid on the Bonds from federal income taxation; designate the Bonds as qualified tax-exempt obligations; define events of default; and provide for remedies and duties upon default.

Section 30 and 31 relate to the extent of liability for Bonds not presented when due; and delegate powers to the officers of the Village to effectuate the provisions of the Ordinance.

Sections 32 through 38 provide for amendments to the Ordinance and the defeasance of the Bonds; state that the Ordinance is irrevocable; provide for severability and repealer clauses; provide an effective date for the Ordinance; and provide a form for publication.
