Chamber says put it here

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce has taken an interest in the Farm and Ranch Heritage Program, to be established through the New Mexico State University (NMSU)-Department of Agriculture in Las Cruces.

Monday and Tuesday, the chamber hosted a meeting of the Executive Board of the organization, and interested spouses. Convention and Visitors Bureau Director Tracey Moran made a presentation to the group, in which she explained why Lincoln County's Fort Stanton area would be better for the program than the other considered sites in Las Cruces.

"Whether the Farm and Ranch Heritage Center is built in Fort Stanton or in Las Cruces, the site will be a historical gold mine. Not only will it bring substantial economic value, it will be a wealth of information for history lovers (young and old) for many years to come," Moran stated in her presentation.

The center proposes to have museums dedicated to horses, farms and ranches, to collect farm and ranch equipment and paraphernalia, and to collect records and historical documents.

MainStreet moves in

MainStreet board members' eyes light up when they talk about "streetscapes" and "facades." They like discussions of graphics, interior merchandising, public improvements and street furniture.

Members of the MainStreet board seem to have a vision for Midtown Ruidoso. And they're investing time and resources to see that dream become a reality.

Just back from a two-day workshop in Roswell, MainStreet board members have spent the last two days in meetings and workshops in the village conducted by state MainStreet staff and a representative from the National Heritage Trust in Washington, D.C.

Ursula Boatwright and Ed Boles of the state office and Kate Joncas from Washington were in the village to visit Midtown, help members of the local program set goals and objectives and provide training for the design committee.

The Village of Ruidoso was selected as one of three New Mexico communities to join the MainStreet program this year. With a Community Development Block Grant that will pay part of the new director's salary and provide three-year contracts with the state and with the National Heritage Trust, local organizers have acquired pledges of money and services from the Village of Ruidoso and a large number of village business operators.

MainStreet project manager Donna Edwards has been hired, and has an office in the Ski West Shopping Center. Ruidoso MainStreet is open for business.

The next step for the public/private partnership venture is selling MainStreet to business operators and property owners up and down the street. State and national staff had some ideas to share on that subject.

They provided board members with lots of information on resources available for use in selling and implementing the downtown rehabilitation program.

During a morning session Tuesday, the board listed some issues they've identified for consideration during the three-year Midtown revitalization project.

- Those issues include:
- Enhance pedestrian experience.
 - Improve all aspects of infrastructure.
 - Provide visual identification for downtown.
 - Clean up and inventory "street furniture."
 - Provide clean public restrooms.
 - Investigate existing state highway restrictions and continue coordinating with village and state on the ongoing highway project.
 - Improve parking; conduct surveys of existing parking and vacant land.
 - Investigate viability of a river walk.
 - Improve signs.
 - Work with Texas-New Mexico Power Company on lighting.
 - Establish revolving loan fund.
 - Improve sight distance in Midtown.
 - Improve safety downtown; check with retired groups for possible service as crosswalk guards.
 - Improve handicapped access.
 - Develop design guidelines.

- Update sign ordinance.
- Boles told the design committee they'll be the ones involved with education, advocacy, facilitation and design review as MainStreet progresses. He described the typical role for a design committee of:
 - building public awareness of opportunities and resources.
 - teaching proper renovation procedures.
 - encouraging building owners to make improvements.
 - promoting public policies and programs that encourage appropriate renovations and public improvements.
 - making it easier for owners to rehabilitate.
 - assuring that public renovation incentive funds are used appropriately.
 - assuring that public sector improvements are appropriate.
- Boles gave the board some specific techniques to use in carrying out their goal. He explained his role, and described how he works with project managers to provide design assistance.
- Boles, Boatwright and other members of a resource team will make several site visits during the life of the MainStreet project. The project manager can be reached by calling, 257-6346.

Mid school shop, home ec dropped

The Ruidoso School system will be minus two elective classes at the middle school level in the 1988-89 school year, according to Superintendent of Schools Sid Miller.

Vocational shop and home economics will be dropped from the curriculum in the coming year.

Andrea Sams, who taught home economics, resigned from her position at the April school board meeting because of her husband's job transfer to Utah.

Vocational shop teacher Leigh Carter will not be offered a job in the school system next year.

"We have just found it necessary to not have that particular program," says Miller. "Mr. Carter was recommended by the board to be rehired, but that doesn't preclude dropping a program if it's necessary."

Miller states that it was an administrative decision to drop the programs, and that it was not voted on by the board.

"As far as dropping a program, first of all, it is a determination of whether it is required by the state

department of education, or whether it is necessary by local requirements. That basically is the academically oriented situation.

"Then, if there are problems of budget, I have to make the program fit into that budgetary constraint. I have to determine where budgetary priorities lie, and then figure out how to generate more revenue or cut expenditures."

Last fall, personnel had to take a pay cut rather than cut teachers off the staff. "When you cut everywhere you can, you have to then look at personnel," says Miller. "I have to determine what is required or not required, then make decisions. Shop has been more or less assigned—it is an elective, but we're not rich enough to have several electives to choose from. So something else will have to fill the students' daily program next year."

Miller says students will be assigned to other areas of study, physical education, music, or additional study hall.

Miller says a "ballpark figure" of funds saved by dropping the programs will be around \$30,000.

Two teachers will be moved from the high school as well. Announce-

ments have not been made but there have been two resignations, one a retirement, so no other high school faculty should be let go, according to Miller.

"We don't want to drop home ec and shop at the middle school level, we really don't," said Miller. "But we have to have a realistic budget, and something has to go."

Board of Education President Stormy Edwards was contacted for comment, and declined to make a statement, as did board member Rod Adamson. However, Edwards said, concerning the administrative decision, "We give the superintendent the authority to make his own judgment concerning adding or dropping of programs."

Board member Bud Swalander said he hadn't heard before about Carter's contract being cancelled. "It's news to me," he said. However, he stated that it didn't surprise him. "We recommend hiring subject to budgetary availability," he said. "In plain language, we say, 'We'll hire you all if we've got the money.' Really, I have no comment. We have budgetary problems. We have to work with that knowledge."

Schools will finish June 6

It's the question students, teachers and parents in Ruidoso are asking: What day will school let out this year?

"I'll explain this very clearly, because it's a little complicated," said Ruidoso Schools Superintendent Sid Miller. "Normally, Thursday, June 2nd, would have been a work day for teachers. On Friday, June 3rd, students would have their last day of school, and would pick up

their report cards." This is easy so far. The wrench in the works is two snow days that still remain and need to be made up.

Miller continued to explain. "The plan now is for students to attend all day on Thursday, June 2. On Friday, June 3, students will attend school in the morning, and the afternoon will be devoted to a

teacher's work day. "The teachers have to come back on Saturday, June 4, to work. Then on Monday, June 6, the children will be picked up by the busses, taken to their schools, given their report cards, and dismissed."

Miller said that this plan was the one that works out best for everyone. "It's a little complex, but I think it'll work OK," he said.

Goodloe has been working with NMSU to get them to consider Lincoln County as an alternative site to Las Cruces for the center. He has received the support of the Lincoln County Commission and has taken representatives of the school to Fort Stanton and the surrounding area for detailed tours and discussion of the possibilities.

"The lack of commercialism at Fort Stanton and Lincoln lends itself into escape into the historical past," explained Moran.

Chamber Executive Director John Jeffers said the Fort Stanton Restoration and Recreation Committee worked with the chamber to make the presentation to the 28 visitors from NMSU.

"This is a project that can benefit both Ruidoso and Lincoln County, and it's natural for the business community to cooperate in this venture," Jeffers said.

"We felt pleased that Sid Goodloe asked us to assist in this project, because it is one of those things which can lead to still another thing for our visitors to enjoy."

Candidates announce Petty runs for county commission

Karon Z. Petty has announced her candidacy for the Republican nomination for Lincoln County Commissioner, District 3, in the upcoming June 7 primary.

In order to run for this position Karon has to live in Ruidoso, but Republicans throughout Lincoln County will have the opportunity to vote for her.

Petty was born in Carrizozo in 1949, moved to Ruidoso in 1960 and is a first generation native of Lincoln County. "My grandmother," Petty explains, "Mrs. John W. Harkey, will be 100 years old next year. She moved from White Oaks to Nogal to Carrizozo where she now lives. Our families are ranchers and business people."

After obtaining her B.S. Degree from Eastern New Mexico University, Petty lived in Santa Fe and worked for the New Mexico state government as a program coordinator and administrative liaison. She traveled throughout northern New Mexico writing and initiating federal and state grants for rural communities.

For the past 15 years Petty has

been acquiring business experience. She has been an assistant manager and public relations director for a large recreational development. In 1975, while living in Albuquerque, Petty obtained her NYSE/NASD securities license and became the youngest woman stockbroker in New Mexico. She also managed a 72-unit Albuquerque apartment complex and a Ruidoso real estate company for Jack Stahl, present lieutenant governor of New Mexico.

Today Petty owns and operates her own real estate company in Ruidoso. She states, "I believe in integrity in business and following through with the details. Knowledge, honesty and service!"

Petty is a former director of the Ruidoso Board of Realtors; former commissioner of the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission and the Lincoln County Extraterritorial Authority, and presently serving as secretary for the Alto Ladies Association. She enjoys music and sports.

"Caring about this county is definitely in my blood," says Petty, "and with my extensive and varied

experience in business and government I feel well-qualified to represent all of Lincoln County as Commissioner, District 3."

Junge wants trash compactor open

Ruidoso Village Councillor J.A. "Al" Junge said Tuesday he disagrees with the administration's decision to close the trash compactor to the public.

Village manager Frank Potter announced last week the compactor is now closed to the public. His policy decision came a day after a Ruidoso man fell into the compactor while unloading pine needles from the back of his pickup.

"They can't do it," said Junge, who served on the council that made the decision to buy the trash system. Although he wasn't on the council when the project was finally completed, Junge worked to see that the compactor project was not abandoned.

"You don't throw the baby out

with the water," said Junge. He said original plans called for an inspection regarding liability and a fee schedule to charge for use of the compactor.

Junge said the village had three options, other than closing the facility to public use. Those options include letting customers continue to unload their own loads into the hopper; drawing a line and having

customers stop at that line (back from the hopper), and having a village employee sweep the trash into the compactor; and having a village employee unload the private citizens' trucks.

Since a village employee has to be on hand to watch as individuals use the compactor, Junge said that employee could be the one to unload the load.

But Potter, in a telephone interview Wednesday, stood by his decision to close the compactor to the public. He admitted his policy decision did, in effect, overrule a previous council's action.

"They can overrule me ... they may do it," said Potter.

"I did what I thought needed to be done," he added.

Ruidoso Downs disputes clerk claims

The Village of Ruidoso Downs is embroiled in two separate disputes involving former village clerks.

Wilma Webb is continuing her court battle that began when she filed a "complaint for wrongful discharge" on May 4, 1987, while Jo Ann Jenkins is protesting a claim by the village that she was over-compensated when she resigned July 1, 1987.

Webb, now a village trustee, served as village clerk during Mayor J.C. Day's four-year term, and continued under Mayor C.L. "Bones" Wright, who was declared the winner of the 1986 election.

After a recount of the votes and a court case over the mayoral election, Wright was replaced by Mayor J.C. "Jake" Harris. District Court Judge Richard A. Parsons found that some of the write-in votes cast for Wright shouldn't have been counted, and declared Harris the winner of the election.

According to current Ruidoso Downs clerk Jean Stillman, Mayor Harris didn't reappoint Webb as clerk. Jo Ann Jenkins was appointed to replace Webb, and served in that capacity for one year.

In a complaint filed May 4, 1987, Webb named the Village of Ruidoso Downs, Mayor Harris, administrator Charles E. Robinson, clerk Jenkins and councillors Conrad Buchanan, LeVerne Cole, Jackie Branum and J.L. Wilson alleging she was wrongfully discharged from her position. Webb claims the Village of Ruidoso Downs failed to comply with its personnel ordinance, and further claims she was terminated because of her political beliefs.

Webb has asked for damages, including, but not limited to, loss of income.

That motion was the first in a string of actions filed in Parsons' court. Judge Parsons doesn't expect the case to be resolved in the next few months.

Ruidoso Downs village attorney Richard Hawthorne, in July 1987, filed a motion to dismiss for failure to state a claim upon which relief can be granted. Hawthorne claimed Webb failed to exhaust her administrative remedies, further claiming the defendants are public employees and immune from liability in

the case.

But Webb responded with an affidavit opposing the motion to dismiss, detailing her allegations that she was wrongfully discharged. Webb said she wasn't advised of the grounds for termination, and was rebuffed in her attempts to speak to the council. Webb said she wanted an employee hearing but was never given an opportunity to request one.

On April 1 Hawthorne filed an answer and counterclaim, denying Webb's claims that she was denied a hearing.

"The defendants admit that plaintiff was not reappointed to her position on June 9, 1986, but deny the allegation ... that her employment was terminated," reads that court document. "The plaintiff was a terminable at will employee," continues the document, in which the Village of Ruidoso Downs again asks the judge to dismiss Webb's complaint.

The village further asks for repayment of \$2,445.12 the village alleges was paid Webb for sick days and compensatory time.

"I've already made the ruling as to the motion to dismiss," said Parsons, who ruled that Webb had complied with the personnel ordinance in effect, thus the motion was not subject to dismissal on that ground.

Parsons said the attorneys in the case submitted different orders, and he'll go back and listen to the recorded tapes of the hearing before making the next ruling. Parsons said the case eventually will be set for trial.

In the Jenkins matter, the village and the former clerk's bonding company have exchanged several letters over a bond claim of \$3,000.

Western Surety Company paid the \$3,000 after Mayor Harris reportedly demanded reimbursement for payments made to Jenkins and Charles Robinson for compensatory and vacation time. The two resigned July 1, 1987.

According to a letter signed by a vice-president of the bonding company, Jenkins later provided documentation rebutting village claims. "It is apparent certain information was withheld from this company and perhaps misrepresented in the continued negotiations for payment under the bond," reads the letter addressed to attorney Haw-

thorne and dated February 11, 1988.

"On behalf of the village, please be advised of our demand for immediate reimbursement of our payment in the amount of \$3,000," continues the letter. According to a spokesman at Western Surety Company, the Village of Ruidoso Downs hasn't paid the claim.

"No, it's not going to be paid back," answered village clerk Stillman, when asked about the demand for repayment. "We responded with a letter from our attorney," she added.

"We know we're right ... the money is rightfully ours and we're not giving it back," averred Stillman.

Jenkins and administrator Robinson, according to village records, both resigned on the same day. The village claimed compensatory and vacation time paid was in excess of amounts due the two.

"The mayor indicated that Ms. Jenkins signed the checks and used a rubber stamp for the mayor's signature without authorization from the mayor nor the village trustees," according to the bonding firm. "Mayor Harris advised Ms. Jenkins was due 30 hours of vacation and Mr. Robinson 60 hours while they were paid 120 hours and 80 hours respectively. Further, Mr. Harris also advised Ms. Jenkins was paid for 120 hours compensatory time when she was entitled to 16 hours pay, and Mr. Robinson was paid for 240 hours compensatory time and was not entitled to any payment," continues the letter.

A spokesman for Western Surety said those claims were made by Mayor Harris in a letter dated September 25, 1987, and by Hawthorne in a letter dated October 20, 1987.

Western Surety apparently paid the claim, and Mary Begtrup of the bonding firm explained that either the village or the insured, Jo Ann Jenkins, will be liable for the \$3,000. She said the function of a bonding company is to guarantee repayment, not repay the money.

Hawthorne, in a telephone interview Wednesday, said Western Surety has written another letter to the village. "They have agreed to look to Jo Ann Jenkins and not the Village of Ruidoso Downs for repayment," said Hawthorne.

Romero is a candidate for county commission

Roger Romero has announced his candidacy for Lincoln County Commissioner from District 1.

Romero, 31, is a lifelong resident of Lincoln County. He is married and has one son.

He is a high school graduate of Hondo High School, has experience in public relations, and has served in the U.S. Navy, where he gained an electronics background. He has worked with the U.S. Border Patrol as an assistant electronic technician, and has worked as a parts clerk with Sierra Blanca Motors.

He's also been a waiter at the Ruidoso Jockey Club, can do motor mechanics, plumbing, and has two years of experience operating a business in San Patricio.

Romero participates in sports, has farm and ranch experience, has experience in real estate, and is well-known in the county.

He has also traveled overseas.

"As a county commissioner, I will do my best to work close to the public in their interest of the county," he said.

Teacher sorority president-elect Jones:

Nellie Jones, who has taught first grade in Lincoln County for 35 years, has been elected President of Alpha Delta Kappa, an honorary women's educational sorority.

Alpha Delta Kappa has 600 state members, and has four purposes: 1) To recognize outstanding women in education. 2) To promote excellence in education. 3) To award scholarships. and 4) To further social fellowship.

"It's really an honor to be president elect," says the Nob Hill teacher, who will be installed on Saturday at a state-wide meeting at the Inn of the Mountain Gods. Jones has also served as the Southern District Conference Chairwoman, and State Recording Secretary.

Lincoln County has a membership of 32. To become a member, you must be an education professional, must be recommended by another member or a principal or superintendent, must have at least three years of teaching experience, and must be considered to be outstanding in your field.

Nellie Jones has reached a point where she is teaching the children of children she taught earlier in her career. "Education is always changing," she states. "I believe that the quality of public education has remained about the same in all the years I've taught, but that respect for education, as well as financing for education, has certainly gone down."

Jones says the most important thing she can give a child is the desire to read. "We observe silent reading in class, because a lot of children these days never have the chance to see a parent read," she explains. She also stresses phonics and grammar instruction.

"Our wonderful new building here has made a world of difference in terms of the respect the children have for their school environment," she says. "They seem to feel better about themselves to be in a sunny, beautiful room."

Jones team-teaches with Greta Cabot. "I would never go back to the old way," she says. "It's so much better to team teach. FATHER BIRDWELL DELIVERS HOMILY

The Reverend Steve Birdwell, rector of Saint Andrews Church in Roswell, delivered the homily in which he said:

"Burdette blessed us in several ways: He blessed us with his wonderful sense of humor...he blessed us with his compassion, his caring...he blessed us by calling us to a heightened awareness of being servants - Our Lord's people, especially - the less fortunate. He blessed us by his attitude toward the goodness of life...even while he was fighting the inevitability of death. He loved life and clung to it valiantly, even in his dying. And we are all blessed by having known him by his being part of our lives."

"Then he has given us a final blessing. He planned this service in almost every detail...and wanted it to be a celebration of life. He gave me strict orders that there were to be no sad words in this homily, that life had been a feast for him, even though he had known his share of grief."

Father Birdwell said that in January of 1982 he was asked to give the homily at Father Stampley's institution as the rector of the Church in Lincoln County. He re-told a story he used on this occasion:

"Once upon a time when the world was young two brothers shared a field and a grinding mill. Each night they divided their grain they had ground that day. One brother lived alone and the other had a wife and several children. Now the single brother thought to himself one day, "It isn't really fair that we divide the grain equally. I have only myself to care for but my brother has children to feed."

So each night he secretly took some of his grain to his brother's granary. But the married brother

said to himself one day, "It isn't fair that we should divide the grain equally, because I have children to provide for me in my old age, but my brother has not one. So every night he also secretly took some of his grain to his brother's granary. Then one night they met each other half way between their two houses and realized what had been happening. And they embraced each other in love."

God witnessed this meeting, and said, "This is holy place. The place of love. And here it is that a temple shall be built."

Father Birdwell continued: "My wish for you and for Burdette on that January night was that you and Burdette would replenish one another's granaries and that God would find this to be a Holy Place."

"I use this story to say to you that you, the good people of this church family, that you did indeed care for Burdette. You responded to his illness, his dying in marvelous ways. And I commend you for it...your loving care and concern for him is known throughout the diocese...and we are all the better for what you have done...as you are better for having done as you did. We are more human, we are truly in the image of God when we sacrifice, when we give, when we care for other human beings in genuine loving ways. You have done this and I salute you."

Our beloved Burdette Stampley is smiling down from Heaven, telling us to be happy and saying he will be with us always.

Let us thank God for the blessing Burdette will ever remain in our lives -- and all our other blessings.

**The Plant
Corner
by Sally Black**

Norfolk Island Pine, "Araucaria." I am doing the Norfolk Pine this week for one very good reason: my boss asked me for the information. However, before I get to work on the Norfolk Pine, I need a few words on an unrelated subject.

While driving around town this past week, the Forsythia was in full bloom and never more beautiful, and that means the Lilac blossoms are soon to follow.

I do believe Ruidoso has the most beautiful Lilacs to be found. Our next pleasure will be the beautiful Petunias filling the barrels. There were some barrels of Petunias around town last year that did very poorly. The basic cause for this was inadequate drainage.

I checked a few barrels around

town to find poor drainage to be the common fault. I checked barrels at the Cattle Baron Restaurant, Hawthorne Law Firm, and Photographers Delight just to name a few. I urge you not to replant these barrels this year as they are.

Two days after a rain when I rechecked the barrels, the plants were still standing in water. No way a plant can grow under these conditions. First thing you must do is dump all the soil and drill more and large drainage holes in the bottom, add plastic packing peanuts to 1/3 full, then replace the soil, pack firmly, leaving at least 2" from top. Now go on and plant those Petunias. and you will get the results you are looking for. With plenty of water and food, Petunias can take full sun.

Now to attend to the questions from my boss about the Norfolk Pine. I was first impressed with these trees when I saw them growing in parks and old estates in Cali-

fornia. These old trees bear large, spiny, 10-15 lb. cones that really make a crash landing. These are not trees to relax under in the park. These trees can thrive in containers for many years with adequate drainage, moisture, light and food. In their native South Pacific Norfolk Island they make a spectacular sight, towering more than 200' in the air.

In indoor containers, these trees grow very slowly, only three to six inches a year. It would take about 15 years to grow a four to six foot tall tree, and you don't have to worry about those large, heavy cones falling on you.

Good, bright indirect or curtain filtered sunlight is the number one requirement. Proper lighting can be accomplished with artificial light, provide at least 400 footcandles. Use a grow-bulb suspended at the top, also a grow-bulb shining up from the bottom.

These trees prefer never to be moved except to take out to repot and to leech. Try for a warm, damp day, out of the sun for this process, then take the tree immediately back to its very own place in the house.

Norfolks prefer night temperatures of 60 to 55 degrees, and day temperatures of 68 to 72 degrees, but they can tolerate a range from 45 to 85 degrees. Keep soil moist, never soggy or completely dry. Soil should be a mixture, with good

drainage of equal parts of peat moss and perlite. To each one gallon of this mixture, add one and a half teaspoons of 20% superphosphate, 1 tablespoon of ground limestone and two teaspoons of 5-10-5 fertilizer. Otherwise, use a highly organic package of potting mixture formulated for African violets.

I suggest you repot your tree at this point in time. Select a permanent location in your living room for your tree, and install proper lighting. Fill large, deep plastic trays with pebbles to keep moist for extra moisture. Be certain to get good heavy plastic trays for the pebbles to prevent leaking. Place the pot and pot tray on top of the pebbles. Do not allow the pot to drain directly into the pebble tray.

If you have more than one stem growing, you can separate one stem at a time when repotting. Have all the new pots prepared ready for planting, then with a very sharp knife with a long blade, slice from top to bottom and promptly place stem in new pot.

Cover, and pack soil firmly and water immediately. Pack soil a second time after watering. The same treatment should be done for all stems. Complete each stem as you go, quickly, so as not to allow air to get to the roots. Date the pots you repot and measure the plants. Keep the record on the side of the pot. Good luck!

Tracksters qualify for state

The Capitan tracksters moved closer to the state finals Monday afternoon as they competed against 17 schools at the Tatum Relays.

Competing for state qualifying times, which allows them to compete in the state contests, the Tiger girls finished third overall. The boys did not finish as well, the team feeling the loss of injured Chris McCarty.

The Tigers will compete for state qualifying times again this Saturday when Capitan hosts their first Capitan Invitational on the new neoprene track. The meet will be the first invitational for the school in many years and the first competition on the new track. The events begin at 9 a.m. with finals beginning at 1 p.m. There will be no admission charge.

At the Tatum meet, all the girls who placed qualified for the state meet.

Leslie LaRue and Tyanna Trolinger had the best distances in discus and shot put for the state 1-A schools so far this season. LaRue finished first at the Tatum meet, with her discus throw of 112-2 1/2 and Trolinger finished second behind a AAA Portales girl, with a shot of 33-3 3/4. In other field events, Lora McKay was fifth in the

long jump at 16-2 1/2, a state qualifying distance.

Three girls placed in the individual runs. Nanette Boyd finished third in the 100 meter dash with a time of 12.95. Gina Griego finished third in the 200 meter dash with a time of 27.25. Kerrie Runnels was fourth in the 3200 meter run with a time of 15:21.02. Her time was behind two girls from AA schools.

In the relays, the Tiger girls took first place in the 800 meter relays with a time of 1:50.5. The relay team was LaShauna Tillotson, Boyd, Griego and McKay.

The 400 meter relay team of McKay, Boyd, Griego and Karie Cox finished second with a time of 52.49. The 1600 meter medley relay team of Tillotson, McKay, Cox and Kim Eckland also finished second with a time of 4:44.6.

The mile relay team of Boyd, Griego, McKay and Cindy Castillo placed third with a time of 4:23.15.

The girls finished with 47 overall team points, behind Tatum and Texico, who tied for first place. The state qualifying teams and individuals are eligible to compete at the state Class A track meet in Albuquerque at the UNM track field on May 6 and 7.

Girls coach Pam Allen said the team had a real good meet.

"There was a tremendous effort from the kids as a group," Allen

said.

"The shot put and discus are really coming into their own," she added. Boyd also had her best time of the season in the 100 meter dash and the relays had their best times so far, Allen added.

Also competing against 17 schools, the Tiger boys placed eighth, with AAA Portales first. The Tiger boys felt the loss of McCarty in their overall points, managing 19 with only one event placing first.

The 400-meter relay team of Tino Gallegos, Nathan Roybal, Kerry Clements and Jerrod Martin were first with a time of 45.94, a state qualifying time. Also state qualifying was the 800 meter relay team of Mike Shanks, Gallegos, Clements and Martin, which placed third with a time of 1:36.06.

The only other placing teams were Clements, Shanks, Heath Huey and Gallegos in the medley relay with a fourth place time of 3:57.55. The mile relay team of Jim Leslie, Gallegos, Shanks and Clements was fifth with a time of 3:44.29.

Boys Coach Blane Miller said Tuesday that McCarty will run at the Saturday meet in Capitan.

The Tigers also will host the District 5 Track Meet on Saturday, April 30.

School board rehires 33 teachers

At the regular meeting of the Capitan School Board, board members approved the rehiring of 33 teachers for the 1988-89 school year.

Only one, Blane Miller, received a dissenting vote on his retention. Board member Hollis Fuchs cast a vote of "no." However, board president James McDaniel and members Preston Stone, Tom Trost and Ken Cox voted "yes" for reinstatement of Miller's contract.

Teachers rehired for next year are as follows:

Elementary school; Mary Halkins, Pat Holland, Linda Turnbow, Pat Sullivan, Dottie MacVeigh, Mary Shanks, Lou Roberts, Mary McIlwain, Linda Smith, Amy Riddle, Idy Eldridge, Mecca Aldridge, Ruby Johnson, Joann Washburn, Mary Lee Daniel, Sonnie Silva, Darlene Herrera, and Joanne Jackson.

High school; Bill Stowe, Mike Katco, Sara Ball, Blane Miller, Pam Allen, Diane Efthimiou, Jim Reese, Kendall Lawlis, Laura Jones, Bill MacVeigh, Frank Silva, Jacque Childress, Anne McKay, Clayton Allen, Dick Efthimiou and Dick Valenzuela.

David Collins, a nine-year veteran teacher in Capitan, was not offered a contract for next year. Collins had been dismissed from his position in the fall, when it was alleged that he was teaching religion in his social studies class. He was then hired as a substitute teacher, without benefits.

Collins asked to address the board at the public meeting last Thursday, but president James McDaniel stated that personnel action had to be discussed only in executive session. Collins, the board members, School Superintendent Scott Childress and high school Principal Larry DeWees then retired to executive session, where they talked with Collins for about an hour and 10 minutes.

Childress presented the "cafeteria plan" of insurance coverage. The plan, Childress said,

had nothing to do with cafeterias but was so named because of its "a la carte" style of choosing coverage. The board voted to offer the plan, which has been approved by the Internal Revenue Service and by the New Mexico Attorney General's Office, as an alternative insurance policy that teachers may or may not choose to purchase.

Because of different tax rates, a teacher could typically save \$46 per month in take-home pay and still have the same sort of coverage they have under the current policy.

The board approved the lease of a Semi-Serv machine for the cafeteria. This machine dispenses a pudding-like dessert product that is low in calories, sugar, carbohydrates and cholesterol. The dessert costs 35 cents per serving, and the machine can be loaned to the Booster Club for fundraising.

President McDaniel stated his concern about the lack of calories, saying that growing youngsters need calories. Superintendent Childress assured him that purchasing the dessert is optional and that calories in the diet can be gained through other food products.

The lease of the machine will cost the school \$235 per month, which can be generated through sales of the food product. In two and a half years, the school will own the machine.

A tractor bid was awarded to an Artesia firm that was low bidder at \$11,985. It is a green John Deere with a cutter, snow blower, broom and five-foot blade.

An agenda item, to discuss the high school curriculum, was postponed until the April 28 budget hearing, because of the lengthy time spent in executive session.





Ruidoso's boys compiled 105 points, paced by Jose Marquez, who placed first in three events.





104 two-year-olds auditioned for the available 10 parts, but it was Merganser's repertoire of speed that brought cheers from the audience. The chestnut-colored colt raced 350 yards in :17.67 and will be the favorite when the curtain goes up May 1st for the final act.

Merganser shared the spotlight with rider Jacky Martin and trainers Jack and Monty Brooks. The Merganser/Martin/Brooks (Jack) combination already got rave reviews while winning the West Texas Futurity at Sunland on March 20th, but all deserved standing ovations for their efforts in the April 15th trials.

Jack Brooks saddled three final qualifiers - Merganser, My Dash, and Rime - while brother Monty had Balachine, Jive Sign, and Six Kiss win their respective divisions.

Martin rode Rime to the win circle in the first of 11 trial heats, then ended the day with four consecutive encore performances. Martin piloted My Dash, Merganser, Jive Sign and Six Kiss to win the last four heats, earned himself a five-bagger and qualified all but Six Kiss for the final.

Owned by Jerry Wells and Ronald Sholz, Merganser is undefeated in his young career and won his trial by an easy three lengths.

Leading ladies for the trials were runners My Dash and Effort Of Love and owner Jacqueline Spencer.

Spencer, an Alto, two Mexico resident, will have two of her speedsters in the final - Rime and Power Effort.

My Dash set the second fastest qualifying time for owner Liese Gullickson and Effort Of Love looked good in a 3 and 1/2 length romp. The only race Effort Of Love has ever lost was a nose decision to Merganser in the West Texas final.

The \$24,829 Consolation will be run on Saturday, April 30th and the qualifiers are: Six Kiss, Masters Link, Miswaki Queen, All For The Cash, Cash Treasure, Peggys First Chance, Gotta Be A Dash, Codys Comment, Folks Folly and Marthas Teeser.

Friday, April 22 the attention will turn to the new crop of two-year-old runners as 44 will make the five furlong trip in the qualification round of the \$185,000 est. Riley Allison Futurity.

This track's premier thoroughbred race will celebrate the Silver Anniversary 25th running of the event on Sunday, May 8th.

The ten final qualifiers will be the first two finishers to come out of the five triers. The heats will be carded as the fourth, sixth, eighth, ninth, and eleventh races.

Three supplemental nominations include Watch Our Hero and Silent Reflex who finished second and third in the Jean Laffit Futurity at Delta Downs earlier this year.

Local standouts include Fly Dragoness, Torrey Pines, Just Like Lace and Stewing Sid.

Fly Dragoness turned in the fastest 4 furlong time of :46.0 in her maiden debut on March 11.

Torrey Pines was an easy 2 and 1/2 length winner on February 24th while Stewing Sid romped 13th.

Curribot, Farmer Brown and Prince Ego have been given the top three weights after being nominated to the \$5,000 add El Paso Times Handicap on Saturday, April 23rd.

The 11 year-old phenom, Curribot has been assigned 121 pounds for the mile test and will be looking to add to his already impressive statistics. He has won over \$423,000 in his 94 race career and many of his 32 wins have come

on Sunland soil.

Farmer Brown faded to seventh in his last race, but the Guy Bowers' color-bearer has shown his potential by winning three of four races here this year including the Mr Vale Handicap.

Prince Ego was named Horse-of-the-Meet last year at Sunland and is coming off a big win in the El Paso Herald Post Handicap on April 9th in which he beat Curribot at 6 and 1/2 furlongs.

Sunday, April 24 the \$48,993 Riley Allison Derby will see the return to the Southwest of Fearless Ego.

The multiple stakes-winner captured first prize in the Norgor Futurity at Ruidoso Downs and both the All-American Sale and Sunland Park Fall Futurities here as a two-year-old before shipping out to California.

The daughter of Bold Ego showed her tremendous speed at Santa Anita as she stayed with Goodbye Halo until the stretch in the Santa Ynez and led the pack for most of the way in the La Habra before finishing fifth. The New-Mexico bred has earned over \$154,000 in her career, winning eight of fourteen races.

Fearless Ego worked :35.2 for 3 furlongs on April 19th in preparation.

The Kentucky-bred Musco Duck will find support in the race. The colt beat Allison Derby-eligibles Van Pack, Princess Telary, Texas Attraction, El Paso Gus, and Available Groom in his Sunland debut on April 9.

Musco Duck got a speedy :47.3 work for 1/2 mile on April 19.

Jockey Mike Lidberg had another multiple-win day on Sunday, April 17 when the 26 year-old veteran mounted three winners.

Lidberg's feat landed him in a tie at the top of the rider's standings with Pedro Benitez.

A three-time Sunland Park riding champion, Lidberg was at the top of the standings earlier this season before sustaining a broken ankle which kept him out of action for six weeks. He has clawed his way back to the top and could be headed for his third straight riding title at this track.

Strate And Easy was carrying second highweight of 117 pounds behind The Red Rocker's 122. The Red Rocker was given the high impost and was favored in the eight horse field on the strength of having won his last three-in-a-row at Sunland.

Third in the field was Dash To A Star, followed by Charge It To Go, Hi Flyin Waldo, Razzure Charge, Restless Squaw, and Available Now.

Riding honors for the day went to Duane Sterling and to Mike Lidberg. Each pilot landed three horses in the win circle.

Local author and historian Lynda Sanchez has been invited to speak to the Alamogordo Community Education Center and the state convention of Alpha Delta Kappa, teachers' sorority.

Sanchez has worked on this research project for almost a decade. She also has had more than 25 articles published, with credits in "Arizona Highways," "New Mexico Magazine" and "The Journal of Arizona History." Sanchez is co-author of

"Indeh, an Apache Odyssey."

A history and Spanish teacher at Ruidoso High School, Sanchez lives on a ranch near Lincoln. She is married to State Board of Education member James Sanchez. Their daughter, Katherine, is a graduate of Capitan High School now enrolled at New Mexico State University.

Sanchez said she enjoys both teaching and writing.

"I believe they go hand in hand," she explained. "Many of the things I experience during my research trips, talks or interviews in other regions make me a better teacher and hopefully will inspire our young people to see what a fascinating world there is out there," she continued.

P&Z allows use of rights of way

It took the Planning and Zoning Commission less than 15 minutes Monday to take care of business scheduled during its regular meeting.

With seven members present, commissioners unanimously approved a replat on the old children's home property and OK'd three licenses for private use of public right of way.

Those licenses, drafted by acting village attorney Mike Runnels, were the result of three separate requests for vacation of right of way where structures extend onto public land. Commissioners, in past meetings, refused to give up public right of way, but authorized the continued use under conditions set forth in the licenses.

"I've read it and I'm agreeable to it," said property owner John Lewis, whose license is over an encroachment into village land that abuts his 107 Echo Drive residence. One license was for W. and B.R. Melton at 105 West Street and the other for Julian Chacon at 209, 211 and 213 Center Lane.

Planning administrator Cleatus Richards said the agreements will be presented to the Ruidoso Village Council for final action.

Commissioner John White, recalling his suggestion in a previous meeting that contractors who build without a building permit be fined, asked if any action was taken.

When the commission considered one of the requests to vacate right of way that resulted in the licenses approved Monday, it was learned that construction took place without the permits required by ordinance. White asked the attorney to pursue legal action against the licensed contractor(s).

"If they're enforced against one party they should be enforced against everybody," said Runnels. He said new procedures have been established that will lead to stricter enforcement.

In further discussions, Runnels explained a policy being drafted that should lead to better weed control. He said all village employees will be asked to report areas where

they see an accumulation of junk, trash, weeds and/or litter.

Runnels said the property owners will be notified and given a reasonable length of time to alleviate the problem or be subject to a fine.

"I think that's a really positive step," said White.

In other business the commission:

—Approved a replat from four to two lots on the children's home property on lots one, two, three, four and other parts of Section 27, Township 11S. The owners, H. Roscoe Robinson and Yvonne F. Robinson have divorced and want to make equal division of the property, explained their agent John Shaw.

—Learned that the Monday afternoon public hearing was cancelled.

—Questioned Richards over a change in use for property at Sudderth and Paradise drives. Richards said he'll make a field inspection and report back at the next meeting.



Eye On The Capitol

HOT PRIMARY ELECTIONS: THE REPUBLICAN RUMOR
Barking up the right tree? Maybe, that's what the Republicans are doing, if the rumor I've heard is right.

Presently, the Senate is tied 21-21 between Republicans and Democrats. State Senators elected in 1988 will reapportion that chamber after the 1990 census is completed. Republicans have far more to fear in the upcoming elections.

In 1984, 5 Senate districts were won by fewer than 300 votes. Republicans hold 4 of them. That means Republicans have a bigger exposure going into the November elections.

In 1988, Republicans formed a coalition with dissident Democrats, and seized command of the Senate. Given the impending reapportionment and the danger the November elections pose, no wonder the Republicans are putting every cent on the line for the Senate races.

A look at June primary candidates show the Grand Old Party has fielded candidates in 32 State Senate districts. The 10 districts the Republicans avoided are, with one exception, hardcore Democratic ones - Rio Arriba, Taos, etc.

Go for the Senate now, go after the House in 1990: the Roundhouse rumor is that's the Republican campaign strategy. Is it true? Apparently - yes.

Let's look at what's happening in a major House race.

State Representative Maurice Hobson's district is Otero, Lincoln and Sierra. Hobson, a Republican, came to the House in 1971. Only 1 Representative has more seniority.

On filing day, politicians got a big shock: Hobson abandoned his House seat. He is now a State Senate candidate for Democrat Bill Vandergriff's seat. Republicans believe Vandergriff is vulnerable.

Two Republicans are seeking the House seat Hobson vacated. The winner in the June 8 Republican primary will run in November against Democrat James Walsh.

Richard Guilez has been Mayor of Tularosa for 14 years. "It doesn't look like the [Republican] State Organization is placing any kind of priority on my race," he told me. Hobson's switch caught the Mayor completely by surprise. When Guilez threw his hat in the ring, "I didn't know of anybody else [another Republican] who would file for the seat."

With 6 children, Guilez's top priority is no surprise: public education. The much vaunted school reform is "not enough," he says. Better salaries for teachers and smaller classes are needed.

The Mayor also emphasizes natural resources. The Texans "want to tap into our water," he complained. Although our State

Engineer's Office has performed well. "A lot more needs to be done." Unemployment is high in Tularosa, but "we're no different from the rest of the state," the Mayor added.

How will he run his campaign for the Republican Primary? "I hope to reach as many people as possible." Look for mailings and a lot of "legwork" - "especially in Sierra County...The voters in Lincoln and Otero know about me."

Mayor Guilez is on the Board of Directors of the New Mexico Municipal League. He was president of that organization in 1976-77.

Paul W. Harrington is also a candidate in the Republican Primary. He is a building contractor and realtor in Elephant Butte.

Like Guilez, Harrington received no prior warning of Hobson's departure. "We didn't learn until late Monday that Maurice wasn't running." The next morning, Harrington decided to become a candidate. He collected 135 signatures before 11:00, then rushed to Santa Fe and filed the petitions with the Secretary of State at 4:00.

Harrington defines himself as a "moderate to conservative fiscally."

He thinks attracting big industry, such as IBM, to the district isn't plausible. Rather, Harrington prefers to develop the "local companies that are already here." In particular, he wants more money for tourism and recreation, two mainstays of the area's economy. "I want our district to get its fair share of advertising on the regional and national level."

On public education, he's no flinty-eyed penny pincher. "We have to pay our teachers more. You get what you pay for."

"My basic philosophy," Harrington concluded, is that a representative should listen to his constituents "rather than espouse his own views."

An Air Force veteran, he has lived in New Mexico since 1946. Harrington attended UNM 1956-1959.

The Guilez/Harrington contest may be decided by political geography.

In 1984, Sierra (Harrington's home county) contributed 48% of the district's Republican primary turnout. The Otero area (Guilez's turf) put in 37%. The remaining 15% came from Lincoln County.

Clearly, geography gives Harrington an advantage. In political experience, however, Guilez has the upper hand.

Assuming both Guilez and Harrington carry their home counties, Lincoln County Republicans could well be the deciding factor on June 7.





WRITE IT AND REAP!

Writing a classified ad that gets results—whether it be for real estate, employment, announcements, transportation, or merchandise—is easy if you follow the guidelines below.



1. Give the reader specific information. Pretend you are someone reading the classifieds. What would you like to know about the item, service or job you are advertising? Be sure to add details such as color, size, condition, brand name, age, features and benefits. Be accurate! Don't embellish your ad with misleading information. Stick to the facts and reap the rewards!




2. Include the price. Don't waste your time or a potential buyer's time. If you advertise the price of the item or service you offer, the people who respond to your ad will be those who are genuinely interested. Surveys show that readers are more interested in those items and services they know are within their price range.

3. Avoid abbreviations. Don't make a potential customer work too hard! Although you may be tempted to cut down on the cost of your ad by using abbreviations, surveys indicate that many people don't understand such abbreviations as EIK (eat-in kitchen) or WSW (write side wall tires and won't take the time to figure them out. A confused reader is a disinterested reader. Get the most for your money and use complete words.



4. Include phone number and speedy hours. Be sure to let potential customers know when and where to call. Surveys show that even if a person is very interested in your item or service, he or she will not call back after the first attempt. Stay near the phone during the hours you indicate you will be available. Don't risk missing a sale!



5. Run on consecutive days. Your ad will not get results if people don't see it. Therefore, it is important to set up a consistent and consecutive ad schedule with your telephone salesperson or outside sales representative. Run your ad for at least one week. Remember, you can cancel your ad as soon as you get the desired results!
