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Councillors can public use of trash compactor

The Ruidoso Village Council Tuesday slammed the lid on public use of the trash compacting system on Gavilan Canyon Road.

After an hour-long executive session, the council upheld village manager Frank Potter's recently announced closed-door policy at the compactor. Councillor Al Junge cast the lone dissenting vote.

Although a previous council, when the compacting system was placed in operation, voted to leave the facility open for public use, Potter recently changed that policy. He said the administration and staff had always recommended the compactor be used only by municipal employees.

Potter's policy was announced a day after a man fell into the compactor and was hospitalized.

Councillors contacted on Wednesday said reasons to leave the compactor closed include liability and insurance costs. The village also provides free pick-up for large items.

Councillor Junge disagrees, maintaining members of the public should have access to the system. He said policies and procedures

should be adopted for compactor use.

Much of Tuesday's regular meeting was spent in discussions over rebuilding the first bridge in the Upper Canyon, with the council awarding the bid to the sole bidder, P.F. Gonzales Cement Work, at \$41,901.48. Village engineer Mike Davalos said Gonzales was also the low bidder previously when all bids were rejected.

A group of Upper Canyon residents and business owners were on hand asking the council to ensure the bridge construction is completed quickly, or delayed until early October. Whispering Pines Restaurant owner Chester Stone, speaking for the group, said Upper Canyon businesses would be seriously impacted if the construction is under way during the busy tourist season.

"We'd like him to start and get through," said Stone, adding he talked to the contractor who said he's ready to go.

Councillors agreed to a change order asking Gonzales to expedite the job.

Ruidoso Lodge owner Bill Rawlins raised questions over the bridge design, displaying a letter he received in which village staff

agreed to add a two-foot extension on the upstream side. He said that isn't included in the contractor's plans.

Davalos displayed various plans, and said the agreement with Rawlins was to move the guardrail two feet, widening the driving surface. He said that will be done, adding the letter Rawlins received didn't say anything about a concrete extension on the west side of the bridge.

"I don't understand your reasoning," said Rawlins. "You've changed what we agreed on," he added.

Acquiring a municipal meetings facility—by either lease or purchase—previously touted as an urgent issue, was put on the back burner Tuesday. Councillors agreed much more information, as well as more money, is needed before choosing and refurbishing a building.

The council authorized staff to advertise for professional proposals to evaluate the area's needs regarding a facility and from an architectural firm. Charles L. Smith, chairman of an ad hoc group studying the issue, recommended establishing a budget, as well as advertising for the proposals.

Councillor Jess Stinson said he's

always preferred the True Value building as a site for a meeting facility, and wondered why Smith changed his recommendation.

Councillor Tom McNeil, noting the village now has \$275,000 in the kitty, suggested drawing interest on that money and going to the New Mexico Legislature to ask for more funds next session.

"We haven't lost a thing except a little time," said McNeil. "If we can't get more money we're still even steven, or a little ahead," he added.

State Representative Ben Hall, in the audience, said he'll take such a request, as well as any other asked by the village, to the Legislature. "If you don't ask you sure won't get it," quipped Hall.

When the council finally agreed on the action taken, Junge said it should have been done six months ago.

"We had a lot of interested people we had to placate," said Junge.

Also Tuesday, the council authorized a new secretarial position and voted to move the planning, building inspection and engineering departments to the old airport terminal.

The move, announced and tabled

during a previous council meeting, apparently was considered during the closed session after councillors voted to retire into an executive meeting to discuss personnel and pending litigation.

In other regular business Tuesday the council:

—Adopted an ordinance calling for staggered terms for village boards and commissions.

—Adopted an ordinance regarding mandatory assessment fee, along with other fees, for persons convicted of distribution or possession of a controlled substance. Attorney John Underwood said the ordinance conforms with state law.

—Delayed discussions over acquiring a liquor license at the Eagle

Crowd questions board on school policy, budget

A group of more than 100 parents and teachers posed questions on the schools' handling of school personnel and program cutbacks at a special budget meeting Wednesday night of the Ruidoso Board of Education.

At the end of hours of discussion and debate, audience and board members seemed to come to some common ground as the parents and teachers continued to call for careful consideration of what programs and staffmembers are cut, and school board members and administrators indicating a willingness to listen to concerns of the public.

The meeting opened with a change of location, with the groups filing out of the small administrative office meeting room and reconvening in the band room at Ruidoso Middle School. And it was the middle school that was the subject of the majority of discussion.

Board members first approved the hiring of accountant Terry Jones to conduct the 1987-88 audit, then listened as administrators and business manager Caron Snow conducted an extensive item-by-item

presentation of the proposed 1988-89 budget.

During the budget overview, Superintendent Sid Miller noted the dropping enrollment and that the state Legislature is "unwilling or unable" to give schools more money. Those factors have necessitated staff changes, budget cutbacks and the use of cash balances in the preparation of the proposed budget, he said. Teacher ratios in upper grades have dropped while increasing enrollment and state mandated teacher ratio levels in lower grades have led to plans to shift teachers from upper grades to lower grades.

Miller expected no raises for teachers without a significant increase in enrollment. The proposed budget was designed to withstand a further loss in students, if necessary.

"We can live with it," he said. Questioners began by seeking a breakdown of the athletic program budget, and Miller promised to mail a copy to all who requested it.

Then a letter was read, stating the signees' concern over cuts at the middle school in home ec, computer and shop, the teachers' pay cut and "the continued high priority

Building permits continue upward trend in March

Village building continued a three-month rally in March, as building levels swelled to the highest levels recorded since last July.

Seven new home starts and 12 residential remodels contributed to the month's 27 building permits issued with a total value of \$859,383. That total more than doubled February's 11 permits worth just \$317,391; but was down from last year. In March 1987 the 21 permits issued had a value of \$1,274,546.

More than half last year's hefty total was made up of a construction project in Rancho Ruidoso valued at \$641,859.

The spring building surge in March pushed the number of permits issued for the year to 49, valued at \$1,423,194.

The seven new single-family dwelling (SFD) permits issued last month were valued at \$602,871, up from February's four SFD permits worth \$206,055. In March 1987 the village saw eight homes

started, with a valuation of \$565,793.

Villagers continue to remodel and refurbish, with a dozen residential addition/alteration permits recorded in March, with a valuation of \$192,613. In February four residential redo permits worth \$81,482 were issued; and a year ago, in March 1987, 11 permits were listed at \$59,895.

For the eighth month in a row, no new commercial building starts were recorded by the building inspector's office. Just two new commercial permits were issued during 1987, five of those in July.

Both commercial remodeling permits valued at \$51,399 were issued in March, up from February's two commercial fix-up permits worth just \$28,354. In March 1987 no commercial addition/alteration permits were issued.

One apartment remodeling permit was issued in March, with a value of \$9,500.

The building inspector last month issued two foundation permits at \$3,000.

given to all athletic programs, especially in light of the much-publicized need for budget cuts."

The letter asked for reconsideration of the development of students, contrasting the need for computer skills against the need for athletic skills.

Board President Stormy Edwards said the board is not placing too much emphasis on athletics. It was learned that coaches are hired as teachers first, and coaches second.

The parley continued with assertions that the French language program at the high school is being cut. Demands were made, asking where that information came from, with French teacher Carol Hubbard standing and stating, "From me, I teach it."

Hubbard said she was told French would be dropped and eventually the program would disappear. But high school Principal Tom Hansen said discussion of changes in the French program were not yet finalized.

"I've been struggling to find a way not to cut the program," said Hansen, calling discussions of any cuts "premature." That started a continuing theme from administrators and board members that decisions were not necessarily finalized yet.

Audience members responded by

—Heard Junge comment on an article published in The News about "white water" in the river. "I felt concern and a little sick," said Junge, noting the story was factual but left out the important informa-

tion that the "white water" has no effect on the municipal water supply.

"We don't need anybody concerned about whether they should come to Ruidoso—we just need them coming," said Junge.

—Heard Junge report on attend-

ing a meeting of the Ruidoso Lodgers' Tax Committee where just two of five members showed up. He said if members don't attend, new members should be appointed.

Councillor J.D. James was absent from Tuesday's meeting.

seeking to be included as decisions are reached on what to cut and what to save.

"Never cut academics," advised Lisa Wiggins. Others added to the call for continued computer education at the middle school. But Associate Superintendent Mike Gladden pointed out that computers may not be cut after all, as two sixth-grade teachers are qualified to teach the subject.

"If you give us a chance, you may be pleased" with the number of electives that will be available at the middle school, he noted.

Later, Gladden said he will first meet with middle school teachers (Gladden will be acting middle school principal next year, replacing present Principal Texanita Cole) before making final decisions at the school. Again, he predicted parents would be surprised and pleased with what will be offered.

At one point, it was asked if a decision had to be made to cut, would the board consider the input of parents. Edwards said the decision would be handled by the board and administration, "but hopefully, we listen to the public before we do."

Community United Methodist Church Reverend Robert Bellows initiated an extensive debate, seeking to determine how the schools could be dropping vocational pro-

grams at the middle school while apparently basing one request for funds on the existence of those very programs.

"That seems a shade deceptive," said Bellows. "Give me your money and I won't offer the program."

Again and again he countered administrators' answers by asserting that a program must exist if funding is dependent upon it.

Board member Don Swalander pointed out that the request for funding can be met at any level from seventh through 12th grade, and present high school vocational programs will meet the requirement.

In a Thursday interview, Miller stated that the funding is not tied to vocational programs, but that the state funds different levels of students at different amounts. The added "cost differential" for some grade levels, including high school and middle school, is designed to meet the greater needs of those students, but no absolute direction is given on how the funds are to be spent, leaving intact local school boards' autonomy, said Miller. He added that no state requirement exists for vocational programs at either high school or middle school levels.

Later, Bellows, stating an assumption that Indian students make up a "healthy" percentage of

those who take vocational courses, wondered if incoming federal funding could be used to fund vocational programs that are largely utilized by Indian students.

"Good point," stated Miller, who agreed it was a possibility.

Miller disputed a News report that stated the cutting of home ec and shop at the middle school would save \$30,000. He said the correct figure is closer to \$60,000, plus a small sum on savings in supplies.

Other discussion included comments asking that administration be cut before teachers, suggestions to have fundraisers to continue elective classes and the creation of a childcare facility as a learning experience for high schoolers.

"Please listen to us when you have a room packed saying we are concerned, because we are," Bellows concluded.

Edwards promised audience members their suggestions had not "fallen on deaf ears."

"Give us the opportunity to build on what we have," added Miller.

"Please let us have a choice before you cut," an audience member urged.

The board then gave approval to the proposed budget, which will be taken to Santa Fe, then returned for final action at a May 25 meeting of the board.

Chamber board OKs new 'fair share' dues plan

Considerable discussion concerning the revised membership dues occupied much of the regular meeting of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors Wednesday.

The board reviewed and accepted a proposal from Ronnie Paulger, chairman of the dues structure review committee. The proposal offered a reduction in the basic membership rate from \$150 to \$120 per year, with additions to the basic rate constituting the "fair share" membership investment per category.

In addition to the basic fee, lodging will pay \$3 for each unit and lodging establishments with restaurants will pay an additional \$1 per chair in the restaurant and lounge.

Restaurants will pay \$1 per chair if serving liquor and \$.25 per chair for all others, in addition to the basic fee.

Professional businesses will add \$25 for each state licensed person.

Financial institutions will pay \$60 per million in deposits.

Utilities will add \$.05 per connection to the basic membership fee.

Attractions fees were proposed on a five-year graduated plan of one cent a year increase, starting at five cents, to a ceiling of 10 cents a ticket. This is to be paid on the gate count of the preceding year. This proposal deals primarily with the racetrack and the ski area.

Entertainment members will add one cent per ticket to the basic membership fee based on last year's sales.

Beauty and barber shops add \$5 per licensed employee to the basic fee, hospital and care center add \$10 per bed to the fee.

Grocery stores, including Wal-Mart, will add \$30 for each cash register to the basic fee.

All other businesses are to be charged at the basic rate plus \$5 for each employee.

Committee member Don Shaw said if any business is unwilling to join under the "fair share" membership program then that business will not be accepted for membership.

There was discussion whether the increased fees for attractions such as the racetrack would cause these businesses to drop their memberships and whether the chamber should continue to promote their businesses if they drop membership.

The board agreed that the chamber not promote non-members, but to mention major attractions briefly when answering inquiries about Ruidoso.

Shaw said there will be subcommittees within the dues struc-

ture committee to meet with businesses and discuss the "fair share" structuring.

The board approved the fee schedule with two members voting no.

The board also discussed the upcoming scholarship fund drive, to be in the form of a rummage sale and "cake show" at 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday, May 14, at the chamber building on Sudderth Drive.

The cake show entries will be taken until 11 a.m. and the entry fee will be \$12.50 per cake. There will be four categories: decorator's special; grannie's delight; organizational ideas, for such groups as Boy Scouts; and originality or the cake of the show.

Scholarship committee chairperson Becky Durham asks that all chamber members contribute rummage for the sale by Friday, May 13.

Durham also reported on the 1988 Art Festival, which will be July 29, 30 and 31 at the old airport site. Durham said there were more artists this year than previously, with "nice art coming."

Durham also discussed the annual chamber retreat scheduled to begin the evening of Friday, June 10, at the Cloudercroft Lodge. The board members will use the time to handle chamber business and to socialize, Durham said.

The board unanimously agreed to rotate the chamber checking account among the member banking institutions, beginning July 1. The Bank of Ruidoso will be first, with First National Bank, Pioneer Savings, Ruidoso State and First Federal Savings to follow consecutively through 1993. Also in accounting business, the chamber amended a paragraph to read that the chamber set up a separate accounting for the receipt and disbursement of funds.

In other business the chamber board:

—Appointed Mike Warren to fill a position vacated by Leon Eggleston, who resigned.

—Heard a report from director John Jeffers about the Tele-Auction, which netted \$300 under the budgeted amount.

—Heard a report of the first month's activities from new Conventions and Visitors Bureau (CVB) Director Tracey Moran.

—Heard a report from Jackie Rawlins about the Ruidoso Valley Greeters. The board complimented Rawlins and the greeters for their good work.

—Approved the CVB contract and budget with the Village of Ruidoso for this year.

—Heard a report from Durham about nominations to the board, with a complete list of nominations to be announced at a later date.

The board will meet on Tuesday, May 3, for a budget review.

Otero Electric told 'no' on residential demand metering

The New Mexico Public Service Commission has ordered Otero County Electric Cooperative to discontinue its residential demand metering program.

In a two-to-one decision the commission ordered Otero to file, on or before June 27, proposed new rates and a new rate design that eliminates the demand metering. Commissioners Joseph Samora and Martin Blake signed the order on April 20, with Commissioner S. Peter Bickley dissenting.

"I was very surprised," said Otero general manager Bill Mershon, adding he told the Otero board of the order last Friday. He said the board is asking its attorney's advice before acting.

"I do not have a plan yet," said Mershon in a telephone interview Tuesday. "I think we have three choices," he added.

Mershon said Otero can comply with the order, ask for a rehearing before the commission or appeal the ruling to the State Supreme Court. Mershon said if the board opts to

comply with the order, the company will likely have to apply for a time extension.

He said the date included in the order is "nearly impossible" since it takes longer than that to gather and compare data.

The Commission order was the culmination of proceedings started in 1986 when Otero filed a proposed rate increase with the commission. Utility customers, represented by Jeanie Clancy and N.C. Grantham Jr., entered the case.

At a hearing last June, the hearing examiner placed on Otero the burden of proving its demand metering program for residential customers is appropriate.

Mershon said the June hearings in Santa Fe were preceded by public meetings in Alto and Ruidoso. He said a recommendation was made in the case last October, but the final order wasn't issued until April 20.

Otero is the only utility company in the state that has applied demand metering in residential areas, and Mershon said the ruling applies only to residential

customers. He said demand metering is widely used by utility companies for commercial customers.

Mershon, admitting that demand metering can cause customers to run up very large bills in a very short time, described how demand metering works. He said energy is measured in time and in volume, with a customer who requires 10 kilowatt (kw) hours of energy for just one hour a month having the capacity to utilize that 10 kw hours at any given time.

Mershon said Otero customers are charged per kw hour for energy usage up to 10 kw, but if the demand exceeds 10 kw for any 15 minute period in a month, the customer is charged \$8 for each kw over 10.

"I understand why people complain about it," remarked Mershon. He said it's not uncommon for a large house, used just on a weekend to have 50 kw in electrical use. "People that use very little energy feel this real fast," said Mershon.

He said an electric water heater draws about 5 kw, as does a clothes dryer. So, if both are operating at once, a customer could easily hit

the maximum of 10 kw.

In an interview last summer, Mershon said demand charges are motivations for consumers to find ways to lower the peak demand during peak periods, around 8 p.m. in the summer and 5 p.m. in the winter.

"If we can trim the peak off, that improves our load factor, and saves us money and the consumers money," he said. "The system is time sensitive. We give consumers the incentive to spread out the usage of their electricity which could potentially reduce the cost of their electric power," he continued.

Mershon said Otero may call a special board meeting to begin drafting a plan in response to the commission order.

Bickley, in his dissenting opinion, said the majority decision is casting out a system that has been working for 25 years without a significant number of protests.

"Rate design is an imperfect art and I remain unpersuaded that Otero's current system is any more or less 'appropriate' than the system that is yet to come," concluded Bickley.

Executive sessions and Lincoln restrictions busy county commissioners

The Lincoln County Board of Commissioners occupied much of Tuesday's regular meeting in Carrizozo with executive sessions.

Commissioners began the meeting in executive session with County Clerk Fran Siddens and her attorney, Dan Bryant, about possible litigation. The one-hour session was not conclusive and Siddens did not sit as clerk for the remainder of the meeting.

The meeting was finalized with a two-hour executive session to discuss litigation in the treasurer's office and further discussion about Siddens. When the meeting was reopened, commissioners addressed Siddens, requesting further discussion with Bryant about minor details.

Siddens then told the commission she thought four months was too long to discuss the situation and that she was "going to the judge tomorrow (Wednesday) to file a motion to compel." At that point Siddens left the meeting room. The discussion between Siddens and the commissioners apparently regarded a longstanding dispute between the two on the taking of minutes at the commission meetings.

Between executive sessions commissioners heard a lengthy discus-

sion from Lincoln resident Ron Becker about the Lincoln Historic Ordinance rules concerning the screening of satellite dishes. Becker contended that the rules were unconstitutional because other television antennas in the village are not screened. He also argued the use of a slat fence to screen was aesthetically unpleasing and that he preferred a shrubby screen.

Becker was before the commission because of an order he received to screen his dish or be fined. County attorney Gary Mitchell told Becker the commission ordered him to enforce the ordinance and to file a complaint against him.

Becker stated he felt the wording of the ordinance covered only satellite dishes and that he owned a "television receiving antenna." He also requested a variance for his "antenna" since he did not live in the town's Historical Zone A. Mitchell told Becker the ordinance did not allow for variances.

Mitchell also told Becker to take his request for a poplar tree screen to the Lincoln Historical Review Board meeting on May 2.

"There's too much government in Lincoln," Becker quipped. "This ordinance has created more problems in some ways and they're going to get worse," Becker added.

Commission Chairman John Hightower told Becker the commis-

sion would not usurp the powers of the historical review board.

"There's no use in coming back here, we're going to enforce the law," Hightower told Becker.

David Lee, Lincoln resident and member of the review board, told the commission and Becker the use of greenery is encouraged and the board is open on how to screen the dishes.

One of Becker arguments was that other residents in the Lincoln zones did not screen the dishes adequately. Commissioner Bill Karn told Becker to bring up the issue at the May 2 meeting.

Mitchell dismissed Becker by telling him, "If you don't resolve this Monday, we'll be in court."

In other business affecting Lincoln, the commission approved amendments to the Lincoln Preservation Ordinance stating gates will be of wood construction and comply in the style of acceptable fences. The other amendment was the deletion of the example of wrought iron fences as acceptable fences.

The commission declared the week of May 6-15 as National Historic Preservation Week in order to carry out national and state reemphasis of the preservation theme in Lincoln County. Commissioner Ralph Dunlap said Lincoln is planning events to celebrate the week.

Also dealing with historical areas, the commission signed a letter of support for the development of a Farm and Ranch Heritage Center at Fort Stanton. Dunlap said the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County met with a group from New Mexico State University recently to tour the Fort Stanton facility. Dunlap said Robert O. Anderson, founder of the Lincoln Heritage Trust, also was present and indicated that the Ranch Center would be located at Fort Stanton.

Dunlap said the center could bring increased tourist dollars to areas in Lincoln County other than Ruidoso.

Hightower emphasized that the hospital facility would not be jeopardized by construction of the center.

In other county business, commissioners:

—Discussed the formation of a personnel ordinance concerning civil rights. Mitchell said the county requested the state Risk Management division send a model copy of such an ordinance but that the county never received one.

Nellie Ruth and Paul have two grandsons: Jim Paul Whipple, and Benjamin Coe Sanchez.



Fearless Ego battled a strong headwind going down the backstretch, and set fractions of :23.1, :47.2, and 1:12.3.


Musco Duck moved strongly midway through the far turn and it appeared that Fearless Ego was going to be passed, but she

The Plant Corner

by Sally Black



Decorating with Plants. Mary, this particular column is for the benefit of those pitiful little plants hanging from the ceiling of your otherwise very pleasant little book store.

Most people, such as it appears you have done, simply collect a few house plants that appeal to them and enjoy their greenery on a convenient table or window sill. But foliage plants in particular offer an opportunity for much more: imaginatively used, they not only create stunning displays, but they can also provide a simple and economical way to solve interior decorating problems. In the severe lookalike interiors of many modern houses and apartments, the varied foliage of house plants adds pattern and color, modifies straight lines and softens harsh contours. In homes of any vintage where the proportions of rooms no longer suit their owners' needs, plants, properly placed, can shape old spaces into new ones. But Mary, never dangle the little pots within a very few inches of the ceiling. First, you cannot get to them for regular watering, cleaning and feeding. Also, as in your case, there is no light.

The many ways in which plants are employed as elements of interior design are made feasible largely by modern lighting techniques, which can keep the plants healthy anywhere in the house. Today it is possible to move plants from their traditional inflexible positions near windows into any corner, even a dark stairway or hall. This very freedom, however, can overwhelm the indoor gardener unless he follows a few basic guidelines:

Scale—First of all, plants should be chosen with an eye to the size and character of the space. A large leaved, fiddle leaved, fig tree would look badly out of place in a small dressing room; conversely, a tiny

lone peperomia might appear lost in a large boldly furnished living room.

Repetition—In groupings of plants, the use of many different plants of different species can lead to a spotty and incoherent effect. Massed plants of the same kind, on the other hand, make a strong impact.

Emphasis—The focus should be on the plant, not the pot. The container design should suit the plant, not fight it; the safest choice is an unadorned pot of a neutral color. I have said before I prefer plastic pots.

None of the above, of course, need to be taken as a hard and fast rule, but each can be put to work in a variety of ways. And each can add greatly to the enjoyment of plants indoors.

It is better to have a few large, spectacular plants than many small ones. Having all large pots can also save time with the care of plants.

Losing a plant is like losing a friend for me. I rarely lose a plant anymore. I seldom replace a plant. Should a plant die, for any reason, I assume the plant did not like the particular location I had selected for it, therefore, I don't try to kill another plant. I go for one which is doing well in that location. I water, feed and otherwise care for my plants on Mondays. Cut the fertilizer to one quarter the manufacturers' recommended amount and use each time of watering. Pick all dead leaves and give a quick spray with a house and garden spray. I love begonias and did my very best to grow one like Mr. Keel's, however, after almost a year, it clearly committed suicide and I will not replace it.

If you have any questions, I have many plant books and will be happy to help you.



HOT PRIMARY ELECTIONS. PART II: SMALLEY'S SUCCESSOR

It's always hard to admit you were wrong. Harder still sometimes, is to admit you were right. Back in January, I wrote, "It is unknown if Ike Smalley will run again." Last month, the senior senator announced he will not be returning to the State Legislature. Monday's column looked at the two Democratic contenders for the seat Smalley held for over 30 years. Senate District 35 includes Sierra, Luna and Hidalgo Counties. But two Republicans also are waging a June primary battle for the Smalley seat. Here's who they are.

H.K. "Mac" McPherson lives in Lordsburg (Hidalgo County). He works for Phelps Dodge in Tyrone. McPherson is the Hidalgo County Republican Party Chairman. He is also on Congressmen Joe Skeen's Military Academy Review Board.

McPherson says State Government "is moving jobs out of the county." The state welfare and unemployment offices are specific cases—"gone to Silver City." Also, the Port of Entry "may go to the Arizona border," he says. Over and over, McPherson underlined the lack of jobs in the district. "The overall economy down here needs a boost." Given the scenic beauty of the area, he sees a better prospect for tourism than for industry.

With McPherson, the job picture colors everything. Welfare reform is a case in point. "If there are no jobs, there is no chance of getting them off welfare." Education, too has its value undercut if employment isn't available.

McPherson is a avid newspaper reader. He subscribes to *The Deming Headlight*, *Lordsburg Liberal*, both the *Herald and Sentinel* in Truth or Consequences, the *Silver City Press*, the *Albuquerque Journal* and the *El Paso Times*. "I sure know what's going on, as far as the papers are concerned."

Even so, "I'm just people," he says. Politicians "get so they are afraid to answer. I'm just open and free. Maybe it's bad for me [politically]."

William E. Cobb of Columbus (Luna County) is McPherson's opponent in the Republican primary. Of his occupation, Cobb says he was a "high volume employer at one time." He also claims to have served as Republican County Chairman on and off since 1948—"in various states."

In 1984, Cobb ran for the Republicans against Ike Smalley. Cobb lost by a big margin, 2,822 votes, and failed to carry any of the three counties in the district. Cobb says he's been "running since 1948...I got elected periodically." However, he didn't identify any office except

"Minority Leader." If so, Legislative Council Service records in the Capitol show it wasn't in New Mexico.

Cobb has "one priority": to "enhance the economic hospitality for employers." He thinks right-to-work is a "secondary enhancement issue." Other elements, such as workman's compensation, are "probably more decisive."

There's no silver bullet to attract industry, Cobb says. Research, vocational training—"all little things" count. "I brought industry into another state that was relatively impoverished," Cobb told me, without identifying which state he assisted.

"I don't mind being misquoted," the comedic Cobb said several times. "My cat's name is Fido. Say anything you want. Usually it's better."

With Smalley out, can a Republican win this Senate seat?

The question is crucial, because the State Senate is presently tied 21-21 between Republicans and Democrats. The party that prevails in the November 1988 elections will be the party that controls Senate reapportionment after the 1990 census is completed.

1984 election results show Luna contained 53% of the district turnout; Hidalgo 16%; and Sierra 30%. In 1985, I was a consultant to Luna County (and also to the City of Deming) for political reapportionment. During that time, I noticed that Luna is very similar to the other 2 counties in its remarkable ability to vote in local elections for Democrats as readily as for Republicans.

In the end, in this highly rural district, the candidates' personal touch—the "Friends and Neighbors Vote"—will make the difference.

The automatic base-vote both political parties can count on simply isn't big enough to do the job.

In 1984, Senate District 35 had 11,138 registered Democrats and 4,860 registered Republicans. The Democrat-to-Republican ratio was 2.29, above the statewide ratio of 1.92.

In 1986, the statewide ratio had fallen to 1.77. Senate District 35, however, didn't join in the pro-Republican trend. That year the district had 11,013 registered Democrats and 4,438 Republicans, for a ratio of 2.28.

Republican prospects may be improving, however. As of March 22, 1988, there were 9,547 Democrats to 4,396 Republicans. The Democrat-to-Republican ratio had dropped to 2.17. This small change could be very important. In 1978, Smalley defeated his Republican opponent, Tommy Perez, by only 332 votes.

Reporter's Round

"Ruidoso, New Mexico— You Haven't Changed a Bit!"

"Can a little mountain village in the West find happiness wedded to a tourist boom?"

Sounds like a timely topic—right? Maybe so, but perhaps it's a timeless topic to those of us living in this little mountain village.

"When west Texans want to enjoy life, they get out of Texas. Where do they go? To neighboring New Mexico."

My friend Robyn found the article quoted above tucked away on page 127 of "Venture, The Traveler's World," August 1964.

"I wondered why Belle (her grandmother) had kept that magazine all those years," remarked Robyn, thumbing through the bound volume filled with stories and descriptions of exotic places throughout the world—from Beirut to South Sea islands. And there it was:

"Ruidoso, New Mexico— You Haven't Changed a Bit!"

Oh, yeah? Listen to what Jack Schaefer, the author of the piece, had to say about Ruidoso:

"Texans have been invading that area, one way or another, for something over a century. Once they came with notions of conquest, but for a long time now they have been intent on nothing more than vacation pleasure. Instead of six-guns they carry well-filled wallets and they take over with typical Texan exuberance. As many a New Mexican, watching the Cadillacs zoom past, has remarked, the Texans certainly know where to find what was left out of their own vast, flat expanse of a state.

"They certainly do. Their latest invasion has transformed a little New Mexican mountain village with the rippling name of Ruidoso into the capital of the most rapidly developing resort area in the Southwest."

Schaefer went on to describe the mountains, valleys, streams, forests and canyons that set Ruidoso apart for its natural beauty. He recalled that 25 years before (that would have been in 1939), The tiny settlement was so isolated that it wasn't even mentioned in New Mexico's state guidebook.

"A mountain empire larger than some Eastern states went on waiting to be discovered—with little Ruidoso smack in the strategic center of it.

"With the advent of World War II and the advent of affluent years, more Texans came, branding the area with their custom of putting small signs by their cabins to proclaim their names and

hometowns; and Texan tourists on their way to other New Mexican attractions took to pulling off U.S. 70 for an overnight stay at Ruidoso. A racetrack—an unusual addition to a mountain area—was built a few miles downriver in a widening of the canyon just below Hollywood. It was called Ruidoso Downs. Guest lodges began to appear in the nearby side canyons. Even so, when the state guide was revised in 1953, Ruidoso and its Downs still did not rate a mention.

Meanwhile, Schaefer continued, Ruidoso got a bank, cabins and motels were built, a private airstrip was added and the racetrack prospered.

"Now, in 1964, the old dirt road is State Route 37 and Ruidoso has grown the only way possible—down the canyon, all the way to U.S. 70 and even down along the road. Real estate offices are as plentiful as pine cones. Last year well over three quarters of a million people visited the area, with Texans leading the tally."

Describing Ruidoso's length, with houses and such hidden by the forest, Schaefer said, "There is neither room nor inclination for the usual humdrum productive activities. A small sawmill is the one industry."

"Modern Ruidoso is a stretched-out string of a fast-growing, up-to-the-minute mountain village, with one excuse for existence, one single purpose: recreation. Catering to the multitudes of outlanders who come in search of recreation, it has become a resort town."

Tourism, even in 1988, still seems to be the only industry we can count on. Various business and economic development groups, as well as assorted politicians and office-seekers, sing a tune of "diversifying the economy," but nobody seems able to add substance to that chorus.

But, back to 1964, Schaefer noted how Ruidoso, perhaps because of its beautiful surroundings, has avoided the "billboard blight, the snake-farm affront, the hamburger joint and the cheap curio shop..." He said Ruidoso lodgings vary from "rustic to ritzy."

Schaefer had a bit to say about the cyclical nature of the tourist economy, tied to racing and ski seasons, but added:

"The real life of the area is out on the green-forested mountains, where the Rio Ruidoso talks to the sun and the stars, where the winds speak through the tall pines, where thinking people slough off some of the sourness of overcrowded civilization and grasp their kinship with the natural universe."

WHEREAS, the governing body of the Village of Ruidoso Downs (the "Village") has previously adopted an ordinance on June 27, 1978 imposing a municipal gross receipts tax at a rate of 1/2% of the taxable gross receipts of persons engaging in business in the Village; its Ordinance No. 81-4, as amended by Ordinance No. 81-6, imposing a municipal gross receipts tax at a rate of 1/4% on taxable gross receipts of persons engaging in business in the Village; and its Ordinance No. 84-10 imposing a municipal gross receipts tax at a rate of 1/4% on taxable gross receipts of persons engaging in business in the Village; and

WHEREAS, the Village has previously adopted its Ordinance No. 84-9 imposing a special municipal gross receipts tax at a rate of 1/2% on taxable gross receipts of persons engaging in business in the Village; and

"Section 14. **Dedication.** A portion of the municipal gross receipts tax is to be dedicated toward a specific purpose of area of municipal government services listed below as to purpose(s) and amount of dedication:

All to payment of debt service, including principal, interest and premium, if any, on revenue bonds issued by the Village of Ruidoso Downs payable from municipal gross receipts tax revenues, and to the extent not necessary therefor, to General Fund."

Section 2. Section 3 of Village Ordinance No. 81-4, as amended by Village Ordinance No. 81-6, be amended to read as follows:

Section 3. Section 4 of Village Ordinance No. 84-10 be amended to read as follows:

"Section 4. **Dedication.** A portion of the revenue derived from the municipal gross receipts tax will be used for the purpose(s) listed below: All to the payment of debt service, including principal, interest and premium, if any, on revenue bonds issued by the Village of Ruidoso Downs payable from municipal gross receipts tax revenues, and to the extent not necessary therefor, to General Fund."

Section 4. Section 4 of Village Ordinance No. 84-9 be amended to read as follows:
