Long-discussed zoning ordinance gets final OK, finally

The Village Council said "no" to more public input before passing a long-awaited zoning ordinance Tuesday.

A group of citizens, expecting a response to objections voiced last week during a public hearing, expressed disappointment when the council didn't respond to their individual concerns. Councillor Jess Stinson noted councillors were, in fact, rejecting those appeals by passing the ordinance as recommended by the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z).

Councillors Elmer Pirelli and J.D. James voted against the

ordinance, after Pirelli said he believed, as did some audience members, that more discussion would be conducted over the objections.

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., asking assistant village attorney Mike Runnels if the public discussion wasn't ended when the ordinance was tabled, noted the ordinance and map have undergone more than 50 hours of hearings. Runnels agreed that discussions were at an end when the proposal was tabled. Davis said anyone with objections can now appear before P&Z.

But several people questioned whether they can appeal the zoning on their neighbors' property to P&Z. Apparently they can, since Mayor Davis said any appeals from

the ordinance as approved will be heard by P&Z.

"The council is making the decision that any fine tuning will be through P&Z," remarked Runnels. No one answered when asked if the substantial fees implemented in the new ordinance will be waived.

Janet Goodwin of Schlotzsky's asked the council to reconsider a section in the new sign ordinance that will abolish billboards over the next five years, but the council adopted the entire package after Mayor Davis put a stop to further discussions.

"We're just rehashing," said Davis, adding all the protesters were heard last week.

Earlier in the meeting, the

council heard an unscheduled case and amended the zoning map to leave an Upper Canyon property commercial. Attorney Robert Beauvais said his clients, Bruce and Robert Gentry, didn't receive notice that their Sleepy Hollow lots would be changed from commercial to residential.

After hearing that a nearly million-dollar sales deal would be jeopardized if the zoning was changed, councillors voted unanimously to leave the lots commercial. Admitting that a residence is on the Upper Canyon commercial lots, Beauvais said the owners have no plans to change the use. He said there is an "intrinsic" value of having property zoned commercial.

"Time is of the essence," said Beauvais, pressing the council to act on his request.

Runnels said many hours were spent by P&Z on the Upper Canyon zoning, adding if neighboring property owners had known of the Gentry's request, they probably would have been at the meeting to push for residential zoning.

Bill Cornelius, who objected last week to rezoning his commercial property residential, complained that the council responded to a request by the Gentrys, but didn't answer his complaint. An audience member commented the million-dollar price tag may have influenced councillors.

Also Tuesday, councillors denied an appeal by attorney Richard

Hawthorne on behalf of Western Sun Corporation.

Hawthorne said planning administrator Cleatus Richards denied his client a business registration to operate a timeshare sales booth next to the Covered Wagon on Sudderth Drive. P&Z upheld his decision.

Hawthorne said he petitioned district court to declare the denial unconstitutional, and was compelled to return to council to exhaust the appeals process before taking the case to court.

"We need relief and we need it now," said Hawthorne, saying his client sold over \$1 million in timeshares through the booth last

Commission passes mil levy

The Board of Lincoln County Commissioners approved the imposition of a one-half mil levy to finance the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County (EDCLC).

At a relatively short meeting Tuesday in Carrizozo, commissioners heard EDCLC Chairman Buddy Bundick report on the positive response from all county municipalities. Approval was unanimous, except for two dissenting votes on the Capitan board of trustees. Those were due to the imposition of the tax and not taken as a negative vote for the organization, Bundick said.

The half-mil levy will impose an

additional 50 cents to each \$1,000 assessed taxable value to the 1988 property taxes, residential and non-residential.

According to the resolution signed by commissioners, the rate and imposition is provided by state statute and authorized for the county for general purposes.

Audience member Karon Petty said less than 6,000 of the 124,000 property owners in Lincoln County are residents. She suggested EDCLC contact non-residential owners for help with the organization.

A budget increase will be made in the county's general fund to accommodate the increase.

Written approval from the New Mexico Department of Finance was given for the interim budget for the

1988-89 year. The approval authorizes the county to start on July 1 with the new budget.

"Commissioners have the responsibility to make the budget fit the money, Suzanne Cox did all the work," said Commission Chairman John Allen Hightower.

Commissioners approved the final budget with amendments made to the computer system line item in the form of a refund and in the Road Department to reflect a payment made on a loader.

In other business commissioners:

—Approved vacation of a portion of Cedar Creek Road on Martha A. Harris' property.

—Approved, upon

Man charged with murder in shooting of his brother

A Ruidoso man is dead, and his brother jailed on an open count of murder, after a shooting Tuesday at 112 Begonia, according to Ruidoso Police reports.

Danny Hutson, 39, was pronounced dead at the scene by Deputy Medical Investigator Jim Stover.

Steven Hutson, 34, was arrested at the home the two apparently unemployed men shared with their mother, Margaret Hutson, said Ruidoso Police Detective Mike Lovelace. He said the suspect remains in Lincoln County Jail with no bond.

Police said Margaret Hutson called at 10:22 a.m. Tuesday, and reported a shooting incident at her home. Ruidoso police officers and Emergency Medical Services personnel responded to the call, and found the victim lying outside the back door of the house at the end of the driveway.

"The victim appeared to be dead," said Lovelace. Stover pronounced Danny Hutson dead at 10:30 a.m., he added.

Steven Hutson exited from the front door of the house, said Lovelace. He was unarmed.

"Statements made by Steve led officers to arrest him," said Lovelace.

Deputy Medical Investigator Dave Pfeffer, who examined the victim at the scene, said Hutson died of an apparent gunshot wound. The body was transported to the state Office of Medical Investigator (OMI) for a complete autopsy.

Lovelace said the OMI called late Wednesday and reported the cause of death was six gunshot wounds to the head.

According to Lovelace, the two men were home alone when the incident occurred. Margaret Hutson was apparently at work, said Lovelace. Police officers questioned neighbors.

Police cordoned off the Begonia Drive home Tuesday, and photographed and videotaped the home and yard. Lovelace said items were picked up to be fingerprinted later, and will be sent to the state crime lab for tests.

Among items taken as evidence at the scene was a .22 caliber revolver, said Chief William

Newman.


The open murder charge against Steve Hutson was approved by Assistant District Attorney Mike McCormick, said Lovelace. The accused is described as 6' 3" tall, weighing 270 pounds. Police said he has brown hair and eyes. His charge was filed in Magistrate Court Division II, Ruidoso.

Magistrate Judge Gerald Dean said the open murder charge is handled as a capital punishment crime with no bond allowed. Dean said the accused, represented by attorneys Sam Westergren and Richie Askew, waived his first appearance hearing.

Dean said the open charge will be amended to a specific charge, and a preliminary hearing will be scheduled. He said Assistant District Attorney Scot Key is out of town until July 5.

The victim was a disabled veteran, and according to Lovelace, had a history of mental illness.

Detective Lovelace said officers have questioned family members and neighbors. He said the homicide is still under investigation.

Plane crash kills pilot

Searchers in the Capitan Mountains brought out the body of Santa Fe pilot John Wilson, 59, about 11 p.m. Wednesday.

According to State Police Officer Steve Standridge, White Mountain Search and Rescue teams and state police searched the Capitan Mountains since Monday for the downed single-engine Piper aircraft. Wilson left Santa Fe Sunday, en route to Midland, Texas. Civil Air Patrol began searching when Wilson did not reach Midland.

The aircraft was sighted about 3 p.m. Wednesday, from the state police helicopter brought from Santa Fe. The crash occurred on the north side of Capitan Gap, at about 7,500 feet, said Standridge.

Fireworks banned most areas

Fireworks are strictly prohibited in the Village of Ruidoso.

"You can't own them, possess them or discharge them," said Chief William Newman, citing a village ordinance.

Ruidoso Police will respond to complaints of fireworks in village limits by locating the offender, confiscating the fireworks and citing the person or persons into court, said Newman.

Fireworks are prohibited throughout the Lincoln National Forest by regulation and a regional forester's order, said Fire Officer Steve Makowski. He said the discharge of fireworks is prohibited on all forest lands in New Mexico and Arizona.

An individual starting a fire can be held liable for damages, suppression costs and citations, said Makowski, noting that fire danger ranges from moderate to high in the Ruidoso area.

State Forester Larry Bandy said a state ordinance prohibits the discharge of fireworks on state lands, as well.

Makowski said anyone setting off fireworks in areas of the county where they are not illegal should exercise considerable caution. He said grass hasn't turned green in many areas.

"If it lights up, it moves pretty fast," said Makowski.

Fireworks also are banned in Capitan and Ruidoso Downs.

summer. He said the company, the only one selling timeshares in Ruidoso this year, also gives away cash and certificates to visitors who spend that money at local businesses.

Timeshare marketer James Collins added his plea to Hawthorne's, showing councillors a petition he said was signed by 40 local merchants who don't object to timeshare booths.

"They've already threatened to sue us no matter what we do here," said Runnels before the councillors unanimously upheld the denial.

In other regular business Tuesday, the council:

—Tabled bids on drying beds for the sewer treatment plant. The seven bids received ranged from \$219,548 to \$512,272. Village engineer Mike Davalos said the two lowest bidders informed him of unit pricing mistakes in their bids.

"If I left that much on the table, I'd try to get out of it, too," remarked Pirelli.

—Directed the village attorney to research right of way on property being developed by John and Hitomi Greening.

—Heard Stinson thank Pirelli and Ruidoso Police Chief William Newman for handing out pins instead of tickets.

—Went into executive session to discuss pending litigation and personnel.

After the closed session, the council reconvened and, according to attorney Runnels:

—appropriated \$10,000 for the Water Defense Association, contingent on participation by other governmental entities;

—directed the attorney to notify Lincoln County Commission that the village expects that body to honor the joint powers agreement over the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport by providing a full accounting of all funds;

—authorized water engineer Jackie Atkins to make the necessary applications with the State Engineer Office regarding credit and pumping at the Grindstone Canyon Dam.

According to Runnels the session dealing with personnel was limited to the mayor and councillors, and no action was taken when the group went back into the open meeting.

Horsemen protest treatment by racing comm.

The leadership tactics of the New Mexico Racing Commission have been likened to the dictatorship of Adolf Hitler.

"We're faced with the situation of Gestapo-type tactics that this commission is using," said a top New Mexico Horsemen's Association official, who requested his name be withheld due to rising tensions between his office and Racing Commission Chairman Harris Hartz.

The horsemen have expressed discontentment with the way the commission has handled drug testing and the withholding of purses.

Ray Reed, executive secretary of the Horsemen's Association, said much of the talk on the "backside" (the area where the trainers and jockeys gather before races) has been that of unfair practices by the

commission.

The biggest topic among the trainers and owners, Reed said, has been the commission's use of retroactive testing of samples.

Gerald Marr, president of the Horsemen's Association, compared the retroactive testing to someone submitting a urine sample for an alcohol test and passing at the time, but having his urine frozen, only to have new technology enable the authorities to find a trace of alcohol in the urine six months later.

"They're not going to come back six months later and punish you," Marr said. "That's just the situation we're in now."

Hartz has been accused by many owners and trainers of holding a vendetta against them in his crusade to "clean up" the horse racing industry in New Mexico.

"These guys are presumed guilty until proven innocent," Marr said, referring to the several trainers

who are currently on suspension.

Reed said horsemen are asking for a list of medications and other substances that the commission has approved, so the men will know what they can and cannot give to their horses.

"Right now, we have no idea what we're going to get nailed for," added a trainer. "We want some guidelines that we can run by."

The horsemen are also concerned about the welfare of Ruidoso if the commission continues with what horsemen call its "strong-arm tactics."

Talk is in the air among the horsemen of not returning to Ruidoso if retroactive testing is not stopped, and purses are not released.

In a pamphlet titled "Vital Statistics About Racing In Ruidoso: Should We Be Concerned About Its Future?" put out by the Horsemen's Association, a graph shows that 53 percent of all horses run on the

track had owners in Texas, six percent were from Oklahoma and 13 percent from mixed states. Only 26 percent of the horses were New Mexico owned.

Reed predicted that this New Mexico minority, coupled with the fact that Texas recently passed a bill allowing pari-mutuel horse racing within the state boundaries, will devastate the racing industry within the state, especially Ruidoso.

"Why should they come here and put up with all this, when they can stay at home and race," he asked.

Leonard May, a Lincoln County native and trainer, commented on the negative impact that the decline of the racing industry in New Mexico will have on Ruidoso.

"They'll just wake up one of these days and wonder what happened," he said.

recommendation of County Treasurer Shirley Goodloe, a \$5 penalty for delinquent taxes for 1988.

—Approved a contract and notification of a grant award from the New Mexico Area Agency on Aging.

—Heard a report on a new computer system. Cox reported the county will keep the new system for 90 days because of the possibility of going to SRA IBM System Model 30, which has more growth capabilities than the one just installed.

—Heard a request for funds from Hubert Quintana on behalf of the Water Defense Association. WDA is involved with a lawsuit against the Mescalero Tribe, who is trying to obtain additional water rights based on a 1852 treaty. Quintana stated WDA needs about \$31,000 to obtain information about 1850s water rights from expert witnesses. Quintana said no funds are available from federal sources.

State Representative Ben Hall, who was present at the meeting, said he spoke with congressmen Skeen and Domenici, and neither could get any funding for the WDA. Hall has helped with funding through the Acequia Bill in the state Legislature.

Quintana appealed to commissioners, saying the case has more hope now than before, because of recent court precedents. He cited a recent Wyoming Supreme Court ruling dealing with a water rights case involving an Indian tribe. The tribe claimed water rights based on the words "permanent homeland" written in a treaty, not an executive order placing them on a reservation 21 years after the treaty.

The court ruled the water rights

were set aside for "future use" on the reservation, as a result of the executive order. The usage was for agriculture.

Quintana claimed the future usage by the local tribe involved in the water rights case would be limited to municipal and domestic. He added the demands would be no where near the amount being sought in the suit.

Commissioners informed Quintana there is no county money left to support the WDA. Hightower also commented the suit would increase the cost of water so drastically, "what's the value of water rights?"

"If you lose everything you have trying to save the water rights, what have you gained?" Hightower questioned.

—Approved a resolution congratulating and thanking all agencies involved in the recent HazMat mock disaster. Cox reported the county received Mass Disaster Certification, the first in the state.

Nancy Guck, Emergency Medical Services coordinator, said the county is deficient in real chemical gear for fire personnel and first responders.

"The volunteers are the backbone of our system," Hightower said.

—Approved closure of county debt service fund 561, established to deal with general obligation bond payments for the north section of the Lincoln County Courthouse. Cox said the courthouse building is paid off now and remaining money, accrued as interest, will be added to the general fund.

—Approved routine payroll and accounts payable.

—Met in executive session with no action taken on litigation and personnel.

Counseling Center is business as usual despite cutbacks

Rumors of the closure of the Mental Health Counseling Center in Ruidoso's Sierra Professional Center are unfounded, said executive director Lorenzo Sanchez.

Cutbacks in some state funds have caused the center to curtail some of its services, Sanchez said. Some of the full-time staff in Ruidoso were laid off, Sanchez continued, but the Alamogordo Mental Health Center staff will cover the Ruidoso office.

"The services will continue with professional counselors in this office," Sanchez emphasized.

Dr. Michael Hickey, center

psychiatrist from Alamogordo, will continue to serve the Ruidoso office, Sanchez said.

The Ruidoso office will continue with the same business hours, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday, with counselors in the office everyday.

Sanchez requests those needing to speak with a counselor call 257-5038, for an appointment, but he says they will take walk-ins. For hours when the office is closed, anyone in crisis can call the Help-line at 437-8680. The number can be called collect, with the caller insisting their need, Sanchez said.

The Help-line is staffed 24-hours, daily.

The center offers counseling in mental health for individuals, family and marital and group therapy for individuals or families.

Alcohol counseling still will be available with Paul Gallegos. Sanchez said Gallegos will continue as a full-time counselor in Lincoln County. Four days a week Gallegos will be in the Ruidoso office, and on Thursdays in Carrizozo, at the Social Services office in the courthouse.

The center offers alcohol counseling to individuals, families

and group therapy. Sanchez said there is more emphasis on group therapy as its effectiveness in treating alcoholism has been proven.

Other services offered through the center are parenting classes, as needed, education classes in the schools and education classes to community groups.

Sanchez said all the counselors are bilingual.

Fees are charged on a sliding scale, based on the individual's ability to pay. Sanchez added those who cannot pay will not be charged for the center's services.

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
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
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Obituaries

Birthday of Our Mother

During the services in the little stone church for Jo Maria, I felt the spirit of our Mother, visiting us from Heaven, and felt how she shared our joy at the tiny new member in Saint Anne's Church, which was one of the dearest treasures of our Mother's heart.

She was one of the earliest members, and for many years played the organ for the services.

Bertha Kennedy Storm was born July two in Coulterville, Illinois, to John Calvin Kennedy and Catherine Cannon Kennedy. As a small child she was taken to Denver, Colorado, where she went to East Denver High School, where she met her husband-to-be, Lynn Whippo Storm. They were married in Denver on May thirty-one, 1906.

Our Father became a mining engineer and went to Alaska about 1907. Mother had played the pipe organ in the historic Presbyterian Church that still stands on the Capitol grounds in Denver, since her girlhood.

In January, 1909, she sailed on the steamship, Yucatan, to Valdez, Alaska, accompanied by her first child, John, age one and one-half. Along with them they brought a little Mason and Hamlin pump organ, which stood about three feet high, when taken out of its box, and the legs folded up into place.

On this organ mother played and sang hymns, also playing at the little Valdez Episcopal Church on Sundays.

In our travels, twice to Alaska, Oregon and Old Mexico this organ made the trips with us. On the back of a pack mule it was carried to a distant high mountain outpost in Sinaloa, Mexico. Here Mother played and we sang the hymns, the voices and music sounding Heavenly sweet, such a long way out in the wilderness. In other isolated spots in our travels the sacred music was brought into our home by Mother's music and voice.

In 1926, our second trip up here, in our 1917 Velie Automobile, we broke down when we arrived in Mescalero at the first day of the four day celebration, on July two, Mother's birthday. Here we stayed all four days.

We feasted on barbecue beef, coffee, and Indian bread, and also on cream puffs, marshmallows, pineapple, pie, cake, ice cream and every kind of good food you could imagine.


Everything was free. The hospitality, friendship and goodwill of the Indians was one of the highlights in the life of the Storm family. The nighttime ritual dances and the all night chants, sounding like voices from an ancestral spirit world, left an impression of wonder and admiration that will last forever.

After the Fourth of July celebration we came on down to the place here and Mother said, "I have traveled over half the world and this is the place I have been looking for all my life."

The well-traveled pump organ has an honored place in the home of brother Lynn and his wife, Maxine, in Dripping Springs, Texas.

At the approach of our mother's birthday, I can hear organ music and her voice, playing and singing the precious and sacred hymns; and I feel her blessed spirit visiting me with fond love from Heaven.

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Signs of the past surface at archaeological dig

The old shaman peeked out of the smoke-hole in the roof of the kiva to view the great mountain upriver. The clouds were forming, the rains would come, relieving the workers from their exhausting chore of carrying water from the river in their heavy black on white pots.

Suddenly it rains, the people in the plaza stop their daily chores and hurry to their small adobe and rock homes.

The storm is over, everyone returns to their work on the plaza; men chipping stones to make tools and hunting implements, women making pottery, the clay carried from secret pockets along the river and from a cave.

The shaman looks downriver, he will make the journey to the sacred cave the next day, to coincide with the longest day of the year. The cave is sacred, more important than his kiva, which is large for the small village of 45 people.

But in the cave, the inner sanctum altar is marked with white lines, the feathers and precious beads only to be viewed and touched by the most holy of the old shamans.

He will mark his passage on the huge rock so unmoving in the river as he journeys to the cave, it will take him the entire day, if he leaves as the holy sun rises. He will pray, especially for the rain that has been so sparse this season. If no rain comes, the village will move to a higher, wetter place where the maize will grow without the labor of the water bearers.

The above is just conjecture, a bit of imagination based on the beginning of an archaeological dig by students at Eastern New Mexico

University in Portales.

Professor Phil Shelly and his crew are exploring public lands to discover some of the ancient prehistory of this area. The crew has spent six weeks, surveying and mapping different areas along the Rio Bonito to determine the number and quality of prehistoric settlements.

Shelly claims no severe drought affected the Bonito drainage as no present deep gullies or ancient filled gullies are present along the river. Deep gullies are a result of the loss of groundcover, such as grasses, during drought times followed by heavy downpours that cut through the unprotected soil.

There is evidence the settlements along the Bonito were of Mogollon culture, Shelly said. A village, complete with kiva and pueblo-like structures, was found by studying aerial photographs and the ground surface for pot shards.

When pottery shards are discovered the crew begins to

survey and map the area. Shelly said his crew spent much of their six weeks surveying and mapping the possible sites within the Bureau of Land Management lands.

Shelly said he began working with the BLM about three years ago establishing a multi-endeavor plan for archaeology studies in the recreation area to ensure the prehistoric sites would be protected as development occurs. The project was funded jointly by the BLM and ENMU.

Shelly said he will employ various methods to reconstruct the environment during the village's occupation. One way is to find ancient pack rat nests that contain materials from the suspected era of the village. Another is to microscopically study ancient pollen grains to determine what plants were growing. From the style of decoration on pot shards and other artifacts found, Shelly estimated the village was inhabited

until the 1900s.

Three sites were explored and each had a different era for inhabitation. The most ancient had few remnants, the middle site had evidence of a kiva, plaza and above ground adobe and mud structures, the latest was a well-defined village with a tight block of apartment-type rock structures built around a central plaza. The two latest sites were looted by pot-hunters in the past, one extensively, with ancient sites nearby badly vandalized, Shelly said.

A cave with an intact inner sanctum (altar) was completely ruined by vandals, Shelly added. The cave was filmed by two amateur spelunkers in the 1950s," Shelly began the mystery.

"They were the Carrillo brothers that lived in Roswell," Shelly added. The brothers entered the dry cave and filmed the intact inner sanctum with an eight millimeter movie camera, but the film was never reproduced and remains in

one of the Carrillo brothers' possession.

"We're looking for the Carrillo brothers to videotape the film."

The brothers are reported to live separately now, both in their 80s; one in Roswell and the other in Datil, west of Magdalena. Shelly asks for anyone knowing the brothers' whereabouts to contact him at the Anthropology Department at ENMU.

The inner sanctum was completely looted sometime in the early 1960s, Shelly commented. The artifacts taken for a quick profit can never be replaced, nor their historic value, had a trained team found the site first.

Shelly emphasized the problem of pot-hunting takes away the legacy of the ancient people from the public and places it in the hands of those who can afford the artifacts. Pot shards, arrowheads and artifacts found on the surface are clues to human inhabitation,

and indicators to trained eyes where to begin looking for more evidence of human life.

Much of the work in the field is dirty, moving earth by shovelful, sifting all of it, carefully cleaning around all artifacts, including charcoal. Then everything is labeled and taken to the lab for more analysis.

At the lab, shards are cleaned, identified and labeled. Any other unusual items are labeled for study later. Shelly says most of his intensive analysis will be done in his fall ENMU class.

But for now, the crew prepares to leave for the summer. All the sites will be covered, having been surveyed and mapped. All their samples have been labeled and stored into boxes, ready for transport.

"We'll be back next year," Shelly smiled.

And the ghosts will stay behind.

The Plant Corner

Air layering plants.

Many of you have asked me how this process is done. So let's all start a new plant today, especially you school children. This is a fun project to beautify your rooms or to give as Christmas gifts and the cost is minimal.

All you will need is; lots of

patience not to peek inside the little package on the stem once it is all tied up, sterilized sphagnum moss, plant hormone powder, sharp knife, twist-ems and some clear plastic wrap.

Although many plants are easy to grow from cuttings, large-leaved types such as Rubber Tree Plants,

Scheffleras or the Split-leaf Philodendron lose so much moisture from their leaf surfaces that they would wilt before roots could form. Yet, even these plants can be multiplied by inducing roots to grow on the stem by air layering. The trick is to start the rooting process on stems that remain attached to the mother plant. The method is an ancient form of plant propagation known as air layering or Chinese layering. Other plants that may be started by air layering are; Azaleas, gardenias, Ficus Benjaminas, Indian Laurels, Camilias and hibiscus, just to name a few. I have done the Ficus tree and found it does best if you locate the "cut" where the "hardwood"

stops and the "softwood" begins.

To use this method, choose a healthy, sizable stem near the top of the plant, use a sharp knife or single edged razor blade, make an upward-slanting cut one-third to one-half way through the stem and insert a wooden match stick in the cut to hold it open. Next, the open cut is dusted with rooting-hormone powder and wrapped in an tightly-bound bundle of moist, pre-soaked, sphagnum moss about as big as a baseball. The moss ball in turn is bound in ordinary clear plastic wrap to retain the moisture. Here is where you will need patience. Do not open the plastic ball, should you open to peek, the moisture

would escape, thus the project doomed.

After two or three months, roots can be seen under the clear plastic, working their way through. If droplets of water quit forming inside the plastic covering, then you may need to open only the top and pour a little tepid water over the moss and promptly tie up again.

When the roots are plentiful, the plastic can be removed. Cut just below the new roots and plant, moss and all, being very careful not to disturb the roots. In the already prepared pot, plant in the type of potting mixture recommended for the species. Be sure to use the right

size pot. A good rule of thumb is never put a new plant in a pot over one-third the height of the plant and never wider than one-half larger than the rootball. This should keep the air and water in the proper balance.

Good luck and let me hear the results of your efforts. Not to worry about the mother plant, should no roots form, the branch will callus where it was cut and new bark will eventually grow over the cut area. Don't give up, just move up or down the stem and try, try again.

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

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

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

Margaret Rench: a positive attitude

If hard work adds years to one's life, then longtime Capitan resident Margaret Rench fits the bill. Today is Margaret's 86th birthday and as a birthday wish, I offer this look at Capitan's Grand Lady of the news. She was born June 30, 1902, in Bancroft, Nebraska, to Mr. and Mrs. William Sharp. She also has two brothers, Harry and William Sharp, who are still living, in California. Margaret's early life was hard. She left home at 16 and toiled long, hard hours. At 19, she married her first husband, Earl B. Roundtree, in 1920. Her first son, Boise E. Roundtree, was born October 16, 1921, and the second, Roland B. Roundtree, was born July 13, 1923. Both sons are deceased. Boise died in 1975 and Roland in 1955. Margaret and Earl moved to New Mexico and settled on the Lovelace Ranch near Corona in 1925. In 1930, they moved to Capitan. They soon purchased property where the Capitan Mart, El Paisano Restaurant, her house and the vacant lot east of it are currently located. Before Capitan incorporated in 1898, the property was used as a dump for the coal mines in the now-extinct town of Coalara, which was about two miles west of the village. "There was nothing on this side of town," Margaret remembered. "Highway 380 didn't exist then, so we started to develop this end of town." In 1934, Earl died. Margaret, who was not one to stop in the face of adversity, realized she had to create a business to make a living for herself and her two young sons.

So she made adobes and used old lumber from the cabins at Bonito Dam to erect a service station and cafe. This building still stands and is currently El Paisano Beauty Shop, owned and operated by Barbara Sanchez of Capitan. She also built five small cabins. With these businesses she struggled to pay large medical bills and to raise her family. Both boys attended Capitan schools. Margaret has been a jack-of-all trades. Since 1936 she has been a voter sub-registrar for Lincoln County, a secretary for the county treasurer, served on the Capitan Chamber of Commerce, a cafeteria cook for Capitan and Lincoln schools, operator of a home laundry service and an assistant to Dr. D'Elia of Ruidoso for 16 years until D'Elia's death in 1986. But her most obvious and long-time jobs have been her 43 years as an Avon representative and her 33 years as a correspondent for the Lincoln County News. Margaret was alone until 1942 when she met her second husband, Joseph Rench. They helped Capitan grow. With donated help and materials, Margaret and other members of the community built the little log cabin that is now the Smokey Bear Museum. Joe served as mayor from 1958 but died in 1960, during the time of construction. Margaret, one hard to keep down, kept going—hauling rock from Corona to finish the fireplace in the cabin which is still used today. "The cabin was built in Joe's honor," Margaret said. Margaret has written a column for 33 years for the Lincoln County News and still goes about on Monday, checking with her contacts,

looking for news. She also delivers papers every Thursday. "I was selling Avon when the paper asked me to write a Capitan column. Well, I learned to type in 1943 and I liked it. I love the paper and my community loves it," she commented. Television is her favorite thing, next to her animals and plants. She says she can travel where she could never before and it's a lot cheaper. She thinks the news is great and the change of times is fascinating. Hats off to this wonderful lady of 86 years, striving to live to at least 90. "A positive attitude," is her answer to her long life. "I love everybody here and I love this locality," she said. Of her news she said "I want God's love to shine through." She is still self-sufficient, sharp minded with lots of memories of Capitan's early days. And she wants to see Capitan grow and prosper.

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Building permits rebound during May

Village construction soared to over the half-million-dollar mark in May.

After a slump in April, village building recovered last month when the Building Inspection Department issued 25 permits in all categories with a valuation of \$508,933.

In April, permits numbered just 14, worth \$126,606; and in May 1987, the village saw 28 permits issued with a total value of \$456,367.

Five new single family dwelling permits were recorded, worth \$376,971; bringing the year-to-date on new homes to 18 at \$1,294,153. That's up from April's one new home valued at \$29,631; and from May 1987, when four new residences were started with a total price tag of \$261,898.

Remodeling permits continued to lead building projects with 17 residential addition/alteration permits issued in May with a value of \$127,478. In April, 11 residential redo permits worth \$70,976 were issued, and in May 1987 the village recorded 15 home remodeling permits valued at \$132,733.

No new commercial building permits were issued in May 1988, or in May 1987. The one new commercial permit issued in April for \$18,000 is the only one in that category this year.

One commercial remodeling permit was issued in May with a value of \$200. In April the one commercial redo permit issued was valued at \$2,000. Last year, in May 1987, the village issued eight commercial fix-up permits with a total dollar value of \$60,235.

The Building Inspection Department issued two foundation permits in May, worth \$5,284.

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



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

EDITORIAL

Fireworks are illegal in most areas of the county, with all fireworks prohibited on National Forest lands, state land, the Village of Ruidoso, the Village of Capitan and the Village of Ruidoso Downs. Instead, plan to attend one of the controlled, public displays of fireworks that will be put on around the area. The event will be in the Fort Stanton ballpark.

Spectacular aerial fireworks also can be seen in nearby Alamogordo on July 4, where an impressive show of pyrotechnics is a yearly tradition. Be at or near the Space Center long before the 9:10 p.m. beginning to be sure you'll have a good vantage point at the popular event.

Whether Fort Stanton or Alamogordo appeals to your fireworks appetite, or perhaps just staying home for a barbecue is your way to mark the Fourth, celebrate Independence Day with common sense ... and leave the fireworks to the experts.-DJP

Eye On The Capitol

fore 1964 only Missouri featured judicial retention elections for major trial court judges, and then in only two of the state's 114 counties. First used in 1942, fewer than 60 major trial court retention elections were held in Missouri between 1942 and 1962." The idea of retention elections was first proposed in 1914. It was part of the turn-of-the-century reform movement.

"New Mexico Judges: Finding the Merit in 'Merit Selection'"

"Judges' Jobs Guaranteed For Life." You'd be dismayed, if you read that headline.

Yet there could be lifetime jobs waiting for New Mexico judges just around the corner.

And if the voter opinion polls are right, you'll be voting in favor of them.

The controversial measure will be on the November ballot. Proposed Constitutional Amendment #6 is usually called the "merit selection" of judges. Opponents of the measure say that's nothing but a euphemism for job security.

Presently, New Mexico judges are elected in partisan political elections. One example: In the Democratic primary of June 7, voters picked Joseph Baca to be their party's candidate for Supreme Court Justice.

Also, both parties picked a slew of nominees for the 70-plus district court judges.

The so-called merit selection amendment would not change the partisan political picture—at least, for a judge's first run for office. "Thereafter," the amendment asserts, "each such justice or judge shall be subject to retention or rejection on a nonpartisan ballot."

A KOAT-Zia Research Associates poll conducted April 27-May 2 of 600 likely primary voters showed 60% is high enough to pass the measure in November.

On January 21, ye challenged amendment supporters to answer this question: "What is the history of 'retention' elections [in other states]? How many judges actually have been tossed out of office?"

As of June 9, there was no answer.

Maybe, this is why.

Judicature, the journal of the American Judicature Society, published an article by William Hall and Larry Aspin, "What Twenty Years of Judicial Retention Elections Have Told Us." (Volume 70, Number 6, April-May, 1987). The authors examined 1,874 retention elections at the major trial court level from 1964-1984, in 10 of the 14 states that have retention elections (Alaska, Arizona, Colorado, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska and Wyoming).

The study's conclusions are disturbing:

"First, those who maintain that retention elections serve to insulate judges from popular control seem to be correct. Only 22 judges (1.2 per cent) were defeated in retention bids... Only 45 judges (including the 22 defeated judges) polled less than 60 per cent affirmative votes."

Actually, the casualty list is even shorter than 22. "9 of the 10 defeated judges in Illinois would still be on the bench, but for Illinois having a 60 per cent minimum in-

stead of the 50 per cent minimum affirmative vote used in all other states."

Critics of retention elections say the problem is that because there's no living, quarreling human opponent in a retention election, the public is denied "an effective choice."

"*Second, judicial retention elections are generally characterized by low voter turnout. We found that at least one-third of the voters passed up the opportunity to vote in retention elections."

Low voter participation is related to the lack of an opposition candidate: "Some [voters] do not vote because the mechanism is non-competitive and there is no choice."

"*Third, judicial retention elections fail to provide cues to help voters in the voting booth."

Party labels are the most important of the missing cues. So are confrontational campaigns, which provide information to the voters and grab their attention.

Bar association ratings would be helpful, but apparently nothing of the sort would accompany retention elections in New Mexico. The 1982 merit selection amendment would have printed Judicial Standards Commission recommendations next to retention candidates' names on the ballot. That amendment failed, however, and the recommendations provision is not included in the 1988 measure.

In the vast majority of retention elections, then, with neither party labels nor controversy, nor professional associations' ratings to help the voter make up his/her mind, how is the decision made?

Basically, on how much a person trusts government in general. The authors found a statistically-significant relationship between changes in approval votes in retention elections and changes in overall "political trust."

22 out of 1,874: That's the evidence from other states. Has the jury reached a verdict? Yes, Your Honors. Retention elections, it turns out, are only too well named.

The Hall/Aspin article noted that Illinois and Pennsylvania "coupled in an 'incongruous joiner' the retention election part of the merit selection plan with partisan elections for the initial selection of trial court judges." It appears, then, that if Constitutional Amendment #6 passes, New Mexico wouldn't be alone in requiring an initial partisan election.

Idaho, Montana and Utah have "qualified" retention elections. "That is, if a sitting judge is challenged, a nonpartisan election between the incumbent and the challenger is held. Only if unchallenged does a judge stand in an uncontested retention election."

Of the history of retention elections, the authors wrote that "be-


tracks are lined with tires as bumpers. Rates are \$2.50 per ride.

Family owned and operated by Ray Eidson, Fun Trackers is open daily from Spring Break until Labor Day, then weekends until inclement weather in the fall.



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


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

Shift into free-wheeling fun with ATVs

Some area visitors may take to the hills on all-terrain vehicles (ATVs) this summer.

Mine Canyon, located off Carrizo Canyon Road behind Rainbow Lake, is an area designated by the U.S. Forest Service for ATV use. According to a spokesman for the Forest Service, areas where ATVs are permitted are signed.

If a trail is not designated by a USFS sign that ATV riding is permitted, then it is prohibited.

A map is on display at the Smokey Bear Ranger Station, showing where designated trails are located. In New Mexico it is against the law to operate ATVs on public streets, according to Ruidoso Police. Jeremy Taylor of JT Yamaha said the Mine Canyon area is clearly marked and fenced on two and a half sides with a mountain on the back side.

"It's a really nice area," said Taylor, noting the canyon includes a whole maze of trails. He said families often take their ATVs into the canyon to spend the day riding and picnicking.

The three- and four-wheeled vehicles are for sale and for rent in Ruidoso. Taylor sells ATVs at his store at the corner of Sudderth and Mechem drives; and Terry Whitaker of Ruidoso Rent-all has several ATVs for lease at his business at 1109 Mechem Drive.

Some visitors will bring their own vehicles for free-wheeling, since some will fit into the back of a station wagon, and most will fit into the back of a pick-up. Taylor cautions anyone planning to ride an ATV in the forest that a spark arrester is required.

The rental vehicles are available by the hour or by the day, and Whitaker said he delivers them to Mine Canyon, and then returns to pick them up. He also delivers helmets for the riders to wear.

Taylor said when someone visits his shop to buy a new or used ATV, he first tries to determine how the vehicle will be used, who and how many people will be using it.

"An ATV is a family vehicle," remarked Taylor, adding that research

has shown that 3.3 people use each ATV. He said he tries to guide purchasers to the model that will best fit their needs—from recreation to sport to utility.

"They're more than just a toy," said Taylor, noting that even recreation ATVs are not intended for use by children.

Both Taylor and Whitaker stress to their customers the importance of wearing a safety helmet and following safety precautions.

A manual provided by Taylor lists the following safety recommendations:

—Beginning and inexperienced drivers should complete a certified

training course. For more information on training call 1-800-852-5344.

—A child under 16 should never operate an ATV without adult supervision.

—Never carry a passenger. The long seat is to allow the operator to shift position, not for carrying passengers.

—ATV tires are designed for off-road use. Never operate on paved surfaces, including sidewalks, driveways, parking lots and streets. In New Mexico, ATVs are not allowed on public streets.

—Always wear an approved motorcycle helmet and protective clothing. That includes eye protection, gloves, boots, long-sleeved shirt or jacket and

long pants.

—Never consume alcohol or drugs before or while driving an ATV.

—Do not drive at excessive speeds for the terrain, visibility and operating conditions, and your experience.

—Never attempt stunts, such as wheelies or jumps. Don't try to show off.

—Always keep both hands on the handlebars and both feet on the foot-pegs during operation.

Operated correctly, ATVs can be an enjoyable part of the recreation picture in Lincoln County.

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
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Step right up: Hiking trails abound

If hiking is your bag, the Smokey Bear Ranger District of the Lincoln National Forest can accommodate you.

The White Mountain Wilderness contains 48,143 acres and lies entirely within the Smokey Bear District. As with all wilderness areas, travel is by foot and horseback only; no motorized vehicles or equipment of any kind is allowed. Wilderness entry permits are not required at this time.

The wilderness is 12.5 miles long and ranges from four to 12 miles wide. The west boundary is the National Forest boundary, while the south boundary borders the Mescalero Apache Reservation. The wilderness consists mainly of a long, northerly running ridge and its branches. The west side of this ridge is steep and extremely rugged with many extensive rock outcroppings while the eastern side is more gentle

with broader, forested canyons and a few tiny streams.

With nearly 175 miles of non-motorized trails within a 20 mile radius of Ruidoso, the Forest Service can provide even the most avid hiker with a challenging adventure.

Short trails for the day hiker or weekender are also available, with many of the trails making loops, enabling the day or weekend hiker to return to their origin easily.

Thom Heller, with the Smokey Bear District, said the most heavily used campgrounds, and hiking basecamps are in the Bonito Area, Three Rivers and at the Ski Area. Pine Lodge in the Capitan Mountains is also very popular.

The trails in the White Mountain Wilderness range in length of six-tenths of a mile to 21.7 miles long. Elevations range from a low of 6,500 feet at Three

Rivers Campground on the west side to a high of 11,580 feet near Lookout Mountain on the south.

Major access points to the wilderness are:

—1) Three Rivers Campground on

the west side via Trail #44 Three Rivers —2) Ski Apache ski area on the southeast side via Trails #78 Lookout and #15 Scenic.

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

—3) South Fork Campground via Trail #19 South Fork to #25 Crest Trail

—4) Argentina Canyon via Trails #36 Bonita and #38 Argentina

—5) Nogal Canyon via Forest Service Road #108 and the Crest Trail #25

Summer weather in the wilderness is generally moderate in the lower elevations, while a light jacket may be required in the higher elevations even during the day.

July and August are the rainy

months of the year, with frequent afternoon showers, so it is advisable to pack a raincoat or poncho.

For the camera buffs, there is plenty of scenery and wildlife to be found in the wilderness around Ruidoso. Abrupt changes in elevation, escarpments, rock outcrops and avalanche chutes make for striking contrast and scenery. Big game species in the area include mule deer, elk, black bear and turkey. Porcupines, badgers, bobcats, gray fox, coyotes, skunks, spruce and rock squirrels and

numerous species of mice, voles and rats are plentiful.

Bird watchers can also get an eyeful with the five species of birds that have crucial habitats within the wilderness, mainly within the spruce-fir life zone.

The species include the Northern Three-toed Woodpecker, Clark Nutcracker, Red-breasted Nuthatch, Townsend's Solitaire and the Golden-

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

crowned Kinglet.

The Forest Service offers the following tips for wilderness visitors:

—Always carry a map and keep yourself oriented.

—Inform a responsible person of your plans and when you plan to return.

—Pack out all of the trash, never bury it.

—Be careful with fire. Check with the ranger station in Ruidoso for fire restriction information.

—Do not cut any live or standing trees. Use only dead wood and down wood for firewood.

—Do not leave fire rings and try to destroy evidence of your campfire by carefully scattering dead ashes and any unburned wood.

—Avoid use of "beaten out" campsites to allow them to recover.

—Keep sanitation facilities away from streams and cover them adequately before leaving.

—Use a campsite inside the treeline without clearing the ground vegetation. These areas are much more durable than meadows or open country.

—Always be sure to carry plenty of water while hiking in the wilderness. If it is necessary to drink mountain stream water, be sure to treat with chlorine tablets before drinking.

The Forest Service also warns people to look out for what they refer to as "The Big Three":

—1) Water - always treat your water in the wilderness as a preventive measure against bacteria that may live in the streams and lakes.

—2) Lightning - New Mexico has the highest amount of deaths and injuries due to lightning in the nation, especially in the higher elevations. If you are caught in an electrical storm in the wilderness, try to stay away from trees and get to a clearing. Stay low.

—3) Respect - The Forest Service asks that everyone using the wilderness treat it with due care and respect. Control litter and always use established trails when possible.

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
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

Racetrack runs into big summer fun

The American quarter horse has been billed as a popular pleasure horse but at Ruidoso Downs Race Track, the quarter horse is big business.

Fans throughout the Southwest come to Ruidoso Downs to see the quarter horses and now the thoroughbreds run on the newly expanded tracks.

Racing continues through Labor Day, Monday, September 5, with the spectacular finale, the All-American Futurity, billed as the richest quarter horse race in America.

Post time is 12:30 p.m. but the parking gates open to the public at 9:30 a.m. and the grandstand opens at 11 a.m.

The general parking fee is \$1, valet parking is \$3, \$2 with select stickers. General admission is \$2. Admission to the All-American Turf Club is \$8.50 per person (general admission included) each race day. No children under 14 years old are allowed in the Turf Club. No shorts are allowed either.

A grandstand table, which seats four, is \$20 each race day. Grandstand boxes, which seat four, are \$22 each race day. Grandstand bucket seats are \$3.50 per seat each race day. Open air seating is \$2.50 per seat each race day.

Beginning today (Thursday, June 30), the horses run for five straight days with the Rainbow Derby on Sunday, July 3, the highlight of the weekend. The Derby features a 440-yard race for three-year-olds with an estimated purse of \$600,000. Also, on Sunday, three-year-old and older fillies and mares will run the six-furlong First Lady Handicap, with \$10,000 added to the purse.

The big race on July 4 is the Governor's Handicap, a seven furlong race for three-year-olds and older. The \$20,000 added purse plus \$2,000 Breeders' Cup Premium Awards will go to the winners of the race.

The next major race is the Rainbow Futurity, Sunday, July 17. The race features two-year-old quarterhorses in a 400-yard race with an estimated \$700,000 purse. Saturday, July 23, is the Kachina Stakes, a six furlong race for two-year-olds. The purse is estimated at \$60,000.

The World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic is Sunday, July 24, a 440-

yard race for three-year-olds and older with an estimated \$100,000 purse.

Racing continues every weekend through July and August with the next major race on Sunday, August 21, with the All American Gold Cup. The Gold Cup is a 440-yard race for four-year-olds with an estimated purse of \$400,000.

Sunday, August 28, is the All American Derby, a 440-yard race for three-year-olds with an estimated \$1,300,000 purse.

The big weekend of the racing season begins Thursday, September 1, with the Road Runner Handicap, a six furlong race for three-year-olds. Friday, September 2, is the Brigand Handicap. Saturday, September 3, is the third con-

solation of the All American Futurity, a 440-yard race for two-year-olds. Later that day is the Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity, a six furlong race for two-year-olds with an estimated \$140,000 purse.

The second consolation race of the All American Futurity is Sunday, September 4. Later that day is the Ruidoso Mile Handicap, a one mile race for three-year-olds and older with \$30,000 guaranteed plus \$4,000 Breeders' Cup Premium Awards. Also that Sunday is the Higheasterjet Handicap, a 350 yard race for three-year-olds and older.

The first consolation race of the All American Futurity is run Monday, September 5, and the grand finale is later that day with the All American

Futurity, the 440-yard race for two-year-olds with the \$2,530,000 purse.

Two other races, the Ruidoso 550 Championship Handicap for three-year-olds and older and the Countess Blade Handicap, a thoroughbred race for three-year-olds, finish the 1988 racing season on Monday, September 5.

To get in on the action, call for seating reservations at 378-4140 or 800-622-6023 on non-race days from 9 a.m. to 12 noon and from 1-4 p.m.; on race days from 8:30-10:30 a.m. For Jockey Club information call 378-4446. 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


Holiday also has a video arcade and soda machine.

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
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A tale of trail rides

With her blonde hair blowing in the gentle mountain-top breeze, she looks around, puts her nose into the air, takes a deep breath and says, "I love to come up here, especially when it's raining. It's so beautiful."

With that, she guides Speck, her brown and white filly, to the other side of the mountain.

"If you'll look through the trees there, you can see the ski area," she says with the experience of an oldtimer. "Over there you can see the Grindstone Dam, and off to your right you can see the golf course."

Danielle Townshend, 13, is the head wrangler for Grindstone stables, located one-half mile off Carrizo Canyon Road. Just follow the signs, you can't miss it.

With a stable of 18 horses, Grindstone offers one and two hour rides for \$8 an hour. Young children can ride double for only \$2 extra per hour.

The stables are run by Danielle's father, James Townshend, who gets a lot of help from his other three children: Tara, 8, Matthew, 6 and Jesse, 4.

The one hour trail winds up to the top of a ridge overlooking Ruidoso, past an old plane crash, along the bottom of Grindstone Dam and through a beautiful grassy meadow.

At all of the stables in this area, the experienced wranglers rely mainly on the tips they receive, so a healthy gratitude is appreciated.

Other stables in the area are:

—Eagle Creek stables, located two miles up Ski Run Road, offers a stable of about 30 horses, some of whom are former race horses.

"They're well bred and fat," said owner Bill Barnard. "We've got the best kid horses in the country."

Barnard and his five wranglers maintain several miles of trails which offer scenic views of Sierra Blanca and surrounding valleys.

Riders can rent the horses for \$8 an hour, with the second hour an additional \$7. Young children can share a horse for \$4 per hour.

Eagle Creek is open every day from 8 a.m. till 6 p.m.

—Cowboy's Riding stables, located on Highway 70 East, about one-half mile west of the race track offers scenic views of Sierra Blanca and Capitan Mountain.

Cowboy Scrimshire has owned the stables for 23 years and said riders during the day may be able to see a race at the track during race days.

Scrimshire said he offers one, two and three hour trail rides, and will provide a guide for all day rides.

Moonlight rides will be available soon, Scrimshire said, adding that the rides will include a two to two and a half hour ride out, dinner in the country and a return ride. The rides will probably be on a Wednesday or Friday night. Anyone interested should stop by the stables for more information.

—Buddie's stables, on the Gavilan Canyon road, about one-half mile south

of the high school turn-off, offers a stable of 20 horses.

From the scenic trails, one can take in beautiful views of Ruidoso and the surrounding area, including Sierra Blanca and Capitan Mountain.

Rates are \$7 per hour, and there is no extra charge for little ones to ride double.

Special rates are available for large groups.

Buddie's offers a special Wednesday night ride, with the group heading out for two hours and finishing up with a chuckwagon dinner. The cost is \$15, which includes horse rental and dinner, and reservations are requested.

Call 258-4027 for reservations or more information.

—Bonito Stables, owned by the Runnels family, is located about three miles above Bonito Lake and offers one of the most beautiful and scenic rides in the Ruidoso area.

With access to over 75 mountain trails, the Runnels can provide a guide for the inexperienced rider, or riders can go out on their own for only \$6 per hour, \$20 for a half day and \$30 for a full day.

With a stable of about 50 horses, the Runnels are able to accommodate most size groups, but large groups are encouraged to call ahead so they can have the horses ready upon arrival.

Robert Runnels, manager of the stables, said with a day or two of notice, he and his wranglers can provide a guide service to some of the best fishing country in the White Mountain Wilderness.

"We just take a frying pan and some corn meal and cook what we catch right there," he said.

He added that the cost for the guide service depends on the size of the group and the length of the trip, but that it doesn't usually run much more than the actual cost of the rental of the horses. Anyone interested in an overnight pack or fishing trip can call Robert Runnels in Capitan at 354-2778 or Arvel Runnels in Ruidoso at 258-3495.

Runnels added that the Bonito Stables are open year around, and the Runnels' Outfitter Guide Service can help in planning and outfitting a bear, deer, elk, turkey, or mountain lion hunting trip in the White Mountains.

At the Inn of the Mountain Gods, both indoor and outdoor courts are available to hotel guests, and to those who join the Racquet Club.

Hotel guests pay \$10 an hour to play on one of the Inn's six outdoor courts and \$15 an hour to play on one of the two indoor courts.

Racquet Club members have tennis privileges as part of their membership.

Land a lunker in river, lake fishing

Perhaps one of the most popular sports in the Ruidoso area, and one that can be enjoyed year-round, is fishing.

Anglers can take advantage of several local fishin' holes in the summer when the ski area is closed, or in the winter when the horses aren't running.

Local lakes and streams such as Bonito Lake, Alto Lake, Lake Mescalero, Eagle Lakes, Silver Lake, Rio Bonito, Eagle Creek and Rio Ruidoso hold trout, the most popular species being Native, Rainbow, Brown, Brook and Cutthroat. Fishermen may also find an occasional crappie or perch on the ends of their lines.

License fees for residents and non-residents are \$8.50 for one day; \$5.25

for an additional day; a five day license is \$15; and an all-year license is \$14 for residents and \$25.50 for non-New Mexico residents. A Junior/Senior license for residents 12 and 13 years old and seniors over 65 is \$4.50, and is non-applicable for out-of-staters.

On the reservation, temporary licenses are \$4 for Eagle Lakes, Silver Lake, and the Upper Rio Ruidoso, and \$8 for Lake Mescalero.

Popular baits this season are floating garlic cheese baits, salmon eggs, worms, grasshoppers, corn and marshmallows.

Panther martins, silver bladed panther martins, daredevils and flies seem to be the most sought after lures bringing in the big ones.


The pool is open for swimming from
