Dam pollution has affected fish numbers

Game and Fish Department officials were in Ruidoso last week counting fish.

Mike Hatch, Miles McInnis and Laurie Angel spent two days checking fish counts in the Rio Ruidoso and Carrizo Creek, in the agency's continuing investigation of effects of the Grindstone Canyon Dam to the stream system.

"We're seeing an impact of about half the numbers of fish," said McInnis, a fisheries biologist from the Roswell Game and Fish office. He said at least a half mile of Carrizo Creek and a half mile of the Rio Ruidoso have been impacted by fill operations at Grindstone Canyon Dam.

"The numbers are telling us there's an impact, but it's not irreversible," said McInnis.

Using what they termed a "statistically sound" method, Game and Fish staff have made counts on Carrizo Creek above the confluence with Grindstone Creek, and then again about four-tenths of a mile downstream. Above the confluence they determined there were 3,059 fish per mile, and below the confluence they counted 1,665 fish per mile, indicating a 54 percent difference above and below the dam.

On the Rio Ruidoso, the counts were made above North Loop in the Upper Canyon, where 4,861 fish per mile were found; and below the confluence with Carrizo Creek (at the Chamber of Commerce), where 2,994 fish per mile were counted. That indicates a difference of 62 percent.

McInnis said Game and Fish counted 5,751 fish per mile where the Rio Ruidoso meets Gavilan Canyon Road. He said that area was determined to be far enough downstream to be unaffected by changes in the stream system seen since fill operations began at Grindstone Canyon Dam.

Both brown and rainbow trout of all sizes were identified and counted during the tests. McInnis Please see Fish, page 5A

Last planes leave village's airport

The Ruidoso Municipal Airport closed Thursday, marking the end of an era.

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., on hand to make the official closure announcement, was a passenger in the last plane to take off from the municipal airport at sunset Thursday. Tim Morris, head of the village Aviation and Transportation Division, piloted the plane carrying Davis, village manager Frank Potter and Councillor Jess Stinson. Bill McCarty took off just ahead of that last plane, with Councillor Elmer Pirelli videotaping the event from the back seat of that plane.

The group, all with years of involvement in the small facility, gathered at the nearly deserted airport, boarded McCarty's two small planes and took off for the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA) on Fort Stanton Mesa. McCarty, who donated the land for the field that has served this community for more than a quarter century, dipped the wing of his plane in what looked like a salute as he zoomed up and over the huge orange X painted boldly over the runway.

The Ruidoso Village Council, in special session Thursday, adopted the ordinance that officially closed the airport to all traffic. The field was closed to general use some time ago, but a handful of private hangar owners have been authorized to use the airport until facilities were completed at SBRA.

Morris said the new airport now has a place for those users—either under a rented sunshade or in the large hangar. Airport users were notified of the closure in a letter from village attorney John Underwood.

And Thursday, as some private hangar owners packed their tools and belongings for the move to the new airport, some people looked back over the history of the centrally located airfield.

Mayor Davis and Potter agreed that Ruidoso got its first airfield right after World War II. Former

County Commissioner Kenneth Nosker and Congressman Joe Skeen were two of the early operators of that airport.

The Ruidoso Municipal Airport, in its present location, was constructed for about a half million dollars in 1963. Mayor Davis was a member of the village board of trustees that year, and Potter was a graduating senior at Ruidoso High School.

Davis has served several mayoral terms during the life and development of the Ruidoso Municipal Airport, and was mayor when the multi-million-dollar replacement airfield opened last December.

Potter went to work for the brand new airport in the early 1960s, and later was assistant manager and then manager of the facility, before moving to Village Hall as assistant and then village manager.

The 5,500-foot runway, with the terminal building and large hangar, were constructed under contracts awarded in August 1962.

According to reports in The Ruidoso News, Floyd Haake was the contractor for the airport, improving the runway and taxiway for \$487,201. The terminal building was constructed for \$55,000 and the T-hangars and service hangar for \$45,000.

Davis recalled one slight problem when construction was started on the new runway in 1962. He said a Lockheed Lodestar belonging to the 6666 Ranch was parked at the airport when construction crews began ripping up the old runway.

"They couldn't take off," laughed Davis, remembering how the plane had to be towed and transferred to another field to get off the ground.

In May 1963, Haake invited the community to view the project, and hosted an open house at the new facilities.

The new hangars and operations, directed by airport manager Lowell Morgan, were located across the runway from the old buildings

Drug plane grounded after eluding officials

Lincoln County Sheriff deputies and U.S. Customs Agents had a run for their money Friday night as they chased an airplane they believe was smuggling marijuana.

According to Rex Skellett, Lincoln County undersheriff, the sheriff's department in Carrizozo received a call early Friday evening about a low-flying aircraft in an isolated part of northwest Lincoln County. When the deputy investigated the area, he found two vehicles parked in separate places on a remote highway.

The deputy was unable to detain the vehicle drivers and began to return to Carrizozo, Skellett said. As he was returning, an airplane almost landed on the deputy's vehicle. Customs was contacted to help locate the aircraft with one of their airplanes. The deputy at first thought the low-flying plane was Customs, Skellett said.

After the low-flying plane tried to land on the highway, the pilot apparently saw the deputy's vehicle and took to the air again.

Customs could not find the aircraft, Skellett added, as it was fly-

ing with no lights and the evening was still dark. Customs agents decided to fly by the Carrizozo airport, found nothing, then decided to fly back to their home base. As they were about to take to the air, they saw the aircraft at the end of the runway. The aircraft was running, Skellett said, and when the pilot apparently saw the customs plane, he tried to drive across country to get back on the runway to take off.

The rough terrain stopped the plane in a hole, putting its nose into the dirt and bending the propeller. The whole scene happened so quickly and unexpectedly, the Customs agents were unable to leave their aircraft in time to catch the pilot of the Piper Aztec, twin-engine airplane, Skellett said.

The sheriff's department seized the aircraft and the 700 pounds of marijuana it contained.

Roadblocks and additional units were unsuccessful in their attempt to catch the pilot, Skellett said. Investigations for finding the ground crew and pilot were turned over to Customs and the Drug Enforcement Agency, Skellett concluded.

Morton is chair of art commission

Gary Morton of Lincoln was named chairman of the New Mexico Arts Commission by Governor Gary Carruthers.

Morton, a painter who is known as "the cowboy's artist" for his authentic portrayals of ranch life, succeeds Dr. Bruce Streett of Las Cruces. Streett stepped down after serving as chairman for more than a year but remains on the commission.

A native New Mexican, Morton is a former wagon boss at the historic Bell Ranch. Morton began painting and sculpting scenes from the life he loved, partly in protest against the inaccurate portrayals of horsemanship and Western life by so many contemporary artists.

His paintings are recognized for their authentic detail and atmosphere as well as their technical excellence. He still spends at least six weeks each year as a working cowboy, hiring on as a regular hand and differing from the other cowboys only in that he carries a camera to record material for future paintings.

Morton's works and his career have been documented in such publications as "Art of the West," "Southwest Art," "Contemporary Western Artist" and "The Western Horseman." In the 1970s, when he was still working at the Bell Ranch, he was featured in the Public

Broadcast System documentary film, "Cowboy Heaven," produced by KNME, Albuquerque, which was released nationally and was nominated for an Emmy. Photographs of him at work at the ranch also appeared in "The Cowboy" by Bank Langmore, a book which showed life on ranches from Mexico to Oregon.


Early in his career, Morton was influenced and assisted by the late Robert Loughheed and Bob Moline. He now has been a professional painter and watercolorist for more than a decade, showing his work in invitations around the country, including Western Arts in the Grand Tradition, Fallbrook, California; the Southwest Invitational at El Paso, Texas; the Governor's Invitational at Cheyenne, Wyoming; and the Buffalo Bill Show at Cody, Wyoming.

He has received eight awards from the National Western Artists, including two Best of Show awards and the American Airlines Award for Art. Last year, several of his paintings were included in the National Western Artists collection, which toured 12 German cities.

Currently he shows in the Savage Galleries in Santa Fe and Scottsdale, Arizona, and the Big Horn Gallery at Cody and Jackson Hole, Wyoming.

Dash For Speed adds Rainbow victory

The remarkable 3-year-old filly Dash For Speed dispatched a field of eight other sophomore speedsters in Sunday's running of the \$396,000 Rainbow Derby, keeping alive her chances of becoming only the second quarter horse in history to win the Triple Crown series for 3-year-olds.

A Dash For Cash-Mighty Speedy product, Dash For Speed has already captured the 1988 Kansas Derby crown. If she wins the All American Derby, set for August 28, she will become the first 3-year-old to win all three Derbies since My Easy Credit turned the hat-trick in

1976. Dash For Speed covered the 440-yard Rainbow Derby distance in 21.75 over a track labeled "good." Ridden by her regular reinsman Steve Fuller, Dash For Speed opened up a one-length lead at the halfway point and didn't look back, finishing 1 1/2 lengths in front of longshot Reverend Jonah Black.

"I gate broke this filly as a 2-year-old," Fuller said, "and there's a bond between us. Today she came out of the gate perfectly, I took hold of her at the grandstand, and she still beat them by daylight."

The Rainbow Derby triumph, worth \$162,440 in prize money, boosted Dash For Speed's lifetime earnings to more than \$538,000. Her career record now stands at eight wins and three seconds in 11 starts.

Reverend Jonah Black, a 24-1 longshot ridden by Gary Sumpter, held second the entire race, but could not get at Dash For Speed. Jack W. Brooks trains the son of Bugs Alive in '75 for owners Dwight and Francelle Claxton and Thomas Self of Tulsa, Oklahoma. The second-place paycheck was worth \$74,258.

Last year's All American Futurity champ Elatis Special, with Alex Baldillez in the irons, finished third. Her owner Dr. Lindsey D

Burbank, of Leesburg, Florida, collected \$38,057 for the show. A Special Effort filly, Elans Special, is saddled by Iris M. Buchanan.

The rest of the 1988 Rainbow Derby field finished as follows: Shawne Music Man (Lackey), Its Called Class (Martin), Genuine Knockout (Nicomemus), Zure Hope Again (Garcia), Goldenrighttwo (Short) and Oh Bid Go (Hunt).

Shawnes Favorite was a late scratch.

In Sunday's co-feature, the \$14,775 First Lady Handicap for fillies and mares, Walter F. Merrick's Northern Writer emerged victorious. Larry Payne was on board the 7-year-old Staff Writer mare. She is trained by Rick Anderson.

Dash For Speed, winner of this year's Kansas Derby, takes the second leg in the Triple Crown for sophomores, winning the Rainbow Derby. Steve Fuller was on board the champion filly for trainer Larry Keiter. Blakeman Farms, Bob Blakeman and Thomas H. Bradbury of Fort Worth, Texas, are the owners.

This year's Kansas Futurity champion Okeydokey Baby kept her Triple Crown bid alive, posting the fastest qualifying time of nine divisions of 400-yard Rainbow Futurity Time Trials run Thursday. 19.960 first-place performance in the final division. A Duck Dance-Hug Tiny, colt Merganser is owned by Jerry Wells and Ronald Shalz. Jack Brooks trains the stakes winner. His regular reinsman Jacky Martin was on board for the time trial win.


This message will reach you on July Five. I might bring you a little something about the Fourth of July the next time we meet through the magic of the printed page.



said the team did see a good number of insects in the stream, but he was unable to estimate a time frame for the creeks and river to return to normal.

To count fish, the team blocks off a 50-meter section of stream, placing a net securely across both ends. The nets are anchored to the streambed using heavy rocks. Wearing hip boots, the team enters

the water, and one member of the team wears electric shock equipment on his back and carries two electrical probes. They make a pass from one end to the other of the designated area, using the shock equipment.

As the stunned fish float to the top, the two team members scoop them up to be used in the counts. A second pass is made after 30 minutes, and a third pass after an-

other half-hour wait. The fish are returned, unharmed, to the river.

McInnis said the numbers in the physical count are graphed statistically, using a time-proven method, to calculate fish per mile.

Game and Fish is continuing to stock the river on a regular schedule this summer, said McInnis. He said the agency will continue to monitor the public fishery.

Restaurateurs, lodgers to join forces

The Ruidoso Hospitality Association took one step closer to being reality Thursday, as Ruidoso restaurateurs agreed they would join the Ruidoso Lodgers Association.

Meeting at Cree Meadows Country Club, Dan Kelley, who was appointed temporary chairman of the restaurant group last week, led discussion concerning the formation of a separate restaurant association or to join the already existing Ruidoso Lodgers Association (RLA).

RLA invited the restaurateurs to join their group last week.

A larger group of restaurateurs were present at Thursday's meeting than last week, all expressing their desire to form a restaurant association and most willing to become a hospitality association with RLA.

RLA is a not-for-profit corpora-

tion. Discussion led to the proposal that the restaurateurs join RLA under one name, then form two distinct groups with separate boards of directors. Members of each board will become a part of the Hospitality Association executive board. Calling the combined group a "Hospitality Association" was accepted by most present, including the RLA members.

RLA member Dick Weber said RLA was investigating the legal procedures of rewriting their by-laws to create the Hospitality Association.

Kelley also said that as an organized group, the restaurateurs and lodgers could become a voting block in such village issues as the formation of a convention center. Kelley and lodger Ron Andrews

agreed the village needs an "events center" as opposed to an elaborate "convention center," because a convention center was available at the Inn of The Mountain Gods. Andrews said the events center would allow groups with smaller budgets to have events.

Andrews encouraged all restaurateurs and lodgers to attend the next Village Council meeting on Tuesday, July 12, to voice their feelings on the convention center subject.

The group concluded their meeting with another invitation to all restaurateurs and lodgers to attend the next meeting at 3 p.m. Thursday, July 7, at Cree Meadows. Kelley said the restaurant group will elect officers.





when the new and improved airport opened for business in 1963. "We were all so excited," said Davis.

As the village celebrated its new half-million-dollar facility, private airport operator Ralph Brown continued his services from the other side of the runway, near the present site of the Ruidoso Financial Center.

Brown and the village squabbled for nearly a year over who would provide airport operations, with the private company continuing to sell fuel and offer maintenance and repair, even as the village sought to be the sole airport operator.

In a letter to the editor in May 1963, Brown questioned how the village could pay for the half-million-dollar facility. He announced he was still in business, adding "(I) intend to remain so in spite of competition from the city."

Potter and Davis recalled that the battle between the village and Brown heated up before it was finally settled. Potter said he was among the village employees who were instructed to build a fence over the runway on the Brown side, only to be told to go back and tear it down the next day on a court order.

"We were out on the runway flagging planes down, to get them to the municipal airport," laughed

Potter. The Ruidoso News on June 7, 1963, carried pictures of the two competing operations with the following caption: "Private enterprise versus city hall—a full-blown feud between Brown Air Service and the Ruidoso Municipal Airport. It is providing visiting airmen into Ruidoso with more service than is ordinarily found at any airport."

But, in the end, the village apparently purchased the facilities, after the board of trustees directed the village attorney, in November 1963, to negotiate with Brown. At that time then Mayor Warren Tucker said Brown was getting three-fourths of the business, with the village losing about \$12,000 a year.

The new, improved airport soon was racking up big numbers of operations, with the village attempting to keep pace with progress in aviation, even knowing the airfield would someday move.

"It's been an attempt to put the maximum facility we could here, while knowing it's obsolete," remarked Davis. Potter said the big thing was trying to get money to expand.

Davis said people have always been supportive of this airport, noting a resort is only as good as its availability to the public.

"We have had a lot of people fly in to this airport," said Potter, and

members of the group named off celebrities who have been in and out of this community through the airport. They include: Marlon Brando, Lorne Green, Audrey Murphy, Chill Wills, Dale Robertson, Phyllis Diller, Robert Mitchum, Debra Winger and more.

But the little airfield began to be known, not for its excellent service and high traffic counts, but for the number of crashes. According to some sources, the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) called this field the "most dangerous in the Southwest."

While there were a number of deaths and serious injuries as pilots coped with mountain flying conditions in Ruidoso, some crashes occurred and were just barely noticed.

Potter remembered when emergency equipment reached one downed plane, the pilot was asked, "Is anyone hurt?" And the pilot answered, "I don't know, I just got here myself."

Another plane crashed onto the runway, and the pilot and passengers jumped right into a waiting leased car, leaving the damaged aircraft without a backward glance. Airport staff reported the group, "had a horse running in the first race."

Not all crashes at the little airport had such happy endings, and a

group of Ruidoso residents became more and more concerned with the airfield's close proximity to Midtown Ruidoso, White Mountain schools and many village homes. Citizens and officials worked for 20 years to obtain the federal and state funding needed to construct the state-of-the-art air facility on Fort Stanton Mesa.

And as airport users looked back over the history of the Ruidoso Municipal Airport, Davis and Morris had their eyes to the future at SBRA.

Morris, who managed the Ruidoso Municipal Airport (RMA) and now manages SBRA, said the new field has instrumentation and commercial operation capabilities that were never available at the village airport. The differences between RMA and SBRA reflect the changes and advances in aviation over the past quarter century.

"We can now reach 70 percent more people than we ever could have here," said Davis, predicting a positive impact from SBRA as people more and more become aware the airport is here.

And they were off, cruising down the runway, soaring up and over the Village of Ruidoso, for the last time.

Council makes closing of old airport official

In a special meeting Thursday, the Ruidoso Village Council adopted an ordinance closing the Ruidoso Municipal Airport (RMA) to all traffic.

Councillors voted unanimously for the ordinance that marked the end for the airport located next door to Midtown Ruidoso and the Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center.

In discussions in previous meetings, it was learned the FAA had asked the village to set a date and close the airport to all operations. Since the opening of the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA), just the private hangar owners have been authorized to fly in and out of the facility.

The ordinance adopted makes it unlawful to land or take off, and also makes it illegal to operate a motor vehicle on the old runway. Fines of up to \$300 and imprisonment of up to 90 days are set forth in the new ordinance.

Ruidoso Police officers are charged with enforcing the new ordinance, as they do other village ordinances.

"If there's a plane there—you've obviously landed," remarked Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., during discussions over the enforcement procedures.

With the many activities scheduled on the old airfield, Davis said he hopes the village will never have

a fine levied. "I would hope we wouldn't have a plane with a propeller cascading into a crowd," he added.

Village manager Frank Potter said, after the meeting, the FAA regulates use of air space. He said since the airfield is closed, pilots can't violate the air space, and are required to stay at least 2,000 feet over the village.

During other business at the special meeting, assistant village attorney Mike Runnels recommended the council leave the matter of a bid for additional drying beds at the sanitation department up "on the table" until he does further research.

That bid was tabled at last Tuesday's council meeting.

Also Thursday, Mayor Davis made the following appointments, subject to acceptance by the appointees:

—Tim Hoyt to the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission.

—Dick Weber to the Lodgers Tax Advisory Board.

—Al Lane to the Library Board. Councillors unanimously approved those appointments.

Councillor Al Junge said he had been out of town, and was "shook up about 3,200 fish killed" in the Upper Canyon.

"Thank God, it wasn't bridge number one," remarked Junge. He said the contractor on that job is doing such a good job, "you can hardly tell he's working there."


Ruidosoan hurt in wreck

Looking for a long-time companion for yourself or your family?

Take a ride this week to the Humane Society of Lincoln County's animal shelter on Gavilan Canyon Road. There you'll find almost any description of dog, puppy, cat or kitten imaginable.

Now, puppies and kittens are not hard to come by. "Free" puppies and kittens can be seen all over town.

But at the animal shelter, you'll be getting not just a puppy or kitten; you'll be getting a companion for many, many years, according to shelter director Randy Basche. Animals at the shelter have been properly vaccinated and are spayed or neutered, so, the cost of adoption - up to \$60 for a spayed or neutered, vaccinated puppy, with kittens likewise protected running about \$38 - is really an investment into a long-time relationship. The pet's life has been protected, something that cannot be said for the "free" puppies and kittens.

The bulk of the adoption fee is due to the cost of spaying or neutering, a policy the Humane Society follows on a nationwide basis. The prevention of unwanted pets through uncontrolled breeding is the prevention of needless deaths later by starvation or euthanasia.

The Humane Society even guarantees its pets, offering a two-week money-back promise on all pets. "We want to make sure the owner is happy with the adoption," said Basche. The shelter has several gentle adult dogs and cats available, too, for those who would rather take that route. Declawed cats also are available.

If you've been thinking of getting a pet, think of the Humane Society's animal shelter. There you'll be getting not only a pet, but a long-time companion, as well. -DJP

twice, in April and May. That's how we knew they were not heavily headed in Budagher's direction. Technical note: obviously a survey of only proven primary voters can only be evaluated in the light of other polls employing more sampling procedures.

"Monthly Follow-Up"

A behind-the-scenes look at the political pressures exerted on pollsters:

At six o'clock, June 6, the day before the election, KOAT-TV7 ran the final Zia Research Associates poll of the primary season.

Results for the Republican race for Congressional District 1:

- Steven Schiff: 33%
- Edward Lujan: 33%
- John Budagher: 16%
- Undecided: 18%

The race was clearly a two-man contest between Schiff and Lujan. The difference was too close to call-meaning inside 3,000 votes.

Minutes after the poll aired, I received a telephone call from Harry Pavlides, who identified himself as a Budagher "volunteer."

Zia should put a "disclaimer" on the poll, Pavlides argued, because "your methodology is wrong." Our approach of interviewing only people who voted in the 1986 primaries, left out two groups of people: those who had just reached voting age, and those who came to New Mexico after 1986. The younger, newer voters, Pavlides contended, "are our base." In undercounting them, we underestimated Budagher's support.

You think we should interview nonvoters? I asked.

"They're nonvoters now," he angrily asserted, "because after seeing your poll results, they won't turn out."

Even so, all was not lost, he remarked. "I've interviewed 19,000 people who voted in the 1986 Republican primary—19,000 versus only 200 by Zia," Pavlides said. "Our results consistently show John [Budagher] within plus-or-minus 1% of the leader."

"I've never been wrong," Pavlides stated. "I may be wrong later, but I'm not wrong on this one."

That wasn't the first time Pavlides called.

On Saturday night, June 4, Pavlides told me The Albuquerque Journal was going to publish a poll on Sunday, June 5, showing that Budagher was the odd-man-out. (The Journal's findings: 31.5% for Edward Lujan, Steve Schiff 27.3%, 19.3% for Budagher and 21.9% undecided).

What Pavlides apparently did not know:

In 1980, when I was a campaign consultant, I worked on Budagher's race for the state senate. Budagher defeated incumbent Democrat Albert Gurule in what can truly be considered as a remarkable upset, given the preponderance of Democratic party registrations in the district.

Since that time, I have been a family friend of the Budaghers.

I am also a family friend, however, of accurate and truthful

reporting of poll results. No findings will be fudged to suit anybody, friend or foe, period.

Final unofficial results: 13,934 for Schiff, 12,765 for Lujan and 7,354 for Budagher.

The Sunday June 5th Albuquerque Journal poll had a disappointing side for me, as well as for Budagher camp.

As Eye has noted on several occasions, the registered agent for Research and Polling, Inc., is Tom Lang, publisher of The Albuquerque Journal. When the newspaper publishes Research and Polling polls, it does not acknowledge that relationship. The Sunday, June 5th poll was no exception.

I wrote in October, "A newspaper with an undisclosed amount of interest in a political consulting firm raises too many questions." On May 18th, I repeated that position, along with a challenge to The Journal to disclose the connection. "If not," I asked, "Why not?"

April and May reports filed in the Secretary of State's Office show Research and Polling actively participates in political campaigns. Specifically, Jim Baca, Patricia Madrid and Tom Udall—the top three competing Democratic candidates for Congress in the First District—each purchased "poll results" from Research and Polling. Cost per candidate: \$526.25. I must emphasize that these activities are only preliminary, because another campaign report will be filed in July.

Personnel in The Journal and Research and Polling repeatedly have said the relationship is without consequence. But the fact of the matter is, legally, that is simply not the case. As Corporation Commissioner John Elliott once told me, "The registered agent is the person they sue in New Mexico."

Leadership on horse racing, the continuing series on PNM by reporter Doug McClellan—indeed, the publication of opinion survey results: The Journal has many things it can be proud of.

The lack of meaningful disclosure isn't one of them.

Once again, I urge The Journal to reconsider.

As for the purported impact of poll results, Eye cited (June 15) George Gallup's "classic case" to show that "the bandwagon theory"—voters vote for the winner in political poll—is pure "political myth." In the 1948 presidential election, "all the polls showed Governor Thomas E. Dewey on top" of Harry Truman. (The Sophisticated Poll Watcher's Guide, pp. 34-5).

Regarding Pavlides' remarks about newer and younger voters, Zia did indeed interview them—




DEAR EDITOR:
