## Drag races favored at old airport

A proposal to use the old airport landing strip for monthly Sunday afternoon drag races was handed over to village management during Tuesday's meeting of the Ruidoso Village Council.

Steven R. Standridge, president of the Fraternal Order of Police, asked the council for permission to conduct a trial run on Sunday, August 28, before establishing the drag races on a monthly basis from May through October 1989.

Councillors were within calling for a vote on a motion to allow the trial run, when they opted to ask for a recommendation from the administration.

Councillor Al Junge said the idea was a good one, but should be cleared through the administration. Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr agreed, noting the administration can provide the council information on insurance and possible costs of installing guardrails for the races.

Standridge said his plan was geared to promote youth activity in Ruidoso, and to prevent or cut down on the number of accidents and youth speeding on village streets. He said a drag racing incident Monday resulted in an accident with injuries.

The plan unveiled Tuesday will enable youth to race their cars in a controlled atmosphere, said Standridge. He said prize money will be paid by the Fraternal Order of Police, local merchants and from entry fees, with spectator fees to be remitted to the Parks and Recreation Department to fund other youth programs.

The police organization will operate the races, and the only cost to the village will be the two 100-foot guardrails needed along each side of the landing strip in order to have the races sanctioned by national and international hot rod associations.

Standridge said the noise factor will be minimal compared to the noise of aircraft that used to land and take off at the airfield. He said the events will take place just once a month for about six hours.

Questioned about insurance, Standridge said his organization will take care of that. He said Daryl Obermueller, head of Parks and Recreation, told him that issue might be worked out with the village.

Also Tuesday the council approved an \$11 million 1988-89 fiscal year budget. Finance director John Varley explained changes made since the original budget was adopted.

Questioned as to the "bottom

## Hit-and-run driver kills 2 boys

Two young Mescalero boys are dead following a hit-and-run incident on the reservation.

The names of the boys, ages 6 and 11, haven't been released pending notification of family members.

Mark Chino, supervisory criminal investigator for the Bureau of Indian Affairs, said the bodies of the children were found

by a family member shortly after noon Wednesday, but they probably were killed sometime late Tuesday night or early Wednesday morning.

Chino said the bodies of the boys were found near the roadside in Pena Canyon about two miles west of the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

Chino added that a vehicle has

been impounded near Alamogordo, and he will go out there sometime today to see if the treads on the vehicle match tracks found at the scene.

He also said the United States Attorney's office in Albuquerque has been notified because the victims were tribal members.

## Area Marijuana mystery unravels

The ongoing story of the elusive Lincoln County marijuana smugglers is slowly evolving.

According to Lincoln County Undersheriff Rex Skellett, the pilot of the twin engine Aztec Piper airplane, confiscated July 1 in Carrizozo, was identified by United States Customs agents with the help of the New Mexico State Police Crime Lab.

The lab processed the aircraft for

fingerprints and other clues, including a pocket calculator and documents found near a wire fence on the airport, Skellett said. The pilot was identified by comparing the found fingerprints to those on file.

According to Skellett, federal agencies arrested the pilot in Oklahoma on a federal warrant. The ground crews also were identified. They and the pilot are

out-of-state people, Skellett added.

Skellett said he is applying for forfeiture procedures for the aircraft with the Department of Treasury of the United States Customs Service.

The identity of the pilot was not revealed by Customs as the case is still under investigation, Skellett stated.

Tad Haynes will replace Brett Argo as high school and middle school band director and Liz Wheeler will replace B.J. Tooley as speech pathologist. Superintendent Sid Miller commented, in reference to Neal and Haynes, it was pleasurable to see former Ruidoso

High School students return as teachers.

The resignations of Gene Segura as high school English teacher and coach, Renee Rubin as second grade teacher and Susan Day as White Mountain Elementary special education teacher also were accepted. Ruidoso High School principal Tom Hansen announced Jody Hopkins will be head girls basketball coach and Dean Hood will be head boys basketball coach this fall.

In other personnel action board approved hiring Ben Jeffery as high school custodian, Molly Long as special education aide at the middle school to replace Herman Fox and Dorothy Phillips as high school secretary.

J.M. Brook Corporation of Alto was awarded the bid on remodeling the White Mountain Gymnasium.

## Four felled by lightning bolt

Picacho residents Adalina Kimbrell and Dr. Walter Hopkins narrowly escaped with their lives after a bolt of lightning knocked them unconscious Tuesday afternoon.

Kimbrell and Hopkins were with two Roswell residents Dick Wright and Mike Lee who were conducting a survey of the Kimbrell property in Picacho.

According to Wright, Hopkins, Lee and himself were clearing brush from between two large poplar trees when it began to rain. Wright, who operates a surveying business in Roswell, said he sent one of his surveyors with the equipment back to the truck when it started to rain. Before the rest could get out of the rain, the lightning hit one of the trees.

Wright said all four people were knocked unconscious, with Hopkins injured the most severely.

Lincoln County Sheriff's Department received a call at 3:16 p.m. on the 911 line about people being hit by lightning in the Hondo area. As the person gave no details, a tracer was placed on the call.

Ambulances from Hondo,

Capitan and Ruidoso responded. The four were transported to St. Mary's Hospital in Roswell where they were kept overnight for observation. Wright and Lee were released at noon Wednesday and Kimbrell was released to her son Wednesday afternoon.

Hopkins was placed in Intensive Care Unit to monitor a possible problem with his heart.

According to investigating deputy Dave Pfeffer, a metal bar ran between the two large trees, possibly used to hold a rope swing.

Hopkins reportedly had his hand on a branch of the tree hit by lightning. He was knocked unconscious with the hair on one leg singed and a burned streak. Hopkins' wife Gale reported he was in good condition at Saint Mary's late Wednesday.

Wright said the lightning took everybody by surprise, as the day was hot and sunny previously. By the time they were into the ambulances, everyone was soaking wet, Wright said. They were not taking shelter from the rain under the trees, Wright added, as he has had experience with lightning in open ballfields.

"I guess you can expect anything in the mountains," Wright mused.

The project includes replacement of the gym floor, repair of plumbing, installation of acoustics and interior painting. Project funds will come from capital improvement money, Miller told board members.

Call for bids for milk for the 1988-89 school lunch program and recarpeting the White Mountain Intermediate School were approved.

Board discussed changing the type of roof to be installed on the middle school gymnasium. Miller suggested a metal roof, which will be \$3,000 less, as opposed to the hot mop roof in the current roofing contract with Van Winkle Roofing of Roswell. Board members agreed the change should be open for bid among the other companies that bid on the original contract. Miller said he will call a special meeting to award the bids for the roof and the carpeting.

In other business board:  
—Presented an appreciation plaque for Lamar Osbourn, former board member.

—Approved payment of checks, cash transfers and budget increase in the cafeteria. Board requested they receive copies of the quarterly reports.

—Approved bus contracts.  
—Appointed Miller and Associate Superintendent Mike Gladden as financial officers for 1988-89.

—Heard a favorable report on the cooperation between the school and the village of Ruidoso in solving the drainage problem from the middle school parking area onto Walnut Road. Village crews plan to divert water into a drainage ditch behind the school administration building.

# Surratt trial set in Fort Sumner

The trial for Matt Surratt, charged with the murder of Katina Chavez, will begin August 22 in Fort Sumner, by the order of District Judge Richard Parsons.

In a telephone interview Thursday morning, Parsons said he made the decision to move the trial out of Lincoln County on July 12 for "apparent" reasons.

"There is no argument that pretrial publicity in media coverage was intense and continues to be, as the letters," Parsons commented. "It is extremely difficult to select a fair and impartial jury," he continued.

Parsons said both state and defense attorneys recognized the need to move the trial and agreed to the transfer. Pretrial conference will be August 1 in Carrizozo.

Surratt, 17, was charged with the February 20 murder of fellow High School student Katina Chavez.

line" of those changes, Varley said the new budget reflects a net increase of \$100,000 over the original budget. Changes included correcting mistakes and additional equipment and vehicle purchases.

Among equipment purchases added to the budget was an \$18,000 12-passenger van to be used for flight line and airport-to-town transportation from the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

Councillor Junge questioned Varley over the number of employees, noting the number shown is 163, the same number as on a printout he had from three years ago. Junge questioned if the village has had a reduction in work force as has been announced in previous meetings.

Varley said the 163 employees includes seasonal workers, with the

stable work force at from 145 to 150. Mayor Davis remarked the council and mayor, since they receive pay, are counted among employees.

Village manager Frank Potter said Wednesday the overall budget is still down \$3 million from last year's \$14 million village budget.

In other regular business Tuesday the council:

—Referred a zoning protest to the Planning and Zoning Commission. Hazel Haynesworth, representing the 126-member Upper Canyon Association, said the group filed protests that were never heard before the new zoning ordinance was adopted.

—Voted unanimously to rebid the drying bed project for the regional wastewater treatment plant on the recommendation of village attorney John Underwood.

# Board: Building Inspector should be reinstated

The Personnel Board for the Village of Ruidoso, in a written report, faulted village management in the handling of recent personnel actions.

Three positions were abolished and one staffer fired recently, resulting in the filings of grievances and appeals that led to a personnel hearing last week. The report filed with village manager Frank Potter, who serves as personnel director, was the result of that hearing.

Building inspector Jimmy Neeley was fired by Potter, and the board found that he was "improperly dismissed and should be placed back in his former position with full back pay and

benefits." Although the board said the elimination of the Engineering Department and the position of deputy police chief was outside its jurisdiction, its members said it's up to the three individuals to disprove the fiscal reason cited as the reason for the cuts.

"As far as placement of these individuals in other positions, we feel that proper evaluations of each person's credentials was not taken into account. We are asking for proper evaluation of any position made available on or after the elimination of the Engineering Department and deputy chief of police," said the report.

Potter wouldn't say if he plans to accept the board's recommendations, but confirmed receiving the

# Man and his dog walk for homeless

James C. Masker is walking to help the homeless.

The Pennsylvania native walked through Ruidoso Friday on a journey that began in Las Cruces and will end in 1991 in Wayne County Pennsylvania on the Delaware River.

The 32-year-old Masker and his pal, Travis, a German shepherd/rottweiler mix, walk about 20 miles a day, sleeping on the streets, in homes, churches and hotels, and spreading the word that millions of Americans are homeless and in need of help.

The tall, slender Masker, his bright blue eyes shining, took a break Friday at Kentucky Fried Chicken. Travis waited patiently by the front door as Masker talked enthusiastically about his mission.

By the time the man and his dog reach their destination, they will have walked 4,200 miles. Masker started his trek on July 1, and by the time he hit the Ruidoso area he had worn out his first pair of shoes. At that rate the traveler will walk through 40 pairs of shoes in the next two years.

"I never considered myself homeless," said Masker, a jack-of-

all-trades. He learned first-hand of problems facing the homeless over a year ago when he was robbed and left with no money, no identification and no place to go. He spent some time in a rescue mission and was exposed to the limited resources available to those without a home.

"The Lord has actually given me a job to do," said Masker, who has spent the past year working as a volunteer for Gospel Rescue Mission in Las Cruces.

The mission provides temporary shelter, food and medical aid for the needy of Las Cruces. Masker provided figures that estimate from 4,000 to 5,000 homeless and transient people are on the streets of that city.

Masker's trip through New Mexico has been sponsored by the Full Gospel Businessmen and the First National Bank of Las Cruces. He said he is asking for nothing for himself, but is seeking pledges and donations to the Gospel Rescue Mission. Masker said all money he raises in New Mexico will be given to that organization, explaining in each state he visits he'll dedicate funds to the hardest hit area in that state.

Pledges, so much per mile, or any amount, may be sent to the

mission, in care of Pastor Julius Martin; P.O. Box 386; Las Cruces, NM 88004.

Pastor Martin, contacted by telephone Wednesday, said the project is Masker's. He said the funds Masker raises will be used for the program already in place at Gospel Rescue Mission.

Martin said the homeless are offered the opportunity to stay at the mission for up to six months while they undergo counseling and find employment.

Masker, besides offering information on the homeless, said he takes time along the way to provide jail ministry and counseling for victims of drug abuse, for prostitutes and runaways.

"I've been on the road enough to know the problems are there... to know how to relate to those groups," said Masker.

When it was time to hit the road again Friday, Masker donned the 75-pound pack that contains clothing, equipment and, of course, dogfood, and headed toward Roswell.

He and Travis paused just long enough for a goodbye, and one last request: "If you do a story, please send a copy to my mother."

# They oppose Sun. liquor in Capitan

Capitan voters will go to the polls next Tuesday, July 19, to answer the question of whether the sale of alcoholic drinks on Sunday will be allowed in the village.

The ban on the sale of drinks on Sunday in Capitan began in 1985. Since, the referendum has come before voters yearly and voters continue to turn it down.

Last year, the voters continued the ban with 106 to 98 votes.

There are some in the village who oppose the sale of alcoholic drinks on Sunday. Toni Otero, part owner of El Paisano Restaurant, stated she knows that Sunday sales would bring added revenue to the village. But she opined Sunday should be reserved for things other than drinking. She added her business has experienced little or no decrease since the ban began.

Dan Carter, pastor of the Christ Community Fellowship in Capitan, opposes the Sunday sales because of religious and moral reasons. He said from an economic standpoint the issue is dollars versus people's lives.

A referendum costs at least \$750 of village funds to conduct, Carter said. He offered the opinion that the frequent occurrence of referendums for Sunday sales is more than coincidence.

"I can't see adding to the detriment of people's lives," he said about allowing Sunday sales.

He said he believes six days a week for liquor sales is enough. He stated he is concerned about people as he has seen the detrimental effects of alcohol on families he has counseled as a minister.

Capitan businessman Virgil Hall Jr., who operates Hall's Automotive, also opposes the Sunday sales. He echoed Carter's opinion that six days a week is enough.

"I personally would vote the town dry," Hall stated. When he operated a auto wrecker service, Hall said over 90 percent of his calls were alcohol related. He concluded that sales by the drink encourage overindulgence.

Opinions about alcoholic sales by the drink on Sunday are varied but legally the voters will make the decision.

Polls open at 8 a.m. and remain open until 7 p.m. Tuesday, July 19, at the Lincoln County Fairbuilding. Registered voters who reside in the village of Capitan are eligible to vote in the special election.

# Body found by police

The badly decomposed body of a white female was discovered Sunday in a bedroom at 502 Second Street, according to Ruidoso Police reports.

Detective Lanny Maddox said Nancy Guck pronounced the victim dead about 7:15 p.m. Sunday, but a positive identification couldn't be made at the scene.

The body was taken to the Office of Medical Investigation in Albuquerque, but Maddox said Wednesday the medical examiner was unable to make a positive identification due to the condition of the body.

Sylvia M. Williams, 63, from Albuquerque rented the house about five weeks ago, and hasn't been seen or heard of since the unidentified body was found, said Maddox. He said relatives of the Williams woman have been contacted to obtain dental records and other information.

While there were no signs of foul play, Maddox said the possibility wasn't excluded. The investigation is continuing.

# Gunshots fired; three women arrested

Three women were arrested Saturday after a shooting incident at the Mark Apartments. Police said Carla McCoy, 33, of the Mark Apartment, number 17, called police at 6:22 a.m. Saturday reporting a break-in under way at her residence. When officers arrived at the scene Sergeant John Layher reportedly heard a gunshot. No one was injured, but Detective Mike Lovelace said police learned two gunshots were fired. Police observed three females

fighting in apartment 17, entered the residence and arrested all three subjects. McCoy, Susan Spall, 37, and Patricia Gonzales, 31, were taken into custody. According to police reports Spall and Gonzales were charged with breaking and entering and McCoy faced drug charges. All three reportedly bonded out. Detective Lanny Maddox said a firearm was confiscated at the scene.

In a separate incident, a loud party reported right after midnight Friday at 314 Walnut, led to the arrest of seven people. Police said they shut the party down, but were called back after 3 a.m. and arrested two juveniles and five adult males.

Maddox said the following people were arrested: James K. Woodall, 24; John Sykes, 29; Curt Hesse, 21; Shawn Childress, 21; Joseph Rue, 18; Scott L. Richardson, 15; and Ali D. Freeman, 15.

Woodall, Sykes, Hesse and Childress were charged with furnishing liquor to minors; Woodall was charged with resisting arrest and Hesse and Childress was also charged with unreasonable noise. Rue, Richardson and Freeman were charged as minors allowing themselves to be served, said police.

The juveniles were released to their parents right after the arrest, and the adults bonded out early Monday, said Maddox.

# Downs Trustees reverse stand on judge's budget

The Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees Monday night voted to approve a change of heart Monday night and made the motion to approve the increase.

The budget change is still subject to approval by the Department of Finance Administration in Santa Fe; however, Village Clerk Janice Polk said she doesn't anticipate any problems with the change.

In other business, Mayor J.C. "Jake" Harris announced that the trustees, in a special meeting last week, voted to award the village's paving contract to McCarty Construction Co., Inc. of Ruidoso, who had bid \$388,000 to pave 21 streets in the Downs.

Polk said bids were accepted on a per street basis, and individual contracts were awarded for each of the 21 streets. She added that

Trustee Bill Smith, who had been the most outspoken opponent of Mansell's budget increase, showed a change of heart Monday night and made the motion to approve the increase.

school bus routes were placed on the top priority list to be paved and that work is expected to begin within a week to 10 days.

The trustees also voted to hire Jack Matthews as the village's new animal control officer and Parks and Recreation Department employee.

Under new business, the trustees voted 6-0 to send eight members of the Ruidoso Downs Fire Department to fire school in Hobbs. The cost of the school will come out of the fire department's state funds and is expected to run approximately \$3,120 for the eight men.

As its last official act of the evening, the board voted unanimously to renew its membership with the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County.

In an unscheduled confrontation,

Ruidoso Downs resident Charlotte Craig, who lives on North Main, presented the trustees with Polaroid pictures showing water damage that her driveway and shed had sustained during last Thursday's heavy rains.

Craig contends that the damage was caused by the placement of sandbags by village employees, which caused water to run off of her neighbor's property and onto hers.

However, Polk said that she was with the workers when they began placing the sandbags, and contends that by that time, the rains had stopped and water was beginning to recede. She said because of this time frame, the damage to Craig's property had already been done.

Harris said an investigator from the road department will be sent out to Craig's property to assess the damage and determine the cause.

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# The Plant Corner

### New Reproduction Ideas

We have new plants now from cuttings, air layering and seeds. I thought that would just about do it. However, I have just learned a new method which I will pass on to you for your consideration. I have not personally experimented with either of these ideas, but in this day and age, anything is possible.

When Bob Kundtz said he wanted some birth control pills for a horticultural experiment both his doctor and druggist were taken back.

Kundtz, known as the "Wizard of Florida's Cypress Gardens," wanted the pills, not to prevent conception, but to get some plants to reproduce.

Soaked in a solution of one birth control pill to one quart of water, the plants soon sprout new offshoots complete with root systems. The offshoots are then separated and repotted as new plants.

"I first heard of it in Australia," Kundtz said.

"I couldn't get a variegated pineapple to put out new growth quick enough. And this friend of mine said, 'No problem, old chap. Do this and so.'"

"I thought he was pulling my leg, but I kept it in the back of my mind," Kundtz says. "It sort of bugged me."

"About a year later, I couldn't get a pandanus (a member of the lily family) to throw any Keiki (a horticultural term for new growth). So I went to the drugstore and asked for some birth control pills."

"There was a lot of whispering in the back of the store, and then I found out I needed a prescription for the pills. So, I go over to my doctor. He said, 'Bob, does your wife know?'"


But Kundtz persisted through all the ribbing, got his pills and tried them out.

"It really does work," he says. "Little plants come out thicker than hairs on a dog's back."

Kundtz says a gynecologist friend of his believes it's the estrogen (a growth hormone) in the pills that causes new plant growth quickly.

Now Kundtz is trying to find out whether he can get other plants to do the same. He's also interested in seeing whether the pill solution would increase root systems in trees and stimulate flowering, which in fruit trees would mean more fruit or berries.

He says a home gardener can probably get results as well as anyone but jokingly warns that the pills aren't cleared by the Food and Drug Administration for gardening.



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## Mock disaster committee examines disaster plan

Participants in the county's recent mock disaster drill and members of the Hazardous Materials (HazMat) Right to Know Committee met Monday, July 11, in Carrizozo. The drill was reviewed and suggestions for rewriting the emergency disaster plan were considered.

"We learned a lot about our strengths as an Emergency Response team," said Nancy Guck, Lincoln County Emergency Coordinator, "but there's always room for improvement."

Among the many items considered were training rural Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) in the use of self-contained breathing apparatus (SCUBA), augmenting law

enforcement personnel and expanding the communications network. In compliance with state and Federal requirements, Lincoln County conducted a mass disaster drill a few miles north of Ruidoso three weeks ago.

Attending the follow-up meeting were representatives from several agencies involved, including Lincoln County Emergency Medical Services, Lincoln County Sheriff's Office and local police departments, the county road department, various volunteer fire departments, the U.S. Forest Service and the media.

"We plan on meeting regularly," said Guck. "We encourage anyone who is interested to join us. We appreciate their input."

## Village passes buck on airport terminal bill

After a tense but speedy regular meeting Wednesday, the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission retired into executive session to discuss pending litigation.

Chairman Bill Karn, after commissioners made quick work of the regular meeting's short agenda, commented the meeting was one of the shortest in history.

But village attorney John Underwood asked if the group wanted to discuss "the situation with the terminal building" and Karn responded by asking if that subject would be pending litigation.

"It could be," answered Underwood, and the group voted unanimously to conduct a closed meeting over pending litigation.

Village Councillor Al Junge asked if some of the "distinguished visitors" could take part in the meeting, and Karn said he had no problem with the councillors, as well as village manager Frank Potter attending the executive session.

Karn added everyone at the meeting could attend the executive meeting except the reporter, who was asked to leave.

In the meeting, along with commissioners Karn, John Hightower, Ralph Dunlap, Lloyd L. Davis Jr., Jess Stinson and Elmer Pirelli, were councillors Junge, J.D. James and Tom McNeil. Also included in the executive get-together were attorneys Underwood and Gary Mitchell, Potter, county manager Suzanne Cox, airport manager Tim Morris, airport secretary Kathy Tetreault, village finance director John Varley and airport engineer Earl Cook.

Potter, James and McNeil chose to leave before the discussions began, with James noting he didn't believe his presence was needed with the three official village representatives present.

It was learned that Underwood, on behalf of the Village of Ruidoso in its position as a member of the SBAC, wrote county attorney Mitchell a letter on July 12. In that letter Underwood reminded the county of its duty, as set forth in a joint powers agreement, to "ensure that the facilities and capital improvements reasonably necessary for the normal and businesslike operation of the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport are provided ... in a timely manner."

He continued, the county is responsible for deficits incurred for capital improvements.

Referring to a lease-purchase agreement between the commission and Airspace Inc., Underwood informed Mitchell that SBAC is responsible for the payments, \$4,721.46 a month, with the initial payment on the eight-year obligation due on July 1.

Airspace Inc. is the company that built the terminal building and hangar at the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

"We must request that the County of Lincoln meet its obligation under the agreement to provide funds to pay for the terminal building as the Village of Ruidoso neither has the duty nor the funding available to do so," continues the letter.

Information over the executive meeting and its outcome wasn't available at press time.

In regular business, the commission:

—Authorized payments of \$14,770 to Southern Avionics and \$401.95 to Merchants for shipping. Cox said the state will reimburse

the commission for the equipment and the shipping. She said she paid the Merchants bill from the operating fund, but will repay that fund when the state money is received.

—Approved a contract for auditing services with the firm of Donald Wingfield. Cox said the State Auditor approved the contract.

—Unanimously approved two change orders on the airport terminal project. Both were previously approved by the Ruidoso Village Council.

—Authorized the engineer to advertise for bids on the next phase in a \$500,000 project to include paving the T-hangar area, constructing the maintenance equipment and storage building and providing security fencing and lighting. Cook said the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) already approved the funds. He said the plans are ready to go, and the commission approved advertising for bids as soon as FAA approves the plans and specifications.

## Village and fire department deadlock over chief issue

Capitan Mayor Benny Coker butted heads with the volunteer fire department Monday night as he attempted to appoint village water supervisor Terry Cox as fire chief.

Meeting before a capacity crowd in the village fire hall, which no longer houses the emergency vehicle and fire department equipment, Coker and trustees Norm Renfro, Lee York and David Rouleau received the Volunteer Fire Department (VFD) bylaws from VFD secretary Jimmie

Wright.

Coker immediately tabled the bylaws "for further review" and named Cox as an "interim" fire chief until VFD bylaws were accepted and new officers elected.

Cox angrily replied, "I resign from the fire department in Capitan. That's what you just heard, if you want some other sucker in here, that's fine with me!"

The present fire chief Virgil Hall Sr. also strongly showed disapproval of the interim appointment and a murmur of dissent rose from the crowd, many of whom were VFD members.

After Coker tried to move onto other business, Rouleau questioned fire chief election procedures detailed in the fire ordinance passed at June's town meeting. He said the chief could be appointed only after VFD elects officers.

Coker responded, he could approve an interim chief until the bylaws are approved. He consulted with village attorney Mike Runnels, who stated Coker has the power to appoint on an interim basis, but Rouleau was correct when considering a permanent chief.

"It's not a legal situation, it's political," Runnels said.

Rouleau said that VFD members had presented their previous

bylaws to the trustees. But those were just rules and regulations, responded village clerk Janet Keel.

VFD was instructed by the state fire marshal to update its bylaws to current standards. At the last village meeting, trustees approved a model ordinance, which was not favored by VFD.

Renfro stated he wanted to have a special meeting to approved VFD bylaws as presented. "There's bad blood between the village and the fire department," Renfro said. "We have got to get this resolved. I don't care if Smokey Bear is fire chief, as long as we're in line with state statutes. We're not going about this in the right way."

Coker commented, "You can't talk to people who won't talk to you," in reference to VFD. He indicated VFD held "secret" meetings with no trustees and attorneys.

VFD members denied having secret meetings and invited everyone to come.

Hall questioned Coker's authority to override the state fire marshal, who approved VFD bylaws.

In discussion with VFD members during a break in the meeting for executive session, The News learned VFD members recently met with the state fire

marshal Carl Sandefer in Santa Fe. VFD said Sandefer reviewed the bylaws and found no problems. Sandefer also told VFD its request to change the model ordinance was acceptable and would have met the requirements for state funding.

Coker responded to Hall, "The fire marshal is not passing the bylaws." He said that the village trustees are responsible for spending the money and to keep up with accounting, due to liability.

"How is your accounting, what about the minutes of your meetings, election of officers?" Coker questioned Hall.

"By acclamation (election of officers)," Hall responded. He further requested Coker read VFD bylaws before appointing a fire chief.

"Who's fire chief now?" asked VFD member Hollis Fuchs.

Coker said without an election and approval of bylaws the village does not have a legal VFD.

Rouleau ended the discussion with his comment to "leave things as they stand now until the council reviews the bylaws."

"Nothing's changed," Coker flatly stated.

The mood of the meeting was set early when trustees refused to second a motion to appoint Darlene Stewart to fill the trustee

vacancy created by Dave Strickland's resignation. Although the resignation was approved, Rouleau commented trustees were not consulted on the appointment. Trustees tabled the appointment until the next meeting.

In other business trustees: —Reappointed Francis Shaw as president and Dorothy Smith as secretary of the Cemetery Board.

—Approved Cemetery rules and regulations.

—Announced state approval of Roy Woodard as village auditor for the next fiscal year.

—Announced the receipt of a \$3,111 grant for village emergency medical services equipment.

—Accepted proposal for solid waste from Wayne Hobbs, based on last year's contract.

—Accepted proposal for the Smokey Bear Museum from Willie Hobbs, based on last year's contract.

—Accepted, conditional to review of contract, proposal for animal control from Brian Wilmeth, who will provide control, housing, licensing and adoption of animals in the village. Review of facilities can be made by calling Wilmeth.

—Considered proposal from residents north of the village limits to pipe water from the village. Coker said the village is restricted

on extending water lines out of the village. He requested the residents present a formal proposal at the next meeting. Renfro opined that the residents, all of whom shop and work in Capitan, should be considered. Village residents were concerned a precedent would be set in allowing water to leave the village.

—Approved, with a dissenting vote from York, the temporary hiring of Dave Strickland as a general working supervisor. Strickland will oversee work at the filter plant and investigate grants available to the village.

Considerable discussion centered around whether the village budget could afford another employee. Keel affirmed funding. Cox and road supervisor Guy Henley endorsed Strickland.

—Were questioned why the lock was changed on the door to the fire department hall, with no new keys given to VFD members. Coker said firemen could get in where they need to be. He continued Cox would have a key, then VFD could have new keys made from the master.

Response was, "We'll bring an axe next time," in reference to being locked out.

—Met in executive session to consider litigation and personnel.

## Progressive curriculum offered to Capitan students

Capitan High School students will have the opportunity to participate in a highly progressive and innovative curriculum with the same type courses offered in larger schools, according to superintendent Scott Childress.

For the first time at Capitan High School, students will be

identified as being college bound or trade school bound. The students will find a wide choice of courses offered to fit their needs.

Childress said the redesigned curriculum resulted from mandates from the New Mexico Department of Education and a needs survey taken among high school students last year.

Childress said he began working with high school teachers during

January this year. He questioned the teachers on what type of enhanced education opportunities for students they would like to see. The teachers used the state guidelines as a basis for the courses.

Although the past curriculum was in state compliance, Childress said he and high school principal Larry DeWees compiled the teacher input to begin work on the new curriculum. Student requests also were considered when they began building the class schedule, Childress added.

Capitan High School students will have a choice of 68 courses beginning this fall. "That's a lot of courses for a small school," Childress expressed.

The sequence of math courses will be changed this fall, Childress commented. Starting with eighth graders, college-bound students will have the option to take pre-

Algebra. When the students arrive in the ninth grade, Algebra I will be their course.

A change in the math sequence is most evident in the sophomore year. According to Childress, geometry was offered in the tenth grade before. Childress said studies showed that sophomores often are not mature enough to understand the logic involved in geometry. Another problem was the amount of Algebra forgotten by students between their freshmen year and junior year, when Algebra II was offered before.

Childress hopes changing Geometry to a junior year subject will help students better understand the concepts in the course. Geometry also will be offered to seniors as well as advanced math.

A new addition will be honors

math classes in the 10th through 12th grades.

For those students who are not college bound, math will include basic and pre-Algebra, Basic Geometry, Consumer math and Vocational math.

Electives for 10th through 12th grades will be one-semester courses in advanced computers and a guide to student survival. The guide was derived from surveys of Capitan graduates who are in college. The students listed a need to better prepare for college. As a result, the one semester elective will be offered to sophomores, juniors and seniors beginning this fall, Childress said.

Other optional course additions will be two classes in high school art and shop.

Another change, which will involve all students, kindergarten through 12, is the use of a computer-based management system for math, with unit tests taken on a card. Childress said the card system will help the staff identify students who master objectives and those who need additional help.

Childress concluded that the curriculum, which is detailed in a course description handbook given to all junior and high school students, identified student needs and desires.

The Capitan Board of Education meets at 7:30 p.m. today (Thursday) at the school administration building. Among other business the board will consider the hiring of new teachers, one of which will replace Kendall Lawlis who resigned in June.

Lacy, in her second year as a member of the New Mexico Rodeo Team, will be among 80 New Mexico high school students on the team this year. She will compete as a breakaway roper, a category in which she ranks second in New Mexico.

# Ambulance service director Guck: cooperation, coordination

Remember back in elementary school, the kid who was to be given a perfect attendance award at an assembly—then was absent that day.

Something similar happened to Nancy Guck, Lincoln County Ambulance service director. She was named Outstanding Service Chief among volunteer services by the Region III Emergency Medical Services (EMS) and was to have received her plaque at their annual conference in Portales last month.

"I couldn't go," Guck explained. "I had ambulance duty."

No matter that this was a prestigious award which she won over many other service directors in the 12-county area covered by Region III in eastern and southeastern New Mexico. "I promised I'd cover the ambulance that day, so I couldn't back out."

Devotion to duty—abstract until it comes down to a personal level. Since assuming the Service Director's position 18 months ago, Guck made the abstraction a daily reality.

"She's a problem-solver," avows county manager Suzanne Cox. She cites Nancy's ability to find simple solutions to expensive equipment needs, "at a price that saved the county money. And she's straight-forward when dealing with individuals or situations. The success of our recent Mass Casualty Incident (MCI) mock disaster is an example."

Region III Director Jim Fynquist was impressed by the "inter-agency cooperation and coordination" that was achieved. "It's some of the best I've ever seen."

Concluded Cox, "I can't think of a better person for this award."

Guck's co-workers, the Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) she supervises, agree. They cite new uniforms, an "EMT of the Month" recognition, newsletters, an organizational manual and a locally produced continuing education conference as examples of "blending far-flung rural volunteers into a spirited cadre of professionals," as the citation reads.

Typically, Nancy defers credit. "Any ideas I develop came from EMTs. They know what they need. I just facilitate it."

As Service Director, she oversees

the maintenance and supplying of the county's seven ambulances, their equipment and EMT training. She writes requests for grants and is the Emergency Coordinator for the county. She also is Safety Training Coordinator for all Lincoln County departments, a requirement from the Federal Office of Safety and Health Administration (OSHA).

In addition to all the above, she presents classes on defensive driving, cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR), hazardous materials (Haz-Mat), first aid, electrical safety, lifting procedures and others designed to promote worker safety on the job.

Not surprisingly, Nancy loves her work. "It's working with volunteers that's so special. The hours they put in, the sacrifices they make—all because they care about their fellow human. It gives me chills."

One of those volunteer EMTs commented, "Nancy goes to bat for us. When we need equipment, she finds some. When we have trouble with the licensing bureaucracy in Santa Fe, she calls. She does so much for us that we want to do good so we don't let her down. Ultimately, the people of the county are the winners."

Nancy also gives credit for the success of EMS in Lincoln County to the fire departments and the county road department. "We couldn't perform near as well without their assistance. They don't get enough recognition for their cooperation either. Did you know that during snowstorms the road department gives priority to the elderly and ill? They're an integral part of our EMS."

As Service Director, she has made the ambulances, fire and road departments, law enforcement and other related agencies more aware of potential dangers and aware responses to them. This month's MCI drill is an example. "It is most critical to blend all agencies—government, law, fire, EMS, road, utilities—together to work if a mass disaster occurs. To meet state requirements, we must have proof of a working disaster plan and then properly perform it."

Nancy's plaque is one of several that have been awarded to area personnel by Region III recently. Last year, Charles Cox, Howard Puckett, Ron Beich and Lisa Mason

were honored as outstanding law enforcement, fire chief, nurse and systems assistant, respectively. In 1986 the Lincoln County EMS itself won Outstanding Service. That same year Suzanne Cox and the County Commission won recognition for special contributions to

EMS, an honor which Cox also won in 1984.

And yes, Nancy finally received her plaque. "They delivered it to me," she smiles shyly. It hangs on a wall in her crowded office, an outward testimonial to her work.

It won't be the last.



## Eye On The Capitol

One man's tax break is another man's tax increase.

— Virginia Legislator Ray Garland — Cited in Paul Dickson, *The Official Explanations*.

There's a tax break headed your way. Or is it a tax increase?

You'll see the measure on the November ballot as Amendment #3: "Proposing An Amendment to Article 8, Section 5 of the Constitution of New Mexico To Increase The Head of Family Exemption From the Taxation of Property."

At present, each head of family gets a property tax exemption of \$200. The amendment would increase the exemption from \$200 to \$2,000.

The ascent would occur in phases:

- \*In 1989, the exemption would rise to \$800.
- \*In 1991, to \$1,400.
- \*Starting in 1993, \$2,000.

Well, is the amendment a good deal, or a bad one?

The Legislative Council Service, the capable folks in the Capitol who draft bills and perform research for legislators, have prepared a learned treatise, "Constitutional Amendments Proposed By The Legislature in 1988 and Arguments For And Against."

Here's a summary of the arguments pro and con:

1. In Favor of The Amendment.
  - A. Cuts property taxes.
  - B. The phase-in prevents a sudden loss of government revenue.
  - C. The \$200 tax exemption was enacted in 1914. Property values and tax rates have gone up astronomically since World War I.
  - D. Elderly persons with limited fixed incomes are especially hurt by high property taxation. While they stayed put, the value of their homes increased faster than their incomes. The increased exemption would be more in line with present housing values.
  - E. The increased exemption would create more progressive property taxes. \$2,000 means less to a rich person than to a poor one.
2. Arguments Against The Amendment.
  1. Revenues from oil/gas and other extractive industries are down. Excise taxes, notably the gross receipts tax, and income taxes are up. To maintain the current level of services, the state would have a hard time replacing the revenues lost from the higher exemption.
  2. New Mexico is attempting to diversify its tax base. In particular, severance taxes and other taxes on business discourage economic development. A higher property tax exemption is a step away from the needed diversification.
  3. Property taxes provide funds

essential for county governments. That means local governments would be hit hardest by a higher tax exemption.

4. Local governments rely on property taxes not only for operating expenses but also for bond issues. A higher exemption would erode their bonding capacity.

5. Nonresidents would benefit from the higher exemption, along with residents. Good tax policy tries to shift the burden onto nonresidents.

6. New Mexico's property taxes are already among the lowest in the nation. Even with the full \$2,000 exemption, the amendment would provide a meager \$20 - \$60 per year for a New Mexico family.

7. By going to property owners only, the higher exemption would not benefit renters — 35%-40% of the population. Renters are higher in younger wage earners who should share in the advantages brought about by any tax reform.

How much money is involved?

According to a Fiscal Impact Report prepared by the Legislative Finance Committee, 200,000 households currently benefit. About one-third of the recipients live in Bernalillo. The \$200 exemption removes \$41 million of taxable value from property taxation. Increasing the exemption in \$600 increments would cut the property tax base by \$450 million by 1993.

The FIR also noted that the property tax base comes in three varieties: residential, nonresidential and oil/gas. If one is cut, the tax burden would have to be increased for the other two types to service annual bonded debt. Specifically, passing the amendment would mean the debt service burden on residential property would go down 3.8%; on nonresidential property, the burden would go up 2.9%.

Looks like it's true. One man's tax break is another man's tax increase. But in the event the amendment passes, watch for New Mexico to put its usual, unusual twist on things. I suspect our state and local governments would try to make up lost revenues by raising property taxes.

If that happens, "one man" and "another man" will be one and the same person. \*\*\*

In 1988, the legislation which created the proposed amendment, HJR3, passed the house by a vote of 53-14; the senate, by 33-0.

I spoke with State Representative Ben Lujan (Democrat, Santa Fe) who sponsored the measure. The \$200 exemption "meant something," he said, when it was enacted over 50 years ago. The state recently required counties to become current in their property

tax assessments, "so we need something that's comparable — a meaningful amount."

I asked Representative Lujan if the amendment passes, won't local governments try to recover lost revenue by simply raising property taxes. "That's a possibility," he said. "But the public needs to be made aware, and hold those county officials accountable."

How much money do property taxes bring in, and where does it go?

For 1985-86, property tax collections totaled \$265.2 million. 36.7% of that amount came from residential, 14.5% from oil/gas and 48.8% from nonresidential (except oil/gas).

The distributions of the money for that fiscal year were as follows: 39.8% went to counties; 25.9% to schools; 18.5% to cities; 9.3% to colleges; 4.0% to the state and 2.5% to special districts. (Overview of New Mexico's Tax System, Taxation and Revenue Department, May, 1987, pp. 48-9).

When Jim Boverie, just 21 years old, was the victim of a tragic freak accident last Friday, his family and friends did just that. They set about dealing with their loss by remembering the young man they had known and loved.

Jim was the son of Robert and Phyllis Boverie and Diane and John Schattel, and the brother of Rob, Michele and Annette.

"We just want everyone to know that Jim was dearly loved," said Phyllis Boverie. And he was.

Jim, a college student, was spending the summer helping manage his family's River Ranch Campground. As visitors moved in and out of the KOA camp, Jim made a lot of friends this summer. He was a favorite of those campers, and after his death Friday, they talked about the young man who helped make their stay at the campground so much fun.

Grieving, apparently, is a strange mix of laughter and tears. And so, when the loss becomes just too painful to bear, friends and families turn to happy memories. That's what happened last weekend at the Boverie's home and campground.

"He was always smiling," said one camper. "I'll miss my morning hug," said another.

"They just kind of adopted him this summer," said Robert. His family remembered a

brother and son that filled a special place in their hearts—the big brother who one sister called "Jimbo" when she couldn't say "Jimbo."

The playful little kitten, Smokey, that Jim and Annette rescued this summer is a lively testimony to his love of animals. For Jim and Annette joined forces to save the tiny abandoned kitten's life with lots of love and hand feedings as often as every hour.

His mom recalled how perceptive Jim was, how considerate of the people around him.

Jim was an athlete, playing soccer in Central America, running cross country and in marathons in Austin, Texas, and skiing every chance he got in Ruidoso. In between he played some baseball, and made a lot of friends.

"He could be with all kinds of people and blend right in," said Michele.

His passion for politics was apparent in Jim's choice of reading materials and interest in current events. His family and friends were expecting big things from Jim as he headed back to college to study political science and history.

"Jim was at the point of really putting it all together," said Robert. He was particularly proud of the way Jim took on responsibility at the campground this summer. As Robert worked in California, he talked regularly to Jim, telling him how much he appreciated his hard work and maturity.

And, according to one family member, Robert always remembered to tell his son he loved him.

What a great memory to keep.
