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New editor selected for News by Green

Al Stubbs, veteran New Mexico newsman, has been named editor of the Ruidoso News effective this week. Ken Green, publisher of the News, made the announcement today.

Stubbs replaces Darrell Pehr, editor of the News since May of 1985 and on the staff of the newspaper since October of 1983. He served first as reporter-photographer and covered the county-chamber-business beat. Later he was named Village of Ruidoso reporter.

Pehr resigned from the News to become the new editor of the Valencia County News-Bulletin in Belen. He and his wife, Linda, and daughter, Renee, moved to Belen last Saturday.

The Valencia County News-Bulletin also is a Green newspaper.

Stubbs, a Roswell native, comes to the News from the Alamogordo Daily News where he was editor for over four years. After being graduated from the University of Kentucky, Stubbs started his newspaper career with the Roswell Morning Dispatch in 1948, later moving to the Roswell Daily Record where he served first as reporter-photographer, then managing editor and later editor for 20 years.

He and his wife, Florence, are former Ruidoso residents, having lived here from 1979 until December of 1982 when they moved to Alamogordo and later to High Rolls.

Taking a break from the news-

paper business, Stubbs was associated with KC Realty here for three years. His wife, a retired school librarian in Roswell, worked for Pampered Lady during that period.

A former president of the New Mexico Press Association, Stubbs was voted into the NMPA Hall of Fame last year. He is a former Rotarian and Lion.

Pehr said upon leaving Ruidoso, "Linda, Renee and I are looking forward to the challenges ahead in Valencia County, but we'll miss many things about Lincoln County, especially the people here who have meant so much to us."

Stubbs said, "My wife and I are very happy to be back in Ruidoso and Lincoln County, they seem like home."

"I will be striving to put out the best newspaper possible for Ruidoso and area."

Manager Potter is silent about personnel problems

Manager Frank Potter isn't talking about personnel problems that have plagued Village Hall lately.

"I don't have any statement to make," said Potter Tuesday.

When questioned last week about a Personnel Board recommendation that he reinstate fired building inspector Jimmy Neeley, Potter said he would make a statement Tuesday. "I don't have a statement," repeated Potter, reminded of his previous words.

Assistant village attorney Mike Rannels said Potter intends to write Neeley a letter, but as of Wednesday afternoon Neeley hadn't received any word from his former employer.

"I'm really surprised," said Neeley. "I thought I would be going back to work," he added.

Neeley said he had been glad the Village of Ruidoso had a Personnel Board in place and functioning, and

had believed the board's decision would be final. Neeley, quoting from the personnel ordinance Article 7, 27-2-A4, said "the decision of the (Personnel) Board shall be final."

"I'm disappointed," said Neeley, still waiting for word on the job he has held for the past four years.

"I can assure you that Jimmy Neeley will get due process," said Rannels.

While Potter wouldn't confirm or deny plans to ignore the Personnel Board's recommendation, at least one member of that board resigned after rendering the decision in the hearing that included Neeley and three other employees. It was learned that Jim Baker already submitted his resignation.

Baker couldn't be reached for comment on Wednesday.

The other three employees, former village engineer Mike Davalos, former engineering inspector John

County experiences wild storm

Heavy rain puts Bonita out of banks

Lincoln County began to dry out Wednesday from storms that dumped almost two inches of rain on the Fort Stanton and Ruidoso areas and tornadoes that were sighted near Capitan.

According to Gene Parker at the New Mexico State University Experimental Ranch at Fort Stanton, 1.88 inches fell Tuesday afternoon. The cloudburst added so much water to the Bonita River, which runs past the Ranch headquarters, it began to overflow its banks.

The Lincoln County Sheriff's department reported the Bonita River was over its banks at the crossing at Salazar Canyon west of Lincoln. The department warned citizens of possible flooding in the Hondo River Valley Tuesday. But no reports were taken of high water there.

A tornado was sighted around 1 p.m. Tuesday about five miles west of Capitan by a sheriff's deputy. The tornado reportedly was moving south before it went back into the clouds. The other tornado was sighted also around 1 p.m. east of Capitan near the Fort Stanton turnoff by Capitan Chief of Police Randy Spears. He said the funnel cloud did not touch ground and dissipated into the clouds.

The Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, which is on the Fort Stanton Mesa south of Fort Stanton reported receiving .88 inch Tuesday, but not in one storm.

Parker at the experimental ranch said the July total at the headquarters totals 6.5 inches. This exceeds the record July total of 6.47 inches since 1857 when rainfall records began at Fort Stanton.

Annual festival of Arts is near at new location

The old Ruidoso Municipal Airport site is the new home of the Ruidoso Arts Festival, July 29-31.

Sponsored by the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce the Arts Festival is in its 17th year. The Festival began in the Schoolhouse Park. It expanded so much it moved to the Ruidoso Middle School parking lot. Again expansion has moved the Festival to a new location.

At the airport site this year, the Festival will feature another tent housing 22 more artists than last year's show. More than 130 arts and crafts people from New Mexico, Texas, Oklahoma, Colorado, Arizona, California and Arkansas will sell their wares. Pottery, jewelry, weaving, textiles, oils and mixed media are only a part of the arts and crafts represented.

The Festival opens at 4 p.m. and closes at 9 p.m. Friday, July 29. The gates open at 10 a.m. and close at 8 p.m. Saturday. And on the final day, the gates open at 10 a.m. and close at 5 p.m.

The old airport site is located on Airport Road off of Cree Meadows Drive. Cree Meadows Drive intersects with Mechem Drive on the west and Hull Road on the east.

Admission is \$2 for adults and \$1 for children 12 and under.

Boy, just 6, dreams of becoming physician and desire comes true

A six-year-old boy stood on a milk crate next to a doctor and an operating table in an orphanage. His hand held a suction device. As the doctor removed the patient's tonsils, the six-year-old carefully suctioned blood as the doctor continued surgery.

"All I wanted was to be a doctor," said the six-year-old, now grown up.

That event took place over 50 years ago and that little boy became Walter Hopkins, MD, Medical Director for Lincoln County Emergency Medical Services (LCEMS) who last Friday received the Robert Sabin Award for long-time contributions to EMS.

Dr. Paul Roth of the state Primary Care and EMS Bureau presented the plaque to Dr. Hopkins during the New Mexico EMS Conference in Albuquerque July 14-16.

The Robert Sabin Award is named for a prominent physician in EMS and is the most prestigious award given for EMS on a statewide level, said a spokesperson.

Roth cited examples of Hopkins' lifetime contribution to emergency medicine, including 22 years in surgery and family practice in Lovington, NM and 14 years as an Emergency Room (ER) physician in

southeast NM. His business, Southwestern Emergency Medical Services, provides full-time ER physicians to hospitals in Texas, New Mexico, Colorado and Arkansas.

"Since 1985, he's served as LCEMS Medical Director and also is a First Responder and emergency driver for Hondo Ambulance," continued Roth. "He currently runs the ERs at Saint Mary's in Roswell and at Guadalupe Medical Center in Carlsbad. Despite that demanding schedule, he attends local meetings

of seven ambulance organizations, writes critiques of them and collects data on the frequency of accidents at certain mileposts. He personally knows each of the 92 EMTs he is responsible for."

Dr. Roth laid aside his speech and added, "After last Tuesday, Dr. Hopkins almost wasn't around to receive his award." He then related the circumstances of the lightning strike that injured Hopkins and three others at his Picacho home.

"Temporarily paralyzed from the waist down and short of breath, he crawled to the others to see if they were OK," continued Roth in a low voice. "He was released from the hospital just yesterday. Many of his

care-givers and responders to his accident are in this audience."

Dr. Hopkins and his sister grew up in a Texas orphanage. Without prospects, he joined the Navy and flew fighter planes in World War II. Following the war, he used the GI Bill to educate himself, then coached and taught high school while putting his sister through nursing school. "Then she helped put me through medical school," Hopkins added.

LCEMS serves the communities of Alto, Capitan, Carrizozo, Corona, Fort Stanton and Hondo. With scanners at his home and in the ERs in Roswell and Carlsbad, the Medical Director monitors every ambulance call. "I recognize everybody's voices," he says with quiet pride.

And EMTs reflect pride back to their director. "With us scattered all over the county, it's easy to feel nobody cares," said one LCEMS volunteer. "Since 'Hoppy' became our Medical Director, we know somebody cares. He never fails to give us a 'well done' after a run we're proud of, not just constructive criticism when we need it."

As Dr. Hopkins, still showing the effects of his injury, limped to the podium to receive his plaque, the audience gave him a standing ovation. They seemed to echo Roth's last remark, "He has given more to life than he was given."

Area EMS personnel honored at NM event

Four Emergency Medical Services (EMS) personnel from Ruidoso and Lincoln County received statewide recognition Friday in Albuquerque.

Jim Stover, Ruidoso EMS Service Director, accepted the Systems Excellence Award. Dr. Walter Hopkins, Lincoln County EMS Medical Director, received the prestigious Robert Sabin Award.

The two-man Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) team of Richard Vigil and Eddie Jones won first place in skills competition at the basic level. All were presented with plaques during the eighth annual New Mexico EMS Conference July 14-16.

"The Systems Excellence Award is given not just to an ambulance service, but to the entire system that cares for the patient," said Larry Marcum of the State EMS Advisory Committee.

"Ruidoso EMS received this award for the development of the current system — trained citizens, First Responders such as law enforcement and the fire department, EMS from both Ruidoso and Lincoln County — all of which provide the entire system of emergency care," said Stover.

In accepting the award, he observed, "It takes a combination of good people to win this, the outstanding EMTs in the street plus

the Village council and Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) Board of Directors and administration who provide the financial support and direction that allows our service the latitude to provide emergency care capable of winning this type of award."

The Robert Sabin Award presented to Dr. Hopkins is named for a prominent physician in EMS and is the most prestigious award given for EMS on a statewide level, said a spokesperson.

It is given to an "individual for long-time service to EMS," stated Dr. Paul Roth of the State Advisory Committee, who presented the award. He cited examples of Hopkins' "long-time service in the emergency field," including 14 years as an Emergency Room (ER) physician in southeastern New Mexico. His business, Southwestern Emergency Medical Services, provides physicians to cover on a full-time basis hospital ERs in Texas, New Mexico, Colorado and Arkansas.

He has served as Lincoln County EMS Medical Director since 1985. "He attends meetings of seven local ambulances, writes critiques and collects accident data. He personally knows each of the 92 EMTs he's responsible for," continued Roth.

Lincoln County EMS serves the communities of Alto, Capitan, Carrizozo, Corona, Fort Stanton and Hondo.

In the skills competition, Jones

and Vigil beat nine other teams from around the state in Thursday's contest. Both volunteer with Lincoln County EMS at Fort Stanton and Capitan.

On hand to see their fellow area residents receive honors were Lincoln County Manager Suzanne Cox and Commissioners John A. Hightower, as well as EMTs Bill Jones, Don and Lisa Mason, Gail

Hopkins, Lester and Yvonne Lanelli, Nancy Guck and Kathy Williams.

In addition, three Ruidoso business persons presented classes to the 470 conference registrants Wednesday and Thursday. They are Verna Adams, RN, Director of Home Health Services and David and Wanita Morin of Health Matters of Ruidoso.

Campaign Committee.

*New Mexico Federation of Labor-COPE (AFL-CIO). \$28,318 were received in contributions. \$15,000 of that amount came from the National COPE.

Democratic winners Frances Armijo and Tom Overstreet were probably thrilled to learn the Federation gave to their opponents, Ipiotis and Vandergriff, in the primary.

David Martinez, coalition-Democrat Ralph Hartman's opponent, also received a Federation contribution. But don't get the idea that Labor only backs hard-line Democrats. It also gave to Senators Manny Aragon and Tom Benavidez who sided with the Republicans in the last legislative session.

*Republican Legislative Campaign Committee. Legally, party organizations can't contribute money to primary candidates, so there's a question as to whether the Committee had to file a report. Given that potential loophole, the Committee should be applauded for doing so anyway. Contributions to the Committee totalled \$54,726.88.

*Republican Party of New Mexico. The list of contributions had a subtotal at the bottom of each page, but no grand total was supplied. I would have gone ahead and added them up, except the contributions totalled...84 pages.

*Speakers Fund. House Speaker Ray Sanchez controls this money.

As with the party organization, it's unclear if legally he has to file a report. The law defines "political committee" as "two or more per-

sons". Sanchez—regardless of what his political opponents think—is not two or more persons. Thus, Sanchez must be commended for going ahead and filing.

His report shows mostly contributions to Democratic state representative candidates in close races reported last week in Eye (Casey, Winters, etc.).

PAC-Man players know where it all leads. If you successfully devour all the power pills, a new playing board emerges—faster, with bigger bonuses, requiring more skill.

NEA-New Mexico, this teachers' union received \$24,737.69 in contributions.

As with Labor, NEA isn't straight yellow-dog Democrat: they gave to Manny Aragon and to the Republican Legislative Campaign Committee—but also contributed to the Democrat Legislative Caucus and to The Speaker's Fund.

NEA also hedged their bet in the race for the senate seat vacated by John Budagher, giving to Janice Paster (the Democratic primary winner) as well as to Hugh Formhals, a Republican candidate who lost the primary to David McMann.

House Speaker Ray Sanchez also contributed to Representatives Ralph Hartman and Robert Light. Both are Democrats who in the past have sided with Republicans against Sanchez.

Why would Sanchez help them now?

I suspect the reason may be that the Republicans this year thanked their two former allies by...holding Republican party candidates against them.

Hostetter reported almost two inches falling in the Cedar Creek road area with Musketball Road washing out. Water running into Cedar Creek and subsequently into Paradise Canyon caused the creek to rise almost over the road. Hostetter said that .86 inch fell Tuesday afternoon in the old airport area and an additional .89 inch during Tuesday night brought the July total to 5.96 inches for his weather station. He also said Alpine Village received two inches in Tuesday's storm.

The Ruidoso record July rainfall is 10.86 inches in 1950 and 8.68 in-

ches in July, 1973.

No reports of major flood damage Tuesday were taken by the Ruidoso Police.

The Tuesday rains followed a weekend of rain and extreme lightning activity. Opal Peete of Mont Blanc Drive in Ruidoso reported lightning hitting a huge old tree near her home during the lightning storm Sunday night.

Others reported lightning in Eagle Creek as well as the Capitan area.

Visitors and residents are cautioned to exercise care when outdoors during thunderstorms. Seeking shelter under trees and remaining on open areas such as golf courses is highly discouraged.

Salas and former deputy police chief Jim Alston, all lost their jobs when they were abolished.

Salas has since accepted a job in the Water Department.

The Personnel Board, noting it had no jurisdiction in a case involving budgetary measures, did question the administration's handling of requirements in the personnel ordinance to give such employees the opportunity to fill comparable jobs.

Since fiscal responsibility was cited as the reason for eliminating the positions, the board said it's up to the ousted workers to prove otherwise.

"I find it fascinating that they can increase the budget ... hire a Planning and Zoning secretary and

financial director ... while cutting public service and public safety positions," said Alston. He also questions the village's handling of the personnel ordinance.

"It seems to be one-sided," said Alston, adding "the employee has to follow it but the village doesn't."

Alston and Davalos are represented by attorney Robert Beauvais. In a four-page letter to Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., Beauvais lines out the reasons he believes his clients should be reinstated with full back pay and benefits.

"I find it untenable that no one appears to accept the responsibility that my clients are without employment and the village administration chooses to hide behind the cloak of the executive session and not set forth the reasons as a matter of record," said Beauvais.

Eye On The Capitol

Gobbling up power pills and being chased by ghosts.

That was the destiny of PAC-Man, to be repeated over and over in a tiny, dark vacuum tube, forever.

Or at least until the video game broke down.

PAC-Man is no longer king of the arcades. But he still plays big in the Capitol. That is to say, his humanoid equivalent does.

Last year U.S. Senator Pete Domenici wrote an article blasting PACs, or "political action committees." He noted on the federal level, "During the 1986 elections, business and labor PACs poured \$45 million into Senate campaigns, [and] \$87.2 million on campaigns for the House of Representatives." (The Albuquerque Journal, June 5, 1987)

Needless to say, New Mexico-based PACs don't come near those amounts in their contributions. But they still play a major role in financing New Mexico political campaigns.

New Mexico state law mentions PACs as a subspecies of "political committee." I'd like to give you the legal definition (1-19-26E) of a political committee. Unfortunately, this column is limited to 650 words.

The key thing is political committees must file reports of expenditures and contributions in the Secretary of State's Office. The law

(1-19-27.2) requires two filings, "not later than ten days prior to the election; and...not later than thirty days after an election..."

That means political committees file their first report at the end of May, for activities from January 1-May 24; the second, on July 7, for activities from May 25-June 30.

The first report is the big one. Here are some scintillating cases I have gleaned. (I've excluded cash amounts. As they say, it's the intention that counts):

*PNM Responsible Citizens Group. Looks like they're not happy with Republican Senators Victor Marshall and Anthony Williams. PNM gave to their opponents, who lost. There was money for Representative Dan Berry and for Senator Emilio Naranjo (odd thing about that: Senator Naranjo is running unopposed). PNM contributed to the Democratic Senatorial Re-Election Committee, as well as to the Committee's worst enemy—The Republican Legislative Campaign Committee.

*New Mexico Leadership Committee. Governor Carruthers' man, Lee Atchison, is Treasurer. Expenditures totalled \$38,829.63, including a \$10,000 loan to the New Mexico Republican Party, a \$6,500 loan to the New Mexico Governor's Conference, and a \$5,000 contribution to the Republican Legislative

Mitchell is hot over ordinance problems

Lincoln ordinance problems prompted Lincoln County attorney Gary Mitchell to express strong feelings at the regular meeting of the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners Tuesday.

After hearing a complaint of how slowly the county is acting on two "haunting" violations of the Lincoln Zoning Ordinance, from the Historical Preservation Board member David Lee, Mitchell defended the county's position.

"You accuse us of not moving...I take offense to this," Mitchell told the Lincoln group with a raised voice.

"It's not as if we don't try to work with these people," he continued. "I don't mind being criticized but in this instance it's not us dragging our feet."

Lee commented that the preservation board had taken the violations as far as they could. "If the ordinance is worth anything, this is the time to do it," he said.

Mitchell explained to the Lincoln group which included Bob Hart, representative for the Lincoln County Heritage Trust, Nora Henn and Walter Henn and Linda Hart, that he did not want to take the situation to court but will do so to uphold the ordinance. The violations were non-compliance of an agreement to screen a satellite dish by Ron Becker and two unscreened railroad boxcars belonging to Mike Hainer. Both violations have been sent to the preservation board many times.

"Now we'll take affirmative action and apply some leverage," Mitchell said in reference to taking the violations to court.

Commissioner president John Allen Hightower opined the court process is "frustrating and slow."

Commissioner Ralph Dunlap, who represents the district in which Lincoln is located, expressed his concern. The process seems so slow as the commission was trying to avoid the idea of going to court.

Also at Tuesday's meeting the Lincoln County Sheriff's Depart-

ment Traffic Safety project seemed in trouble as commissioners tabled a request from chief undersheriff Rex Skellett for a continuance of the grant which finances the project.

Skellett reported on the status of this year's project which required the county pay \$25,000 in matching funds. The project is federally funded through the New Mexico Traffic Safety Division. It primarily concentrates on traffic control in rural areas with alcohol related traffic accidents. The days for concentrated traffic control are set by the state as Tuesday through Saturday, Skellett said.

"Ironically, a lot of accidents are on Sunday," Skellett commented.

Skellett said the two officers hired for the project were not completing as many hours as required to fulfill the grant requirements. The officers were often called out to other sheriff department situations and that when they were off-duty the vehicles were not in use. To remedy the situation, Skellett said the department is training all of-

ficers to qualify for traffic control. The training will enable the county to keep the traffic control vehicles in constant use.

Two vehicles and two traffic control officers were purchased and hired with last year's grant money.

Skellett reported the sheriff's department still has \$20,000 to fulfill the grant requirements. Skellett concluded the project was successful because it "exceeded all their expectations" in traffic control.

Commissioners considered the status report and a request for salary funding for 1988-89. Concern over the penalties for not fulfilling this year's grant requirements led commissioners to table the request for additional matching fund to pay the salaries of the two officers next year.

In other business commissioners:

—Made final payments and completed paperwork on the Lincoln County roads reconstruction project which included the paving of Alto, Eagle Creek and other area county roads. Payments of \$131,154 to Bill

McCarty Construction Company and \$25,928.57 to Pajo Engineering were finalized by commissioners.

—Approved a contract change order in the paving project to delete the sand seal.

—Approved the release of bond money to McCarty on an approved certificate of substantial completion.

—Approved agreement with the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District for services the next fiscal year. Also approved the resolution concerning the agreement.

—Approved the automated voters record system contract for keeping voter registration lists in the county clerk's office.

—Approved the resolution calling for emergency purchase of liability and civil rights insurance for \$40,397 Fidelity Insurance Company of Roswell.

—Accepted treasurer's report for June.

—Approved accounts payable and payroll.

—Tabled the amended off-

system Federal Aid Bridge Agreement with New Mexico State Highway Department (NMSHD).

—Tabled Off-System Federal Aid Bridge Agreement also with NMSHD.

—Approved the 5.9 mill levy for Sun Valley Sanitation District.

—Approved the school bus route agreement with NMSHD for improvement of county road FO-16, the northern end of the Transwestern Road.

—Approved a county arterial agreement and cooperative agreement with NMSHD for the Fort Stanton Mesa road improvements. The agreements will make \$537,000 available to the county for the project.

—Met in executive session to discuss litigation. When they returned to open meeting, commissioners authorized Mitchell to pursue the Bonito law suit.

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
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


Lodger's Tax Board introduces new member Weber

The Ruidoso Lodger's Tax Advisory Board introduced its new member at the regular July meeting Wednesday.

Dick Weber was introduced as the Lodger's Tax Advisory Board (LTAB) appointee to the vacancy created by Hank Evaro. Evaro died this spring. Weber was appointed by Ruidoso village council.

Treasurer's report was given by village clerk Tammy Maddox as LTAB treasurer Anne Evans was not present. Maddox reported tax collections for 1987-88 are completed and reflect a budget deficit of

\$109,03. \$150,000 was budgeted last year.

Maddox stated this year's budget of \$150,000 was based upon last year.

A question from board member Bobby Parsons of how payments are to be made to groups receiving lodger's tax funds was answered. Maddox said bills come to her office in village hall, checks are then issued from the finance department and certification of the payment is made from her office.

Tracey Moran from the Convention and Visitor's Bureau presented

her report. She listed the results of the resort research which showed villages with the populations similar to Ruidoso spending much more on advertising.

She showed the advertising budget from Steamboat Springs, Colorado. That village spends \$325,000 for summer advertising. The ski corporations spend \$3,000,000, Moran said.

Red River, New Mexico, with a population of 300 spends \$90,000. Ruidoso spends \$100,000 on the advertising.

Moran also displayed the news-

paper ad running in Dallas and Fort Worth, Texas and Tucson, Arizona papers. Inquiries have been 75 to 250 a week since the ads began, Moran said. The chamber responds within 48 hours, Moran added.

Weber briefly explained the Ironhorse Railroad Project which is a rebirth of the area railroad idea. The new project proposes a not-for-profit corporation for its financial structure. Old Lincoln Days

The recent good rains have helped Mother Earth prepare the neighborhood of Lincoln Town to welcome you for the Old Lincoln Days to be held August five, six, and seven.

The Bonito Valley and the hills on either side are all dressed up in many shades of new green. All the land marks, such as little upland meadows, and small winding glens are all brought out plainly through the magic of the shining green color on every hand—so that all the charm of this historic land shows forth in full glory.

There will be three performances of "The Last Escape of Billy The Kid", the historical pageant, night shows on Friday and Saturday and an afternoon show on Sunday. A parade on Sunday and many other activities during the three days will fill out the Lincoln Days.

Back in 1940 New Mexico celebrated its Quarto Centennial, or four hundredth birthday. All of the state local celebrations were held.

Wilbur F. Coe, then president of the Lincoln county Historical society, together with his wife, Louise, organized "A Day in Old Lincoln." This was a day honoring the old timers of Lincoln County and all New Mexico and The Southwest. In that time there were many pioneers who had taken an active role in the dramatic history of early Lincoln County. These old timers met to exchange memories with each other and to tell true stories to listeners hanging on their every word.

As a feature of the day the pageant was presented. To write a script two veteran Hollywood script writers were brought in: Blanding Sloan and his young helper Mark Hamilton.

Most of the material for the script was taken from a book written in 1926 entitled "The Saga of Billy The Kid" by Walter Noye Burns. Burns had obtained the material for this book from Frank Coe, Wilbur's father.

Frank had figured prominently in the Lincoln County history of just over a hundred years ago. The first pageant, which traced the main points of The Lincoln County War, was held with the streets of Lincoln as the stage and Peter Hurd as the first Billy The Kid.

In those days there were ox carts, stage coaches, covered wagons to add realism to the show, and it captured the public's imagination.

The show became so popular that the day in Old Lincoln was increased to two days and then three. And a pageant grounds was established right next to the Old Court House. The actors have always been volunteers, many of them descendants of the pioneers who were prominent in the early history.

Through the years, additions have been made in the show, rounding out the history set forth by the original script, so that the show is truly a community creation, a true folk pageant.

It is the only western show that takes place on the exact spot where the original action took place. The court house from which the Kid made his dramatic escape is less than a stone's throw from the pageant grounds. And the town of Lincoln is little changed from what it was in the early days.

I will go over a little more about the pageant, the history and The Kid a little later. Meanwhile remember the first week in August.

Be sure and attend the "Christmas in July" annual Bazaar, presented by Saint Anne's Guild, at the Church of the Holy Mount in Ruidoso.

The festivities begin at nine o'clock Saturday, July twenty three.

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
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

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Plenty of Water

The Rio Ruidoso lives up to its name of "noisy" Tuesday as heavy rains caused the river to swell to a chocolate brown torrent. Parts of Lincoln County also received over two inches of rain during the week.

Dirty water crisis short-lived

Some village residents reported dirty water flowing into their homes early this week, but Infrastructure division head Becky Bell Durham said the problem was over by late Tuesday afternoon.

Durham said the municipal filtration system is adequate to handle muddy water caused by rainfalls, but some areas experienced "a short interruption in service" and dirt in the bottom of pipes was picked up.

The problem was so short-lived that by the time Water Department crews responded to calls, flushing out fire hydrants, the water was already clear, said Durham.

"I think it's all behind us now," said Durham.

In other water-related matters, Village Manager Frank Potter said problems at Grindstone Canyon Dam are now under control.

"We've asked the contractor to go in and regrout those joints," said Potter, noting the pump-back has stopped the flow from going downstream, but the repair will put an end to greater than expected seepage.

"I can't believe such a simple problem could cause such heartache," said Potter. He said village crews continue to monitor and test water at the dam.

When water levels at Alto Lake dropped before the recent rainfalls, Potter said Eagle Creek was placed on-line. He said so much water was pumped from the wells to the lake that the duck pond filled, and pumping had to be stopped.

Potter and Durham will travel to Santa Fe next month for a meeting with State Water Engineer Steve Reynolds regarding some village water issues.

The Plant Corner

Dear Sally:
I want you to know how much I appreciate and enjoy your column. I save each article for future reference. How about the potted Hoya plant? I have had mine four years and it has never bloomed. It is hanging in my glassed-in front porch in Ruidoso. Thanks, Ruth McGuire.

Dear Ruth McGuire: Thank you for your interest, hope I can help you. There are numerous forms with both green and variegated leaves, but by far the most popular is H. Carnosa which I will assume you have. Being both an inside or outside plant, it must be grown inside in a sunny window in Ruidoso.

In this cool climate let the plant go dormant in winter, giving only enough water to keep it from shriveling. Do not allow temperature to drop below 40 degrees.

Since this is another plant for which good drainage is essential, I suggest you repot your plant in a rich 50 percent peat and 50 percent sharp sand into a new pot not much larger around but deeper. Be sure to add plenty of plastic packing duds for good drainage insurance.

They like an overhead light plus the sunny window. Water deeply in summer, then allow soil to get partially dry before watering again. Keep deep soil slightly moist at all times and never allow this plant to

completely dry out or to become soggy wet. Either will halt the blooms.

Vining up to five feet, the hoyas has two- to four-inch long oval leaves, with big, round, tight clusters of creamy white flowers one-half inch across. Each flower has a perfect five-pointed pink star in the center, so perfect, they seem unnatural. They are fragrant, summer bloomers.

Red young leaves give the plant an additional touch of color.

Regular checks must be maintained for mealy bug pests which frequently inhabit the areas between the twisting stems and plant support.

Change over to a tomato fertilizer cut to one quarter the manufacturer's recommendation and use every time you water during blooming periods.

New plants can be raised from cuttings which can be taken at almost anytime in the summer, if a heated propagator is available. Cuttings should be made from firmer growth and not from soft stems at the top of the plant. You always should have a good rooting hormone on your plant shelf. The H. Carnosa also may be increased by air layering in spring.

This plant blooms best when slightly pot-bound.

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


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Painted Warrior among Thursday race hopefuls

Hit-and-run arrests made in fatalities on reservation

A Mescalero resident has been arrested in connection with the hit-and-run deaths of two Mescalero boys last Wednesday.

Mark Chino, supervisory criminal investigator for the Bureau of Indian Affairs in Mescalero, said a federal warrant was served by a Federal Bureau of Investigation agent from Roswell Tuesday on tribal member Elroy Duffey, 26.

Chino said an affidavit was prepared combining evidence found at the scene of the accident and that found on the truck, as well as information gathered from residents in the reservation's housing complex in Pena Canyon. The affidavit was sent to Albuquerque, where a warrant was issued after the U.S. Attorney's office determined there was enough evidence to bring charges against Duffey.

Duffey has been charged with two counts of involuntary manslaughter in the deaths of 6-year-old Brian Whitebird and 10-year-old Patrick Blake.

The bodies of the cousins were found the afternoon of Wednesday, June 12 by family members near the roadside in Pena Canyon about two miles west of the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

A truck matching the description given by a worker at the 7-11 store at Mechem and Sudderth in Ruidoso was found abandoned near Alamogordo early Wednesday morning and impounded by local police.

The truck was apparently the same one used in the theft of two 12-packs of beer and \$10 worth of gas from the convenience store shortly after midnight June 12.

Police reports indicate that store clerk Thalia Treas identified the

driver of the older model green Chevy pick-up as Elroy Duffey.

Arrest warrants were put out for Duffey, as well as a passenger, Treas identified as Pete Rocha, also known as "Chungo."

The police report also indicates that a third person was with Duffey and Rocha, but that the subject did not "actually aid in the larceny."

Chino said Duffey appeared before a United States Magistrate judge in Alamogordo Tuesday, where he was advised of the charges against him.

Because his case involves the death of reservation residents, charges were brought against Duffey by the office of the United States Attorney.

Duffey is scheduled to appear in United States District Court in Albuquerque for a preliminary hearing sometime the week of August 1, Chino said.

New zoning ordinance is back before P&Z

Ruidoso's new zoning ordinance, finally adopted after four years and hundreds of hours in the making, was back before the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) Wednesday.

The hefty document and related maps were adopted by both P&Z and the Village Council, with the council passing the final bevy of appeals back to the commission for administrative review. P&Z members, before hearing from a string of property owners, agreed to delay final action on the appeals until after the next planning meeting.

Assistant village attorney Mike Rannels explained the review process, advising the commission to vote to take action or not take action. In cases where further study or action was desired, he said a public hearing will be scheduled

and the whole rezone process, including notification and publication, can begin.

Rannels said if the commission rules to hear more on a case the cost will be borne by the village. If a citizen initiates a rezone, then the fee structure in the ordinance will apply.

Capitan employees fired: grievances filed

Surprise action by Capitan Village Mayor Benny Coker saw two village employees terminated last Friday.

Coker said Tuesday he asked water superintendent Terry Cox and village policeman Tom Hammontree to resign last Friday. After the two refused, he then terminated them.

Coker said he terminated the employees because he had "documented evidence" they would not conform to village working policies.

"Neither case has any bearing on anything," Coker commented. Coker said he explained the terminations before the two men and the village employees present at village hall last Friday. He said he wanted everyone to know what grievance rights the men had.

Both Cox and Hammontree filed grievance complaints at village hall. Hammontree said he filed Monday and plans to have an open hearing whenever the date is set.

Terminated village employees have 10 days to file a written grievance complaint with the village clerk, then village government has 14 days to set a date for the grievance. According to Coker the

grievance will be heard by a grievance committee which by law must be a full council and the mayor.

Coker said he is looking into having a special call meeting to appoint a trustee to fill the vacancy

created by David Strickland's resignation. Coker attempted to appoint

Daralene Stewart at the last regular village meeting. He tabled the appointment because he could not get a second to the motion.

"Everything (terminations) was done in legal steps" Coker continued. He told The News that he will advise the terminated employees to have an attorney present at the grievance hearing.

Hammontree told The News that he was terminated because he refused to resign. He said the village chief of police asked him to resign at 11 a.m. last Friday while he was on duty. He said the action was a "surprise." Hammontree said he filed a grievance Monday and he will request a public hearing when the date is set.

Cox was unavailable for comment, but Coker said Cox did file a grievance complaint and will have a hearing at a date set later.

Other village personnel action involved the resignation of Dave Strickland, who was hired as a temporary employee at the last regular meeting. Strickland told The News Tuesday he informed Coker he would resign last Friday.

He said the main reason was to avoid the possible "accusations" that the mayor fired Cox to give him (Strickland) the job.

"I don't want to give any more ammunition to fight this battle," Strickland said.

Voters say no to Sunday sales

Visitors and residents in Capitan will find they cannot purchase alcoholic drinks on Sunday as voters said no on a special election Tuesday.

With 48 percent of registered Capitan voters at the polls, the referendum asking to allow the sale of alcoholic drinks on Sunday lost

by a vote of 172 against and 94 for. The votes were canvassed by village clerk Janet Keel and magistrate judge Gerald Dean Jr. at village hall Tuesday night.

Keel said at about 8 p.m. Tuesday that Dean had verified the canvass and all "was legal and ethical." The loss makes the fourth time Capitan voters have denied alcoholic drinks on Sunday.

Board hires new teachers

The Capitan Board of Education accepted resignations from three certified personnel and hired four new teachers at their regular July meeting.

With all boardmembers present resignations from Kendall Lawlis, Michael Katko and Frank Silva were accepted. Lawlis was a teacher for high school math and the head boys basketball coach, Katko taught business and Silva taught high school science.

The board approved hiring Norman Cline for high school math, James Fowler for math and science, Diane Riska for business education

and Sidney Hammontree for biology and chemistry.

Jim Robinson will replace Larry Griego as custodian on a half-time basis.

The ongoing drainage problem from the school grounds and Highway 48 is nearing a solution as the board approved a change in scope in the project. Engineering plans were displayed which would channel water in an underground conduit from the ball field and highway across property owned by David Rouleau and Virgil Hall Jr. to discharge into Magado Creek. The plans identified a real cost of

the project at \$31,815.

The project will be funded with a cooperative agreement with the school paying about \$6,200, the New Mexico Highway Department about \$18,000 and the village of Capitan about \$6,200. The project will go to bid around the first of August. Plans and specifications will be available at Superintendent Scott Childress' office in the Capitan Schools Administration Building.

In other business board:

—Approved the activity bus contract with Frankie Silva for 1988-89.

—Approved the public sale of unusable items (old storage cabinets) at a time to be set latter.

—Approved the lease of computers for the high school science laboratory for six months. The lease will allow computers to be installed

for the fall classes. The computers will be purchased in early 1989 when bond issue funds are received.

—Heard a report that the school board policy review will be at the August meeting. The public is invited hear the review, Childress said.

—Met in executive session for one and a half hours to discuss litigation and personnel.

The next regular meeting will be at 7:30 p.m. August 11 in the school administration building.

Criminal charge against mayor dropped

A criminal charge filed by the Capitan Fire Department chief against Mayor Benny Coker was dismissed Wednesday morning by Capitan Municipal Judge Jimmie Stewart.

The formal criminal charge from the Capitan Volunteer Fire Department (VFD) chief Virgil Hall and assistant chief Pat Huey was filed Wednesday, July 13.

Yesterday (Wednesday) village attorney Mike Runnels told The News he filed a notice of dismissal with Judge Stewart on Tuesday. Runnels said neither the fire chief or assistant fire chief could bring action against the village.

"It is political and managerial difficulties," Runnels commented about the situation. "I am not going to prosecute."

"They have the mistaken belief they don't have to respond to village authority," he said about VFD.

"They feel they are a co-equal branch of government with the mayor and council," he continued. But all records and funding are a responsibility of village government.

Runnels said VFD problems surfaced after last year's audit with concern over the disbursement of VFD funds. The concerns led to the recent requested revision of VFD bylaws by the village. The revision

would bring VFD in compliance with 1988 state fire regulations.

"All we were trying to do is establish a clear line of command and delineation of responsibility," Runnels said.

The complaint states it is against Benny Coker, mayor, for ordering the change of locks to the fire department, equipment, and paging systems on two occasions, without the consent, approval or notification of the Fire Chief. He claims this is in direct violation of

Ordinance 88-4, 3-3-10 subclauses a, b, c, h, and occurred on June 15, July 12 and July 13.

The complaint continued, by these actions the mayor exceeded his executive authority and threatened the public health safety and welfare. Also the complaint stated that on July 13, 1987 chairs were removed from the fire substation without the Fire Chief's approval, a violation of section 3-3-7.

"The responses were totally inappropriate," Runnels expressed. As prosecutorial discretion, authorized by the supreme court, Runnels said once the notice of dismissal is submitted to the judge, he must dismiss the case.

Capitan VFD is not the only department with problems, Runnels added.

"It is a period of transition happening in other VFDs in the state," Runnels concluded.

'Old Lincoln Day' shapes up

Tiny Lincoln, population 70, near Ruidoso, was once the county seat of the largest county in the United States!

The town swells by several thousand persons during an annual celebration of territorial frontier days. Known as "Old Lincoln Days," this year's festivities will begin Friday, August 5 and run through Sunday, August 7.

Living history camps of soldiers and mountain men, spinning and blacksmithing demonstrations and vendors selling items from frybread to souvenirs will surround the pageant grounds behind the Old Courthouse and line the single town street (Highway 380). Archaeologists from the McSween

House archaeological dig (1986, 1987 and July 28 - August 1 this year) will be on hand to explain the demise of the object of their study and what they have learned from its remains. And of course, the museums in Lincoln will beckon with their artifacts and explanations of the town's bygone days.

The highlight of Old Lincoln days is the 42nd annual presentation of a folk pageant, "The Last Escape of Billy the Kid." Utilizing a volunteer cast, the production is given outdoors at 8:30 p.m. on Friday and Saturday and again at 3 p.m. on Sunday, following a parade through town.

The entire pageant is done in pantomime, with the narration coming from a sound booth. During the pageant horses trot by, guns flash

and a romantic version of the Lincoln County War (1878) comes alive for the audience.

The Lincoln pageant began in 1940 as part of New Mexico's Quatro Centennial Celebration. It was presented in the then unpaved roadway in front of the courthouse; today the paved roadway is Highway 380. Local artist Peter Hurd played as the first Billy the Kid. Repeated again in 1941, World War II then interrupted the summer presentations until they were resumed again in 1949. Since then the amateur production has become a Lincoln tradition. For those six years of age and older, admission is \$2.

Diane Shrecengost will be this year's director.

MAST stands for "Military Assistance to Safety and Traffic Evacuation."


The briefing will be on helicopter safety and on air evacuation.

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
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
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


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Council input is desired on convention center issue

The Economic Development Advisory Board will ask the Ruidoso Village Council to review an ordinance establishing funds to develop a convention center.

"We've got all these ad hoc committees running around out here wanting to do a community center, but the ordinance requires a convention center," said board member Ralph Petty during the regular monthly meeting.

"Things have changed since that ordinance was passed," said Petty. "I'm trying to figure a way to benefit the town today—not five years from now," he added.

Councillor J.D. James, chairman of the advisory group, agreed to place the request on the agenda for the next council meeting.

"This town needs a convention

center like I need another hole in the head," said Petty, preferring a multi-purpose facility to do double duty as a youth center and events center.

"We've got to get this thing off dead center," said Petty, reminding the others that their group was formed to develop a plan utilizing funds set aside in the ordinance.

According to that ordinance, the village matches lodgers tax collections each year, with one-third to be used for promotion and the other two-thirds set aside for a convention center. Board member Betty Beacham, a member of the lodgers group, said she'll present the plan to the association president, Katherine Finley.

Petty, James and Beacham also agreed to ask the council to consider pooling promotion funds with those of the Inn of the Mountain Gods as a joint venture. The three

agreed the village and tribe should work together to benefit the entire area.

Petty said the area's three biggest assets are the ski area, the Inn and the race track.

In other discussions at the board meeting, James said he has received about 10 calls from people concerned over a proposal to conduct drag races at the old airport land near Midtown Ruidoso. James recalled asking Steve Standridge, the plan's originator, if he had checked with neighbors and Standridge said many had been contacted with little negative feedback.

James said he listens to the citizens and bases his votes on calls such as the ones he has had from White Mountain area residents opposing the Sunday drag racing.

Sid Miller and Preston Isaacs were absent from the meeting.

Carruthers, who has said ground water quality is a top priority in his administration, has appointed a 17-member Ground Water Quality Advisory Committee. Members of that committee will be on hand for the regional get-togethers to "engage in dialogue with the public about local problems as well as new ap-

proaches for protecting ground water for the future."

Members of the advisory committee are from Santa Fe, Albuquerque, Hobbs, Las Cruces, Artesia, Espanola and Clovis.

According to a meeting announcement, the group will meet monthly and will draft recommendations for the governor by this fall.

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
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Travis Thornton comes a bit short of the adjacent building in an attempt to escape ladder his character meant to catch on the the sheriff.

As he walks down the board-walk, not a sound can be heard. The town is deathly quiet.

The argument over who is entitled to the money continues into the street, when the sheriff appears.

A volley of gunfire ensues and bodies drop like flies - from the roof, from the street, from the bank.

Victoriously, the sheriff returns his sidearm to its waiting holster, and starts to walk off.

Suddenly, outlaws are coming to- standing and dusting themselves off, as the audience breaks into applause.

The show is over. The stage is a reconstruction of an Old West city street at the Flying J Ranch, located about two miles north of the Alto turn-off.

The actors are members of the White Mountain Gunfighters Association, a group of locals who like to get dressed up and step back in time about 100 years.

The group was founded about three years ago by Matt Thornton, who recently played Charlie Sheen's photo double in the upcoming motion picture "Young Guns."

Several of the members have worked with motion pictures and television in the past. Films have included Gambler 3, Long Arm, Desperado 2 and 3 and Lonesome Dove.

The group is for hire, said member Sid Goodloe. The group is available for parties, openings, corporate meetings, and just about anything anyone might want them for.


"We're modern old guns for hire," Goodloe said. "We all die for a livin'."

We believe the drag strip has some merit, but we recognize possible drawbacks. Anyone is entitled to an opinion.

Let the councillors know how you feel, pro or con, if you have strong feelings. Preferably do this by mail. A flood of telephone calls can be very irritating for busy, busy people. The Letters to the Editor column always is open, also. Or a personal appearance at a council meeting is effective if you arrange at city hall to be on the agenda.

Young people involved in the recognized sport of drag racing should comment. Let them express their concerns and desires. They would be the beneficiaries.-- AS

Enjoyed the editorial by A.S. in last Thursday's edition of the News. Very positive and mentioning the quality of life to be enjoyed here.

It was quite a shock, therefore, to read the article in the same paper suggesting drag racing was "favored" at the old airport. Surely someone is jesting! Who "favors" this activity which might be suitable for the flatlands somewhere - but in Ruidoso?

I can't imagine anyone living within a mile of the old airport "favoring" such an undertaking. I can't imagine the majority of permanent residents here wanting this activity. The question of noise pollution was dismissed as not relevant - but is the most important single factor to be considered. Noise is trapped up here in the mountains. It would resound through the town.

The argument that this is a "youth" activity and would stop drag racing on streets is a specious argument and at best an opinion. Drag racing has to do with noise, speed and power - just those activities we may prefer that younger persons NOT get too involved with.

And - once again - who foots the bill? The overburdened local taxpayer!

It was fortunate the matter was referred to the administration. It is to be hoped that upon reflection they will not approve this request.

A discouraging aspect was that the entire matter was not referred to P & Z for study as that is where it properly belongs. The old airport is part of the master plan for Ruidoso, so any use of the old facility should be reviewed by P & Z with recommendations to the council.

In any event, while we try to keep and improve the quality of life in our mountain setting, it is hoped we will not pollute the area with an activity like drag racing which is simply incompatible with the setting.

And - if there is a study indicating youth would prefer drag racing in a controlled setting to challenging each other to "drag" on streets (which they learn from observing drag racing), I will be quite willing to review the matter.

Most people don't know that when the present administration took office two years ago, that they had to struggle and juggle and maneuver to keep from letting part of the village work force go because there wasn't enough money to meet the payroll.

Well, we kept our work force and they've since had two raises.

Most people don't know that not only is there enough money for a first class work force now, but that there is a quarter of a million dollars in CDs and money funds for future use. This in just two years!

Most people don't realize that our water storage capacity is three times what it was two years ago. They don't know that our insurance rates will probably go down because of the increase fire fighting capabilities.

Most people don't know that the village had to borrow and beg from other organizations for enough equipment and materials just to keep the water, sewer and street departments operating. That was two years ago. Today we don't have to take a back seat to anyone.

Granted, we're not at the top yet, but we're well on our way. Or rather we were. Now it seems like every thing we had planned for the future has come to a screeching halt because the war is more important than progress.

Most people don't know that we have come within a gnat's eyelash of receiving a \$50,000. grant (free money) for the purpose of upgrading our sewer system and making it meet all state requirements but one village trustee says "no" leave it just like it is." I personally don't understand his reasoning when he knows full well that we are polluting a major water source in the Hondo Valley not to mention our own ground water.

We have been working on, obtaining grant money (again free money) for no expense to the taxpayers for other important projects such as a city park complete with a small fishing lake, little league park, playground, picnic tables, etc. and getting our city streets paved, installing street lights, sidewalks,

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curbs and gutters, but we've had to put these things on the back burner so that we can fight our war.

I resigned from my seat on the village council on June 15th this year so I could take a low paying job with the Village in order to pursue these available grant monies. There's a lot of money out there in the form of state and federal agency grants, but some one has to go after it. That, in a nutshell, was to be my job.

My goal was to try for five hundred thousand dollars to accomplish some of the above projects. Even if I only got half of what I went after I felt it would more than justify my salary of 1,200 per month.

But you guessed it. We have a council member who thought a 1,200 per month salary was just too much to pay for a half a million dollars for the for the Village. So, I have resigned.

Capitan, if you feel I'm not the right person for the job, so be it. But you need someone in city hall to get you this money. You are entitled to it and you deserve it. Keep in mind now that we are talking about grants. No increase in taxes, No bond issues, but free money.

We do have a lot going for us. We have the best school in the state. We have the best water in the state and plenty of it. We have a chance to have the best streets, sewer treatment plant, and the prettiest city park in the state. We have the best little village in the state.

Lets not ruin it with these stupid and petty disagreements. Lets work it out. It's that simple.

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


