## Art Fair fee appeal backfires

Council chambers remained hot Tuesday, despite a cool breeze wafting through open windows.

Tuesday's regular meeting of the Ruidoso Village Council was interspersed with heated exchanges on subjects that ranged from business registration to drag racing to hot air balloons.

One citizen's appeal backfired when the council voted to nearly triple, rather than waive, a fee protested by Anne Wilson.

During a lengthy presentation describing her Arts and Crafts Fair located in the old Skateland in Midtown Ruidoso, Wilson asked councilors to exempt artists and craftsmen from the business registration fee. She said she brings "distinguished" artists to town who

rent spaces in her building to exhibit their wares.

Wilson said the village clerk has been interpreting the new business registration ordinance, and classified the exhibitors under the "flea market" section, subject to an annual \$35 fee. Wilson vehemently protested the "flea market" designation, and called any registration fee an "indication of a hostile attitude."

"Anyone feels that any tax is hostile," said Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., adding there was no attempt to be hostile.

Village Manager Frank Potter reviewed past problems that led to the adoption of the new ordinance, stressing that any business operating in village limits should have hanging on the wall a business

## Water table is key to school settling

The settling problems at the 22-year-old White Mountain Elementary School are due to fluctuating changes in the water table.

Cracks in the southwestern buildings at the White Mountain School Complex began to baffle Ruidoso Schools Superintendent Sid Miller. He and board members Rod Adamson, Lynn Willard and Don Swalander inspected the facility and discovered cracks in exterior corners and under floor tiles in classrooms.

A structural engineer John Jaquess of Roswell was employed and a site tour was conducted on July 20.

In Jaquess' report, he described the facility as incorporating five separate structures, each constructed of load-bearing exterior masonry walls and a structural

steel roof framing system.

The report stated the most severe cracks are in the southwest classroom building, or the Elementary Building. The cracks were caused by settlement of the footings and interior corner footings. The southwest corner of the original structure shows settlements of from one and a half to three inches.

Similar foundation movements have warped exterior door openings in both the northwest and southwest classroom buildings and have caused the slump block veneer to pull away from the structural frame. Settlements of the interior column footings created stresses within those interior walls directly attached to the structural frame and resultant random cracking of the plaster finish.


The newer intermediate buildings showed slight settlements and no evidence of recent movements was found. No significant structural defects were found in the cafeteria building or the gymnasium, the report added.

Jaquess concluded that fluctuating moisture content of the subsoils underlying the building caused the excessive foundation movements. Laboratory analysis of the sub-soils showed the soils in their undisturbed natural state to be susceptible to significant consolidation.

When combined with seasonal fluctuations in water table depth, the potential for excessive consolidation settlement is even further increased, Jaquess reported.

The report further stated the soils under the gymnasium and east classroom building (intermediate school) were removed and replaced with select fill material, effectively eliminating any major consolidation settlement problems.

Rigid, cast-in-place concrete stemwalls were used to overcome Please see WATER TABLE, Page 2A

Board members agreed that the total job would be preferred if affordable. Superintendent Sid Miller said there are funds in SB 9.

## Fort Stanton clients will get project benefit

Clients at the Fort Stanton State Hospital will be able to get hands-on experience when the Lincoln County Heritage Center gets into full swing.

Ervin Aldaz, administrator of the hospital, said the hospital has contracted with the Bureau of Land Management to clean up the land that the Cattle Country Heritage Center will be built on.

He also said the upper level clients at the school will be able to get involved in some aspects of the project by helping out with maintenance and other basic activities.

Fort Stanton has been in operation as a state hospital for over 20 years. The fort was initially established in May, 1855 to control Mes-calero Apaches and was named after Captain Henry W. Stanton, 1st U.S. Dragoons, who was killed in action with Indians in the vicinity of Penasco River in the Sacramento Mountains.

The 1,480 acre campus utilizes many of the original buildings that were built on the fort, with only minor changes being made to the original layout of the fort.

"When we build something, we try to keep the fort in mind," he said.

The newest addition to the campus is a dining facility. The modern-looking building has been built utilizing the same style of architecture that was used to build

registration form and a State of New Mexico tax identification number.

Wilson, who compared her business to the many non-profit organization-sponsored arts fairs, said she provides tax forms to her exhibitors. But one former exhibitor, Esther Caldwell, stood to disagree with that contention, saying some artists "bragged" of not paying taxes.

"Last year I paid Mrs. Wilson \$165 for the privilege of being in her 10x10 space," said Caldwell who now owns two businesses in Ruidoso. Another local business operator, Bob White, disagreed with Wilson's claim that artists don't have to pay fees in other towns, saying he spent eight years on the art circuit.

Councillor Elmer Pirelli noted seasonal merchants are charged \$100 for from five days to five months, rather than the \$35 "lea market" fee. He said the fees aren't discriminatory, but do serve to protect the local businesses that stay and "sweat it out all year."

"I think they're seasonal—let them pay \$100," said Pirelli, and the council agreed, voting unanimously in favor of that interpretation.

Also Tuesday, John Greening spent 45 minutes asking the council for permission to extend village water to his property in Cree Meadow Heights Subdivision.

Greening provided many hand-

outs to councillors, reviewing a long process he said has delayed his plans to develop lot Lot 9, Block 1. Greening was told by councillors on June 14, to follow steps provided in the subdivision regulations and take his request back to Planning and Zoning (P&Z).

Issues discussed, besides the size of Greening's water pipes, include fire protection and paving a street that is apparently located in the subdivision.

Greening and councillors continued to disagree on point after point, with the council again sending him back to P&Z.

Greening also described a "scam" involved in land development, that he said could result in millions of dollars to a developer borrowing, subdividing and borrowing again on property that has so many conditions it can never be used.

"This council is as honest as the day is long," responded Councillor J.D. James.

Greening, in spite of his long, detailed presentation, said the outcome was just what he expected. "That's why I notified the New Mexico Attorney General and the Japanese Consulate," he said. On Wednesday, Greening said the reason he notified the Japanese Consulate is because his wife, who is part owner of the property, is a Japanese citizen.

In other regular business Tuesday, the council:

—Reviewed information items, including a water leak survey showing how other towns handle

billing problems after customers have leaky pipes.

—Learned that a request for use of the old airport land for monthly drag races was cancelled. Cleston Pritchett, a member of the audience, said he talked to Steve Standridge, who presented the drag racing plan, and was told the request was not cancelled, but removed from the agenda by village staff.

"I've just been trying for months to get something positive that teenagers could do," said Pritchett, and the mayor agreed, but said the council apparently would vote against a request to allow the drag races.

Standridge couldn't be reached for comment Wednesday. —Adopted a resolution to share the cost of an automated weather station at Sierra Blanca Regional Airport. Manager Tim Morris said funds are available for the station that will provide minute by minute, 24-hour weather information. Uses are not limited to aviation, said Morris.

—Heard Councillor Al Junge observe that things have changed in the newspaper business over the past 65 years, with up-to-the-minute news available through various media. Junge said The Ruidoso News is very important to Ruidoso, since potential tourists are affected by reading the paper. "The problem is not accuracy," said Junge, complaining of where stories are placed, and how headlines are written.

Reading some recent headlines: "Dam has a crack," "3,200 fish killed," and more, Junge said, "I don't think this is headline stuff."

Junge, commenting that The News has a new editor, said "in time the paper can be a real credit. "With just one paper ... we have to live with it," added Junge, wishing the newspaper and its staff well.

—Listened as Junge suggested the entire Personnel Board should be present for any future grievance hearings.

—Authorized publication of an amendment to the ordinance establishing the Economic Development Fund. All agreed with the Economic Development Advisory Board's (EDAB) recommendation to free those funds to be used for more than just a convention center, by adding the words "and/or a community events center."

Councillor James, chairman of the EDAB, also called on the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce advertising committee to work with the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe to promote the village.

—Approved the annual membership fee (\$716) in the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District.

—Authorized staff to publish a fair housing ordinance, as required by federal law.

—Tabled action on convention center study proposals that were the subject of a workshop meeting Monday. Councillors on Monday agreed to reject all nine bids, but

Councillor Pirelli said, apparently, not all councillors had read the proposals, since they didn't realize the project could be scrapped after the first 10 percent was paid.

—Instructed Potter to learn more about regulations on hot air balloons, after Junge said a balloon has been landing and taking off at the old airport. Citizens were on hand to complain angrily of the practice, calling on the village to put a stop to the flights they said endanger their homes.

"Most people love to see balloons," said Davis, assuring the group it will be investigated.

—Heard Al Stubbs, editor of The News, announce he's glad to be back in Ruidoso.

—Retired into executive session over pending litigation.

Village clerk Tammie Maddox said the council went back into open session and:

—Instructed the attorney to start arbitrage proceedings as provided in the joint powers agreement establishing the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission.

—Voted to release liability on the Hollywood well contingent on administration approval.

—Referred White Mountain Inc. back to P&Z with a zoning change protest.

—Heard Councillor James suggest a work area be established for councillors upstairs in Village Hall.

The board awarded the carpeting bid to Barnett Carpets of Ruidoso for the halls, lounge and library at a cost of \$8,987. The carpet will be a 28 ounce weight with a 10-year warranty. The color will be selected by Weems.

Members also approved the hiring of Bradley Scott McMath for Special Education at the high school, Lisa Ann McMath for physical education at the Middle School and David Zale Woodward for English at the Middle School.

In other action the board: —Approved a change order for the Middle School Gymnasium and Science Wing, subject to approval from attorneys. The change involves the installation of a membrane-type roof instead of the

four-ply roof indicated in the specifications. Board members discussed legalities of the change order.

Architect Steve Strain stated he discussed the change order with the two roof bidders - Allen Roofing and Van Winkle Roofing, both of Roswell. Both agreed they would not want to rebid the project with the change order. Strain commented the state allows a 10 percent change order on contracts.

—Discussed structural engineer's report on White Mountain Elementary School. (See today's issue for details in Part 2 on White Mountain Elementary School.)

—Discussed and approved the four-year legal contract with Samons, Scuddy and Freeman, a legal firm that represents many local schools.

potential differential settlement problems in the intermediate buildings. No evidence of similar over-excavations or rigid stemwalls were found at the elementary buildings, the report also stated.

Jaquess recommended isolated repairs to only the major points of damage; the southwest corner should be underpinned and jacked to original level; the floor slab within the classroom should be mudjacked to original level and all cracks repaired and floated smooth; repairs to damaged masonry joints can be made as required.

He stated that eliminating the settlement problem would be cost-prohibitive as pier footings would need to be drilled to 19 feet below the present foundation with underpinnings required for all spread footings. The extreme depth is to reach into the gravel strata below the overlying clay strata under the elementary buildings.

According to past issues of The Ruidoso News, when the 1964 Ruidoso Board of Education began to explore the possibility of building a new elementary facility, they looked into the land next to the airport. As the site offered the space to expand, the board was eager to purchase.

Soil foundation tests were made in April, 1964 by Texas Testing Tec Laboratories, Inc. of Alamogordo. April 30, the board approved the purchase of the property contingent upon favorable soil tests. Apparently the tests were favorable enough as the board approved the land purchase at a later date.

In the same issues of The News, the United State Forest Service listed fire conditions as "extreme."


Run-off from the mountains was over by April and June received no rainfall in 1964. That same spring the soil tests were taken.

White Mountain Elementary School was constructed on Bog Springs. There are cattails and reed grass growing in the area. The soil beneath the buildings is wet.

Miller said the settling problems were no cause for safety concerns. The cracks have yet to cause roof damage, but if they continue to spread, roof damage is possible.

The 1988 Board of Education has inherited a problem they hope they can repair. At a special meeting Monday, board members approved the call for bids to do repairs on the foundations.

Meanwhile, the rains continue to fall, Bog Spring continues to run as it has for centuries and White Mountain Elementary School slowly settles.

the original fort in 1855. Aldaz said the majority of the clients, over 90 percent of the 148 clients are over the age of 21. Most are multi-handicapped, he said, adding that many have been duly diagnosed as having mental retardation as well as psychosis.

He added that the main goal of the hospital is to "find the potential of the clients, habilitate them and put them into the least restrictive environment as possible."

The hospital offers many programs to integrate the clients into this goal, including: a nursery where the clients tend to their own plants, a crafts shop, a farm and a

canteen, where clients are integrated together for dances, movies and other social activities.

The incoming Heritage Center will also mean the refurbishing of several old buildings on the fort, as well as the building of museums to house many of the artifacts left by the soldiers that manned the fort during its heyday.

Aldaz said due to the work of State Representative Ben Hall, the hospital has received funds to re-roof a couple of buildings; however, more money will be needed in order to restore them to modern electrical and structural standards.

Hall's work in the legislature has been a "double positive" for the hospital, Aldaz added, because the renovation of the buildings will help the campus, and will enable the county to capitalize on the historical aspect of the fort without interfering with the operation of the hospital.

With the two entities working together, Fort Stanton may well become a very popular vacation spot for travelers to the area.

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


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# Mast 'copter group briefs crews of area

"MAST may be our second priority, but it is one we're happy to do and one we take a lot of pride in."

Military Assistance to Safety and Transport (MAST) helicopter pilot Major John L. West and his crew addressed 24 area emergency personnel Thursday as one of a series of briefings designed to familiarize the civilian community with rapid transport available through the U.S. Army at Fort Bliss, Texas.

Lincoln County Emergency Medical Technicians Association (LCEMTA) sponsored the MAST briefing which took place at the Carrizozo Airport.

"We respond to emergencies involving the loss of life, limb or eyesight," continued Major West "and will transport to the closest hospital. We do not charge for our services."

Local emergency personnel in charge of the patient determine the need for MAST and access them through their dispatcher.

The UH-1 helicopter, nicknamed "Huey," carries a crew of four—pilot, co-pilot, crew chief and flight medic who is an EMT-intermediate—and functions as an air ambulance over a 10,000 square mile area in west Texas and southern New Mexico.

"We've made trips into Ruidoso

and other parts of Lincoln County," said Major West. Local EMTs recalled a rescue incident near Carrizozo several years ago.


With a top speed of 130 miles per hour, MAST can arrive in the area in an hour. "We made it to Ruidoso in 45 minutes one time," recalls Major West. "We can fly in almost any kind of weather as long as there's instrumentation to guide us in. And we have the hoist capability of 230 feet and 600 pounds."

Major West outlined landing requirements, "a firm, level surface about 75 feet around, relatively free of debris. Our rotor generates a lot of wind and smoke to gauge wind direction, and if at night, headlights pointing away from the aircraft."

Mountains present no rescue problem, said CW4 Merle Mixon. "We fly as high as 17,000 feet."

With a seven-patient capability, MAST has assisted with rapid transport of head injuries, critical newborns, heat injuries and others. In addition, they transport doctors and blood where shortages exist. Most of their calls were to New Mexico in 1987, said Major West.

He, CW4 Mixon and Sgt. Garry Blosser express pride in their MAST mission, although it is secondary for the Army. Their primary mission? "Going to war and picking up the wounded on the battlefield."

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
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

### Downs \$1.41 million budget sent on way

The Ruidoso Downs Village Board of Trustees met briefly Monday night to approve its 1988-1989 budget.

The \$1.41 million budget was signed by the trustees and will be submitted to the Department of Finance Administration in Santa Fe.

Under new business, the trustees approved a \$9,688.20 permanent cash transfer from the Utility Fund to the General Fund for hours worked in the Utility De-

partment by the village mechanic. In other business, Police Chief G.L. "Skip" Hazel presented a letter of commendation to Ruidoso Downs resident Bobby Zamora for his awareness and quick-thinking in calling the police after witnessing a serious accident on July 16.

The trustees also approved resolution 88-23, which is a Conveyance of Gift resolution from the Ruidoso Downs Ladies Auxiliary.

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

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# Community Center idea favored by councillors

What looked like a long meeting was short-lived Monday, as councillors told the village manager they didn't want to hear what he had to say.

And, apparently, they didn't want to hear from representatives of nine firms answering their request for proposals, or a half dozen village staffers present to make recommendations on the convention center project under consideration.

Members of the Ruidoso Village Council called a halt to the workshop on proposals to study convention facility development, after agreeing to reject all nine bids. Since no official business can take place in a workshop session, councillors agreed to take action on that decision during a regular meeting.

Councillor J.D. James, chairman of the Economic Development Advisory Board, announced his group favors a community or events center rather than a convention center.

"I feel like we need to get off the center ... and get the ball rolling for a community center to take care of the Ruidoso citizens," said James. "Going out and spending \$75,000 or more for other studies for convention center wouldn't be appropriate," said James.

"I think all of us agree with James," said Councillor Al Junge, reminding the council that discussions over a center began last January with a committee headed by Charlie Smith.

"If we had left the council and administration out of it we'd probably be moving into a center," said Junge, noting, instead six months has passed and nothing has happened.

James said if the village develops a convention center it will be in competition with the Inn of the

Mountain Gods, a convention facility he called "second to none." James said his committee prefers working with the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe to promote the Inn rather than developing a new facility.

Calling on the village and the tribe to work together to achieve "harmony," James referred to his many contacts with tribal members. "I love them all," he added.

Village Manager Frank Potter asked councillors if they wanted to go through the proposals.

"I doubt if it would serve any purpose," answered Mayor Pro-tem Elmer Pirelli. Potter responded he had "no problem rejecting all those or tossing them in the trash."

Councillor Tom McNeil, before the meeting adjourned, asked for comments from the audience, but the small group remained silent.

McNeil repeated suggestions he made during an earlier meeting calling on the village to leave the \$275,000 on hand now in the bank to draw interest until the village can ask the State Legislature for more money to develop a center.

Councillors were provided with extensive information by village staff in a packet that included contents of the request for proposals, information on proposers and rating sheets. Staff recommended for consideration four of the nine firms submitting proposals.

- Stanley J. French-G.Vincent Barrett, Las Cruces (\$38,000)
- Ruidoso Convention Center Group, Ruidoso (\$75,000)

- Deen Kruger & Associates Inc., Albuquerque (\$82,500 plus tax and 10% expenses)

—Laventhol & Harworth Denver Brown Burton & Partners, Albuquerque (\$78,000)

—A. Wagner Smith, Tempe, Arizona (\$57,200)

—NMSU Wechert CBA, Las Cruces (\$39,770)

—Lee Gamelsky Architect, Albuquerque (\$73,905)

After rating the various firms according to experience, qualifications of personnel and knowledge of the project, as well as the proposed cost, staff recommended the four firms with the four highest cost figures be considered: Ruidoso Convention Center Group, Laventhol Brown & Burton, Dean Horwath & Associates, Real Estate Research.

Although councillors turned thumbs down on reviewing the proposals they received, on April 26, they voted unanimously to request those proposals. Planning administrator Cleatus Richards headed up the team of staff members that prepared the requests and then conducted a vendor meeting to explain the requests.

Richards explained the project is divided into four phases, with each section dependent on further council approval. For instance, the proposal calls for paying just 10 percent for the first phase study, with proposers placed on notice that the rest of the project could be scrapped depending on the results of the market analysis.

By the time the proposals were evaluated, at least a half dozen village staffers had spent time on the project. Village Manager Frank Potter, questioned over the cost of the proposals process, was unable to set a price on the time and efforts invested.

It was estimated that the nine firms submitting plans had each invested thousands of dollars.

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# Ruidoso man is hospitalized following kidnapping incident

A Ruidoso man remains hospitalized and two Alamogordo men are in jail after an apparent kidnapping incident that began Monday in Alamogordo and ended on U.S. Highway 70 in Ruidoso.

Detective Lanny Maddox of the Ruidoso Police Department said Ronald Schneider, 39, of Ruidoso told police he was picked up about 11:30 a.m. Monday in the parking lot of the Desperado Lounge in Alamogordo.

According to police reports, Schneider said three men drove him around in a 1987 Mercury Cougar for nearly six hours. Schneider, who is in St. Mary's Hospital in Roswell, alleged the

driver and one passenger struck him many times in the face.

The incident that apparently started in Alamogordo reportedly ended near the Camelot Theater in Ruidoso where the victim said he was beaten and dragged behind a rock pile.

Maddox said Schneider suffered extensive injuries to his face, including a broken nose, contusions and serious damage to his left eye. He is scheduled for transfer to the Veteran's Administration Hospital in Albuquerque, said Maddox.

Lincoln County Sheriff's deputies arrested two Alamogordo brothers, Frank H. Baca, who listed his date-of-birth as November 17,

1961, and Paul Dino Baca, born March 11, 1966. Also arrested was Rueben Zamora, born April 23, 1968, of Carrizozo. The three were booked into Ruidoso jail about 6 p.m. Monday.

Frank Baca was booked on aggravated battery and robbery, with Paul Baca and Zamora booked as accessories.

Maddox said after he investigated the incident and interviewed the subjects, he dismissed charges against Zamora and formally charged the Bacas with aggravated battery, a third degree felony. Those charges were approved by Assistant District Attorney Scot Key.

# Chamber directors hear reports on activities; membership is growing

It was suggested that a member of the Chamber President's Club be present at all openings, in an effort to increase membership in the Chamber.

Crocker also relayed that the Greeters might be missing several opportunities for openings and ribbon-cuttings because some new store owners are under the impression that they have to be members of the Chamber to have the Greeters.

This is not true, Crocker said. "Our purpose is to welcome these new businesses to Ruidoso."

Cindy Lynch, chairman of the Economic Development Division, reported that work on establishing a flight between Roswell and Dallas by a major carrier has been postponed. Finally, Moran said that a wine festival is in the works for this spring. The festival will include wine tasting, representatives from various wineries around the state and a possible "taste-off" between Texas and New Mexico wines.

Under new business, President Becky Durham reported that preparations for the Art Festival were underway, and everything was expected to go well.

John Jeffers, reported that the Chamber came out in the black for its annual meeting. He said the Chamber took in \$2,100 at its banquet that was held July 21 at the Inn of the Mountain Gods Convention Center. He said the Chamber paid out \$1,634 in fees, leaving a net of \$464.

Don Shaw presented a budget revision to the board, indicating that the chamber's estimated "Membership Investment" line item should read \$54,700. That amount is \$4,700 more than the original approved budget listing.

"An elegant seated candlelight dinner will precede a full evening of excellent entertainment," according to a news release. The "Borden Group" will make an appearance.



## Pony Express celebrates 20th

The Pony Express lasted as a business only a short while in the 1800s but in Lincoln County, a special pony express race will celebrate its 20th anniversary.

With Bud Crenshaw as the Grand Marshall, the Lincoln County Pony Express Race, in its 20th year, will begin at 8 a.m. Saturday, August 6.

The horses and riders will take off from the Capitan Gap road (located about two miles east of the village of Capitan). The race course covers about 40 rough miles of back country roads; through Capitan Gap, down a short segment of paved highway on State Road 246 past Encinoso and then on to Forest Road 39 to White Oaks around the back way.

In the course of about two hours, the riders will change horses as in the old days, carrying mail with them all the way. You can have your mail carried via Pony Express also, as special mail boxes for letters are in several Lincoln County locations.

Boxes are in the Bank of Ruidoso lobby in the Ruidoso Financial Center, the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce and the Merle Norman Cosmetic Studio on Sudderth Drive in Mid-Town. Two boxes are in Capitan at the Smokey Bear Restaurant and Rusty Anchor Bar and in Carrizozo a box is in the Shop Rite store and three other locations. Promoters state the letters will receive an "official Gold Embossed Seal" indicating they were carried by horse and rider.

The excitement really happens

in the old "ghost town" of White Oaks as the horses and riders approach the finish line. Onlookers are alerted as the word is sent down the road, "riders are approaching."

Children and other spectators run out into the road, the tension mounts and the first rider or riders come clattering across the finish line. This is no quarter horse race; in the past Arabian horses were the winners with times nothing like the All-American Futurity. But then the race course is 40 miles.

This year's winners will receive a trophy saddle made by Harlan Webb and an approximate purse of \$4,000.

The race is just a part of the Pony Express Race activities. A horsehoe tournament will begin after the race ends at 10:45 a.m. and a rodeo begins at 1 p.m. both on Saturday. A team roping and one go-round of barrel racing will start at 1 p.m. Sunday. All the rodeo action is at the White Oaks Arena.

Two evening dances will thrill those who enjoy the Lone Star Express at the White Oaks Casino Ballroom on Saturday and Sunday nights.

Fund raising in the form of a team roping and an auction have been successful so far, said Kay Madera, race promoter. Another fund raising team roping will begin at 1 p.m. Saturday, July 30, at the White Oaks Arena.

# The Plant Corner

This week I will explore the use of fertilizer for Foliage House Plants. Much of my information is taken from "Time-Life Encyclopedia of Gardening."

While a greenhouse can provide optimum light and moisture condition for foliage plants, they also must have proper feeding if they are to thrive for years. The first feeding rule is a simple one: when in doubt, don't do it.

Frequent fertilizing simply makes house plants grow faster so they become too big for their allotted space and have to be cut back severely or thrown away. And fertilizer, remember, is not a substitute for either moisture or light.

In fact, it is easy to damage or even kill a foliage plant by giving it too much food. The plant is growing so slowly the roots cannot assimilate much fertilizer, and the accumulating excess may burn the roots.

Most foliage plants should be fed no more frequently than once every three months and this schedule should begin no sooner than six months after the plant is purchased; the soil and fertilizer given the plant by its commercial grower to bring it to salable size is generally more than enough to last that long.

Any powdered, liquid or tablet fertilizer specifically designed for house plants can be used, but the

best ones are those that have their nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium in a 1-2-1 ratio; a fertilizer marked 5-10-5 or 10-20-10 on the package, for example, is ideal.

The reason for a 1-2-1 ratio is that it contains ample phosphorus, which promotes sturdy cell growth; but not so much nitrogen, which makes for fast leaf growth; or potassium, which also stimulates plant development. Follow the directions on the label and under no circumstances make the mixture stronger than the one suggested by the manufacturer; remember, they make it to sell. I generally use only one-quarter the minimum strength suggested and feed more often.

To prevent pests, I recommend using insecticides twice monthly.

Use a systemic insecticide absorbed in the sap stream, poured through the soil to kill the unseens. I like Isotox for one which is very good for red spider mites. If you use a spray high in petroleum derivatives, cover your ferns, Bougainvilleas, Impatiens, Jade plants and Christmas Cactus, to name a few I have burned. Best to check for a spray low in petroleum derivatives.

Pyrethrum is a favorite of all insecticides. At times it is combined with Rotenone. Leaves shine and the air doesn't smell with its use.

behind the festival booths kept most of us exhibitors warm, somewhat. The wine helped too. As I recall we sold much of our wares, which were college student quality and traded much when the last day came. But we left with fond memories, and a feeling of camaraderie with our fellow exhibitors.

During the festival a friend came from Las Cruces, where we were all from, and brought a wonderful picnic lunch. The only problem was her keys got locked into the car. What a time we had trying to get into that car, finally we arranged for a lockmaker to come and open the door. And finally we had our pate' on rye bread, salad, fruit and too many other goodies to remember.

1973 wasn't my last time at the Ruidoso Arts Festival. Before it moved to the school parking lot, I again tried my hand at selling crafts in 1979 at the School House Park. The library had been constructed, which decreased the size of the space available. No one was allowed to camp nearby, the festival was more sophisticated.

It rained again. This time I worried as I had clothing for sell. But I was a bit more experienced with mountain weather, having lived here for three years. But one never knows and of course, it poured. All the exhibitors and

viewers alike waited out the rain, which of course stopped after a short while.

The rains are our natural air conditioner. The day heats up and the clouds begin to form, then down comes the rain and the temperature with it.

I never did the festival in the mid-school parking lot, but did visit almost every year. I am impressed by the expansion and the quality of arts and crafts. Being a craftsper-son or artist is no easy task, selling is even more a challenge. But I love to look and plan to visit this year.

Maybe someday I'll get my hands back into the arts and crafts field. But until then...can't wait to see those extra 22 artists!

## Old airport chosen new site for bigger festival this year

The old Ruidoso Municipal Airport site is the new home of the Ruidoso Arts Festival, July 29-31.

Sponsored by the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce the Arts Festival is in its 17th year. The Festival began in the Schoolhouse Park. It expanded so much it moved to the Ruidoso Middle School parking lot. Again expansion has moved the Festival to a new location.

At the airport site this year, the Festival will feature another tent housing 22 more artists than last year's show. More than 130 arts and crafts people from New Mexico, Texas, Oklahoma, Colorado, Ari-

Admission is \$2 for adults and \$1 for children 12 and under.



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

He added that being able to work on his art is a matter of time now, since the arrival of his baby daughter, Kiana, 10 months ago, and the success of his building contracting business.

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
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# Interesting old faces carved into logs by artisan Briggs

A visit to the Carving Corral at the Flying J Ranch will convince anyone that Roy Briggs is not your common everyday artist.

Briggs will be a featured local artist at the Ruidoso Art Festival on July 29, 30 and 31 at the Old Airport.

Upon entering the shop, one is bombarded with strange looks from ...logs. Yes, logs. And pencils.

Briggs has ingeniously and creatively carved wise-old faces into pieces of wood that he has found.

"Do you believe what that says," he asks a young boy who was looking at some pencils that he has carved.

The boy puts on a shy smile and shrugs.

"When you're taking a test, you

just put that pencil up to your ear and it'll tell you the answer," he says. "But it'll only talk to you if you have a test in front of you."

Briggs picked up a book on woodcarving back in 1980, pulled out his pocket knife and began shaving wood.

Since then he has studied and worked with many locally famous woodcarvers, and has shown his work extensively.

Another of his talents is the carving of wooden caricatures - made-to-order.



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
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# Working with potters in SF provides some fresh designs

White Mountain Pottery enthusiasts can expect something new in Tim Wierwille's booth at the Art Festival.

Wierwille is spending the summer working with a group of potters in Santa Fe, and the results include some new pieces, new designs and new colors.

Wierwille characterizes his handmade stoneware as contemporary.

"Blue had dominated my palette," said Wierwille, whose blue and gray Lone Star pattern has become a trademark of White Mountain Pottery. "You want to grow," said Wierwille, who has worked alone since moving to Ruidoso.

"It's really a charge, going up there and working," said Wierwille. "It stimulates your imagination," he added.

An Ohio native, Wierwille was a history major in college when he took some art courses as electives, and started "throwing pottery."

"It was enough to whet my curiosity," said the artist. He finished his studies with a teaching certificate, but embarked on a career in art.

In 1971, Wierwille began a four-year apprenticeship with Santa Fe artist Frank Willette, and then moved to Ruidoso where he established his studio near Bonito Lake. Wierwille's studio is connected to the home he shares with his wife, Nan Wierwille, and the couple's two children, Chloe and Nathan.

Since moving to Ruidoso, Wierwille has learned to ski and worked

at Ski Apache as a part-time ski instructor.

The entire family enjoys skiing, and the sport is an important part of their lives in winter, said Wierwille.

Looking for another creative outlet, Wierwille joined the No Permit Blues Band as an electric bass player. A tuba player in high school, the potter said he put his musical pursuits aside as he finished college and established himself as an artist.

But Wierwille is back in the swing of things, playing rhythm and blues. The No Permit Band performed recently in the lounge at Casa Blanca.

Wierwille's pottery is available in Ruidoso at the Aspen Tree, Mountain Arts, House of Kelham and Spirit Winds; and in Santa Fe at the Hand Maiden, Jackalope Pottery and Santa Fe Pottery.

Wierwille will be in Tent 2, booth 11 at the Ruidoso Art Festival.

## Downs artist produces functional and also art pottery

Her hands work quickly and masterfully. Squeezing, pinching and smoothing the soft, wet, spinning clay. Soon, what was once a brown mass of clay becomes easily recognizable as a bowl.

She uses a wire to slice under her creation and remove it from the wheel. It is placed on a rack to dry, before it is glazed and fired.

Vicky Conley, of Ruidoso Downs will be a featured local artist at the Ruidoso Art Festival on July 29, 30 and 31.

Conley, who said arts and crafts have always been a hobby for her, has a masters degree in physiology, but she "put science aside" and went into pottery as a full-time business.

She has been making pottery seriously for about nine years, she said, slowly working her way from art fair to art fair and into full time as her two children, ages 8 and 5, grew.

Conley operates Pinon Pottery, where she creates "wheel-thrown functional pottery," meaning plates, bowls, kitchenware, tortilla warmers, and other pieces.

Although Conley prefers to create functional items, she said she also dabbles in some art pottery forms.

Nerriage, a Japanese art form of pottery, requires pit firing, in which the pieces are placed in a brick-lined pit. Wood is placed on top, and is lit from the top. As the wood

burns downward, the carbon bonds to the clay, making it black on one side. The piece is then hand-burnished to a high shine.

In addition to her home business, Conley teaches art classes through the public library.






This is Crown's 13th year at the Ruidoso Arts Festival.



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


Co-owner and co-founder of Studio III Gallery and Art School, Stepleton will display his works at the Ruidoso Arts Festival. He says he will take orders primarily.

Capitan weaver Maggie Doyle began her craft when she was five, making potholders.

Today, Maggie is far from potholders. Her prize-winning contemporary limited edition hand-woven garments carry such names as a "Sierra Blanca Sweater."

Maggie learned the fine art of weaving from her grandmother then began making belts on an inkle loom to sell while she was attending Univeristy of New Mexico (UNM).

Educated in art and early childhood, Maggie tried teaching, but went back to her first love, weaving. She completed her Masters in Fine Arts with a concentration in fiber arts, also at UNM.

Reds, blues, purples and other colors thread through the hand-woven cloth. Maggie's fingers

quickly and instinctively know the process of tying the loom.

"I began weaving full-time in 1981."

Since, she has won awards in Contemporary Textiles from the Smithsonian Institute in 1985, best of show in fiber at the Saint George Arts Fest in Saint George, Utah this year and Fiber Fest at the Bellevue Art Museum in Bellevue, Washington in 1985-87.

She states her garments use "all elements of design to create functional contemporary clothing of natural and man-made fibers that will enhance with age."

Maggie will feature her work at the Ruidoso Art Festival after which she will teach a weaving class at Studio III in Alto, August 1-5.

parents were artists.



The versatile artist has since taught and worked from California to New Mexico, settling last year in Ruidoso where he has undertaken his latest big project.


