

Capitan residents advised to get along, communicate

Cooperation and communication were the key words at a special hearing with the New Mexico Corporation Commission chairman, New Mexico Fire Marshal, Capitan village trustees and mayor and the volunteer fire department, Friday.

The corporation commission chairman Jerome Block and state fire marshal Carl Stander answered questions and took comments from people in the crowded meeting room.

Block chaired the hearing with opening words saying that he hoped to resolve some of the problems the village and fire department are having, including the changing of words in a VFDS ordinance that passed village hall.

The VFD feared the wording, which says that the mayor is to appoint the chief who in turn is elected by the members of VFD. This could lead to the mayor not approving the VFD selection.

Block admitted the model ordinance was issued by the New Mexico Municipal league to help create a continuity in the state's volunteer fire departments which receive state fire protection funds. Without legal counsel, Block said he could not say whether passing the ordinance as the VFD requested would violate any state municipal regulations. Block told the VFD members present funding would not be jeopardized if the wording had been changed.

In response to a question from trustee Lee York, Stander defined the village as being the fiscal agent


for the VFD, while the VFD members set the operation procedures of their own department. He added the VFD constitution must be approved by the village trustees.

VFD is responsible for making a budget for the next fiscal year. This budget must be approved by the trustees who are fiscal agents for VFD, Block said.

"I feel that with cooperation and working with each other, things might work a little smoother," Block emphasized.

At trustee David Rouleau's request, Block delineated the responsibility for the VFD physical plant and fire funds. Rouleau's question was based on recent activities of village officials who changed locks on the hall where the meeting was

Village 'Center' is visualized

What's in a name? Is a convention center an events center? Or is a multi-purpose center a community center? And what's the difference?

Apparently, quite a bit. The Ruidoso Village Council continues to wrestle with a multitude of questions over some sort of center for tourists and/or locals. The economic development fund, established to construct a center, includes the words "convention center," and councillors agreed Tuesday to expand the possibilities by adding the words "and/or a community events center."

The fund, made up of general fund monies, consists of two-thirds of the village match on lenders tax collections. The other one-third match is dedicated to a tourist bureau.

Since the fund was established, various groups have made proposals to the council, and a number of facilities have been considered for a center. But, according to members of the Economic Development Advisory Board, using the funds for anything other than a "convention" center would have been a violation of the ordinance.

With the changed wording, the council can now investigate various types of facilities.

But, the next question facing the council is, just what sort of facility

is needed, can be supported and will best serve the community's needs?

The council voted recently to request proposals on just such a market analysis. During a workshop set to review the nine proposals received, councillors agreed to reject all the proposals, saying no more funds should be spent on "feasibility studies."

But councillors may have changed their minds, for during Tuesday's regular council meeting they tabled action on the proposals, rather than turning thumbs down on all nine.

According to Councillor Elmer Pirelli, some of the councillors may not have read the documents they had planned to review. Apparently some members of the council were unaware of the nature of the four-phase project.

Village Manager Frank Potter explained the proposal is divided into four parts, with the first part consisting of a market analysis. He said if the council awards the contract, the successful firm will complete the study and be paid 10 percent of the total contract price.

If the information gathered doesn't indicate a need to continue, then the rest of the project will be scrapped. The proposals included estimated costs of from \$38,000 to \$92,000, but Potter said accepting a proposal is a pledge of only the first 10 percent of the total amount.

An ad hoc committee was formed some months ago after a small group came to the council with a recommendation to purchase the old Gibson's building. During discussions then, the council asked for more information on the various available buildings in town. Councillors voiced a number of concerns, and many of their questions were dealt with in the recent request for proposals.

Meanwhile, the ad hoc committee compared available facilities, gathered some information about other convention facilities in New Mexico and listed some possible uses.

That group compared access, parking, price per square foot, flexibility and availability of Gibson's, True Value, King's, New Mexico Glass and the old airport terminal. All but the airport building are immediately available.

A partial list of users compiled by the committee includes annual events, such as the motorcycle festival, Arts Festival and Wursthfest; as well as ongoing events planned by clubs and civic organizations. Possible users include Ruidoso Little Theatre, Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, the Parks and Recreation Department and sponsors of special events.

Convention facilities in Carlsbad, Santa Fe, Farmington, Gallup, Grants and Taos were compared.

Drag race issue still has spark

Gentlemen, start your engines. But wait! Don't start your engines...not yet.

The on-again, off-again discussions over drag racing were squelched Tuesday, when Village Manager Frank Potter told the Village Council the requester had withdrawn the drag race proposal.

But Steve Standridge said Thursday he didn't withdraw his request. Standridge, president of the Fraternal Order of Police, is

still working to provide drag racing at the old airport one Sunday afternoon each month.

Potter couldn't be reached for comment on Friday.

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. said Tuesday it appeared that councillors would vote against a formal request.

But just two weeks ago Standridge got a warm reception from the council. "They seemed to favor the idea," said Standridge.

Councillors referred the proposal to village staff and voiced concern over insurance and the cost of

providing guard rails on both sides of the proposed strip.

"We did all that," said Standridge. He said the Fraternal Order of Police made arrangements for insurance and got the guard rails, including installation, donated.

"We really don't know what to do," said Standridge. After he met with Potter, he was told his request would be removed from the agenda.

"I've still got people calling me everyday," said Standridge, adding

Track will start 5-day racing weeks

Ruidoso Downs' 42nd season kicks into high gear Wednesday, August 3rd, with the 1988 inauguration of 5-day racing weeks through Labor Day.

First post Wednesday is set for 1:00 p.m. Gates open at 11:00 a.m.

Wednesday's headliner is a competitive \$5,000 claiming event which pits recent winners Chapter Closed and Gorheadon against seven other 3- and 4-year-old thoroughbred campaigners. They will be going 5 1/2 furlongs in pur-

suit of \$2500 in prize money.

Chapter Closed, a 4-year-old colt by Broadway Forli, appears to be on edge for Wednesday's sprint. He has captured two wins in a row by a margin of more than 4 lengths in each race. In his last outing, he was claimed for \$3200 by owner-trainer Darwyn Howell. Salustio Burgos gets the riding assignment.

Like Chapter Closed, A.C. Arnett's Gorheadon is racing in winning form, having posted a one-length victory in a \$5,000 claiming

sprint on July 22. A 4-year-old Master Hand gelding, Gorheadon had a series of solid 1987 performances against allowance company, and is a definite threat off his best effort. Lea Short conditions Gorheadon. David Lidberg, who guided him to his last victory, gets the call again.

Rounding out the field are Jer-ric's Ego, My Dear Betty, Iwanabefirst, Hawaiian Stitches, Egor, Bet Again and Masked Miss.

Crusher Run stands out



After a convincing 1 3/4 length victory in Sunday's 5 1/2 furlong Hondo Valley Handicap, a \$12,475 event, Amber Branch's Crusher Run appears to be the southwest's premiere 3-year-old thoroughbred sprinter.

A grey gelding by Victory Stride, Crusher Run carried top weight of 124 pounds in Sunday's clash, and still managed to dominate a high-quality field of 3-year-old speedsters.

Reinsman Jim Powell and Crusher Run stalked pacesetters Fearless Ego and Quannah Jones to the top of the stretch, Quannah Jones fell off the lead, then Powell and Crusher Run glided along the rail past Fearless Ego to post the victory. He covered the distance in 1:06 over a sloppy surface. Paul A. Smith tightened the girth.

First-place prize money in the Hondo Valley Cap came to \$7,485. The triumph lifted Crusher Run's career moneyline to more than \$137,000 in only 10 lifetime starts.

He has entered the winner's circle six times. Sunday's win was his second 1988 stakes score at Ruidoso Downs, following his 3 1/2 length romp here in the Memorial



Amber Branch's big grey, Crusher Run, made an impressive showing in Sunday's Hondo Valley Handicap, beating the field by 1 3/4 lengths. Jockey Jim Powell was up for trainer Paul A. Smith. Powell guided Crusher Run over the 5 1/2 furlongs in 1.06.

Day Handicap. The consistent Bold Ego filly Fearless Ego performed gamely, cutting out fractions of 22 3/5, 46 2/5 and 59 2/5 for jockey Carlos Rivas. She carried the second-highest impost of 121 pounds and was clearly the best of the rest, ending up almost 4 lengths in front of the show horse, Arrowhead's Pro. Ralph W. Black saddled Fearless Ego for the Ego Joint Venture

and James E. Wilburn (et al) of Santa Teresa, New Mexico. The second-place paycheck of \$2,794 boosted Fearless Ego's bankroll to \$184,000. She has won half of her 18 starts, finishing off the board only four times.

Peggy Jo Hall's Arrowhead's Pro, with Salustio Burgos in the irons, earned \$1,247 for his third-place finish. Fred Danley trains the 3-year-old son of Syncopate.

A 3-year-old daughter of Victory Stride, Requesta Victory, ridden by Darrel Blevins, left the gate at odds of 23-1. That price was a sig-

nificant overlay from her 8-1 morning line estimate.

Almost the entire trip it appeared as though a match-race was in progress, with 17-1 shot Bonamia contesting the issue along with the eventual winner. The rest of the field lagged well behind the two pacesetters.

Bonamia managed to get a head in front at the top of the stretch and gamely stuck to Requesta Victory's

side until they reached the middle of the lane. After that it was all Requesta Victory. Her winning time was 1:07 3/5 over a sloppy surface.

Lester B. Wilcox owns and trains Requesta Victory. The win was worth \$1800.

Bonamia, with Carlos Rivas in the irons, shortened strides as she approached the finish line but had enough left for the place.

The other three qualifiers from that division, in order of finish, were Texas Club Cutie, William Hugh and Foggy's Christian.





The WC-1 was mailed to all employers registered by the department who pay withholding tax. Employers subject to New Mexico's Workers' Compensation Act are li-

able for the assessment. Excluding farm and ranch laborers, domestic servants or real estate sales people, the assessment is \$6 per employee on the payroll as of June 30. Half is paid by the employer, half by the employee. Even if no payment is due, the forms should be filed, according to Vickie L. Fisher, secretary of the department.

Jail prisoner tries to take his own life

A prisoner in the Ruidoso jail apparently tried to take his own life Wednesday, according to Police Chief William Newman.

A 22-year-old Hispanic male, jailed on charges of aggravated battery, was restrained and taken from the local jail in a straight jacket, said Newman, who didn't release the man's name.

"It's not a crime," noted Chief Newman. The man and another prisoner were in the day room before he returned to his cell about 4:25 p.m. He reportedly looped one end of his sheet, tied a knot in the other end and threw it over the door. After closing the door, the prisoner reportedly placed his neck in the noose and slumped his body, said Newman.

Officers were alerted by the other prisoner, who saw the man through the glass door.

Newman said it took five or six people to restrain the prisoner, who was then placed in the straight jacket. On an order signed by Magistrate Judge J.R. "Jim" Wheeler, the prisoner was moved to the Lincoln County Jail where they have a padded cell.

Chief Newman said the man had shown signs of despondency all day, and communications-detention staff were keeping an eye on him.



Happy Birthday To Dave Parks

Just after the practice last Thursday, July 28, of the Lincoln Pageant, the director Diane Shrecengost, sang "Happy Birthday" over the Sound Booth microphone to Dave Parks, and all of the cast joined in the song.

Dave has been one of the mainstays in the pageant for close to 30 years. Most of this time he has been the narrator, who traces the story of the Lincoln County War over the microphone. He also has played the voice of about every character in the show. He is the narrator for this year's show, and plays several voices especially the voice of Guard Ollinger.

The actors on the open air stage, including an area for horseback riders to come off and on the scenes, pantomime the action in harmony with the speech of the voices from the sound booth. After all these years this arrangement has worked out to present a show that is in a class by itself nationwide.

As narrator, from his view from the sound booth, Dave has good view of the action, and through the years has helped the directors shape the show - by adding touches of action of his own - so that the scenes have become remarkably realistic, making you think you are seeing the real history of over one hundred years ago.

A Lincoln County native, Dave feels the spirit of dramatic story played out by the show, and with his sunshiny personality, very cheerful and helpful, has endeared himself to all of us in the show and to the spectators as well.

In 1950 Ruidoso High won the state championship for small schools. On a football scholarship he attended Western New Mexico University, Silver City, and played football for this school.

On August 25, 1953, Dave's star of good fortune shone brightly as he was married to the former Lillah Jane Smith in Saint John's Methodist church in Lubbock.

They have four children: Collier Dave Parks, Lesah Jane Silva, Steven Crain Parks, and Kaylah Sue Parks. Also four grand daughters, Dusty Silva, Kristy Silva, Clarisa Silva, and Asha Parks.

Dave received a master's degree in education administration from Western New Mexico University

In 1968 Dave and Tommy bought out Dan Swearingen, forming Perrett Parks Associates, Inc., which is still in operation today.

Dave has been active in educational, business, and civic circles all his life. He is a member of the Trinity Methodist Church.

He has made his mother, Nell, justly proud of her fine son. And we join Nell in congratulating her son on reaching this important milestone in life, Dave and his family are a great blessing to us; and we wish him many happy returns of the day and all God's blessings.



West German teacher learns about Ruidoso and area while convalescing

When West German teacher George Bastion began his travels in the American West he had no idea he would spend the final two weeks in a hospital bed in Ruidoso, New Mexico.

Bastion had saved a long while with his salary as a teacher of 12 to 18-year-olds. But finally he saved enough to fulfill a dream of visiting the American West. He planned the trip for about five years, a dream slowly taking shape while he taught in the middle-sized West German city of Hildesheim.

Finally, his dream was realized and he found himself in San Francisco this summer.

"I traveled by bus to meet people," George said from his hospital bed in room 209 in Lincoln County Medical Center.

"I didn't want to go on a guided tour, that wasn't the way to see America," said the teacher of English and other foreign languages such as "German".

He traveled south from San Francisco to Los Angeles and from L.A. rented a car to see all the western "sights" as Grand Canyon and Death Valley. As an amateur photographer, he enjoyed stopping to photograph the "fantastic scenery."

He enjoyed America, the largeness of the western states; the vast loneliness of the deserts. "I could drive and see nobody," he commented in his perfect English, for which he apologized.

"The death valley was quite warm," he said, "a fantastic place for being alone."

The trip was going perfectly, although seeing the poor in food lines in Santa Monica, California was an eye-opener. "I thought all people in America were rich," he mused. "In Europe, everyone has that image of America."

In his rented car and on the final leg of his "American journey" Bastion visited White Sands. On his way toward Albuquerque, after traveling through the Malpais, west of Carrizozo, "the music was right, the car was right, the scenery right," Bastion remembered.

Driving below the speed limit, which is much lower than West Germany's, he came over a hill to see an oncoming car in his lane.

"I don't remember anything after

that," he continued. "It was a nightmare, I was crushed inside the car for three and a half hours."

Bastion said the police told him it was not his fault.

His biggest concern when the Emergency Medical Technician (MET) was preparing him was for his new crocodile shirt and tennis shorts (which are very valuable and wanted in West Germany).

When Bastion arrived at LCMC Dr. Paul Whitwam performed surgery. Internal injuries and lacerations kept Bastion in bed for two weeks.

"I know a lot more of America by speaking with others in the hospital here," he said. "In Germany, no one would care if I had an accident," he said wistfully. "I have come to know people who really want to help you, not with just words," he said. About that time, his nurse John McGrath walked in with his release papers.

"This is a funny hospital," he said referring to the nurse-doctor relationship. "German nurses are so serious, they do their job, here, the nurses keep me laughing," he chuckled, even though it pained him. He laughed about Dr. Whitwam's bicycling shorts under his surgeon's clothing. "He did such a good job," he said, pointing out scars already faded.

When the accident happened, his family at home was alerted, but was not told the location where

Bastion was in the hospital. His brother Chris, who flew from Hildesheim to help, said the family called all hospitals in the west to locate George.

"I'm really glad to be alive," he said. "Those first days...it was really a nightmare."

His memories of Ruidoso are mixed. Ruidoso is similar in land space as his home in Hildesheim, but about 94,000 people smaller. But his memories of the people here were positive. "I have so many phone numbers and addresses," he commented with a smile, "it was like a Greyhound bus station."

"It's good that the speed limit is 55 in the United States, in Germany on the autobahn (where the limit is very high, if any) the accidents are terrible."

McGrath agreed, commenting on his own stay in Europe, traveling about at high speeds. McGrath joked a bit longer and held out the discharge papers for George to sign.

Chris stepped aside and attributed "the great help" with communicating with the Bastion family in Germany to McGrath.

So ended the great western American journey for George Bastion as he and his brother left Ruidoso for their trip back to West Germany.

And those great wide open spaces will live forever in the memory of a West German visitor

State liquor laws information goes to bar owners, employees

Some Ruidoso bar and lounge owners got a short course in state liquor laws Thursday.

A special investigator with the State of New Mexico Department of Public Safety was invited to Nottingham's Pub to explain rules and regulations affecting owners, operators and employees of bars and lounges.

"You may refuse to sell alcoholic beverages to anyone," said the agent, stressing the importance of checking and verifying identification.

A big problem for bar owners is making sure minors aren't served. Since serving a minor can be the cause of an administrative citation against a liquor license, the speaker said it's very important to check carefully the identification presented.

"If you sell to a minor, you're looking at a \$300 fine plus court costs and up to six months in jail," he said, noting the sentence is up to the judge.

If there's any question, the speaker suggested asking for supporting documentation—other forms of identification with the same information.

"If someone shows a fake ID, confiscate it," advised the agent. "If they admit they were using someone else's license they're going to jail," he added. The investigator said when he catches a minor with a fake ID he charges that person with minor in possession, conceal-

ing identification and presenting false proof of age.

The speaker then gave some tips on how to recognize fake identification, displaying some of the innovative documents he has confiscated over the years. He said everyone in the bar needs to be aware of the laws affecting them—from the owner to the barman, bartender and cocktail server.

"You're in a very responsible business, so consequently you have to be very responsible people," he said.

He encouraged employees to help each other out to be sure a minor isn't admitted on false information, and then served. If you know someone is underage, tell the bartender or server, he advised.

And, if there's any question, just call the local police to come check.

According to state laws, a minor may be employed in a restaurant serving alcohol, but may not deliver the beverage to the table. Minors also are allowed to work in bands at lounges, but must be escorted to an office or off the premises during breaks.

Anna Mooney of Nottingham's questioned the investigator over how a lounge could have an activity strictly for teens, with no alcohol served. Such an event is possible, by notifying the Alcohol and Gaming Department in advance of the time and date. The agent said the area where liquor is kept must be totally sealed off and the owner must ensure that guests do not bring in any liquor. Some establishments in other towns have en-

countered problems with teen events, he said.

Other regulations explained include:

—drinks may not be sold for less than half the normal or customary price;

—a person may not have more than two unconsumed drinks on the table;

—drinks may not be awarded as prizes for a special event;

—no one may walk out of a lounge or bar with an open container

—neither workers, owners nor customers may be on the premises when intoxicated;

—signs must be posted that no firearms are allowed and that no sales will be made to obviously intoxicated people.

"I don't care if God comes down from Heaven—at 2 o'clock you don't serve a drink," said the agent. He said drinks may not be served from 2 a.m. until 7 a.m., and everyone except a clean-up crew must be out of the establishment after the 2 a.m. closing time.

Other rules his department enforces cover prostitutes working from bars and commercial gambling—both illegal in New Mexico.

He said bootlegging also is illegal, with anyone caught unlawfully selling alcohol beverages subject to losing his or her vehicle, liquor, profits and is subject to jail.

"You're paying your hard-earned dollars and they're not paying anything," said the investigator, encouraging people to report the unlawful sale of liquor

Pilot puts down during Art Festival

Most of the thousands of visitors to the Ruidoso 17th Annual Arts and Crafts Show arrived in cars.

But Vernon Stanley Peterson of Valley View, Texas, zoomed onto the site of the Art Festival in a light twin-engine plane.

According to Ruidoso Police reports, the 62-year-old pilot landed at the old airport about 1:50 p.m.

Saturday. Police were at the scene to cite Peterson for landing on a closed runway.

Officers kept the runway clear for the pilot to take off and move his aircraft to the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport. He was also cited for taking off from the closed facility, said Police Chief William Newman.

The Ruidoso Municipal Airport was officially closed at the end of June, and the information was placed in Federal Aviation Administration computers. The runways are marked with a large "X."

"It was kind of an inappropriate time to be landing," said Village Manager Frank Polter who was on the scene at the festival.

area from Second to Fifth Street. Bears also have been sighted in the Upper Canyon, Perk Canyon and Ponderosa Heights.

While Ruidoso has a long-standing tradition of bear visits, they usually come into residential areas after dark or very early in the morning. The bears in Ruidoso Monday ventured out in broad daylight, and Hughes believes the unusual behavior was caused by the hot, dry weather.

"They were probably heading for the river to get a drink," said Hughes, noting the dry weather earlier this summer also might have driven the bears down from the high areas where they usually feed on green grass and sprouts.

Hughes and Hayes, when they

find a bear, attempt to push the large visitor back into the timber by tossing firecrackers. They try to keep the creatures from coming into contact with people.

"One was huge," said Hughes describing the marauders that came into town Monday. He estimated one of the bears to weigh as much as 500 pounds, with the others in the 200-pound range.

"Generally they seemed to be a little thin," said Hughes, who discovered some people intentionally feeding the bears; he warned them to stop. Hughes said he'll be giving citations if he finds that citizens are feeding the bears.

"They may look funny sitting on a dumpster or moseying around the yard, but bears are very dangerous," said Hughes. He said the creatures are big, powerful and

very moody.

Besides not baiting bears, Hughes asks residents to keep garbage and dog food off decks. He said that really tempts bears.

"They scrounge for anything, including hummingbird feeders," said Hughes.

If a bear is sighted, Hughes advises residents to steer clear of the critter and call the Ruidoso Police Department, 257-7365.

With bear season set to open today (Monday), August 1, some of the problems will be alleviated, said Hughes. He said some of these bears will be driven back to the high country or caught by hunters.

A license is required to hunt bears, and Hughes reminds people not to shoot at the animals that wander into town.

held, and which formerly housed the emergency rescue wagon, and the use of fire department chairs; both situations without the consent or knowledge of fire officials, the VFD claimed.

Block said he knew of the "chair" situation. He opined the situation would not have happened had there been informal cooperation and communication between the VFD and village hall.

Block defended the VFD right to limit access to VFD property to anyone not an officer or VFD member, even village officials, without the fire chief's approval. To be considered VFDOM property, the items or facility in question must have been purchased or constructed with fire protection funds, Stander added.

Rouleau further questioned the right of village officials to change the locks to the fire hall which housed the VFD pagers, the rescue wagon and the two pumper trucks.

As Block did not know the details, he had Choker explain the situation. Choker said the VFD had vacated the fire hall in favor of the substation located in the subdivi-

sions. As the village needed a meeting area, the chairs were taken from the fire substation, after Choker asked if they could be moved.

A chuckle from audience members moved Choker to ask "is that a joke?"

He continued that the building was vacant, and he ordered the locks changed to protect village documents stored in the hall. He claimed he had keys furnished to the VFD for the garage where the fire pumps are kept. He also said he had one of the electric garage door openers converted to manual.

Choker asked if the fire chief has responsibility to anyone. Block answered the fire chief has to account for all VFD inventory to the village.

Stander said he had dealt with the building situation in other departments in the state. The normal requirement was an agreement on the worth of an area then the village and VFD could transfer funds or property based on appraisal.

Fire Chief Virgil Hall was concerned about the fire trucks with only five VFD officers had keys.

Block commented on a police report of the locks change and said

that former village employee Dave Strickland said he took a box of keys to VFD members.

"This gets back to communications," Choker pined.

Assistant fire chief Pat Hey said Choker met with the VFD only once; when he gave them an eight by ten foot room and told them of plans to sell the rescue wagon.

"It's true about the locks," he said and continued about the charges filed against the mayor. Hey complained about the dismissal of the charges by the village attorney Mike Runnells.

"You were the one who complained," Runnells responded. "I'd dismiss them again, if you file another they would be just as bogus."

Block urged everyone to abide by the ordinance in dealing with VFD problems. He agreed with Runnells that the situation was largely political and personal disagreements.

VFD members and Chokers all agreed Capitan has a "good" fire department. The major disagreement was with the wording on the ordinance as there were fears Chokers would not appoint the fire chief-elect. Block emphasized the mayor does not select the chief, but

people from all over the state are ready to come to Ruidoso, stay in lodgings and spend money. Since a number of Ruidoso people travel to drag race events in other towns, Standridge said it's time to bring some of that money back to Ruidoso.

Standridge had asked the council for permission to stage a drag race on Sunday, August 20, as a trial. If things went well the police organization he heads wanted to have a drag race event for six hours one Sunday afternoon each month.

Councillors questioned after what Standridge believed was a promising response to his presentation, said they got many calls from neighbors concerned over the noise.

"It's not going to be an overbearing noise," said Standridge, comparing the noise to the sound of a vehicle without a muffler. "It's nowhere like an airplane landing," he added.

Standridge, a member of the New Mexico State Police, said he is promoting the races as an individual, not as a state employee.

But, as a law enforcement officer, Standridge and other members of the Fraternal Order of Police, have seen many area teens drag racing on city streets and county roads.

Standridge said they hope to channel that interest to the organized racing, to avoid having young people injured or killed. He said the group will have a safety committee to inspect cars that take part in the drags.

"Our main purpose is to give the kids in this area something to do," said Standridge. Even those who don't race can enjoy drag racing as spectators, he said.

Clestone Pritchett, who asked Standridge and his group to take on the project, said he has been working for months to come up with some activities for area teens. He said monthly drag races would be ideal.

Both men describe drag racing as a man sport, and Pritchett noted it's an activity that often draws fathers and sons closer together.

Standridge said races are conducted on alternating weeks in

Swell and Alamogordo, but people in those towns have agreed to forego the week that Ruidoso plans a race, so they can come to that event. He said as many as 100 cars could be expected to race.

The Fraternal Order of Police would see that no liquor is present at the races, and would enforce all the safety regulations, said Standridge.

If the village plans to use the old airport for some other purpose in the future, Standridge said the guard rails would be no problem to remove. "Why not let us use it until then?" asked Standridge.

"We're kind of at a stalemate," said Standridge. "We don't want to drop it; we've had so much support from citizens."

Standridge said he's not giving up, and the Fraternal Order of Police will continue to work on the plan. In the meantime, he said anyone wanting drag racing at the old airport, should discuss it with members of the Ruidoso Village Council.

"We're only asking for once a month," he said.

Stander said any VFD property taken or used with approval will be reimbursed or paid based on appraisal. A cooperative agreement for the use of the fire hall was recommended between the village and VFD.

Block also ordered all written communications, especially in budgeting, between the fire chief and his office will go to the VFDS and the village.

A question of donations to the fire department brought Block's answer that the VFD is under direct supervision of the village. Unless donations specify where the money is to be used, such as equipment, it will be added to the fire fund.

Joint agreements between the VFD and such agencies as the State Forestry Department and the United States Forest Service for help on fires was discussed. Block said reimbursements for equipment

use would go to the village fire fund and reimbursements to fire fighters would go directly to the fighters themselves.

Block emphasized to Hall "you are a part of the village." Block suggested the VFD incorporate to facilitate the acceptance of donated funds.

Again Block stressed the need for cooperation. "It works both ways, put aside your differences and make an agreement (on the chairs) at your next meeting."

He said the argument about the chairs is "nitpicking."

"I hate to come back and have to put the fire department under probation. It could possibly put next year's funding in jeopardy."

Trustee Norm Renfro, who had remained silent most of the hearing said he was not a firefighter and not sure why he was a trustee. As Virgil Hall was involved with the fire department for 40 years, he was the fire department, Renfro said.

"Fire protection is the main issue, no way I would ever jeopardize that." And he approved of Hall as chief.

Block adjourned the meeting at 12:49 p.m.

Any community has a certain reputation whether it be good or bad. Much of a community's charisma or lack of it depends on the attitude of service people in a particular town or village.

Visit any community which seems vibrant and very much alive, and you will find the service people, the waitresses, bus boys, service station attendants, grocery clerks, convenience store managers, bank employees, etc., cheerful and apparently anxious to serve.

Other communities appear dead. Service people are rude, not courteous and act like they are doing you a favor to wait on you.

Much of the attitude of employees goes back to management's treatment of employees. Employees who are treated fairly and courteously usually respond in a very positive way.

There are a few "duds" in Ruidoso, but in the main we have found the village to be filled with very courteous service people. The village does seem very much alive, especially this time of year.

Businesses which aren't doing too well might do well to review personnel policies. A cheerful face, a smile and a genuine interest in people, these are priceless commodities in the business world.

You may go home and kick the dog after a hard day's work, but restrict such behavior to home and hearth. We hope Ruidoso continues to put its best foot forward. Much depends on this. --AS

Eye On The Capitol

"Whither The State Legislature?"
Ever wonder where the New Mexico State Legislature is headed?

What will it be like, say, in 2,010?

Try this: Picture your local legislator making \$57,500 per year, plus \$75 per day when the legislature is in session.

Add on \$25,000 - \$42,000 per year, if your lawmaker is the Speaker, President Pro Tem, majority leader or minority leader.

There's another \$9,000 - \$13,000 for committee chairman.

Don't forget dental and optical insurance, life insurance, health/hospitalization insurance.

All that, incidentally, is how it works in New York, starting January, 1989.

New Mexico legislators presently receive \$75 per day when they're in session or attending interim committees, and 25 cents per mile for travel.

Why the gigantic difference in legislators' compensation?

New York has a full-time, professional legislature; New Mexico, a part-time "citizen" legislature.

Therein lies the usefulness of mentioning New York. It shows one end of the legislature spectrum, New Mexico another.

The compensation data are from the National Conference of State Legislatures. The information was handed out to members of the Legislative Reform Committee, an interim committee of New Mexico state senators and representatives who are investigating ways to "update and modernize" the legislature.

The Reform Committee and the compensation question are themselves signs of the times.

And what, exactly, are those times?

The information packet included a paper by Alan Rosenthal of Rutgers University. If you want to know what Speaker Ray Sanchez and Senate Republican leader Les Houston are reading right now, this could be it:

Rosenthal observed several national trends underway in state legislatures: "First, the legislative career is becoming professionalized; second, legislative behavior and the legislative process are increasingly politicized; and third, the legislative institution is more fragmented, and leaders are severely taxed trying to get things together."

Demands caused by the increasing complexity of society underpin the trend toward full-time, professional lawmakers. Rosenthal noted, "Years ago relatively few interests were represented at the state level; now there are many...Most states have also witnessed an explosion of lobbyists...It

used to be that most legislatures met biennially; today all but seven meet annually."

New Mexico's state legislature meets 60 day and 30 days, in odd and even-numbered years respectively. But pressure is mounting to make the sessions longer. And already, interim legislative committees, such as the Reform Committee, are rapidly growing in numbers and in demands on members' time.

A bigger work load generates a push for better pay. Rosenthal wrote, "States that value the citizen legislator, but also want to compensate members as fairly as practicable, are cross pressured."

The trend toward professional legislators:

*is reducing the number of businessmen and private professionals in legislatures.

*Fewer professional incumbent legislators "retire voluntarily." Incumbents in professional state legislatures have a re-election success rate of about 90%. Professionalism increases entrenchment because incumbents have more resources—technology, money, legislative aides and personal staffs.

*Higher politicalization. Rosenthal observed that whereas "lobbyists used to prey on legislators, the tables have turned; now, legislators seem to be preying on lobbyists."

Legislative leaders become more directly involved in their colleagues' campaigns. "Partnership has grown [and] is becoming nastier."

"In more and more states," Rosenthal concludes, "winning power is becoming more important to legislators than exercising it."

*Fragmentation: "the individualism of legislators has risen markedly." California's professional legislature has been compared to "an Oriental bazaar with 120 rug merchants...peddling their wares to colleagues, lobbyists, the governor and whoever else may come along."

The bottom line, Rosenthal believes, is the national trends "are taking a toll." The situation in the legislature today may be analogous to that of our infrastructure at the state and local level. We are spending too little on maintenance: our facilities are running down.

New Mexico won't make the big leap soon to a full-time professional legislature. We're too rural and small townish for that. But the pressures will be in that direction.

Membership in the growing club of semi-professional legislatures may not be far off.

Regarding legislators' compensation, we're close to the "bottom of the barrel" -- but not the bottom per se. That honor belongs to New Hampshire, which pays lawmakers

\$100 per year, plus health/hospitalization insurance (paid by the member). Presiding officers of the house and senate get an extra 25 bucks. As for per diem, mileage, access to a car, gas or phone credit cards, don't even ask. They don't call New Hampshire "The Granite State" for nothing.

Attorney General Hal Stratton's fight to keep teachers out of the state legislature could be an important turning point in a much wider war.

"Nationally," Rosenthal wrote, "the proportion of attorneys declined from 30 percent in 1960, to...about 16 percent by 1985." If attorneys decline, who rises? "In recent years teachers—frequently sponsored by local education associations—have been the largest growing occupational grouping in the legislature."

Stratton is an attorney and a former state representative.


