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New DA believes communications is key

Bert Atkins is getting a head start on the job he'll be seeking in the November general elections.

Atkins, the Democratic nominee for district attorney for the 12th District, was sworn into office Monday as interim DA. Atkins is unopposed in the upcoming election.

Former District Attorney James Weldon resigned in June, citing poor health as his reason for stepping down before the end of his four-year term.

Settling into his new office on the third floor of the Otero County Courthouse, Atkins said one of his first priorities will be establishing good communications among all the law enforcement agencies in the

district. He said he'll be traveling throughout the two-county area to meet with heads of departments.

Atkins talked during his campaign of setting up a task group of law officers to deal with homicide investigations, and said he'll bring heads of those departments and their investigators together for a roundtable discussion on that plan.

The new DA said his ultimate goal is to have the various agencies communicating and clear on their responsibilities before they're called to the scene of another homicide. "It's clearly an area the people are concerned about," said Atkins, recalling comments and questions he heard while campaigning for the nomination. He noted this district has a large number of homicide cases right now.

A major area of concern for the interim prosecutor is the continuity of ongoing cases, as well as continuity of assistants. Although two of the four assistant prosecutors have advised Atkins they'll be resigning within the next few months, he was unwilling to release those names.

Atkins agreed that drugs were an issue that continued to surface during the primary election, and said he expects to see increased success in prosecuting drug-related cases.

He said he'll make his "office available to law enforcement agencies 100 percent" and back those investigations, predicting more successful and more productive results in drug cases.

As he puts together the budget

in Santa Fe on September 1, Atkins is evaluating if the case load merits a request for another assistant. He said this district is operating at the same budgetary level as two years ago, while other districts have received budget increases.

Atkins said he'll testify in budget hearings to see that the 12th Judicial District receives adequate funding to prosecute what appears to be a growing case load.

"I intend to be going to Lincoln County on a fairly regular basis," said Atkins. Assistant district attorney Scot Key is assigned to the Lincoln County branch in Carrizozo, but Atkins said he'll become more involved as he and his staff deal with the district as a whole.

Atkins, while heavily involved in

office administration and budgets right now, said he'll spend more time in the courtroom than his predecessor. It was learned that Weldon prosecuted just two cases while he was chief law enforcement officer for the district.

"It's a very exciting time—a time when I want to jump in and do 13 things at once," said Atkins, who's concentrating on settling in and acquainting himself with current operations.

A lifelong Alamogordo resident, Atkins received both his bachelor's degree and jurisdoctorate from the University of New Mexico. Atkins spent five years as district public defender, and has served as an assistant district attorney for the 12th Judicial District.

Events center need hashed out

After a meal of Cajun dishes, representatives of the Ruidoso Village council and administration, Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, Ruidoso Lodgers' Association and the Ruidoso Economic Advisory Board discussed the need for a community events center at a workshop hosted by Finley's La Junta Sunday night.

Katherine Finley, president of the Ruidoso Lodgers' Association (RLA), soon to be Lincoln County Hospitality Association, brought the groups together to gain "posi-

tive" input for the events center. "It's better to make decisions over good food," Finley told the group, who had finished Creole Jumbalia and Creole Decadence (a rich desert).

Cleatus Richards, representing the village of Ruidoso, explained a Request for Proposals (RFP) for a feasibility study for marketing and architectural services for convention facilities. The proposals were discussed in the June 10 village council meeting.

Nine proposals received July 5 were analyzed and reduced to four firms. The lowest proposal was \$75,000 and the most expensive

\$92,000. Richards emphasized the proposals were negotiable. Arguments were presented that the cost of RFP would take funds that could ultimately be used to construct a facility.

All groups present echoed the desire to have an events center as opposed to an exclusive "convention center." Ruidoso councilor J.D. James said he did not want a convention center as it would compete with the Inn of the Mountain Gods (Inn) convention center. He said the lodgers he spoke with do not want a

Meteorologist Bill Hostetter in Ruidoso predicts today's weather to be considerably cloudy with thundershowers by afternoon. The winds will be locally gusty near thundershowers. Tonight, thundershowers will be ending with cloudiness decreasing, winds will be light.

Friday will be partly cloudy with a chance for afternoon thundershowers and mostly southerly winds. Precipitation forecasts are today, 30 percent; tonight, 20 percent; and Friday, 30 percent.

The outlook for the weekend includes partly cloudy skies and warmer temperatures with scattered, mostly afternoon thundershowers.

Ruidoso's average rainfall for August since 1942 is 4.32 inches. The wettest August was in 1984 with 11.36 inches and the driest August was in 1948 with 1.12 inches.

July's rainfall is near record

July, 1988 was the third wettest July since 1942, according to Ruidoso meteorologist Bill Hostetter.

The official Ruidoso July precipitation of 7.25 inches was 3.05 inches (or 173 percent) above the average July total of 4.20 inches.

Rainfall was measured on 22 days with the greatest daily amount, 1.21 inches, measured on the 17th. A trace was observed on two days, July 8 and 12.

Thundershowers occurred on 21 of the 31 days with some hail and flash flooding on the 19th.

The mean temperature of 63.9 degrees was .7 degrees below the long-term average of 64.6 degrees. The average minimum temperature of 49.4 degrees was 1.6 degrees above normal; the average maximum of 78.4 degrees was 2.9 degrees below normal.

Families get lodging break


Needy families who have a member in Lincoln County Medical Center will find lodging compliments of the Ruidoso Lodgers' Association.

Search starts to find person for MainStreet

MainStreet Ruidoso will begin a state-wide search to replace outgoing project manager Donna Edwards.

MainStreet president Margaret Lahey, said the group will advertise locally in order to hire an interim manager, until a more extensive state- or nation-wide search can be implemented.

At a MainStreet coffee Wednesday, Lahey announced to about 30 MainStreet members that the group will begin several projects, including early morning "sweep-up times." The event will be designed to get the business owners on Sud- derth to sweep the front of their stores, and "make a big street party out of it," Lahey said.

Other events will include: a ZIP Code survey to identify the areas that Ruidoso most draws on for its tourist trade; a more localized advertising campaign in cities such as Roswell and Alamogordo; a block captain system for MainStreet members to ease the distribution of information and more early morning coffees.

"This is a self-help group," Lahey said, adding that the coffees will be used by the members to keep in touch.

from 41 degrees on July 2 to 86 degrees on July 21.

All-time temperature extremes were 97 degrees on June 28, 1951 and minus 26 degrees on January 6, 1971 and February 1, 1951.

The wettest month in Ruidoso since 1942 was August, 1984 when 11.36 inches fell. The wettest year since 1942 was 1965 when 34.37 inches of precipitation accumulated.

The driest month was April, 1972 and 1974 and January, 1967 when no rain or snow was measured. The driest year was 1970 with a total of 12.25 inches.

The winter of 1974-75 claimed the most snow with an estimated 101.5 inches and 1976-77 claimed the most measured snow of 78.5 inches. Most snow on the ground was 24 inches on December 14, 1987.

Care center chief cites care goals

With just a half-dozen people present, the Service Club Council heard from Gary Purvines, the new director of Ruidoso Care Center.

A major problem for long-term care patients is "out of sight out of mind," said Purvines.

He said Ruidoso Care Center is owned by Horizon Healthcare, one of only two New Mexico corporations listed on the New York Stock Exchange. Although Horizon is the third owner of the local center, Purvines stressed that the current owner is in the long-term care business "for the long run."

Quality patient care is a priority for Horizon, a company that owns 12 facilities in New Mexico.

Horizon is a major provider of care for Alzheimer's patients. Purvines said he is particularly proud of the Alzheimer's unit of Ruidoso Care Center. He said the center is designed with the needs of the

patient in mind.

The Care Center also sponsors an Alzheimer's support group for families of victims of the degenerative disease.

"It takes special people to work with Alzheimer's victims," said Purvines, praising the staff of the living center.

He described Horizon's three-part quality assurance program that helps keep the operation at or above state standards.

"Horizon has spent a half million dollars in exterior and interior remodeling at the Care Center," said Purvines.

Current projects include hiring a certified recreational therapist and offering a training program for certified nursing aides. Ruidoso Care Center will host an Alzheimer's conference in November.

Purvines said Horizon has made a commitment to the Village of

Ruidoso, and intends to be a good neighbor and a useful part of the community.

"If this community succeeds, our nursing home succeeds," he said. Purvines encourages people to stop in at the Ruidoso Care Center.

The Care Center auxiliary meets at 7 p.m. the third Thursday of each month, and is open to the public.

Also Monday, Service Club Council got a reminder of the Ruidoso Downs Arts and Crafts Fair scheduled September 2-4, in the pavilion in Ruidoso Downs.

After the meeting, Barbara Duff, president, said she plans to send letters to area clubs and organizations, reminding them to send representatives to the monthly council meeting. She said if those groups don't support the organization, it won't succeed.

Court action nothing new

The Village of Ruidoso is currently threatened with a great number of court actions over a variety of issues—from airplanes to business registrations, personnel, water and zoning.

Village manager Frank Potter was unwilling to say exactly how many cases are pending, but the council seldom meets without retiring into executive session over pending litigation. When the Planning and Zoning Commission met Monday, that volunteer group went behind closed doors to discuss threatened litigation.

"These are not actually lawsuits," said Potter. "When decisions are made, there are going to be counter reactions," he added.

A hearing is scheduled on August 17, over the citation issued to a pilot who landed at the old airport during the Art Festival Saturday. Vernon Stanley Peterson, 62, of Valley View, Texas, was cited after he landed a twin-engine aircraft on the closed airfield.

It was learned Wednesday that attorney Robert Beauvais has entered an appearance on behalf of his client in the case.

Beauvais said the pilot, who had never landed in Ruidoso, was in radio communication with the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport. He said his client told him the municipal airport is shown on a Federal Aviation Administration map as open, and the controller identified his station as "Ruidoso Tower."

Beauvais said the pilot was cleared to land, and put down on the old airfield. "It was an honest mistake," he said.

Police met the plane, and controlled traffic for the pilot to take off and move to the regional airfield. The police decision not to ticket the pilot, was counter-manded by Potter, and by the time the visitors landed at SBRA, the police were on hand to cite the pilot for violating a village ordinance.

"They just got back on the plane and took off," said Beauvais, noting the visitors had planned to spend some time and some money in the village.

Both Potter and Police Chief William Newman confirmed Potter's action.

"I would have instructed the officers to write a ticket, too," said Newman. "The violation did take place." Newman said the officers "felt there were enough extenuating circumstances."

Beauvais said he also is representing Anne Wilson over her disagreement with the village's new business registration ordinance. Wilson, who operates an Arts and Crafts Fair in the old Skateland, asked the council to establish a new category for exhibiting artists, and also asked council to waive the business license fee.

After hearing her presentation last week, council instead determined the exhibitors were subject to a \$100 annual fee.

Beauvais said Wilson changed her operation to consignment, and took responsibility for cash receipts, and asked him to meet with village staff to sort out the problem. Although a meeting was scheduled for Tuesday, Beauvais said planning administrator Cleatus Richards visited the fair Saturday and cited his client for operating a gallery without a gallery license.

convention center, but rather a multi-purpose events center that would be available to groups with limited budgets.

James continued "I represent a group that supports a center for smaller groups."

Arguments from John Jeffers, executive director of Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, led James to rethink his desire for a facility to handle up to 100 people. Jeffers argued that such limited space would preclude groups as the motorcycle convention, gun shows and other shows which require a large space.

"Small groups can now go to Swiss Chalet or the Inn at Pine Springs," Jeffers said.

Ruidoso Village Manager Frank Potter responded, "I didn't know you did not want larger groups."

Further argument was that the RFP would be a viable study if the village is to approach the state legislature for additional building funds. Ralph Petty, a member of the Economic Development Advisory Board (EDAB), said the village needs a study for its own general information, but he advocated building an events center on property the village is already obligated to pay for, (the old airport).

Ron Andrews, a board member of RLA listed his group's support of beginning a construction project as soon as possible. He said the set-aside of money in the Ruidoso budget was for a "bricks and mortar study," or actual plans and work for the facility.

Andrews said that the proposed study was nothing more than what the local business people already know about Ruidoso.

Potter responded that he "hated" not being able to answer questions about the area, as there are no formal documents about marketing and other business activities in Ruidoso.

Bob Finley, also owner of La Junta, echoed Andrews, "I am against feasibility studies. I'm from the old school...they get their money from the top...and they get their information from us (business people). If we don't go to the state, we don't need a study. I vote against it and I don't even have a vote."

Councilor Tom McNeil suggested the village create a group to get the events center project started.

James added that the village needs teamwork on the project to "get this center off high center and get moving."

Councilor Al Junge accused the village administration of discounting the "viable" work of a convention center committee that came be-

fore the council in January. He claimed the committee was not put to work because the project was given to the village administration.

Richards replied the committees have worked on the project for over three years.

Rick Evans, a member of EDAB, echoed the need for a facility not in competition with the Inn. He detailed the history of the events center, including the accumulation of seed money and the already high tax rate in Ruidoso. He advocated not passing any bonds to finance the events center project, rather pay for the project directly with municipal funds. He also echoed the need for a feasibility study only if the village approaches the legislature.

Petty commented, "we won't get any more money until they (the legislature) digests the airport road."

The group then discussed the situation at the Inn, which has developed a name for conventions; no county taxes are paid, no state taxes paid and no lodgers' taxes paid.

Petty told the group they need to "stop kicking that dead horse" (referring to the non-payment of taxes at the Inn). He claimed Wendell Chino would match any kind of taxes if only taken to him.

Jeffers disputed the idea that the Chamber tried to work co-op agreements with the Mescalero tribal businesses for advertising.

"I have a personal commitment with Wendell," Petty replied.

Petty advocated building an expandable facility with existing funds (\$300,000) and building it soon. "It's not doing anybody any good having that money sitting in the bank."

Katherine Finley concluded the workshop with a request the EDAB write resolutions calling for:

—A multi-event center begun immediately with the use of existing funds (Lodgers' Tax) on the old airport land.

—The feasibility study not be funded out of Lodgers' Tax funds, but by using local talents.

—Cooperation with Chino to utilize the convention facilities at the Inn of the Mountain Gods and consider a joint advertising agreement.

—Making Ruidoso a "model" village in the state by completing the study without outside paid professional help and by constructing the facility without state or bond money.

—The feasibility study to be made at a later date.

Many present at the workshop agreed the events facility project needs prompt action.

ists alike was positive, all liking the additional parking and the view of Sierra Blanca. The food tent was a positive plus for this year's festival, giving goers and artists a place to eat and relax out of the rain (or sun).

According to Becky Durham, chairman of the Arts Festival Committee, this year's festival was the "most successful" show ever.

The Plant Corner

Here are a few tips on fertilizers for container gardening with information taken from Dave Peyton's article in The Herald Dispatch in Huntington, West Virginia.

Here's a secret. You can feed your garden plants "dog food." But if you tell your friends, they'll think you're crazy.

Dog food is great fertilizer, especially if you're afraid of using chemical fertilizers and you live in an area where organic material isn't available.

It's highly unlikely that you can't find some sort of organic material for your plants not too far from your home. Anything that is produced in the ground and living process probably contains some valuable soil nutrients.

But maybe you live where organic material for your tiny garden is hard to come by. Perhaps you don't want to make trips here and there collecting organic matter. Maybe you don't have a way to haul such matter. The dog food is the answer!

Not just any dog food, mind you. It should be dried dog food. In fact, it might be the most overlooked source of fertilizer in America today.

Consider the fact that most plants are in need of nitrogen. That element is introduced into the soil through the natural process of protein decomposition.

Have you read the label on a bag of dried dog food recently? If you have, you know that some of these doggie snacks contain as much as 20 percent protein.

There are two major ingredients in most dried dog food—scraps of dried animal protein and grain meal. Both meat and grain are high in protein. As a result, their nitrogen potential is high as well.

Dried dog food also contains many minerals and trace elements as well. Plants need the same basic nutrients and other considerations as animals. Generally speaking, what's good for your Dalmation is good for your tomatoes.

Unlike chemical fertilizers, which release their nitrogen rapidly into the soil, dog food must be acted

upon by bacteria to convert the protein into nitrogen. That takes time and the nitrogen release is much slower.

So, instead of buying 50 pounds of chemical fertilizer, buy 50 pounds of dry dog food. The actual cost of the dog food might be a little higher but you can cut costs by buying a supermarket-house brand instead of a national brand.

It may not have the same good taste as the "leading brand" but since when did a tomato plant ever complain about how dog food tastes.

If there are no dogs or other critters in your neighborhood, simply sprinkle a cup or two of dog food around your plant and see what happens.

As soon as the dog food gets wet, it will probably dissolve. But that does not mean it has decomposed. It will take several days or several weeks for that to happen, depending on how rapidly the bacteria work on it.

Blood meal, bone meal and cottonseed meal have long been known as excellent soil additives for plants and bulbs. But, when purchased individually in garden stores, the cost is often high.

Dried dog food often contains blood meal, bone meal and cottonseed meal; the very items you pay twice or three times as much for in the organic section of your garden store.

Feed dog food to your plants and bulbs may be your answer to avoiding chemical fertilizers and keeping your costs down as well.

All kinds of animal manures are high in nitrogen and many can be added directly to the plants during the gardening season. But do be careful with fresh chicken manure and fresh sheep manure, however. I have "burned" my strawberries with too much fresh chicken manure. Both have such high nitrogen content they can flood an area with too much nitrogen if they are not composted first.

A Word About Billy The Kid

This is being sent to you on August second - with the Mountain World all shining green and the heavens clear blue with white clouds - and will reach you on August four, the eve of the first presentation of "The Last Escape of Billy The Kid."

Therefore I thought we might make a brief sketch of the kid himself. He is known throughout the world, and more has been written about him than about any Western American character. Most of this writing is by people who did not know the Kid or any of his close friends. Despite much said against him, he remains a great favorite in the history, legend and lore of the West.

When we first came to this valley, in 1925 there were many of The Kid's former friends and companions still alive. We became friends with these pioneers and their children, and grandchildren through the years - the finest friends anyone could have.

The closest you can come to knowing someone without actually being acquainted is learn from those who knew this person. Through the years, then, remembering back to what his friends said of him, you begin to feel that you almost remember the Kid himself.

True to Friends

Down through the years comes a pattern of The Kid's personality. First of all he was true to his friends. He was orphaned early in life, and soon learned the value of a true friend, especially on the frontier. Much of his trouble was the result of taking up for his friends; notably in regard to the killing of John Tunstall, his employer and friend.

A man will be forgiven many faults if he has courage; and even his enemies admitted that the Kid had this quality. He was also known to be, as the Hispanic people who admired and befriended him, "Muy Caballero" (Very Much a Gentleman). He tipped his hat to old people whom he met, and always asked about the family, in the true Spanish tradition.

He carried out the tradition of a true gentleman in that he would

help a complete stranger in trouble. He would not see anyone bullied or mistreated, and was a protector of women and children.

The Kid's real name was Henry McCarty, and the old timers say he was proud of his Irish ancestry, and often wore a green silk hat band.

There is a picture on record of The Kid as a school boy, showing him to be a clean-cut lad. And his teachers in Silver City said he was a good pupil, not giving any trouble and always helping with the chores.

In his school days he was an actor and comedian, and this showed up in his life, later on. Old timers said the Kid was always welcome because he was of a happy up-beat disposition, had a good sense of humor and could sing and dance to the accompaniment of guitar and fiddle. He was very fond of children, oftentimes joining in their childhood games.

Lincoln County War

The term Lincoln County War was not just a by-word. President Hays termed the conflict truly a war, so as to drop all charges and bring peace to the county. In this war the Kid fought on the side of his friends. He himself longed for peace, but dared not put away his gun, after his arrangement with Governor Ler Wallace went astray.

Welcome to the pageant, "The Last Escape of Billy The Kid". Some say this was not his last escape. Quien Sabe? (Who knows?)


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
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

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

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

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

Eyes turn to Old Lincoln town

Wild West fans are in for a treat this weekend as Lincoln County activities include Billy the Kid days in Lincoln and the Pony Express Race in White Oaks.

At 8:30 p.m. Friday, August 5 the first performance of the "Last Escape of Billy the Kid" begins at the pageant grounds in Lincoln. Admission is \$2.

Saturday, August 6, is the 20th annual running of the Lincoln County Pony Express Race. Beginning at 8 a.m. the start of the race is on the Capitan Gap Road, two miles east of the village of Capitan. Riders and horses will carry specially marked mail across the 40-mile course with a change of horses in Encinosa, north of Capitan. When the horses and riders come into the finish, a horseshoe tournament begins. A rodeo is scheduled for Saturday afternoon at the White Oaks Arena. A dance with the Lone Star Band tops the day's excitement.

Special mail boxes for Pony Express letters are located in Ruidoso, Capitan and Carrizozo. In Ruidoso at the Financial Center and Merle Norman Cosmetic Studio; the Rusty Anchor Bar and Smokey Bear Restaurant in Capitan and at Shop Rite in Carrizozo.

Also on Saturday in Lincoln, living history exhibits of soldiers and mountain men, spinning and blacksmithing demonstrations and vendors selling items from frybread to souvenirs will surround the Old Courthouse and the single main street (Highway 380).

Archaeologists digging at the McSween house site will be on hand to explain the purpose of the study and what has been found to date. The Lincoln museums also will be open.

An old-time fiddler's contest also is scheduled for Saturday at Lincoln Park in the center of town.

The Saturday performance of the folk-pageant "Last Escape of Billy the Kid" will begin at 8:30 p.m.

Sunday's Lincoln activities include a parade at 1:30 p.m. and the final performance at 3 p.m.

For Wild West excitement and a romantic version of the 1878 Lincoln County War, visit White Oaks and Lincoln this weekend.

White Oaks is best reached by traveling through Carrizozo on Highway 54 to the White Oaks turn-off about 12 miles north of Carrizozo. The road goes directly to the "ghost town" where the Pony Express Race activities will take place.

Lincoln is located about 35 miles east of Ruidoso, reached by either traveling east through Capitan on Highway 380 or traveling east from Ruidoso on Highway 70 to the Hondo turnoff, then west 10 miles back to Lincoln.

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

Lightfoot Lil, a 4-year-old Muscovite-Bold Scamp mare, drew the high impost of 120 pounds for the sprint feature. She is coming off




Kiper said by the time he arrived at the bar, the suspect had fled after struggling with the bartender. The bartender had taken the gun, a .38 caliber pistol, from the man and turned it over to Kiper.

As the man could not be located Monday night, other area law enforcement agencies were alerted to watch for him. 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
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Zoning group weighs many requests

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) got together Monday to consider a whole string of requests for replats, variances, conditional uses and zoning appeals.

With six members present, the commission took care of business and took time out for an executive session over "pending litigation." Assistant village attorney Mike Rannels called for the closed session, and the commissioners went into the coffee room without taking a voice vote.

A spokesman for New Mexico Municipal League confirmed that the Open Meetings Act calls for each member's vote to be recorded before a group retires into executive session. P&Z failed to vote at all on the motion made by Commissioner John White and seconded by Commissioner Ellen Long.

In the open meeting P&Z denied

Hamilton Terrace, Lot 2B and 2D, a request by Jennifer Jarvis to operate a day care center as a conditional use in a residential neighborhood. Jarvis asked permission to open a child care center in her home at 208 Shady Lane, located in Town and Country North, Lot 6, Block 6.

Commissioner Candyce Garrett cast the lone dissenting vote, noting the village is in need of day care facilities. But the commission went along with neighbors who testified the use would set a precedent and increase traffic in the neighborhood.

During discussions over the request, commissioners talked of the relationship between restrictive covenants and the village zoning ordinance. Later in the meeting, they reminded an applicant that a variance from the village ordinance does not release a property owner from subdivision restrict covenants.

In other regular business the commission:

—Approved a replat requested by Richard Little in Skyland Addition, lots 243-248.

—Approved a replat requested by Michie D. Taylor in Young Heights Subdivision, Lot 8, Block 2.

—Approved a property line setback variance for John W. and Louis Johnson in Flume Canyon, Lot 3, Block 7, 113 Rowan Place. White voted against the variance.

—Postponed indefinitely consideration of a property line setback variance for Lyla Steger at 107 White Mountain Drive. Planning administrator Cleatus Richards said the applicant hasn't provided any further information.

—Set for public hearing appeals on zoning of White Mountain Plaza; portions of White Mountain Meadows; lots 1-7, Block 4 and the Locke Tract of Gateway Subdivision; and the east half of lot 37 and all of lot 38, block 10, Palmer Gateway.

—Authorized Richards to set a date for public hearings on

Block 4; and Riverside Addition Block 6, lots 8-18.


—Scheduled a meeting to discuss policies and procedures at 2 p.m. Monday, August 8, in council chambers of Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center.

—Approved a request from the Ruidoso Gymnastics Booster Club to name the street between the Grindstone Canyon dam and Grindstone Drive. Commissioners learned the group sold tickets offering a street named after the winner as a prize. Arrangements were made through one of several past planning administrators, but the drawing has been postponed until a street is designated. Richards stipulated the group must come back to P&Z with a name after the drawing, and the name must not conflict with other street names.

—Unanimously adopted a resolution calling for bringing the intersection of Mechem and Country Club drives into compliance with the Master Transportation Plan. Donaldson said the increased traffic is a problem, and suggested if the redesign is too costly, Country Club should be closed to through traffic.

—Listened to a number of concerns voiced by White, and learned the Building Inspection Department will be in the P&Z Department. White discussed manufactured housing, load limits on some streets, a nuisance ordinance, a policy manual and advisory letters to real estate offices.

White also questioned Richards over the chuck wagon business on Sudderth Drive, and learned the business complies with village and environmental regulations.

One more time men. There is absolutely no information indicating that the presence of a drag strip lessens drag racing on city streets. There is no argument that the F.O.P. could provide adequate supervision. Perhaps they could. That is not the point. The point is that a drag strip placed in a heavily residential area is entirely inappropriate. Consider where drag strips are placed in populated areas. Near freeways (accessibility); in commercial districts; sometimes not even in the corporate limits. That would not be the case here, and although the proponents of drag racing downgrade the effects of noise, that is of primary concern. Airplane noise was intermittent and faded.

So it doesn't seem to me we should encourage the short-timers and the hustlers by going for any activity, especially one that has so many down sides as drag racing at the airport, that will bring in some kind of business. It would certainly degrade the property values of any adjacent residential areas, something we do not need currently.

Kudos to the News for the positive editorial in support of the efforts of P&Z. It has been a long struggle but the current commission is continually trying for consistency and the general good in an evenhanded manner. It appears to be working even though there will always be some individuals who do not benefit monetarily from some of the decisions. As long as the long term benefit to the town is kept in mind, there can only be long term benefits.

Finally congratulations to Dick Hall for objecting to the ASAY political cartoons. He was right on in his perceptions, and it does raise a question as to why the News picked a rural Colorado cartoonist to print. He must be free to copy, surely no one would pay for that material. It is generally mean, narrow minded and of course to the right, but there are many conservative cartoonists better than ASAY. For instance the local horse cartoon was improvement. Hopefully the new editor may be allowed to look elsewhere for political comment.

WHAT IS BEST FOR RUIDOSO???
COMMISSION MANAGER GOVERNMENT OR MAYOR COUNCIL GOVERNMENT

It may be that the choice will be available. Which way to go?

It appears, after reading about the Commission Manager Government, that there are some differences in the two forms of government that should be considered.

There is no elected mayor in the Commission Manager municipal government, only elected commissioners. Five of them who are assigned one of five segments of the village. They elect their own chairman who most of the time is called the mayor but for ribbon cutting and such public responsibilities and to exercise chair responsibilities at the commission meetings. This is about all. Other than this, his responsibilities are exactly the same as the rest of the commissioners. He can make motions and he is expected to vote on all motions.

He does not appoint people to committees. This is done collectively by all the commissioners. He is not regarded as the head of the police department or anything else. He is just one of five commissioners. There is only one entity of the governing body. The five commissioners. Not a mayor as a separate entity, or the council as a separate entity as is true in the present form of municipal government.

It looks as if it is a lot easier to correct mistakes made at the ballot box if the people want to replace one of the commissioners, because all of them are subject to a recall election. With the Mayor Council government, about the only way to get rid of a dead-head is by proving malfeasance. This is tough.

The five commissioners then hire a manager to run things. This is similar to the way business is run in a corporation. In this case the people of the village could be compared to the directors who are elected by the stockholders, and the president of the corporation could be compared to the manager. Just like in a business that is expected to prosper under the president, this village could be expected to prosper under the manager. If it doesn't he is replaced.

Could it be that everybody would be on their toes more? Maybe yes, maybe no. Only time would tell.

New Mexico Statutes 3-14-12 through 3-14-14 deals with the law of the state for managers, under the Commission Manager form of government.

I states that the commissioners are responsible for the appointment of a manager, solely based upon his administrative qualifications and his selection shall not be limited by

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reason for former residence. The manager shall receive a salary to be fixed by the commission.

It further states that the manager shall be employed for an indefinite term and shall hold office until removed by the commission.

Frankly, as a taxpayer and voter in Ruidoso, I will say without reservation that it sounds good to me. I am tired of voting for people with no recourse, after they are elected. I am sick of the amnesia that effects some elected officials after the fact. And yet there are some of the elected village council that I would vote for again as an elected official.

Where is the petition, I will sign it.

Now that doesn't go along with my image of a reporter at all. For when I'm covering an event or reporting a story, I feel like part of the furniture—there, and yet unseen. It's my hope that the principals in a meeting will be so unaware of my presence that they'll be completely open and candid.

(I'm not holding my breath on that one.)

Doris Cherry said she always wanted to write, but didn't want to be a "starving novelist," and so she turned to reporting. Reporters get to write all they want—and get paid for it.

But, when questioned closely, Kevin admitted that he, too, is nosy. Doris wouldn't admit it, but

I've seen the way her eyes light up at some juicy bit of information.

After enough meetings and a few late night sessions in the darkroom, being a reporter begins to feel like work. Maybe there's a better way to make a living... like what?

Maybe public relations? nah, I'm far too cynical to sell people, things or ideas. There's got to be something with lots of money, great hours and plenty of excitement.

With those kinds of thoughts rattling around in my head, I headed over to the Ruidoso Public Library to teach a session on newspaper writing to students in Ingrid's Writing for Fun class.

A bunch of bright-eyed little kids were waiting expectantly to learn everything they could about newspapers. They helped me teach them how people's curiosity is tweaked by just a headline... and how a lead draws the reader on into the story.

For they were talking about a front-page story about two children killed in a hit and run accident. The youngsters were shocked and saddened by the tragedy... and they wanted to know the "who, what, when, where, why and how—" just as you and I want to know what's going on in our town and in our world.

Somebody has to go about finding out what's going on, how it will affect us and what we can do about it.

"Does anybody here want to be a reporter when you grow up?" I asked.

"I do," answered Misty with a big grin.

Me, too, I thought. Go for it, Misty! You'll be glad you did.

It was great fun, talking journalism with that eager bunch, but I couldn't help but wonder... why don't they all want to be reporters?

Journalism 101 (assuming that you've had a bit of training) that accuracy, along with truth and fairness, is one of the absolute musts of professional journalistic ethics?

If, Mr. Green, you lack the

ability and/or the integrity to publish a letter of mine with reasonable accuracy, I ask that you return it to me unpublished.

REFINANCE BREAK-EVEN POINT
Lower payments are what most people seek when they refinance their mortgages. It also can be a nice way to tap your home equity for other financial needs. However, you should figure your costs carefully before deciding. To tell if you might benefit, start with the two-by-two rule: Your present loan rate should be two or more percentage points higher than today's rates; you bought the house at least two years ago; and you plan to stay put for at least another two years. Any refinancing will have new closing costs: points (each equal to one percent of the loan), appraisal fees, title search and insurance. These can total as much as 5% or more of the new loan.

How long it will take to work off these new closing costs before you begin to realize savings on your monthly payments? Divide your closing costs by the difference between your old and new payments to get the answer in months. It will probably be around two years.

Valuable crystals are sought

Federal agents from the USDA Forest Service and the United States Department of Interior Bureau of Land Management last week searched businesses in Santa Fe and Albuquerque for quartz crystals.

The action was a part of a continuing investigation of the theft of smoky quartz crystals from forest lands, according to USDA Forest Service Information agency.

Agents were seeking smoky quartz crystals which were stolen from the White Mountain Wilderness of Lincoln National Forest. The smoky quartz is unique at this location in the United States and is highly prized by collectors. Since the quartz crystals are located on government land, their removal without permit becomes theft of government property, the bulletin stated.

Search warrants were issued by a U.S. Magistrate in New Mexico for three businesses since the investigation indicates that stolen crystals were sold locally, in three states and several foreign countries.

Federal officers said the quartz was stolen from the Lincoln National Forest site and then sold to retailers here and abroad. Searches are being made of at least 50 retail outlets where the crystals may be on sale to the public since the store owners may have purchased them from the suspected thieves.

The suspected thieves were identified, but as the investigation is continuing, Forest Service special agent Joel Johns in Albuquerque declined to give their names as they are not in custody.

The loss to the government was estimated in the "tens of thousands of dollars."

Crystals are highly prized for purported "healing qualities" and as the White Mountain crystals are relatively rare, they bring a large price on the open market.

Conviction of the theft can result in 10 years imprisonment and up to a \$10,000 fine.
